found favour generally among the authorities in this country. The Governor General in Council, while regarding with every respect the opinion of the eminent gentlemen upon the Special Committee and the Executive Committee of the National Leprosy Fund who dissented from the finding of the Leprosy Commissioners regarding the contagious character of the disease, is constrained to accept the conclusion of the Commissioners upon this matter, fortified as it is by the views of the distinguished medical authorities just cited, and by the general opinion of those in India who are qualified to pass judgment on it. His Excellency in Council accordingly feels assured that the extent to which the disease is propagated in India by contagion is small, and, holding this opinion, is unable to approve of the compulsory segregation, either absolute or partial, of lepers except under the special circumstances which are detailed infra in paragraph 10.

8. The Local Governments and Administrations were requested to offer their opinions for giving practical effect to the recommendations of the Commissioners. There is complete unanimity of opinion in favour of the first recommendation that lepers should be prohibited from engaging in certain trades. This recommendation cannot indeed be directly justified on the conclusion of the Commissioners regarding the question of the contagiousness of leprosy, but it appears to the Government of India that, as the Lieutenant-Governor of the Punjab observes, 'it is amply justified on the grounds that there is a certain danger in allowing lepers with running sores to engage in those trades, and the people of this country, and indeed, it may be said, of any other country, would be struck with dismay if they discovered that the articles they used or consumed had been handled by such lepers.' There is, in fact, the Government of India are advised, danger of septic poisoning from any such running sore or ulcer.

The question arises whether the prohibition in respect of the trades in question should be confined to Municipalities or made of general application. The majority of the Local Governments and Administrations would, for the present at least, proscribe lepers from engaging in trades only in Municipal areas, upon the broad grounds that the enforcement of the prohibition would be impracticable in agricultural villages, and that the members of village communities, who are fully cognizant of the most trifling details connected with the every day life of their fellow residents in a village, are well able to protect themselves. The object is to protect the public from dealing unwittingly with leper tradesmen, and the Governor General in Council thinks that this can be adequately secured if the prohibition is confined to Municipalities and to the larger fairs and religious and other gatherings which are held outside the limits of towns. His Excellency in Council has, therefore, decided that, for the present at all events, the prohibition should not apply except to lepers in and near Municipalities and at the larger fairs and similar gatherings. As the Government of India abstain strictly from regulating prostitution, no byelaw or Act dealing with the prohibition against lepers following certain trades or callings should extend to that of prostitution by leper women.

In the opinion of the Governor General in Council the question of amending the Municipal Acts in the Provinces where they are at present deficient in this respect should now be taken into consideration. In connection with this point it appears to His Excellency in Council that section 55 of Act XV of 1883 in the North-Western Provinces and Oudh cannot, as urged by the Lieutenant-Governor of the North-Western Provinces and Chief Commissioner of Oudh, be held to refer to this matter, and that section 85 of Act XVIII of 1889 in the Central Provinces, which the Chief Commissioner of the Central Provinces considers would enable Municipal Commissioners to prohibit, as a public nuisance, lepers from publicly exposing their sores or from engaging in trade, does not provide for it with sufficient precision.

of mendicant lepers to leave their homes and crowd into the large centres of population. The Commissioners held that vagrant and indigent lepers scattered about the country are not a source of serious danger, and their proposal that Municipal authorities should be empowered by bye-laws to prevent vagrants afflicted with leprosy from begging in or frequenting places of public resort or using public conveyances in towns and cities was dictated by the expectation that the effect of such bye-laws in large towns would be an emigration into the surrounding country, and a furtherance of the scheme for establishing experimental leper colonies or farms in rural districts. With the exception of the Government of Madras and the Chief Commissioner of Assam, the Local Governments and Administrations are generally in favour of sending to, and retaining in, asylums vagrant pauper lepers who congregate in towns. It has been forcibly urged to the Government of India that this question, as well as that of prohibiting lepers from engaging in certain trades, has an administrative as well as a medical aspect, and that action such as the Commissioners proposed is justified by the loathsomeness of the disease, by the circumstance that those suffering from it very commonly obtrude their sores upon the public with a view to forcing people to give them money, and by the fact that people in India are commonly struck with horror at the approach of a leper, and are apt to yield to his importunity in order to induce him to move on. In deference to the sentiments of the community generally, the Government of India agree that steps should be taken to prevent mendicant lepers from obtruding their deformities on the public gaze in towns and cities. The experience gained in Bombay, since the establishment of the Leper Asylum at Matunga, shows that regulations having this object may, if intelligently and energetically carried out, be expected to be productive of great benefit to the leper community as well as to the general public.

