No. K.-Misc.—The following Resolution by the Government of India, Finance Department, is republished :—

“ RESOLUTION.

No. 1543-F.E., dated Simla, the 13th September 1920.

The Government of India have recently considered the question of the rate of interest allowed on deposits in special Provident Funds on bonus terms referred to in Finance Department letter No. 1093-F.E., dated the 28th August 1918, and have now been authorised by His Majesty's Secretary of State for India to announce that interests on amounts accumulated in such funds will until further orders be allowed at the rate of 5½ per cent. per annum, with effect from 1st April 1919.

The increased rate will not be fixed for any definite period but will be subject to reconsideration should the rates at which the Government of India borrow undergo modification. Six months' notice will however be given to subscribers before any alteration is made.

Ordered that the foregoing Resolution be published in the *Gazette of India*.

No. 2783.—In exercise of the powers conferred by section 5 of the Opium Act, 1878 (I of 1878), the Governor in Council, with the previous sanction of the Governor General in Council, is pleased to amend the Bombay Opium Rules published in Government Notification in the Revenue Department No. 9656, dated 18th September 1919, as follows, namely:—

1. After rule 25 of the said rules the following rule shall be inserted, namely:—

“25-A.—The conditions subject to which the transport through British territory shall be permitted of opium, other than preparations or admixtures of opium

used for smoking, which is the property of a farmer licensed by His Highness the Maharaja of the Bhávnagar State and which is to be taken direct from the depôt in His Highness' territory through British territory, for the supply of the said farmer's retail shops in the villages of Otaria and Sandhida in His Highness' territory, are as follows:—

- (i) that the opium shall be transported by not more than four consignments in any year, on the first day of February, May, August and November respectively and on no other date. The quantity of each consignment shall not exceed 2½ seers; this quantity shall be subject to revision every five years;
 - (ii) that the opium shall be transported by the Adhelai-Bawaliári, route from the Bhávnagar State depôt to Bawaliári. On its arrival at Bawaliári, the covering transport permit granted as hereinafter provided by the Revenue Commissioner of Bhávnagar shall be presented to the Nákádár of Bawaliári, and in the absence of that officer, to any other officer of the Opium Department who may be deputed to Bawaliári for the purpose; and facilities shall be afforded to the said officer for the proper examination and weighing of the opium. After the examination the opium shall be conveyed to Sandhida or Otaria by the most direct route leading from Bawaliári; the Bawaliári-Hebatpur route shall not be used;
 - (iii) that the opium shall be covered by a pass which shall be numbered and dated (according to the English Calendar) and shall contain the following particulars:—
 - (a) the route by which, the time during which and the places from and to which, transport is to be effected;
 - (b) the quantity of opium to be transported;
 - (iv) that every such pass shall be
 - (a) in duplicate in Form H-A;
 - (b) signed by the Revenue Commissioner of Bhávnagar;
 - (c) kept during transport in the possession of the person in charge of the opium;
 - (d) produced on demand made by any British officer of the Departments of Land Revenue, Police and Excise;
 - (v) that no quantity shall be transported in excess of that mentioned in the pass granted in respect thereof or by any route other than that mentioned in such pass;
 - (vi) that not less than 24 hours before the import into British territory commences, intimation of the route by which any such opium is to pass shall be given to the Police Patel of the first village in British territory through which the opium may have to pass;
 - (vii) that a duplicate of every such pass shall, at the time of its issue, be forwarded to the Mámlatdár of every táluka in which a British village, through which the opium will have to pass, is situated."

“ POST OFFICE.

No. 6385, dated Simla, the 20th September 1920.

RESOLUTION.

The Governor General in Council is pleased to sanction the following amendments of the rules for the guidance of depositors in Post Office Savings Banks, published with the Resolution of the Government of India in the Department of Commerce and Industry, No. 1446-1449-29,* dated the 5th March 1914, as subsequently amended :—

The following shall be substituted for rules 31, 37, 38, 40, 44, 46, 47 and 48 :—

31. A depositor may have his account transferred, free of charge, to any post office that is a Savings Bank, provided that the account shall have been in existence at least three months from the date on which it was originally opened. If he should wish to transfer his account, he must present his pass book personally, or send it to the post office and must in either case make a written application for transfer in which he should mention whether or not he holds Government securities in the custody of the Accountant-General. The pass book will be returned to the depositor (but see note 3 below), who should present it as soon as possible at the post office to which his account has been transferred with a specimen of his signature.

NOTE 1.—Accounts cannot be transferred from one head post office to another between the 16th and 31st March, both days inclusive.

NOTE 2.—Accounts ordered to be closed cannot be transferred; nor can an account be transferred after the death of the depositor.

NOTE 3.—The pass book of a depositor in a sub or branch post office who wishes to transfer his account will first be sent to the head post office to which the sub or branch office is subordinate to have the orders authorising the transfer entered in the book.

NOTE 4.—When an application for the transfer of an account of a female depositor is made by her authorised agent, the agent must certify as follows above his signature on the application for transfer : ‘ Certified that the depositor is on this day alive and sane.’

