The expenses incurred in connection with the burial of paupers who die within Cantonment limits will be defrayed from Cantonment Funds under the orders contained in the Circular from the Quarter Master General in India No. 18, dated the 20th March 1884. In the case of paupers who die out of Cantonment limits, the expenses will be defrayed by the Magistrate of the District.

I have the honour to state, for the information of the Secretary of State for India, that a Company registered as the ‘London Exhibitions, Limited,’ has decided to commence an annual series of exhibitions at Kensington, with one devoted to the arts and manufactures of the people of India, to be opened early in May 1895.

For this proposed series of exhibitions the Company has purchased the lease of the extensive grounds of the District Railway Company at Earl’s Court, Kensington, one of the most central and best known sites in London, and has entered into contracts for the erection of handsome and spacious buildings for the proper installation of exhibits, the present very scattered buildings not

being considered either suitable or worthy of the special exhibitions now contemplated.

As the first exhibition will be an elaborate illustration of the Arts and Industries of India, this Company is most solicitous that it shall in every way reflect credit upon Her Majesty’s Indian Empire. Very carefully considered arrangements are being made for the arrangement of a number of Indian artisans representative of the leading handicrafts and manufactures of that country. It is intended to instal these work-people in an artistic reproduction of some Indian streets, a market-place, bazaar, &c., somewhat like the Indian Palace of the Colonial and Indian Exhibition of 1886, which proved such a constant source of interest and instruction to many millions of the British public; but on a far more extensive and magnificent scale.

It is with special reference to this employment of natives of India at the exhibition that I am asked to address you. The Company wishes to take every possible precaution to ensure the comfort and well-being of the workers whilst in this country, and any advice or assistance the Government of India may be able to give the Company in this direction will be most gratefully received.

I am also to state that no pecuniary help is required from Government, and that the Company being composed of commercial men, they are of opinion that goods with the Indian retail prices affixed should not be exhibited, as this practice at past exhibitions has been found most detrimental to the interests of the Indian producers and to the importers, and for this reason no Government priced collections are desired.

The value of the exhibitions in developing trade is practically demonstrated by the immense increase in the consumption of Indian grown teas, which can be directly traced to the great and deserved stimulus given to them by their thorough representation at the Paris Exhibition of 1878. This Company is convinced that many other products of India only require to be better known to command equal success, and with this object in view they beg to state that they have decided to place at the disposal of the Government of India or any syndicate of planters or merchants which may be recommended by Government, a large and prominent space at the forthcoming exhibition for a thorough scientific and commercial representation of Indian tobacco, both in the raw state and in the process of manufacture.

In conclusion, I am to express the hope that the contemplated exhibition will favourably commend itself to the Secretary of State for India, and that the Government of India may be informed accordingly.”

“Letter from the Secretary and Director, Imperial Institute, London, No. R-¹/₅₅, dated 11th January 1895.

PHOTOGRAPHIC EXHIBITION, 1895.

In further reference to my letter of the 12th October last, No. 289/51, I have pleasure in transmitting for the information of Your Excellency and your Government one copy enclosed and six copies under separate cover, of the amended Circular concerning the abovenamed Exhibition.

I am acquainting His Excellency the Governor-General by this mail, that there can be allotted, if necessary, for the reception and display of exhibits from India, a portion of a Gallery measuring 67 feet long by 30' 6" wide, or allowing for the two necessary six foot gangways, a total floor area of 67 feet by 18' 6"=1,239' 6" square feet. The wall space attached to this area amounts on two sides to 67 feet by 10' 6", or a total wall space of $(67 \times 10' 6" \times 2) = 1,407$ square feet.

Your Excellency will note that the general Regulations provide that no exhibits should be received here after Saturday, April 27th, 1895, and that they should all be in place by Thursday, 2nd May 1895; but if it be found impossible to arrange for the exhibits from India to arrive here until some short time after the dates named, space can be reserved for their reception, provided that this office is acquainted at as early a date as possible of the amount of floor space or wall space which may be required.

It will probably be found that the exhibits from India may be included in such Divisions as 2B, 5G, and 7A and B, and will be such as may be displayed on screens. Possibly Your Excellency may see fit to communicate to His Excellency the Governor-General the amount of space which will be required by your Government in the Exhibition, in order that His Excellency may cause you to be informed, as soon as he has received replies from other parts of India, what portion of the space set aside may be allotted to your Government for that purpose.

May I ask that when Your Excellency causes the list of the proposed exhibits to be forwarded to me, I may at the same time be acquainted what are the wishes of your Government with reference to the disposal of these exhibits at the close of the Exhibition? It is possible that some of the photographs may be usefully added to the Indian Section of the Imperial Institute, and that others will be acceptable to scientific bodies, societies, or institutions in London.

DIVISION 2, SECTION A.—ARTISTIC PHOTOGRAPHY.

Exhibition of Photographic Pictures.

