In exercise of the powers conferred by section 33 of the Cotton Duties Act (XVII of 1894), the Governor General in Council is pleased to make the following rules for carrying into effect the provisions of the said Act within the Presidency of Bombay :—

The Return of cotton yarn produced in any mill situated within the said Presidency, to be delivered to the Collector by the owner of such mill in accordance with the provisions of section 7 of the said Act, shall be in the form appended, which is divided into Parts A, B, and C.

The particulars required in Parts A, B, and C of the Return shall be shown separately for each count or number of yarn, provided that all counts not exceeding 20 may be shown in a single entry, unless the Collector shall otherwise direct.

Any owner proposing to export or sell for export cotton fabrics composed in whole or in part of dutiable counts of yarn shall also submit monthly to the Collector a return of such cloth in Form D appended.

The owner of the mill or his representative submitting the returns shall subscribe at the foot of Parts A and B of the Return under section 7 and at foot of Form D a declaration in the following terms :—

'I do hereby declare that I have compared the above particulars with the records and books of my mill, and that they are, in so far as I can ascertain, accurate and complete.'

BY THE COMMISSIONER OF CUSTOMS, SALT, OPIUM AND A'BKÁRI.

No. 812.—In continuation of this Office Notification No. 3145, dated the 24th June 1893, published at pages 578 and 579 of the *Bombay Government Gazette*, Part I, dated the 29th idem, the following subsidiary rules approved by the Commissioner of A'bkári under the provisions of Section 35 of the Bombay A'bkári Act, 1878, for the management of the Central Distillery at Belgaum, and for the regulation of the storage, removal and transport of spirits made therein, are published for general information:—

- I. Each cask, before being used in the distillery or employed for transport, shall be taken by the farmer's men to the Inspector, who shall gauge its capacity by means of the measures provided for the purpose, and shall paint upon it—

- (1) the name of the distillery ;
- (2) the consecutive No. of cask ;
- (3) the capacity of cask in gallons and drams ;
- (4) the date of painting.

II. Each cask so painted shall be again gauged once in every six months, or whenever it undergoes any repairs, by the Inspector, by means of measures provided for the purpose, and shall be painted anew, if necessary.

III. Casks exceeding 60 gallons in capacity used for storage shall not be used for purposes of conveyance of liquor from one place to another.

IV. The Distillery Inspector shall keep a register showing the number and capacity of each cask gauged and painted by him, and shall produce it before officers visiting the distillery.

BY DISTRICT MAGISTRATES.

With the object of preventing the outbreak or spread of any epidemic disease during the fair to be held at Shingnápur in the Mán Táluka of the Sátára District, from the 31st March 1895 to 10th April 1895, both days inclusive, the District Magistrate, Sátára, prescribes the following regulations under clause (1) of Section 45 of the District Police Act IV of 1890, Bombay, to be observed by the residents of Shingnápur and by persons present at or going to or returning from the fair :—

1. Sanitary arrangements at the Shingnápur fair during the period from 31st March 1895 to the 10th April 1895 shall be under the management of a Committee consisting of—

- (1) The Assistant or Deputy Collector in charge of the táluka.
- (2) The Mámálatdár of the táluka.
- (3) The Chief Constable of the táluka.
- (4) Ganesh Babaji Chinchore, Kulkarni.
- (5) Narso Keshav Bokil, Kárbhári of Devasthán.
- (6) Ganesh Dhondi Dombe Wani.
- (7) Shivalingaya Guru Ramlingaya.

2. The Committee shall make suitable arrangements for the conduct of the business of the Committee and for the discharge of its executive functions.

3. All persons attending the fair or present in the village or at the site of the fair during the continuance of the Committee shall obey all instructions and orders issued by the Committee on all matters affecting sanitation and public health and safety. Disobedience entails liability to punishment under Section 69, Bombay District Police Act.

4. The Committee is invested with full powers to make all arrangements necessary or advisable to prevent outbreak or spread of epidemic disease, provided that if it forbids the assembling or dispersing of pilgrims or visitors to the fair, it shall report its action without delay to the District Magistrate, who shall thereupon pass orders as he thinks fit, provided also that the Committee shall obey all instructions issued to it by the District Magistrate.

With the object of preventing the outbreak or spread of any epidemic disease during the fair to be held at Akalkhope from 7th to 12th of the waxing moon of Chaitra corresponding 2nd to 6th April 1895, both days inclusive, the District Magistrate prescribes under Section 45, clause 1, of the District Police Act IV of 1890, the following regulations to be observed by the residents of Akalkhope and by persons present at or going to or returning from the fair :—

1. Sanitary arrangements in the fair at Akalkhope during the period from 2nd to 6th of April 1895 shall be under the management of a Committee of—

- (1) Assistant Collector in charge of the táluka.
- (2) The Mámálatdár of the táluka.
- (3) The Chief Constable of the táluka.
- (4) The Police Pátíl of Akalkhope.
- (5) The Kulkarni of Akalkhope.
- (6) Mr. Wasudeo Bhaskar Gogate.
- (7) Mr. Vishnu Nilkant Deshpande.

2. The Committee shall make suitable arrangements for the conduct of business of the Committee and for the discharge of its executive functions.

3. All the persons attending the fair or present in the village or at the site of the fair during the continuance of the Committee shall obey all instructions and orders issued by the Committee on all matters affecting the sanitation and the public health and safety.

Disobedience entails liability to punishment under Section 69, Bombay District Police Act.

4. The Committee is invested with full powers to make all arrangements necessary or advisable to prevent the outbreak or spread of epidemic disease, provided that if it forbids the assembling or dispersing of pilgrims or visitors to the fair, it shall report its action without delay to the District Magistrate who shall thereon pass such orders as he thinks fit, provided also that the Committee shall obey all instructions issued to it by the District Magistrate.
