No. 5156-W. —The following notices, dated the 14th May and 6th June 1920, respectively, issued by the Foreign Office, London, are published for information:—

I.

CARGOES EX ENEMY VESSELS SEIZED BY PORTUGAL.

Foreign Office,

May 14th, 1920.

With reference to previous notifications published in the *London Gazette* respecting the release of Allied and Neutral merchandise found on enemy vessels in Portuguese harbours, particularly to those published on May 30th, 1916, August 3rd, 1917, and April 11th, 1919, a translation of a Decree which has now been issued by the Portuguese Government providing for the sale of such cargoes as are still unclaimed or are enemy property is appended.

It is understood that a further Decree is under consideration by the Portuguese Government, and will shortly be issued, in accordance with which fresh claims for goods will be admissible, and providing that, should such goods have in the meantime been sold, or requisitioned, the owners, on substantiating their rights, will receive the proceeds of sale, or, in the latter event, the market value of their property.

DECREE No. 6556, APRIL 17TH, 1920.

(Translation.)

Articles 31 and 33 of the Decree No. 2350 of the 20th of April 1916 having provided that the goods found on board enemy ships at the time in Portuguese waters, or discharged therefrom, should be sold by public auction, the respective proceeds being deposited, with an indication of their origin, in the Caixa Geral De Depositos, whenever they could not without great loss be kept under administrative control, it being presumed that such goods as were not proved, within the period of thirty days, a period which was subject to extension and was in fact several times extended, to be the property of allies or neutrals to whom they would be delivered on being claimed or their value restored should they have been requisitioned by the Portuguese Government; and

According to the statement made by the Directorate-General of Customs that considerable quantities of the said goods exist which it has not yet been possible to identify, either because there are no cargo documents or because no one has appeared with a right to claim them; and that in order to restore the goods belonging to allies or neutrals, successive decrees, published between the 13th July 1917 and the 22nd of March 1919 have extended the original period of thirty days, which periods have now elapsed; and

Considering that, in order to carry out the provisions enacted by the Decree of the 20th of April 1916, a later Decree No. 2366 of the 4th of May of the same year, assigned to the Intendencia Dos Bens Dos Inimigos, the liquidation of such enemy property "provided no inconvenience is likely to result therefrom"; and the abovementioned goods being not only of that nature, but their indefinite retention in State warehouses, which are always in demand for commercial traffic, is further prejudiced by this accumulation;

Considering that the goods in question will, in the majority of cases, suffer depreciation in value in proportion to the length of time they are kept in deposit;

Considering that once these goods have been put upon the home markets by sale at a public auction, they will help to reduce the shortage of raw materials and manufactured articles so prejudicial to national interests;

In view of the provisions of Article 297, sub-clause (b) of the Treaty of Peace approved by the Law No. 962 of the 2nd instant; and

Availing of the power granted to the Government by the Law 491 of the 12th of March 1916, and on the advice of the Council of Ministers:

I hereby decree as follows:—

Article I.

The goods found on board the *ex*-German ships requisitioned by the State and at the time lying in Portuguese waters and which are still deposited within the judicial districts of the Custom Houses of continental Portugal and the adjacent Islands, shall be sold by public auction at the said Custom Houses in accordance with the terms of legislation in force, the nett proceeds to be placed in the custody of the Caixa Geral De Depositos with an indication of their origin.

Article II.

In order to carry out the provisions of Article I, all packages containing the said goods shall be opened in succession, so that the contents may be briefly examined and the basis of sale fixed.

Article III.

The examination and valuation referred to in the previous Article shall be effected by as many committees as may be necessary for the rapid completion of the sale.

Article IV.

All packages examined and valued shall obtain a rotation number and be duly entered in special books, and, as far as possible, in groups of Custom House marks and according to nature of contents.

Article V.

Objects of recognised historical, artistic or archaeological value, publications of political propaganda, arms and ammunitions not specified in paragraph I of this Article, are excluded from the provisions of Article I whenever the Government think fit.

