NOTIFICATIONS.

FINANCIAL DEPARTMENT.

Bombay Castle, 6th March 1919.

No. 2024.—The following notification by the Government of India, Commerce and Industry Department, is republished :—

“TELEGRAPHS.

No. 1931-D., dated Delhi, the 1st March 1919.

In exercise of the powers conferred by section 7 of the Indian Telegraph Act, 1885 (XIII of 1885), the Governor General in Council is pleased to direct that the following amendments shall be made in the rules published with the Notification of the Government of India in the Department of Commerce and Industry, No. 6975-137,* dated the 16th September 1909, as subsequently amended, namely :—

1. For rule 18 the following rule shall be substituted, namely :—

‘ 18. *Language, etc.*—The text of private telegrams may be in plain language, in code language, or in cipher, or partly in one and partly in the other :—

(a) *Plain Language* is that which offers an intelligible sense in English, or in any foreign language, or in any of the vernacular languages subject to the conditions of rule 17.

- (b) By 'Telegrams in Plain Language' is understood those of which the text is written entirely in plain language. Nevertheless, the presence of code addresses exchange quotations, commercial marks, letters representing the signals of the International Code of Signals employed in maritime telegrams, of abbreviated expressions currently used in ordinary or commercial correspondence such as *rsvp*, *fob*, *cfi*, *cif*, *caf*, *svp.*, *c/o.*, *b/l*, *mo.*, *upp.*, *am.*, *pm.*, % or any other analogous expressions, the meaning of which is understood at the office of origin, does not alter the character of a telegram in plain language.
- (c) If in telegrams in which the text is written entirely in plain language, any single word or authorised compound contains more than 15 characters according to the Morse alphabet, the excess is counted separately as one word.
- (d) *Code Language* is that which is composed of words which do not form intelligible phrases in one or more of the languages authorised for telegraphic correspondence in plain language. The words, whether genuine or artificial, must be formed of syllables capable of pronunciation according to the current usage of one of the following languages:—
English, French, German, Italian, Dutch, Spanish, Portuguese or Latin.
Artificial words must not contain the accented letters *ã*, *á*, *à*, *é*, *ñ*, *õ*, *ü*
Genuine vernacular words are also admissible.
- (e) Words in code language must not contain more than 10 characters according to the Morse alphabet (Rule 17), the combinations *ae*, *aa*, *ao*, *oe*, *ue*, being counted as two letters each. The combination 'ch' is also counted as two letters in artificial words.
- (f) Combinations, which do not fulfil the conditions of clauses (d) and (e), are considered as belonging to letter cipher language [clause (g)] and charged accordingly. Compounds composed of two or more words in plain language, combined contrary to the usage of the language are not admitted. (See also rule 51 *et seq.*)
- (g) Cipher language is that which is composed—
(1) either of Arabic figures or groups or series of Arabic figures having a secret meaning, or of letters (excluding the accented letters *ã*, *á*, *à*, *é*, *ñ*, *õ*, *ü*), groups or series of letters having a secret meaning.
(2) Of words, names, expressions or combinations of letters not fulfilling the conditions of plain language [clauses (a), (b) and (c)] or of code language [clauses (d) and (e)].
- (h) The employment in one group of figures and letters having a secret meaning is not admitted. It is desirable to avoid the use of letter cipher, as far as possible, as it is less easy to transmit than pronounceable groups of letters, and is, therefore, more liable to error. In cases where it is necessary to employ letter cipher it should be arranged in groups of five letters in order to facilitate transmission.
- (i) The groups referred to in clause (b) are not considered as letter cipher, *i. e.*, as letters having a secret meaning.
- (j) Words in plain language inserted in the text of a mixed telegram, *i. e.*, a telegram composed of words in plain language and words in code language, must not contain more than ten characters according to the Morse alphabet, and any excess is counted separately as one word in each case.
- (k) If the mixed telegram contains, in addition, cipher language, the passages in cipher are counted according to the stipulations of rule 55.
- (l) If the mixed telegram is composed only of passages in plain language and of passages in cipher language, the passages in plain language are counted according to the stipulations of clause (c) and the passages in cipher language according to those of rule 55.
- (m) The address or sender's name in telegrams of which the text is written wholly or partly in code language is charged according to the stipulations of rule 53 and clause (c).
- (n) Registered abbreviated addresses are treated as plain language [clause (c)] when occurring in the *address* or as the *sender's name* in both plain and code language telegrams and also in the *text* as plain language telegrams. When in the *text* of a code language telegram, they are treated according to clause (j).

2. For rule 37 the following rule shall be substituted, namely:—

'37. *Language.*—The text of State telegrams may in all cases be composed of secret language (*i. e.*, code and cipher) but a combination in the same telegram of figures and letters, having a secret meaning, is not admitted.'

In exercise of the power conferred by section 20 of the Indian Coinage Act, 1906 (III of 1906), and in continuation of paragraph 2 of the Notification in the Finance Department, No. 1448-A.,* dated the 8th March 1907, the Governor General in Council is pleased to authorise the Manager, Agent or other principal officer of the several offices and agencies in India of the Tata Industrial Bank, Limited, Bombay, to cut or break counterfeit silver coins.

JUDICIAL DEPARTMENT.

No. 1829.—The following draft of a notification, which it is proposed to issue under the Indian Motor Vehicles Act, 1914 (VIII of 1914), removing the *táluka* of *Sálsette* from the scope of the rules regulating the use of motor vehicles let or plying for hire in the town and island of Bombay and applying to the said *táluka* the rules regulating the use of motor vehicles let or plying for hire in the district of *Thána*, is published as required by section 11 of the said Act for the information of persons likely to be affected thereby, and notice is hereby given that the draft will be taken into consideration by the Governor in Council on the expiry of one month from the date of its publication in the *Bombay Government Gazette*.

2. Any objection or suggestion which may be sent to the Secretary to Government, Judicial Department, or to the District Magistrate of *Thána* or the Commissioner of Police, Bombay, by any person with respect to the draft before the expiry of the said period, will be considered by the Governor in Council.

Draft Notification.

In exercise of the powers conferred by section 11 of the Indian Motor Vehicles Act, 1914 (VIII of 1914), the Governor in Council is pleased to direct that Government Notifications No. 705, dated the 5th February 1917, and No. 6252, dated the 1st October 1917, shall be amended as follows:—

- (1) From the preamble of Government Notification No. 705, dated the 5th February 1917, and from Form B in the First Schedule appended to that notification *delete* the words “and of the *táluka* of *Sálsette*”.
- (2) From the preamble of Government Notification No. 6252, dated the 1st October 1917, and from Form B in the First Schedule appended to that notification *delete* the words “excluding the *táluka* of *Sálsette*”.

No. 1827.—In supersession of previous orders on the subject, the Governor in Council is pleased, under section 8 (I) of the Code of Criminal Procedure, 1898, to divide the West *Khándesh* District into four sub-divisions, comprising the following areas respectively:—

- (1) The City Sub-division, comprising the area within the limits of the *Dhulia* City Municipality.
- (2) The *Dhulia Táluka* Sub-division, comprising the *Dhulia Táluka*, excluding the area within the limits of the *Dhulia* City Municipality.
- (3) The Eastern Sub-division, comprising the *Sindkheda*, *Shirpur* and *Sháháda Tálukas*.
- (4) The Western Sub-division, comprising the *Sákri*, *Nandurbár*, *Taloda* and *Navápur Tálukas*.

No. 1839.—The following resolution by the Government of India, Department of Education (Archæology and Epigraphy), is republished :—

“ No. 48, dated Delhi, the 21st February 1919.

RESOLUTION RELATING TO CLASSIFICATION OF ANCIENT MONUMENTS.

RESOLUTION.

At present the lists of ancient monuments in India are classified in accordance with the instructions laid down in paragraphs 3 and 4 of the Home Department Resolution No. 3-168-183, dated the 26th November 1883. It has been represented to the Government of India that since the passing of the Ancient Monuments Preservation Act, 1904 (VII of 1904), the classification laid down in the abovementioned resolution has been found inadequate inasmuch as it makes no provision for those monuments which, although privately-owned, are nevertheless maintained by Government in accordance with agreements made under section 5 of the Ancient Monuments Preservation Act, VII of 1904. The Governor General in Council has, therefore, given the matter his careful consideration and after consulting the Director General of Archæology in India is pleased to direct that in future the lists of ancient monuments should be classified as noted below :—

- I. Those monuments which from their present condition and historical or archæological value ought to be maintained in permanent good repair.
- II. Those monuments which it is now only possible or desirable to save from further decay by such minor measures as the eradication of vegetation, the exclusion of water from the walls and the like.
- III. Those monuments which from their advanced stage of decay or comparative unimportance it is impossible or unnecessary to preserve.

The monuments in classes I and II should be further sub-divided thus :—

I (a) and II (a).—Monuments owned and maintained by Government.

