No. 5016.—The following notification by the Government of India, Army Department, is republished:—

“CANTONMENTS—REGULATIONS.

No. 745, dated Simla, the 23rd April 1920.

In exercise of the powers conferred by section 24 of the Cantonments Act, 1910 (XV of 1910), the Governor-General in Council is pleased to direct that the following amendments shall be made in the Cantonment Code, 1912, namely:—

1. For clause (u) of sub-section (1) of section 2 of the said Code the following shall be substituted, namely:—

‘(u) ‘Health Officer’ means the officer appointed as such by the Officer Commanding the Division or Brigade, or where no officer has been specially so appointed, the senior executive Medical Officer in military employ on duty in a cantonment.’

2. For the words ‘Sanitary Officer’ wherever they occur in the said Code the words ‘Health Officer’ shall be substituted.

3. After clause (g) of sub-section (1) of section 3 of the said Code the following new clauses shall be added, namely:—

‘(h) The senior executive Medical Officer in military employ on duty in a cantonment.

(i) The Medical Officer in charge of the Cantonment Hospital or Dispensary.’

4. In section 71 of the said Code for the words ‘the officer responsible under section 69’ the words ‘the senior executive Medical Officer in military employ on duty in the Cantonment.’ shall be substituted.

No. 4717.—The following draft of a notification which it is proposed to issue under the Indian Petroleum Act, 1899 (VIII of 1899), is published as required by section 24, sub-section (1), of the said Act for the information of persons likely to be affected thereby, and notice is hereby given that the draft will be taken into consideration by the Governor in Council on or after the 1st June 1920.

2. Any objection or suggestion which may be sent to the Secretary to Government, General Department, by any person with respect to the draft before the date aforesaid will be considered by the Governor in Council.

Draft Notification.

No. —In exercise of the powers conferred by section 9 of the Indian Petroleum Act, 18 9 (VIII of 18 9), the Governor in Council, with the previous sanction of the Governor-General in Council, is pleased further to amend the rules for the importation, possession and transport of petroleum in the Bombay Presidency, published in the Notification of Government in the General Department, No. 2572, dated the 18th May 1909, as subsequently amended, as follows, *namely* :—

In rule 6, Chapter IV, Part II of the said rules the words "but not more than 2,000 gallons each" shall be omitted.

No. 5009.—The following Resolution by the Government of India, Home Department (Public), is republished :—

"RESOLUTION.

Simla, the 21st April 1920.

The attention of the Government of India has been drawn to a rule laid down by the Colonial Office that an officer who has retired from the Colonial Service may not accept a directorate of a company the principal part of whose business is directly concerned with the Colony or Protectorate in which he has served, or employment in the Colony or Protectorate under such a company, without obtaining the previous approval of the Governor; and they have had under consideration the question whether it is necessary to lay down some similar rule for retired officers of the Indian services.

2. After consultation with Local Governments and careful consideration of their views, the Government of India have come to the conclusion that, while it is not necessary at the present time to lay down a definite rule, it is desirable that retired Government servants, especially Gazetted officers, before accepting directorships, partnerships or agencies of, or employment by, any company or firm or individual engaged in commercial business or associated with the management of land in India, should either obtain the consent of the Government of India, or if the company is managed in London, the consent of the Secretary of State. The Government of India believe that this procedure will conduce alike to the interests of the officers concerned and to those of the services generally, and are prepared to leave it to the good sense and loyalty of their officers to observe the procedure now suggested.

Order.—Ordered that a copy of this Resolution be forwarded to Local Governments and Administrations and to all Departments of the Government of India for information, and that it be published in the *Gazette of India* for general information.

EDUCATIONAL DEPARTMENT.