The Commissioners recommended that the authorities in towns should be empowered to order a leper infringing the regulations either to return to his home or to enter an asylum. This recommendation is generally accepted except by the Government of Madras which would limit the power of enforcing obedience to the bye-laws to the actual expulsion of lepers from towns and cities, and by the Chief Commissioner of Assam on the ground that he is not prepared to recommend compulsory detention in asylums. The view which approves itself to the Government of India and to the majority of the Local Governments and Administrations is that vagrant lepers in Municipalities should be dealt with in much the same way as vagrant lunatics are dealt with under the provisions of Act XXXVI of 1858, viz., that such persons should be brought before a Medical officer and a Magistrate and sent to an asylum by an order of the latter if found to be suffering from the disease and without relatives who can properly care for and treat them. The Governor General in Council considers that, for the present at all events, it will be sufficient to take power to deal with vagrant lepers in this manner in Municipalities and their immediate neighbourhood.

10. The Commissioners recommended that Leper Asylums should be built near towns where they do not already exist, and the memorandum of the Surgeon-General with the Government of India, circulated with Home Department letter of the 15th September 1893, contained detailed suggestions for the establishment and location of additional asylums throughout the country. The Surgeon-General was of opinion that requirements would be met if on an average one asylum was provided to each revenue division. A suggestion of the Commissioners, intended to be ancillary in the rural districts to the establishment of asylums in the immediate neighbourhood of towns, was that leper farms in rural tracts where lepers with their wives and families could cultivate the soil might be productive of practical good. They considered that comparatively few children would be born, and proposed that they should, if possible, be removed to orphanages from which they would be discharged as soon as they could support themselves.

This part of the subject appears to the Government of India to need further consideration by the Local Governments and Administrations. The Governor General in Council considers that in each division or some convenient area an asylum, or an asylum and a farm, should be maintained so as to accommodate the lepers who may be found vagrant in the Municipalities in the division or area, and His Excellency in Council is of opinion that the additional expense which may be necessary for the purpose should be met jointly by the Municipalities and District and Local Boards of the division or area. The Government of India will be glad if the Local Governments and Administrations will take the matter into their consideration at an early date, in order to determine to what extent additional accommodation will be required, how the cost of providing and maintaining such accommodation should be divided among the local bodies, and whether any amendment of the law relating to Municipalities and District and Local Boards is necessary for the establishment of such asylums and farms outside the limits of Municipalities and for the proposed division of the cost. The Government of India are inclined to think that it may not be necessary to legislate, as was proposed in clause 4 of the Bill circulated in 1889, for the voluntary admission of lepers in asylums, but they would have no objection to the adoption of such a provision in any Province in which the Local Government or Administration thinks it would be useful.

- 11. The fourth recommendation of the Commissioners was that competent medical authority should always be consulted before action in regard to lepers is taken. With this view the Government of India entirely agree. But the Commissioners did not suggest a definition of the terms "leper" and "leprosy" which could be adopted for the purpose of the provisions to be made in the different laws and bye-laws. In the opinion of the Government of India the terms should for this purpose be defined, as in the Bill at present before the Legislative Council of the Lieutenant-Governor of Bengal, which is alluded to in the preamble of this Resolution, so as only to include cases in which ulceration has actually commenced. The Governor General in Council considers that the public interests do not require that action should be taken against persons attacked with the disease who have not reached that stage. In any case in which it is proposed to enforce the bye-laws against a person who appears to be affected with ulcerous sores, a preliminary to such action will be that he should be examined by a competent medical authority.
- 12. The enquiry mentioned in paragraph 2 of this Resolution which was instituted into the question whether the disease of leprosy is on the increase or not in this country was taken up by the Leprosy Commissioners. At the time when the report was issued the returns for the census of 1891 had not been fully revised, but they were sufficiently complete to enable the Commissioners to make an elaborate examination of the Statistics given in the last three censuses taken in India regarding the distribution of lepers in the country. The conclusions at which they arrived was that the alarm about the increase of leprosy in British India is altogether groundless, that the figures available, though unfortunately consisting of only three sets, pointed strongly to a decrease in the number of these unfortunate people, and in any case to the disease not being on the increase, that the number of lepers had been greatly overstated, 110,000 being perhaps nearest the truth, and that leprosy could therefore not be regarded in the light of a general danger. The final statistics of the Census Commissioner for India showed the number of persons described as lepers at the Census of 1891 to be 126,361, of whom 31,069 were females. Mr. Baines thought it possible that a good deal of the decrease in the numbers of lepers returned in 1891, from tracts in which they were formerly remark-

