There was thus a net increase in Revenue of Rs. 3,89,042 and a net saving of Rs. 44,277 in Expenditure as compared with the figures of the previous year. The more important variations under the several heads are explained below:—

The decrease under *Land Revenue* is nominal, and arises chiefly in connection with the book adjustments of Alienated Land Revenue, which were Rs. 2,11,753 less than the adjustments made in 1892-93. There was also a smaller payment of Rs. 35,626 by Imperial to Provincial for services rendered by the latter to Imperial in 1893-94, but on the other hand there was a considerable improvement in the Divisible Land

Revenue collections which were Rs. 2,33,724 ($\frac{1}{4}$ th of Rs. 9,34,897, the total collections) in excess of those of 1892-93, so that on the whole there was a net decrease of Rs. 13,656 only. The smaller adjustments of Alienated Land Revenue were almost wholly in the Hyderabad and Shikárpur Districts, due in Hyderabad to a survey of the holdings of Jáhirdárs under which assessments have been fixed only on lands fit for cultivation, whereas prior to 1893-94 the whole of the holdings, including uncultivable waste lands, were assessed, and also to the lapsing to Government of certain jáhirs on the deaths of the holders, while those in Shikárpur were also attributable to Survey operations on jáhír lands and partly to less cultivation. The improvement in the actual collections of Land Revenue was due to larger recoveries in the Surat, Khándesh, Poona, Hyderabad, Karáchi, and Shikárpur Districts. In Surat the improvement was attributed partly to the collection of arrears of the previous year and partly to advance payments, while that in Khándesh was wholly due to revised rates of assessments. In Poona the improvement was partly due to the same cause as in Khándesh and partly to larger realisations of fluctuating items. That in Hyderabad resulted from extended rabi cultivation. In Karáchi and Shikárpur there was also a considerable increase, due in the former to the recovery of large outstandings of the previous year, and in the latter to extended rabi cultivation owing to favourable floods. On the other hand, there was a falling off in the Broach District owing to the actuals of 1892-93 having been exceptionally high. The small falling off under *Salt* was in Miscellaneous items, while the considerable decrease under *Stamps* was mainly owing to the fact that the receipts for 1892-93 included such special items as the probate duty on the estate of a wealthy citizen of Bombay and the composition of stamp duty chargeable on the debentures of the Bombay and Karáchi Port Trusts. The increase under *Excise* was chiefly due to the issue of a large amount of spirit free of duty in 1892-93, which reduced the receipts of that year, to the recovery of arrears, and to a good season. The better results under *Customs* were due chiefly to larger receipts in 1893-94 from transhipment fees owing to the re-export of kerosine oil to foreign parts being greater in 1893-94 than in 1892-93 and to these fees being now levied on all goods liable to duty under the new Customs Tariff Act. The decrease under *Assessed Taxes* was due to a falling off in the income liable to taxation, the result of stagnation of trade owing to the disturbance in Exchange and the accumulation of surplus stocks in China. The large improvement under *Forests* was chiefly in the Southern and Northern Circles. In the former the increase occasioned by prosperity in the districts and consequent high prices was emphasised by the fact that the demand for forest produce in 1892-93 was unusually small owing to the agricultural distress then prevailing. In the Northern Circle the improvement was due to the exceptionally high prices received for the coupes sold in both the Thána Divisions. In the Central Circle the better results were occasioned by higher prices obtained at timber sales and by larger receipts from grazing and fodder grass. The increase under *Registration* was due to a good season and to the growing appreciation of the advantages of registration, while that under *Interest* was chiefly due to larger advances having been made to cultivators out of the funds at the disposal of the Local Government. The decrease under *Law and Justice* was due to the actuals of 1892-93 having been unduly swollen by some special receipts in connection with the sale proceeds of unclaimed and escheated property, but the difference due to this cause was however partially counterbalanced by larger recoveries in the following year of fees in pauper suits and larger recoveries under other items. The improvement under *Jails* was due partly to larger recoveries of transportation and Jail charges from Native States and partly to larger receipts from Jail manufactures. On the other hand, the large falling off under *Police* was due to the payment in 1892-93 by the Bombay Port Trust of contributions towards the cost of the Harbour Police in arrears from 1888-89 and to a special adjustment in the same year for value of muskets returned to the Ordnance Department in connection with the re-arming of the Mofassil and Agency Police. The dulness of the shipping business during the earlier part of the year accounts for the small falling off under *Marine*. The improvement under *Education* was due chiefly to a larger attendance of students in both Colleges and Secondary Schools, while that under *Receipts in aid of Superannuation* was accounted for by an increase in the number of officers on foreign service. The improvement under *Miscellaneous* was due partly to a portion of the sale proceeds of the Bhadgaon farm having been credited to Provincial under this head under orders of the Government of India and partly to sale proceeds of the Nazrána received at the Darbár held at Ahmedabad in November 1893. The increase in *Contributions from Local to Provincial* was due to the services of all Local Fund vaccinators being now treated as foreign service of the third kind, while that under *State Railways* was due to the Hyderabad-Umarkot Railway having been open for traffic during the whole year, whereas in 1892-93 it was working for a portion of the year only. The improvement under *Public Works* was under all the sub-heads, but chiefly under "Tolls" and "Fines, Refunds and Miscellaneous."