Paragraph I.—The following are excluded from the sale provided for by this Decree:—

- (a) Arms and munitions of war;
- (b) Merchandise in contravention to Portuguese laws or to Agreements and Treaties of an international character to which Portugal has adhered.

Article VI.

The provisions of this Decree do not include goods the sale of which has already been advertised at the date of its publication, nor those which have been requisitioned as well

as those the release of which have been authorised or of which the delivery orders are registered in the Custom Houses within the period of fifteen days counting from the above-mentioned date.

Article VII.

The sales by auction shall be presided over by the Director of the Custom House concerned, by the Sub-Director, or by a Chief of Department.

Article VIII.

Persons presenting themselves to bid must previously deposit in the treasury of the Custom House in which the sale takes place the sum of 200 escudos, and a further sum of 25 per cent. on the purchase money.

Paragraph I.—Bidders are obliged to remove the goods purchased by them within a period of five days, under penalty of forfeiting the deposits mentioned in this Article.

Article IX.

The proceeds of the sales of goods referred to in this Decree shall only be subject to the payment of duties and other legal imposts, with the exception of charges for warehousing.

Article X.

The Custom Houses shall forward beforehand to the Directorate-General of Customs the lists of objects and goods about to be sold by auction, in order that the higher authorities may decide which may be disposed of exclusively for internal consumption.

Article XI.

Legislation to the contrary is hereby revoked.

The President of the Ministry and the Ministers of the other Departments shall accordingly cause this Decree to be put into effect.

CARGOES EX ENEMY VESSELS SEIZED BY PORTUGAL.

With reference to the notification which was published in the *London Gazette* on the 18th ultimo, relative to goods still unclaimed *ex-enemy* vessels seized by Portugal, His Majesty's Minister at Lisbon reports that, according to information which he has received from the Portuguese authorities, the ordinary Customs regulations, under which claims can be made in respect of goods lying in the Portuguese Customs are now applicable to these goods, and that on such claims being presented to the Portuguese authorities any contemplated sales are suspended.

THE CHARITABLE ENDOWMENTS ACT, 1890.

In the matter of "the Parvatibai Endowment Fund" in connection with Parvatibai's Home for Incurables, Ahmedabad.

VESTING ORDER AND SCHEME.

Whereas application has been made to the Governor of Bombay in Council by Sheth Mangaldas Girdhardas Parekh, a Hindu Gentleman of Ahmedabad, that the securities to the amount of twenty-five thousand rupees (Rs. 25,000) specified in the second schedule hereto be vested under the Charitable Endowments Act, 1890 (VI of 1890), in the Treasurer of Charitable Endowments for the territories subject to the Governor of Bombay in Council in order and upon the terms that the income accruing therefrom may be applied for the purpose of endowing and maintaining at Ahmedabad a home for pauper incurables and also that a scheme for the administration of the property so to be vested be settled under the provisions of the said Act;

And whereas the Governor in Council has approved of, and agreed to, the said terms as to the application of the said income as the same are hereinafter set forth and has in pursuance of section 5 of the said Act with the concurrence of the aforesaid Sheth Mangaldas Girdhardas Parekh, settled the scheme for the administration of the said property which is set forth in the first schedule hereto annexed;

Under and by virtue of the powers conferred by sections 4 (1) and 5 (1) of the said Act, the Governor in Council is hereby pleased on the application aforesaid of the said Sheth Mangaldas Girdhardas Parekh to order that the securities to the amount of twenty-five thousand rupees (Rs. 25,000) particulars whereof are set forth in the second schedule hereto, be and the same are hereby vested in the Treasurer of Charitable Endowments for the Presidency of Bombay, upon the terms that the same shall be held as an endowment for the purposes and objects mentioned in the said scheme set forth in the first schedule hereto, and that he shall collect or draw the income or interest thereof as and when the same becomes due and payable and shall pay the same as and when the same shall from time to time be received to the person or persons appointed to administer the same under the said scheme and that such scheme shall come into operation as on the date hereof.

