With reference to rule XIII of the Rules promulgated with the Finance Department Resolution No. 1251-F.E., dated the 30th September 1914, published on pages 1643-1645 of the *Gazette of India*, Part I, dated the 10th October 1914 (a copy of which, as amended by subsequent resolutions, up-to-date, is subjoined below) it is hereby notified for general information that an examination will be held at Allahabad in December 1920, for the selection of probationers to fill six vacancies in the General List of the Indian Finance Department. Only those candidates will be entitled to compete at the examina-

tion who have been nominated by the Government of India in the Finance Department, in accordance with the rules quoted above:—

RESOLUTION.

(CORRECTED UP TO THE 1ST JUNE 1920.)

Simla, the 30th September 1914.

In supersession of the Resolution in this Department, No. 281-F.E., dated the 17th January 1911, the following revised rules are prescribed for the examination of candidates in India for admission to the General List of the Indian Finance Department:—

I.—A register of candidates will be kept from which not less than three candidates for each vacancy will be nominated by the Government of India from time to time as vacancies are expected. Only candidates so nominated will be entitled to compete.

II.—Names will ordinarily be entered in the register only on the recommendation of a Local Government.

III.—On, or before, the 1st of May in each year Local Governments will send to the Government of India the names of any persons whom they desire to recommend for entry in the register. The list should be accompanied by a statement containing, in respect of each such person—

- (1) A duly verified statement of age.
- (2) Copies of certificates of character and education.
- (3) A statement, duly supported, showing the mathematical reading which the candidate has done, and the examinations involving mathematics, which he has passed.
- (4) Information regarding any services that may have been rendered to the State by his parents or family.
- (5) A statement of the two optional subjects, in which he will, if nominated, offer himself for examination.

Before being recommended by a Local Government, each applicant must give satisfactory proof that he is a native of India, within the meaning of the Statute 33 Vict., Cap. 3, Section 6.*

*The words "Native of India" shall include any person born and domiciled within the dominions of His Majesty in India, of parents habitually resident in India and not established there for temporary purposes only.

NOTE.—Subjects of Native States are eligible for registration under rule II.

IV.—The names of persons not possessed of high educational qualifications will not be registered. Clear and distinct handwriting, a business familiarity with the English language, a good knowledge of arithmetic and an elementary knowledge of algebra are indispensable.

V.—The Government of India reserve an absolute discretion, not only in regard to the selection of persons to be entered on the register of candidates, but also as to the nomination of candidates to compete at the examination. It must be clearly understood that registration of a candidate's name does not, in any way, imply that he will be nominated for admission to examination.

VI.—The name of a registered candidate will be struck off the register when he has failed in two examinations. It will also be liable to be struck off if he has been twice nominated and has failed to appear at the examination on one or both occasions.

VII.—A candidate nominated for admission to one examination will not be admitted to a later examination unless again nominated.

VIII.—The age of a candidate, on the first day of August of the year in which the examination is held, must not be less than twenty-two and not more than twenty-five years. A candidate, who has been continuously in Government employ since before the age of 25, may, however, at the discretion of the Government of India, be allowed to compete at the examination up to the age of 30, provided that he is satisfactorily recommended by the Head of his Department.

IX.—A nominated candidate, before appearing at the examination, must produce a certificate in the annexed form by a Commissioned Medical Officer or by a Medical Officer in charge of a Civil Station. A candidate, who obtains a second nomination, must produce a fresh Medical Certificate.

CERTIFICATE.

I do hereby certify that I have examined A. B., a candidate for employment in the Indian Finance Department, and that I cannot discover that he has any disease, constitutional affection or bodily infirmity, unfitting him, or likely to unfit him, for the public service in any part of India.

X.—Such candidate must also, before appearing for examination, produce a certificate of age from the officer in charge of the district in which his family reside, or, if they reside in a Presidency town or a Native State, from the Presidency Magistrate or Political Agent, respectively. To obtain this certificate the date and place of the candidate's birth must be proved before the district officer, Presidency Magistrate or Political Agent, as the case may be, by documentary evidence, supplemented, where this is not conclusive proof, by statements of relatives and others on oath or solemn affirmation.

XI.—Nominated candidates will be examined in the subjects described in the schedule attached to this Resolution. No candidate will be admitted to the Department who fails to show a competent knowledge of the compulsory subjects, and the Government reserve the right of declining to make any appointment when no candidate reaches a high standard of proficiency.