EXPENDITURE.

The charges under the head *Refunds and Drawbacks* depend upon the corresponding Revenue heads, and as the receipts from Land Revenue and Excise were high, the refunds were also higher than in 1892-93. On the other hand, a special refund in 1892-93 to the Bombay Port Trust in connection with the composition of stamp duty on the Prince's Dock Loan and a special refund in the same year of Income Tax recovered from the employés of the G. I. P. Railway residing in the Berárs and His Highness the Nizám's Dominions, more than counterbalanced the excess under Land Revenue and Excise, so that on the whole there was a net decrease of Rs. 10,698 as compared with the actuals of 1892-93. The large decrease under *Assignments and Compensations* was chiefly due to special arrear payments having been made in 1892-93 and to smaller adjustments in connection with Alienated Land Revenue for the reasons given above under I. — Land Revenue, while that under *Land Revenue* was chiefly due to the consolidation of the appointment of Survey Commissioner with that of Director of Land Records and Agriculture, to the gradual reduction in the expenditure of professional survey charges, and to the actuals of 1892-93 having been swollen by some exceptional payments to village officers. The savings due to the above causes were however to a great extent counterbalanced by Exchange Compensation Allowances and by increased expenditure arising from a further extension of the new Agricultural staff. The excess expenditure under *Forests* was due to extended operations, to Exchange compensation allowance, and to the appointment of an Extra Assistant Conservator in the Southern Circle, while that under *Registration* was due to an increase in commissions to sub-registrars and village registrars arising out of the *per contra* improvement in the revenue. The

increase in *Interest on Ordinary Debt* represented interest paid to the Government of India on the additional funds allotted to the local Government for loan purposes. There were considerable fluctuations both of increase and decrease in the several minor heads included under *General Administration*, but they more or less balanced each other, and the increase of Rs. 9,303 is chiefly to be attributed to the Exchange Compensation Allowances. The large excess under *Law and Justice—Courts of Law* may be ascribed partly to Exchange Compensation Allowance and partly to a larger number of District officers being on duty in 1893-94, while that under *Jails* was due to some special miscellaneous expenditure incurred at the Nára Jail and to larger purchases of raw materials. The increase under *Police* was due to extra expenditure caused by the addition to the strength of the Presidency Town Police sanctioned by the Secretary of State, to a refund to the Bombay Municipality of contribution over-paid in 1892-93, and to Exchange Compensation Allowances. The increase was to some extent counterbalanced by the transfer of the charge of the Sind section of the North-Western Railway Police from 1st September 1893 to the Punjab Government and by a special payment in 1892-93 to Shetsandis in the Bijapur District as extra family allowance, which was not repeated in the year under report. The increase under *Marine* was due chiefly to the cost of 200 tons of coal supplied to the Sultan of Zanzibar's S.S. "Avoca" in connection with the rescue of pilgrims from the S.S. "Khiva" destroyed by fire off the Coast of Arabia, while that under *Education* was due to an increase in the salary of Sub-Deputy Inspectors, to Exchange Compensation Allowances, to larger expenditure on Europe stores, and in payments in support of Municipal schools. The increased expenditure under *Medical* was chiefly due to Exchange Compensation Allowances, but payments to officers of other Provinces and the charges for Local Fund vaccinators were also greater in 1893-94 than in 1892-93. The increase under *Political* was also principally due to Exchange Compensation Allowances, other causes being the non-recovery within the year of certain contributions which are brought to account by deduction from the charges, special expenditure incurred in connection with a Darbár held at Ahmedabad, and the purchase of horses for the Rájá of Kolhápúr on the occasion of his accession to the *gadi*.

