No. 396.—The following Resolution by the Government of India in the Home Department is republished for general information:—

"HOME DEPARTMENT.

PROGRESS OF EDUCATION IN INDIA DURING THE YEAR 1893-94.

No. 3 Education

Extract from the Proceedings of the Government of India in the Home Department (Education),—dated Calcutta, the 19th February 1895.

READ-

The several Reports on the Progress of Education in India during the year 1893-94, with the orders passed on them by Local Governments and Administrations.

RESOLUTION.

In the Resolution recorded in the Home Department, dated the 7th September 1894, the Government of India reviewed at length the state and progress of education in India during the quinquennium 1887-88 to 1891-92 as shown in the Report of Mr. A. M. Nash of the Bengal Educational Service, and noticed also the results of education in the year 1892-93. In publishing for general information the statistics of education for 1893-94, therefore, only a brief summary is necessary of the most important features presented by the figures.

- 2. The total number of Public and Private Institutions to which the Educational Reports relate rose from 141,793 in 1891-92 and 144,699 in 1892-93 to 147,297 in 1893-94. The increase was shared by both classes of institutions, public institutions having numbered 102,145 in 1892-93 and 103,172 in 1893-94, and private institutions having numbered in those years 42,554 and 44,125. The number of Primary (public) institutions, which had fallen from 97,109 in 1891-92 to 96,409 in 1892-93, rose again to 97,325 in the year under review. There was also an increase in the number of Secondary (public) Schools from 4,962 in 1892-93 to 5,066 in 1893-94. The number of elementary Private institutions rose from 37,111 in 1892-93 to 38,395 in 1893-94, an increase of over 500 having occurred in Korán Schools.
- 3. The percentage of scholars to the total population of school-going age (calculated at 15 per cent. on the statistics of population according to the last Census) was 11.67 in 1893-94, as compared with 11.38 in 1892-93. The percentages of male (20.82) and female (2.19) scholars on the total male and female population of school-going age showed a slight advance over the figures for the previous year (20.32 and 2.12, respectively). The total number of pupils under instruction in schools of all classes increased from 3,966,267 in 1892-93 to 4,066,235 in 1893-94. Of these, there were 3,602,492 males and 363,775 females in 1892-93, against 3,691,292 males and 374,943 females in 1893-94.

4. The statement given in the margin compares the average monthly attendance at the different

classes of public institutions during the years 1892-93 and 1893-The average monthly number of scholars attending these institutions rose from 3,228,114 in 1892-93 to 3,308,121 in the year under report. As observed in previous years, similar statistics regarding private institutions (advanced and elementary) are not available. On the 31st March 1894 there were 14,360 students in Arts Colleges, as compared with 13,387 on the 31st March 1893. The number on the rolls of Colleges or Departments of Colleges for Professional Training on those dates were, respectively, 3,824 and 3,344. It is satisfactory also to observe that the increase noticed last year in the number of pupils at Secondary and Primary Schools has been maintained, the former having risen from 488,261 at the end of March 1893 to 507,658 at the end of March 1894, and the latter from 2,890,824 to 2,947,530.

There were 4,370 pupils attending Training Schools for Masters on the 31st March 1894, against 4,327 on the corresponding date in 1893; but the number attending Training Schools for Mistresses, which had risen from 793 at the close of 1891-92 to 1,092 at the close of 1892-93, again fell away to 909 at the close of 1893-94. There was, however, a steady increase in the number attending other special schools from 16,586 at the end of 1891-92 and 17,681 at the end of 1892-93 to 18,363 at the end of 1893-94.

- 5. Of the total number (4,066,235) of pupils (including those in private institutions) receiving instruction, 404,591 were studying English, as compared with 388,650 in the previous year. The number (579,361) studying a classical language showed a small increase (575,789 in 1892-93); and the number learning a vernacular (3,690,391), a substantial increase (3,607,327 in 1892-93). The greatest increase among pupils learning English was among those attending Secondary Schools (301,376 in 1892-93 and 310,621 in 1893-94). The highest rise in the number of those studying a classical language also occurred among the pupils at Secondary Schools, and the increase among those studying a vernacular was naturally greatest at Primary Schools. The number of pupils in private institutions studying English, a classical language and a vernacular was, respectively, 4,784, 296,176 and 325,979 in 1893-94, as compared with 5,086, 284,132 and 316,445 in 1892-93.
- 6. The following statement shows the race and religion of the pupils, and the proportion borne by each class to the total number, during the past two years:—