XII.—The examination will be mainly by written questions and answers. The questions will be prepared, and the examination conducted, in such manner as the Governor General in Council from time to time directs.

XIII.—Some months before an examination is to be held, its date and place, and the conditions of examinations, will be notified in the *Gazette of India*, and the number of vacancies which the Government expect to fill on the results of the examination, will, at the same time, be stated.

XIV.—Subject to the above conditions, candidates will be appointed to the posts thrown open to competition according to their order of merit at the examination.

ORDERED that the Resolution be forwarded to the Departments of the Government of India, to the several Local Governments and Administrations with the request that it may be communicated to Directors of Public Instruction and all heads of colleges and schools in their respective provinces; to the Comptroller and Auditor General; to the Controller of Currency; to all Accountants General and Comptrollers; to all Chief Examiners and Government Examiners of Railway Accounts; to the Examiner of Press Accounts; to the Examiner of Accounts, Lower Ganges Bridge Works; to the Audit Officer, Delhi Province; and to the Examiner of Accounts, Military Works Services.

Ordered also that the Resolution be published in the *Gazette of India*.

PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT.

No. Ry.-18426.—The following notification by the Government of India, Railway Department (Railway Board), is republished:—

“ No. 3-T.—18, dated Simla, the 20th October 1920.

In exercise of the powers conferred by the Notification of the Government of India in the Department of Commerce and Industry, No. 801, dated the 24th March 1905, and in pursuance of section 47, sub-section (3), of the Indian Railways Act, 1890 (IX of 1890), as in force in British India or as locally applied, the Railway Board sanction in supersession of the rules published under their Notification No. 213, dated the 30th July 1913, the following rules made by the Great Indian Peninsula Railway Company, Limited, under sub-section (1), clauses (f) and (g) of the said section, for and to be applicable to the Great Indian Peninsula Railway System situate in British India or in Native States, for regulating the terms and conditions on which the Railway Administration will warehouse or retain goods at any station or depot on the said Railway, on behalf of the consignee or owner, and for regulating the use of rolling stock, engines and trains on the said railway by the public.

GREAT INDIAN PENINSULA RAILWAY.

1.—Rules for the Warehousing and Retention of Goods.

Wharfage.

1. Wharfage should be calculated—

- (1) Where freight is levied on weight—upon such weight.
- (2) Where freight is levied on the vehicle in or on which the goods are carried—upon the carrying capacity of such vehicle.
- (3) Goods are considered as available for delivery as soon as they are unloaded.

Partial Delivery of Consignments.

2. A consignee must take delivery of goods forming part of a consignment whenever they are available for delivery notwithstanding that the remaining goods are short or damaged or have not arrived at their destination or are otherwise not available for delivery; and, if the consignee does not take delivery of such goods forming part of a consignment as are available for delivery, they will be subject to wharfage charges if not removed within the time allowed for removal.

On Luggage and Parcels available for delivery.

3. For unclaimed booked luggage and parcels the following warehouse charges will be made if not removed from Railway premises within 48 hours of their receipt counting from midnight of date of arrival:—

Rate per maund or part of a maund.	Minimum charge per package.
2 annas per maund or part of a maund for the first 24 hours or part thereof and one anna per maund or part of a maund for each subsequent 24 hours or part of 24 hours in the case of luggage.	As for one maund.
2 annas per maund or part of a maund for every 24 hours or part of 24 hours in the case of parcels.	As for one maund.

On Carriages, Motor Cars and Palanquins.

4. (a) Two or four-wheeled carriages, motor cars and palanquins left on the Company's premises awaiting removal by consignee will after the expiration of 24 hours from the time they are available for delivery be subject to a wharfage charge of Rs. 2 per carriage or motor car, and Re. 1 per palanquin for each subsequent day or part thereof.

(b) A similar charge will be levied on all two or four-wheeled carriages, motor cars and palanquins left on the Company's premises awaiting despatch order from the consignor after the expiration of 24 hours from the time they are brought to the station. The Railway Company will not acknowledge any responsibility in respect of such carriages, motor cars and palanquins until a railway receipt is granted.

On Birds, Poultry or Animals.

5. For birds, poultry or animals, charges will be made after the expiry of 6 hours from the time they are available for delivery.