The excess under *Superannuation Allowances* was due to larger expenditure on pensions, a portion of which arose in connection with the reductions in the Survey Department, while that under *Stationery and Printing* was chiefly due to larger supplies from Central Stores to Government offices. The decrease under *Miscellaneous* resulted mainly from special expenditure incurred in 1892-93 in connection with the Deccan Agriculturists' Relief Act, while that under *Civil Works* by Civil Officers was due to special charges having been incurred in 1892-93 on wells and water works in connection with the distress then prevailing in certain districts. The increase under *Contributions from Provincial to Local* was chiefly due to larger grants for village sanitation. The decrease under *Construction of Railways* was due to the completion of the Hyderabad-Umarkot Railway, while the increase in *Working Expenses* was due to that railway having been in working order for the whole of the year, whereas in the previous year the line was opened only on 18th August 1892. The increase under *Irrigation Minor Works* was due to the settlement of claims for land compensation in connection with the Gokák Canal Works. The decrease in *Civil Works* by Public Works Officers is due to smaller expenditure on Original Works and Establishment charges.

Out of the large decrease under *Land Revenue*, Rs. 2,35,000 are nominal, as it arises in connection with the book adjustments "Assessments of alienated lands less quit-rents," and is counterbalanced by a corresponding diminution on the expenditure side. The decrease is almost wholly in the Sind districts of Hyderabad and Shikárpur as already explained when comparing the two years' actuals. The remaining decrease about 4 lákhs (in divisible revenue), of which $\frac{1}{4}$ th represents the Provincial share, is briefly due (1) to over-estimates in certain districts in connection with revision survey rates, (2) to large remissions being necessary in the Sind districts of Karáchi, Hyderabad, and Shikárpur, owing to submission of kharif crops caused by floods and breaches in several river embankments, and (3) to smaller sales of occupancy rights than were originally anticipated. The improvement under *Stamps* is chiefly apparent in sale of Court-fee Stamps, while that under *Excise* arises chiefly in the receipts from "Transit duty on Excise Opium." The better results under *Customs* are owing mainly to the duty under the Tariff Act of 1894 being levied on a greater Import Trade than was anticipated when the budget was framed. The improvement in the *Forest Revenue* is chiefly under Head II—Timber and other produce removed from the forests by consumers, &c. The better results are expected in all four Circles, and are reported to be due in Sind chiefly to a demand for sleepers and fuel from the forests of the Jerruck and Thar and Párkar Districts. In the Northern Circle the improvement is reported to be due to exceptionally high prices having been obtained for "coupes" in both the Thána Divisions and to unforeseen fellings in málki lands in the West Thána Division, while that in the Central Circle is stated to be due to a further development of the "coupe" system, to better prices having been offered for teak trees, and to better sales of firewood and charcoal. In the Southern Circle the improvement is also due to better prices and to larger sales of bamboos, and other minor produce than was originally anticipated. The falling off under *Registration* is due to too great an allowance having been made in the original estimate for a progressive increase over the actuals of 1893-94, while that under *Courts of Law* is due to less revenue being now expected under "Sale proceeds of unclaimed and Escheated property" and in "General fees, fines and forfeitures" than were originally anticipated. The decrease under *Jails* is mainly due to the non-employment of convict gangs in Sind and the Deccan owing to most of the large works having been completed. The better results under *Police* are chiefly due to recoveries in connection with the large punitive force now stationed in the Násik District in connection with the riots at that place, while those under *Marine* are due to the recovery from the Agents of the S.S. "Khiva" of the value of the coal supplied to the Sultan of Zanzibar's S.S. "Avoca" in connection with the rescue by the latter of the pilgrims from the former vessel on its destruction by fire in 1893-94 off the Coast of Arabia. The improvement under *Medical* is chiefly due to the recovery in the current year of two years' contribution from the Bombay Port Trust towards the cost of the European General Hospital. The falling off under *Superannuation* is due to smaller contributions received from officers in foreign service owing to several of them having reverted, retired, or proceeded on furlough. The improvement under *Miscellaneous* is due to certain special receipts, of which the most important are the assets of unclaimed estates of over 15 years' standing in the hands of the Administrator General and the credit to Provincial of the balance of the Cotton Gin Factory Fund which has been closed. Higher toll receipts account for the increase under *Public Works*.