ably high, might be nominal, and due to greater accuracy of diagnosis, and the Governor General in Council is inclined to agree with him that it is impossible to say for certain whether the disease of leprosy in this country is on the whole stationary or not. His Excellency in Council, however, sees no reason to dissent from the general conclusion of the Commissioners that leprosy does not prevail in India to such an extent as to constitute a general or universal danger, and that the means by which we must book forward to secure its diminution are improved sanitation and better dietetic conditions.

- 13. The legislation which is required to carry out the decisions of the Government of India in paragraphs 8, 9 and 10 of this Resolution will be effected in Local Legislative Councils in the Provinces where they exist and for other Provinces by the Governor General in Council. The Bill cited in the preamble has already been introduced in the Council of the Lieutenant-Governor of Bengal, and the Governments of Madras, Bombay and the North-Western Provinces and Oudh should now proceed to legislate, either by means of a separate Bill or by such amendment of the Municipal law as is necessary to bring it into accord with the principles which have been accepted by the Government of India. The Governor General in Council will be glad to receive in due course, from the Lieutenant-Governor of the Punjab and the Local Administrations, proposals for effecting the changes in the law which will be required in the Provinces administered by them.
- 14. The Governor General in Council cannot conclude this Resolution without placing on record his appreciation of the able and exhaustive manner in which the Leprosy Commissioners conducted their enquiry. Two of them, the Governor General in Council regrets, passed away before His Excellency in Council had had an opportunity of publicly acknowledging their labours. Surgeon-Major Barclay died at Simla of typhoid fever while the Commissioners were still engaged in their investigations, and Dr. Beaven Rake at Trinidad in August 1894. Finally, the Government of India desire to express on behalf of the Empire their thanks to the Committee of the National Leprosy Fund for devoting a portion of the subscriptions raised in memory of the late Father Damien to the investigation of the disease of leprosy throughout India."

The following extracts from the Indian Railways Act, IX of 1890, in regard to accidents:

Report of railway accidents.

Section 83.--When any of the following accidents occurs in the course of working a railway, namely:

(a) any accident attended with loss of human life, or with grievous hurt as defined in the Indian Penal Code,\* or with serious injury to property;

(b) any collision between trains of which one is

a train carrying passengers;

(c) the derailment of any train carrying passen-

gers, or of any part of such a train;
(d) any accident of a description usually attended with loss of human life or with such grievous hurt as aforesaid or with serious injury to property

(e) any accident of any other description which

the Governor General in Council may notify in this behalf in the Gazette of

\* Indian Penal Code, Act XLV of 1860, section 320.—The following kinds of hurt only are designated as 'grievous':

First.—Emasculation.
Secondly.—Permanent privation of the sight of either eye.
Thirdly.—Permanent privation of the hearing of either ear.
Fourthly.—Privation of any member or joint.
Fifthly.—Destruction or permanent impairing of the powers of any member or joint.
Sixthly.—Permanent disfiguration of the head or face.
Seventhly.—Fracture or dislocation of a bone or tooth.
Eighthy.—Any hurt which endangers life, or which causes the sufferer to be, during the space of twenty days, in severe bodily pain, or unable to follow his ordinary pursuits.

