No. 4523.—The following Resolution of the Government of India, Revenue and Agricultural Department (Meteorology), No. 51, dated 31st October 1894, is republished for general information:—

*Extract from the Proceedings of the Government of India in the Department of Revenue and Agriculture (Meteorology),—No. 51, dated 31st October 1894.*

Read—

Letter from the Meteorological Reporter to the Government of India No. 4122, dated 3rd October 1894, submitting the annual report on the administration of the Meteorological Department for the year 1893-94.

## RESOLUTION.

1. The number of observatories controlled by the Meteorological Department at the end of the year was 177 against 154 in 1889-90. Four new observatories were opened during 1893-94 at the distant stations of Teheran, Ispahan, Kashgar and Kabul, and the accurate and interesting observations already recorded have thrown much light upon the origin, progress and other features of the cold-weather storms of Northern India. The voluntary Observatory at Kodaikanal was closed in January 1894, but two new ones were opened at Port Victoria in the Seychelles Islands, and at Gantak. The observations from the former place are promised by the Port Officer for one year, and the Department is indebted to him for his assistance towards determining the value of the Seychelles as a possession for a meteorological observatory working in co-operation with the Indian meteorological system.

2. Interesting and valuable information was received from 23 officers regarding the amount, distribution and time of occurrence of the snowfall in the Himalayan and Afghan mountains. The Department was thus assisted in determining the probable effect of the winter of 1893-94 in modifying the distribution of the south-west monsoon rainfall.

3. It is feared that the work of inspecting rain-gauges is not always satisfactorily performed, and the Government of India desire therefore to invite attention to the orders regarding rainfall registration communicated in Resolution No. <sup>6</sup>/<sub>3-16</sub>, dated 29th August 1890, and to commend to the consideration of Local Governments the following remarks by the Meteorological Reporter to the Government of India:

‘As the whole of the rainfall data of the year is now issued in annual volumes by the Government of India, it has hence virtually assumed a certain

responsibility for the accuracy of the data contained in these volumes, which are distributed to officials and others interested in rainfall statistics of India and to meteorologists in other countries; and it appears to be desirable, if not essential, that the Government of India should receive information in one form or another that the work of rain-gauge inspection is fully carried out in all Provinces and that the results of these inspections are placed before it so as to show whether the work of rainfall registration is being carried out accurately and systematically, or otherwise.

‘I would venture to suggest in the first place that the attention of the Provincial Governments should be again called to the orders on this subject by the Government of India, and in the second place that in the case of those Provinces where the rainfall registration is not carried out under the superintendence of the Meteorological Reporters, the officers who are in charge of it should be authorized to submit through their Local Governments a brief report annually, shortly after the close of the year, on the state of the rainfall registration system under their superintendence, as shown by the comparison of the rainfall statements themselves, and also by the examination of the inspection reports they have received in the course of the year.’

4. The system of storm warnings to Indian ports was continued unaltered, while 341 special warnings of approaching floods were issued during the year to the local authorities concerned. The Meteorological Reporter is, however, without information as to how far the warnings thus issued were trustworthy and of use. The Government of India would therefore be glad if officers who receive these warnings will report on this point to the Meteorological Reporter to the Government of India, and offer any suggestions that may occur to them for improving the existing arrangements.

5. Under the head of Marine Meteorology an increase of work is again recorded. Since the 1st January 1893, daily weather reports and charts have been issued for the whole of the Indian land and sea area. These reports give promise of valuable aid in the determination of the relations between the meteorology of India and of the adjacent seas, and, if continued, will probably furnish data for working out the meteorology of the latter, the necessity for which, in connection with the selection of the best routes for steamers and the more important lines of communication between India and the East in the different seasons of the year, has recently been brought to notice by the Ship Masters' Society of London.

6. The south-west monsoon of 1893 was of an exceptionally abnormal character, and the Government of India agree with the Meteorological Reporter that the forecast of the seasonal rainfall gave a fair approximation to the general features of the monsoon, and that the methods employed in preparing the forecast appear to be based on correct principles.

7. Partly in consequence of the absence on leave of the Meteorological Reporter to the Government of India, and partly owing to the increase of work at the meteorological offices, fewer observatories have been inspected than in previous years, but the Government of India are glad to observe

that the method of inspection has been systematized and directed to the discovery of the causes of inaccurate observations detected by examination of the telegraphic reports. Measures have also been taken to secure as far as possible the instruction and training of observers by officers of the Meteorological Department, and one of the chief causes of erroneous observations will thus be minimized.