Animals.—One anna per animal per hour or part of an hour.

Poultry.—One anna per head per hour or part of an hour.

Birds in baskets or crates, etc.—One anna per cubic foot or part of a cubic foot per hour or part of an hour.

These charges to be in addition to any expenses entailed in feeding the birds, animals, etc.

Under any circumstances live animals should be removed from the railway premises within 24 hours from the time of their arrival at destination, failing which they may be disposed of under section 56, clause 2, Railway Act IX of 1890.

Notice of Arrival.

6. The Railway administration do not undertake to send notice of arrival of goods and parcels to the consignees or their agents and non-receipt of such advice will not entitle the consignee to exemption from wharfage and demurrage charges, if the goods or parcels are not taken delivery of within the free time allowed.

Treatment and Disposal of Unclaimed Goods, Parcels and Luggage.

7. (a) Subject to the exception mentioned in Rule (c) below, unclaimed goods, parcels, and luggage, are kept on hand at the station to which booked for a period of not less than one month during which time the notice prescribed in section 56, sub-section (1) of Indian Railways Act of 1890 will be issued if the owner of the goods or person entitled thereto is known.

(b) If not taken delivery of within a period of not less than one month after receipt at the station to which invoiced or waybilled unclaimed articles will be sent to the unclaimed goods or lost property office and dealt with as laid down in Rule (f) below. The unclaimed goods offices are at Wadi Bunder and Generalgunj and the lost property office at Victoria Terminus, Bombay.

(c) Unclaimed articles will be liable to the wharfage and demurrage charges hereinbefore referred to, as well as to all freight and special expenditure incurred by the Railway on account of their custody and disposal.

(d) Where articles, such as arms, ammunition, explosives, intoxicating liquors, opium and its preparations and hemp drugs, the sale of which by unlicensed persons is prohibited by law, are left unclaimed in the possession of the Railway they will be made over to the Police or Excise Authorities for disposal under the laws affecting the articles. When not of a dangerous, perishable or offensive character, they will, however, be retained in the possession of the Railway for the same period as that prescribed for other unclaimed articles.

This rule in so far as it relates to explosives is supplemental to, and not in modification of the rules made under the Indian Explosives Act.

(e) Perishable articles, unclaimed or not taken delivery of, will be disposed of by auction at owner's risk and expense by the Station Master of the station at which they may be left after the expiry of 24 hours or earlier if they are or are likely to become offensive.

(f) Public sales by auction are held from time to time of all unclaimed or lost property which has remained in the possession of the Railway over six months. At least fifteen days' previous notice of each auction will be given by advertisement in the local newspapers.

(g) Any surplus proceeds arising out of sales of lost property or unclaimed consignments after payment of all charges and expenses due to the Railway will be paid to the person or persons thereto entitled.

Lost Property.

Rule 8. (a) Lost property found in Railway vehicles or on Railway premises will, subject to the exception mentioned in paragraph 7 (c) above, be sent to the Lost Property Office after 48 hours and will be dealt with in the same manner as unclaimed booked goods.

(b) Application for the recovery of lost property should be made to the nearest Station Master and also to the General Traffic Manager, Bombay, marked on the outside cover 'Lost Property.'

(c) The Lost Property Office is situated at Bombay.

(d) A fee of four annas for each article or package will be charged in addition to a storage charge of annas four per month or portion of a month during which it has remained in the possession of the Railway Company as Lost Property.

Left Luggage Offices or Cloak Rooms.

9. (a) Passengers intending to break their journey *en route* may book their luggage direct to the station for which they have taken their tickets, and such luggage will be allowed to remain free of charge at destination up to the day (after allowing for break of journey) the passenger would be due to arrive, after which it is charged at the rate for 'Left Luggage.'

(b) A left luggage receipt will be given to any person depositing luggage or parcels for custody in a cloak-room; and delivery will be made to any person presenting such receipt, after which all responsibility of the Railway administration in respect of such luggage or parcels shall absolutely cease and determine. The person presenting the receipt must sign his name on the receipt and enter the date. An Indemnity Bond should be executed by the owner in all cases of loss of Left Luggage receipts.

(c) Before a Left Luggage receipt is given, the Luggage ticket issued at the forwarding station in the case of luggage received by railway, must be collected.

