No. 10036.—The following rules framed by the Inspector General of Registration, Bombay, in exercise of the powers conferred by the Indian

Registration Act, 1877, in substitution for Rules 82 and 83 of the Registration Department, published at pages 272, 717 and 395 of the Bombay Government Gazette, Part I, dated 5th April 1883, 18th August 1887 and 4th May 1893, respectively, having been approved by Government, are published for general information:—

82. (a) A Departmental Examination in questions relating to the Registration Act and Rules and the General Stamp Act

Annual Departmental Registration Examination.

shall be held yearly in September in each district. All clerks and karkuns of the Registration Department in the direct employ of Government shall be required to pass such examination before being confirmed in their appointments. In ordinary cases no person shall be appointed clerk to a Registrar who has not already passed that examination. In special cases a person who has not passed the above examination may be appointed a Registrar's clerk, subject to the proviso that if on the expiration of three months from date of appointment as above, such person does not pass the Departmental Examination, he shall, from the expiration of those three months, until he so passes, draw only four-fifths of the pay of the Registration clerkship, and be ineligible for promotion to any other post in the Registration Department. In such special cases it shall be the duty of the Inspector General, if the annual Departmental Examination is more than three months off at the time of the man's appointment to the Registry clerkship, to prepare an examination paper containing questions relating to the Registration Act and Rules and the General Stamp Act, and to despatch this paper to the Registrar under whom the clerk is serving on the expiration of three months from the latter's appointment, in order that the clerk may undergo an examination in the contents of that paper. The clerk's answers shall subsequently be returned to the Inspector General in order that the latter may determine whether the former has passed the examination. Passing in such a case shall be held to be equivalent to passing the annual Departmental Examination in September. All other clerks and all karkuns of the Registration Department in the direct employment of Government may be appointed to such posts in anticipation of their passing the Departmental Examination, but shall not be confirmed in their appointments or be eligible for promotion in the Registration Department until they have passed such examination. The karkuns of any Sub-Registrar, other than the Sub-Registrars of Bombay and of Karachi, not being in the direct employ of Government, are exempt from the necessity of passing this examination, but any such karkuns as are, under the terms of Government Resolutions, Revenue Department, No. 2257 of 12th May 1871 and No. 2724 of 13th May 1873, eligible for Government service may, if they so desire, appear at the examination.

(b) The questions for the yearly Departmental Examination will be prepared by the In-

spector General and forwarded by him to the President of the Examination Committee in each district, and the value of each candidate's answers will be assessed by such Committee, the result being communicated to the Inspector General. The names of the candidates who pass the examination will be published in the *Bombay Government Gazette*.

- (c) In ordinary cases if a candidate who has passed the Departmental Examination does not obtain an appointment in the Registration Department within one year from the date of so passing, he shall not be deemed qualified for a permanent appointment therein until he has again passed the examination, but he may be appointed a probationer. It shall, however, be within the discretion of the Inspector General in special cases to allow of a departure from the rule requiring a candidate to undergo a second examination, if the former is satisfied that the candidate's knowledge of registration work is sufficient to entitle him to the above indulgence.

83. The appointment of every Special Sub-Registrar will for the first twelve months be probationary only. As soon as possible after that time has elapsed, or in special cases within that time, if after careful examination of his office he be reported duly qualified by the District Registrar, the Inspector General will inform Government whether in his opinion the Sub-Registrar should be confirmed in his appointment, but—subject to the proviso contained in para. (c) of Rule 82 empowering the Inspector General to relieve any candidate for employment in the Registration Department who has once passed the Departmental Examination from the necessity of, on the latter obtaining such employment, again appearing for such examination—no such appointment will be confirmed unless the probationer has passed the annual examination prescribed by Rule 82 either within a year before he was appointed a Sub-Registrar or while he has filled that office on probation.

MARINE DEPARTMENT.

Bombay Castle, 23rd November 1894.

No. 94.—The following Notice to Mariners is published for general information :—

“GULF OF ADEN—NORTH SHORE, ADEN HARBOUR.
Intended light on the edge of Marbat Shoal. Uniform system of buoyage and lighting up of the inner harbour buoys at night.

