No. 554.—His Excellency the Governor in Council is pleased to publish for general information the following subsidiary rules framed with a view to carrying out the provisions of Rule 10 of the rules

prescribed by the Government of India for the raising of loans by Local Authorities in the open market, published at page 17 of Part I of the *Bombay Government Gazette* dated 10th January 1889 :—

I.—The execution, supervision and audit of works entrusted to the Public Works Department will, as heretofore, continue to be subject to the rules of that department as published in the Public Works Code.

II.—The rules hereinafter following apply only to works to be constructed independently of the Public Works Department by Local Authorities authorized under the Local Authorities' Loan Act, 1879, to raise money in the open market for the purpose.

III.—It shall be the duty of the Executive Engineer in whose district works are being constructed out of loans raised by Local Authorities in the open market under the Local Authorities' Loan Act of 1879, or of any person specially authorized by Government in this behalf, to inspect such works and the accounts connected therewith at such intervals as Government or the Chief or the Superintending Engineer may direct.

IV.—Such inspection shall ordinarily be conducted twice a year, and shall be chiefly directed to ascertaining that the quantity and quality of the work executed and the progress made in construction are fairly commensurate with the outlay charged in the accounts.

V.—To enable this to be done, each Local Authority shall cause a continuous record of expenditure to be maintained, and posted monthly in the Public Works

Note.—This form and the method of posting it will be found at pages 167 to 170, Government of India, Public Works Department, Form Book, Part I. A supply of working forms can be obtained from the Government Central Press.

Department "Register of Works"—Form B appended to these rules. The measurements for the month and for the year, and up to date must be shown for each item, but corresponding expenditure on items need only be given for those works estimated to cost over Rs. 10,000. The expenditure for the work for the month, the expenditure for the year, and the total expenditure should be shown. Columns should be provided for "Materials at site" and for liabilities. With the above information the quantities and cost (calculated on the normal cost system) may, at any time, be compared with the estimate. With the sanction of Government the account forms may be modified, and actual expenditure by items omitted in any special cases in which this is deemed desirable.

Note.—A description of the normal cost system is given in Public Works Code, Chapter XII, paragraphs 58 and 102.

VI.—Every deviation from any project as sanctioned which in the opinion of the Inspecting officer is likely to entail any increase in the outlay exceeding five per cent. on the estimates approved, or to impair, or diminish the utility of the works under construction, shall be reported to Government and also to the Local Authority authorised to raise the loan, and no such deviation shall in any case be proceeded with without the sanction of Government and of such Local Authority, or otherwise than in accordance with such requirements as Government or such Local Authority, with the approval of Government, may impose as to additions, alterations and amendments in the estimates.

VII.—Every Inspecting officer shall furnish the Chief or Superintending Engineer with a brief report of the inspections performed by him, with such remarks on the construction and progress of the works as he may deem necessary. The Chief or Superintending Engineer shall bring to the notice of Government any points on which the orders of Government are considered to be necessary.

VIII.—The Accountant General shall be entitled to inspect the accounts of any loan work in progress, with a view to ascertaining the correctness of the annual return prescribed in Rule XI. The Accountant General is also authorised to conduct a test audit of the loan accounts of a Local Authority in such detail as he may consider necessary, in order to secure the due execution of these rules.

IX.—In regard to the loan accounts of Local Authorities whose accounts are subject to an official audit by the Accountant General, the test audit shall be conducted by the Outside Audit Branch of the Accountant General's office. In all other cases the test audit shall be carried out once a year as the Accountant General may direct, and shall be confined exclusively to the accounts of expenditure from the loan.

X.—The Accountant General shall, not later than the 31st of December in each year, certify to Government that he has carried out the audits prescribed in Rules 8 and 9, and shall bring to the notice of Government any points in connection with the expenditure on which it is considered that the orders of Government are required.

XI.—The Collector shall require all Local Authorities by which works are being constructed out of loans to furnish to him an abstract in Form A appended to these rules, showing separately for each work under construction out of a loan the expenditure incurred on the work during the preceding official year and signed and duly certified as provided in the form by the principal officer of the Local Authority concerned, or by an officer duly authorized in that behalf and shall forward such account to the Accountant General on or before the 30th of June in each year.