(d) A charge of two annas per package will be levied, for each 24 hours or part of 24 hours during which the luggage or parcel remains in a cloak-room.

For the purpose of this rule, Sundays, Good Friday and Christmas Day are *not* considered *dies non*. The charge will be calculated from the time the package is deposited in the cloak-room. This time will be marked on the Left Luggage receipt just below the date.

(e) The responsibility of the Railway administration for articles left in a cloak-room shall be that of a bailee under sections 151, 152 and 161 of the Indian Contract Act, 1872 (IX of 1872).

(f) Articles deposited in cloak-rooms, which are unclaimed, will, after a period of one month, be transferred to the Lost Property Office and be dealt with as prescribed in rules for unclaimed packages.

Cloak-Room charges on Tricycles, Motor Bicycles or Motor Tricycles, Perambulators, etc.—The Cloak-Room charges on articles such as tricycles, motor bicycles and motor tricycles, perambulators, jinrickshaws, etc., will be made on the minimum weight chargeable for each of such articles and not for one package per maund only. If the actual weight exceeds the minimum weight, then the charges will be made on the actual weight.

II.—Rules for regulating the use of rolling stock, engines and trains.

10. DEMURRAGE.

NOTE.—Daylight hours are reckoned as from 6 to 18 o'clock. Demurrage will be charged for every hour, day or night, in excess of the free time.

Demurrage charge on Horse Boxes, Carriage Trucks, Motor Trucks, etc.

11. Demurrage at the rate of ten rupees per day or part of a day is charged on horse boxes, carriage trucks, motor trucks, etc., ordered and not loaded or loaded and not made available for despatch after the expiry of 24 hours from the time at which they are placed in position for the purpose.

A similar charge also applies on all loaded vehicles requiring to be discharged by owners but which are not discharged after the expiry of 24 hours from the time of their being placed in position for unloading. The Railway Administration may, of its option, unload the vehicles and charge the consignee for doing so and charge wharfage on contents under clause 4.

Demurrage charges on Reserved Carriages.

12. When special trains are detained by passengers either at the starting or at intermediate stations the following charges will be made:—

On broad gauge.	On metre gauge.
Annas 8 per hour or part of an hour for a four-wheeled carriage.	Annas 6 per hour or part of an hour for a four-wheeled carriage.
Annas 12 per hour or part of an hour for a six-wheeled carriage.	Annas 9 per hour or part of an hour for a six-wheeled carriage.
Re. 1 per hour or part of an hour for a Bogie carriage.	Annas 12 per hour or part of an hour for a Bogie carriage.

The charge applies for detention to carriages ordered by intending passengers and not used from the time the vehicle is available till the time when intimation is received that it is not required.

Detention to Special Trains.

13. When special trains are detained by passengers either at the starting or at intermediate stations, demurrage will be charged at the rate of annas 8 per broad gauge vehicle and annas 6 per metre gauge vehicle per hour, or part of an hour, and for keeping the engine in steam, a charge of Rs. 10 per hour or fraction of an hour on broad gauge and Rs. 8 on metre gauge will be made. In levying demurrage charges, a Bogie carriage will count as two ordinary four-wheeled carriages and a six-wheeled carriage as one and a half carriage.

III.—Calculation of Charges.

14. In calculating wharfage and demurrage charges, a day is reckoned as 24 hours and fractions of an anna less than six pies are dropped and six pies and over are charged as one anna. When the total charge of wharfage or demurrage by actual calculation does not amount to two annas it shall be foregone.

Calculation of time.

15. In calculating demurrage charges, a wagon shall be considered as available for loading or unloading if it is placed in position at any time during day light hours, but if not so placed until after 18 o'clock the 24 hours' free allowance is reckoned from opening time, viz., 6 o'clock the next morning.

IV.—General.

16. (a) In the event of goods requiring to be loaded or unloaded by owners becoming liable to both demurrage and wharfage charges the Railway administration may levy both demurrage and wharfage charges for such periods as the goods would be liable to such charges under these rules.

(b) If and for so long as the state of the traffic or any sudden emergency makes it necessary, and after advertisement in the local newspapers, the rate of demurrage or wharfage may be increased and the free time may be curtailed.

(c) Sunday, Christmas Day and Good Friday will be reckoned in charging demurrage on all wagons made available for unloading on those days and stations will also be opened for unloading of wagons on those days so that merchants receiving wagons to the addresses which they are required to unload may do so.

