### EDUCATIONAL DEPARTMENT.

Secretariat, Fort, Bombay, 8th December 1920.

No. 5329A.—In exercise of the powers conferred by sub-section (2) of section 26 of the Reformatory Schools Act, 1897 (VIII of 1897), and in supersession of the rules published in Government Notification in the Educational Department, No. 1954,\* dated the 6th October 1903, as subsequently amended, the Governor in Council is pleased to make the following rules for the management of the Yeravda Reformatory School.

#### *Control and Management.*

1. For the control and management of the school, Government shall appoint a Superintendent and a Committee of Visitors. A Deputy Superintendent and a Sub-Assistant Surgeon shall also be attached to the school.

#### *The Superintendent and the School-Staff.*

2. In all matters in respect of which the Superintendent is not invested with sole authority, he shall, subject to the control of the Director of Public Instruction (hereinafter referred to as "the Director") be subordinate to the Educational Inspector, Central Division (hereinafter referred to as "the Inspector") and shall obey the orders of that officer.

3. He shall live in quarters provided for him, and shall devote himself solely to the management of the school, and shall not engage in any other business or pursuit.

4. He shall furnish such security as the Director shall from time to time consider necessary.

5. The Deputy Superintendent and the clerk shall be appointed by the Director and the teachers and the jamadar of the school shall be appointed by the Inspector. Every other subordinate officer in the school shall be appointed by the Superintendent.

6. Each trade-instructor of the school shall be required to give at least thirty days' notice of his intention to resign his situation; and, as security for his doing so, shall be required to deposit with the Superintendent either the amount of one month's pay or a bond for the amount of one month's pay, signed by a surety as well as by the trade-instructor. In the event of any trade-instructor throwing up his employment without having given notice as above, the amount of the bond in the one case or the cash deposit in the hands of the Superintendent in the other shall be forfeited to Government.

7. It shall be the duty of the Superintendent to see that every member of the staff behaves with tact, patience, and good temper. Officers of any rank, including also trade-instructors and school-masters, found wanting in these qualities shall have their services at once dispensed with, for, in dealing with boys, more specially with lads of the class detained in a reformatory school, such qualifications are absolutely indispensable. Every case, therefore, of violence by a member of the staff towards a scholar shall be immediately reported to the Superintendent, who shall take such action thereupon as he shall be authorized to take under these rules and as he shall think expedient.

8. The Inspector may suspend and the Director may suspend or dismiss any subordinate officer of the school for dishonesty, inefficiency, or misconduct disqualifying him for office.

9. The Inspector may dismiss, and the Superintendent may suspend, any subordinate officer except the Deputy Superintendent, the clerk, the teachers, and the jamadar. The Super-

intendent may, in the case of serious misconduct on the part of any one of the officers above named, suspend him and in such case, or whenever necessary, appoint any person to perform temporarily the duties of the officer, reporting his proceedings to the Inspector. The Director or the Inspector, before dismissing any officer, shall record the charges against him, the answers made by him (which, if possible, shall be in writing) to each charge, and the reasons for dismissal.

10. All the proceedings of the Inspector and the Superintendent under the two preceding rules shall be subject to the control of the Director who may act either on his own motion or on the receipt of an appeal from any person who considers himself aggrieved.

11. The Superintendent shall keep a report book, in which he shall make a note of all occurrences of importance and of any matters which he may think proper to bring to the notice of the Committee of Visitors or of the Inspector. He shall also keep such registers of admissions, licenses, releases, and such accounts as may be prescribed by the Inspector.

12. He shall submit such returns as may be required by the Director and the Inspector.

13. He shall draw up and submit to the Inspector as soon as possible after the close of each year a report referring to all subjects of interest and giving a brief account of the working of the school during the year. The Inspector shall forward the report to the Director, who shall circulate copies to the members of the Committee of Visitors, and as soon as possible after such circulation arrange for a meeting of the Committee to discuss and adopt the report.

14. Subject to the authority of the Inspector the Superintendent shall have the executive management of the school in all matters relating to internal economy, discipline, industrial training, work, teaching, punishments, rewards, expenditure, and general control.

15. It shall be his duty to be constantly present with the boys during work-hours, and to acquaint himself with the conduct and character of each boy and his progress in industrial training. He shall also pass a certain amount of time in the school-room.

16. It shall be the Superintendent's duty to be present both when the dormitories are locked up for the night and when they are unlocked in the morning. If, owing to illness or other cause, he is unable to perform this duty, he shall delegate it to the Deputy Superintendent.

17. During the night the keys of the dormitories and cells shall be kept in the Superintendent's quarter, and on no account shall they be removed without his permission.

18. The Superintendent shall see that a peon is always on duty by day and by night at the entrance gate. In the day time a peon shall patrol within the enclosure, and at night a peon shall be on duty in the verandahs of the dormitories.

19. The Superintendent shall report to the Inspector, as they occur, all escapes and recaptures, all serious breaches of the rules of the school, all suicides and accidental deaths, all outbreaks of epidemic diseases, and the measures taken to prevent their spread.

20. All cases of death shall at once be reported by the Superintendent to the nearest Magistrate for judicial inquiry, who shall thereupon enquire into the cause of such death and make a written report thereon to the Inspector.

21. The Superintendent shall satisfy himself by frequent inspections of the books and of the boys' food, and by enquiry into the bazaar rates, that the full amount of food is purchased, that the rates are reasonable, and that the boys obtain their full rations.

22. The monthly bills for expenses of every description in connection with the school shall be submitted by the Superintendent to the Inspector, by whom they shall be audited.

23. The Director is authorised to sanction any item of expenditure in connection with the school, not exceeding Rs. 500, for which provision has been made in the budget.

24. All expenditure in connection with the school shall be incurred by the Superintendent, subject to the full control of the Director, who shall submit annually to Government, through the Accountant General, at the time and in the form prescribed from time to time by Government, a budget estimate of the charges of the maintenance of the school.