† The power of appointing Magistrates and police officers to whom notices of accidents are to be given has been delegated, under section 144 of the Indian Railways Act, 1890, to Local Governments—see notification No. 268, dated the 11th June 1890, in Gazette of India, 1890, Part:1, page 438.

the accident to the local Government and to the Inspector appointed for the railway; and the Station Master nearest to the place at which the accident occurred or, where there is no Station Master, the railway servant in charge of the section of the railway on which the accident occurred shall, without unnecessary delay, give notice of the accident to the Magistrate of the district in which the accident occurred, and to the officer in charge of the police station within the local limits of which it occurred, or to such other Magistrate and police officer as the Governor General in Council appointst in this behalf.

enquiries into accidents.

Section 84.—The Governor General in Council may make rules, consistent with this Act and any other Power to make rules regarding notices of and enactment for the time being in force, for all or any of the following purposes, namely:

- (a) for prescribing the forms of the notices mentioned in the last foregoing section and the particular of the accident which those notices are to contain;
- (b) for prescribing the class of accidents of which notice is to be sent by telegraph immediately after the accident has occurred;
- (c) for prescribing the duties of railway servants, police officers, Inspectors and Magistrates on the occurrence of an accident.

Section 85 .- Every railway administration shall send to, the Governor General in Council a return of accidents occurring upon its railway, whether attended with personal injury or not, in such form and manner and at such intervals. Submission of return of accidents. of time as the Governor General in Council directs.

the railway administration working the railway and, if the accident happens to a train belonging to any other railway administration also shall, without unnecessary delay, send notice of

Penalty for delay in submitting returns under section \* \* 85.

for the submission of the return.

Penalty for omitting to give the notices of accidents required by section 83 and under section 84.

Omission to give notice of accident.

Section 92.—If a railway company fails to comply with the provisions of \* respect to the submission of any return, it shall forfeit to the Government the sum of fifty rupees for every day during which the default continues after the fourteenth day from the date prescribed

Section 96.—If a railway company omits to give such notice of an accident as is required by section 83 and the rules for the time being in force under section 84, it shall forfeit to the Government the sum of one hundred rupees for every day during which the omission continues.

Section 103.—If a Station Master or a railway servant in charge of a section of a railway omits to give such notice of an accident as is required by section 83 and the rules for the time being in force under section 84, he shall be punished with fine which may extend to fifty rupees.

Observations.—In Government of India letter No. 86 R. T., dated the 20th February 1891, now read again, the Local Governments and Administrations, officers controlling railways and railway administrations were asked for an expression of their opinion on the draft rules for enquiring into and reporting on accidents on railways, which formed an enclosure to that letter. Replies have now been received, and, after careful consideration of the several suggestions offered and of the provisions of the sections of the Indian Railways Act, 1890, read above, the rules have been revised so as to render them suitable for general adoption.

RESOLUTION.—The rules herewith enclosed are published for general information.

It will be observed that the rules forming Enclosure No. 1 which have been framed under section 84 of the Indian Railways Act, 1890, relate only to accidents occurring in the course of working a railway. In the case of accidents occurring otherwise than in the course of working a railway, e.g., damage to the line or works from excessive floods, etc., involving interruption to traffic but not causing any train accident, the railway administration should send notice of the occurrence by telegram to the Government Inspector who, for the portion of the railway on which the accident occurs, performs the duties prescribed in section 4, sub-section (2), clauses (a) and (b), of the said Act and also to the Director General of Railways when the railway concerned is under the direct control of that officer. A detailed report of such accident should also, whenever the railway administration may consider it necessary to do so, be subsequently submitted to the same officers. Rules 22 to 27 of the accompanying rules which have been framed under section 84 of the Act will, so far as they may be applicable, also regulate the duties of the Government Inspector in regard to accidents occurring otherwise than in the course of working a railway.

The rules forming Enclosure No. 2 which have been framed under section 85 of the Act, relate not only to accidents which occur on a railway, but to all other railway accidents.

- 3. The present rules and orders are confined to railways in British India. A notification will be issued by the Government of India in the Foreign Department applying them to railways occupying lands in Native States.

Ordered further that this resolution, together with the rules and forms referred to therein, be forwarded to the Home Department for information, and be published under a notification in Part I of the Gazette of India.