There was thus a net decrease in Revenue of Rs. 1,47,030 and a net saving in Expenditure of Rs. 4,40,030 as compared with the figures of the previous year. The more important variations under the several heads are explained below:—

The decrease of Rs. 5,85,392 under *Land Revenue* was the net result of (1) curtailments, in the present contract, by Rs. 15,00,000, of the fixed allotments given to Provincial to balance expenditure, and (2) increases of Rs. 1,54,538 in the divisible amount of Land Revenue, and of Rs. 7,49,075 in alienated Land Revenue, due to the introduction of revised survey rates. The latter was chiefly in the Shikárpur District, where the increase is also explained to be due to the area of the Bakar Khairat lands having been found on measurement in 1892-93 (when the settlement of the Rohri Taluka was revised) to be more than that previously recorded, and also to the extension of cultivation owing to floods. The considerable improvement under *Stamps* was chiefly due to a special receipt on account of probate duty paid on the estate of a millionaire and also to the receipt of composition of Stamp duty chargeable on the debentures of the Bombay and Karachi Port Trusts, while that under *Assessed Taxes* was due to payment of some large political pensions, higher profits made by cotton mills in Bombay, interest on new loans issued by the Bombay and Karachi Municipalities, the opening of the Umarkot Railway, &c. The decrease under *Forests* was chiefly due to a falling off in the receipts from timber removed from forests by consumers in the Southern Division, and partly to diminished demand for firewood and charcoal from Government forests owing to the great difficulty in obtaining labor, the absence of a good market caused by sales in inámdári lands, and to the North-Western Railway taking less wood. The total decrease thus caused was, however, partly counterbalanced by an increase in the Northern and Central Divisions from grazing, and partly by sale of timber removed by Government Agency in larger quantities than in 1891-92. A favourable season and the more general recognition of the advantages of *Registration* were the causes of the large improvement under this head, the number of registrations in 1892-93 having exceeded that in 1891-92 by 18,634. The increase under *Interest* was due to larger loans to cultivators, while that under *Law and Justice* was due to exceptional receipts from unclaimed and escheated property in the Sholápur District. The decline under *Jails* was caused by diminished recoveries of transportation and Jail charges from Native States. The considerable increase under *Police* was due to the payment by the Bombay Port Trust of arrears of the moiety of the Dock and Harbour Police charges, and to a large adjustment of the value of muskets returned to the Military Department in connection with the re-arming of the Mofussil and Agency Police. The improvement under *Education* was due to an increase in the number of students in both the Arts Colleges of Bombay and Poona. The increase under *Medical* was caused by larger receipts from paying patients at the European General Hospital in the Presidency Town and at Aden, although on the other hand there was a decrease under Contributions, chiefly due to the stoppage of the Gaikvár's contribution for the chair of the Professor of Clinical Medicine, and to the contribution from several Municipalities having fallen into arrears. The falling off under *Scientific and other Minor Departments* was due to the transfer of the Empress Botanical Garden to the Agricultural Society of Western India. The operation of the New Foreign Service rules was the cause of the decrease under *Receipts in aid of Superannuation*. The increase under *Miscellaneous* was chiefly due to a special adjustment, in connection with some old outstanding items, in the accounts of the Bombay Small Cause Court and of the First Class Subordinate Judge, Sátára, under Unclaimed Deposits. A contribution of Rs. 1,50,000 by the Hyderabad and Thar and Parkar Local Boards in 1891-92 towards the completion of the Hyderabad-Umarkot Railway, which was not repeated in 1892-93, accounts for the falling off in *Contributions from Local Funds*. The opening for traffic, in 1892-93, of the Hyderabad-Umarkot Railway as far as Shadiapalli explains the increase under *State Railways*. The improvement under *Public Works* is made up principally of an increase of Rs. 53,396 under Tolls (inclusive of receipts under the Highway Act), Rs. 4,529 under Rents, and Rs. 1,969 under Sale of Produce, which was partly counterbalanced by a decrease of Rs. 5,545 under Fines, Refunds and Miscellaneous, Rs. 1,389 under Sale of Old Materials, and Rs. 1,159 under Sale of Materials received from old buildings.

Expenditure.