This does not apply in the case of wharfage in which connection the above days will be treated as 'dies non' as hithertofore.

(d) Explosives or dangerous goods must be removed by the consignee from the receiving stations during the 12 hours of daylight after arrival; if this condition is not strictly complied with, the Railway administration may return the consignment to the consignor at his risk and expense.

(e) Should the wharfage or storage on actual weight exceed the demurrage charges at the wagon rate for the full time, the latter rate will be charged.

(f) The Railway administration have the same lien on goods for demurrage and wharfage, and if incurred, for unloading, as for freight, and these charges must be paid before the goods are removed.

- (a) In section 25, for the words "having engines of one hundred or more nominal horse-power," the following words shall be substituted, namely, "of which the engines had been supplied on a date prior to the 25th August 1920, and are of eighty or more nominal horse power."
- (b) In section 26, for the words "having engines of forty or more nominal horse-power but of less than one hundred nominal horse-power," the following words shall be substituted, namely, "of which the engines had been supplied on a date prior to the 25th August 1920, and are of thirty or more nominal horse-power, but of less than eighty nominal horse-power."
- (c) In section 27, for the words "having engines of less than forty nominal horse-power," the following words shall be substituted, namely, "of which the engines had been supplied on a date prior to the 25th August 1920, and are of less than thirty nominal horse-power."

Notwithstanding anything contained in clauses (a), (b) and (c), the said sections may be applied without the modifications specified in the said clauses to any inland steam-vessel referred to in the preamble to this notification at the option of the owner thereof.

SAMPLES.

An Open General Licence has been issued which permits the free export of all *bona fide* samples of prohibited goods to all destinations with which trade is now permitted. Samples exported under this licence may be used only for genuine sample purposes, *i.e.*, for obtaining orders from foreign buyers, and may not be sold except with the written consent of the Import and Export Licensing Section; but such consent may be dispensed with when it is desired to sell the articles in the country of destination after they have fulfilled their purpose as samples. Exporters will be required to satisfy the Customs Authorities that the goods presented for export under this licence are *bona fide* samples, and to make a declaration to that effect on the relative shipping documents.

This notice only applies to samples of goods which require licences for export to the particular destination concerned.

In addition, the consent of the Import and Export Licensing Section is not required for the sale of samples which, though within this scheme at the actual time they were exported, could be exported outside the scheme at the actual time of the proposed sale.

OPEN GENERAL LICENCE FOR COAL EXPORTS.

An Open General Licence has been issued, with effect from Thursday, 1st January 1920, permitting the export of coal, coke and manufactured fuel to all destinations abroad except Russia, Germany, Hungary, Austria, Turkey and Bulgaria, subject always to the approval, previously obtained, of the Controller of Coal Mines or his duly authorised representative, and subject to shipment being made in a vessel approved by the Commissioners of Customs and Excise or their Officers.

The Customs Authorities will require pre-entry to be made in all cases; and at ports where there is a duly authorised local representative of the Controller of Coal Mines (*see list below*), the approval referred to above will be signified by his endorsement on the pre-entry form, which must be presented to him for the purpose before shipment.

Where shipment is proposed to be made from a port not included in the list given below it will be necessary for application for the Controller's approval to be made to the Export Branch of the Coal Mines Department in London. Shipments from all ports in the United Kingdom to the destinations excluded from the purview of the general licence must still be covered by an export licence from the Coal Mines Department.

OPEN GENERAL LICENCE FOR THE EXPORT OF SMOOTH-BORE GUNS AND MUNITIONS FOR USE THEREWITH.

An Open General Licence has been issued for the export of smooth-bore guns and munitions for use therewith to the destinations given below, to which, therefore, exports may be made subject to the usual Customs formalities without applications for specific licences to the Import and Export Licensing Section :—

British Possessions and Protectorates (*see note below*).

French Possessions and Protectorates (*see note below*).

United States of America.

South America.

Japan and Korea.

France, Belgium, Spain, Portugal, Greece, Italy, Jugo-Slavia, Roumania, Norway, Sweden, Denmark, Holland, Switzerland, Iceland, Czechoslovakia, Panama, Nicaragua, Honduras, Guatemala, Costa Rica, Cuba, San Salvador, San Domingo and Hayti.