EXPENDITURE.

Under *Assignments and Compensations* the real saving is Rs. 22,000 only, the remainder being on account of the decrease in alienated revenue referred to above under "1. Land Revenue." The saving in the cash payments is chiefly due to the arrears provided for Mahád Hakdárs not being required in the current year and to other small savings spread over several heads. The savings under *Land Revenue* are spread over all the minor heads, and may briefly be described to be due in the "Charges for District Administration," to savings in establishment charges, allowances, and supplies and services: in the charges for "Survey and Settlement" to arrear recoveries from Táluqdári Estates, to a sufficient deduction not having been made for "probable savings" in salaries and to a transfer of Rs. 11,800 from the grants for cadastral maps to the Public Works Estimates: in "Land Records and Agriculture" to the non-introduction within the year of the new Agricultural Staff in the Kolába District and to large savings in the grant for boundary marks expenditure in Sind owing to the recoveries being far in excess of the expenditure. Considerable savings are also anticipated in the cash payments to District and Village Officers. Under *Forests* the chief decrease is in the Sind Circle and is reported to be due to a smaller quantity of locomotive fuel having been supplied to the North-Western Railway, to an arrangement having been made with the railway to take the fuel required for the Kotri Station direct from a contractor, whereby the gross receipts will be reduced, but a corresponding increase in net profits will ensue, and to similar arrangements having been made in regard to firewood indented for by the Port Engineer, Karáchi Harbour Works. There are savings in other Circles also, but they are not of any importance. The encouragement of agricultural loans is increasing the claim of the Imperial Government for *Interest* on Provincial Advance and Loan Account. The small fluctuations under *Registration*, *Post Office*, and *General Administration* call for no special remarks. On the other hand the decrease under *Courts of Law* is chiefly under the minor heads "Civil and Sessions Courts" and "Criminal Courts," and may briefly be described to be due in the former to large savings in salaries partially due to a fewer number of Assistant Judges being actually on duty than were provided for and to decreased expenditure in allowances and supplies and services. In "Criminal Courts" the chief savings are also in salaries owing partially to several Cantonment Magistrates being on leave out of India, their appointments being held by officers on reduced salaries. There are also savings in supplies and services. Under *Jails* the chief savings are under supplies and services, particularly in the charges for "rations" in the District Jails, Lock-ups, and convict camps. There are also savings in establishment charges which are partially due to the lump provision of Rs. 4,000 for improving the pay of warders not being required. The special provision of