37. (1) If a depositor should die, leaving in a Post Office Savings Bank a balance in cash not exceeding three thousand rupees, and if probate of his will, or letters of administration of his estate, or a certificate granted under Act VII of 1889, be not produced to the Postmaster-General within three months of the death of the said depositor, the Postmaster-General may pay the said sum of money to any person appearing to him to be entitled to receive it or to administer the estate of the deceased.

(2) The Postmaster-General may also determine under section 19 of the Indian Securities Act, 1920, who is the person entitled to Government securities standing in the name of a deceased depositor and kept in the safe custody of the Accountant-General, Posts and Telegraphs, if the nominal or face value of such securities does not in the aggregate exceed Rs. 5,000 and probate of the deceased depositor's will or letters of administration of his estate or a certificate granted under Act VII of 1889, be not produced to the Postmaster-General within six months of his death.

NOTE.—If the deceased depositor was a minor in whose name more accounts than one stand open the balance at credit of all these accounts will be added together for the purpose of applying this rule.

38. Cash balances in excess of Rs. 3,000, or Government securities in excess of Rs. 5,000 in the custody of the Accountant-General, Posts and Telegraphs, may only be paid on production of probate, letters of administration, or a certificate under Act VII of 1889. In the former case, the Director-General has, however, discretionary power to dispense with such evidence if he is of opinion that to require it would cause hardship, and that to dispense with it would involve no appreciable risk.

NOTE.—The provision of the note below rule 37 applies also to this rule.

40. The deposits of officers and soldiers of the British Army who die intestate, desert, or become insane or otherwise incapable of managing their affairs, will be made over on application to the President of the Committee of Adjustment; or to the legal representative of the deceased as defined in section 29, Regimental Debts Act, 1893 (56 and 57 Vict., ch. 5).

Regimental, Police and other conjoint accounts.

44. The following special conditions govern the opening of the conjoint accounts specified below and their transactions :—

(a) The Commanding Officer of a unit may open a single account with the Post Office Savings Bank on account of the men or followers of his unit making his own arrangements about the separate accounts of the individuals and about the distribution to them of the interest credited upon the conjoint account. In other

respects the account shall, except when the contrary is stated, be subject to the general rules for other accounts. The Commanding Officer must, when opening the account, sign a certificate, that to the best of his belief, the money is the property of the men or followers of his unit.

- (b) District Superintendents of Police, and officers-in-command or charge of any Police Force, may open similar accounts on account of the men of the Police Force under their command or charge.
- (c) Chairmen of District Boards and Municipalities are also allowed to have similar accounts on account of servants of such Boards and Municipalities in accordance with rules which may be sanctioned from time to time by Local Governments.
- (d) Managers of Provident Funds authorised by Government in connection with Courts of Wards and other institutions administered or controlled by Government are also allowed to open similar accounts on behalf of non-pensionable employees paid from the funds of the Courts of Wards or other institutions in accordance with rules which may from time to time be sanctioned by Local Governments or Administrations.
- (e) Secretaries of Cantonment Committees are also allowed to open similar accounts on behalf of non-pensionable employees paid from cantonment funds, in accordance with rules which may from time to time be sanctioned by the Government of India.
- (f) Headmasters of Educational Institutions are also allowed to open similar accounts on behalf of students for the deposit of small sums saved by them for the purchase of Post Office 5-year Cash Certificates.

NOTE.—Nothing in this rule shall be held to prevent any member of any of the above mentioned classes of persons, for whom a conjoint account has been opened, from opening an account of his own in his individual capacity.

- (g) Officers in charge of Lunatic Asylums may open similar accounts on behalf of patients in their charge.
- (h). The annual limit of Rs. 750 and the maximum limit of Rs. 5,000 for deposits (see rules 10 and 11) as well as the maximum limit of Rs. 5,000 for calculation of interests (see rule 29), do not apply to accounts opened under this rule.
- (i) Except with the special sanction of the Director-General, the amount of withdrawals within a calendar month from an account opened under this rule is limited to Rs. 1,000, unless the person who holds the account gives notice to the post office at which the account stands of his intention to make additional withdrawals. The notice must specify the amount to be withdrawn and be given one month in advance, by means of an ordinary letter addressed to the postmaster which should specify the date on which it is intended to make the withdrawal and if it is intended to withdraw the amount in two or more instalments, specific information must be given in the notice as to the number of instalments and the amount and date of withdrawal of each instalment.

NOTE.—The provisions of the latter portion of the Note below clause (k) of rule 42 apply also to this rule.

- (j) In the form of declaration (see rule 17), which every intending depositor is required to sign, the words 'I further declare that I have no account opened by me on my own behalf at any Post Office Savings Banks' should be scored through in the case of accounts opened under this rule.
- (k) The prohibition against the deposit and withdrawal of sums containing a fraction of an anna (see rules 9 and 15) does not apply to conjoint accounts opened for Provident Fund deposits of persons employed by Municipalities, District Boards, etc.

Purchase of Government Securities.

46. (1) Any person, whether previously a depositor in the Post Office Savings Bank or not, may invest through the Post Office in any Government loan bearing interest at 3½ per cent. or upwards.