I (b) and II (b).—Monuments owned and maintained by private persons.

I (c) and II (c).—Monuments owned by private persons but maintained by the owners and Government jointly or by the Government exclusively.

2. His Excellency in Council is satisfied that, while the adoption of the classification noted above will be distinctly advantageous in preparing future lists, it will not in any case render the existing lists either useless or ineffectual, as it will be a simple matter in each province to circulate to officials concerned a brief schedule showing the corrections to be made which may be pasted in their appropriate places in the lists.

3. The words ‘ Ancient monuments ’ in this resolution should be interpreted as monuments within the meaning of section 2 (I) of the Ancient Monuments Preservation Act, 1904 (VII of 1904).

ORDER.—Ordered that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to local Governments and Administrations and the Director General of Archæology in India for information and guidance.

Ordered also, that a copy be forwarded to the Foreign and Political, Public Works and Finance Departments for information and that the resolution be published in the Supplement to the *Gazette of India*.

EDUCATIONAL DEPARTMENT.

No. 737.—The following alternative sets of standards for Urdu primary schools for boys are approved and published for general information in supersession of those prescribed under Government Notification no. 3833,* dated the 23rd December 1913 :—

MARATHI
STANDARDS OF EXAMINATION FOR URDU—GUJARATI PRIMARY
KANARESE
SCHOOLS FOR BOYS IN THE BOMBAY PRESIDENCY (EXCLUDING SIND).

1. Under these standards the medium of instruction shall be Urdu †
2. Poetry lessons occurring in the Departmental Vernacular Readers prescribed under the last head in standards I—VII may be omitted.
3. Books of equal difficulty and of recognised merit will be accepted by the Department in place of the books prescribed in the standards. The whole amount of the reading prescribed need not be required, if the Inspector is satisfied that the amount offered is, considering the manner in which it has been prepared, a sufficient year's work.

STANDARD FOR INFANT CLASSES.

First head.—Numbers up to 100 to be learnt from concrete examples; multiplication tables up to 10×10 . Addition and subtraction up to 10 with the aid of concrete objects. The use of the arithmeticon. Repeating the numbers and the tables.

Second head.—Reading of the primer (Himayat-i-Islam, Lahore series). Singing short and simple songs in unison.

Third head.—Alphabet and 'taktees' complete. Writing on black-board or slate in a bold hand short and simple words.

Fourth head.—Instruction in infant classes may also suitably include the following :—

- (a) Instruction in simple forms, colours and the most familiar objects.
- (b) Narration by the head teacher or a trained assistant of simple and interesting stories.
- (c) Recitation and singing in unison of simple songs.
- (d) Infant drill and exercises and games.
- (e) Some kindergarten occupations according to the convenience of the school.

N.B.—Counting, word-building, object lessons with simple drawing, † stories, songs, games and occupations should as far as possible be connected with one another.

STANDARD I.

Marks.

- 100 *First head.*—Notation and numeration up to 10,000. Multiplication tables up to 20×10 , $\frac{1}{2} \times 50$ and $\frac{1}{4} \times 50$. Acquaintance with the current coins and money tables. Rules and tables to be explained by concrete illustrations. Repeating the tables. Simple mental arithmetic involving questions in the multiplication tables learnt in the first year.

† Where preferred, the medium of instruction in the First head may, with the approval of the Deputy Inspector for Urdu schools, be the local vernacular.

‡ Simple outline drawing on slate or paper or black-board of objects connected with the object lessons given in the class or taken from the following list; for directions *vide* appendix B :—

Section A.—(1) A stick. (2) A pencil. (3) A slate. (4) An envelope (the back of one closed).

Section B.—(1) A ball or marble. (2) An egg. (3) A child's kite. (4) A top.

Section C.—(1) An orange. (2) A fig. (3) A mango. (4) A mango leaf.

Section D.—(1) A boy as in Augsburg's Drawing, volume I, page 22 (*i. e.*, a single line outline). (2) A chick (*e. g.*, Augsburg's Drawing, volume I, page 44).

Marks.

- 100 *Second head.*—Reading the first book, Lahore series (Himayat-i-Islam), with understanding of the part read. Singing in unison of short and simple songs.
- 100 *Third head.*—Writing on slate or black-board in bold hand words from the portion read.
- 100 *Fourth head.*—Narration of simple and interesting stories, the children being required to give them in their own words, and 15 object lessons with simple drawing.* Kindergarten occupations, drill, exercises and games to be continued.
- 100 *Fifth head.*—Reading the first part of the Departmental vernacular primer (Marathi, Gujarati or Kanarese). Writing on black-board in bold hand words of simple letters in the primer.

STANDARD II.

Marks.

- 100 *First head.*—
75 (a) Notation and numeration up to 10,00,000. Pauna and Savaya. Addition and subtraction of numbers of not more than five figures; multiplication and division of similar numbers by numbers of not more than three figures.
25 (b) Mental arithmetic involving questions in the multiplication tables and money tables prescribed for the first two years.
- 100 *Second head.*—
75 (a) Reading 50 pages selected from the second book of the Lahore series (Himayat-i-Islam) with understanding of the part read.
25 (b) Forty couplets of poetry from the book read with general knowledge of the meaning and recitation.
- 100 *Third head.*—
50 (a) Writing to dictation in a bold hand two lines from the book read.
50 (b) Writing large hand. Full copy-book to be shown. Copy-book No. 1.
- 100 *Fourth head.*—Knowledge of what a map is. The four cardinal points. Notions of the relative position of objects with reference to space. Constructing a plan of the school-house from measurements taken by the children. The general geography of the taluka from the map.
- 100 *Fifth head.*—Twenty object lessons on simple objects taken from any suitable text-book, with simple drawing.†
- 100 *Sixth head.*—
75 (a) Reading the second part of the Departmental primer and 15 lessons of the Departmental first book in vernacular with understanding of the part read.

* Simple outline drawing on slate or paper or black-board of objects connected with the object lessons given in the class or taken from the following list; for directions *vide* appendix B.

List of objects.

Section A.—(1) A pen. (2) A book. (3) A bamboo cane. (4) A whip. (5) An Indian balance.

STANDARD III.

100 *First head.*—

- 75 (a) Reduction and four compound rules. Local tables of weight, measure, capacity and time. Easy examples in simple proportion.

- 25 (b) Mental arithmetic involving the use of tables learnt in the first three years.

100 *Second head.*—

- 75 (a) Reading 60 pages selected from the third book of the Lahore series (Himayat-i-Islam) with understanding of the part read and meaning of words.

- 25 (b) Sixty couplets of poetry from the book read to be recited and understood.

100 *Third head.*—

- 50 (a) Writing to dictation in bold hand three lines from the book read.

- 50 (b) Writing medium hand. Full copy-book to be shown. Copy-book No. 2.

100 *Fourth head*—Geography.—Principal geographical terms to be learnt, as far as possible, by actual observation and from clay or other models and then shown on the map. The children to be practised in judging the relief and general character of the country from the representations of its physical features on the map. Knowledge of scales and measuring distances on maps with scales. Physical and political geography of the Collectorate or Agency, with industries, means of communication, etc., and general geography of the Division. Boys to fill in an outline map of the district drawn by the teacher on the black-board.

100 *Fifth head.*—Twenty object lessons on objects (plants, animals and natural phenomena) treated of in the book read or taken from any suitable text-book, with simple drawing.*

100 *Sixth head.*—

- 50 (a) Reading 30 lessons selected from the Departmental second book in vernacular with understanding of the part read.

- 30 (b) Writing to dictation in bold hand two lines from the book read.

- 20 (c) Writing large hand. Full copy-book to be shown.

In Marathi districts, reading and writing from the first part of the Modi primer in addition.

STANDARD IV.

(Standard after passing which boys are allowed to study English.)

Marks.

100 *First head.*—

- 75 (a) In addition to standard III, English tables of weight, money, measure, capacity and time. Vulgar fractions. More advanced sums in simple proportion and easy sums in compound proportion. Simple interest (in which calculation of interest only is to be expected).

- 25 (b) Mental arithmetic. Questions involving the use of the following ratios: 12, 20, 24, 30, 40, 48, 96, 100, 120 and 360.

* (a) Simple outline drawing on slate or paper or black-board of objects connected with the object lessons given in the class or taken from the following list; for directions *vide* appendix B.

(b) Training in use of simple instruments such as the ruler or foot-rule and set-square.

(c) Practice in actual measurement of simple articles and objects:—

List of objects.

Section A.—(1) A key. (2) A pen-knife. (3) A broom.

Section B.—(1) A bottle. (2) A bag. (3) A cask. (4) A padlock.

Section C.—(1) A radish (or carrot). (2) A plantain. (3) A castor-oil leaf.

(4) A lotus leaf. (5) A lotus flower.