Rs. 2,500 for increasing the diet and scale of certain classes of prisoners was also saved. The large saving under *Police* is spread over several heads, but may briefly be described to be due (1) to larger recoveries from the Bombay Municipality including arrears for 1893-94, (2) to the Police on the Sind section of the North-Western Railway having been transferred to the Punjab Government and the grant on that account having been saved, (3) to the provision of Rs. 75,000 for the reorganization scheme in Sind not being fully required, and (4) to savings under "Supplies and Services" chiefly in ammunition charges for the District Force and under "Village" and "Special Police." The chief saving under *Education* is in grants-in-aid chiefly in connection with the transfer of grants for building purposes (Rs. 84,000) to the Public Works Estimates and (Rs. 15,000) to the adjusting head "Contributions from Provincial to Local." Savings are also anticipated in the grants "Government Schools, General" and "Special" and in "Scholarships." Smaller salary payments and a change in the system of accounts by which certain grants-in-aid to hospitals and dispensaries have been transferred to the adjusting head "Contributions from Provincial to Local" account for the savings under *Medical*, while those under *Political* are due to the recovery of arrears in Káthiáwár and Pálanpur and to smaller charges for Darbár presents. The delay in the opening of the Surat farm and the failure of the Reay Museum Committee to claim the grant provided for them are the chief causes of the saving under *Scientific and other Minor Departments*. The charges for *Superannuation Allowances* are rising yearly in consequence of increases to the pension list: hence the increase of Rs. 31,000 under that head. The savings under *Stationery and Printing* are in the charges for Supplies and Services for the Stationery Office at the Presidency and for the Government Central Press, while those under *Miscellaneous* are due to small savings under several minor heads, which do not call for special remarks. The decrease under *Contributions from Provincial to Local* is due to the transfer of certain amounts to the Public Works Estimates, and partly to the grant for village sanitation not being fully utilized. The excess under *Public Works* is due to the transfer of funds for departmental works.

The original Budget estimate of the current year provided for the minimum closing balance of 20 lakhs on 31st March 1895, which has now, in accordance with the Revised Estimate, improved to Rs. 31,13,000. The better results are due (1) to a larger opening balance than was taken for the Budget on the results of the actuals for 1893-94 being known, and (2) to savings in expenditure as explained above.

R., dated the 10th January 1895, the Governor General in Council is pleased to direct that the duty of five per cent, *ad valorem*, leviable under No. 15 of Schedule IV of the Indian Tariff Act (VIII of 1894) as amended by Act XVI of 1894 on the following descriptions of iron and steel, namely :—

- (1) iron, bar, of any kind not specified in that number;
- (2) steel, cast and blistered, of any kind not specified in that number;
- (3) steel bar and blooms;
- (4) steel angle, channel and spring;
- (5) steel nails;

shall be reduced to one per cent. *ad valorem*.

SIR,

As it has been brought to the notice of the Government of India that doubts have arisen as to the proper mode and rate of assessment to customs duty of various descriptions of galvanised or tinned iron and steel if imported under the provisions of the Tariff Amendment Act, XVI of 1894, I am desired to request that Collectors of Customs may be instructed that galvanised or tinned iron or steel of any of the descriptions specified in No. 15 of Schedule IV of Act XVI of 1894, or in any notifications issued subsequently to the passing of that Act under the provisions of section 22 or 23 of the Sea Customs Act, VIII of 1878, must be held to be a species of iron or steel coming under such general description, that is to say, galvanised or tinned iron wire, rivets, washers, etc., or galvanised steel plates, sheets, wire, etc., are still iron wire, rivets and washers, and steel plates, sheets and wire: and unless specifically distinguished in the Schedule of the Tariff Amendment Act as altered by Notifications under sections 22 and 23 of the Sea Customs Act, the galvanised descriptions are assessable to duty precisely as if they were ungalvanised.

2. Galvanised iron and steel are, however, generally of greater value than other kinds of iron and steel coming under the same general description. Where, therefore, the general description is assessed to duty *ad valorem*, the galvanised kinds will be fully assessed under the above instructions, but in the case of iron and steel of descriptions on which duty is levied on a fixed Tariff valuation, it is necessary to prescribe separate valuations for the galvanised kinds; and the Governor General in Council has accordingly issued a Notification, No. 599 S.R., dated the 1st February 1895, in which the descriptions most commonly imported are specified.

