**NOTIFICATIONS.**

**FINANCIAL DEPARTMENT.**

“ PENSIONS AND GRATUITIES—(FUNDS, SERVICE AND OTHER).

No. 1749-F.E., dated Simla, the 28th October 1920.

RESOLUTION.

The Government of India have had under consideration the question of the admission of military subordinates in civil employ to the benefits of the General Provident Fund, and, with the approval of the Secretary of State for India, they have now decided to admit certain classes of such officers to the benefits of the Fund. The following new rules, which will form an appendix to the present General Provident Fund Rules, are accordingly promulgated:—

*Appendix to the Rules of the General Provident Fund—Rules applicable to military subordinates in civil employ.*

1. The benefits of the General Provident Fund having been extended to military subordinates in civil employ, subject to the limitations and conditions stated below, the

rules of the General Provident Fund will apply, *mutatis mutandis*, and to the extent applicable in each case, to these officers.

2. The following rules are special to the military subordinates mentioned in Rule 1.

3. Officers with honorary rank and warrant and non-commissioned officers employed permanently in the Public Works Department, the Post and Telegraph Department, the Indo-European Telegraph Department, the Survey of India Department, the office of the Financial Adviser, Military Finance, and Military Assistant Surgeons (but not Military Sub-Assistant Surgeons) of the Indian Medical Department in permanent civil employ are eligible to subscribe to the General Provident Fund.

4. (a) Military subordinates of the eligible classes already serving in one of the departments and offices mentioned in Rule 3 will be permitted to join the fund as optional subscribers.

(b) In the case of military subordinates of the eligible classes who are after the 1st November 1920, permanently appointed to one of the departments or offices mentioned in Rule 3, subscription to the fund will be compulsory, as a condition of their permanent employment, for all Europeans and Eurasians receiving a salary of Rs. 100 a month or more, and will be optional for others.

*Note.*—Subscribers whether under Rule 4 (a) or (b) shall be required to sign a declaration in the following form :—

'I hereby declare that I am willing to become a subscriber to the General Provident Fund with effect from the \_\_\_\_\_ 192 , the date of my permanent appointment in the \_\_\_\_\_ in accordance with the rules framed from time to time by the Government of India in that behalf.'

5. As an exception to Rule 10 and the note to Rule 6 of the General Provident Fund Rules, a military subordinate subscribing to the General Provident Fund who has reverted to military employ, may either withdraw the amount standing at his credit or leave it in the fund. The amount so left in the fund shall bear interest for not more than one year from the date of reversion and may be withdrawn at any time after that date. If the military subordinate subsequently obtains re-employment in one of the departments or offices mentioned in Rule 3, deposits not withdrawn will commence to bear interest from the date on which subscription is renewed.

6. The term 'salary' wherever it occurs either in the General Provident Fund Rules or these special rules includes pay and staff pay and allowances of military rank.

2. The following consequential amendments in the General Provident Fund Rules are also made :—

1. Insert the following after the word 'Civil Service Regulations' in the 4th line of rule 1 'and to certain military subordinates in civil employ (see appendix)';

2. Add the following as note 2 to Rule 3 :—

'Note 2.—As regards military subordinates in civil employ see appendix.'

3. Insert the following after the words 'quitting the service of dies' in the 2nd line of rule 20 :—

'except in the case of military subordinates in civil employ (who may, at their option, withdraw the sums at their credit, in the event of their reverting to their substantive appointment in the military department).'

ORDERED that the foregoing Resolution be published in the *Gazette of India*.

ORDERED also that a copy of the foregoing Resolution be forwarded to the several Departments of the Government of India (including the Board of Industries and Munitions); to all Local Governments and Administrations; to the Financial Adviser, Military Finance; to the Heads of Departments subordinate to the Finance Department; to the Comptroller and Auditor General; to the Controller of Currency; to all Accountants-General and the Comptroller, Assam; to the Controller of War Accounts; to all Chief Auditors of State Railways; to the Examiner of Accounts, Military Works Services; to the Examiner of Press Accounts; to the Examiner of Customs Accounts; to all Government Examiners of Railway Accounts; to the Private and Military Secretaries to His Excellency the Viceroy; and to the Chief Commissioner, and the Audit Officer, Delhi Province.

## EDUCATIONAL DEPARTMENT.

Secretariat, Fort, Bombay, 3rd November 1920.