Section D.—(1) A bee (as in Augsburg's Drawing, volume I, page 44). (2) A shell. (3) A sparrow (sitting) (as in Augsburg's Drawing, volume I, page 127). (4) A cat (sitting or lying).

Marks.

100

Second head.—

70 (a) Reading 90 pages selected from the fourth book by Moulvi Mahomed Ismail with understanding of the part read and meaning of words. Use of the parts of speech and formation of small illustrative sentences.

30 (b) Seventy-five couplets of poetry from the book read to be repeated and understood.

100

Third head.—

50 (a) Writing to dictation four lines from the book read.

50 (b) Writing small hand. Full copy-book to be shown. Copy-book No. 3.

100

Fourth head.—

50 (a) History of the Province. Instruction in this subject may be given through the medium of simple and interesting stories.

50 (b) General knowledge of the Presidency and India with particular knowledge of the districts in the Division. Boys to fill in an outline map of India drawn by the teacher.

100

Fifth head.— Twenty object lessons on objects (plants, animals and natural phenomena) as treated of in the book read or taken from any suitable text-book, with simple drawing.*

100

Sixth head.—

60 (a) Reading 15 lessons selected from the first two parts of the Departmental third book and 15 lessons selected from the first two parts of the Departmental fourth book with understanding of the part read. Use of the parts of speech.

20 (b) Writing to dictation three lines from the book read.

20 (c) Writing medium-hand. Full copy-book to be shown.

In Marathi districts, reading and writing from the whole of the Modi primer in addition.

STANDARD V.

Marks.

100

First head.—

75 (a) In addition to standard IV, decimal fractions and simple and compound interest complete.

25 (b) Mental arithmetic. In addition to standard IV, examples involving the use of the following ratios : 8, 10, 16, 32, 64, 240, 256 and 320.

100

Second head.—

60 (a) Reading 100 pages selected from the fifth book by Moulvi Mahomed Ismail with understanding of the part read and meaning of words. Grammar—accidence and simple parsing.

20 (b) Hundred couplets of poetry from the book read to be repeated and explained.

20 (c) Reading easy manuscripts.

100

Third head.—

50 (a) Writing to dictation five lines from the book read. Writing a simple letter or a small narrative paragraph. The forms of writing private letters to be known.

50 (b) Writing a bold current hand. Full copy-book to be shown. Copy-book No. 4.

100 *Fourth head.—*

50 (a) History of India.—Mahomedan period, 712—1761 A.D., or lives of six eminent men of the period.

* (a) Simple outline drawing on slate or paper or black-board of objects connected with the object lessons given in the class or taken from the following list ; for directions *vide* appendix B.

(b) Drawing to simple scales :—

List of objects.

Section A.—(1) A cricket bat. (2) A box. (3) A basket.

Section B.—(1) A wheel. (2) A bucket. (3) A spout. (4) A blow-pipe.

APPENDIX A.

At the desire of managers a graduated course in manual training or elementary science may be substituted for the object lessons and science prescribed under standards III—VII. In selecting any such course regard should be paid to the industrial and other needs of the locality in which the school is situated. Managers may select any subject that may be suitable to their locality, provided that the graduated course proposed by them is approved by the Department.

APPENDIX B.

(Directions in connection with drawing.)

1. The subjects are divided into sections as follows :—
 - (a) Inanimate things in which straight lines predominate.
 - (b) Inanimate things in which curves predominate.
 - (c) Specimens from the vegetable kingdom.
 - (d) Specimens from the animal kingdom.
2. Not more than ten subjects should usually be attempted in any standard in a year.
3. In selecting subjects the teacher should endeavour to represent as many sections as possible.
4. In standard IV and upwards not less than one-half of the selected subjects should be drawn from the natural original, not from a flat copy. In all classes, however, where flat copies are used, a specimen of the natural original, if possible, should also be shown to the pupils and attempts to draw from it should be encouraged.
5. The drawings should be made on slate or paper or on the black-board and in outline only.
6. Practice in memory drawing should also be given with the subjects selected for the year's course.
7. Brush drawing with colour (or "mass-drawing" with coloured chalks) may be employed with the subjects selected for the year's course (or some of them), provided managers can make provision for the efficient teaching of the subject.

APPENDIX A.

At the desire of managers, a graduated course in manual training or elementary science may be substituted for the object-lessons and science prescribed under standards III to VII. In selecting any such course regard should be paid to the industrial and other needs of the locality in which the school is situated. Managers may select any subject that may be suitable to their locality, provided that the graduated course proposed by them is approved by the department.

APPENDIX B.

Directions in connection with drawing.

1. The subjects are divided into sections as follows :—
 - (a) Inanimate things in which straight lines predominate.
 - (b) Inanimate things in which curves predominate.
 - (c) Specimens from the vegetable kingdom.
 - (d) Specimens from the animal kingdom.
2. Not more than ten subjects should usually be attempted in any standard in a year.
3. In selecting subjects the teacher should endeavour to represent as many sections as possible.
4. In standard IV and upwards not less than one-half of the selected subjects should be drawn from the natural original, not from a flat copy. In all classes, however, where flat copies are used, a specimen of the natural original if possible should also be shown to the pupils and attempts to draw from it should be encouraged.
5. The drawings should be made on slate or paper or on the black-board and in outline only.
6. Practice in memory drawing should also be given with the subjects selected for the year's course.
7. Brush drawing with colour (or "mass-drawing" with coloured chalks) may be employed with the subjects selected for the year's course (or some of them), provided managers can make provision for the efficient teaching of the subject.

The following despatch from Lieutenant-General Sir W. R. Marshall, K.C.B., K.C.S.I., on the operations of the Mesopotamian Expeditionary Force from the 1st April to the 30th September 1918, is published for general information:—

No. O.-1907-1, dated 1st October 1918.

From—Lieutenant-General Sir W. R. MARSHALL, K.C.B., K.C.S.I., Commanding-in-Chief, Mesopotamian Expeditionary Force;

To—The Chief of the General Staff, Army Headquarters, India.

I have the honour to submit herewith a report on the operations carried out by the Mesopotamian Expeditionary Force during the period extending from April 1st to September 30th, 1918.

My previous despatch ended with the narrative of the operations which culminated in the capture of the Turkish forces opposed to me on the Euphrates about Khan Baghdadi, and the subsequent pursuit to Haditha, Ana, and beyond.

2. In my previous despatch I alluded briefly to the murder of the political officer at Nedjef but not to the motives which had prompted such an unprovoked crime. The reasons for it have been traced to enemy agency, and amongst the evilly disposed inhabitants of Nedjef a conspiracy, fostered by German gold, had been organised, the heads of it calling themselves ‘The Committee of Rebellion.’ The roots of this conspiracy were in Nedjef and its branches extended both up and down the Euphrates Valley. To put down this conspiracy, therefore, and to mete out stern justice to those actually concerned in the murder was from every point of view of urgent necessity. It was not desired to treat the city, which contains one of the most holy shrines of the Shiah, and is surrounded by a very high wall, in an ordinary way, i.e., by shelling or by direct assault.

A strict blockade was, therefore, ordered and the outside water supply cut off. Picquets were established round the town with barbed wire connecting them and these effectually stopped ingress or egress. There were two attempts of the insurgents to break out through the blockade line but these were effectually stopped, dominating mounds were assaulted and held by our troops and gradually the blockade line closed in and occupied the bastions of the walls as well as holding the entrance gates. Every consideration was shown to the holy Ulema and to the theological students (most of whom were Persian subjects) and had it been necessary to proceed to extremities all these would have been given an asylum. The loyal inhabitants under the guidance of the Ulema determined, however, to rid themselves and their sacred city of these evil-doers and eventually by 13th April the proscribed persons had been handed over and the blockade was raised. The instigators of the murder and the actual murderers were brought before a military court to answer for their deeds and as a result of the trial eleven were condemned to death and duly executed, seven others were sentenced to transportation and three were deported; in addition a number of undesirables were sent out of the country. The firmness with which the situation was handled, the fairness with which the law-abiding inhabitants were treated and the scrupulous care which was taken to avoid damage to holy persons and places created a most favourable impression on all the surrounding tribes and contributed in no small degree to the subsequent establishment of friendly relations with the somewhat recalcitrant tribes of the Shamiya, Rumeitha, and Shatra districts.

For this eminently satisfactory ending to a delicate and somewhat difficult situation my thanks are due to the acting Civil Commissioner, to Brigadier-General G. A. F. Sanders and the troops under his command and also to the political officer on the spot, Captain F. C. C. Balfour, M.C.

I subsequently visited Nedjef myself and was received with every token of honour. I attended a meeting at which were assembled the Ulema, the Shaikhs of the district and the notables of the town who one and all expressed the most lively gratitude for the measures which had been adopted and their loyalty to Government.