(2) The total amount, after deducting any sum sold through the Post Office, which may be invested through the Post Office by an individual investor in any one official year from the 1st April to the 31st March inclusive is Rs. 5,000. The total amount, after deducting any sum sold through the Post Office, which may be left in the safe custody of the Accountant-General under rule 48 (1) is Rs. 22,500. This limit applies only to securities the interest on which is liable to income-tax unless they are retained in the custody of the Post Office, and not to securities which originally are declared income-tax free.

NOTE 1.—The above limits will be applied with reference to the nominal value of the securities purchased. They do not apply to investments in connection with public accounts or with regimental, police and other conjoint accounts.

NOTE 2.—Subscriptions to new loans through the Post Office will be allowed in each case up to the limit specified in the notification announcing the loan. Such limits will be an addition to the yearly amounts of investment permissible under these rules. But securities whether obtained by investing in existing loans or by subscription to a new loan may not be left in the custody of the Accountant General under rule 48 (1) in excess of the limit of Rs. 22,500 mentioned above, unless they include an issue declared free of income-tax as one of the original conditions of subscription thereto.

(3) An investor may apply for the purchase of Government Promissory Notes or stock* certificates under clause (5). A form of application is prescribed for this purpose and may be obtained at any post office.

(4) If the investor is already a depositor in the Post Office Savings Bank, he should present his pass-book with his application; if he is not already a depositor, a pass-book will be prepared and delivered to him. Investments in Government securities can be made either from money already deposited in the investor's Savings Bank account or from money specially deposited for the purpose, or partly from the one and partly from the other.

(5) (a) Applications for the purchase of Government Promissory Notes or stock certificates will be for whole pieces of Government paper of Rs. 100 or any multiple of Rs. 100 subject to the annual limit prescribed by clause (2).

(b) The investor should specify the particular loan or loans in which he desires to make the investment. He has also the option of taking delivery of the Government Promissory Notes or stock certificates or of leaving them in the custody of the Accountant-General, Posts and Telegraphs. In the latter case, a receipt from the Accountant-General for the paper will be delivered to the investor. When a Government Promissory Note is to be delivered to the investor it will be endorsed in his favour, enfaced for payment of interest at the district treasury and forwarded to the post office for delivery to the investor. A stock certificate to be delivered to the investor will be issued in his name and interest on it will be made payable at the Treasury named by the holder.

(c) The purchase will be made by the Accountant-General and the investor will be charged for the Government Promissory Note or stock certificate at the current market rate for the day on which the application for purchase is received by the Accountant-General as certified by the Public Debt Office. This rate cannot be stated beforehand, as it is subject to the fluctuations of the market. Investments at any particular rate are not undertaken. The entries in connection with the investment will be noted in the pass-book by the head office.

(6) Investments in any Government Loan bearing interest at $3\frac{1}{2}$ per cent., and upwards by means of an Investment Certificate are no longer permissible, but an investor may exchange one or more existing Investment Certificates having an aggregate nominal value of not less than Rs. 100 for a whole piece of Government paper of Rs. 100 or any multiple of Rs. 100 by making an application in the prescribed form. The application must be accompanied by the Investment Certificates to be exchanged. If the total nominal value of the Investment Certificates tendered for exchange is not an exact multiple of Rs. 100 the investor may at his option obtain either (i) the next higher multiple of Rs. 100 if the balance in his Savings Bank account is sufficient for the purpose or (ii) the next lower multiple of Rs. 100. In the latter case the balance will be sold and the proceeds be credited to his Savings Bank account. The investor has also the option of having the Government paper obtained in this way made over to him or held by the Accountant-General, as provided for in rule (5) (b).

SALE OF GOVERNMENT SECURITIES.

47. (1) Any investor may apply for sale through the Post Office of the whole, or of any portion of any Government Promissory Notes or stock certificates which may have been purchased for him through the Post Office, whether held by himself or held for him by the Accountant-General, provided that the investor is also a Savings Bank Depositor at the time of application, that in the case of Government Promissory notes they bear no endorsements other than those made by and in favour of the Accountant-General and in the case of stock certificates that they are the identical scrip issued to the original holders, and also that if only a portion is specified for sale the balance of securities left after the sale is of the nominal value of Rs. 100 or a multiple of Rs. 100. Investment Certificates tendered for sale by an investor will be sold outright unconditionally.

(2) A separate form of application is prescribed for the sale of (i) Government securities and (ii) Investment Certificates. An application must be accompanied by:

(a) such of the Government Promissory Notes or stock certificates to be sold as are in the possession of the depositor. Government Promissory Notes should be endorsed by the holder, in favour of the Accountant-General and in the case of stock certificates the form of transfer on the reverse should be filled in by the holder at the time when these securities are tendered for sale.

(b) the receipts referred to in rule 46 (5) (b), for such of the securities to be sold as are in the custody of the Accountant-General; or

(c) investment certificates,

*Stock certificates are a form of Government Security and their chief advantage lies in the fact that they are not negotiable by endorsement and are consequently of no value in the hands of a wrongful holder.

as the case may, and a receipt for them will be granted by the postmaster. The securities in whatever form will be sold by the Accountant General at the current market rate for the day on which the application for sale is received by the Accountant-General, as certified by the Public Debt Office. Sales at any particular rate are not undertaken.