Information has been received from the Port Officer, Aden, dated 10th instant, that on 15th January 1895 two lights will be shown from a light-vessel moored in 22 feet water half a cable west of the Marbat Shoal buoy at the entrance of Aden Harbour.

The lights will be two fixed red vertical lights, three feet apart, the lower light being 20 feet above the sea-level and visible in clear weather from a distance of eight miles.

The light-vessel will be painted red, and will carry a red ball at her mast-head during the day, and is intended to enable vessels to clear Ras Tarshein, also to mark the edge of Marbat Shoal.

Aden light-vessel bears N. 27° E. (magnetic) from the position.

The Marbat Shoal buoy will be removed.

Directions.—Vessels entering Aden Harbour from the eastward should not shoal under six fathoms low water spring tides until Aden light-vessel is well open to the westward of the Marbat Shoal light-vessel, then haul in for any point between the Marbat Shoal light and the ‘Anadyr’ wreck light, in a direct line between these two marks and 300 feet to the westward of the former, the depth being not less than 26 feet low water spring tides.

Buoyage of the Inner Harbour.—The inner harbour will be buoyed in accordance with the International System on or about the 15th January 1895,—red conical buoys carrying red lights at night on the starboard hand and black can buoys carrying green lights on the port hand.

The entrance channel will probably have been dredged to 26 feet low water spring tides by 15th January 1895, enabling steamers drawing 25½ feet to enter at low water.”

No. 97.—Under the provisions of Section 74 of the Bombay Port Trust Act, 1879, the following alterations in Pilotage Byc-laws Nos. 7 and 34 made by the Trustees of the Port of Bombay under Section 72 of the said Act, are published:—

1. For paragraph 7 substitute the following:

Master Pilots and Pilots will be provided with a distinguishing flag which is to be displayed on vessels while in their charge where it can best be seen and apart from other signals.

2. The clause of paragraph 7 as above beginning with the words "The flags and pennants of the" and ending with "3rd Grade Pilots—5 Ditto W"—to be deleted.

3. Substitute for the following portion of paragraph 34, viz. "berth the vessel in the Harbour, hoisting the letter R flag, the signal for the Health Officer of the Port to inspect," the following wording, viz., "berth the vessel in the Harbour, hoisting the signal for the Health Officer to inspect, which is the letter R flag by day, or if the vessel arrives after dark three lights, of which the upper and lower lights shall be red and the centre light white."

Berbera—Exhibition of Leading Lights.

Information has been received from the Port Officer, Aden, dated 24th November 1894, that from and after the 1st of December 1894 two leading lights have been exhibited at Berbera.

The low and high lights are fixed red lights, the former fixed on roof of a house and the latter on a framework above one of the highest houses, both painted red, and are easily distinguished

during the day. The lights are visible six miles at night, and when in line bear N. 77° E. (magnetic) and lead through the mid channel to the anchorage.

Directions.—Bring the Berbera Light-house to bear south and stand on until the leading lights are in line, then haul in for the anchorage until it is reached."

EDUCATIONAL DEPARTMENT.

Bombay Castle, 6th December 1894.

No. 2585.—In supersession of the rules published by Government Notification No. 129, dated 26th January 1887, and with reference to Government Notification No. 2433, dated 6th November 1893, the following rules made in exercise of the powers conferred under Section 24 of the Bombay District Municipal Act, 1873, as amended by Section 49 (e) of the Bombay District Municipal Act Amendment Act, 1884, to prescribe the extent of the independent authority of Municipalities in respect of public education, and the relations of Municipalities with the Government Educational Department, are published for general information:—

Rules laid down by Government under Section 24 of the Bombay District Municipal Act of 1873.

1. The powers and duties of every Municipality in respect of the establishment and maintenance of schools may, subject to the reservations and conditions hereinafter contained, and subject to such alterations as may from time to time be made under the authority of Government on this behalf, be delegated to a Committee, which shall be called "the Schools Committee," and shall be constituted

according to the rules made under Section 32 of the District Municipal Act Amendment Act (Bombay II of 1884).