3. The opportunity has been taken to alter the Tariff valuation on steel wire, which enquiry has shown to be incorrect.

4. For the guidance of Collectors of Customs and the convenience of the public, I am to point out that, as regards iron and steel, No. 15 of the Schedule as so altered stands as in the appendix to this letter.

5. I am to request that if duty has been levied at a higher rate than the rate admissible under the Schedule entry as reproduced in the appendix on any descriptions of iron or steel imported since the 27th December 1894, the duty so levied in excess may be refunded to the parties concerned.

6. I am to take this opportunity of explaining that the intention of the amended Tariff Act and its Schedule was to specify and tax at one per cent. all iron and steel imported for the purpose of being worked up into manufactures, and to tax at five per cent. such manufactures of iron and steel as might reasonably be treated as hardware. I am to request that Collectors of Customs may be informed accordingly, and instructed to report at once for orders any case in which that purpose appears likely to be defeated, owing either to the unintentional omission of any sort of iron or steel which is of the class that is imported merely to be worked up, or to the unintentional inclusion of any descriptions of those metals which ought properly to be regarded as hardware or manufactures.

Captain S. W. Lincoln, Indian Staff Corps, Deputy Assistant Commissary General, First Class, to be Assistant Commissary General, Fourth Class; * * * * * with effect from the 4th February 1895, vice Colonel J. L. Fagan, Assistant Commissary General, Second Class, who has vacated."

No. 84.—The following General Order by the Government of India, No. 134 dated 8th February 1895, is republished:—

"FURLOUGH AND LEAVE

No. 134.—With reference to the orders quoted in the margin, the following subsidiary instructions regarding the grant of furlough and leave to officers, the maintenance of their records of service, and for the preparation of their furlough and pension statements, furlough certificates, etc., are issued for the guidance of all concerned:

RECORDS OF SERVICE.

2. The records of service for furlough, pension and promotion of all officers of the Indian Staff Corps, Indian Army, including cadres of the late Indian Artillery and Engineers, Indian Medical Service, officers of Royal Engineers who have elected for continuous service in India, and of Royal Artillery who have been selected for continuous service in the Ordnance Department or are serving with Native Batteries of Artillery, which are now kept up in the Military Department of the Government of India and in the offices of the Adjutant Generals, Bombay and Madras Armies, will, from the 1st April 1895 (with the exceptions mentioned in paragraphs 3, 4, and 5 following), be kept up by the Controllers of Military Accounts of the four Commands, to whom they will be transferred in due course.

3. The records of service of all officers of the Military Works Department, including attached officers (with the exception of those* of the Inspector of Sub-Marine Defences and the officers of the Sub-Marine Mining Company), will be transferred to, and be kept up by, the Examiner of Military Works Accounts.

4. The records of service of officers of the Hyderabad Contingent will be transferred to, and be maintained by, the Comptroller, Hyderabad.

5. The records of service of officers employed in the local corps under the Foreign Department, will be kept up in the office of the Controller of Military Accounts, Bombay Command.

6. When an officer is admitted to the Staff Corps or the Indian Medical Service, or, if belonging to the Royal Engineers, when he elects for continuous service in India, or when an officer of the Royal Artillery is selected for continuous

* These will be kept up by the Controller of Military Accounts of the Command in which the officer may be serving.

service in the Ordnance Department, or joins a Native Battery of Artillery (batteries of the Hyderabad Contingent excepted), the Controllers of Military Accounts, the Examiner of Military Works Accounts, or the Comptroller, Hyderabad, as the case may be, will obtain the necessary information from the proper authority, and cause a sheet to be opened for recording the particulars of his service for leave, pension, and promotion.

7. The Controllers of Military Accounts, the Examiner of Military Works Accounts, and the Comptroller, Hyderabad, will be respectively responsible that the records of service in their charge are correctly maintained. They should see that they are always kept up to date, and are completed with all necessary particulars affecting an officer's service for furlough, pension, and promotion, any information that may be wanting being obtained from the proper authorities.