# Enclosure No. 1 to Government of India Circular No. 7 Railway of 1895.

In exercise of the powers conferred by section 84 of the Indian Railways Act, 1890, the Governor General in Council is pleased to make the following rules, regarding notices of accidents occurring in the course of working a railway and the duties of railway servants, Police Officers, Government Inspectors, and Magistrates on the occurrence of such accidents:

#### Notices.

The notices mentioned in section 83 of the Indian Railways Act, 1890, shall contain the following particulars, namely :

mileage at which the accident occurred, and the name of the station nearest to the spot; time and date of the accident, and the number and description of the train or trains; nature of the accident, and the number of people killed or injured, as far as known; cause of the accident, as far as known; probable detention to traffic.

2. In the case of the following accidents, namely :

(a) accidents attended with loss of human life, or with serious injury to persons or property, or

(b) collisions between trains, of which one is a train carrying passengers, or

(c) the derailment of any train carrying passengers, or of any part of such a train, such notices shall be sent by telegraph immediately after the accident has occurred.

N.B.—Notices of accidents described in section 83 of the Indian Railways Act, 1890, and not falling under rule 2, must in accordance with that section be given without unnecessary delay, and may be sent by post.

Duties of Railway Servants.

- 3. Every railway servant shall report, with as little delay as possible, every accident occurring in the course of working the railway on which he is employed which may come to his notice. Such reports shall be made to the nearest Station Master, or where there is no Station Master, to the railway servant in charge of the section of the railway on which the accident has occurred.
- 4. (1) Whenever an accident such as is described in section 83 of the Indian Railways Act, 1890, has occurred in the course of working a railway, the Agent or Manager shall cause a departmental enquiry to be promptly made by a railway servant for the thorough investigation of the causes which led to the accident :

Provided that such enquiry may be dispensed with-

- (a) if the accident has not been attended with loss of human life or with serious injury to persons or property;
- (b) if there is no reasonable doubt as to the cause of the accident; and
- (c) if one department of the railway intimates that it accepts all responsibility in the matter.
- (2) Where a departmental enquiry is dispensed with, it shall be the duty of the Heads of Departments of the railway to make such enquiry as they may consider necessary if their staff or their system of working is concerned, and to adopt or suggest such measures as they may consider expedient for preventing a recurrence of similar accidents.
- 5. (1) Whenever a departmental enquiry is to be made, the Agent or Manager shall cause notice of the date and hour at which the enquiry will commence to be given to the following officers, namely:
  - (a) the Magistrate of the district in which the accident occurred, or such other officer as the Local Government may appoint in this behalf;
  - (b) the Government Inspector appointed under section 4, sub-section (1), of the Indian Railways Act, 1890, for the section of the railway on which the accident occurred;
  - (c) the Consulting Engineer in administrative charge of the railway, when that officer is not the Government Inspector referred to in clause (b) of this rule for the section of the railway on which the accident occurred; and
  - (d) the officer in charge of the railway police, or if there are no railway police, the officer in charge of the police station in the jurisdiction of which the accident occurred.
- (2) The date and hour at which the enquiry will commence shall be fixed so as to give the officers mentioned or referred to in clauses (a), (b), (c) and (d) of this rule sufficient time to reach the place where the enquiry is to be held.
- 6. (1) As soon as any departmental enquiry has been completed, the railway servant who made the enquiry shall submit to the Agent or Manager a report in the form prescribed by rule 25.
  - (2) The Agent or Manager shall forward a copy of such report-

(a) to the Government Inspector mentioned in rule 5, clause (b), and

(b) if no enquiry has been made under rule 16, or if the departmental enquiry has been held first, to the Magistrate or officer mentioned in rule 5, clause (a), and

(c) if any judicial enquiry is being made, to the Magistrate making such enquiry.