THE FIRST SCHEDULE ABOVE REFERRED TO.

Scheme.

1. The fund shall be known as "the Parvatibai Fund for Incurables."
2. The income accruing from the fund shall be devoted to the housing maintenance and medical relief of incurable paupers admitted to the "Parvatibai's Home for Incurables", established for the purpose at Ahmedabad, and hereafter called the "Home" but the principal amount shall be retained intact.
3. The affairs of the Home and the income accruing from the said fund shall be administered by a Committee consisting of the following:—
 1. The Collector of Ahmedabad, *ex-officio* (President).
 2. The Civil Surgeon, Ahmedabad, *ex-officio*.
 3. Sheth Mangaldas Girdhardas Parekh.
 4. Sheth Chimanlal Girdhardas.
 5. Nagarsheth Kasturbhai Manibhai.
 6. Mr. G. U. Parekh, LL.B.
 7. Sheth Jivanlal Girdhardas.

Members other than *ex-officio* members shall be life members.
4. Pauper incurables shall be admitted to the Home on the recommendation of the Civil Surgeon alone; or on the joint recommendation of Sheth Mangaldas Girdhardas and Sheth Chimanlal Girdhardas; and on the death or resignation of one of the aforesaid Sheths on the recommendation of the survivor and on the death or resignation of the survivor on the recommendation of the member of their family appointed a member of the Committee under the provisions of clause 5: provided that where the pauper is not admitted on the recommendation of the Civil Surgeon, the Civil Surgeon shall certify that the pauper is suffering from an incurable disease.

5. When by death or resignation both Sheth Mangaldas Girdhardas and Sheth Chimanlal Girdhardas have ceased to be members of the Committee, a member of their family jointly appointed by the said Sheths or appointed by the surviving Sheth, as the case may be, failing whom a member of their family appointed by the remaining members of the Committee, shall be a member of the Committee in place of the aforesaid Sheths; and on the death or resignation of the member so appointed or of a member appointed in his place, the remaining members of the Committee shall appoint to the vacancy a member of the family of the aforesaid Sheths; provided that in all such cases there shall be a member of their family available and willing to accept the appointment.

6. Save as provided in clause 5, a vacancy on the Committee caused by the death or resignation of a life member shall be filled by appointment by the remaining members of the Committee.

7. Sheths Mangaldas Girdhardas and Chimanlal Girdhardas shall be joint Secretaries and Treasurers; and on the death or resignation of one, the survivor shall be Secretary and Treasurer; and on his death or resignation, the member of their family appointed to the Committee under clause 5, failing whom a member of the Committee elected by the remaining members shall be Secretary and Treasurer.

8. The Committee shall meet quarterly in the months of April, July, October and January in each year. Unless otherwise determined by the Committee, four members shall constitute a quorum.

9. The President or Secretary or any two members of the Committee may at any time summon a meeting of the Committee.

10. In the absence of the President, the Civil Surgeon shall preside.

11. Questions at any meeting of the Committee shall be decided by majority of votes, and in the case of equality of votes the President shall have a second or casting vote.

12. Subject to the aforesaid provisions the Committee may make such rules as to the holding and calling of meetings and the transaction of business as they may deem fit.

13. The Committee shall cause true accounts to be kept of the moneys received and expended by them and of the assets, credits and liabilities of the Home.

14. The accounts shall be closed on the 31st day of March in each year and a balance sheet containing a summary of the assets, credits and liabilities of the Home on that date shall be prepared.

15. One or more auditors as may be considered necessary shall be appointed by the Committee.

16. The auditors shall examine the accounts for the year ending 31st March, with all vouchers therefor and the balance sheet prepared by the Committee; and shall submit a report thereon to the Committee which shall be considered at a meeting of the Committee, of which at least seven days' notice has been given subsequent to the despatch of the report to the members.