(3) The result of sale will be intimated to the investor by the Accountant-General through the postmaster concerned, with the least possible delay after the receipt of the application. The proceeds of sale, together with any interest that may be due, will be credited to the investor's Savings Bank account in the first instance and if the annual or total cash limit of his account is thereby exceeded, the excess will not bear interest and must be withdrawn by the depositor.

NOTE.—Securities purchased in the name and on behalf of a minor cannot be sold during the minority, except by the minor's legally constituted guardian, and the definition of guardian in rule 1 of these rules does not apply to the sale of such securities.

SAFE CUSTODY OF GOVERNMENT SECURITIES.

48. (1) An investor may tender at a Post Office Savings Bank, for safe custody by the Accountant-General, Government Promissory Notes and stock certificates which have been purchased for him through the Post Office, provided that the investor is a Savings Bank depositor at the time the securities are tendered, and that in the case of Government Promissory Notes, they bear no endorsements other than those made by and in favour of the Accountant-General and in the case of stock certificates that they are the identical scrip issued to the original holders. Except in the case of investments in connection with public accounts or with regimental, police, or other conjoint accounts, the total amount which may be kept in the custody of the Accountant-General by an individual investor is limited to Rs. 22,500 in securities the interest on which is liable to income-tax unless they are retained in the custody of the Post Office. This limit is exclusive of securities issued free of income-tax as one of the conditions of subscription thereto. The tender must be made on the form prescribed for the purpose. Government Promissory Notes tendered for safe custody should be endorsed by the holder in favour of the Accountant-General. In the case of stock certificates the form of transfer on the reverse should be filled in by the holder. A receipt from the Accountant-General for the securities will be delivered to the investor.

(2) An investor may also, at any time, apply through the local post office for the delivery to him of any Government Promissory Notes and stock certificates which have been purchased for him through the Post Office. The application must be made in the form prescribed for the purpose and must be accompanied by the receipt referred to in (i) section 1 of this rule or (ii) in rule 46 (5) (b). The securities will then be forwarded to the postmaster concerned for delivery to the investor. In the absence of any special request as to the form of the security it will be delivered in the form of a Promissory note.

NOTE.—Securities purchased through the Post Office on behalf of a Fund other than one belonging to a body corporate with perpetual succession and a common seal, and kept in the safe custody of the Accountant-General, Posts and Telegraphs, will be sold by him on application by the person or persons who have furnished a declaration under rule 17 or rule 42 (g). If delivery of the securities is applied for, the notes will be delivered endorsed in the name of such party or parties.

ORDER.—Ordered that this Resolution be published in the *Gazette of India* for general information and that it be communicated to the Finance Department, the Director-General of Posts and Telegraphs and to the Accountant-General, Posts and Telegraphs.

GOVERNMENT OF BOMBAY.

Poona, October 1920.

No. 2452-R.—The following notifications of the Government of India are republished for general information :—

“ No. 123, dated Simla, the 24th September 1920.

Whereas by section 47 of the Government of India Act, 1919, it is provided that the said Act shall come into operation on such date or dates as the Governor General in Council with the approval of the Secretary of State in Council may appoint;

And whereas the said Act confers powers for the making of rules thereunder for regulating the course of business in the Legislative Council of the Governor of Bombay; and for matters incidental and consequential thereto;

And whereas it is necessary for the purpose of bringing into operation the provisions of the said Act in respect of such Council on such date as may hereafter be appointed to make such rules prior to the date on which these provisions will be brought into operation;

And whereas a draft of such rules was laid before both Houses of Parliament and was duly approved by them with certain modifications and additions;

Now, therefore, in exercise of the powers conferred by section 37 of the Interpretation Act, 1889, read with the rule-making powers under the said Act, the Governor General in Council is pleased with the sanction of the Secretary of State in Council to make the said rules in the form so approved, the same being as follows :—

1. *Short title and commencement.*—(1) These rules may be called the Bombay Legislative Council Rules.

(2) They shall come into force on a date to be appointed by the Governor General in Council with the approval of the Secretary of State in Council.

2. *Definitions.*—In these rules—

‘ Council ’ means the Legislative Council of the Governor of Bombay;

‘ Finance Member ’ means the member of the Council appointed by the Governor to perform the functions of the Finance Member under these rules;

‘ Gazette ’ means the Bombay Government Gazette or the Sind Official Gazette or both, as the case may require;

‘ member ’ means a member of the Council;

‘ member of the Government ’ means a member of the Executive Council or a minister, and includes any member to whom such member may delegate any function assigned to him under these rules;

‘ resolution ’ means a motion for the purpose of discussing a matter of general public interest;

‘ standing order ’ means a standing order of the Council; and

‘ Secretary ’ means a Secretary to the Council, and includes any person for the time being performing the duties of the Secretary.

3. *Temporary Chairman.*—At the commencement of every Session, the President shall nominate from amongst the members of the Council a panel of not more than four Chairmen, any one of whom may preside over the Council in the absence of the President and Deputy President, when so requested by the President or, in his absence, by the Deputy President.

4. *Power of persons presiding.*—The Deputy President and any Chairman of the Council shall, when presiding over the Council, have the same powers as the President when so presiding; and all references to the President in the rules and standing orders shall, in these circumstances, be deemed to be references to any such person so presiding.