No. 1805.—Under section 21, sub-sections (3) and (4), of the Indian Universities Act, VIII of 1904, the Governor in Council is pleased to sanction the affiliation of the College which the Karnatak Education Society proposes to start at Dhárwár, to the Bombay University for the purposes of the First Year and Intermediate Examinations in Arts. The affiliation shall be provisional for a period of three years commencing from the 20th of June 1920 and shall be subject to the condition that the number of students in the first year shall not exceed 100, and the number in the second year shall not exceed 70.

2. The supplementary application of the Society for the affiliation of the College in question up to the Intermediate Science Examination in Group A (Mathematics, Physics and Chemistry) is refused on the ground that the proposed provision is unnecessary.

No. 717, dated Simla, the 15th April 1920.

RESOLUTION.

In exercise of the powers conferred by section 30, sub-section (2), of the Government of India Act, 1915 (5 and 6 Geo. ch. 61), and of all other powers enabling him in that behalf, the Governor General in Council is pleased to direct that the following amendments shall be made in Part D of the Resolution of the Government of India in the Home Department Nos. 713-734 (Judicial), dated the 2nd June 1913, as subsequently amended, relating to the execution of deeds, contracts and other instruments on behalf of His Majesty's Secretary of State for India in Council, namely :—

(1) For the existing heading to that part the following shall be *substituted*, namely :—

‘In the case of the Public Debt and Currency Departments, Treasuries and Accounts Offices :—’

(2) The following shall be added as item 6, namely :—

‘*Government Securities.*—The Controller of Currency and in the case of securities issued from Madras and Bombay, the Accountant General, Madras, and the Deputy Controller of Currency, Bombay, respectively.’

ORDER.—Ordered that the above Resolution be communicated to all local Governments* and Administrations and the several Departments† of the Government of India for information and guidance (with reference to its endorsement No. 219-A., dated the 30th March 1920) [and for communication to the Agent to the Governor General, Baluchistan] and that it be also published in the Supplement to the *Gazette of India*.

THE SHIKARPUR ELECTRIC LICENSE, 1920.

NOTICE.

The Shikarpur Electric License, 1920.

WHEREAS an application has been made on 23rd March 1920 to the Government of Bombay, under Rule 9, on behalf of the Shikarpur Electric Supply Company, Limited, for the grant of a License under the Indian Electricity Act of 1910, for the City of Shikarpur, notice is hereby given, under Rule 13, that any person or company or local authority desirous of making any representation with reference to the said application, may do so by letter addressed to the Secretary to the Government of Bombay in the Public Works Department, within three months of the date of issue of this. The said draft License is published hereunder for general information.

The copy of the map referred to in the said draft License, showing the area of supply, may be inspected and copies of the draft License may be had at the Registered Office of The Shikarpur Electric Supply Company, Limited, on the Sind Canal Road, Shikarpur.

License for the supply of energy, granted by the Government of Bombay under the Indian Electricity Act, 1910.

LICENSE IS HEREBY GRANTED to the Shikarpur Electric Supply Company, Limited, to supply electrical energy in the area, with the powers and upon the terms and conditions all specified below.

Short Title.

1. This License may be cited as "The Shikarpur Electric License, 1920."

Interpretation.

2. The several words, terms and expressions, to which by the Indian Electricity Act, 1910, or by the Rules thereunder, meanings are assigned, shall have in this license the same meanings, provided that in this License—

- (a) The expression "The Act" shall mean the Indian Electricity Act, 1910.
- (b) The expression "The Licensees" shall mean The Shikarpur Electric Supply Company, Limited, and their permitted assigns.
- (c) The expression "First Annexure," "Second Annexure," and "Third Annexure" shall mean the first, second and third annexure to this License respectively.
- (d) The expression "Deposited Map" shall mean the plan of the area of supply hereinafter specified, which is deposited with the Government of Bombay in pursuance of the Rules under the Act, which plan is signed for the purpose of identification by the Secretary to the Government of Bombay in the Public Works Department and by the Managing Agent of the Shikarpur Electric Supply Company, Limited.
- (e) The date of the notification by the Government of Bombay in the *Bombay Government Gazette* that this License has been granted, is in this License referred to as "The commencement of this License."