In this division will be included only such photographs as have distinct artistic merit. It is hoped that all schools of artistic photography may be represented, and contributions, whether new or previously exhibited pictures, are invited from Home, Colonial and Indian photographers. Contributions from the representatives of deceased artists (except such works as might better be displayed in the Historical Division) will also be welcomed.

The maximum number of pictures that may be sent in by any one exhibitor will be six.

A selection will be made by the Committee, whose decision will be final.

The Exhibition will open early in May 1895, and will remain open till about the middle of September or probably a little later.

No charge will be made for space occupied by pictures accepted for this Section.

Each picture should be separately framed. On the back of the frame must be written the name and address of the Exhibitor, with the title or description of the picture, and the number (if there is more than one) corresponding to the number in the entry form. (Entry form is attached.)

The entry form must be sent with the pictures or previously.

The pictures must be received not later than Monday, 15th April 1895, at 12 noon.

They must be addressed "Exhibition of Photography," Division 2, Imperial Institute, London, S.W.

Pictures must be delivered, carriage paid, at the Imperial Institute, or by hand between 10-0 a.m. and 4-0 p.m. (1 o'clock on Saturdays).

The Imperial Institute will unpack, repack, and dispatch, carriage forward, all exhibits sent in cases, which may be selected by the Committee of Advice.

Every care will be taken of exhibits, but the Institute will not be responsible for loss or damage.

The Executive Council of the Imperial Institute having determined that the United Kingdom Section of the Institute will be for the present best utilised and the resources of the Home Country effectively displayed by a series of exhibits, illustrative of the progress and present condition of leading industries and manufactures of Great Britain and Ireland, such as the Pottery, China and Glass Exhibition of 1894, arrangements are being made for holding during the forthcoming Summer Season, 1895, a Special Exhibition of Photography in its Application to the Arts, Sciences and Industries throughout the Empire.

The Exhibition will include examples which may be received from the Colonies and India.

The gentlemen whose names are given on the first page of this circular have consented to serve, and have been appointed by the Executive Council as a Committee of Advice in connection with the Exhibition.

The Exhibition, which will be open daily (except Sundays) from 11 A.M. until 11 P.M. from the middle of May to the middle of September 1895, will be divided into the following Seven Classes :—

The Imperial Institute, in pursuance of its objects as defined by the Royal Charter, which include the encouragement and development of British manufactures and industries, will provide attendants, lighting, and all needful supervision and general facilities incidental to the Exhibition as a whole.

Exhibitors will be expected to provide, at their own cost, the Exhibits, Glass Cases and Fittings, and to incur the cost of transit to and from the Institute, and of the necessary attendants for the installation and arrangement of the Exhibits.

As regards processes, the Imperial Institute will be prepared to receive applications, and to provide motive power to a moderate extent, for the display of such processes, subject to the Executive Council being of opinion that the utility and attractiveness of the process to be illustrated is sufficient to justify the outlay thereby involved.

The Committee of Advice has selected and recommended to the Council a preliminary list of Firms to whom invitations to exhibit are being transmitted, but applications for permission to exhibit will be received from individuals and firms from all parts of the British Empire.

No Sales will be allowed in the Exhibition Galleries, but Exhibitors will be permitted to take orders for articles at the Exhibition. No circulars or trade cards must be distributed by Exhibitors.

A Catalogue will be issued and sold in the Exhibition, in which a reasonable description of the Exhibits, and of any special features to which attention is called by the manufacturers, may be inserted free of charge.

All Exhibits, Glass Cases, Fittings, &c., must arrive at the Institute not later than noon on SATURDAY, APRIL 27th, 1895. No Cases or Exhibits will be received after that date. The Exhibits must be installed and arranged in their cases not later than noon on THURSDAY, 2nd MAY 1895.

Screens or other erections must not exceed 8 feet in height.

The passage way indicated in the plan must be preserved throughout the whole length of the gallery.

2. A similar application was submitted from the President's office in the year 1890-91 which was for Rs. 2,00,000, the old estimated cost of the project being Rs. 2,96,899. The excess of Rs. 2,90,363 over the former estimate is due to the change of site and extra excavations to obtain hard foundations up to the depth of the rock and the additional masonry required consequent thereon. The new amount of the revised estimate was sanctioned by the Municipality on the 25th November 1893.

5. It may be seen from the above that the Municipality must provide for Rs. 5,25,473, out of which they intend to borrow Rs. 4,85,000 in the bazar at 4 per cent. per annum.

6. The accompanying Statement A. gives the particulars required by Rule 5 of the Rules relating to the loans now solicited.

7. It is contemplated that the loan will spread over thirty years, which period, the Municipal Commissioners hope, may be sanctioned, as the intended project, which costs nearly six lakhs of Rupees, is of the utmost public utility not only for the limited area of the municipal district, but for the benefit of thousands and hundred thousands of pilgrims that repair to Pandharpur from all parts of India every year. The importance of the work has been recognized by Government in paragraph 19 of their Resolution No. 8053, dated 23rd October 1889.