17. Any savings that may accrue from the fund and any subscription received by the Committee on behalf of the Home may be invested in such manner as the Committee may deem fit.

18. The Trust shall operate in favour of any other institution by which the Home may with the approval of the Governor in Council be replaced or for such other purpose of a like nature or in furtherance of the intent specified as shall at any time seem proper to the Governor in Council.

19. The investment, management and dispensation of the fund shall be at the discretion of the Governor in Council.

PAPERS REGARDING THE EXTERMENT OF MR. D. M. MANILAL FROM CERTAIN PARTS OF THE FIJI COLONY.

(I)

Order of prohibition and removal made under the Peace and Good Order Ordinance, 1875.

FIJI.

To WIT.

GOVERNOR,

Whereas by the Peace and Good Order Ordinance, 1875, the Governor in Council is empowered by Order under his hand to prohibit any person whom he shall believe to be disaffected to the King or otherwise dangerous to the peace and good order of the Colony from residing or being within any particular district or districts of the Colony during any space of time not exceeding two years, and by the same or any subsequent order under his hand to authorize and direct that if such prohibition be not obeyed forthwith or within a specified time the person disobeying the same shall be arrested and imprisoned and shall be removed being so arrested and imprisoned beyond the limits of the prohibited district and in such removal force may be used if need be for the purposes thereof;

And whereas the Governor in Council believes that Doctor Maginmal Manilal is dangerous to the peace and good order of the Colony;

Now, therefore, by and with the advice of my Executive Council, I do by this order under my hand prohibit the said Doctor Maginmal Manilal from residing or being within all or any of the undermentioned districts of the Colony during the space of two years, that is to say, the Island of Vitilevu, the Island of Ovalau, the province of Macuata.

And I do further, by and with the advice of my Executive Council, by this order under my hand, authorize and direct that if the above prohibition be not obeyed within the following specified time, that is to say, by or before noon on the first day of April 1920, then and in such case the said Doctor Maginmal Manilal shall be arrested by the Inspector General of Constabulary or by any Police Constable or by any other Peace Officer within the Colony and imprisoned, and shall be removed being so arrested and imprisoned beyond the limits of the prohibited districts, and in such removal force may be used if need be for the purposes thereof.

Petition from Indian residents to His Excellency the Governor of Fiji, dated April 1st, 1920.

We, the undersigned, Indian residents, beg most respectfully to submit the following representations to His Excellency the Governor for his kind consideration. We have learned with profound sorrow that an order has been served by His Excellency the Governor on Mr. Manilal, our foremost leader in Fiji, which amounts to his expulsion from this country. We deeply grieved for this and earnestly request His Excellency to cancel the order immediately. We beg to express our views regarding the matter; that we do not want to live in this country if our leader, or leaders are expelled from here. We would also mention here that in case our petition is not considered favourably we all intend to return to our mother country together with Mr. Manilal. We would therefore request Your Excellency's Government to make immediate arrangements for repatriation of those amongst us who are entitled at this moment to a free return passage to India.

We may suggest that if these arrangements cannot be made immediately, the order for Mr. Manilal be withdrawn for the present and postponed, until the Government can make the above-mentioned arrangements asked for. Otherwise we would refrain from doing any work in the Colony until we are repatriated, as a protest against such action of the Government. We do not mean to interfere with the work of the Government of this Colony but we fitly express our feelings. The simple thing is that, as we have already stated, we do not want to live in this country without a proper leader to guide us and one who safeguards our interests. If it is contended that he has committed any offence or has broken any law of the country, we do not see any reason why the Government prefer expelling him from here rather than proceeding against him in a Court of Justice. In the absence of a prosecution against him we are inclined to think that it is because he might be an undesirable person in the estimation of the European community and the Government of this country in advocating our cause. In that case we do not see how any self-respecting Indian can continue to live here any longer. In view of the above fact we submit this petition, hoping that it will receive due consideration at the hands of His Excellency's Government. In the absence of a prompt reply to this petition we will be compelled to stop all work for the future and get ready to return home.

