No. 19123-Ry.—The following Resolution by the Government of India, Railway Department (Railway Board), is republished :—

“ No. 405-F.-19, dated the 9th October 1920.

RESOLUTION.

In conformity with the announcements made in the Indian Legislative Council on the 25th February and 2nd September 1920, a Committee will shortly be appointed to consider, and advise Government on, certain matters connected with the administration of railways in India.

2. An announcement will be made in due course of the constitution and place of assembly of the Committee. In the meantime, to enable interested parties to formulate their views, it is considered desirable to publish for general information the Terms of Reference which have been framed in consultation with the Secretary of State for India: they are as follows:—

Terms of Reference.

- (1) To consider, as regards railways owned by the State, the relative advantages, financial and administrative, in the special circumstances of India, of the following methods of management:—
 - (a) direct State management;
 - (b) management through Company domiciled in England and with a Board sitting in London;
 - (c) management through Company domiciled in India and with a Board sitting in India;
 - (d) management through a combination of (b) and (c);

and advise as to the policy to be adopted as and when the existing contracts with the several Railway Companies can be determined. (In considering the question of the East Indian Railway, the Committee will take note of the decision to remove the management of that railway to India, which was arrived at when the contract with the present Company was extended on the amended terms in 1919.)

- (2) To examine the functions, status and constitution of the Railway Board, and the system of control exercised by the Government of India over the Railway Administration, and to recommend such modifications, if any, as are necessary for the adequate disposal of the Railway business of the Government.
 - (3) To consider arrangements for the financing of railways in India and in particular the feasibility of the greater utilization of private enterprise and capital in the construction of new lines.
 - (4) To report whether the present system of control by Government of rates and fares and the machinery for deciding disputes between railways and traders are satisfactory, and, if not, to advise what modifications are desirable.
 - (5) To make recommendations that may seem germane to the enquiry.
3. Pending the further announcement referred to in paragraph 2 of this Resolution, and the institution of enquiries by the Committee itself, any expression of opinion which it may be desired to offer upon the subject-matter of the Committee's investigation may be addressed to the Secretary, Railway Committee, care of the Railway Board, Simla, for communication in due course to the Committee.

ORDER.—That a copy of this Resolution be forwarded to each Local Government and Administration, to Railway Administrations and to Chambers of Commerce and similar bodies, and that the Resolution be also published in the *Gazette of India*.

BY THE COMMISSIONER OF CUSTOMS, SALT AND EXCISE.

No. 97-22.—Mr. H. R. Kolhapurwalla, Excise Inspector, Bonded Liquor Warehouse, Sewri, was permitted to return to duty on the 11th October 1920, from leave on medical certificate granted to him, vide Commissioner's Notification No. 97-22, dated the 6th October 1920, the unexpired portion of his leave being cancelled.

No. 171-2.—In exercise of the powers conferred by section 35-A (a) (iii) of the Bombay Abkari Act, 1878, and in supersession of his Notification T. No. 1/13, dated 7th April 1916, the Commissioner of Customs, Salt and Excise has framed the following rules for regulating the tapping of toddy-yielding trees and the drawing of sweet toddy therefrom in pots or other receptacles freshly coated internally with lime, for the manufacture of gul :—

- (1) Before any tree is tapped for sweet toddy, the owner of the tree must give a notice in the appended form A to the Excise Inspector or Sub-Inspector within whose jurisdiction the tree is situated.

- (2) Such notice shall contain full and accurate particulars of the location of every tree proposed to be tapped, and shall bind the owner to observe all the conditions laid down in these rules.
- (3) Every tree specified in the notice must be marked with a complete ring of not less than a hand's breadth round the trunk, so as to be visible from all sides, in the colour and with the material prescribed for the year and district.
- (4) Tapping for sweet toddy will be permitted without a license at any time after the trees have been marked and the notice has been presented personally or sent by registered post, until the end of the toddy year in which the notice was given, provided that the ownership of any of the trees is not changed.
- (5) Upon a change of ownership of any tree tapped for sweet toddy, all such tapping must cease until a fresh notice has been given by the new owner.
- (6) No tree may be tapped for sweet toddy in the same survey number in which any tree is licensed to be tapped for fermented toddy.