Statement showing particulars pursuant to Rule 5 of the Rules published by the Government of India for the raising of Loans by Local Authorities.

- I.—The loan is required for the construction of a masonry bridge across the river Bhima at Pandharpur. Plans, together with a detailed estimate of the cost, have already been passed and sanctioned by Government in their Resolution No. 3508, dated 17th September 1894. The whole bridge according to the estimate costs Rs. 5,87,562.
- II.—The amount proposed to be borrowed is Rs. 4,85,000 at four per cent. per annum.
- III.—The general revenues of the Pandharpur Municipality, together with the proposed tax on the Maghi Fair and collections from the levy of the tolls on the bridge, are offered as security.
- IV.—The laws under which the funds, duties, taxes, rates, cesses, &c., are levied, received and held, and which make up the above revenue, are Acts VI of 1873 and II of 1884.
- V.—The money which it is proposed to borrow is to be received by two instalments, as given below :—

- VI.—It is proposed to discharge the loan raised by half-yearly instalments in thirty years. The instalments of repayments will be as given in the accompanying Statement B. The first and the last instalments will be Rs. 15,000 and 8,320 respectively. The second, third and fourth will not be less than Rs. 25,000 each. From the 5th to the 28th instalment not less than Rs. 29,000 each. Commencing from the year 1896-97 the loan will be paid off in the year 1924-25.
- VII.—A detailed account of the revenue and expenditure of the Pandharpur Municipality during the past three years is herewith appended, C and D.
- VIII.—There are no prior charges upon the funds of the Municipality.

SIR,

I am directed to acknowledge the receipt of your letter No. 7447, dated the 6th September 1894, making enquiries as to the liability of certain articles to assessment under Schedule II of the Indian Tariff Act, 1894.

2. I am to observe that under this schedule, as amended on 27th December last by Act XVI of 1894, *first*, every article that is ordinarily known as 'ammunition' or 'military stores' will be assessed as such, unless it is specifically mentioned in another schedule of the Act; and, *secondly*, such other articles (if any) will be so assessed as the Governor General in Council may declare to be 'ammunition' or 'military stores' for tariff purposes.

3. Applying these principles to the specific instances mentioned in your letter, it will be evident—

- (1) that gunwads, wire cartridges, and bullets, being ordinarily known as 'ammunition' are chargeable with duty under Schedule II of the Tariff Act; while
- (2) sulphur, lead, and bird-shot, being specifically mentioned in Schedule IV, and not having been declared to be 'ammunition' or 'military stores' for the purposes of the Tariff Amendment Act, are chargeable with duty at 5 per cent. under the appropriate heads of Schedule IV.

5. His Excellency will be received at the Bandar by His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief and Staff; His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief, of Her Majesty's Naval Forces in India, if in Bombay; the Chief Justice of Bombay, the Lord Bishop, the Members of Council, the Judges of the High Court, the Additional Members of the Council of His Excellency the Governor for making Laws and Regulations, the Vice-Chancellor of the University of Bombay, the Roman Catholic Archbishop, the Secretaries to Government, the Archdeacon of Bombay, the Senior Naval Officer at the Station, in the absence of His Excellency the Naval Commander-in-Chief, the Brigadier-General Commanding the Bombay District, the Naval Officers Commanding any of Her Majesty's Ships in Harbour, if able to attend on shore, the Director of the Royal Indian Marine, the Private Secretary and the Staff of His Excellency the Governor, the Municipal Commissioner, the Under Secretaries to Government, and the Heads of Departments, Civil and Military, the Sheriff of Bombay or such of the above high officials as are then in the Presidency Town, for whom a space marked A will be reserved.

6. An enclosed space marked B will be reserved at the Bandar for any Native Chiefs who, being in Bombay, may have intimated to the Secretary to Government, Political Department, their desire to be present.

7. The Consular representatives of Foreign Governments and the President of the Bombay Corporation are invited to be present on the occasion and a space marked C will be reserved for them at the Bandar.

8. All other officers of Her Majesty's Services, Civil, Naval, Military and the Royal Indian Marine, and officers belonging to Corps of Volunteers, then in Bombay, will be provided with seats as far as space is available. To all such who wish to attend cards of admission to space D will be supplied on application to the Executive Engineer of the Presidency. The same officer will also issue cards of admission to space A to any Heads of Departments, not specified by name in paragraph 5, who may intimate that they will be present. For all other officials and persons mentioned in paragraphs 5, 6 and 7 no cards will be necessary. As far as accommodation in space E is available it will be allotted to any Ladies or Gentlemen who may apply for tickets to the Executive Engineer. The arrangements at the Bandar will be made by the Public Works Department.

9. The Commissioner of Police will arrange for the maintenance of order and for keeping the streets clear.

10. Full Dress will be worn by all officers of Government entitled to wear uniform and morning dress by all others.

11. All honours due to the Governor of Bombay will be paid to Lord Harris until he passes Aden.