8. When an officer is permanently transferred from one station or appointment to another, necessitating the transfer of his record of service from one office to another (paragraphs 2 to 5), his record of service will be completed up to the date from which his transfer has effect; thereafter the responsibility for the correctness of his record of service will rest with the office to which it is transferred.

FURLOUGH AND LEAVE.

9. On and after the 1st April 1895, applications for furlough or leave under military rules from officers, whether in military or civil employ, will be submitted through the Controller of Military Accounts, the Examiner of Military Works Accounts, or the Comptroller, Hyderabad, as the case may be, who will forward them to the sanctioning authority, stating the furlough or leave regulations to which the officer is subject; and in addition—

- (a) if the applicant is subject to the Regulations of 1868 or 1875—the particular rule or rules of the regulations under which the furlough is admissible;
- (b) if the applicant is subject to the leave rules for the Staff Corps—*what year of service he has entered upon, and the date on which that year commenced; or
- (c) if he is subject to the leave rules applicable to regimental officers of the British Army serving in India, or article 704, Army Regulations, India, Volume I, Part I,—that the leave is admissible under those rules or under the article quoted.

10. In the case of officers in civil employ proceeding on furlough under the military furlough regulations of 1868 or 1875, the Controller of Military Accounts, the Examiner of Military Works Accounts, or the Comptroller, Hyderabad, as the case may be, will furnish the civil auditors concerned with the certificates (Form B-1, B-2, D, E, 5A, or 5B) required by articles 933 and 934a, Civil Service Regulations. Certificates in forms B-1 and D for officers entitled to furlough pay at the rate of 2s. the rupee should be issued on blue paper.

* This report is not necessary in the case of leave in India, where it will be sufficient to say that the leave is admissible under the leave rules for the Staff Corps.

11. In the case of an officer subject to the Civil Leave Rules in which the Civil Audit Officer concerned may require information necessary to calculate furlough under article 338 (b), Civil Service Regulations, the Controller of Military Accounts, in charge of the officer's record of service, will issue a certificate (Form IV) shewing the amount of furlough earned by the officer under military rules on the date of his becoming subject to the leave rules for the Staff Corps. No such certificate is necessary unless the officer comes under clause (i) or clause (iii) of the article quoted. If coming under clause (ii), it will be sufficient to issue a statement on Form V, with a foot-note to the effect that the officer's furlough has to be calculated in accordance with that clause.

12. When the grant of furlough or leave out of India (elsewhere than to the Colonies) has been gazetted or notified, the Controller of Military Accounts, the Examiner of Military Works Accounts, or the Comptroller, Hyderabad, as the case may be, will forward to the Under Secretary of State for India a statement of the officer's service prepared on Form III or IIIa according as the officer is subject to the furlough regulations of 1868 or 1875, or to the leave rules for the Staff Corps. No such statement of service is required in the case of officers of the British Army serving in India proceeding on furlough under British Leave Rules or article 704, Army Regulations, India, Volume I, Part I.

13. In notifying a grant of furlough or leave, care should be taken that the phraseology of the order is in strict accordance with that now adopted in G. G. O. in similar cases.

14. After the furlough or leave has appeared in orders, the authority notifying it will, in the case of furlough or leave out of India (elsewhere than to the Colonies) on medical certificate, forward the medical statement of the officer's case to the Under Secretary of State for India.

15. Local Governments and Heads of Civil Departments, when granting furlough or leave to a military officer in civil employ, will forward a copy of the order or notification to the Controller of Military Accounts, or the Comptroller, Hyderabad, as the case may be, as also to the Military Department; and the Civil Audit Officer will keep the Controller of Military Accounts and the Military Department informed of the date of the beginning and ending of all such furlough or leave.