The largest increase under *Refunds and Drawbacks* appears under the head *Stamps*, and is chiefly due to the refund to the Bombay Port Trust of composition of stamp duty on the Prince's Dock Loan. The large increase in *Assignments and Compensations* was due to the payment, in arrears from October 1878, of compensation due to the Pálanpur Darbár, and to an increase in the adjustment of alienated land revenue in Shikárpur for the reasons already given under Land Revenue, while that under *Land Revenue* is attributable to the increased establishment consequent on the reorganisation of the Department of Land Records and Agriculture and to the payment of cash allowances to village officers in arrears from 1874 to 1889. The increase under *Stamps* was due to a change in the method of calculating the cost of Stamp paper issued for sale by which the sterling value is converted at the official rate of exchange instead of, as formerly, at two shillings the rupee. The increase thus caused was, however, reduced by a decrease caused by the transfer of a portion of the salaries of the Inspector General and Inspectors of Registration from this head to "18. General Administration." The decrease under *Forests* was attributable to curtailment of timber operations in the Southern Circle, as there was a large stock which could not be sold in 1891-92 owing to the distress prevailing in some districts, to a payment to a contractor having been withheld as his timber did not reach the depôt in time for sale, and to a smaller crop of myrabolans. On the other hand, the saving was considerably counterbalanced by increased expenditure in connection with the reorganization of the superior appointments of the Forest Department from 1st April 1892. The transfer of the charges of the office of the Inspector General and Inspectors of Registration and Stamps to "18. General Administration" caused an apparent saving under *Registration*, though there was an increased expenditure on commission to Sub-Registrars and Village Registrars arising out of the increased amount of business done. The increase under *Interest on Ordinary debt* represented interest paid to the Government of India on the funds allotted to the Local Government for loan purposes. The excess under *General Administration* was the net result of an increase caused by the transfer to this head of the charges for the salaries of the Inspector General of Stamps, Registration and Prisons from April 1892,

and savings of expenditure under staff and household and tour expenses of His Excellency the Governor. The saving under *Law and Justice—Courts of Law* was due to temporary vacancies among the Judges of the High Court, to the absence of the Administrator General and Prothonotary on long leave, and to the retirement of the Legal Remembrancer, whose successor draws a lower salary. The increase under *Law and Justice—Jails* was attributable to a growth in the jail population, and to a special charge incurred in the construction of huts for convicts employed on the Dhulia Water Works. The large falling off under *Police* was caused by a heavy expenditure in 1891-92, not repeated in 1892-93, on clothing supplied to the District Police, on arms, accoutrements and ammunition, on buildings for the Palanpur Agency Police, and by the transfer to the head "Stationery and Printing" of expenditure on stationery purchased departmentally. The falling off from these causes was counterbalanced by the payment of arrears to village policemen. The decrease under *Marine* was due to a special charge for the cost of removing and replacing the Hajamri beacon in 1891-92 not having been repeated in the year under review. The increase under *Education* was due to the payment of leave allowances to the Director and some of the Inspectors. The expenditure on Government Schools, General, was Rs. 8,000 below that of 1891-92, but that on Government Colleges, Professional, showed an equivalent increase. There was also an increase of expenditure on scholarships. The grant to the University was Rs. 5,000 less than in 1891-92. The increase under *Medical* was attributable to the opening of new hospitals in Bombay as well as in the Mofussil. The small increase under *Political* was due to special law charges and to the creation of a post of Native Assistant to the Political Superintendent, Palanpur. The decrease under *Scientific and other Minor Departments* was due to the salary of the Superintendent of the Civil Veterinary Department having been charged wholly to Imperial instead of partly to Imperial and partly to Provincial, and to a special charge in 1891-92 in connection with the tabulation of certain returns for provincial purposes in connection with the Census. The excess under *Superannuation Allowances and Pensions* is explained by the gradual growth of expenditure and the payment of certain arrears at the Presidency. The chief cause of the large increase under *Stationery and Printing* was the transfer of the expenditure on local purchases of country stationery by large offices to this head. The expenditure has hitherto been debited to the departments concerned. The decrease under *Miscellaneous* was due to the fact that, in 1891-92 arrears of the assessment on Government buildings were paid to the Bombay Municipality, while in 1892-93 only the ordinary charge was paid. The increase under *Civil Works* was due to special expenditure for the improvement of water-supply in districts in which scarcity was prevailing, and the decrease under *Contributions from Provincial to Local Funds* is accounted for by the fact that the actuals for 1891-92 included specially large grants for public works and for water-supply. The large falling off under *Construction of Railways* is due to the major portion of the expenditure on the Hyderabad-Umarkot Railway having been incurred in 1891-92, while that under *Irrigation Minor Works* is due to a smaller capital expenditure on the Gokak Canal Works in the year under report. The decrease under *Public Works* is due to a smaller grant having been sanctioned for public works in 1892-93, the state of the balances not allowing as large a grant as in the previous year.