In accordance with Article 6, Chapter 2, of the 'Convention for the Control of the Trade in Arms and Ammunition,' all consignments of Arms and Ammunition proceeding into or through any of the Prohibited Areas set out below will require a Specific Export Licence.

The Prohibited Areas are :—

(1) The whole of the Continent of Africa, with the exception of Algeria, Libya, and the Union of South Africa. (Within this area are included all islands situated within a hundred nautical miles of the coast, together with Prince's Island, St. Thomas' Island and the Islands of Annobon and Socotra.)

(2) Transcaucasia, Persia, Gwadar, the Arabian Peninsula and such continental parts of Asia as were included in the Turkish Empire on August 4, 1914.

(3) A maritime zone including the Red Sea, the Gulf of Aden, the Persian Gulf and the Sea of Oman and bounded by a line drawn from Cape Guardafui, following the latitude of that cape to its intersection with longitude 57° east of Greenwich, and proceeding thence direct to the eastern frontier of Persia on the Gulf of Oman.

OPEN GENERAL LICENCE FOR THE EXPORT OF AIRCRAFT, etc.

An Open General Licence has been issued for the export of the undermentioned goods to all destinations except Russia, Germany, Hungary, Austria, Turkey and Bulgaria. Applications are no longer to be made to the Import and Export Licensing Section of the Board of Trade in respect of the export of these goods to countries other than those mentioned :— 'Aeroplane engines and their component parts. Aircraft, other than balloons of all kinds, and their component parts, together with accessories and articles suitable for use in connection with aircraft.'

**OPEN GENERAL LICENCE FOR THE EXPORT OF PARCELS CONTAINING
MISCELLANEOUS FOODSTUFFS.**

An Open General Licence has been issued for the export by parcel post of parcels containing one or more varieties of foodstuffs (for the personal use of the addressee and *not* for trading purposes) to all destinations with which trading is allowed, provided that any such parcel may not contain more than two pounds of sugar or more than one pound of butter. Applications need, therefore, no longer be submitted to the Import and Export Licensing Section in respect of the export of such parcels by parcel post.

NOTES REGARDING EXPORT TO CERTAIN COUNTRIES.

Exporters are warned that there are import prohibitions in some foreign countries, information regarding which can be obtained from the Department of Overseas Trade, 35, Old Queen Street, Westminster, S. W. 1, and 73, Basinghall Street, E. C. 2. The issue of an export licence implies no guarantee that the goods will be admitted into the country of destination.

There is no parcel post to *Esthonia, Jugo-Slavia* (except *Dalmatia*), *Lettland (Latvia)*, *Lithuania*, *Poland*.

Germany.—Gift parcels sent by parcel post may enter Germany without import licence and also free from duty and taxes, provided they do not contain more than 2 kilos (70 ozs.) of tobacco.

Russia (European).—Conditions under which trading with European Russia will be permissible are at present under consideration.

Syria.—A parcel post service is in operation north of Acre to Alexandretta and west of Aleppo, including—

Beirut, Damascus, Hamah, Homs, Latakia, Rayak and Tripoli.

Turkey.—Parcels for civilians in Turkey and Smyrna will only be accepted if they are fully addressed 'c/o Poste Restante, British Army Post Office, Constantinople' (or Smyrna), and parcels must be called for at the British Post Offices.

URGENT ORDERS.

The Import and Export Licensing Section, Board of Trade, announces that firms receiving orders which require immediate acceptance may telegraph details of any such order to ascertain whether a licence will be granted for the export of the goods if the order is accepted.

In the event of an applicant being promised a licence he will be enabled to deal with the order straightaway with the knowledge that upon application being made in the proper form to the Import and Export Licensing Section (Board of Trade) the licence will be granted.

The telegrams should be addressed to 'Derestim, London.' They should give in each case in addition to the name and postal or telegraphic address of the applicant the quantity and description of the goods comprised in the order and the country of destination. A reply of 24 words must be prepaid.

Applicants are requested in their own interest to confine their enquiries to orders needing a very urgent decision, since the fewer the enquiries the more promptly can answers be given.

Any subsequent correspondence that is necessary in connection with the telegraphic enquiries should be addressed to the Director, Import and Export Licensing Section, Board of Trade, Great George Street, S. W. 1.
