PART V.

PROCEEDINGS OF THE LEGISLATIVE DEPARTMENT, BOMBAY.

The following Bill, together with the Statement of Objects and Reasons accompanying it, is published in accordance with Rule 15 of the Rules for the conduct of Business at Meetings of the Council of His Excellency the Governor of Bombay for making Laws and Regulations:—

Bill No. 2 of 1888.

A Bill to consolidate and amend the law relating to Salt and the Salt-revenue throughout the Presidency of Bombay.

WHEREAS it is expedient to amend the Bombay Salt Act, 1873, and to enact a consolidated salt law for the whole of the Bombay presidency; It is enacted as follows:—

CHAPTER I.

PRELIMINARY.

- 1. (1) This Act may be cited as "The Bombay Salt Act, 1888."
- (2) It extends to the whole of the presidency of Bombay; but it shall not come into force in Sind till such date as the Governor of Bombay in Council, by notification in the Bombay Government Gazette, fixes in this behalf.

STATEMENT OF OBJECTS AND REASONS.

The law for the regulation and control of the manufacture of, and traffic in salt in the province of Sind has hitherto been distinct from that in force in the rest of the Bombay presidency. - The opportunity has been taken of thoroughly revising and re-arranging the provisions of the Bombay Salt Act, 1873, and of amending them by the light of the experience gained in the working of that
- The Bill contains some new provisions on the subject of salt-earth. earth (called in Sind "kalar") is earth impregnated with or mixed with salt. Salt may be obtained from it, but it has been held by the Sadar Court of Sind that it is not a natural saline deposit or efflorescence within the meaning of the Indian Salt Act, 1882, and that nothing in that Act affects But salt-earth is obtainable in large quantities and without any trouble in Sind and in other parts of the presidency also and as there is very little difference in the saline properties of it and of natural salt, it is necessary, for the protection of the salt-revenue, to bring the collection of it under control. In sections 10-12 of the Bill, therefore, the excavation, collection and removal of salt-earth except under and subject to the terms and conditions of a license are prohibited in the same way in which the excavation, collection and removal of natural salt are prohibited. But in order that this prohibition may not inflict unnecessary hardship, power is taken by section 13 to dispense in any local area or place with the necessity for obtaining a

It would have been possible for the license for the excavation, collection or removal of salt-earth. The effect of this will be that in localities where there is no serious risk of loss to the salt-revenue, the excavation, collection or removal of saltearth for certain prescribed purposes will be permitted, subject only to such limitations and regulations as Government think it necessary to lay down in rules framed by them for this purpose.

- In Chapter VIII of the Bill some changes have been made for the purpose of assimilating the scale of punishments under the Bombay law to that laid down in the Indian Salt Act, 1882. With this XII of 1882. object:
 - (1) the fine of Rs. 1,000 which may be imposed under section 49 of Bombay Act VII of 1873 has been reduced in section 46 (a) of the Bill to Rs. 500, in conformity with section 9 of the Indian Salt Act;
 - the punishment of imprisonment for two years and fine of an unlimited amount which may be imposed under sections 54 and 55 of Bombay Act VII of 1873 has been altered in section 47 of the Bill to a fine not exceeding Rs. 500, in conformity with section 25 of the Indian Salt Act;
 - (3) the same punishment has been provided in section 47 of the Bill for wilfully and maliciously giving false information as is laid down in the last paragraph of section 25 of the Indian Salt Act.
- The other changes which the Bill proposes to make in the existing Bombay salt-law are designed for the purpose either of facilitating the introduction of the Bombay system into Sind or of improving the administration of the Salt Department in this presidency generally.