3. On the Persian border certain tribes, notably some sections of the Sinjabis, were inclined to be troublesome (another result of German intrigue and gold) and as this tribe has its habitant just to the north of the Qasr-i-Shirin-Kermanshah road it became necessary to give them a lesson. The Guran confederation (which includes the Kalkhanis) was reported on the 19th April to be about to take action against the pro-enemy sections of the Sinjabis. I decided, therefore, to support these friendly tribesmen

in their action and despatched a small column of all arms to co-operate. On the 25th April a brief action took place with eminently satisfactory results. The Sinjabis were defeated and suffered heavy casualties (as well as losing large numbers of animals) and our aeroplanes turned their retreat into a rout.

The effect of this small operation, carried out in severe conditions of weather, has been far-reaching. The pro-enemy chief of the Sinjabis, who was known to be in German pay, was himself wounded and the German agents were thoroughly discredited; whilst among the surrounding tribes a profound impression was created in favour of the British and our lines of communication into Persia were safeguarded from serious raiding.

4. Again with the object of making the Persian Lines of Communication more secure I considered it advisable to drive the Turks out of the Kara Tepe-Kifri-Tuz Kermatli area and to hold both Kifri and Tuz for the future.

5. The general plan of operations decided upon was to stimulate a converging attack upon Kara Tepe and Kifri, but in reality to strike first at the more distant objectives of Abu Gharai'b and Tuz Kermatli, with the intention of cutting off and dealing subsequently with any hostile forces south-east and east of these places. This plan was to be carried into effect by means of various columns. Preliminary movements were delayed by rain in the middle of April, but all columns were concentrated at their respective positions of assembly by the 25th of that month. Secrecy was well maintained and the Turks appeared to be in ignorance of the impending attack. The operations were entrusted to Lieutenant-General Sir R. G. Egerton, K.C.B., K.C.I.E., and by the morning of April 26th he had completed the deployment of the troops selected for the operation.

6. A small column was sent up the Adhaim river to induce the Turks to strengthen and hold their Abu Gharai'b defences. On the right a small mixed column, with which were some irregulars, demonstrated on the upper Diala. At Mirjana another small column of all Arms was concentrated, and the 6th Cavalry Brigade moved to Umar Maidan and bridged the Lesser Naft river above that place. The main column consisting of the majority of the 13th Division with attached troops under Major-General Sir W. deS. Cayley, K.C.M.G., C.B., was at Nahrin, Kupri, where the bridge, which had been destroyed by the Turks in their hurried retreat last December, was rapidly put in repair. This column detached forces towards Abu Gharai'b and the Lesser Naft, the last named with orders to move to Abu Alik before dawn on April 27th in order to head off any enemy movement from Kara Tepe in a north-westerly direction. Although the Turks must have been aware of these movements they evidently failed to appreciate their significance as they did not commence their withdrawal from Kara Tepe until evening of 26th April.

The night of 26th-27th April was very stormy and torrential rain fell making the night march of the detached forces an exceedingly difficult and arduous one. However in spite of inky darkness, boggy ground and flooded streams they reached their objectives by daybreak on 27th. The Abu Gharai'b position had, however, been abandoned by the Turks and its retreating garrison was discovered and bombed by our aeroplanes. The detached force on the Lesser Naft came in contact with the Turks retreating from Kara Tepe and fulfilled its mission by heading them off from their direct line of retreat.

The 6th Cavalry Brigade under Brigadier-General P. Holland-Pryor, C.M.G., D.S.O., M.V.O., after an arduous night march, overtook the Turks who had retreated from Abu Gharai'b and had taken up a defensive position at Kulawand, covering Tuz Kermatli from the south-east. Feigning a frontal attack, whilst gradually working round the enemy's right flank, our cavalry cut the enemy's line of retreat and then charged right through his infantry killing some 200 including two battalion commanders and capturing 565 prisoners, a mountain gun and considerable booty. After reconnoitring the Ak Su with cavalry and light armoured motor cars, and finding the trenches south of Tuz Kermatli strongly held, the cavalry fell back on the main column which was bivouacked four miles south of Kulawand. This retrograde movement was made with the object of inducing the Turks to believe that our forces, as in previous operations, would retire to their original positions. The move evidently had the desired effect, completely deceiving the enemy and inducing him to remain in his position at Tuz Kermatli and even to reinforce it by bringing up troops from Kirkuk.

The small columns operating on the right had conformed to the general forward movement on the 27th and before darkness on that date had reached Chaman Kupri and the right bank of the upper Diala respectively. Kifri was occupied unopposed on the 28th where some 70 sick Turks were found. The coal mines had been flooded but were otherwise undamaged.

The attack on the enemy position was arranged for the 29th and was fought in two main parts, viz., on both banks of the Ak Su. On the left bank a detached force attacked the enemy and drove him with loss across the river to Tuz Kermatli whilst some prisoners and a machine gun remained in our hands.

The main attack, however, was made on the right bank against the Yanijah Bayuk position and was carried out with great dash by the 38th Infantry Brigade supported by artillery, machine guns, and low-flying aeroplanes. The Turks made a stout resistance but the infantry advanced under heavy artillery and machine gun fire with the greatest rapidity and in the most perfect order. By 7 A.M., the position was carried and the Lancashire men pressing on in pursuit entered Tuz Kermatli capturing the major portion of the Turkish forces. The cavalry and cyclists took up the pursuit of the remnants who were endeavouring to get away through the hills and captured many prisoners and much transport. The enemy suffered severely, over two hundred dead being buried by us alone whilst 1,300 prisoners, 12 field guns, 20 machine guns and large quantities of ammunition fell into our hands. Reconnaissances carried out on the 30th showed that the Turks further north were retiring on Kirkuk and had withdrawn from Taq. The task which I had set the troops was, therefore, satisfactorily completed and the whole area completely cleared of the enemy. However, on receipt of instructions to continue the pressure and to capture Kirkuk (130 miles distant from railhead) some readjustment of the troops became necessary in order to make the supply situation at all possible. Further action was also delayed by the state of the weather which was very stormy and wet during the first week of May, indeed on the 7th torrential rain caused heavy floods in the rivers which washed away the temporary bridges. Notwithstanding this difficulty reconnaissances were pushed forward and on the 5th May found the Turks holding a position at Taza Khurmatli but this force, evidently a small rear-guard, withdrew at dusk and the place was occupied by our troops on the 6th. The cavalry pushed on ahead and got astride of the southerly road leading from Kirkuk to Altun Kupri. Some opposition was encountered but the Turks continued to withdraw and our main body that night bivouacked seven miles north of Taza Khurmatli after having done a 28-mile march. During this period the 1st Corps, to which was attached the 7th Cavalry Brigade, continued to threaten the Turkish position on the Tigris and to hold the enemy there to his ground.

On the 7th our leading troops entered Kirkuk unopposed, the Turks having retired from it during the night of 6th-7th, leaving behind them 600 sick and wounded soldiers who were in a deplorable sanitary condition and were suffering greatly from malnutrition. A large amount of ammunition and equipment was also captured. Cavalry patrols pushing forward got into touch with the Turkish rear-guard but the state of the ground precluded any large movements. On the 8th our main body reached Kirkuk and the Turks withdrew across the Lesser Zab having prepared the bridge at Altun Kupri for demolition.

7. Difficulties of supply, due to distance and state of the ground, now made it imperative to stop further pursuit. Kirkuk was in an indescribably filthy condition and starvation was rife amongst the inhabitants, our troops therefore were kept very busy in sanitary measures, town control, salving and destruction of military material as well as in the evacuation of prisoners and refugees. For a time a small mobile column was left as a garrison after the main force had been withdrawn, but though it was politically desirable to continue in occupation of this centre of Kurdistan military considerations made this impracticable—all possible transport was required to fulfil the role allotted to us in Persia and on the 24th May the last of our troops withdrew from Kirkuk. Before the final withdrawal all those of the inhabitants who feared the return of the Turks were evacuated as refugees by their own express desire. Those who took advantage of our offer numbered nearly 1,600 and included Chaldeans, Armenians and Mohammedans.

Owing to the distance covered by these operations, and to the bad weather which prevailed throughout, the work of the troops was very arduous and I have nothing but admiration for the good work put in by all arms and the excellent co-operation which was maintained between them. In prisoners alone over 3,000 Turks were taken whilst our total casualties only amounted to 26 killed and 210 wounded. My thanks are greatly due to the able manner in which the whole sweeping operation was conducted by Lieutenant-General Egerton, his staff, and the troops under his command.

8. The rain had continued much later in the year than is usual and the road into Persia had, therefore, been impracticable so that in spite of urgent calls I had been unable to send in that direction more than small detachments. The demoralised Russian troops were retreating to the Caspian and with the exception of Lieutenant-Colonel Bicharakov's Partisan Detachment there was nothing to prevent anarchy breaking loose in Persia.