(Note:—For the purpose of this rule survey no. means any unit of occupancy separately recorded in the village registers.)

- (7) Sweet toddy may be drawn only in pots freshly coated internally with lime, or in which sufficient lime has been freshly placed before they are attached to the trees. In either case the lime must be renewed whenever the pot is emptied before using it again for drawing sweet toddy.
- (8) In case of any breach of the above rules, the owner, unless he himself first informed an Excise Officer of the offence, shall be liable to pay the full tree tax on every tree in respect of which the offence was committed, and all permission to tap any of his trees for sweet toddy shall be withheld for such period as the Superintendent of Salt and Excise may direct, in addition to any penalties to which he may be liable under section 43 (1) (d) and (e) of the Abkari Act if the offence was committed by him.
- (9) Sweet toddy shall not be drawn except between the hours of sunrise and sunset.
- (10) Sweet toddy must be manufactured into jagri and no such toddy shall be kept until the day following.
- (11) Sweet toddy shall not be mixed with fermented toddy or delivered to any person licensed to tap or sell fermented toddy, or to any person on behalf of such licensee.
- (12) Any person tapping for sweet toddy shall be bound to bring down the pots attached to any of the trees so tapped for inspection on the demand of any Excise Officer above the rank of a peon.

No. 9629.—The following draft of a notification which it is proposed to issue under the Indian Motor Vehicles Act, 1914 (VIII of 1914), is published, as required by section 11 of the said Act, for the information of persons likely to be affected thereby, and notice is hereby given that the draft will be taken into consideration by the Governor in Council on the expiry of two months from the date of its publication in the *Bombay Government Gazette*.

2. Any objection or suggestion which may be sent to the Secretary to the Government of Bombay in the Judicial Department by any person with respect to the draft before the expiry of that period will be considered by the Governor in Council.

Draft Notification.

In exercise of the powers conferred by section 11 of the Indian Motor Vehicles Act, 1914 (VIII of 1914), the Governor in Council is pleased to make the following rules to regulate the use of motor vehicles let or plying for hire in public places within the limits of the district of Panch Mahals hereinafter referred to as the said limits. The rules shall come into force on the

Rules.

1. In these rules "motor vehicle" shall mean a motor vehicle let or plying for hire.
2. Such of the Bombay Motor Vehicles Rules, 1915, as are not inconsistent with the provisions of these rules shall apply to motor vehicles let or plying for hire.
3. No motor vehicle shall be let or plied for hire in public places within the said limits without an owner's permit granted by the District Superintendent of Police, Panch Mahals. A fee of Rs. 5 shall be charged for such permit, and a fee of Rs. 2-8-0 for every duplicate thereof. Such permit shall be in Form A set forth in the schedule appended to this notification, with such variations as the circumstances require. The District Superintendent of Police shall enter on such permit the maximum number of passengers and quantity of luggage which may be carried at any one time in such vehicle.

4. Subject to rule 5, such permit shall remain in force from the date on which it is granted until the 31st March following, and shall not be transferred to any person without sanction duly endorsed thereon by the District Superintendent of Police.

5. A motor vehicle shall be liable to examination at such times as the District Superintendent of Police may prescribe, and the owner's permit may be suspended or cancelled by him if the vehicle does not comply with the requirements of these rules or with those of the Bombay Motor Vehicles Rules, 1915, or is not passed by the District Superintendent of Police as fit to ply for hire, or is not produced for examination at such time and place as the District Superintendent of Police may require.