2. The principles and system of school management, the course of instruction to be followed, and the rates of salary to be given to the various grades of masters in Municipal Schools, shall be those prescribed by the Educational Department under the authority of Government in the Codes for Vernacular Masters and Training Colleges, and in Chapter I and Schedules of the Grant-in-Aid Code, so far as the same may be applicable: provided that to meet local requirements, with the previous consent of the Director of Public Instruction, any Municipality may adopt such modifications as may be found to be necessary or expedient. In case of doubt as to the application of any principle or rule the decision of the Director of Public Instruction shall be followed subject to an appeal to Government, whose decision shall be final and conclusive.

3. Municipal schools shall, subject to the proviso in Rule 2, be provided for all castes and classes of the community, and shall be open to inspection and examination at all times by the Government Inspecting Staff. The Municipality shall in each case make suitable arrangements in communication with the Inspector for the annual examination required by the Educational Department.

4. In the Budget Estimate of every Municipality prepared under Section 88 of the Bombay District Municipal Act of 1873, as amended by clause (j) of Section 49 of the Bombay District Municipal Act Amendment Act, 1884, there shall be a separate section for educational income and expenditure. A copy of that section, with full details of both income and expenditure, and of all variations and alterations made from time to time, shall be forwarded to the Educational Inspector as soon as conveniently may be after the general meeting at which such Budget Estimate, variation or alteration is passed. The School Fund shall be kept distinct from the general Municipal Fund and in the annual accounts rendered under Section 90 of the said Act, there shall also be a separate section under the head Education. A copy of this section shall be forwarded yearly to the Government Educational Inspector of the Division as soon as possible after the accounts have been audited and passed.

5. In the Budget Estimate and in the annual accounts shall be set forth in separate parts the receipts and expenditure—

- (1) for schools within the contract *;
- (2) for schools not within the contract, but maintained or aided from the Municipal Fund with or without a Government grant;
- (3) for any other educational purposes not included in the above, but coming under Section 24, clauses (15), (16) or (21) of Act VI of 1873.

Under the head of 'Receipts' shall be shown separately—

- (a) balance of School Fund unexpended and carried forward;
- (b) the Government contract grant;
- (c) the fee receipts of schools;
- (d) the sum assigned and paid to the Municipality under Section 47 of the Bombay District Local Boards Act, 1884, which is to be expended on educational purposes under the second paragraph of that section;
- (e) any other contribution made by Government or by a Local Board, and any other income received by the Municipality for expenditure on or for the benefit of the said schools, or accruing from the said schools;
- (f) the allotment made by the Municipality in the year of account from receipts of the Municipal Fund other than receipts under (a), (b), (c), (d), and (e) for expenditure on or for the benefit of the said schools.

6. The Budget Estimate and annual accounts shall be rendered in such detail as may be set forth in forms prescribed from time to time by the Governor in Council.

7. In all questions relating to pension, leave, and pay, and acting allowances the rules from time to time in force for the Government uncovenanted services shall be applicable to every member of a school establishment, who has been or may be transferred from the Educational Department, and who was permanently employed by that Department on a salary of more than Rs. 10.

In Municipal Schools so long as persons who hold certificates recognised by the Educational Department or who are already in receipt of pensionable salaries under Government are procurable, no persons not so qualified shall be employed on a salary of more than Rs. 10. It shall be incumbent on every Municipality engaging a teacher as aforesaid to make provision for his pensionary rights and leave allowances, in accordance with the rules in this behalf from time to time prescribed by Government, and every such teacher shall have the same rights in respect of pension, leave allowances, dismissal and transfer as if he were an officer lent to the Municipality. In filling up places of non-pensionable pay, the Municipality shall give the preference to those who have passed an examination qualifying for the Public Service, or who have been useful teachers.

* The contract grant is a sum of money paid at the discretion of Government for the support of a certain number of primary schools said to be within the contract.

Explanation.—In reference to the obligation as to the employment of certificated persons recited in this rule, it must be understood that all teachers on a salary of more than Rs. 10 whether first employed by the Educational Department in Government and Local Board Schools or whether first employed by the Municipalities in their primary and industrial schools are interchangeable. The Municipalities must, therefore, limit their choice of new teachers to (1) Teachers who hold certificates issued by a *Training Institution and signed by an Educational Inspector and (2) Teachers who hold a Drawing Master's Certificate from the Jamsetji Jijibhai School of Art or a final certificate for any course taught in the College of Science, the Dayaram Jethmal Sind College, the Jamsetji Jijibhai School of Art, or the

* A Municipality can send candidates to the Government Training Colleges provided (1) the candidates are accepted as properly qualified by the Educational Inspector and the Educational Inspector has room for them and (2) the Municipality provides the usual stipends and engages to employ the candidates for five years after passing for a certificate.