8. Observations continue to be taken in certain forest areas in order to throw light on the influence of forest growth in modifying the distribution and amount of rainfall. The Meteorological Reporter doubts whether it is desirable to continue these observations 'since,' he remarks, 'experience as well as theory appear to indicate that any differences with regard to temperature, humidity, etc., due to forest growth will very probably be small in amount, and their determination requires not only careful and accurate, but also intelligent observation, in order that these effects may be ascertained without intermixture with other unknown effects.' The Government of India have recently sanctioned proposals for the improvement of these forest observations, and they would prefer to await the result of the measures taken with this object before passing orders on the suggestion to discontinue all such observations.

9. To the publications of the Department has been added a Daily Weather Report for Madras, which is understood to meet local requirements. The printing of the observations taken at Trivandrum has been unfortunately delayed. A portion is ready for issue, and it is hoped that the whole of Volume I will be issued during the present year.

10. The question raised by the observations in paragraphs 130 to 135 of the Report on the inexpediency of altering the conditions of exposure in old-established observatories, and thus rendering comparison between past and future observations unsatisfactory or impossible, will be dealt with separately.

11. The Government of India again tender their thanks to Mr. Elliot for the manner in which he has superintended the Department under his charge, to his assistants and to the Provincial Reporters for the good work done by them, and to the many gentlemen unconnected with the Department who have rendered it valuable assistance in the matter of observations and information.

ORDER.—Ordered that the foregoing Resolution be forwarded to the several Departments of the Government of India, to Local Governments and Administrations, to the Director-General of Telegraphs, to the Surgeon-General with the Government of India, and to the Meteorological Reporter to the Government of India.

Ordered also, that it be published in the Supplement to the *Gazette of India*.

## MARINE DEPARTMENT.

*Bombay Castle, 23rd November 1894.*

No. 94.—The following Notice to Mariners is published for general information :—

"GULF OF ADEN—NORTH SHORE, ADEN HARBOUR.  
*Intended light on the edge of Marbat Shoal: Uniform system of buoyage and lighting up of the inner harbour buoys at night.*

Information has been received from the Port Officer, Aden, dated 10th instant, that on 15th January 1895 two lights will be shown from a light-vessel moored in 22 feet water half a cable west of the Marbat Shoal buoy at the entrance of Aden Harbour.

The lights will be two fixed red vertical lights, three feet apart, the lower light being 20 feet above the sea-level and visible in clear weather from a distance of eight miles.

The light-vessel will be painted red, and will carry a red ball at her mast-head during the day, and is intended to enable vessels to clear Ras Tarshein, also to mark the edge of Marbat Shoal.

Aden light-vessel bears N. 27° E. (magnetic) from the position.

The Marbat Shoal buoy will be removed.

*Directions.*—Vessels entering Aden Harbour from the eastward should not shoal under six fathoms low water spring tides until Aden light-vessel is well open to the westward of the Marbat Shoal light-vessel, then haul in for any point between the Marbat Shoal light and the 'Anadyr' wreck light, in a direct line between these two marks and 300 feet to the westward of the former, the depth being not less than 26 feet low water spring tides.

*Buoyage of the Inner Harbour.*—The inner harbour will be buoyed in accordance with the International System on or about the 15th January 1895,—red conical buoys carrying red lights at night on the starboard hand and black can buoys carrying green lights on the port hand.

The entrance channel will probably have been dredged to 26 feet low water spring tides by 15th January 1895, enabling steamers drawing 25½ feet to enter at low water."

No. 95.—The following Notice to Mariners is published for general information :—

*Position of Manora (Karachi) Light-house.*

*(Latest determination of the Great Trigonometrical Survey of India.)*

Information has been received from the Port Officer, Karachi, dated 14th instant, that according to the recent determination of the Great Trigonometrical Survey of India the position of the light-house at Manora (Karachi) is as follows:

No. 96.—The following alterations which it is proposed to make in the rules made under Section 6 of the Indian Ports Act, 1839, and published under Government Notification No. 97, dated 16th December 1885, are published for the information of persons likely to be affected thereby.