6. The owner of a motor vehicle shall maintain regularly a register in such form as the District Superintendent of Police may direct, showing the name of the driver and the hours and dates on which the driver was in charge of the motor vehicle.

7. (1) A motor vehicle let or plying for hire shall not, under any circumstances, be driven by any person other than a driver, who shall hold and produce, whenever required by a police officer, a public driver's permit signed by the District Superintendent of Police. Such permit shall not be granted unless the driver satisfies the District Superintendent of Police that he is a competent and careful driver, that he has a thorough knowledge of the rates for hire sanctioned, and that he is in all respects a fit person to be the driver of a motor vehicle to be let or plied for hire.

(2) A public driver's permit will be granted only to a person who already holds an ordinary license to drive which is for the time being in force.

(3) A public driver's permit shall remain in force from the date on which it is granted until the 31st March following, but shall cease to be in force if the holder's license to drive is suspended or cancelled, or expires and is not renewed.

(4) A fee of Rs. 4 shall be charged for the permit, and a fee of Rs. 2 for every renewal or duplicate thereof. Such permit shall be in Form B set forth in the schedule appended to this notification, with such variations as the circumstances require.

8. The rates for the fare or hire of a motor vehicle let or plied for hire shall be in accordance with a schedule to be approved by the District Magistrate of Panch Mahals.

9. The driver of a motor vehicle let or plied for hire shall be entitled to charge for detention after having been hired, and for any package carried in such vehicle, in accordance with the said rates.

10. Every motor vehicle intended to be let or plied for hire within the said limits must be taken to the office of the District Superintendent of Police for inspection. The owner or person in charge of such motor vehicle shall at the same time produce the certificate of registration of the motor vehicle under the Bombay Motor Vehicles Rules, 1915.

11. The brakes shall, as far as possible, be so affixed as to be capable of easy adjustment, and at least one brake must be so made as to be applied by the foot of the driver. The brakes will at any time be subject to inspection.

12. All brake and steering connections secured with bolts must have such bolts secured with nuts and locked or pinned. These parts will at any time be subject to inspection.

13. The machinery should be so constructed that no undue noise or vibration is caused.

14. All parts connected by bolts or studs and nuts subject to severe vibration must be fastened by lock nuts or by nuts and approved spring or lock nut washers to prevent their working loose and making a rattling noise, and any motor vehicle with lamp brackets, mudguard brackets and other carriage fittings so loose as likely to cause unnecessary noise will be regarded as unfit for use as a public conveyance.

15. Carburettors must not be placed in close proximity to magnetos or to connections of wires carrying electric current, unless they are suitably encased or screened.

16. Effective means must be adopted for preventing the heat of the motor or of the exhaust pipe connections from injuriously affecting other parts of the motor vehicle or the comfort of the passengers. All wires carrying electric current must be properly insulated and protected from injury, and so placed that they cannot be the cause of danger.

17. Tanks for petrol or other liquid fuel must be made of suitable material properly constructed and of sufficient strength. They should be so placed that any overflow shall not accumulate on wood work, or where it can be readily ignited. The filling nozzle or inlet for the petrol or other liquid fuel should, where possible, be brought to the outside of the body.

18. When a guard or tray is fixed underneath, it must be so constructed that any overflow of petrol from the carburettor shall not be retained in the tray.

19. The machinery must be so constructed or placed that oil from the bearings shall not be allowed to drop on to the roadway. When trays are fixed to prevent this, they must

have suitable webs for retaining the oil when ascending or descending hills or be otherwise suitably constructed with that object; the oil must be cleaned out frequently and not allowed to accumulate from day to day.

20. The lubrication of the engine and the carburation of the working mixture must be so controlled that smoke is not ejected with the exhaust, or from any other part.

21. The outlet from the silencer should not be so placed as to eject the exhaust directly on to the roadway, or so placed, or so directed, as to alarm horses immediately behind the motor vehicle.