5. *Appointment of the Secretary.*—The Secretary and such assistants of the Secretary as the Governor considers to be necessary shall be appointed by order in writing by the Governor and shall hold office during his pleasure.

6. *Allotment of time for non-official business and precedence of business.*—The Governor, after considering the state of business of the Council, shall, at the commencement of each Session, allot as many days as are in his opinion compatible with the public interests for the business of non-official members in the Council, and may from time to time during the Session alter such allotment, and on these days such business shall have precedence. At all other times Government business shall have precedence.

7. *Power to disallow question.*—The President may within the period of notice disallow any question or any part of a question on the ground that it relates to a matter which is not primarily the concern of the local Government, and, if he does so, the question or part of the question shall not be placed on the list of questions.

8. *Subject matter of question.*—(1) A question may be asked for the purpose of obtaining information on a matter of public concern within the special cognisance of the member to whom it is addressed :

Provided that no question shall be asked in regard to any of the following subjects, namely :—

- (i) any matter affecting the relations of His Majesty's Government, or of the Government of India, or of the Governor or the Governor in Council, with any foreign State;
- (ii) any matter affecting the relations of any of the foregoing authorities with any Prince or Chief under the suzerainty of His Majesty, or relating to the affairs of any such Prince or Chief or to the administration of the territory of any such Prince or Chief; and
- (iii) any matter which is under adjudication by a Court of Law having jurisdiction in any part of His Majesty's Dominions.

(2) If any doubt arises whether any question is or is not within the restrictions imposed by sub-rule (1), the Governor shall decide the point and his decision shall be final.

9. *Questions regarding controversy with higher authorities.*—In matters which are or have been the subject of controversy between the Governor General in Council or the Secretary of State and the local Government, no question shall be asked except as to matters of fact, and the answer shall be confined to a statement of facts.

10. *Supplementary questions.*—Any member may put a supplementary question for the purpose of further elucidating any matter of fact regarding which an answer has been given :

Provided that the President shall disallow any supplementary question if, in his opinion, it infringes the rules as to the subject-matter of questions.

11. *Motions for adjournments.*—A motion for an adjournment of the business of the Council for the purpose of discussing a definite matter of urgent public importance may be made with the consent of the President.

12. *Restrictions on power to make motion.*—The right to move the adjournment of the Council for the purpose of discussing a definite matter of urgent public importance shall be subject to the following restrictions, namely :—

- (i) not more than one such motion shall be made at the same sitting;
- (ii) not more than one matter can be discussed on the same motion, and the motion must be restricted to a specific matter of recent occurrence;
- (iii) the motion must not revive discussion on a matter which has been discussed in the same Session;
- (iv) the motion must not anticipate a matter which has been previously appointed for consideration, or with reference to which a notice of motion has been previously given; and
- (v) the motion must not deal with a matter on which a resolution could not be moved.

13. *Quorum.*—The presence of at least twenty-five members shall be necessary to constitute a meeting of the Council for the exercise of its powers.

14. *Language of the Council.*—The business of the Council shall be transacted in English, but any member who is not fluent in English may address the Council in any recognised vernacular of the Province, provided that the President may call on any member to speak in any language in which he is known to be proficient.

15. *Decision on points of order.*—(1) The President shall decide all points of order which may arise, and his decision shall be final.

(2) Any member may at any time submit a point of order for the decision of the President, but in doing so shall confine himself to stating the point.

16. *Irrelevance or repetition.*—The President, after having called the attention of the Council to the conduct of a member who persists in irrelevance or in tedious repetition either of his own arguments or of the arguments used by other members in debate, may direct him to discontinue his speech.

17. *Power to order withdrawal of member.*—(1) The President shall preserve order and have all powers necessary for the purpose of enforcing his decisions on all points of order.

(2) He may direct any member whose conduct is in his opinion grossly disorderly to withdraw immediately from the Council, and any member so ordered to withdraw shall do so forthwith and shall absent himself during the remainder of the day's meeting. If any member is ordered to withdraw a second time in the same Session, the President may direct the member to absent himself from the meetings of the Council for any period not longer than the remainder of the Session, and the member so directed shall absent himself accordingly.

(3) The President may in the case of grave disorder arising in the Council suspend any sitting for a time to be named by him.

18. *Publication of Bills.*—The Governor may order the publication of any Bill (together with the Statements of Objects and Reasons accompanying it) in the Gazette, although no motion has been made for leave to introduce the Bill. In that case it shall not be necessary to move for leave to introduce the Bill, and, if the Bill is afterwards introduced, it shall not be necessary to publish it again.

19. *Notice of motion for leave to introduce Bills.*—(1) Any member, other than a member of the Government, desiring to move for leave to introduce a Bill shall give notice of his intention, and shall, together with the notice, submit a copy of the Bill and a full Statement of Objects and Reasons.

(2) If the Bill is a Bill which, under the Government of India Act, requires sanction, the member shall annex to the notice a copy of such sanction, and the notice shall not be valid until this requirement is complied with.