The Revised Estimates of 1893-94 show the following variations when compared with the sanctioned Budget Estimate of the year :—

Rs. 6,61,000 of the increase under *Land Revenue* is nominal as it arises in connection with the book adjustments—assessments of alienated lands less quit-rents—and is covered by a *per-contra* increase on the charge side. The increase is chiefly in the Shikárpur District as already explained when comparing the two years' actuals. Leaving out the book adjustment an improvement of about Rs. 5 lákhs is expected in the divisible (Land Revenue)— $\frac{1}{4}$ th of which represents the Provincial share of this increase. The better results are due (1) to large sales of occupancy rights in several districts, (2) to more extended cultivation and to revision survey rates, and (3) in Karáchi (Rs. 75,000) and Shikárpur (Rs. 2,78,000) to recoveries of postponements of 1892-93, and partially to improved rabi cultivation owing to fall of rain last cold season and in Shikárpur to an unexpected rise in the river towards the end of the season. The improvement under *Stamps* is due to the progressive improvement of this revenue. The considerable improvement under *Excise* is due to the recovery of arrears and to an expected increase in the receipts from "Still-head duty," "Tári shop license fees" and "Transit duty on Excise Opium." On the other hand, the decrease under *Assessed Taxes* is due to a falling off in the profits of nearly all the Joint Stock Companies, &c., owing (1) to the disturbance in exchange, and (2) to surplus stocks in China having checked the China trade, while that under *Forests* is due to curtailment of operations. *Registration* revenue is still steadily progressing. Under *Interest* the improvement is due to Rs. 10,000 on account of loans to cultivators and Rs. 19,000 on account of a change in the dates of instalment of a loan made to the Ahmedabad Municipality, while on the other side there is a slight falling off from loans not being taken up as expected. The increase under *Courts of Law* appears chiefly under the heads "Sale-proceeds of unclaimed and escheated property" and "General fees, fines and forfeitures," while that under *Jails* is due to larger "Recoveries of transportation and Jail charges from Native States" and larger sales of "Jail Manufactures." Special receipts for value of muskets returned to the Ordnance Department explain the improvement under *Police*. The decreased receipts under *Marine* are due to the decrease in trade with China owing to the disturbance of exchange. The improvement under *Education* is due to a larger attendance of students both at Colleges and Schools and to larger receipts from workshops and from sale-proceeds of books. The small increase under *Medical* is the outcome of increases in "Medical College fees" and "Hospital Receipts" and a considerable decrease in "Contributions" owing chiefly to the discontinuance by the Baroda Darbár of its contribution towards the salary of the additional Professor of Clinical Medicine and Pharmacology in the Grant Medical College. Larger receipts from the Bhadgaon farm explain the improvement under *Scientific and other Minor Departments*, and an increase in the number of officers in Foreign Services that under *Superannuation*. The improvement under *Miscellaneous* is wholly due to the sale-proceeds of Nazars received at the recent Darbar at Ahmedabad. Larger contributions towards Vaccination Establishments explain the increase under *Contributions from Local to Provincial*. The decrease under *State Railways* is due to the original estimate for the earnings of the Hyderabad-Umarkot Railway having been fixed a little too high. The improvement under *Public Works* is chiefly in the revenue derived from tolls.

Expenditure.