- (3) Such copy shall be accompanied in case (b), by a statement of the persons, if any, whom the Agent or Manager desires to prosecute and in case (c), by a copy of the evidence taken at the departmental enquiry.
- 7. (1) Whenever any accident has occurred in the course of working a railway, the Agent or Manager shall give all reasonable aid to the District Magistrate or the Magistrate appointed or deputed under rule 16, and to the Government Inspector, Medical Officers, the police, and others concerned, to enable them promptly to reach the scene of the accident, and shall assist those authorities in making enquiries and in obtaining evidence as to the cause of the accident.
- (2) When any enquiry under rule 16 or any judicial enquiry is being made, the Agent or Manager shall arrange for the attendance, as long as may be necessary, at the office or place of enquiry, of all railway servants whose evidence is likely to be required.
- 8. Whenever any accident has occurred in the course of working a railway and any offence referred to in section 131 of the Indian Railways Act, 1890, has been committed, the Agent or Manager or some officer of the railway nominated by him shall instruct the senior police officer or policeman present, or, if there be no member of the police force present a railway servant, at once to arrest the offender: Provided that, when such offender is a railway servant whose removal would cause danger or grave inconvenience, he need not be arrested until the arrival of a substitute, but precautions shall be taken to prevent his escape.
- 9. Whenever any accident occurring in the course of working a railway has been attended with serious personal injury, it shall be the duty of the Agent or Manager to afford medical aid to the sufferers, and to see that they are properly and carefully attended to till removed to their home or handed over to the care of their relatives or friends. In any such case, or in any case in which any loss of human life has occurred, the local medical officer should be communicated with if he is nearer than any railway medical officer.

# Duties of Police Officers.

- 10. The railway police may make an investigation into the causes which led to any occurring accident in the course of working a railway, and shall do so—
  - (a) whenever any such accident is attended with loss of human life or with grievous hurt as defined in the Indian Penal Code, or with serious injury to property, or has prima facie been due to any criminal act or omission; or
  - (b) whenever the District Magistrate or the Magistrate appointed under rule 16 has given a direction under clause (c) of that rule:

Provided that no such investigation shall be made when a Magisterial enquiry has been commenced or ordered under rule 16, clause (a) or clause (b).

- 11. (1) Whenever an investigation is to be made by the railway police—
  - (a) in a case in which an accident is attended with loss of human life or with serious injury to persons or property; or
  - (b) in pursuance of a direction given under rule 16, clause (c),
- the investigation shall be conducted by the officer in charge of the railway police, or, if that officer should be unable to conduct the investigation himself, then by an officer to be deputed by him.
- (2) An officer deputed under clause (1) of this rule shall ordinarily be an Assistant Superintendent of Police, but if in any case it should be found impracticable to depute an officer of that grade, an Inspector of Police may be deputed.
- 12. The officer who is to conduct an investigation in pursuance of rule 11 shall proceed without delay to the scene of the accident and conduct the investigation there, and shall at once advise the Agent or Manager of the railway and the Traffic Officer of the district by telegraph of the date and hour at which the investigation will commence, so that, if possible, the presence of a railway official may be arranged for to watch the proceedings and to aid the officer making the investigation. The absence of a railway official must not, however, be allowed to delay the investigation, which should be made as soon as possible after the accident has taken place.
- 13. (1) In every case to which rule 11 applies, immediate information shall be given by the railway police to the district police, who, if so required, shall afford all necessary assistance, and shall, if occasion arise, carry the investigation beyond the limits of the railway premises. But the railway police are primarily entrusted with the duty of carrying on the investigation within such limits.
- (2) Subject to any provisions elsewhere contained in these rules, the further prosecution of the case, on the conclusion of the police investigation, shall rest with the railway police.
- 14. The result of every police investigation shall be reported at once to the Magistrate of the district, or other officer appointed in this behalf by the Local Government, and to the Agent or Manager of the railway.
- 15. Where there are no railway police, the duties imposed by rules 10, 11 and 12, rule 18, clause (2), and rule 14 on the railway police, or on the officer in charge of the railway police, shall be discharged by the district police or by the District Superintendent of Police, as the case may be.