(3) If any question arises whether a Bill is or is not a Bill which requires sanction under the Government of India Act, the question shall be referred to the authority which would have power to grant the sanction if it were necessary, and the decision of that authority on the question shall be final.

(4) The period of notice of a motion for leave to introduce a Bill under this rule shall be as follows, namely :—

(a) if the Bill relates to a transferred subject—fifteen days;

(b) if the Bill relates to a reserved subject—one month or, if the Governor so directs, a further period not exceeding in all two months.

20. *Publication.*—As soon as may be after a Bill has been introduced, the Bill, unless it has already been published, shall be published in the Gazette.

21. *Effect of certification by Governor.*—If the Governor certifies that a Bill or any clause of a Bill or any amendment to a Bill affects the safety or tranquillity of a Province or any part thereof, and directs that no proceedings or no further proceedings shall be taken thereon, all notices of motions in connection with the subject-matter of the certificate shall lapse, and if any such motion has not already been set down on the list of business it shall not be so set down. If any such motion has been set down on the list of business, the President shall, when the motion is reached, inform the Council of the Governor's action, and the Council shall forthwith without debate proceed to the next item of business.

22. *Power to disallow resolutions.*—(1) The Governor may within the period of notice disallow any resolution or any part of a resolution, on the ground that it cannot be moved without detriment to the public interest, or on the ground that it relates to a matter which is not primarily the concern of the local Government, and if he does so the resolution or part of the resolution shall not be placed on the list of business.

(2) The Governor may disallow on grounds as aforesaid any motion for adjournment under rule 11, notwithstanding the consent of the President, and if he does so the adjournment shall not be permitted by the President and no further discussion of the motion shall take place.

23. *Restrictions on subjects for discussion.*—(1) Every resolution shall be in the form of a specific recommendation addressed to the Government and no resolution shall be moved in regard to any of the following subjects, namely :—

(i) any matter affecting the relations of His Majesty's Government, or of the Government of India, or of the Governor or the Governor in Council, with any foreign State;

(ii) any matter affecting the relations of any of the foregoing authorities with any Prince or Chief under the suzerainty of His Majesty, or relating to the affairs of any such Prince or Chief or to the administration of territory of any such Prince or Chief; and

(iii) any matter which is under adjudication by a Court of Law having jurisdiction in any part of His Majesty's Dominions.

(2) The decision of the Governor on the point whether any resolution is or is not within the restrictions imposed by sub-rule (1) shall be final.

24. *Copy to Government.*—A copy of every resolution which has been passed by the Council shall be forwarded to the Government, but any such resolution shall have effect only as a recommendation to the Government.

25. *The Budget.*—A statement of the estimated annual expenditure and revenue of the Province (hereinafter referred to as "the Budget") shall be presented to the Council on such day as the Governor may appoint.

26. *Demands for grants.*—(1) A separate demand shall ordinarily be made in respect of the grant proposed for each Department of the Government, provided that the Finance Member may in his discretion include in one demand grants proposed for two or more Departments, or make a demand in respect of expenditure, such as Famine Relief and Insurance and Interest, which cannot readily be classified under particular Departments. Demands affecting reserved and transferred subjects shall, so far as may be possible, be kept distinct.

(2) Each demand shall contain, first, a statement of the total grant proposed, and then a statement of the detailed estimate under each grant divided into items.

(3) Subject to these rules, the Budget shall be presented in such a form as the Finance Member may consider best fitted for its consideration by the Council.

27. *Stages of the Budget debate.*—The Budget shall be dealt with by the Council in two stages, namely :—

(i) a general discussion; and

(ii) the voting of demands for grants.

28. *General discussions.*—(1) On a day to be appointed by the Governor subsequent to the day on which the Budget is presented and for such time as the Governor may allot for this purpose, the Council shall be at liberty to discuss the Budget as a whole or any question of principle involved therein, but no motion shall be moved at this stage, nor shall the Budget be submitted to the vote of the Council.

(2) The Finance Member shall have a general right of reply at the end of the discussion.

(3) The President may, if he thinks fit, prescribe a time-limit for speeches.

29. *Voting of grants.*—(1) Not more than twelve days shall be allotted by the Governor for the discussion of the demands of the local Government for grants.

(2) Of the days so allotted, not more than two days shall be allotted by the Governor to the discussion of any one demand. As soon as the maximum limit of time for discussion is reached, the President shall forthwith put every question necessary to dispose of the demand under discussion.

(3) On the last day of the allotted days at 5 o'clock, the President shall forthwith put every question necessary to dispose of all the outstanding matters in connection with the demands for grants.

30. *Motions at this stage.*—(1) No motion for appropriation can be made except on the recommendation of the Governor communicated to the Council.

(2) Motions may be moved at this stage to omit or reduce any grant or any item in a grant, but not to increase or alter the destination of a grant.

(3) When several motions relating to the same demand are offered, they shall be discussed in the order in which the heads to which they relate appear in the Budget.

(4) No motion shall be made for the reduction of a grant as a whole until all motions for the omission or reduction of definite items within that grant have been discussed.

31. *Excess grants.*—When money has been spent on any service for which the vote of Council is necessary during any financial year in excess of the amount granted for that service and for that year, a demand for the excess shall be presented to the Council by the Finance Member and shall be dealt with in the same way by the Council as if it were a demand for a grant.