25. The Superintendent shall keep a constant watch over the receipts and expenditure of the school, shall satisfy himself by frequent inspections that the registers and books are written up, that the cash balances correspond with those entered in the books, that the daily entries are made in the day-books, and that outstandings are not allowed to accumulate. He will be held responsible for any defalcation on the part of the school-staff, if it be shown that such defalcation was rendered possible by negligence on his part.

26. The Superintendent shall hold a muster of all the boys every Sunday or at other convenient time during each week, hear complaints and attend to them, and see that every boy is provided with proper clothing and bedding.

27. All youthful offenders confined in the school shall be numbered in a consecutive series from one upwards and shall be provided with a uniform and distinctive dress of khaki.

28. On the admission of a youthful offender to the school, his clothing and other perishable articles received with him may, at the discretion of the Superintendent, be sold by auction, the



money thus realised being carried to the youthful offender's credit, by a red ink entry initialled by the Superintendent, in the cash column of such register of the private effects of the inmates of the school as may be prescribed from time to time by the Inspector. All moneys realised under this rule shall be deposited in the local savings bank in the manner provided in rule 53.

29. Whenever it appears to the Superintendent that a youthful offender will attain the age of eighteen years before the expiry of his period of detention, he shall, six months previously to the attaining by the youthful offender of the age of eighteen years, intimate the fact to the Inspector with a view to the making of the necessary report to Government under section 13 (1) of the Act.

30. One month before the date of release of any youthful offender the Superintendent shall communicate the date of his release to the Deputy Educational Inspector of the district to which he belongs with a view to the boy's mode of life in the future being, as far as possible, watched and influenced. Six months after the date of release, and after every succeeding six months, for a period of three years, a reference shall be made to the Deputy Educational Inspector of the district with a view to ascertain the boy's mode of life. The replies received shall be laid before the Committee of Visitors, and a summary of the information received shall be attached to the Superintendent's annual report to the Inspector.

If the boy so discharged is a native of a state under the Bombay Government, the Superintendent shall communicate with the Political Agent concerned.

If the boy so discharged belongs to British territory or to a native state outside the limits of the Bombay Presidency, the Superintendent shall forward the necessary references to the Director who shall communicate with the highest educational authority of the province or the highest Political Officer of the Agency to which the boy belongs.

31. The Superintendent shall order the discharge of any youthful offender whose sentence has expired. He shall also order the payment of subsistence allowance to the boy for the journey to his home.

32. No stranger shall be admitted within the school-premises unless accompanied by a member of the Committee of Visitors, or furnished with a written permission signed by the Superintendent.

33. The Superintendent shall accompany the Director and all official visitors during their inspection of the school.

#### *Committee of Visitors.*

34. The Committee of Visitors shall consist of nine persons, of whom five shall be *ex-officio* members. The four non-official visitors shall be appointed by Government on the recommendation of the Director.

35. The following shall be *ex-officio* members of the Committee :—

The Collector of Poona,

The Judge of Poona,

The Educational Inspector, C. D.,

The Professor of Mechanical Engineering in the Poona College of Engineering,

The Superintendent of the Yeravda Central Jail.

Each of the remaining four members of the Committee shall hold office for a period of two years from the date of appointment, but shall be eligible for re-appointment.

36. The Inspector-General of Prisons shall be a Visitor of the Yeravda Reformatory.

37. At any meeting of the Committee of Visitors held for the purpose of the monthly visit to the school prescribed by section 23 (1) of the Act or of transacting any other business two members shall form a quorum.

38. A visitors' book shall be kept, in which official visitors shall record the dates of their visits, with any remarks or suggestions they may have to make. The Superintendent shall forward a copy of every such entry to the Inspector for the issue of suitable orders. When any remark of an official visitor requires explanation, such explanation shall invariably accompany the copy.

#### *Medical Officer.*

39. The Sub-Assistant Surgeon attached to the school shall be under the supervision of the Medical Officer of the Yeravda Jail. The Sub-Assistant Surgeon shall keep such registers and returns as shall be prescribed by the Director and Inspector. All medicines required for the school shall be indented for from the Medical Store, Bombay.



*Director and Inspector.*

40. The Director and also the Inspector, shall, at least once a year, inspect all parts of the school and see every youthful offender confined in it. They shall during their inspections give every boy the opportunity of making any application or complaint to them which he may wish to make. The Inspector shall satisfy himself that all accounts and registers are maintained according to the rules at the time in force, and that proper arrangements are made for the safe custody of all records.

A brief memorandum of the state in which they find the school and of the manner in which it is administered, etc., together with any suggestions they may wish to make and any orders they may have issued to the Superintendent, shall, on the occasion of each inspection, be recorded by them in the visitors' book.

41. After any such visit of inspection, the Director may, if he thinks fit, make a special report to Government, in the usual official form, on the condition of the school. He shall deal with the subject of the school in his annual report.

*Diet.*

42. The diet issued to all youthful offenders in the school shall be on the following scale:—

43. The following shall be deemed prohibited articles, and their possession by a youthful offender shall be punished by the Superintendent:—(a) liquor, (b) intoxicating drugs, including opium, ganja and tobacco. The introduction of any of these articles by any of the school-staff shall render the offender liable to fine or dismissal.

*Daily Routine.*

44. The dormitories shall be unlocked at day-light, and the boys shall be at once marched off to perform their ablutions and to visit the latrine. A slight meal, consisting of a small baked cake of wheat flour or a porridge ration, shall then be given them to support them until breakfast.



45. Up to 7 a.m. (7-30 in winter) the boys shall be employed in cleaning up the dormitories, when all will be in readiness to commence work.

46. The employment of the boys during the various hours of the day shall be as follows :—

Summer.	Winter.
7—9, Manual Training or Drawing.	7½—9, Manual Training and Drawing.
9—11, School.	9—11, School.
11—12, Bath and breakfast.	11—12, Bath and breakfast.
12—4½, Work.	12—4, Work.