A state of famine prevailed over the whole length of road from Kerind to Kasvin and the Mission under Major-General L. C. Dunsterville, C.B., was largely engaged in relief work. The Persians, who had suffered greatly from both Turks and Russians, were rather naturally averse to yet another belligerent entering into their country and his point of view was sedulously fostered by enemy agents and propagandists. A great deal of good and useful relief work was undertaken by the Dunsterville Mission and much of the prevailing distress was thereby alleviated. In this connection I would like

to bring to notice the excellent work done by Mr. and Mrs. Stead (American Missionaries) in the neighbourhood of Kermanshah; there is no doubt that they saved many hundreds of lives by their devotion.

However by the end of May the road to Hamadan became possible, and the matter being urgent, I sent forward troops in Ford vans as far as Kasvin to take over that place (which covers Tehran from the north and west) from Colonel Bicharakov, whose detachment comprised the rear-guard of the Russian troops evacuating Persia.

9. We were now embarked on an operation of great difficulty. From railhead to the Caspian and Enzeli is, by the road, nearly 700 miles and this road, west of Hamadan, is unmetalled and traverses rocky passes, swift running streams and broad alluvial valleys, bridges had been broken and blown up so that temporary expedients for crossing had to be devised. One at least of the passes is over 7,000 feet and the rocky nature of the ground encountered on many stretches of the road wore out tyres with alarming rapidity. The country in the immediate neighbourhood of the road was famine stricken and not only was the food situation an anxious one but much transport was required for the supply of petrol, oil, spare parts, ordnance stores and the many and varied articles of equipment necessary for maintaining a force in the field.

10. On June 1st, General Dunsterville's Mission arrived at Kasvin, then occupied by Colonel Bicharakov's partisans, some 1,200 strong, together with weak British detachments. On the 8th June the Russians marched from Kasvin with the intention of proceeding to Enzeli and thence by ship to Baku. A small British detachment accompanied them. On reaching Mandjil three days later this force found the bridge at that place held by a Gilan tribe, named the Jangalis with whom were several German officers. After a vain endeavour to parley on the part of the Germans the Russians attacked and after capturing the Mandjil bridge pushed on to Resht and Enzeli assisted by our light armoured cars.

The moral effect of this small action was out of all proportion to its military importance, and for a time kept in order the Jangali leaders who had previously been bolstered up by a fictitious prestige. The closely wooded nature of the country round Resht which they inhabit gives them a sense of security which they endeavoured to turn to account by sniping at our convoys which were being sent to Enzeli, but no serious trouble arose until July 20th when they attacked a small British detachment at Resht together with the British Consulate and bank at that place. After some hand to hand street-fighting the attack was beaten off and over 100 Jangalis were killed. Our Hampshire and Gurkha troops fought extremely well, and the Jangalis have not only given no more trouble, but have made an agreement not to assist the Turks any further.

11. During June, small detachments were despatched to Bijar and Miane to keep an eye on the possible activities of the Turks against my lengthy line of communications in Persia, and to establish friendly relations with the local tribes. A further reference will be made to minor operations in these districts (see paragraphs 15 and 16).

12. On July 3rd, Colonel Bicharakov sailed from Enzeli for Alyat, 35 miles southwest of Baku. He had previously accepted the post of Commander-in-Chief of the Red Army of the Caucasus. At this time the Government of Baku was purely Bolshevik and strongly opposed to British intervention. Various small actions were fought near Baku during July between the Tartars and Turks on the one side and the Russians and Armenians on the other, but owing to existing disorganisation the resistance offered with the exception of Bicharakov's troops was ineffective and proved powerless to prevent Baku being seriously threatened. On July 26th, a *coup d'etat* took place, the Bolshevik Government being overthrown and its place taken by a Centro-Caspian Dictatorship. The latter at once appealed for British aid, but before it could arrive Bicharakov was convinced that the fall of the town was inevitable, and in consequence of repeated acts of treachery on the part of the Red Guards, drew off his detachment to the north and moved along the coast of the Caspian towards Derbend.

13. What news filtered through from Baku was now very meagre, but the Turks were slow to make the most of their opportunities in occupying the town, and, though a landing of British troops now seemed impracticable, a small mission of British officers with one platoon as escort was despatched to report on the situation. These landed in Baku on August 4th. For the time being the appearance of even this small party of British troops, which received an ovation on marching through the town, seemed to have an electrical effect on the citizens and government of Baku, and a Turkish attack on the following day was repulsed with heavy loss.

Further British reinforcements were sent during the remainder of August, but their numbers were restricted by the limitation imposed by the great length and difficulties of the Persian Line of Communication. On arrival they took over portions of the defended perimeter of the town, and every effort was made by General Dunsterville and his staff to instil order into existing chaos. The inhabitants of Baku seemed, however, to think that it was no longer necessary for them to fight now that the British had arrived and they gave our troops little or no assistance. On August 26th, the Turks attacked with considerable determination a pronounced salient in the line: they

were well supported by their artillery and charged home with the bayonet. This point was most gallantly held by a British company against odds of five to one, unsupported by local Baku troops who should have been there in reserve. The company suffered heavy casualties before being obliged to withdraw. On August 31st, the Turks made two further attacks, which were beaten off with heavy loss by British and Russian troops, who were however subsequently compelled to give ground owing to the exposure of their flank resultant on the withdrawal of some Armenian battalions. On September 1st, further ground was lost, our troops being forced back fighting against heavy odds without any efficient support from our local Allies. During all these attacks the Turks lost heavily, and it was not till the 14th September that they again attacked after receiving large reinforcements. On this date they succeeded in scaling the heights driving out the Armenian troops opposed to them with little difficulty, and thereby causing a re-adjustment of the British line to save a menaced flank. On this flank three very weak British companies held out all day on the last ridge on the outskirts of the town under heavy shell fire and against repeated attacks by the main strength of the Turks. From this ridge the town and harbour are completely dominated, and its possession was of great importance.

An attack by the enemy on the centre was brought to a standstill by rifle fire. A counter-attack by British, Russians and Armenians in this vicinity failed through the British and Russians losing all their officers as well as sustaining heavy casualties in the ranks while Turkish artillery fire arrested the advance of the Armenian troops at an early stage. Throughout the day the North Staffordshire Regiment had fought with great gallantry and were ably supported by the men from Warwick and Worcester as well as by the Dunsterforce armoured cars, which were boldly handled and accounted for large numbers of the enemy.

At 4 P.M., it became evident that the Turks who had been attacking since dawn, were fought to a standstill and could do no more than occupy the positions they had gained. Had an effective counter-attack now been possible it is more than doubtful if the Turks could have withstood it but every British rifle was in the line, and the Russian and Armenian troops were by this time incapable of any further effective action. The town was at the mercy of the enemy, who occupied all the high ground, and could shell the shipping in the port at ranges of 3,000—5,000 yards.

It was decided, therefore, to evacuate the British detachment. This decision was communicated to the Baku Government. By 8 P.M., all sick and wounded had been carried on board. Troops and guns were then embarked, and by 10 P.M., all were on board, the three ships which had, since our arrival at Baku, been embarked for our use. These three ships sailed without lights, closely followed by another in which it had been possible to collect explosives and ammunition. This latter ship was hit by gunfire from the guardship at the mouth of the harbour, but the others slipped away unscathed and all four arrived safely at Enzeli.

This British detachment had denied to the enemy for a period of six weeks the town of Baku with its very valuable oil fields, and had caused heavy casualties to the Turks who were compelled to bring up a force of considerable numerical superiority before the capture of the place could be effected.

14. I referred earlier in the despatch to a detachment at Bijar. A road runs through this place to the Urmia district where it was known that the Assyrians, Nestorians, and Jelus, had been successfully resisting the Turks during the earlier summer months. In July, it was decided to get into communication with these tribes by aeroplane and to send them by convoy assistance in the shape of ammunition, machine guns, and money. This convoy reached Sain Kala on 23rd July, but the Assyrians were ten days' late in meeting it and their eventual arrival coincided with the occupation of Urmia by the Turks who drove all the Assyrians out, massacring many, and pursuing them along the road to Sain Kala until checked by our advanced troops. The whole of the Assyrians who survived, men, women and children then poured along the Sain Kala-Bijar road from August 3rd onwards and eventually over 50,000 arrived at Bijar whence they were evacuated unmolested to Hamadan. Large numbers unfortunately died from cholera and privation on the way. After a few days' rest and food all were evacuated in batches of 3,000 at a time down the Persian Lines of Communication to Bakuba, where a large refugee camp had been formed. Men capable of bearing arms were organised into a fighting force and others were employed at work on the roads and elsewhere. Their feeding on the way threw a great strain on my supply staff and practically denuded the reserves of supplies which had been collected for our winter use. The able manner in which this undisciplined mob of men, women and children were dealt with reflects great credit on the staff of the Persian Lines of Communication.