Security.

3. (1) The period within which under clause 1 (a) of the Schedule to the Act, the Licensees shall show that they are in a position fully and efficiently to discharge the duties and obligations imposed upon them by the License throughout the area of supply shall, unless otherwise ordered by the Government of Bombay under that clause, be 18 months from the commencement of the License.

(2) The period within which under clause 1 (b) of the Schedule to the Act, the Licensees shall deposit or secure such sum as therein mentioned and the sum so to be deposited or secured shall, unless otherwise ordered by the Government of Bombay, be six months from the commencement of this License and Rs. 5,000 respectively.

Area of Supply.

4. The area within which the supply of energy is authorised by this License, is as described as follows :—

- (1) The area contained within the limits of the Shikarpur Municipality.
- (2) The area contained within the limits of *Deh Chawani*, which are proposed to be brought within the limits of the Municipality, by the Municipality.
- (3) The area contained within the limits of the North Western Railway in Shikarpur, the present limits being shown on the deposited map by a green line.

Purpose of Supply.

5. Subject to the provisions of this License and the Act and to the Rules thereunder, the Licensees shall be entitled, during the continuance of this License, to supply energy within the area of supply for all purposes, except in bulk to other Licensees for distribution by them.

System of Supply.

6. The systems which may be adopted for the supply of electrical energy in pursuance of this License are the following :—

- (1) (a) A continuous current supply at a pressure not exceeding 250 Volts between adjacent conductors of a three wire system, the intermediate conductor being connected to earth at the generating station but insulated at all other parts.
- (b) A continuous current direct supply at a pressure not exceeding 250 Volts between the conductors of a two wire system.
- (2) (a) A low pressure alternating current three phase supply at a pressure not exceeding 230 Volts between each phase and neutral at a frequency of 50 complete periods per second.
- (b) A high pressure alternating current three phase supply at a pressure not exceeding 6,600 Volts at a frequency of 50 complete periods per second.

The feeders, distributing mains and service lines may be aerial or underground in whole or in part and shall be erected, constructed and maintained by the Licensees in strict conformity with the Act and the Rules thereunder.

Limits within which the Supply of Energy is to be Compulsory.

7. (1) The Licensees shall, within a period of three years after the commencement of the License, execute works to the satisfaction of the Government of Bombay for the purpose of supply of energy throughout such streets or parts of streets as are mentioned in the first annexure and shown as coloured brown on the deposited map.

(2) If the Licensees fail to comply with the provisions of sub-section (1) the License may be revoked.

Limits of Licensees' Obligation to supply Energy.

8. (1) The Licensees shall not be under any obligation under section 22 of the Act to supply more energy than is consistent with their obligation to maintain a constant supply to consumers having regard to the capacity of the plant that is installed.

(2) The Licensees are hereby authorised to discontinue the supply of energy to consumers during the hours between sunrise and sunset during the months of October, November, December, January, February, March and April.

Breaking up of Streets and Railways, and Crossing of Waterways.

9. The Licensees are hereby authorised, within the area of supply, to open and break up the soil and pavement of Railway or to cross any waterways, mentioned in the second annexure, at such points and places and to such extent only as shall have been previously approved in writing by the Government of Bombay and upon such conditions as may be fixed by the Government of Bombay.

Power to lay Mains in Streets not dedicated to Public Use.

10. The Licensees may, upon the application of any owner or occupier of any premises abutting on any street not dedicated to public use within the area of supply, supply such premises with electrical energy and may in accordance with and subject to the provisions of the Act, so far as such provisions are applicable, lay down, take up, alter, relay or renew in, across or along such street, such mains as may be required or proper for furnishing such supply, in the same way and to the same extent as if such street had been specified in the third annexure to this license, but doing as little damage as may be in the execution of the powers hereby granted and making compensation for any damage which may be done in the execution of such powers.