*Education and Industrial Training.*

47. The boys should be made as happy as possible in the school which should be viewed by them as a place of education, not one of punishment. So long as their games are of a harmless nature, their movements should, during play hours, be as unrestricted as possible; during work and school hours play should be strictly interdicted.

48. In the school, reading, writing and arithmetic shall be taught in the vernaculars.

49. The industries taught at the school shall at first be (1) carpentry, (2) blacksmith's work, (3) painting and varnishing, (4) market-gardening and flower-gardening and (5) book-binding. Others may be introduced, but in each case special sanction shall be previously obtained from the Director. A competent instructor shall be entertained for each trade taught in the school.

50. On a boy's first entering the school he shall not be put permanently to any particular industry. He shall rather be given the choice of all the trades in which the school affords instruction, and by employing him as a help at each in turn, his tastes will be ascertained and his fitness for a particular trade decided upon.

*Rewards.*

51. With a view to encourage good conduct and industry a mark system shall be employed under which small gratuities, not exceeding one anna per week, may be earned by the boys.

52. To enable the jamadar, school teachers, and trade instructors to keep a daily record of each boy's conduct and industry, they shall be furnished with registers in which shall be recorded daily the initial letter of the words "Good," "Indifferent," and "Bad" opposite each boy's name.

The Superintendent shall, at the end of the week, allot marks on an inspection of these registers. For every "G" he shall give two marks and for every "I" one mark; for "B" he shall allow no marks. A minimum of 34 marks shall entitle a boy to the maximum pecuniary reward of one anna. A minimum of 28 marks shall entitle a boy to the pecuniary reward of half an anna.

53. One-half of the money so earned may be spent by the boy who earns it on sweet-meats, fruits, toys, and other articles which are not forbidden admission to the school. The purchases shall only be permitted on fixed days of the week. The other half of the amount earned shall be deposited by the boy in the local Savings Bank. All Savings Bank books shall be kept in the custody of the Superintendent. At the time of the release of a boy from the school, his Savings Bank book shall be handed over to him by the Superintendent through the Deputy Educational Inspector of the district the boy goes to.

54. The Superintendent is authorized to select from amongst the best behaved boys not more than 14 per cent. of the entire number of boys in the school for promotion to the grade of monitor. Boys promoted to this grade shall be enabled to earn double the number of marks, and consequently double the amount of gratuity which they could otherwise earn.

*Punishment.*

55. The Superintendent is authorized to punish any boy for misconduct, and shall record all such punishments in a book provided for the purpose. Punishments shall consist of :—

- (a) loss of marks;
- (b) degradation from monitorship;
- (c) loss of privilege of communication with parents and relatives;
- (d) solitary confinement;
- (e) corporal punishment;
- (f) penal diet;
- (g) grinding.



No boy shall be kept in solitary confinement for a period exceeding three days. Corporal punishment shall be administered after the manner of school discipline with a light cane, the number of stripes in no case exceeding twelve. Penal diet shall consist of 1 lb. of flour or rice per diem, cooked with salt in the form of porridge, and may be given for a period not exceeding two days at a time, with intervals of 14 days between such periods.

*Visits to, and communication with, youthful offenders.*

56. The parents and near relations of the boys shall be allowed to visit them once a month, and to correspond with them in writing at reasonable periods. Parents or near relations shall in every case receive notice of serious illness, and intimation shall be sent them a reasonable time before a boy is released from the school of the date on which he will be released.

*Licenses for employment of youthful offenders.*

57. Before issuing any license under section 18 the Superintendent shall obtain the views of the Committee of Visitors and forward them, with his own opinion and full particulars, to the Inspector, whose instructions for granting or withholding a license or for apprenticing or not apprenticing a youthful offender, he shall follow.

58. Every license under section 18 shall be in the following form, namely :—

*License.*

Whereas A.B. is a youthful offender, at present detained in the Yeravda Reformatory School under a warrant signed by \_\_\_\_\_ and dated \_\_\_\_\_

And Whereas the said A.B. has attained the age of fourteen years, has been an inmate of the school for two years, and has conducted himself to the satisfaction of the Committee of Visitors; And Whereas C.D. being a trustworthy and respectable person\* and an employer of labour, is willing to receive and take charge of the said A.B. on the condition that he shall keep the said A.B. employed in the occupation of a† \_\_\_\_\_ and while in his charge shall clothe and feed him; And Whereas, furthermore, the said C.D. has undertaken to maintain every reasonable precaution to ensure the welfare and safe custody of the said A.B. while under his charge; Now These Presents Witness that the said A.B. is hereby licensed to live under the charge of the said C.D. for a term of three months from this date, subject to the provisions of sections 18 to 21 (both inclusive) of the Reformatory Schools Act, 1897, and the further conditions endorsed on the back of this license.

Conditions to be endorsed on the back of the license.

(1) This license is in force for three months only, but it may be renewed from time to time for a similar period, until the expiration of the period for which the boy has been directed to be detained (Reformatory Schools Act, 1897, section 18 (2)).

(2) The license shall be cancelled at the desire of the employer (*ib.*, section 19).

(3) The license is moreover determined by :—

(a) the death of the employer,

(b) his cessation from business, or employment of labour,

(c) the expiry of the period for which the boy can be detained in the school,

(d) his discharge from the school, or removal to another school, at any time by order of the local Government (*ib.*, section 20).

(4) The license may be cancelled by the Superintendent if it appear to him, after full enquiry, that the employer has ill-treated the boy or has not adequately provided for his lodging and maintenance (*ib.*, section 21).

(5) A boy who escapes from the charge of his employer may be arrested by any police officer without a warrant and taken back to his employer (*ib.*, section 29).

(6) A licensed boy who escapes from his employer's charge shall never again be licensed, and an employer who negligently permits a boy to escape, or abets such an escape or an attempt to escape, will be excluded from again having a boy licensed to him.