Reply of His Excellency the Governor, dated April 14th, 1920, to the petition from Indian residents.

His Excellency the Governor has received the petition of Indian residents in the Ba district, with reference to the order recently served on D. M. Manilal.

The order in question prohibits Manilal and others from residing for two years in Vitilevu, Ovalau or the Macuata Province. Outside these districts the persons concerned may go where they please and there is no restriction on their movements. The order was issued by the Governor in Council after full deliberation because these persons are believed, while resident in any of the districts mentioned, to be dangerous to the peace and good order of the Colony. Under no circumstances will His Excellency reconsider the decision, and he dismisses forthwith the request in the petition that he should cancel the order.

Manilal has not deceived the Government, but he has grievously deceived the Indians at Suva and Rewa with the result that many of them are in prison or awaiting trial, while he has been careful to save his own skin. Loyal Indians here have protested to His Excellency against these agitators, who are responsible for the recent trouble, being allowed to remain at large while their dupes are punished.

Manilal has been the worst enemy of Indian progress in Fiji. If the petitioners knew all that the Government knows about him they would rejoice at his departure. It is entirely owing to him and to the trouble which he has caused that the Government has been unable to proceed with its intention, already publicly announced, to make provision for the election by the Indian community of two representatives in the Legislative Council. This would, in the Governor's opinion, have afforded a safeguard of Indian interests, such as the petitioners desire, and a constitutional means of voicing Indian aspirations through their chosen and recognised leaders. The enforced postponement of this important concession has been a matter of regret to His Excellency.

The petitioners ask that if the order against Manilal is not withdrawn they may be repatriated, and they threaten to strike. As regards repatriation, arrangements have already been made for two ships to come to Fiji to fetch those who are entitled to repatriation and who wish to go. The first ship is due to arrive at the end of next month and it is hoped that the second will follow not long after. Lists of those desiring to be repatriated are being prepared and those who are entitled to free passages and wish to go should send in their names to the Agent General of Immigration. The Government has no desire to impede or delay the departure of those Indians who do not wish to remain in Fiji. Malcontents are not wanted here.

As to the threat of a strike, the petitioners are making a grave mistake if they think that the Government is to be intimidated by threats of this nature. The petitioners state that 'They do not mean to interfere with the work of the Government.' If by this they mean that they do not intend to commit any breach of the peace, His Excellency strongly advises them to abide by this intention. Any disorder or violation of the law will be promptly and sternly dealt with.

No. 2327.—The following revised rules for appointment to the Subordinate Forest Service of Bombay are published for general information in supersession of those promulgated in Government Notification No. 1540, dated 17th February 1913, printed at pages 273 to 275 of the *Bombay Government Gazette*, of the 20th idem, Part I :—

Revised rules for appointment to the Bombay Subordinate Forest Service.

PART I.

Upper Subordinate Forest Service.

1. His Excellency the Governor in Council is pleased to direct, in supersession of all previous rules and orders, that subject to the satisfaction of the claims of persons qualified under the rules hitherto in force and of those who at examinations held not later than in January 1904, March 1921 and July 1922, respectively, may have obtained a certificate of successful training in the Forest Class at the College of Science, Poona, at the Forest College and Research Institute, Dehra Dun, and at the Madras Forest College, Coimbatore, appointments to the Upper Subordinate Forest Service or Ranger class shall be made by the Chief Conservator—

(a) By promotion of subordinates of long service and tried ability and probity, irrespective of the special training they may have undergone or the educational certificates they may have obtained; and

(b) by direct appointment of candidates who have obtained the Diploma of Forestry after a period of training at the Bombay Forest College, Dhárwár, which will ordinarily extend to two years.