Owing to the general increase of numbers, the percentage of Muhammadans to the total has slightly fallen: but the number of Muhammadan pupils shows an increase yet greater than that (from 887,236 to 894,241) in the preceding year. Of the students receiving a Collegiate education, the greatest number (15,303) were Hindus; 1,212 were Muhammadans; 528, Europeans and Eurasians; 548, Native Christians; and 593 belonged to other classes. Of the pupils in Secondary Schools, 367,413 were Hindus, 70,816 Muhammadans, 23·078 Europeans and Eurasians, 26,124 Native Christians, and 20,227 belonged to other classes. Of those under primary instruction in public institutions 2,116,506 were Hindus, 580,272 Muhammadans 3,431 Europeans and Eurasians, 68,311 Native Christians, and 179,010 belonged to other classes.

- 7. The total Expenditure (direct and indirect) on public instruction, which had risen from Rs. 3,05,19,632 in 1891-92 to Rs. 3,16,72,827 in 1892-93, reached Rs. 3,22,79,706 in 1893-94. The direct expenditure increased from Rs. 2,50,54,254 in 1892-93 to Rs. 2,58,51,608 in the year under review. The increase was mainly due to a rise in the expenditure on Secondary and Primary Schools, from Rs. 1,03,29,480 and Rs. 99,73,177, respectively, in 1892-93 to Rs. 1,06,36,125 and Rs. 1,03,23,937 in 1893-94. The expenditure on Arts Colleges increased from Rs. 21,10,205 to Rs. 22,13,938; that on Professional Colleges from Rs. 7,97,427 to Rs. 8,22,866; and that on Training Schools for teachers from Rs. 6,82,740 to Rs. 7,06,347. The expenditure on all other special schools decreased from Rs. 11,61,225 to Rs. 11,48,395. The indirect expenditure on education (which includes charges on account of direction, inspection, scholarships, buildings and miscellaneous items) fell from Rs. 66,18,573 to Rs. 64,28,098.
- 8. The expenditure on education was met from Provincial, Local and Municipal funds, from fees, and from miscellaneous sources such as subscriptions, endowments, &c. The following statement compares the sums spent from each of these sources, and the proportion of each sum to the total cost of education, in the years 1892-93 and 1893-94:—

The Government of India regret that the contribution from Municipal funds, the smallness of which the been noticed in previous reviews, has declined, but the increase in the income from fees and miscel-fancous sources is satisfactory; and the general results summarised above afford, in the opinion of the Governor General in Council, satisfactory evidence of the continued progress in the work of public instruction during the year 1893-94.

No. 997 .- The following rules approved by the Commissioner of Abkari under the provisions of Section 35 of the Abkari Act, 1878, for the management of the Central Distillery at Bijapur and

for the regulation of the storage, removal and transport of spirits made therein are published for general information :-

Rule 1.—The Distillery Inspector shall live on the premises throughout the year in the quarters provided for him, and shall be responsible for the general management of the distillery and for the efficient sanitation of the premises. The Distillery Inspector shall open and close the distillery daily in the presence of the officer in charge of the Police guard.

Rule 2 .- No work shall be carried on in the distillery before sunrise or after sunset, or on Sundays, Good Friday, Christmas Day, New Year's Day, or the Queen's Birthday, except upon the written permission of the Huzur Deputy Collector, to whom power to grant this permission has been delegated.

Rule 3 .- In the event of work being done under such permission, extra remuneration shall be given to the Distillery Inspector for supervising on the scale sanctioned in Government Resolution No. 6882, dated 29th September 1886, and report should be made to the Collector of each occasion on which such permission is granted.

4.—The Inspector shall be present on duty at the distillery while the stills are working and while distillation is going on, and he shall be responsible that no spirits are removed from the distillery except under proper authority. In the event of his unavoidable absence from sudden illness or other urgent cause, the Huzúr Deputy Collector will make such arrangement as is possible for the temporary conduct of his duty reporting his proceedings to the Collector forthwith. In cases of urgency the Huzúr Deputy Collector may grant casual leave to the Distillery Inspector, and shall submit a report to the Collector on each occasion of his doing so

Rule 5 .- All liquor drawn during the day shall be removed to the strong room and deposited in the vats there. It shall be tested with the Standard. Syke's Hydrometer and the strength thereof ascertained and adjusted to the standard prescribed as soon as it is cool and fit for testing, and the quantity shall be ascertained by inserting the gauge rod.

Rule 6.—The Distillery Inspector shall forward to the Huzur Deputy Collector daily at 11 A.M. a report in the accompanying form, showing-

(a) the opening balance,

(b) liquor drawn during the preceding 24 hours, (c) liquor issued up to 11 A.M.,

(d) balance in stock.