\*Or, if he is an officer of Government or of a Municipality, substitute the words "an officer of Government" or "an officer of the Municipality of \_\_\_\_\_" as the case may be.

†Insert the exact trade, occupation or calling, as the case may be, at which he is to be employed.



(7) The employer shall permit the boy to be visited at least once a month by the Superintendent or such other person as the Educational Inspector, Central Division, may appoint and to be seen by such Visitor apart from others.

(8) This license is in duplicate; the original shall remain in the possession of the employer and the duplicate in the possession of the boy.

59. Forms of the license and the conditions endorsed thereon shall be printed in English and Marathi in parallel columns and kept in stock by the Superintendent for issue as required.

60. Not more than five boys shall at any one time be licensed to any individual employer.

61. No boy shall be so licensed until he has been an inmate of the school for at least two years, and no boy shall be so licensed whose character and conduct in the school have not, in the opinion of the Superintendent, been satisfactory.

No. 12787.—The following notification by the Government of India, Board of Industries and Munitions, is republished :—

#### " PATENTS AND DESIGNS.

No. A.—197, dated Delhi, the 15th December 1920.

The following draft of certain amendments to Indian Patents and Designs Rules, 1912, which it is proposed to make in exercise of the powers conferred by section 57 and sub-section (1) of section 77 of the Indian Patents and Designs Act, 1911 (II of 1911), is published as required by sub-section (2) of section 77 of the said Act for the information of all persons likely to be affected thereby, and notice is hereby given that the said draft will be taken into consideration on or after the 18th day of January 1921.

Any objection or suggestion which may be received from any person with respect to the draft before the date specified will be considered by the Governor General in Council.

#### *Draft Amendments.*

1. To rule 2 of the said rules, the following clauses shall be added, namely :—
  - (d) 'British application' means an application by any person for protection of his invention in any part of His Majesty's dominions for the protection of which invention in British India the provisions of section 78A of the Act are for the time being applicable;
  - (e) 'Reciprocity application' means an application in British India under section 78A of the Act.
2. After rule 10 of the said rules, the following rule shall be inserted, namely :—
 

'10A. (a) in a Presidency town or Rangoon, by the Commissioner of Police, or

(b) in any other place—by the District Magistrate or by any Sub-Divisional Magistrate specially empowered by the local Government in that behalf."



(2) In Schedule VII to the said rules, after Form XII the following Form shall be inserted, namely.—

Form XIII.

(See rule 28A.)

Fee—

- (a) For each breech-loading weapon, FIVE RUPEES ;
- (b) For other weapons, EIGHT ANNAS in disarmed districts, and FOUR ANNAS elsewhere for each weapon.

1. This licence is granted subject to all the provisions of the Indian Arms Act, 1878 (XI of 1878), and of the Indian Arms Rules, 1920.

3. The Mess, Club or Association, at the time of purchasing any new arms, and in the North-West Frontier Province at the time of purchasing ammunition, shall cause the following particulars to be endorsed upon its licence under the vendor's signature, namely:—
  - (a) the name, description and residence of the person who takes delivery of the articles purchased on behalf of the Mess, Club or Association;
  - (b) the nature and quantity of the articles purchased; and
  - (c) the date of purchase.



4. The Mess, Club or Association shall not purchase ammunition in excess of the maximum which may from time to time be fixed by the local Government.

5. Save where the local Government directs the omission of this condition, the Mess, Club or Association shall forthwith give information at the nearest police station of the loss or theft of any arms covered by the licence.

6. The licence does not authorise any member of the Mess, Club or Association to keep Government arms or ammunition.

*Explanation.*—For the purposes of this condition—

(a) 'Government arm' means a firearm or other weapon which is the property of the Government;

(b) 'Government ammunition' means ammunition manufactured in a Government factory or prepared for and supplied to Government.

7. The local Government may require any firearm or ammunition possessed by the Mess, Club or Association to be registered in such manner as the local Government thinks fit.

8. The authority granting the licence has the right to inquire at any time during the currency of the licence whether the weapons for which it has been granted are still in the possession of the Mess, Club or Association and to require the production of such weapons for the purposes of such enquiry.

No. 762.—In accordance with No. 7 of the Rules prescribed in the Notification of the Government of India, Finance Department, No. 1020-A., dated 10th November 1914, republished in Part I of the *Bombay Government Gazette*, dated 26th idem, under Financial Department No. 4868, dated 17th idem, His Excellency the Governor in Council is pleased to publish the following application from the President of the Poona City Municipality, for the grant of a loan of Rs. 12,000 under the provisions of the Local Authorities Loans Act, 1914:—

No. 3082, dated 17th February 1920.

From—The President, Poona City Municipality;

To—The Secretary to Government, Financial Department, Bombay.

Sir,

We, the President, the Vice-President and the councillors of the Poona City Municipality, beg to request that under provisions of section 3 of the Local Government Loans Act (IX of 1914), Government may be pleased to grant to this Municipality a loan of Rs. (12,000) twelve thousand only. This application is being made according to the Municipality's resolution dated 29th July 1919.

Government have allowed this Municipality to ask for a loan of Rs. 12,000 in Government Order No. K.—11 (Financial Department), dated 5th January 1920.

2. As required by the rules made by the Government of India under section 4 of the said Act, published at pages 2874 to 2850 of the *Bombay Government Gazette*, Part I, dated 26th November 1914, we beg to supply the following details:—

- (1) The loan is required for meeting charges for spare parts and special and ordinary repairs to the pumping machinery at the central and low level pumping stations for the Poona City drainage system. This Municipality is required to pay to



Government a sum of Rs. 12,249 under Government Order No. C.W.—8937, dated 31st March 1919, for spare parts, etc. But owing to the very heavy demands for maintenance charges of these pumping stations amounting to about Rs. 72,000 for 1919-1920, the Municipality is unable to spare additional amount for repairs and spare parts out of its current revenues. It is proposed therefore to meet these charges by borrowing a loan from Government.