No. 4690.—His Excellency the Governor in Council is pleased to direct that the following rules should be substituted for rules 15 and 16 of the rules of the Secondary Training College, Bombay, published in Government Notification no. 1648\* dated the 3rd September 1910:—

“(15) At the close of the course of study an examination is held by a Board constituted by the Department in accordance with the following regulations:—

- (i) The examining Board will be appointed by the Director of Public Instruction.
- (ii) The Board will consider in the case of each candidate (a) his performance at a written and practical examination conducted by the Board at the end of the year, (b) the notes kept by him throughout the year, (c) the estimate of his abilities and attainments formed by the Principal and staff of the College on the basis of work done throughout the year.
- (iii) The written part of the examination will consist of six papers and will embrace the following subjects:—
  - (1) School Method and Management (two papers)—
    - (a) General (including the theory of physical education, the organization of games, and the methods of moral instruction, in addition to the theory of general class management);
    - (b) The teaching of the class subjects (including the direct method of teaching languages).
  - (2) Organization.
  - (3) Psychology.
  - (4) School Hygiene.
  - (5) History of education.
- (iv) The practical part of the examination will consist of two lessons of half an hour each given in the presence of the members of the Board. Graduates in Science will give one lesson in Science and the other in Mathematics. For others, one of the two lessons will be in English and the other in any of the three subjects, e.g., History, Geography and Mathematics. The Board will test the general ability of the student to teach and manage a class with particular attention to his enunciation, command of English, his skill in asking questions, his power of exposition, and his use of the blackboard.
- (v) The notes examined will include notes of lessons and those taken during periods of observation and criticism as well as essays written in the course of the year.
- (vi) In all written work good hand-writing will be expected.

(16) On the result of the written and practical examination and the estimate of the Principal and the staff taken together diplomas will be issued to the successful candidates who will be graded in two classes. These diplomas are recognized by Government as specially qualifying the holders for employment as teachers in the Educational Department. The diploma will be in the form appended (Appendix B).”

## HOME DEPARTMENT.

“POLITICAL.

No. 4484, dated Simla, the 6th November 1920.

RESOLUTION.

In view of recent events the Governor General in Council considers that it is necessary to make a further declaration of the attitude and policy of the Government of India towards the non-co-operation movement, not only for the guidance of local Governments and administrations but also for the information of the people of India. At the opening of the Autumn Session of the Imperial Legislative Council His Excellency the Viceroy explained the policy which the Government of India have, up to date, followed in this

matter. Although in their opinion the movement is unconstitutional in that it has as its object the paralysis and subversion of the existing administration of the country, Government have hitherto refrained from instituting criminal proceedings or taking any other action against those of its promoters who have advocated simultaneously with non-co-operation abstention from violence, and they have instructed local Governments to take action against those persons only who in furtherance of the movement have gone beyond the limits originally set by its organisers and have by speech or writing openly incited the public to violence or have attempted to tamper with the loyalty of the army or of the police. In adopting this policy Government have been influenced by several considerations.

In the first place they have been reluctant to interfere with liberty of speech and the freedom of the press at a time when India is on the threshold of a great advance towards the realisation of the principle of self-government within the Empire, when indeed the first elections are already in sight. In recognition of that advance and in pursuance of the spirit of the King Emperor's Proclamation of December last they extended His Majesty's clemency to many hundreds of political offenders who were then in custody and they have since released from the restrictions of the Press Act numerous papers which were formerly held to security. Although these concessions have in many cases failed to evoke any response or recognition, Government are loth to re-impose restrictions which have so lately been relaxed.

In the second place, Government are at all times reluctant to embark on a campaign against individuals some of whom may be actuated by honest, if misguided, motives. This consideration is reinforced by the knowledge that such action, even if it took the form of prosecution under the ordinary criminal law, would be likely to give those against whom it might be directed the opportunity of posing as martyrs and might also by evoking false sympathy swell the number of adherents to a cause which has in itself no intrinsic merit to commend it to public acceptance.

The third and chief consideration, however, which has influenced the Government of India is their trust in the common sense of India, their belief that the sanity of the classes and the masses alike would reject non-co-operation as a visionary and chimerical scheme, which if successful could only result in widespread disorder, political chaos, and the ruin of all those who have any real stake in the country. The appeal of non-co-operation is to prejudice and ignorance, and its creed is devoid of any constructive genius. India has had bitter experience of the fruits of its forerunner, the 'Satyagraha' cult, and the Governor General in Council still hopes that with that lamentable warning before her eyes India will reject the much greater peril of non-co-operation. Its principal exponents have frankly avowed that their object is to destroy the present Government—'to dig up the foundations of the British Government in India' and they have promised their followers that if only their gospel be generally accepted India shall be self-governing and independent within one year. The full consummation of their hopes would leave India defenceless alike against foreign aggression and internal chaos. All the benefits of stable Government and undisturbed peace, the results that have been attained by the orderly progress of India for more than a century, the still greater results which it is hoped, will attend her advance under the Reforms Scheme, her material prosperity and her political progress are all to be sacrificed to the irresponsible caprice of a few misguided men.