2. The Chief Conservator of Forests shall, before July 1st in each year, decide the number of recruits required for the whole Presidency during the following year for vacancies likely to be filled up under clause (b) of rule 1 subject to the maximum fixed by Government.

3. The Chief Conservator shall notify to the public through the local newspapers the date on which applications from candidates for training in the Ranger's course at the Bombay Forest College will be received; and he shall, in consultation with the Conservators, select from amongst the candidates whose applications have been received, the number of men required for nomination as stipendiary students, provided a sufficient number of qualified candidates is available.

4. Candidates for training should ordinarily be not less than 18 nor more than 23 years of age on the date of admission to the College. The Chief Conservator may waive

the age limit in the case of men who appear to have special qualifications, or in cases where it is decided to nominate men from the Lower Subordinate Service. The candidates will be required to furnish with their applications the certificates enumerated below:—

(i) A certificate that the candidate is a "Native of India" as described in article 37 of the Civil Service Regulations.

(ii) A certificate of age.

(iii) A health certificate in the form prescribed by article 49 of the Civil Service Regulations (fifth edition), signed by a Commissioned Medical Officer or by a Medical Officer in charge of a Civil Station, and testifying to the candidate's sound constitution, good vision and hearing and general physical fitness for a rough outdoor life in the Forest Department, and to the fact that he bears marks of successful vaccination or of small-pox.

Note.—Any candidate is liable to further medical examination as directed by the Chief Conservator.

(iv) A certificate of respectability and good moral character from two or more persons whose social or official position can be accepted as a guarantee of trustworthiness.

(v) A certificate that the candidate has passed at least one or other of the following examinations, *viz.* :—

(a) the Matriculation examination;

(b) the School Final examination;

(c) the School Leaving certificate examination;

(d) for European candidates, a certificate of having passed the School examination.

N.B.—The certificates (iii) and (iv) must bear date not further back than July 1st of the year previous to that in which the candidate desires admission to the College.

5. The students selected under rule 3 will contract certain obligations and acquire certain privileges, *viz.* :—

(a) They must undergo 3½ months of practical training in such forests as may be prescribed and give proof of their fitness for forest work. Any selected candidate who fails in this test will not be allowed to proceed to the College except with the express permission of the Chief Conservator.

(b) They must sign an agreement binding themselves to work diligently while at the College, and to serve Government for not less than five years after passing out of the College.

(c) They must find sureties to execute a bond guaranteeing that under special circumstances they will refund all monies expended by Government on the student's education.

(d) They acquire the privilege of receiving a stipend during the period of training at the College, and a guarantee of an appointment worth not less than Rs. 50 per mensem, if they pass out satisfactorily.

(Forms of agreement and bond may be procured from the Chief Conservator.)

6. The Conservators in charge of Circles will be responsible for the preliminary training of students appointed by the Chief Conservator to their respective Circles for the purpose of being trained, and they will be empowered to pay such students a travelling allowance of Rs. 25 per mensem during the period of such training and actual travelling expenses from the place of their relief from the training when first joining the College, the class of railway fare being regulated under article 1011 of the Civil Service Regulations by the amount of their stipend.

7. While at the College, each selected candidate will receive a stipend of Rs. 50 per mensem payable from the date of his entry into the College. The selected candidate will be granted actual expenses on tour as passed by the Principal, including single third class fare by rail and single middle or second class fare by steamer for himself, fare of one servant and freight of a bicycle where necessary. The continuance of payment of the stipend will, however, be conditional upon a certificate being passed by the Principal at the end of each term that the student has made proper use of his opportunities for instruction during that term. Should the report of the Principal be unfavourable, the payment of the stipend will be stopped until such time as the Principal certifies that by his better application to work the student deserves to receive it; and arrears of stipend will then be paid to him. If, on the contrary, the report of the Principal at the end of the subsequent term should still be unfavourable, the student will forfeit his nomination and be withdrawn from the College.