- (2) The amount of the loan applied for is Rs. 12,000.
- (3) The rates, taxes, and recoveries of the Poona City Municipality are offered as security for the loan.
- (4) The law under which the abovementioned revenue is received is the Bombay District Municipal Act III of 1901.
- (5) The loan is required for a period of ten years and will be taken in lump for payment to Government as soon as it is sanctioned.
- (6) The loan will bear interest at 6 per cent.
- (7) It is proposed to repay the loan by two equal instalments every year for a period of ten years. The first instalment is to be paid six months after the loan is received.
- (8) The Municipality has the following prior charges on its revenue :—
  - (a) The balance of the loan of Rs. 10,00,000 sanctioned under Government Resolution No. 2898 (General Department), dated 21st June 1910, and Government Resolution No. 2624 (Financial Department), dated 15th August 1911. This loan has been granted for drainage and water supply works. The balance remaining to be paid this day is approximately Rs. 9,87,000, the exact figure not having been as yet received from the Accountant General, Bombay. The Municipality has been paying the half yearly instalments regularly before the due date for the last six years, out of its general revenues.
  - (b) A loan of Rs. 23,000 asked for acquisition of open sites for school buildings. This loan, when received, will be repaid by being set off against any educational grants that may fall due to the Municipality in future.
  - (c) A loan of Rs. 1,25,000 applied for on 5th January 1920 for executing a road scheme and effecting removal of congestion thereby. This loan is to be repayable in 2 years after it is received.
- (9) The Municipality proposes to meet the recurring charges of instalments of capital and interest of the loan now applied for from the general revenue of the Municipality.

No. 763.—In accordance with No. 7 of the rules prescribed in the Notification of the Government of India, Finance Department, No. 1020-A., dated 10th November 1914, republished in Part I of the *Bombay Government Gazette* dated 26th idem, under Financial Department No. 4868, dated 17th idem, His Excellency the Governor in Council is pleased to publish the following application from the President of the Poona City Municipality for the grant of a loan of Rs. 1,25,000 under the provisions of the Local Authorities Loans Act, 1914:—

To—The Secretary, to Government, Financial Department, Bombay.

Sir,

We, the President, the Vice-President and the Councillors of the Poona City Municipality, beg to request that under provisions of section 3 of the Local Authorities Loans Act (IX of 1914) Government may be pleased to grant to this Municipality a loan of Rs. 1,25,000 (Rs. one lakh and twenty-five thousand). This application is being made in accordance with the Municipality's resolution dated 30th October 1919. Government have desired the Municipality to ask for this loan in Government Order No. 7906 (General Department) dated 20th September 1919.

2. As required by the rules made by the Government of India under section 4 of the said Act, published at pages 2847 to 2850 of Part I of the *Bombay Government Gazette* dated 26th November 1914, we beg to supply the following details:—

(1) The loan is required for carrying out a road scheme already submitted to Government. This scheme forms part of the General East West Road scheme and covers a portion between the Budhwar Chowk Road and the Dane Ali Road. The grant of Rs. 37,500 received from Government in 1918 for removal of congestion in the City will be utilised for this scheme and the remaining expenditure can be met from the loan now asked for.

(2) The amount of the loan applied for is Rs. 1,25,000.

(3) The rates, taxes and recoveries of the Poona City Municipality are offered as security for the loan.

(4) The law under which the abovementioned revenue is received is the Bombay District Municipal Act of 1901.

(5) The loan is required for a period of two years and will be taken in lump at the time of paying the compensation for the lands and houses to be acquired.

(6) The loan will bear interest at 6 per cent. per annum.

(7) It is proposed to repay the loan by two equal instalments in two years, the first instalment to be paid one year after the receipt of the loan amount.

(8) The Municipality has the following prior charges of its revenue:—

(1) The balance of the loan of Rs. 10,00,000 sanctioned under Government Resolution No. 2898 (General Department) dated 21st June 1910 and Government Resolution No. 2624 (Financial Department) dated 15th August 1911. This loan has been granted for Drainage and Water Works. The balance remaining to be paid at the end of 1919 is Rs. 9,49,165.

The Municipality has been regularly paying the half-yearly instalments of the loan and interest out of the general revenues.

(2) A loan of Rs. 23,000 asked for acquisition of open sites for school buildings. This loan, when received, will be adjusted by being set off against any educational grants to be received by the Municipality in future.

(9) The Municipality proposes to meet the recurring charges of the instalments and interest of the loan applied for from the general revenues of the Municipality.

(10) Any surplus accruing from the scheme will be earmarked for future measures for the relief of congestion in the City.

*Item No. 332.*—“ Government Order No. 7906 dated 20th September 1919 (General Department).”

The Governor in Council is pleased to extend the period of the utilization of the grant of Rs. 37,500 made to the Poona City Municipality up to 31st March 1921, as it is improbable that acquisition proceedings will be completed before 31st March 1920.

The Poona City Municipality should be asked to submit the necessary application for a Government loan of Rs. 1,25,000 for a period of two years at 6 per cent. interest.

*Note.*—The loan is required to carry out the scheme of the east west road joining the Budhwar Road to the Dane Ali Road. It will be repaid by sale of the building sites that will be formed by removal of congested houses.”

Mr. Kavade proposed and Prof. Kanitkar seconded that the application for a loan of Rs. 1,25,000 should be made and the amount of the loan should be taken when it is actually required for payment.

Carried unanimously.

“ A similar report should also be submitted by all the District Judges regularly each year after the touring season on all the Subordinate Judges who have served during the year within their districts. They should keep their own private registers and enter therein from time to time their opinions formed at the periodical inspections or in the course of civil appellate work and particularly on the transfer of Subordinate Judges or on their own transfers from their districts. These private registers should be handed over to their successors for their information and preparation of the periodical reports on the Subordinate Judges who have served in their districts.”