15. I had also kept a detachment at Miáne on the Kasvin-Tabriz road and by the end of August I received information that the Turks in Tabriz were collecting transport, and presumed that their intention was to endeavour to raid my vulnerable Lines of Communication in the direction of Kasvin. I have already recounted the difficulties of

sending troops and maintaining them in North Persia, and every man I could spare from there had been hurried to Baku. Consequently I had only extremely weak parties between Kasvin and Tabriz. On September 5th, the Turks attacked an advanced post of irregulars on the road some 45 miles north-west of Miane. This was driven in, and during the next few days my advanced troops gradually fell back fighting before superior numbers of Turks, who occupied Miane on 9th September and took up a strong position to the south of it. By this time, however, I had been able to push reinforcements forward, and brought the Turkish advance to a standstill.

16. My relations with the Bakhtiari Khans to whom are entrusted the safeguarding of the oil-fields near Ahwaz have remained most cordial, and in order to coerce the Kubgalus, a tribe who had been causing the friendly Ilkhani of the Bakhtiari some annoyance, and at the same time restore security along the Ahwaz-Ispahan road, I placed during June and July a section of mountain artillery at the disposal of the Ilkhani. The results were pre-eminently satisfactory and it is worthy of record that this section of an Indian Mountain Battery in the hottest season of the year covered a distance of 395 miles in 28 marching days and returned with men and animals in excellent condition.

17. The defence of the Lines of Communication on both Tigris and Euphrates have been ably performed. Trouble from riverain tribes is now almost unknown and I have been able to replace regular troops on the Tigris line to a large extent by Arab police and thereby release several battalions for more active work in forward areas.

18. In so far as the climate has permitted, progressive military training has been carried out by all formations since the cessation of active operations in May last. A special feature of this has been the development of schools of instruction, not only at General Head-quarters, but also by the various formations throughout the force. These schools are based on the latest models of those on the Western Front, with such special modifications as are desirable for this theatre of war.

In close connection with the above, every encouragement has been given to organised recreational training, and there is no doubt that the health and physique of the men, many of whom are young soldiers, have benefited in no small degree.

19. Uninterrupted progress has been made in the opening up and development of the country. It must be remembered that in the tract of country watered by the middle Euphrates the tribesmen have never felt the weight of our arms, and unlike those on the Lower and Upper Euphrates have never seen our troops in any numbers.

The dredging of the Hammar Lake, which is nearing completion, is likely to open out the Lower Euphrates still further, and the results cannot fail to benefit the whole Euphrates area which is at present deprived of water communication with the Basrah for the six busiest months in the year.

From the Hilla district which is now connected with Baghdad by a broad gauge railway some 70 per cent. of the cereals available for the force are derived. The extensive agricultural and irrigation projects in this region bid fair to restore to this once fertile tract the prosperity it enjoyed when Babylon was at her zenith.

The manufacture of prepared bitumen and lime continues at Hit on a large scale. Some 4,000 tons of bitumen and 5,350 tons of lime have been exported during the past four months and it has been found possible after meeting all government demands to allow of private enterprise in this industry by the inhabitants. Steps are also being taken to develop and work the large oil-bearing strata at Naft Khana and other places and to utilise the coal mines at Kifri.

20. The opportunities afforded to the *Royal Navy* during the period under review have been few, but Commodore D. Norris, and the officers and ratings under his command have invariably displayed a spirit of ready co-operation in accordance with their high traditions, and I confidently look forward to their finding a wider scope for their activities in the near future.

21. The hot weather in Mesopotamia of necessity limits the sphere of activity of the *Royal Air Force*. Notwithstanding this, many fine long-distance flights have been undertaken and valuable reconnaissances and much photographic work performed. Some idea may perhaps be gained of their wide range of action when I say that since the conclusion of the Kirkuk operations aeroplanes have been employed on various missions at places as widely separated as Samawa on the Middle Euphrates and Baku in Trans-Caucasia. In fact, whenever troops have operated the pilots and observers of the *Royal Air Force* have invariably contributed in no small measure to their success, and their boldness and intrepidity are fully recognised by the Army.

22. Great progress has been recorded in the development of the port of Basrah and in the reclamation of low-lying areas in its vicinity. There is now a continuous wharf 3,300 feet in length, adequately equipped with electric cranes, and the entire port railway system has been re-modelled.

23. The Directorate of *Signals and Telegraphs* has had many difficulties to contend with more especially in connection with the extension of the area now controlled by the Force. These have been promptly overcome, and communication well maintained at all times. During the period no fewer than 850 miles of telegraph line carrying 1,700 miles of wire have actually been erected, while 375 additional miles are now under construction.

There has been too a considerable extension in the use of wireless telegraphy, and a complete chain of wireless stations has been established throughout the area now in occupation.

24. *Surveys and the Map Compilation Section* have always risen to the occasion, and have continued to produce a large output of admirable work.

25. The period April 1st to July 13th shows a distinct improvement in the health of the troops as compared with the corresponding weeks of last year :—

These figures indicate a very considerable saving to the Force which has been achieved by unremitting care paid by the *medical authorities* to sanitary and medical requirements and to the constant devotion to duty shown by the *Nursing Services*.

The *Red Cross Society* has continued to attend to the needs and comfort of the sick and wounded in a most praiseworthy manner.

Ministration to the spiritual welfare of the troops by *Chaplains* of all denominations continues satisfactorily and the work of Indian Assistant Chaplains is much appreciated amongst Indian Christians.

Considerable progress in the recording of Christian graves has been made and cemeteries are being well maintained.

The Bishop of Lahore paid a welcome visit to the country in June which was much appreciated, and many candidates received Confirmation.

26. The physical and moral recreation of the Force is being attended to, and I am satisfied that the steps taken in forming a *Central Recreational Committee* will have a beneficial result.

Concert parties and cinema performances are universally provided and much appreciated by the troops.

who have so generously provided gifts of money and in kind for the benefit of the troops.

In April we had the honour of a visit from Their Excellencies Lord and Lady Willingdon who have, throughout the campaign in Mesopotamia, done so much for the benefit of all members of the Force. Their visit was a source of genuine pleasure to all and they were enabled to see for themselves some of the results of their unremitting labours on our behalf.

27. The difficulties of the administrative departments and services have naturally increased with the extended area now occupied by the Force.

Local Resources have been developed in a very satisfactory manner, and good results achieved. The activities of this department are many and varied, and demand much ingenuity and tact in dealing with the local inhabitants. The most important

part of its functions during the past summer has been the preparation for the collection of the harvest; the success attained redounds to the credit of the staff of this Directorate in carrying out this arduous duty at a most trying part of the year.

The harvest though later than was anticipated has been bountiful, and it is confidently expected that in the future the Force will be self-supporting as regards barley and fodder.

Supplies have been satisfactorily maintained, and delivered to the troops with a regularity which is worthy of all praise, when it is remembered that not a single metalled road exists throughout the length and breadth of Mesopotamia.

The work of the *Transport*, particularly of the Mechanical Transport, has been extremely arduous. Immense wear and tear to vehicles has been caused on the Persian road, and it reflects great credit on all concerned to have kept so many vehicles in working order. It is safe to say that a Line of Communication of such a length has never previously been kept up. The strain thrown on the personnel of the *Mechanical Transport* branch has been very considerable but the demands on them have been met with unfailing regularity and willingness.

The development and opening-up of new lines by the *Railway Department* during the period has been most marked. Allusion has already been made to the broad gauge line to Hilla. A narrow gauge extension thence to Kifl on the other branch of the Euphrates has since been opened to traffic. In the forward areas also much time and labour has been expended in extending both standard and metre gauge lines and the service of trains has been well maintained.

The *Ordnance Services* have kept up their high standard of efficiency. Supplies of clothing, stores and ammunition have been satisfactory and the needs of the troops promptly met.

The responsibilities of the *Department of Works* have increased during the period under review, and though this department has had to contend with a shortage of supervising and subordinate personnel as well as of actual material, the work has been of a consistently high order.

The *Board of Agriculture* was constituted some three months ago, and has already proved of value in co-ordinating with the Political Department the work of the two recently established Directorates of *Irrigation* and *Agriculture*. Considerable irrigation projects are in hand with the object of increasing the food development of the country, but the scope of these is limited by the labour available for the works and the number of cultivators available for the ultimate production of crops. Circle officers have been appointed in order to stimulate agriculture and to improve the methods hitherto employed by the natives. In addition, both government and demonstration farms are being started.

The Directorate of *Labour* has to contend with ever-increasing demands for roads, railways, works, and irrigation, for all of which the requirements in personnel are always inadequate. The necessary steps are being taken to cope with the situation, and it is hoped that the advent of additional Labour Corps from India will ease matters.

The *Remount* and *Veterinary* Departments continue to be administered in a satisfactory manner. It has been recently found possible to supplement drafts of horses from overseas by local purchases. The condition and health of the animals of the Force has been most satisfactory during the past summer as compared with the summer of 1917.