Supply of Electrical Apparatus and Fittings by the Licensees.

11. (1) The Licensees may provide, let for hire, and fix, repair and remove lamps, fan, motors, wires and accessories for all purposes for which electrical energy can be used, and may provide all materials and work, necessary or proper in that behalf, and with respect thereto may demand and take such prices, remuneration or rents and charges and make such terms and conditions as may be agreed upon.

(2) Any fittings let for hire under the provisions of clause 11 (1) shall not be subject to distress or to the landlord's remedy for rent or liable to be taken in execution under process of law or proceedings in bankruptcy against the person in whose possession they may be.

Limits of Prices to be charged in respect of Supply of Energy.

12. The prices to be charged by the Licensees for energy supplied by them shall not exceed those stated in that behalf in the third annexure, or in the case of a method of charge approved by the Government of Bombay in accordance with Clause X of the Schedule to the Act, such maximum as the Government of Bombay shall fix on approving the method.

Purchase of Undertaking.

13. The option of purchase given by section 7 of the Act, shall be exercisable on the expiration of forty-five years computed from the commencement of the License and thereafter after the expiration of every subsequent period of fifteen years during the subsistence of this License. The value of all lands, buildings, works, materials and plant of the Licensees to be paid in accordance with the said section of the Act, shall be their fair market value, at the time of purchase, which shall be determined in case of difference or dispute, by arbitration, due regard being had to the various matters mentioned in the first proviso to set out in sub-section (1) of the said section 7 and there shall be added to such value, ten per cent. on account of compulsory purchase as is referred to in the second proviso set out in the same sub-section.

(2) In accordance with sub-section 2 (d) (ii) of section 3 of the Act it is hereby declared that the generating station to be used in connection with the undertaking shall form part of the undertaking for the purpose of purchase under section 5 or section 7 of the Act.

Exceptions from the Schedule to the Act.

14. In pursuance of section 3, sub-section (2), Clause (f) of the Act it is hereby declared that Clause IX of the Schedule to the Act shall be excepted from incorporation in this License.

Assignment of License.

15. At any time after the commencement of this License, the Licensees may, with the previous consent in writing of the Government of Bombay and subject to compliance with such conditions upon which such consent may be given, assign this License and transfer the whole of their undertaking in respect of which this License is granted (including all lands, buildings, works, materials, and plant of the Licensees) to a Company formed and registered in accordance with the law for the time being in force in British India or in Great Britain, having authority to take over this License and the said undertaking as the case may be, and to exercise the powers and perform the obligations given to or imposed upon the Licensees under this License and the Act and the Rules under the Act and on such assignment and transfer, the rights, powers and authorities, obligations and liabilities of the Licensees shall be assigned and transferred to and shall be exercised by and shall attach to such Company aforesaid.

THE FIRST ANNEXURE.

Compulsory Area.

List of Streets and parts of streets referred to in Clause 7 (1) of this License, through which the Licensees are to lay down or erect suitable and sufficient distributing mains for the purposes of general supply, within a period of 3 years after the commencement of this License.

1. From Power Station to Phulpota Road, then West along Phulpota Road to Lakhi Gate, then through the Main Bazar to Stuart Ganj and Meat Market.
2. Along the Inner-Circular Road from Lakhi Gate to Nausharo Gate to Karandar to Vaguna Gate, to Municipal Office Road, and the Grain Market to Khanpuri Gate, and Hathi Gate, and Huzari Gate up to Lakhi Gate.
3. Dadvai Road.
4. Nandha Kamagar Road from Lakhi Gate, to Dadvai Road.
5. Road from Kanjirka But via Kakira and Chunigar and Jamnadas Marhi and Charya Brahaman to Municipal Office Road via Khatwari Dharmsala.