(c) In suits for sums between Rs. 300 and Rs. 500.	Do. ...	Not more than Rs. 45 on the conclusion of the suit.
(d) In suits for sums between Rs. 500 and Rs. 1,000.	Do. ...	Not more than Rs. 68 on the conclusion of the suit.
(e) In suits for sums between Rs. 1,000 and Rs. 2,000.	Do. ...	Not more than Rs. 45 per diem or Rs. 85 if the case be disposed of on the first day.

Note.—Rs. 5, Rs. 15, Rs. 17 and Rs. 34 from the lower scale of costs in (a), (b), (c), (d) and (e), respectively.

XVII. (a) In all suits for sums below Rs. 1,000 disposed of *ex parte*, the costs of employing a legal practitioner should ordinarily be allowed, but on the lower scale, where the Court is of opinion that the employment of such practitioner was under the circumstances reasonable.

(b) Ordinarily the costs of employing a legal practitioner shall be allowed in all suits for sums exceeding Rs. 1,000 in which the legal practitioner has drafted the plaint, but such costs shall, notwithstanding anything contained in Rule XVI, be allowed only on the lower scale, *viz.*, Rs. 34, unless the suit is contested at the hearing.”

No. 4845.—In exercise of the powers conferred by section 37 of the amended Letters Patent of the High Court, the Honourable the Chief Justice and Judges are pleased to make the following rules and to direct that they be incorporated in the High Court Appellate Side Rules, edition of 1920 :—

Insert as rule 78A in Chapter VII at page 60—

78A. " If the Court so directs, the records in all appeals to the High Court likely to be taken to the Privy Council, should be printed before hearing, in the Privy Council form, and should be arranged in the manner set out below, so as to avoid re-printing the book if the case goes before the Privy Council. A sufficient number of copies should be printed to meet the requirements of both the Appellate Court and the Privy Council."

Insert as rule 78B in Chapter VIII at page 60—

78B. " The record of appeals to be sent to England to His Majesty's Privy Council should be arranged and printed in three parts :

Part I should contain the pleadings, the transcript of the evidence of the witnesses and the Judgment and decree of the Court of First Instance and (if there was more than one appeal) of any Appellate Court subordinate to the Appellate Court from which the appeal to His Majesty in Council lies.

Part II should contain the following documents :—

- (1) The proceedings in the Appellate Court, if any ;
- (2) the judgment and decree of that Court ;
- (3) the application for leave to appeal, affidavits, etc. ;
- (4) the grounds of appeal ;
- (5) the certificate granting leave ; and
- (6) the order admitting the appeal.

Part III should contain the exhibits and documents.

Each part should have its own index. The index and documents in parts I and II should be printed strictly in chronological order and bound up as at present, but without cardboard covers. The index to part III should follow the order of the exhibit mark with the proper page number attached. The documents in part III should be arranged as far as suitable in chronological order, each document to show its exhibit mark and whether it is a plaintiff's or defendant's document, and in all cases documents relating to the same matter such as (a) a series of correspondence, or (b) proceedings in a suit other than the one under appeal should be kept together. Part III should be sent to England unbound or lightly stitched, each exhibit being printed separately and pagged at the foot of each page. When copies of these three parts are received in London the parties will prepare the record, omitting any documents that they agree are unnecessary and marking in the index against the omitted documents the words ' omitted by consent '. Where one party objects to the inclusion of a document as unnecessary and the other party insists upon it being included, the record should contain a note as provided by rule 18 of the Judicial Committee Rules, 1908, with a view to the subsequent adjustment of the cost. It will be the duty of the parties to re-arrange part III, if necessary. When part III has been settled, it will be repaged at the top of each page and the new page numbers substituted for the old page numbers in the index.

The documents omitted to be printed shall be enumerated in a manuscript list to be transmitted with the record."

Insert as rule 78C in Chapter VIII at page 60—

78C. Supplementary records dealing with revivor of appeals should be transmitted to England in manuscript and not in print.

Insert as paragraph 2 to rule 80 at page 62—

2. Full particulars of addresses of the parties must be furnished within seven days of the filing of the petition.

Insert as paragraph 2 to rule 81 at page 63—

2. Notices shall be limited, in the absence of any express direction by the Court, to—

- (a) the notice of an application for the certificate of admission,
- (b) the notice declaring the appeal admitted, and
- (c) the notice of the transmission of the record to England,



In all cases where a party has appeared, service on his Vakil shall be deemed sufficient notice.

Substitute the following rule for rule 83 at page 66—

“ 83. (a) Within two weeks of the costs for the preparation of the paper book being deposited, an index of all the documents included in the transcript shall be prepared by the office and annexed to the record in the following form, and shall be followed by a list of all other papers, documents, and exhibits in the case not included in the transcript:—

You are requested to attend the Civil Department for the purpose of settling the index within one week from the date hereof, and in case you are not agreed, as to the documents to be included in or omitted from the transcript record, you should within two weeks from the date hereof, submit to the Registrar a list in the form given in paragraph (a) of rule 83 of the High Court Appellate Side Rules, together with a brief statement of the grounds on which the said documents or the specified portions thereof, you require to be included in or excluded from the transcript.

- (c) It shall be in the discretion of the Registrar to omit from the transcript any documents which have not, within the time specified, been expressly asked for by the parties.
- (d) If the Vakils fail to attend or to settle the index within the time specified, the Registrar shall place the matter before the Court without further delay. Any costs incurred on such account shall be borne in such manner as the Court may direct.



- (e) If the parties are agreed as to the documents to be omitted, such documents shall not be translated or transcribed.
- (f) In the case of the parties differing as to any document and the Registrar being of opinion that it should not be translated and transcribed, the matter shall be brought before the Court for determination.
- (g) Any of the parties may apply to the Court within two weeks from the date of the Registrar's order directing any document to be included in or excluded from the transcript record.
- (h) If either party shall expressly ask for translation or inclusion of any document and the application is granted, the circumstance shall be noted in the transcript."