32. *Supplementary or additional grants.*—(1) An estimate shall be presented to the Council for a supplementary or additional grant when—

(i) the amount voted in the Budget of a grant is found to be insufficient for the purposes of the current year, or

(ii) a need arises during the current year for expenditure for which the vote of the Council is necessary upon some new service not contemplated in the Budget for that year.

(2) Supplementary or additional estimates shall be dealt with in the same way by the Council as if they were demands for grants.

33. *Constitution of Committee on Public Accounts.*—(1) As soon as may be after the commencement of each financial year, a Committee on Public Accounts shall be

constituted for the purpose of dealing with the audit and appropriation accounts of the Province and such other matters as the Finance Department may refer to the Committee.

(2) The Committee on Public Accounts shall consist of such number of members as the Governor may direct, of whom not less than two-thirds shall be elected by the non-official members of the Council according to the principle of proportionate representation by means of the single transferable vote. The remaining members shall be nominated by the Governor.

(3) The Finance Member shall be Chairman of the Committee, and, in the case of an equality of votes on any matter, shall have a second or casting vote.

34. *Control of Committee on Public Accounts.*—(1) In scrutinising the audit and appropriation accounts of the Province, it shall be the duty of the Committee to satisfy itself that the money voted by the Council has been spent within the scope of the demand granted by the Council.

(2) It shall be the duty of the Committee to bring to the notice of the Council—

- (i) every re-appropriation from one grant to another grant;
- (ii) every re-appropriation within a grant which is not made in accordance with the rules regulating the functions of the Finance Department, or which has the effect of increasing the expenditure on an item the provision for which has been specially reduced by a vote of the Council; and
- (iii) all expenditure which the Finance Department has requested should be brought to the notice of the Council.

No. 207.—In exercise of the powers conferred by sections 9 and 72 of the Sea Customs Act, 1878 (VIII of 1878), and in supersession of Notification No. 5989, dated 14th November 1891, by the Commissioner of Customs, Salt, Opium and Abkari and of Government Notification in the Revenue Department, No. 1465, dated 21st February 1905 (save in so

far as it relates to fees chargeable in the Salt Department), the Commissioner of Customs, Bombay, is pleased to make the following rules for fixing working hours and for the levy of fees for work done on holidays and for overtime work by customs officers at Bombay :—

1. *Definitions.*—In these rules,

(a) "Close holidays" includes Sunday, New Year's day, Good Friday, the King-Emperor's birth-day, Christmas, the day following Christmas or New Year's day, if either of the latter falls on a Sunday, any day declared by the Government of India to be a general holiday, and any day on which the discharge or shipping of cargo is prohibited;

(b) "Working" includes the operation of landing and shipping but not of clearing.

2. *Working on Close Holidays: Penalty Fee.*—(a) A penalty fee of 6½ annas per gross registered ton subject to a maximum of Rs. 200 and a minimum of Rs. 50 shall be levied for each non-exempted vessel working cargo, stores, or bunker coal on a close holiday counting from midnight to midnight.

Explanation.—The payment by a vessel of the penalty fee for working on a close holiday shall entitle her to receive cargo, etc., previously loaded into cargo-boats, or to land cargo, etc., previously discharged from her into cargo-boats, without the payment of a further penalty fee.

(b) A penalty fee of Rs. 200 shall be levied for landing or shipping cargo, stores, or bunker coal, at bunders or wharves, from or into cargo-boats, when such work is not in connection with a vessel already charged with the penalty fee or is in connection with an exempted vessel. The payment of the penalty fee shall entitle the person or firm paying it to work cargo, etc., at any or all the bunders or wharves.

3. *Opening Dock Gates on Close Holidays: Penalty Fee.*—Permission to open the dock or bunder gates (so far as Bombay is concerned)

gates of the Napier Mole Wharf or of the native jetty or the exit gates of the Mansfield

Import Yard (so far as Karáchi is concerned) on a close holiday shall be granted in cases of emergency only and on payment of a penalty fee of Rs. 200 by each firm or person requiring such permission.

Provided that (a) if the Port Trust or any Government Department or Ship's Agent applies on behalf of two or more merchants for the opening of the gates, only one penalty fee of Rs. 200 shall be levied in respect of such application;

(b) The Port Trust or a Lighterage Company shall be held to be included in the term "person or firm."

4. *Application: To be made in writing.*—A written application for the requisite permission under rule 2 or rule 3 shall be made on each occasion to the Collector of Customs.

5. *Exemption from Penalty Fees.*—(1) Exemption from the payment of the penalty fee leviable under rule 2 shall be granted in the following cases:—

(a) the working of cargo, stores or bunker coal by vessels owned or chartered by Government;

(b) the landing or shipment at bunders or wharves of cargo, stores or bunker coal belonging to Government, when kept separate and worked by Government;

(c) the loading of coal at bunders or wharves for shipment to Government transports;

(d) the bunkering of coal for mail steamers and steamers in the coasting trade not licensed to carry cargo;

(e) work in connection with steamers of the British India Steam Navigation Company, Limited, carrying mails to the Persian Gulf, and steamers of the same Company carrying mails between Bombay and Karáchi in connection with the Persian Gulf fast mail service;

(f) the pumping of oil by, bulk-oil steamers, provided such pumping is begun before a close holiday and is continuously carried on as laid down in the Petroleum Rules;

(g) the landing or shipment of perishable ship's stores, e.g., fresh or frozen meat, fresh butter, fruit, vegetables, etc.;

(h) the landing or shipment of live-stock and such fodder and fittings as may be required for use in connection therewith immediately on landing or shipment; and

(i) the landing or shipment of explosives.