22. Each car must be capable of being readily steered and able to turn on each lock and proceed in a contrary direction within a reasonable space.

23. Provision must be made for the conveyance of a reasonable quantity of luggage and efficient means provided by chains, straps or other means of securing it. When it is intended to carry luggage on the roof there must also be an approved fixed roof guard rail.

Provided that the District Superintendent of Police may grant exemptions from this rule either generally or in particular cases.

24. Where acetylene or other gas is used to light the carriage, the cylinders or vessels which contain the gas, or in which it is generated, must be fixed outside in such a position as to be removed as far as possible from the danger of accidental ignition.

25. The floor must be covered with mats of rubber, coir, or of some other suitable material.

26. No printed, written or other matter shall appear on the inside or outside of the motor vehicle or be carried by way of advertisement.

27. No celluloid or xylonite fittings shall be placed inside or outside the motor vehicle; but this rule does not apply to the inside of the accumulators.

28. The cushions of seats where such are provided, must be covered with suitable material, and must be stuffed with suitable material.

29. The doors, windows, seats, roof, springs, cushions, wheels, linings, panels, and all furniture and appointments of the motor vehicle must be in proper order and repair, the paint and varnish in good condition, and the inside perfectly clean.

30. The driver when on duty with his motor vehicle shall wear in a conspicuous place on his left breast a metal badge which shall be numbered and supplied to him by the District Superintendent of Police.

31. The driver shall not transfer or lend his permit or badge to any person, and on his permit being suspended or cancelled or ceasing to be in force, the permit and badge shall be surrendered to the District Superintendent of Police.

32. As often as the driver changes his residence he shall give notice thereof at the office of the District Superintendent of Police in writing, within one week after such change.

33. No vehicle shall be suffered to stand across any street or thoroughfare, or opposite the entrance of any street or carriage way.

34. No driver shall, without reasonable excuse, refuse to accept a fare.

35. The driver shall, in the absence of reasonable cause to the contrary, proceed to the destination named by the hirer by the shortest and quickest route.

36. No driver of a motor vehicle shall—

- (a) be drunk during his employment;
- (b) make use of insulting or abusive language or gesture;
- (c) stand (elsewhere than at some stand or other place appointed for the purpose) or loiter for the purpose of being hired, in or upon any public street or road or place;
- (d) refuse to give way (when he reasonably and conveniently may and should do so) to any other vehicle;
- (e) wilfully obstruct or hinder the driver of any other motor vehicle in taking up or setting down any person into or from such other vehicle;
- (f) wrongfully prevent, or attempt to prevent, the driver of any other motor vehicle from being hired;
- (g) terminate the hiring before he has been discharged by the hirer;
- (h) ply for hire any motor vehicle which is at the time unfit for public use;
- (i) shout in order to attract the attention of the public or of a possible hirer or, for any other reason, act in such a way as to cause inconvenience or annoyance to the public;

- (g) make use of the motor vehicle in connection with or for the furtherance of prostitution, or act as a habitual procurer for prostitutes or live on the earnings of prostitutes; or
- (h) allow a cleaner or any other attendant to sit in the motor vehicle when hired by a passenger.
- (i) carry any passenger or luggage in excess of the number of passengers or the quantity of luggage entered on the owner's permit under the provisions of rule 3.

37. No driver or owner of a motor vehicle or agent employed on behalf of such driver or owner shall exact or demand more than the proper fare to which he is legally entitled.

38. The holder of an owner's permit granted for a motor vehicle to be let or plied for hire shall not knowingly make use of the motor vehicle, or cause it to be used, in connection with or for the furtherance of prostitution, or act as a habitual procurer for prostitutes, or live on the earnings of prostitutes.

39. The driver shall be properly dressed in clean uniform of the description prescribed by the District Superintendent of Police.

40. The District Superintendent of Police may in his discretion suspend or cancel any public driver's permit or owner's permit where the holder thereof has committed any breach of these rules.