Victoria Jubilee Technical Institute.

8. Subject to Rule 7, the appointment, promotion, punishment, suspension and dismissal of all members of the establishments of Municipal Schools shall rest with the Municipality or the Schools Committee to whom such power may be delegated: provided that no officer in receipt of a salary exceeding ten rupees per month shall be dismissed or have his salary permanently reduced or be re-transferred to the Educational Department without the previous sanction of the Municipality.

9. In order that the less advanced Municipalities may be relieved of responsibilities which they are not yet prepared to bear, any such Municipality may apply to the Director of Public Instruction, and on such application the administration of its schools in the matter of appointment, promotion, punishment, suspension and dismissal of all members of the establishments of Municipal Schools may be conducted by the Government Educational Department.

10. The scale of school fees payable in any Municipal School shall not, without the previous consent of the Director of Public Instruction, be increased above, or reduced below, that existing at the time of the transfer of such school to the Municipality. Free-studentships in primary or secondary schools maintained or aided by a Municipality shall be distributed according to the rule prescribed in the Vernacular Masters Code, and scholarships paid from Municipal Funds shall be allotted on the same principle. But it shall be allowable to consider all the schools of the same class (primary or secondary) together, and if suitable claimants do not come forward the allotted places shall remain vacant.

11. As to all Departmental matters other than those referred to in Rule 2 as to which the ruling of the Educational Department is obligatory, every Municipality shall give full consideration to the representations of the Educational Department and shall make a written reply within a reasonable time stating its reasons in case it dissents from the views set forth in such representations.

12. With a view to the promotion of private schools and as an aid to the provision of the adequate system of primary instruction which is required by law, every Municipality shall keep a register of primary schools not included in the contract as Municipal Schools, to be recommended by them from time to time for maintenance under the Grant-in-Aid system according to the Code of rules from time to time prescribed and published by Government: provided that a Municipality shall not interfere in any way with such schools as do not desire to receive aid or to be subject to its supervision.

13. A detailed statement of all employes in Municipal Schools, with their salaries and all other items of recurring expenditure, shall be maintained by each Municipality and shall be at all times open to the inspection of the Government Educational Inspector.

14. Every Municipality shall furnish without delay all returns, statistics and any other information relating to Municipal Schools which may be called for by the Educational Inspector.

No. 8218.—It being the intention of the Governor in Council to apply the Glanders and Farcy Act, XX of 1879, to the local area contained within the Municipal limits of the town of Bandora in the Thana District, the following draft Rules proposed to be issued under Section 14 of the said Act are published for general information, and it is hereby notified that any objections to, or suggestions with respect to them, will be considered by Government, if submitted so as to reach Government in the Judicial Department on or before the 15th January 1895:—

1. The Inspector appointed under Section 4 of the Glanders and Farcy Act, 1879, shall, whenever he has reason to believe, from personal knowledge or from information given by any person and taken down in writing, that a diseased horse is to be found in any building, enclosure or place, forthwith proceed to the said building, enclosure or other place, and in the presence of the owner or other person then in charge, or, if he is absent, in the presence of an officer of Police, shall inspect the said premises and execute and discharge the duties and powers conferred on him under the Act.

The Inspector may in such entry and search be accompanied by a Veterinary Surgeon or such Police officers as he considers necessary or by both.

The owner of the premises or person in charge at the time shall give free ingress to the Inspector, and shall in every possible way facilitate the search, and he shall be entitled subsequently to receive from the Inspector a statement in writing of the grounds of entry and, in the event of his premises being infected, shall receive written instructions as to his liabilities and duties under the Act signed by the Inspector.