(2) Exemption from the payment of the penalty fee leviable under rule 3 shall be allowed when permission is given to open dock gates for the following purposes:—

(a) for the entry of perishable ship's stores, e.g., fresh or frozen meat, fresh butter, fruit, vegetables, etc.;

- (b) for the entry or exit of live-stock and such fodder or fittings as may be required in connection therewith immediately on landing of shipment;
- (c) for the bringing in or removal of railway waggons, provided the Port Trustees undertake not to load or unload waggons brought into the docks (so far as Bombay is concerned) or to unload waggons in the Mansfield Import Yard (so far as Karáchi is concerned) on such days and to pay for the attendance of the necessary Customs Staff;
- (d) for the bringing in or removal of troop-trains and of rations for the consumption of troops embarking, disembarking, entraining or detraining in the docks.
- (8) In all such cases a written application shall be made to the Collector of Customs for the requisite permission.

6. *Refund of Fees.*—Refund of the penalty fee leviable on account of the working of ships on a close holiday is admissible in the case of coal ships; provided that a written application or refund of the fee is made to the Collector of Customs accompanied ordinarily by a Survey Certificate from a licensed Surveyor to the effect that the work was imperative for the safety of the vessel.

7. *Working Hours: Overtime.*—(1) Except on close holidays ordinary working hours shall be as follows:—

(a) for officers, wharfingers, tallymen, lascars and peons of the Preventive Service on board ships or on wharves from sunrise to sunset; and (b) for the appraising, examining, bonding staff, clerks, account staff, supervising staff, office peons and scalesmen, from 9-30 a.m. to 6-30 p.m. (Standard time).

(2) Goods other than passengers' baggage shall not be discharged from any vessel or shipped or waterborne to be shipped between sunset and sunrise without the written permission of the Collector of Customs.

(3) Applications for permission for working beyond the hours herein prescribed on days other than close holidays shall be made in writing to the Assistant Collector, Preventive Department.

8. *Officers' Overtime and Holiday Fees.*—The following fees shall be levied from persons requiring the special services of Customs employees outside ordinary working hours or on holidays, and are in addition to any penalty fees payable under rule 2 or rule 3:—

9. *Remission of Fees under Rule 3 and Rule 8.*—It shall be within the discretion of the Collector of Customs to remit the fees leviable under rule 3 and rule 8 in the case of passenger steamers landing only passengers and mails when due notice of the correct time and place of discharge has been given by the agents. When a staff is needlessly posted owing to incorrect or incomplete intimation by the agents, the usual fees shall be charged.

10. *Overtime Fees: How to be calculated.*—(a) In calculating overtime fees periods of 15 minutes and less shall be ignored while periods of over 15 minutes shall be reckoned as one hour.

(b) When extra work is attended to partly out of office hours and partly within office hours and fees are payable under the last column against items (4) and (5) in the table in rule 8, two separate fees shall be levied as under :—

(a) *For work done out of office hours.*—At the rate of Rs. 2 per hour subject to a maximum of Rs. 5 for an officer and at the rate of annas four per hour subject to a maximum of annas eight for a peon ;

(b) *For work done during office hours.*—At the rate of Rs. 5 per day or a portion of a day for an officer and at the rate of annas four per hour subject to a maximum of annas eight for a peon. This fee shall be credited to Government.

- (iii) A health certificate in the form prescribed by Article 49 of the Civil Service Regulations signed by a Commissioned Medical Officer or by a Medical Officer in charge of a civil station and testifying to the candidate's sound constitution, good vision and hearing and general physical fitness for a rough outdoor life in the Forest Department, and to the fact that he bears marks of successful vaccination or small-pox. A letter to the Civil Surgeon or the Medical Officer for the certificate should be taken by the candidate from a Divisional Forest Officer or a Conservator.
- (iv) A certificate of respectability and good moral character from two or more persons whose social or official position can be accepted as a guarantee of trustworthiness.
- (v) A certificate that the candidat has passed one or other of the following examinations:—
 - (a) the Matriculation Examination,
 - (b) the School Final or Leaving Examination, or for European candidates a certificate of having passed the High School Examination.

N. B.—The certificates (iii) and (iv) must bear date not further back than July 1st, 1920.

4. Stipends will be paid to the successful candidates whilst at the College.

5. Candidates must be prepared to serve in any Circle.

6. Any further information required may be obtained personally by the candidates at the undersigned's office at Poona or any of the Conservator's or Divisional Forest Offices in the Presidency.

7. Two candidates will be similarly selected for Sind by the Deputy Conservator of Forests in charge Sind Circle at Karáchi on the date mentioned above.