The confidence of Government in the good sense of India has already been in great measure justified by the unanimity of her best minds in their condemnation of the folly of non-co-operation. For a most weighty body of educated opinion has rejected this new doctrine as one that is fraught with the most mischievous potentialities for India. But having failed to secure a favourable verdict from educated India, the leaders of the movement have now been driven to increase the violence of their appeal to the masses and to endeavour to enlist under the banner of non-co-operation the sympathy and assistance of immature school boys and college students. Herein lie two great dangers for India, which have compelled Government to place the issues plainly before the country, in the hope that its most enlightened and stable elements may clearly recognise the necessity of vigorous and united action to prevent any further extension of the mischief.

Of these two latest developments, the most immoral is undoubtedly the mischievous attack which has been made on the youth of the country who are to be sacrificed to the exigencies of a political campaign; it matters not to the leaders of the movement if the foundations of home life are sapped and children set against their parents and teachers, provided their own ends are attained and the success of their campaign assured.

The appeal to the illiterate and the ignorant is also fraught with very grave danger—it has already resulted in at least one deplorable crime—and it is certain that the restless activity of the leaders who wander from one city to another stirring up excitement amongst the masses by inflammatory speeches and by the reiteration of false statements despite constant contradiction may at any moment result in serious outbreaks of disorder.

The best weapon to combat both dangers lies in the practical help and sympathy of sober-minded and moderate men and Government therefore call on all who have the good of India at heart to organise themselves and take concerted measures to assist the cause of law and order by active opposition to the movement, by the exercise of their influence over the minds of the ignorant and the immature, and by public exposure and denunciation of the evils of non-co-operation and of the anarchy to which it must inevitably lead. Government appreciate the action which has already been taken in this direction by men of liberal opinion and moderate mind throughout India and they congratulate the country more particularly on the manifestations of public displeasure which have occurred in regard to the mischievous attack on education. The opposition which has been offered to this phase of the movement by the Trustees of the M. A. O. College at Aligarh, by the authorities of the Khalsa College at Amritsar, by many other school authorities, by the great majority of teachers and parents and also by large sections of the student community itself is indeed a most hopeful feature in the situation.

Government realise that it is to enlightened public opinion they must chiefly trust for a dissipation of the danger that now envelopes India, as it is on that same public opinion that India's political future must depend. It is in this trust that they have refrained in the past, so far as is consistent with the public safety, from repressive action, for they consider that such action should only be employed in the last resort, when indeed failure to adopt it would be a criminal betrayal of the people. How long, with due regard to their ultimate responsibility for the public safety, Government will be able to maintain that policy, will depend largely on the success which attends the efforts of sane and moderate citizens to check the extension of the movement and keep its dangers within bounds.

ORDERED that the Resolution be published in the *Gazette of India*; and that a copy be forwarded to all local Governments and Administrations and to the several Departments of the Government of India.

- (1) In Regulation 1 (a), Part I, after the words "the said table" insert the words "or any person whom the local Government may, by notification in this behalf, appoint as Returning Officer in respect of any election or part of an election in any constituency in lieu of the person stated in the said table."
- (2) To Regulations 1 (c), (k), (l) and (o) of Part VIII add the words "or such other place in lieu thereof as the local Government may, by notification in this behalf, appoint", and omit the final word "only" in clause 1 (c).

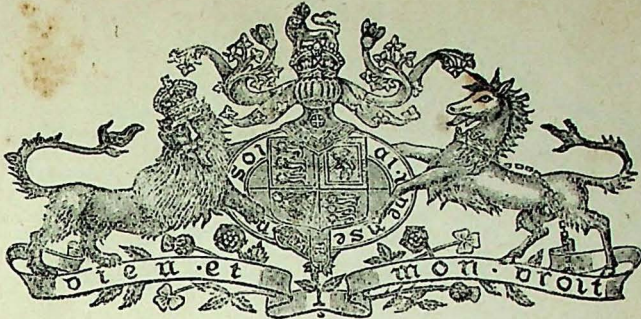