Rule 7.—There shall be two locks to the strong room, the keys of one of which shall be kept by the Inspector, of the other by the Contractor or his agent.

Rule 8 .- To each vat in the strong room shall be affixed a board on which shall be clearly painted-

- (1) the serial number of the vat,
- (2) its full capacity,
- (3) date of testing capacity.

The strong room shall always be kept locked except when it is necessary to open it for the purpose of storing or issuing liquor.

Rule 9.—No combustibles other than liquor shall be allowed to be stored in the strong room, and it must not be entered with an open light.

Rule 10.—The Distillery Inspector shall be directly responsible for all accounts, for keeping the distillery books and registers correctly written up to date and for the due performance of all orders issued by the Collector or by the Huzúr Deputy Collector for the management of the distillery.

Rule 11.—Liquor issued under permit should leave the distillery at the same time as the permit.

Rule 12.—Each cask before being used in the distillery and employed for transport shall be taken by the farmer's men to the Inspector, who shall gauge its capacity by means of the measures provided for the purpose and shall paint upon it—

(1) the letters Bjr. Dy.

(2) the consecutive number of cask;

(3) the capacity of the casks in Glas. and Drs.

(4) the date of painting.

Rule 13.—Each cask so painted shall be again gauged once in every six months, or whenever it undergoes any repairs, by the Inspector, by means of measures provided for the purpose, and shall be painted anew, if necessary.

Rule 14.—Casks used for storage shall not be used for purposes of conveyance of liquor from one place to another.

Rule 15.—As all work has to stop at sunset, the workmen employed in the distillery may be allowed a quarter of an hour to clean themselves and leave the premises, and each of them may in that interval be allowed a ration of liquor not exceeding one dram which shall be drunk in the presence of the Inspector. The distillery will then be closed in the presence of the Inspector, who before leaving it shall see that the store rooms are duly fastened under his own lock and seal.

Rule 16.—There shall be affixed in front o the distillery a signboard 4 feet long by 1½ feet broad on which shall be painted in large letters "Government Central Distillery."

Rule 17.—There shall be no admittance of the public to the distillery except on business. Visitors may be admitted to see the distillery on permits from the Collector, or in his absence from the Huzúr Deputy Collector.

Rule 18.—The following registers and books shall be kept in the distillery, and shall be filled in daily after the work of distillation is completed:—

Rule 19.—(a) A visiting book shall be kept and produced whenever an Inspecting Officer shall visit the distillery. Copy of such remarks as he may make shall be forwarded at once to the Collector through the Huzúr Deputy Collector.

(b) An order book containing such orders as may from time to time be issued by the Collector or by the Huzúr Deputy Collector shall also be kept and shown to Inspecting Officers, in order that they may enter in the visiting book any suggestions they may have to offer regarding modifications or amplifications of existing orders.

Rule 20.—The sentry at the gate shall be regarded as always on duty until he is relieved.

Rule 21.—The distillery should be carefully inspected at least once in each month by the Huzúr Deputy Collector or an Assistant or District Deputy Collector.

ORDER TO THE PUBLIC.

Whereas in former years, on the occasion of festival processions in the streets of the town of Belgaum, disturbances of the public peace have occurred in consequence of assumption by certain of the processionists of masks or disguises offensive to the feelings of persons of other castes; I issue the following orders (under Section 42 of the District Police Act IV of 1890) in view to prevent any such disturbance taking place at the approaching festival of the Shimga:

(1) *On the occasion of the procession to be held on various days on or about the 10th to 15th

* In the public streets of the town and cantonment of Belgaum.

March 1895, both days inclusive, in connection with the Shimga festival, no mummer nor person

disguised in any way will be permitted to take part in or accompany any such procession, unless he shall have obtained a written pass from the District Superintendent of Police granting him permission so to do.

- (2) Again, on the aforesaid dates no such mummer or disguised person shall, without special permission from the District Superintendent of Police, perambulate or appear in the aforesaid streets, unless he takes part in or accompanies a procession, directions for the conduct of which have been issued by the District Superintendent of Police, except indeed he be on his way to or from any such procession.
- (3) Further, no one shall, without permission from the Superintendent of Police, take part in or accompany such procession who is armed with a stick or stone or anything whatever that may be used as a weapon of offence.
- (4) It is also further ordered that the procession which may be allowed in connection with the Shimga festival shall be held only from 10th to 15th March 1895, both days inclusive, and not on any previous or subsequent day.