6. Mirsha Kuba Road up to Karandar Police Ghat.
7. From Nausharo Police Ghat *via* Mirshah Kuba Road *via* Kazi Masjid and Weavers' Quarter to Municipal Office Road.
8. From Lakhi Gate, to the West *via* Kanjirka But.
9. From Khanpuri Gate *via* Khanchand Haveli to Saifal Road.

THE SECOND ANNEXURE.

Maxima Charges.

Clause 1.—The term "unit" as used in this Annexure shall be deemed to mean the energy contained in a current of one thousand amperes flowing under an electro-motive force of one volt during one hour.

Clause 2.—When the Licensees charge any consumer, by the amount of energy supplied to him, they shall be entitled to charge him at the following rates:—

- (a) A fixed rate of Rs. 6 per mensem per Kilowatt demanded for any quantity up to 12 units, whether energy is used or not; and
- (b) For any quantity exceeding 12 units per calendar month—
 - (1) For general supply purposes for light, fans and heaters—annas eight per unit.
 - (2) For power and purposes other than those specified in (1)—at the rate of annas four per unit.

Clause 3.—When the Licensees measure the quantity of current contained in the supply to a consumer, the Licensees shall be entitled to charge such consumer for electric energy according to the rates set forth in Clause 2 of this Annexure, the quantity of energy supplied to him being taken to be the product of the quantity of current as measured by the meter and the declared pressure at the consumer's terminals.

Provided that when Licensees supply energy on an alternating system, this method of measurement shall not apply and in such cases the quantity of energy contained in the supply shall be measured by a suitable and approved meter.

Clause 4.—When the Licensees charge any customer by contract, they shall be entitled to charge a fixed rate per lamp or fan per month, the rate being based on a maximum charge of annas three per watt according to the rated capacity of the lamp or fan.

Clause 5.—Without prejudice to anything contained in the above preceding clauses of this Annexure, the Licensees may at any time enter into a special contract with the Municipality of Shikarpur, or the North Western Railway for a supply of energy to the Municipality or the Railway upon such terms and conditions and at such rates not exceeding the maxima charges above specified, as may for the time being be mutually agreed upon, provided that every such agreement shall have been previously approved by Government.

Railways to be crossed.

The North Western Railway Main line level crossings on the Phula Pota Road and on the Khanpur Road.

“The Judge should inspect the Názir's accounts at the beginning of January, April, July and October, respectively, *i.e.*, at the time when the lists of lapsed deposits are posted (*vide* rule (25) of the Account Rules at page 323). He should also call occasionally for the various registers and accounts mentioned in Chapter XXII, and satisfy himself that the entries have been carefully and properly made. When such inspection is made, the Judge should note the fact with his own hand on the register or account inspected. The examination of the accounts, whether under Rule (25) of the Account Rules or on any other occasion, may be carried out by the Clerk of the Court.”

The cash should also be verified on the re-opening of the Court after the Summer Vacation.

The verification of the cash of a District Court may be delegated by the District Judge to a Joint or Assistant or Subordinate Judge.”

In reckoning the maximum number of passengers, children in arms shall not be counted. Two children not being children in arms but each being under the age of 12, shall count as one passenger.

SAMPLES.

An Open General Licence has been issued which permits the free export of all *bond fide* samples of prohibited goods to all destinations with which trade is now permitted. Samples exported under this licence may be used only for genuine sample purposes, *i.e.*, for obtaining orders from foreign buyers, and may not be sold except with the written consent of the Import and Export Licensing Section; but such consent may be dispensed with when it is desired to sell the articles in the country of destination after they have fulfilled their purpose as samples. Exporters will be required to satisfy the Customs Authorities that the goods presented for export under this licence are *bond fide* samples, and to make a declaration to that effect on the relative shipping documents.

This notice only applies to samples of goods which require licences for export to the particular destination concerned.

In addition, the consent of the Import and Export Licensing Section is not required for the sale of samples which, though within this scheme at the actual time they were exported, could be exported outside the scheme at the actual time of the proposed sale.

OPEN GENERAL LICENCE FOR COAL EXPORTS.

