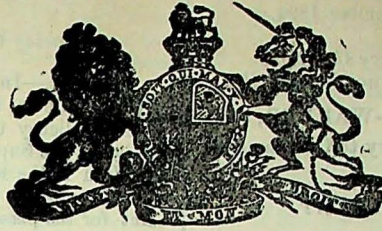

No. 6971.—In exercise of the power conferred by Section 6 of the Bombay Abkari Act, 1878, His Excellency the Governor in Council is pleased to invest the Supervisor in charge of the distilleries at Uran in the Kolaba District with the power of issuing passes under Section 18A (1) of the said Act for the possession and sale of mhowra flowers exceeding in weight four sers in the port of Mora, petha Uran, taluka Panvel of the Kolaba Collectorate, being within the area prescribed under clause (2) of the said section by Notification No. 1985, dated 16th March 1893.