#### Duties of Magistrates.

- 16. Whenever an accident such as is described in section 83 of the Indian Railways Act, 1890, has occurred in the course of working a railway, the District Magistrate, or any other Magistrate who may be appointed in this behalf by the Local Government, may either—
  - (a) himself make an enquiry into the causes which led to the accident; or
  - (b) depute a Subordinate Magistrate, who, if possible, should be a Magistrate of the first class, to make such an enquiry; or
  - (c) direct an investigation into the causes which led to the accident to be made by the police.
- 17. Whenever it is decided to make an enquiry under rule 16, clause (a) or clause (b), the District Magistrate or other Magistrate, appointed as aforesaid, or the Magistrate deputed under rule 16, clause (b), as the case may be, shall proceed to the scene of the accident and conduct the enquiry there, and shall at once advise the Agent or Manager of the railway and the Government Inspector by telegraph of the date and hour at which the enquiry will commence, so as to enable the railway administration to summon the requisite expert evidence.
- 18. A Magistrate making an enquiry under rule 16 may summon any railway servant, and any other person whose presence he may think necessary, and, after taking the evidence and completing the enquiry, shall, if he considers there are sufficient grounds for a judicial enquiry, take the requisite steps for bringing to trial any person whom he may consider to be criminally liable for the accident. Whenever technical points are involved, the Magistrate should be careful to call for and take the opinion of the Government Inspector or other professional persons.
- 19. The result of every enquiry made under rule 16 shall be communicated by the Magistrate to the Agent or Manager of the railway and to the Government Inspector.
- 20. If in the course of any judicial enquiry into an accident occurring in the course of working a railway, the Magistrate desires the assistance of the Government Inspector or of the Agent or Manager of the railway, or the attendance of any officer of the railway, to explain any matter relating to railway supervision, management or working, he will issue a requisition to such officer to attend the court, stating at the same time the nature of the assistance required. In summoning railway servants, the Magistrate will take care not to summon so large a number of the employés, specially of one class, on the same day, as to cause inconvenience to the working of the railway. In the case of very serious accidents it will generally be advisable for the Magistrate to receive either the evidence of, or a report from, both the Government Inspector and the Agent or Manager of the railway in regard to the accident before finally concluding the judicial enquiry.
- 21. On the conclusion of any such judicial enquiry the Magistrate shall send a copy of his decision to the Agent or Manager of the railway, and shall, unless in any case he thinks it unnecessary to do so, report the result of the enquiry to the Local Government.

Duties of the Government Inspector appointed under section 4 (1) of the Indian Railways Act, 1890.

22. Whenever the Government Inspector receives notice, under section 83 of the Indian Railways Act, 1890, of an accident having occurred in the course of working a railway, he shall, if the accident falls under rule 2 of these rules, report the occurrence to the Government of India by telegraph, but in the case of other accidents the report may be made by post.

Every such report shall contain the particulars prescribed by rule 1.

- 23. (1) The Government Inspector shall proceed to the scene of the accident to note the facts and to enquire generally into the causes which led to the accident, whenever he receives notice as aforesaid of an accident which he considers serious enough to warrant an enquiry or investigation being made under any of these rules.
- (2) Whenever an enquiry under clause (1) of this rule is made by the Government Inspector, he shall, if practicable, be present at the departmental enquiry (if any) made under rule 4.
- 24. Whenever the Government Inspector has made an enquiry under rule 23, clause (1), he shall submit a report, in writing, to the Local Government or Administration controlling the railway and to the Government of India, or, if the railway is under the control of the Director General of Railways, then to that officer only; and shall forward a copy of such report to the Agent or Manager of the railway concerned, and, if a magisterial enquiry has been made, to the Magistrate who made such enquiry.
- 25. In the case of all serious accidents, such reports shall be submitted in the form adopted by the Inspecting Officers of the Board of Trade, in order to admit of their reproduction in a uniform shape in the quarterly accident returns; and shall contain—
  - (1) a brief description of the accident;
  - (2) a description of the locality of the accident;
  - (3) a detailed statement of the evidence taken;
  - (4) the conclusion arrived at by the Government Inspector;
  - (5) an appendix stating the damage done; and
  - (6) (when necessary) a sketch illustrative of the accident.

- 26. In important cases, where the occurrence of an accident appears to show that a change in the system of working is necessary, the Government Inspector shall inform the Government of India, or the Local Government or Administration controlling the railway, of the steps which have been or are proposed to be taken by the railway administration to prevent a recurrence of similar accidents, and whether, in his opinion, further action in the matter is desirable.
- 27. The Government Inspector shall, as far as possible, assist any Magistrate making an enquiry under rule 16 or a judicial enquiry, whenever he may be called upon to do so.
  - N.B.—These rules do not limit the exercise of any of the powers conferred on Government Inspectors by section 5 of the Indian Railways Act, 1890.