An Open General Licence has been issued, with effect from Thursday, 1st January 1920, permitting the export of coal, coke and manufactured fuel to all destinations abroad except Russia (other than Esthonia, Lettland and Lithuania), Germany, Hungary, Austria, Turkey and Bulgaria, subject always to the approval, previously obtained, of the Controller of Coal Mines or his duly authorised representative, and subject to shipment being made in a vessel approved by the Commissioners of Customs and Excise or their Officers.

The Customs Authorities will require pre-entry to be made in all cases; and at ports where there is a duly authorised local representative of the Controller of Coal Mines *see* list below, the approval referred to above will be signified by his endorsement on the pre-entry form, which must be presented to him for the purpose before shipment.

Where shipment is proposed to be made from a port not included in the list given below it will be necessary for application for the Controller's approval to be made to the Export Branch of the Coal Mines Department in London. Shipments from all ports in the United Kingdom to the destinations excluded from the purview of the general licence must still be covered by an export licence from the Coal Mines Department.

OPEN GENERAL LICENCE FOR THE EXPORT OF INDUSTRIAL EXPLOSIVES, SMOOTH-BORE GUNS, AND MUNITIONS FOR USE THEREWITH.

An Open General Licence has been issued for the export of industrial explosives, smooth-bore guns, and munitions for use therewith, to the destinations given below, to which, therefore, exports may be made subject to the usual Customs formalities without applications for specific licences to the Import and Export Licensing Section:—

France, Belgium, Spain, Portugal, Greece, Italy, Jugo-Slavia, Roumania, Norway, Sweden, Denmark, Holland, Switzerland and Iceland.

In accordance with Article 6, Chapter 2, of the 'Convention for the Control of the Trade in Arms and Ammunition,' all consignments of Arms and Ammunition proceeding info or through any of the Prohibited Areas set out below will require a Specific Export Licence.

The Prohibited Areas are :—

(1) The whole of the Continent of Africa, with the exception of Algeria, Libya, and the Union of South Africa. (Within this area are included all Islands situated within a hundred nautical miles of the coast, together with Prince's Island, St. Thomas Island and the Islands of Annobon and Socotra.)

(2) Transcaucasia, Persia, Gwadar, the Arabian Peninsula and such continental parts of Asia as were included in the Turkish Empire on August 4, 1914.

(3) A maritime zone including the Red Sea, the Gulf of Aden, the Persian Gulf and the Sea of Oman and bounded by a line drawn from Cape Guardfui, following the latitude of that cape to its intersection with longitude 57° east of Greenwich, and proceeding thence direct to the eastern frontier of Persia on the Gulf of Oman.

OPEN GENERAL LICENCE FOR THE EXPORT OF AIRCRAFT, etc.

An Open General Licence has been issued for the export of the undermentioned goods to all destinations except Russia, Germany, Hungary, Austria, Turkey and Bulgaria. Applications are no longer to be made to the Import and Export Licensing Section of the Board of Trade in respect of the export of these goods to countries other than those mentioned :—' Aeroplanes engines and their component parts. Aircraft, other than balloons of all kinds, and their component parts, together with accessories and articles suitable for use in connection with aircraft.'

OPEN GENERAL LICENCE FOR THE EXPORT OF PARCELS CONTAINING MISCELLANEOUS FOODSTUFFS.

An Open General Licence has been issued for the export by parcel post of parcels containing one or more varieties of foodstuffs (for the personal use of the addressee and not for trading purposes) to all destinations with which trading is allowed, provided that any such parcel may not contain more than two pounds of sugar or more than one pound of butter. Applications need, therefore, no longer be submitted to the Import and Export Licensing Section in respect of the export of such parcels by parcel post.

NOTES REGARDING EXPORT TO CERTAIN COUNTRIES.