16. All reports of officers' arrival from, and departure on, furlough or leave in or out of India with dates of embarkation, and debarkation, as well as those of being struck off or of resuming duty, should be forwarded to the Controller of Military Accounts of the Command in which the officer may be serving or to the Examiner of Military Works Accounts or the Comptroller, Hyderabad, as the case may be. A copy of the monthly return of dates of arrival or departure of officers now furnished by the Deputy Assistant Adjutant General, Bombay District, to the Military Department of the Government will, in future, be supplied by the Staff Officer at the port to each of the Controllers of Military Accounts concerned, or to the Examiner of Military Works Accounts, the Comptroller, Hyderabad, and the Military Department as the case may be.

17. On the return of an officer from furlough or leave, it will be the duty of the officer in charge of his record of service to satisfy himself that he has returned within his leave; and if not, to report the case to the sanctioning authority.

APPLICATIONS FOR PERMISSION TO RESIDE OUT OF INDIA.

18. In reporting to Army Head Quarters on an officer's application for permission to reside out of India under article 756, Army Regulations, India, Vol. I, Part I, the authority in charge of his record of service will state what year of service he has entered upon and the date on which that year commenced.

APPLICATION TO RETIRE FROM THE SERVICE.

19. In reporting to the Military Department of the Government of India on an officer's application to retire from the Service, the authority in charge of his record of service will state the amount of pension to which the applicant is entitled. He will also, after the retirement is announced in G. G. O., prepare a certificate on parchment (Form VI) in duplicate, and forward one copy to the officer and the other to the India Office.

INFORMATION REGARDING FURLOUGH OR PENSION.

20. The Controllers of Military Accounts, the Examiner of Military Works Accounts, or the Comptroller, Hyderabad, will, on receiving applications from officers for statements of service shewing how they stand for furlough or pension, furnish them with such statements on the forms specified below:

- (a) Furlough—
 (i) (rules of 1868), in Form I,
 (ii) (rules of 1875), Ia;
 (b) Pension—
 (i) (rules of 1868), II,
 (ii) (rules of 1875), IIa, IIb, IIc,
 (iii) (leave rules for the Staff Corps) or 11d,

and give such other information as they may require regarding their furlough or pension.

REPORTS.

21. To ensure the correctness of officers' records of service and the expeditious disposal of all matters connected with their furlough, pension, or promotion, it is essential that all changes affecting an officer's service for furlough, pension, or promotion, together with all necessary particulars as to dates, etc., should be promptly communicated to the authority in charge of his record of service.

HONORARY COMMISSIONED AND WARRANT OFFICERS ON THE UNATTACHED LIST AND OF THE INDIAN SUBORDINATE MEDICAL DEPARTMENT.

22. The Controllers of Military Accounts will not be required to report on applications for furlough or leave from honorary commissioned and warrant officers except in cases of furlough under the rules of 1868 or 1875, when the particulars necessary to determine their title to furlough and the rule or rules under which it should be granted may be obtained from the records of service attach-

ed to the applications. No record of service, such as that maintained for commissioned officers, is required in these cases.

23. In notifying the grant of furlough or leave to honorary commissioned and warrant officers and to senior members of the Indian Subordinate Medical Department, the wording of the order should follow that now adopted in G. G. O. in similar cases. After a grant of furlough or leave out of India (except to the Colonies) has been announced in orders, the sanctioning authority will forward to the Under-Secretary of State for India the officer's record of service attached to his application; and in addition, when the furlough or leave is on medical certificate, the medical statement of his case.

FORMS.

24. Specimen copies of the forms referred to in these instructions will be issued by the Military Department of the Government of India to the Controllers of Military Accounts, the Examiner of Military Works Accounts, and the Comptroller, Hyderabad."

No. 85.—The following extract from General Order by the Government of India No. 136, dated 8th February 1895, is republished:—

"No. 136.—The undermentioned officers are granted leave to proceed out of India on private affairs under the Leave Rules for the Staff Corps: the specified period to count from the date of being struck off duty:

III. Casks used for storage shall not be used for purposes of conveyance of liquor from one place to another.