The alterations will be taken into consideration on or after the 1st January 1895, when any objections or suggestions received before that date will also be considered :—

- For the following wording in clause (1), viz. "No vessels of and exceeding 100 feet in length shall attempt to turn in the inshore channel, hereinafter defined, between the extreme north-east corner of the Carnac Bandar and the buoy marking the south-west entrance of Cross Island reef," substitute "No vessels of or exceeding 100 feet in length shall attempt to turn in the inshore channel as defined in clause (3)."

- For clause (3) substitute the following :

The inshore channel before referred to comprises that area of water bounded as follows :

On the north by a line drawn from the north extreme of Carnac Bandar sea wall to the extreme north point of Cross Island. On the south by a line drawn from the Tower of St. Xavier's College to the north side of the Pilgrims' dharmshala and continued to the east limit. On the east by a line drawn from the Malet Shelf beacon through the beacon on the N.W. extreme of Cross Island reefs and

continued to the south limit. On the west by a line drawn along the sea walls of the Carnac and Mody Bandars and continued to the south limit.

No. 97.—Under the provisions of Section 74 of the Bombay Port Trust Act, 1879, the following alterations in Pilotage Bye-laws Nos. 7 and 34, made by the Trustees of the Port of Bombay under Section 72 of the said Act, are published :—

- For paragraph 7 substitute the following :

Master Pilots and Pilots will be provided with a distinguishing flag which is to be displayed on vessels while in their charge where it can best be seen and apart from other signals.

- The clause of paragraph 7 as above beginning with the words "The flags and pennants of the" and ending with "3rd Grade Pilots—5 Ditto W"—to be deleted.

- Substitute for the following portion of paragraph 34, viz. "berth the vessel in the Harbour, hoisting the letter R flag, the signal for the Health Officer of the Port to inspect," the following wording, viz., "berth the vessel in the Harbour, hoisting the signal for the Health Officer to inspect, which is the letter R flag by day, or if the vessel arrives after dark three lights, of which the upper and lower lights shall be red and the centre light white."

## "EXAMINATIONS FOR THE CIVIL SERVICE OF INDIA.

An open Competitive Examination for admission to the Civil Service of India will be held in London, under the subjoined Regulations, commencing on the 1st August 1895.

The number of persons to be selected at this Examination will be announced hereafter.

No person will be admitted to compete from whom the Secretary, Civil Service Commission, has not received on or before the 31st May 1895, an application on the prescribed form, accompanied by evidence on the points mentioned in Regulation 2, and by a list of the subjects in which the candidate desires to be examined. Evidence of health and character must bear date not earlier than 1st May 1895.

The order for admission to the examination will be posted on the 18th July 1895, to the address given on the form of application. It will contain instructions as to the time and place at which candidates will be required to attend, and as to the manner in which the fee (the amount of which is at present under consideration) is to be paid.

## REGULATIONS.

\*.\* The following Regulations, made by the Secretary of State for India in Council, are liable to alteration from year to year.

1. An examination for admission to the Civil Service of India, open to all qualified persons, will be held in London in August of each year. The date of the examination and the number of appointments to be made for each Province will be announced beforehand by the Civil Service Commissioners.

2. No person will be deemed qualified who shall not satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners:—

(i.) That he is a natural-born subject of Her Majesty.

(ii.) That his age will be above twenty-one years and under twenty-three years, on the 1st April, in the year in which the examination is to be held.

[N.B.—In the case of Natives of India it will be necessary for a candidate to obtain a certificate of age and nationality signed, should he be a resident in British India, by the Secretary to Government of the Province, or the Commissioner of the Division within which his family resides, or should he reside in a Native State, by the highest Political Officer accredited to the State in which his family resides.]

(iii.) That he has no disease, constitutional affection, or bodily infirmity unfitting him, or likely to unfit him, for the Civil Service of India.

(iv.) That he is of good moral character.

3. Should the evidence upon the above points be *primâ facie* satisfactory to the Civil Service Commissioners, the candidate, on payment of the prescribed fee, will be admitted to the examination. The Commissioners may, however, in their discretion at any time prior to the grant of the Certificate of Qualification hereinafter referred to, institute such further inquiries as they may deem necessary; and if the result of such inquiries, in the case of any candidate, should be unsatisfactory to them in any of the above respects, he will be ineligible for admission to the Civil Service of India, and if already selected, will be removed from the position of a Probationer.