# Enclosure No. 2 to Government of India Circular No. 7 Railway of 1895.

In exercise of the powers conferred by section 85 of the Indian Railways Act, 1890, the Governor General in Council is pleased to issue the following directions with regard to the feturns of accidents to be submitted by railway administrations to the Governor General in Council:

- 1. The returns shall be prepared in the forms hereto appended, marked respectively Parts I to V and Tables 1 and 2, and shall be accompanied by all necessary remarks and explanations by the railway officials by whom they are prepared. The returns shall be submitted not later than three weeks after the close of the periods to which they respectively relate. The returns, whether submitted in manuscriptor in print, should be set forth on one side of the paper only.
  - 2. The returns should comprise all accidents of the following classes, namely :
    - (a) all cases, without exception, of cattle being run over;
      - In cases of running over cattle it should invariably be stated whether the engine is fitted with a cow-catcher or cattle guard, and, if so, the pattern should be specified. In these cases the condition of the fencing should also be reported.
    - (6) all cases of injury to the way, stock or works, whether attended or not by injury to life or limb;
    - (c) all acciden s of any kind likely to have endangered life or limb, or to have caused serious loss of property; such, for example, as cases of trains running over chairs placed on the line, of persons falling out of trains but who are not injured in any way, or of fires in trains, not resulting in injury to the way, stock or works, etc.
      - In case of fire attributed to sparks from the engine it should be recorded whether the engine is fitted with a spark-arrester, and if so, the pattern should be stated, as also the description of the fuel used. In cases in which there is reason to suppose that the sparks escaped from the ashpan, it should be stated what, if any, precaution has been taken to check the escape of sparks therefrom.
    - (d) all cases of injury to life or limb from causes connected with the working of railways.
  - 3. The following classes of railway servants should be included in the returns, namely:
    - (a) all persons employed in stations, including Police;
    - (b) all persons employed in the maintenance of ways and works, exclusive of men entertained for special works, that is, for railway works involving no risk from the working of trains, e.g., the construction of spurs in a river on which railway work-people are employed; and
    - (c) all persons employed on trains or running engines, also all gate-keepers.
- 4. Accidents described in clauses (b) and (c) of rule 2 which are of a trivial nature, such as petty accidents in shunting, etc., need not be included in the returns. All accidents should, however, be recorded in the office of the Agent or Manager of the railway concerned, it being left to that officer to decide which of them may be omitted from the returns as trivial.
- 5. Accidents on open lines of railway not coming under any of the classified heads in the forms marked Parts I, II and III, but which have caused loss of human life or personal injury, should be entered in the form marked Part IV.
- 6. Accidents connected with the bursting of boilers should be shown separately from these connected with the bursting of tubes. A detailed account of each recorded case of the bursting of a boiler should invariably be given in the form marked Part I.
- 7. In classifying accidents in column 3 on page 2 of the form marked Part I, the word 'serious' should be entered above the number in order to show which accidents were reported to the Local Government under section 83 of the Indian Railways Act, 1890.
- 8. In the forms marked Parts I to V those accidents only should be entered which have occurred during the quarter to which the returns relate. The specimen entries in the said forms explain the nature of the accidents which should be included therein. The entries in the forms marked Tables Nos. 1 and 2 should, however, be cumulative, and these tables should be prepared for three months, six months, nine months, and twelve months, respectively. Tables Nos. 1 and 2 for the second quarter should, therefore, include the figures for both the first and second quarters, those for the third quarter the figures for three quarters, and those for the fourth quarter the figures for the whole twelve months.

9. Accidents occurring—

(a) in railway workshops; or
(b) on new works not opened for traffic; or
(c) on lines under construction; or
(d) on lines not used for the public carriage of passengers, animals or goods; or

(e) to steamers or flats working in connection with railways,

should be entered in the briefest possible manner in Part V only and not entered in any other Parts or Tables of the returns. Accidents of the nature referred to m this rule should also, when necessary, be reported in accordance with the provisions of the Indian Factories Act, 1881.