The work performed by the *Inland Water Transport* has as always been of a high order in spite of the hot weather and the difficulties of navigation during the low river season.

The *Postal Service* is successfully competing with the demands made upon it, and these have been especially heavy during the summer months when individuals have more leisure for writing.

28. The period under review has been, owing to the extreme heat during the greater part of it, one of inactivity for the large majority of the troops, and I was enabled to send a large number of officers and men on leave to India. Leave camps at various centres had been kindly arranged for by Army Head-quarters in India to which the British troops were sent; the Indian troops were of course able to visit their own homes. The General Officer Commanding, Ceylon, also made arrangements for the reception of a large number of British Officers, and his efforts in this respect have been much appreciated.

Urgent cases (treated for precedence on their merits) were granted leave to the United Kingdom but transport difficulties naturally confined this privilege to a selected few.

The country has gone ahead and is being further developed and the inhabitants are showing by their behaviour that they appreciate the blessings of a just and sympathetic government.

29. I have been throughout most ably and loyally served by my subordinate commanders, staff, and technical advisers and take this opportunity of recording my most sincere thanks for all their good work.

30. This despatch would not be complete without a reference to the valuable services rendered by Lieutenant-Colonel A. T. Wilson, C.M.G., C.I.E., D.S.O., Acting Civil Commissioner, and the political officers working under his direction. His advice has always been of the greatest value to me, and I tender him my warmest thanks for the whole-hearted and vigorous support which I have received from him throughout.

31. In addition to the foregoing and in pursuance of the authority delegated to me as Commander-in-Chief, I have made the following immediate awards for gallantry and distinguished service in the field during the period covered by this despatch:—Distinguished Service Order, 8; Military Cross, 29; Bar to Military Cross, 4; Distinguished Conduct Medal, 10; Bar to Distinguished Conduct Medal, 1; Military Medal, 60; Indian Order of Merit, 3; Indian Distinguished Service Medal, 16.

Subsidiary Rules.

1. In these rules and tables of fares :—
 - (a) Conveyance means a vehicle drawn by two ponies and licensed to carry passengers.
 - (b) Day means the period from sunrise to sunset.
2. The annual license fee for a conveyance shall be Re. 1 and the licensee of each conveyance shall in addition provide for the driver a dress to be approved by the Superintendent of Police. The fee for the attendant driver's license will be annas eight for 1st and 2nd class conveyance : for change in the owner, attendant or pony or horses, a fee of Re. 1, annas 8 and annas 8, for the last two respectively, will be levied.
3. The fares shown in the table of fares by distance are for the single journey only ; for the return journey fares will be payable at half the fixed rate except as shown in table of fares by distance I (b).
4. If a conveyance engaged for the day is detained after sunset, the detention period shall be paid according to rates after sunset (from 6 p.m. to 6 a.m.).
5. All conveyances shall be supplied with two clear burning lights during the period between three-quarters of an hour after sunset and one hour before sunrise, except when there is sufficient moonlight to render such lights unnecessary.
6. All tolls shall be payable by the licensee.
7. Conveyances will be licensed to carry three passengers in addition to the driver. Children in arms will not be counted and two children not in arms but under the age of 12 will be counted as one passenger.
8. Conveyances shall not be used for the carriage of goods except the personal luggage of the passengers and no conveyances carrying a full complement of passengers shall carry in addition more than 10 seers of luggage per passenger.
9. It shall not be obligatory on the owner of any conveyance to carry less than the full complement of passengers for less than the full fare of the conveyance. If there is only one passenger, he cannot claim to pay for one seat only but must pay for the whole conveyance and similarly for two passengers.
10. The minimum height for tonga ponies shall be 12-2 hands.
11. The driver of each licensed conveyance shall, when plying for hire, keep with him his license and shall produce the same when required to do so any time by a Magistrate, Police Officer or passenger. He shall have the number and class painted on both sides of the hood in such form and place as the District Superintendent of Police, Násik, shall direct.
12. Licensees of public conveyances shall, when the yearly licenses and numbers are renewed, bring the conveyances to the office of the District Superintendent of Police, Násik, or to any one authorised by him for inspection and shall satisfy him that the conveyances, ponies and harness are in all respects in sufficiently good order and otherwise fit for the purpose and that the drivers are clean, steady and capable.
13. Every driver shall, when engaged in his occupation, be cleanly and decently dressed.

14. All conveyances must be driven on the left side of the road except when passing another conveyance going in the same direction when they should pass on its right.

15. Each licensee will be required to keep a spare pair of ponies for each conveyance for change half way between Jalgaon and Chondi at the foot of the ghat.

- (1) *Northern sub-division*—Indi, Sindgi, Bijápur and Bágewádi.
- (2) *Southern Division*—Muddebihál, Bágalkot, Hungund, Bádámi and Bilgi Mahál, with the exception of Bijápur City.
- (3) *City Sub-division*—Bijápur City.

We, the President, Vice-President and the Chairman of the Managing Committee of the Násik Municipality beg to request that under the provisions of section 3 of the Local Authorities Loans Act (IX of 1914) Government will be pleased to grant to this Municipality a loan of twenty-five thousand rupees.

2. In conformity with the Rules made by Government under section 4 of the said Act, published at pages 2847 to 2850 of Part I of the *Bombay Government Gazette*, dated 26th November 1914, we beg to supply the following details :—

- (1) The loan is required to make the preliminary arrangement in connection with the ensuing Sinhastha Fair.
- (2) The amount of the loan applied for is Rs. 25,000 (Rupees twenty-five thousand only).
- (3) The rates, taxes and revenue of the Municipality are offered as security for the loan.
- (4) The law under which the above mentioned revenue is raised is the Bombay District Municipal Act, III of 1901.
- (5) The loan is required for two years and is to be presently taken in one instalment. The loan will bear simple interest at 6 per cent. per annum. The loan is to be repaid in two years' time.

No. 897.—It is hereby notified that His Excellency the Governor in Council desires to nominate four candidates for training at the Forest Research Institute and College, Dehra Dun, with a view to their qualifying for direct appointment to the Provincial Forest Service of the Bombay Presidency. Applications from intending candidates are accordingly invited and must reach the Secretary to Government, Revenue Department, on or before the 1st June 1920. The following extracts from the rules for the appointment to the Bombay Provincial Forest Service prescribed in Government Notification No. 11375,* dated 20th November 1914, printed at pages 2874 and 2875 of the *Bombay Government Gazette*, Part I, dated the 26th idem, are published for general information:—

5. A candidate for direct nomination must be not less than 18 nor more than 24 years of age on the 1st April of the year in which a notification inviting applications is issued. He will be required to produce the following certificates:—

(i) A certificate that he is "a Native of India" as prescribed in section 6 of 33 Victoria, Chapter 3.

(ii) A certificate of age.

(iii) A health certificate in the form prescribed by Article 49 of the Civil Service Regulations (Fifth Edition), signed by a Commissioned Medical Officer or by a Medical Officer in charge of a Civil Station and certifying to the nominee's sound constitution, good vision and hearing and general physical fitness for an outdoor life in the Forest Department, and to the fact that he bears marks of successful vaccination or of small-pox.

(iv) Certificates of the examinations which have been passed by him.

(v) A certificate of respectability and good moral character from two or more persons whose social or official position can be accepted as a guarantee of trustworthiness.

6. In selecting from amongst the candidates a person for direct nomination, very great weight will be given to high educational qualifications, and only candidates who are in all respects qualified by previous education, more especially in Science, English and Mathematics, to follow the course of instruction without difficulty will be nominated. The knowledge of the candidate in English and Mathematics will be tested by examination in these subjects, which will be held in the first week of August on a date to be fixed by Government in the office of the Chief Conservator of Forests and under his supervision or under the supervision of an Imperial Forest Officer appointed by him for the purpose. The candidate will be required to write a full précis of two passages in English, one read out by a European and the other by an Indian Officer, followed by a colloquial examination. The examination in Mathematics will consist of two papers, one in Arithmetic and Algebra, and the other in Geometry and Trigonometry for each of which three hours will be allowed. After this examination is over, the answers will be forwarded under sealed cover to the President, Forest Research Institute and College, direct.

The standard in Mathematics is a practical knowledge of Arithmetic, Algebra up to and including quadratic equations and simple problems, Mensuration, Geometry (including the first three books of Euclid) and elementary Trigonometry (including the solution of triangles and the use of logarithms). No candidate who fails to obtain half the full marks in each paper will be considered to have passed.

7. (1) A candidate selected for direct nomination will be required—

(a) to find two sureties to execute a bond guaranteeing that under special circumstances they will refund all monies expended by Government on the candidate's behalf, etc.;

(b) to undergo a practical training extending over not less than six months in such forests as may be prescribed to him in order to give proof of his fitness for forest work. Such course of training will ordinarily commence in September of the year preceding that in which the College course begins, and the candidate's final selection for nomination will depend upon the proof which he gives during this training of his suitability for service in the Forest Department.