4. The Open Competitive Examination will take place only in the following branches of knowledge:—

Candidates are at liberty to name any or all of these branches of knowledge (c). No subjects are obligatory.

5. The merit of the persons examined will be estimated by marks; and the number set opposite to each branch in the preceding regulation denotes the greatest number of marks that can be obtained in respect of it.

6. The marks assigned to candidates in each branch will be subject to such deduction as the Civil Service Commissioners may deem necessary (d) in order to secure that 'a candidate be allowed no credit at all for taking up a subject in which he is a mere smatterer.'

7. The examination will be conducted on paper and *visà voce*, as may be deemed necessary.

8. The marks obtained by each candidate, in respect of each of the subjects in which he shall have been examined, will be added up, and the names of the several candidates who shall have obtained, after the deduction above-mentioned, a greater aggregate number of marks than any of the remaining candidates, will be set forth in order of merit, and such candidates shall be deemed to be selected candidates for the Civil Service of India, provided they appear to be in other respects duly qualified. Should any of the selected candidates become disqualified, the Secretary of State for India will determine whether the vacancy thus created shall be filled up or not. In the former case, the candidate next in order of merit, and in other respects duly qualified, shall be deemed to be a selected Candidate. A candidate entitled to be deemed a selected candidate, but declining to accept the

nomination as such, which may be offered to him, will be disqualified for any subsequent competition.

9. Selected candidates before proceeding to India will be on probation for one year, at the end of which time they will be examined, with a view of testing their progress in the following subjects (e):—

In this examination, as in the open competition, the merit of the candidates examined will be estimated by marks (which will be subject to deductions in the same way as the marks assigned at the open competition), and the number set opposite to each subject denotes the greatest number of marks that can be obtained in respect of it. The examination will be conducted on paper and *visà voce*, as may be deemed necessary. This examination will be held at the close of the year of probation, and will be called the 'Final Examination.'

10. The selected candidates will also be tested during their probation as to their proficiency in riding.

The examinations in riding will be held as follows:—

- (1) Shortly after the result of the Open Competitive Examination has been declared, or at such time or times as the Commissioners may appoint during the course of the probationary year.
- (2) Again, at the time of the Final Examination, candidates who may fully satisfy the Commissioners of their ability to ride well and to perform journeys on horseback, shall receive a certificate which shall entitle them to be credited with 200 marks to be added to their marks in the Final Examination.
- (3) Candidates who fail to obtain this certificate, but who gain a certificate of minimum proficiency in riding, will be allowed to proceed to India, but will be subjected on their arrival to such further tests in riding as may be prescribed by their Government, and shall receive no increase to their initial salary until they have passed

(e) Instructions, showing the extent of the examination, will be issued to the successful candidates as soon as possible after the result of the Open Competition is declared.

such tests to the satisfaction of that Government. A candidate who fails at the end of the year of probation to gain at least the certificate of minimum proficiency in riding, will be liable to have his name removed from the list of selected candidates.

11. The selected candidates who, at the Final Examination, shall be found to have a competent knowledge of the subjects specified in Regulation 9, and who shall have satisfied the Civil Service Commissioners of their eligibility in respect of nationality, age, health, character, and ability to ride, shall be certified by the said Commissioners to be entitled to be appointed to the Civil Service of India, provided they shall comply with the regulations in force, at the time, for that Service.

12. Persons desirous to be admitted as candidates, must apply on forms, which may be obtained from 'The Secretary, Civil Service Commission, London, S. W.,' at any time after the 1st December, in the year previous to that in which the examination is to be held. The forms must be returned so as to be received at the office of the Civil Service Commissioners on or before 31st May, in the year in which the Examination is to be held.