Exporters are warned that there are import prohibitions in some foreign countries, information regarding which can be obtained from the Department of Overseas Trade, 35, Old Queen Street, Westminster, S. W. 1, and 73, Basinghall Street, E. C. 2. The issue of an export licence implies no guarantee that the goods will be admitted into the country of destination.

There is no parcel post to *Esthonia, Jugo-Slavia* (except *Dalmatia*), *Lettland* (*Latvia*), *Lithuania*, *Poland*.

Germany.

Gift parcels sent by parcel post may enter Germany without import licence and also free from duty and taxes, provided they do not contain more than kilos (70 ozs.) of tobacco.

Russia (*European*).

Conditions under which trading with European Russia will be permissible are at present under consideration.

Syria.

A parcel post service is in operation north of Acre to Alexandretta and west of Aleppo, including—Beyrout, Damascus, Hamah, Homs, Latakia, Rayak and Tripoli.

Turkey.—Parcels for civilians in Turkey and Smyrna will only be accepted if they are fully addressed 'c/o Poste Restante, British Army Post Office, Constantinople' (and/or Smyrna), and parcels must be called for at the British Post Offices.

URGENT ORDERS.

The Import and Export Licensing Section, Board of Trade, announces that, in collaboration with the Department of Overseas Trade, an arrangement has been made whereby firms receiving orders which require immediate acceptance may telegraph details of any such order to the Department of Overseas Trade in order to ascertain whether a licence will be granted for the export of the goods if the order is accepted.

In the event of an applicant being promised a licence he will be enabled to deal with the order straightaway with the knowledge that upon application being made in the proper form to the Import and Export Licensing Section (Board of Trade) the licence will be granted.

The telegrams should be addressed to 'Orders, c/o Advantage, Stock, London.' They should give in each case in addition to the name and postal or telegraphic address of the applicant the quantity and description of the goods comprised in the order and the name and address of the ultimate consignee if the goods are destined for a neutral country. In the case of orders from Allied or British Territory or from Territory in the occupation of troops of the Associated Governments, the consignee need not be stated; and it will be sufficient merely to give the country of destination. A reply of 24 words (1/3) must be prepaid.

Applicants are requested in their own interest to confine their enquiries to orders needing a very urgent decision, since the fewer the enquiries the more promptly can answers be given.

Any subsequent correspondence that is necessary in connection with the telegraphic enquiries should be addressed to the Comptroller General, Department of Overseas Trade (Export Facilities Section), 35, Old Queen Street, Westminster, S. W. 1.

Transshipment in the United Kingdom.

The provisional approval of the Import and Export Section, Board of Trade, should be obtained before the following goods are brought to this country for transshipment:—

Bacon, ham and lard of all kinds.

It is not now necessary to make application to the Collector of Customs at the transshipment ports on Form S. 90 for the transshipment of any goods except those specified in the following list:—

Foodstuffs for animal or human consumption which are on Section 'A' or 'B' of the list of prohibited exports (including tea and cocoa).

Seeds, oils and fats on Section 'A' of the list of prohibited exports.

Synthetic dyestuffs.

Ergot.

Quinine sulphate.

Caustic potash.

Potassium carbonate.

Wool-tops and mixtures thereof.

Woollen and worsted yarn and mixtures thereof.

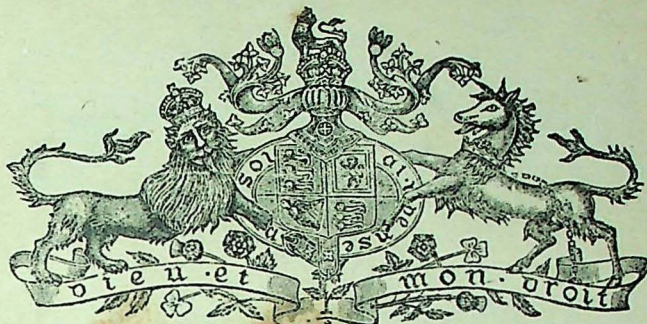