In rule 84 at page 66 for the words " unless the correctness of the translation is impeached " substitute the words " unless the Court specially orders ".

In rule 88 at page 67 insert the words " within two weeks " between the words " shall be submitted " and " to the Chief Translator ".

Insert after rule 89 at page 68—

89A. " A list shall be maintained showing the numbers and dates of all pending Privy Council Appeals in various stages of preparation, and the Registrar shall examine every quarter all such appeals in arrears, and call on the appellant who may be responsible for the delay to show cause before the Court why the appeal should not be dismissed for want of prosecution."

Insert after rule 90 at page 68—

90A. The following order of His Majesty the King in Council regulating the practice in appeals to His Majesty in Council is reproduced for information :—

At the Court at Buckingham Palace, the 9th day of February 1920.

*Present :*

THE KING'S MOST EXCELLENT MAJESTY IN COUNCIL.

Whereas by an Act passed in the fourth year of the reign of His Majesty King William IV, entitled " an Act for the better administration of Justice in His Majesty's Privy Council " it is, amongst other things, enacted that it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council from time to time to make any such Rules and Orders as may be thought fit for regulating the mode, form and time of Appeal to be made (from the decisions of which an Appeal lies to His Majesty in Council), and in like manner from time to time to make such other Regulations for the preventing delays in the making or hearing such Appeals and as to the expenses attending the said Appeals and as to the amount or value of property in respect of which any such Appeal may be made :

And whereas Her Majesty Queen Victoria did by her Order in Council of the 10th day of April 1838, approve certain Rules and Orders for regulating the mode, form and time of Appeal from the decisions of the said Courts and also certain regulations for the preventing delays in the making or hearing such Appeals and as to the expenses attending such Appeals and as to the amount or value of property in respect of which any such Appeal may be made :

And whereas the King's Most Excellent Majesty in Council hath deemed it expedient to rescind all the said Rules, Orders and Regulations and to substitute others in lieu thereof :

His Majesty is, therefore, pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to rescind all the said Rules, Orders and Regulations in the said Order in Council of the 10th day of April, 1838, contained, and to approve of the several Rules, Orders and Regulations contained in the Schedule hereto, and to order as it is hereby ordered, that the same be respectively observed by all Courts of Judicature in India and by all persons whom it shall or may concern.

Whereof the Governor General of India in Council, and all other persons whom it may concern, are to take notice and govern themselves accordingly.

*The Schedule above referred to.*

1. Applications to the Court for leave to appeal to His Majesty in Council shall be made within 90 days of the decree or order to be appealed from, subject to the provisions of sections 4, 5 and 12 of the Indian Limitation Act, 1908.
2. The preparation of the Record shall be subject to the supervision of the Court, and the parties may submit any disputed question arising in connection therewith to the decision of the Court, and the Court shall give such directions thereon as the justice of the case may require.
3. The Registrar, as well as the parties and their legal Agents, shall endeavour to exclude from the Record all documents (more particularly such as are merely formal) that are not relevant to the subject matter of the Appeal, and, generally, to reduce the bulk of the Record as far as practicable, taking special care to avoid the duplication of documents and the unnecessary repetition of headings and other merely formal parts of documents; but the documents omitted to be copied or printed shall be enumerated in a manuscript list to be transmitted with the Record.
4. Where in the course of the preparation of a Record one party objects to the inclusion of a document on the ground that it is unnecessary or irrelevant and the other party nevertheless insists upon its being included, and the Court allows the document to be included, the Record, as printed (whether in India or in England), shall, with a view to the subsequent adjustment of the costs of and incidental to such document, indicate in the index of papers or otherwise, the fact that, and the party by whom, the inclusion of the document was objected to.
5. Where the Record is printed in India, the Registrar shall, at the expense of the Appellant, transmit to the Registrar of the Privy Council 40 copies of such Record, one of which copies he shall certify to be correct by signing his name on, or initialling every eighth page thereof and by affixing thereto the seal, if any, of the Court.
6. Where the Record is to be printed in England, the Registrar shall, at the expense of the Appellant, transmit to the Registrar of the Privy Council one certified copy of such Record, together with an index of all the papers and exhibits in the case. No other certified copies of the Record shall be transmitted to the Agents in England by or on behalf of the parties to the Appeal.
7. Where there are two or more Appeals arising out of the same matter and the Court is of opinion that it would be for the convenience of the Lords of the Judicial Committee and all parties concerned that the Appeals should be consolidated, the Courts may direct the Appeals to be consolidated.
8. An Appellant who has obtained a certificate for the admission of an Appeal may at any time prior to the making of an Order admitting the Appeal withdraw the Appeal on such terms as to costs and otherwise as the Court may direct.
9. Where an Appellant, having obtained a certificate for the admission of an Appeal, fails to furnish the security or make the deposit required (or apply with due diligence to the Court for an Order admitting the Appeal), the Court may, on its own motion or on an application in that behalf made by the Respondent, cancel the certificate for the admission of the Appeal, and may give such directions as to the costs of the Appeal and the security entered into by the Appellant as the Court shall think fit, or make such further or other Order in the premises, as in the opinion of the Court, the justice of the case requires.
10. An Appellant whose Appeal has been admitted shall prosecute his Appeal in accordance with the Rules for the time being regulating the general practice and procedure in Appeals to His Majesty in Council.
11. Where an Appellant, whose appeal has been admitted, desires, prior to the Despatch of the Record to England, to withdraw his Appeal, the Court may, upon an application, in that behalf made by the Appellant, grant him a certificate to the effect that the Appeal has been withdrawn, and the Appeal shall thereupon be deemed, as from the date of such certificate, to stand dismissed without express Order of His Majesty in Council, and the costs of the Appeal and the security entered into by the Appellant shall be dealt with in such manner as the Court may think fit to direct.