(c) to undergo a physical test such as a go-as-you-please-journey of twelve miles over undulating or hilly country to be completed within four hours. The test will be performed by the candidate under the direct supervision of an Imperial Forest Officer towards the end of the first month of the practical training in the forests, which will follow the provisional selection of the candidate by Government.

* Note.—The certificates (iii) and (v) must bear date not further back than the 1st April of the year previous to that in which the candidate desires admission to the Forest Research Institute and College.

(2) While undergoing the training prescribed in clause (1) of this rule the selected candidate will receive a consolidated allowance of Rs. 75 per mensem, which will include the travelling expenses of the candidate.

8. (1) A candidate finally selected under rule 7 (1) (b) will be required—

(a) to proceed to the Forest Research Institute and College, Dehra Dun, and go through the two years' Provincial Service course at the College;

(b) to sign an agreement binding himself to work diligently while at the College and to serve Government for not less than five years after passing out of the College.

(2) He will be allowed actual travelling expenses from the place of his relief from the practical training referred to in Rule 7 (1) (b), when first joining the College, the class of railway fare being regulated under article 1011 of the Civil Service Regulations by the amount of his stipend.

9. After a student has been at the College for two months, the President, may remove him if in his opinion the student does not possess a sufficient knowledge of English to enable him to follow the College course intelligently. The President may also remove the candidate from the College, if at any time during the course he is found to be physically unfit.

10. While at the College the selected candidate will receive a stipend of Rs. 100 per mensem payable from the date of his entry into the College. He will be granted actual expenses on tour as passed by the President, Forest Research Institute and College, Dehra Dun, including single second class fare by rail or steamer for himself, fare of one servant and freight of a bicycle where necessary. Should the periodic report of the nominee's progress or conduct be unsatisfactory, the payment of the stipend will be stopped until improvement is reported, and should the periodic reports continue to be unsatisfactory, the nomination will be cancelled and the nominee will not be allowed to complete the course.

11. After the conclusion of the Provincial Forest Service course a selected candidate who is certified to have passed it satisfactorily will be appointed to the Bombay Provincial Forest Service as Probationary Extra Assistant Conservator of Forests.

12. A Probationary Extra Assistant Conservator of Forests will be on probation for a period of one year commencing from the date of his relief from the College. This period may be extended to three years or more at the discretion of Government. A Probationary Extra Assistant Conservator will be placed in executive charge of a Range or Forest sub-division, and will receive during the first three years of his probation a salary of Rs. 150 per mensem, and thereafter Rs. 200 per mensem until he is appointed to a vacancy of Extra Assistant Conservator in the sanctioned cadre of the Provincial Forest Service.

No. 2282.—The following notification by the Government of India, Foreign and Political Department, is republished:—

“ No. 567-G., dated Delhi, the 10th March 1920.

Whereas jurisdiction to make an order for the detention of any of their subjects who are, or who may hereafter become, lunatics has been transferred to the Governor-General in Council by the Darbars of the States named in the accompanying Schedule :

Now, therefore, the Governor-General in Council, in exercise of the powers conferred by the Indian (Foreign Jurisdiction) Order in Council, 1902, and of all other powers enabling him in this behalf, is pleased to prescribe the following procedure for observance by Political Officers in connection with the making of order and warrants for the detention of lunatics from the said States in asylums in British India.

1. In the case of a criminal lunatic, in respect of whom an order or warrant for detention in an asylum has been made or issued by a court established under the authority of the Darbar of any of the said States, the Political Officer may, on application by such Darbar, endorse such order or warrant for execution in an asylum in British India.

2. In the case of any other lunatic, in respect of whom an application to that effect has been made by any such Darbar, the Political Officer may make an order for the detention of such lunatic in an asylum in British India.

No. 2283—The following notification by the Government of India, Foreign and Political Department, is republished:—

"No. 568-G., dated Delhi, the 10th March 1920.

In exercise of the powers conferred by section 99 of the Indian Lunacy Act, 1912 (IV of 1912), the Governor General in Council is pleased to make the following rules,

regulating the procedure for the reception and detention in asylums in British India of lunatics whose reception and detention are provided for by section 98 of the said Act.

1. All costs involved by the detention of any lunatic, who is a subject of a State in India, shall be chargeable to the State concerned.

2. In the event of non-payment of sums due under the preceding rule on account of the detention of any lunatic, such lunatic shall be liable to discharge from the asylum, if three of the visitors of the asylum by order in writing so direct.

3. Lunatics detained under these rules, who are subjects of any of the States mentioned in the first column of the following Table, may be detained in the asylum, or one of the asylums, mentioned opposite thereto in the second column.

No. 8011-M., dated Delhi, the 13th March 1920.

The following draft of amendments which in exercise of the powers conferred by section 5 of the Indian Explosives Act, 1884 (IV of 1884), it is proposed to make in the Indian Explosives Rules, 1914, published with the notification of the Government of India in the Department of Commerce and Industry, No. 4013—33,* dated the 6th June 1914, is published as required by section 18 of the said Act for the information of all persons likely to be affected thereby, and notice is hereby given that the said rules will be taken into consideration on or after the 13th of May 1920. Any objection or suggestion which may be received from any person with respect to the draft before the date specified will be considered by the Governor General in Council.

Draft amendments.

1. In sub-rule (2) of rule 51 of the said rules, the words ‘ to the District authority ’ shall be omitted and after the words ‘ the reasons for it ’ the words ‘ to the District authority, or, if the license was granted by a Sub-divisional or other Magistrate, to such Magistrate ’ shall be inserted.

(ii) in the note to the heading of Form F,

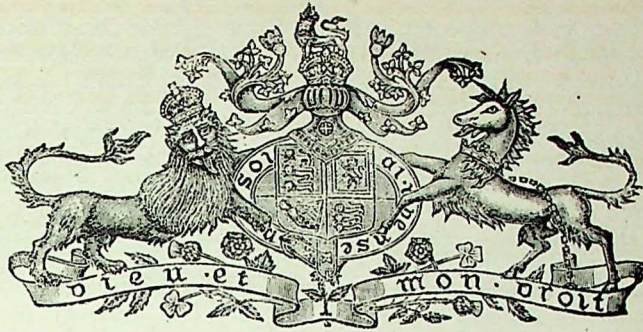

His Excellency will be received at the station by His Excellency the Governor, His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief, His Majesty's Ships and Vessels, East Indies Stations, the Chief Justice of Bombay, the Lord Bishop of Bombay, the Members of Council, the Roman Catholic Archbishop of Bombay, the General Officer Commanding, Southern Command, the Judges of the High Court, the Additional Members of the Legislative Council of His Excellency the Governor General resident in the Bombay Presidency, the Commissioner in Sind, the Chief Secretary to Government, the General Officer Commanding, Poona Division, the General Officer Commanding, Bombay Brigade, the Commissioners of Revenue and Customs, the Additional Members of the Council of His Excellency the Governor for making Laws and Regulations, the Vice-Chancellor of the University of Bombay, the

Director of the Royal Indian Marine, the Archdeacon of Bombay, the Secretaries to Government, the Surgeon General with the Government of Bombay, the Director of Public Instruction, the Accountant General, the Deputy Controller of Currency, the Heads of Departments, Civil and Military, the Collector of Bombay, the President of the Municipal Corporation of the City of Bombay, the Municipal Commissioner of Bombay, the Chairman, City of Bombay Improvement Trust, the Presidency Senior Chaplain, Church of Scotland, the Chairman, Bombay Port Trust, the Officers Commanding His Majesty's Ships in Harbour, and such Officers of the Royal Indian Marine as may be designated by the Director, the Officers Commanding Regiments, the Officers Commanding Units, Indian Defence Force, the Commissioner of Police, Bombay, and the Sheriff of Bombay, or by such of the above high officials as are then in the Presidency Town, for whom a space marked A will be reserved.

7. The Public Works Department should be requested to issue instructions for the necessary arrangements being made at the Railway Station for His Excellency's arrival, and for the adequate provision of space for those invited or desired to attend. The issue of tickets to the officials mentioned in paragraphs 3 and 4, and on application to Ruling Princes and Chiefs and the officials mentioned in paragraph 6, will be arranged by the Executive Engineer, Presidency. A limited space marked E and F will be provided in the station for the accommodation of other ladies and gentlemen, who may wish to be present, to which admission will also be by tickets, issued on application, by the Executive Engineer, Presidency.

8. His Excellency will proceed to Government House, Malabar Point, *via* Waudby Road, Church Gate Street, Queen's Road, Sandhurst Bridge, Chowpatty, Walkeshwar Road, Government House, Lower Gate escorted by His Excellency the Governor's Body Guard, the Bombay Light Horse and the Central India Horse.