2. The Inspector shall seize and hand over to the Police for detention any horse which he considers diseased or which he reasonably suspects of being so. Such animal shall, as soon as possible, and with the exercise of due precautions against contagion to other horses and men, be examined by a Veterinary Surgeon and dealt with under the Act. Such precautions shall comprise, in the case of a discharge from the nose, the wearing of a nosebag and, in the case of open sores, the covering up of the same, so far as is practicable, with disinfecting powder and cloths and bandages during removal along public roads; and such removal shall, unless there be any sufficient reason to the contrary, be at night. These precautions shall be enforced in all cases where horses have to be moved for examination or disposal under the Act.

3. The owner or person in charge of a horse which he believes or has reason to believe to be diseased, shall report the case within twenty-four hours to the Inspector or to a Police officer (who shall at once inform the Inspector) and may remove the animal to any isolated building within fifty yards of the stable or to a remote part of the building, enclosure or other place, where the animal has been standing, and shall keep it, as much as is possible, within these limits away from other horses. He shall detain in the stable, until the granting of a license for removal, any horse which has been in contact with or near the diseased animal.

Except as provided in these Rules, no person shall intentionally or negligently cause or permit any diseased horse to stray or to be worked, led or driven in a public thoroughfare, road, street or place.

4. Licenses for the removal of horses which have been with a diseased horse will be granted by an Inspector under Section 11 of the Act, on the following conditions, *viz.* :—

(1) That the horse to be removed shall be taken direct, under such precautions as the Inspector deems fit to prescribe, to a place to be prescribed by the Inspector, where it can be conveniently isolated.

(2) That whilst so isolated the horse shall be inspected from time to time, at intervals of not more than a week, by the Inspector, provided he be a Graduate of the Bombay Veterinary College, or if he is not, then by the Veterinary Surgeon.

(3) That the horse shall continue at the appointed place in isolation for so long as the Inspector, provided he be a Graduate of the Bombay Veterinary College, or if he is not, then the Veterinary Surgeon, deems it necessary to have it under treatment or observation.

5. The owner or person in charge of any building, enclosure or other premises which have been occupied by any diseased horse, shall, within seven days, carry out such disinfection of such building, enclosure or other premises and destruction of dung, litter, and waste food, gear and other articles in or near to the premises, as may be prescribed by the Inspector, provided he be a Graduate of the Bombay Veterinary College, or if he is not, then by the Veterinary Surgeon.

In all cases dung, surplus food, and litter from the infected stable, also clothing and other gear which has been used by or been in contact with the diseased horse, shall be consumed or disinfected by fire; temporary building materials such as thatch of grass or leaves, bamboo walls and matting shall be burned, if the position admits of this being done with safety, and (after complete removal of all dung, temporary fittings and other articles for destruction by fire) the wood-work of the stable shall be thoroughly washed with boiling water, the walls, wood-work and ceiling shall be scraped and lime-washed with freshly mixed quicklime and water, to which shall be added crude carbolic acid in the proportion of half a pint to a bucketful of lime-wash, and the flooring shall be removed to a depth of two feet and not renewed for the space of two weeks, the removed earth being burnt and replaced by fresh earth. The whole of the interior shall then be fumigated with burning sulphur, chlorine, carbolic vapour, or some other gaseous disinfectant.

6. On a certificate from the Veterinary Surgeon that a horse is diseased, it shall be destroyed humanely in the presence of the Inspector, and the carcass disposed of by burning under the supervision of the Police. Except with the sanction of the Police and for the purpose of burning it, no person shall remove the carcass or any portion of it.

7. In the event of the disinfection of premises and the destruction of gear, fittings, dung and other articles condemned by the Inspector, not being carried out by the owner within the period of seven days, they shall be carried out by the Inspector under Police supervision, and the expenses shall be recovered from the owner of the premises in the manner prescribed by Section 9.

8. The Superintendent of Police, Thána, may award to the Inspector, at whose instance any conviction is obtained under the Act, a sum not exceeding half the amount of any fine imposed.

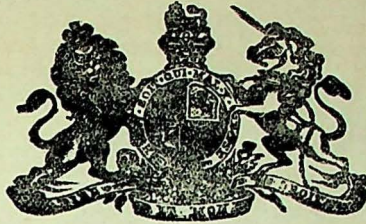