The Civil Service Commissioners are authorized by the Secretary of State for India in Council to make the following announcements:—

(i.) *Selected candidates will be allotted to the various provinces upon a consideration of all the circumstances, including their own wishes; but the requirements of the Public Service will rank before every other consideration.*

(ii.) *An allowance amounting to £100 will be given to all candidates who pass their probation at one of the Universities or Colleges which have been approved by the Secretary of State, viz., the Universities of Oxford, Cambridge, Dublin, Glasgow, Edinburgh, St. Andrew's, and Aberdeen; Victoria University, Manchester; University College, London; and King's College, London; provided such candidates shall have passed the Final Examination to the satisfaction of the Civil Service Commissioners, and shall have conducted themselves well and complied with such rules as may be laid down for the guidance of selected candidates. The whole probation must ordinarily be passed at the same Institution. Migration will not be permitted except for special reasons approved by the Secretary of State.*

(iii.) *The allowance of £100 will not be paid to any selected candidate until he has been certified by the Civil Service Commissioners to be entitled to be appointed to the Civil Service of India; and every certificated candidate must, before receiving his allowance, give a written undertaking to refund the amount in the event of his failing to proceed to India.*

(iv.) *All candidates obtaining certificates will be also required to enter into covenants, by which, amongst other things, they will bind themselves to make such payments as under the rules and regulations for the time being in force, they may be required to make towards their own pensions or for the pensions of their families. The stamps payable on these covenants amount to £1.*

(v.) *The seniority in the Civil Service of India of the selected candidates will be determined according to the order in which they stand on the list resulting from the combined marks of the Open Competitive and Final Examinations.*

(vi.) *Selected candidates will be required to report their arrival in India within such period after the grant of their Certificate of Qualification as the Secretary of State may in each case direct.*

(vii.) *Candidates rejected at the Final Examination held in any year will in no case be allowed to present themselves for re-examination.*

#### CIVIL SERVICE OF INDIA.

#### Open Competition of 1895.

**EVIDENCE OF AGE TO BE REQUIRED FROM CANDIDATES FOR THE CIVIL SERVICE OF INDIA.**

I.—Every candidate born in the United Kingdom should produce a certificate from the Registrar-General of Births, Marriages and Deaths, or from one of his provincial officers. This certificate may be obtained from the Registrar-General in London, Dublin or Edinburgh, or from the Superintendent Registrar of the District in which the birth took place.

II.—A candidate born of European parents in India may produce a certificate of Baptism from the district in which he was baptised. If this does not also mention the date of birth it should be accompanied by a statutory declaration by one of the candidate's parents, stating the date and place of birth. When such certificates are not in the possession of the candidates, an Extract from the Registers kept at the India Office will probably be obtainable.

III.—A candidate who is a Native of India must have his age and nationality certified by the Government of India, or of the Presidency or Province in which he may have resided.

[No Certificates except those issued under Notification of the Government of India No. 2252, dated 21st August 1888, will be accepted for this competition.]

Except as noted in paragraphs II and III, every candidate is expected to produce a Certificate of Birth. The Civil Service Commissioners will not in ordinary cases accept a Certificate of Baptism, or other testimony, unless they are first satisfied that a Certificate of Birth cannot be procured.

Official Certificates of Birth may generally be obtained as follows :—

(a) For persons born in England or Wales since 30th June 1837.—From the Registrar-Gen-

SYLLABUS,

Showing the extent of the Examination in certain subjects at the Open Competition for admission into the Indian Civil Service in 1895.

ENGLISH COMPOSITION.—An Essay to be written on one of several subjects specified by the Civil Service Commissioners on their Examination Paper.

ENGLISH LANGUAGE AND LITERATURE.—The examination will be in two parts. In the one the candidates will be expected to show a general acquaintance with the course of English Literature, as represented (mainly) by the following writers in verse and prose, between the reign of Edward III and the accession of Queen Victoria :

Verse—Chaucer, Langland, Spenser, Shakespeare, Milton, Dryden, Pope, Gray, Collins, Johnson, Goldsmith, Crabbe, Cowper, Campbell, Wordsworth, Scott, Byron, Coleridge, Shelley, Keats.

Prose—Bacon, Sir Thomas Browne, Milton, Cowley, Bunyan, Dryden, Swift, Defoe, Addison, Johnson, Burke, Scott, Macaulay (Essays and Biographies).

A minute knowledge of the works of these authors will not be looked for in

this part of the examination, which will, however, test how far the candidates have studied the chief productions of the greatest English writers in themselves, and are acquainted with the leading characteristics of their thought and style, and with the place which each of them occupies in the history of English literature. Candidates will also be expected to show that they have studied in these authors the history of the English language in respect of its vocabulary, syntax, and prosody.

The other part of the examination will relate to one of the periods named below, which will follow each other year by year in the order indicated.