Under *Refunds and Drawbacks* the increase is mainly due to Land Revenue and Excise refunds. Out of the large increase under *Assignments and Compensations*, Rs. 6,55,000 are nominal, as that sum represents book adjustments in connection with alienated land due to the reasons given above under "I. Land Revenue." The real increase is, therefore, Rs. 11,000, which arises chiefly in connection with the payment of arrears of Excise compensations and of grants to Inámdárs, &c. The savings under *Land Revenue* are due to the lapsing of the grant for the reorganization of the Sind Collectorate Establishments, to the non-introduction within the year of the new agricultural staff in the Kolába District, (the grant consequently lapsing), to larger recoveries in connection with Foreign Service of the third kind and to large savings in the cash allowances to Village Officers. The savings due to these causes would have been considerably larger had they not been partially counterbalanced by a larger number of officers being on duty than was originally anticipated, by the Exchange Compensation Allowances which are expected to amount to over Rs. 52,000, by exceptional payments to officers of other Provinces as compared with such payments in previous years, and by the reduction in Survey charges not having been carried out to the extent anticipated. The small increases and decreases under *Stamps, Excise, Post Office and Marine* call for no special remarks; they have been based on the rate at which expenditure has progressed up to 31st December last. The savings under *Forests* are due to curtailment of operations and would have been greater had they not been partially balanced by Exchange Compensation Allowances. The excess under *Registration* is in charges for commission to Sub-Registrars and Village Registrars caused by the increased revenue under "X. Registration." The savings under *General Administration* are chiefly in "Civil Secretariats" and "Commissioner in Sind," due in the former to absentees and to certain special grants aggregating Rs. 21,500, being either not required or only partially utilized, and in the latter to the Commissioner having been on special leave and to a special provision of Rs. 5,000 not being required. The savings due to these causes have, however, been partially counterbalanced by the Exchange Compensation Allowances. The increase under *Courts of Law* is almost wholly attributable to the Exchange Compensation Allowances, though it partially resulted from a larger number of Collectors and Magistrates being on duty than was originally anticipated, and to a revision in the salaries of Cantonment Magistrates. On the other hand, there are savings chiefly under "High Court" and "Law Officers" owing to a large number of officers being on long leave and other "Refunds." Under *Jails* the savings are chiefly due to the special provision for improving the pay of warders not being utilized and to the grant for temporary establishments not being fully utilized. Notwithstanding the Exchange Compensation Allowances a saving of Rs. 3,28,000 which may be larger is expected under *Police*. The decreased expenditure may briefly be stated to be due to savings in "Supplies and Services" and "Contingencies" and to the lump provision of Rs. 2 lákhs for improving the District Police not being required. There would have been a considerable saving under "Presidency Police" notwithstanding the increase to the force from 1st September last, had allowance not been made for a refund of Rs. 33,000 to the Bombay Municipality which had been overpaid in 1892-93. The small saving under *Education* is nominal as there is really an increase if the transfers of grants to Local Boards for school-building pur-

poses and to the Public Works Estimates are taken into account. The falling off under *Medical* is chiefly in the Presidency Hospitals and would have been larger had it not been partially covered by the Exchange Compensation Allowances. The large savings under *Scientific and other Minor Departments* are chiefly due to the appointment of Inspector of Factories not having been filled, to the closing of the Bhadgaon farm and to the contribution (Rs. 17,000) to the Reay Imperial Museum having been transferred to the next year's Budget. The charges for *Superannuation Allowances* are rising yearly in consequence of increases to the pension list, hence the increase of Rs. 14,000. The savings under *Stationery and Printing* are spread over several heads but chiefly occur in "Supplies and Services" of the "Stationery Office at the Presidency" and in "Stationery supplied from Central Stores." The falling off in the *Miscellaneous* charges is chiefly due to the grant (Rs. 5,000) for "Special Commissions of Enquiry" not being required and to large savings in the grant for "Rewards for the destruction of wild animals." The grant for *Famine Relief* will not be required this year; hence the saving. The savings under *Contributions from Provincial to Local* are chiefly due to a portion of the provision for "Grants to Local Board Schools" having been reappropriated for other purposes and to Rs. 29,000 out of the "Grant for Village Sanitation" not being required this year. The increase under *Construction of Railways* is partially due to charges on account of compensation for land in excess of the amount originally provided, while that under *State Railways Working Expenses* is due to a special debit for making up slopes and shoulder embankments to put the line (Hyderabad-Umarkot Railway) in fair running order and provision for removing sand drifts at certain points on the line. The excess under *Irrigation Minor Works* arises in connection with compensation for land taken up for storage works.

The original Budget Estimate of the current year provided for a closing balance on 31st March 1894 of Rs. 22,73,000, which has now, in accordance with the Revised Estimates, improved to Rs. 34,50,000. The better results are due (1) to a larger opening balance than was taken for the Budget on the results of the actuals for 1892-93 being known, and (2), as explained above, both to increases in Revenue and savings in Expenditure which would, as regards expenditure, have been considerably larger, had it not been for the Exchange Compensation Allowances, which have thrown an additional charge, under the civil heads of Rs. 3,18,000 on Provincial Revenues in the current year.

RESOLUTION.

Calcutta, the 6th February 1894.