12. Where an Appellant, whose Appeal has been admitted, fails to show due diligence in taking all necessary steps in connection with the preparation of the Record, the Court, may, either on its own motion or on the application of the Respondent, call upon the Appellant to show cause why a certificate should not be issued that the Appeal has not been effectually prosecuted by the Appellant; and if the Court sees fit to issue such a certificate, the Appeal shall be deemed, as from the date of such certificate, to stand dismissed for non-prosecution without express Order of His Majesty in Council, and the costs of the Appeal and the security entered into by the Appellant shall be dealt with in such manner as the Court may think fit to direct.
13. Where at any time between the admission of an Appeal and the despatch of the Record to England the Record becomes defective by reason of the death, or change of status, of a party to the Appeal, the Court may, notwithstanding the admission of the Appeal, on an application in that behalf made by any person interested, grant a certificate showing who, in the opinion of the Court, is the proper person to be substituted, or entered, on the Record, in place of, or in addition to, the party who has died, or undergone a change of status, and the name of such person shall thereupon be deemed to be so substituted or entered on the Record as aforesaid without express order of His Majesty in Council, if, in the opinion of the Court, there has been undue delay in making this application, the Court may order the Appellant or the party interested, to take all necessary steps to perfect the Record within such time as the Court may direct, and if, he fails to comply with such Order, the Court may call upon him to show cause why a certificate should not be issued that the Appeal has not been effectually prosecuted and if the Court sees fit to issue such a certificate, the Appeal shall be deemed, as from the date of such certificate, to stand dismissed for non-prosecution, without express Order of His Majesty in Council, and the costs of the Appeal and the Security entered into by the Appellant shall be dealt with in such manner as the Court may think fit to direct.
14. Where the Record subsequently to its despatch to England becomes defective by reason of the death, or change of status, of a party to the Appeal, the Court may, upon an application in that behalf made by any person interested, cause a certificate to be transmitted to the Registrar of the Privy Council showing who, in the opinion of the Court, is the proper person to be substituted, or entered, on the Record, in place of, or in addition to, the party who has died, or undergone a change of status. If, in the opinion of the Court, there has been undue delay in making this application, the Court may order the Appellant, or the party interested, to take all necessary steps to perfect the Record within such time as the Court may direct, and, if she fails to comply with such Order, the Court shall report the matter to the Registrar of the Privy Council.
15. These Rules shall come into operation on the 1st day of January, 1921, or on such other date as the Governor-General of India in Council may determine.

In reckoning the maximum number of passengers, children in arms should not be counted. Two children, not being children in arms, but each being under the age of 12, shall count as one passenger.

On every licensed carriage there shall be shown the total number of passengers allowed in the following manner :—

“ Licensed to carry ( ) passengers only.”

3. The fares shown in the table are for the single journey and are for the conveyance whether a full number of passengers is carried or not.
4. Detention shall become chargeable only when it exceeds half an hour in all.
5. In any case in which any public conveyance is called from a stand or the owner's stable to any place distant more than a mile from such stand or stable, the driver shall be entitled to charge four annas or half the full fare of such conveyance (which sum is the least) in addition to the prescribed fare.
6. The fares given in the table apply to public conveyances plying for hire within the municipal limits of Sholapur Town and on the Sholapur-Valsang and Sholapur-Mandrup Roads. Fares for conveyances taken beyond these limits must be specially agreed upon by the parties hiring them.
7. The driver is not bound to carry in his conveyance any goods other than personal luggage.
8. All horse-drawn conveyances shall be supplied with two clear burning lights and all bullock-drawn conveyances, except two-bullocks passenger conveyances, which will have two, with one clear burning light during the period between three-quarters of an hour after sunset and one hour before sunrise.



9. Every licensee of a public conveyance or horse or bullock shall produce such conveyance or horse or bullock for inspection whenever and wherever the District Superintendent of Police or any officer authorized by him in this behalf shall require him to do so. Every holder of a driver's license shall attend the office of the District Superintendent of Police or of any officer authorized by him whenever required by him to do so.

3. The fares given in the table apply to public conveyances plying for hire within the notified area of Madha, the town of Mohol and the Kurduwadi-Barsi and Kurduwadi-Pandharpur Roads. Fares for conveyances taken beyond these limits must be specially agreed upon by the parties hiring them.

4. The driver is not bound to carry in his conveyance any goods other than personal luggage.

5. All horse-drawn conveyances shall be supplied with two clear burning lights and all bullock-drawn conveyances, except two bullock passenger conveyances, which will have two, with one clear burning light during the period between three-quarters of an hour after sunset and one hour before sunrise.

6. Every licensee of a public conveyance or horse or bullock shall produce such conveyance or horse or bullock for inspection whenever and wherever the District Superintendent of Police or any officer authorized by him in this behalf shall require him to do so; and every holder of a driving license shall attend the office of the District Superintendent of Police or of any officer authorised by him whenever required by him to do so.

7. Every driver shall, when engaged in his occupation, be cleanly and decently clothed in the uniform prescribed and shall carry with him a copy of the Bombay Public Conveyance Act VII of 1920.

8. Every carriage or cart shall bear the license number on both the sides.

9. The Magistrate of Madha shall exercise jurisdiction under this Act and shall decide cases sent to him under this Act.

10. The balance of fees after the necessary contingent expenses shall have been defrayed therefrom shall at the close of the year be paid into the Treasury to the credit of Government.

11. One pair of ponies only may be used for the journey between Barsi and Kurduwadi and *vice versa*, provided the ponies are rested at least four hours before the return journey from Kurduwadi or Barsi, is commenced. Similarly in the case of the Kurduwadi-Pandharpur Road. In addition the ponies should be rested at Shetfal for at least one hour on the Pandharpur-Kurduwadi Road.

12. Any infringement of the conditions shall make the license-holder liable to be prosecuted and punished according to law in force.