1. A.D. 1800 to A.D. 1832  
(1895) [Nineteenth Century writers to the death of Scott]
2. A.D. 1360 to A.D. 1600  
(1896) [Chaucer to Spenser]
3. A.D. 1600 to A.D. 1700  
(1897) [Shakespeare to Dryden]
4. A.D. 1700 to A.D. 1800  
(1898) [Pope to Cowper]

The examination in this part will require from candidates a more minute acquaintance with the history of the English language and literature, as illustrated in the chief works produced in each period, and will be based to a considerable extent, but by no means exclusively, on certain books specified each year by the Commissioners.\* The names placed under the dates are intended to suggest the general character of the literary development of the period, and, consequently, the natural limits of the examination. All the works of Shakespeare, for example, will be regarded as falling within the period 1600 to 1700; all the works of Swift within the period 1700 to 1800; all the works of Scott and Wordsworth, and all the works of Macaulay within the period 1800 to 1832.

FRENCH LANGUAGE AND LITERATURE.—Translation from French into English, and from English into French; Critical Questions on the French Language and Literature.

GERMAN LANGUAGE AND LITERATURE.—As in French.

**GREEK LANGUAGE AND LITERATURE.**—Translation from Greek into English. Composition in Prose and Verse (in the place of the latter may be taken, by those who prefer it, a paper of questions on Greek Philology). Critical Questions on the Greek Language and Literature.

**SANSKRIT LANGUAGE AND LITERATURE.**—Translation from Sanskrit into English, and from English into Sanskrit. History of Sanskrit Literature (including knowledge of such Indian History as bears upon the subject); Sanskrit Grammar; Vedic Philology.

**ARABIC LANGUAGE AND LITERATURE.**—Translations as in Sanskrit; History of Arabic Literature; Arabic Grammar; Arabic Prosody.

**ENGLISH HISTORY.**—General questions on English History from A.D. 800 to A.D. 1848; questions on the Constitutional History of England from A.D. 800 to A.D. 1848.

Questions covering the whole period named will be set, but candidates will be allowed to attempt only a limited number of them.

**GENERAL MODERN HISTORY.**—Candidates may, at their choice, be examined in any one of the following periods:—

1. From the accession of Charlemagne to the Third Crusade.

[A.D. 800 to A.D. 1193.]

2. From the Third Crusade to the Diet of Worms.

[A.D. 1193 to A.D. 1521.]

3. From the Diet of Worms to the death of Louis XIV.

[A.D. 1521 to A.D. 1715.]

4. From the accession of Louis XV to the French Revolution of 1848.

Periods 3 and 4 will include Indian History.

**GREEK HISTORY.**—Questions on the General History of Greece to the death of Alexander; questions on the Constitutional History of Greece during the same period.

**ROMAN HISTORY.**—Questions on the General History of Rome to the death of Vespasian; questions on the Constitutional History of Rome during the same period.

In Greek and Roman History candidates will be expected to show a knowledge of the original authorities. Questions covering the whole period named will be set, but candidates will be allowed to attempt only a limited number of them.

**MATHEMATICS.**—Pure Mathematics:—Algebra, Geometry (Euclid and Geometrical Conic Sections), Plane Trigonometry, Plane Analytical Geometry (less advanced portions), Differential Calculus (Elementary), Integral Calculus (Elementary).

Applied Mathematics:—Statics, Dynamics of a Particle, Hydrostatics, Geometrical Optics; all treated without the aid of the Differential or Integral Calculus.

**ADVANCED MATHEMATICS.**—Pure Mathematics:—Higher Algebra, including Theory of Equations, Plane and Spherical Trigonometry, Differential Calculus, Integral Calculus, Differential Equations, Analytical Geometry, Plane and Solid.

Applied Mathematics:—Statics including Attractions, Dynamics of a Particle, Rigid Dynamics, Hydromechanics, Geometrical and Physical Optics, and Geometrical Astronomy.

**POLITICAL ECONOMY AND ECONOMIC HISTORY.**—Candidates will be expected to possess a knowledge of economic theory as treated in the larger text books; also a knowledge of the existing economic conditions, and of statistical methods as applied to economic inquiries; together with a general knowledge of the history of industry, land tenure and economic legislation in the United Kingdom.

**LOGIC AND MENTAL PHILOSOPHY** (*Ancient and Modern*).—Logic will include both Deductive and Inductive Logic.