PART II.

Lower Subordinate Forest Service.

8. Appointments to the classes of foresters in any grade shall be made by the Conservators of Circles:—

(a) by promotion of subordinates of long service and tried ability and probity, irrespective of the special training they may have undergone or the educational certificates they may have obtained;

(b) by promotion of subordinates, or direct appointment of candidates, who have undergone a course of training at any of the local forest schools or classes for instruction and obtained a certificate of competence and good conduct.

9. A seniority list of subordinates qualified or recommended for promotion in accordance with the preceding rule, and a list of candidates qualified for direct appointment in accordance with that rule, shall be kept by the Conservator in charge of a Circle, showing the educational qualifications of each man, the special training he may have undergone, and the opinions expressed from time to time regarding his suitability for promotion.

10. Forest guards will, as a rule, be recruited locally, but the Divisional Forest Officer shall not be debarred from appointing applicants other than local who possess other qualifications in addition to those of good physique, character, etc.

PART III.

General.

11. Government reserve to themselves the power to make appointments for exceptional reasons otherwise than in accordance with the foregoing rules.

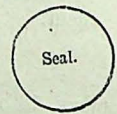

“ 3. Any male person being a Bachelor of Laws of the University of Bombay may be admitted to be an Advocate of this Court on presenting a petition to the Chief Justice and Judges annexing a certificate of good character and conduct signed by an Advocate of the Court and a certificate of having passed an examination in law to be held by persons appointed by the Chief Justice and Judges. The subjects for examination are until further order as follows :—

The several systems of law administered by the High Court as comprised under the following heads :—

- (1) Personal and Property Law, including the Hindu and Mahomedan Laws of Family and Succession, and the Indian Succession Act, 1865, and the Probate and Administration Act, 1881.
- (2) Contracts, Torts and the Penal Code.
- (3) Law of Evidence.
- (4) The procedure of the High Court in the exercise of its Civil and Criminal Jurisdiction on the Original and Appellate Sides.

Six papers will be set to the candidates as follow :—

1. Hindu and Mahomedan Law.
2. Criminal Law.
3. Equity and Property Law.
4. The Law of Succession.
5. Civil Procedure and Evidence.
6. Contracts and Torts.”

Substitute for rule 4 at page 48 :—

“ 4. No candidate shall present himself for examination within two years of the date on which he passed the examination for the degree of Bachelor of Laws.”

Substitute for rule 5 at page 48 :—

“ 5. In order to pass the examination a candidate must obtain at least 50 per cent. of the marks obtainable in each paper. An unsuccessful candidate shall not present himself again for examination within six months of his having failed. But he shall not be required to pass in any paper or papers in which he has obtained at a previous examination 50 per cent. of the marks obtainable in such paper or papers.”

Substitute for rule 7 at page 48 :—

“ 7. In the case of a Pleader of the High Court of not less than ten years' standing who is a Bachelor of Laws of the University of Bombay, and who has ceased to practise at least for one year prior to the date of his application, the Chief Justice and Judges may, in special cases, dispense with the examination required by rule 3.”

Substitute the following rule for rule 9 (i) in correction slip No. 11 at page 49 :—

“ 9. (i) An examination for the office of Vakil of this Court will be held twice a year in the months of February and August or in such other month and on such date as may be determined by the Honourable the Chief Justice and Judges. At least three months' notice of the exact date fixed for holding the examination will be given by publication in the *Government Gazette*.”

“ xi (a). If an unsuccessful candidate obtains 50 per cent. of the marks obtainable in one or more papers he shall not be required on the next occasion on which he offers himself for examination to be examined in such paper or papers.

Explanation.—Candidates who were unsuccessful at the examination held in February 1920 will be allowed to avail themselves of this rule.”

The "next" increment in the case of all officers, excepting those who have reached the maximum pay of Rs. 750 and those whose initial pay has been limited to Rs. 550, will fall due on 1st February 1921.