Read—

Resolution in this Department, No. 3624-A,* dated 18th August 1893, regarding the grant of exchange compensation allowance to European and Eurasian officers of Government not domiciled in India.

RESOLUTION.—The Resolution of the 18th August 1893 applies only to officers whose salary is chargeable to General Revenues. Exchange compensation allowance is therefore not admissible under that Resolution to Government officers in foreign service.

As regards Government officers in foreign service, the Government of India, so far as they are concerned, agree to the grant of exchange compensation allowance under the restrictions and rules of the Resolution last quoted. But as the allowances will not be payable by the Government of India but by the foreign employer, the claim in each case must, subject to any conditions imposed by statute, or by trust provisions, be decided, in the case of foreign service of the first kind, by the orders of the employer to whom the officer's services have been lent, and in the case of service of the second and third kinds, with the consent of the controlling authority of the funds to which the allowance will be chargeable.

In cases in which exchange compensation allowance is granted to an officer in foreign service of the first kind, as defined in Article 802 of the Civil Service Regulations, the allowance should be calculated on 'assumed pay' as defined in Article 808 of those Regulations. In other cases it should be calculated on the actual sanctioned salary of the officer.

ORDER.—Ordered, that this Resolution be communicated to the several Departments of the Government of India, to all Local Governments and Administrations, to all Heads of Departments subordinate to the Finance Department; to the Comptroller and Auditor General, and to all Accountants General and Comptrollers.

Ordered also, that the Resolution be published in the *Gazette of India*.

SIR,—With reference to Government Resolutions, Financial Department, No. 3298 dated the 23rd September 1893, No. 3825 dated the 4th November 1893, and No. 4352 dated the 12th December 1893, directing that separate accounts of grant-in-aid dispensaries should be kept by the Municipalities and Local Boards from 1st April 1894, I have the honour to request that you will transfer to the administrators of these Funds the cash balances standing to the credit of dispensaries under Excluded Local Funds on the 31st March 1894.

2. A stamped receipt should be obtained from the Local Boards or the Municipalities as the case may be, who will be the administrators of the amounts made over to them, and should be sent to this office in support of the debit to Excluded Local Funds in your accounts.

3. The Funds made over to Local Boards should be accounted for in the Treasury Accounts in accordance with the instructions given in the Accountant General's Standing Order No. 79. Charges against these Funds will be paid by Cheques to be issued by the President, District Local Board, on bills countersigned by the Surgeon-General, or in Sind by the Principal Medical Officer, Sind District, as heretofore.

4. To account for the transactions of these Funds to this office a separate sub-column headed "Local Board Dispensaries" should be opened in manuscript under the major column "District Board" in the Summary of Revenue and Expenditure of the Local Fund, and the receipts and charges should be shown in that column against the detailed entries "Dispensary Receipts" and "Dispensary Payments." A schedule working up to the totals entered in the summary should be

sent with the Local Fund cash account giving the following particulars:—

(i) On the receipt side (1) the name of the dispensary, (2) the nature of the receipt, (3) the amount of the receipt, (4) total receipts, and (5) total of schedule.

(ii) On the expenditure side (1) name of dispensary, (2) voucher number, (3) the nature of the charge, whether establishment, travelling allowance or contingencies, (4) the amount of the voucher, (5) total for each dispensary, and (6) total of each schedule.

5. The Provincial and Local Fund grants to dispensaries made over to Municipalities will be credited or paid to them (according as they bank or do not bank with Government) and the grants from Local Boards to Local Board dispensaries will be adjusted in the Local Fund accounts by *plus* and *minus* entries in the same way as adjustments between the Taluka and District Local Boards are made.

6. The Funds made over to Municipalities banking with Government will be accounted for in the manner prescribed in the Accountant General's Standing Order No. 80.

7. In the case of Municipalities not banking with Government all that is required is that the receipt of the proper officer should be obtained for the Funds made over. The receipts and payments of these Funds will be shewn in the Annual Consolidated Municipal Account of your district under separate heads already provided for in the form of account.

8. The administrators of these Funds should be instructed to apply to this office for the transfer to them of the notes standing to the credit of their respective dispensaries.

9. A list of the several dispensaries made over to Municipalities and to Local Boards should be furnished to this office on or before the 31st March 1894 for information.

10. The above orders do not apply to Veterinary Dispensaries, their transactions being shown for the present under Excluded Local Funds as heretofore—Government Resolution No. 4094, dated the 12th June 1890, Revenue Department.
