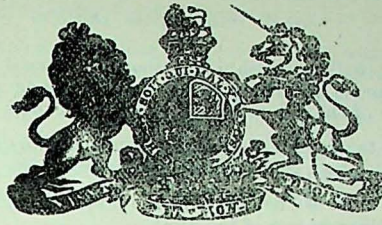

The Governor General in Council has sanctioned, at the instance of Her Majesty's Government, the employment of the Mint at Bombay in the coinage of a silver dollar—called a British dollar—for circulation in the Colonies of Hong Kong and the Straits Settlements; and His Excellency in Council directs the publication, for general information, of the subjoined Rules containing the conditions on which silver bullion and coin will be received at the Mint for coinage into dollars for export to the Colonies mentioned.

RULES FOR THE RECEIPT IN THE BOMBAY MINT OF SILVER BULLION AND COIN TO BE
COINED INTO BRITISH DOLLARS.

1. It has been arranged that a British dollar should be coined at this Mint to be exported for circulation in the Straits Settlements and Hong Kong, the dollar being 416 grains in weight and of 900 millesimal fineness, the diameter of the coin to be 1.5" and the thickness .09".
2. The Mint is open for the receipt of silver bullion and coin for the coinage of British dollars between the hours of 10 A.M. and 3 P.M., Sundays and holidays excepted.
3. Silver bullion or coin must be tendered by the proprietor thereof in Form A, printed copies of which will be supplied by the Bullion-keeper of the Mint.
4. Silver bullion or coin brought to the Mint will be received by the Mint Master on the following conditions:
 - (a) Such coin or bullion must be fit for coinage.
 - (b) The quantity tendered at one time must not be less than 1,000 tolas in weight.
 - (c) A seigniorage charge of one per cent. will be made on all silver bullion or coin which is melted or cut so as to render the same fit for receipt into the Mint.
 - (d) The Mint Master, on receipt of silver bullion or coin into the Mint, will grant to the proprietor a receipt in Form B, which shall entitle him to a certificate in Form D from the Mint Master for the amount of British dollars, payable at the Mint for export, to be given in exchange for such coin or bullion. Such certificates in Form D shall be payable at the Mint in due order of the date of tender, and after such lapse of time as the Mint Master may from time to time notify and on surrender of the said certificate.
5. Silver bullion or coin tendered at the Mint must on arrival be taken to the bullion depôt of the Mint, where it will remain in deposit until it is required for melting.
6. Silver bullion must be melted in the melting room of the Mint, under the superintendence of the Mint melting establishment, to render the same fit for receipt into the Mint.
7. Silver bullion will be melted and otherwise dealt with in accordance with the bye-laws of the Mint bullion depôt annexed to these rules. After the silver bullion has been melted, the resulting ingots will be taken for weighment and registry into the bullion office of the Mint, when the silver is said to be received into the Mint.
8. Until such weighment is made, the silver bullion is in the custody and at the sole risk of the proprietor thereof, to whom every facility will be afforded for securing it in the strong-room appropriated for this purpose.
9. Should silver bullion after being melted prove unfit for coinage, it will be returned to the proprietor on his paying a melting charge of one per mille on the gross weight in tolas before melting, and a fee of Rs. 2-8-0 for each assay, if the silver should have been subjected to assay.
10. On completion of melting and assay, the Mint Master will deliver to the proprietor a certificate in Form D, after deducting the authorised amount of seigniorage duty and on the proprietor surrendering the receipt in Form B, given to him under clause (d) of Rule 4. A notice will be hung up in the bullion office indicating the period after which such certificate will be payable in British dollars at the Mint for export.
11. The proprietor of any silver bullion who, being dissatisfied with the Assay Master's report of its fineness, wishes to withdraw such bullion, can do so within twenty-four hours of his receipt of the certificate in Form D, on prepayment of a melting charge at the rate of one Rupee per 165,000 grains fine silver (*i.e.*, 1,000 tolas Rupee standard), a fee of Rs. 2-8-0 for each assay, a fee of Rs. 5 for the withdrawing order, and two annas per box or bar.
12. Silver bullion or coin tendered at the Mint for coinage into British dollars and subsequently rejected by the Mint or withdrawn by the proprietor, will be subject to import duty, which must be paid to the Customs Department; and, before such silver bullion or coin can be removed from the Mint, the proprietor will be required to produce a certificate in Form E, signed by the Collector of Customs, that import duty on such silver has been paid.
13. Silver bullion in course of receipt by the Mint may be transferred by the original proprietor to another on his signing a letter in Form F, to the Mint Master, notifying the transfer and paying Rs. 4 for each transfer. Such transfer will be recognised on the transferee re-tendering such bullion or coin in a letter in Form G. If the receipt in Form B has been already given to the original proprietor, it should be surrendered, and another receipt in Form B will then be given to the transferee.
14. The Mint will not undertake to commence coining British dollars until at least five hundred thousand tolas of fine silver shall have been received by the Mint Master. When coinage operations have ceased, owing to the whole quantity of silver received having been used up, coinage will not be resumed until the Mint has again in stock at least five hundred thousand tolas of fine silver.

15. The agreement with the guaranteeing Banks shall be held to have commenced from the date on which the last tender completing the first five hundred thousand tolas is made up.

16. The dollars issued in payment of certificates will be securely packed in boxes at and by the Mint and in the presence of the proprietor's representative. Each box of packed coin will bear a consecutive number and will be handed over to the Customs authorities to be shipped for export. The cost of packing and transport will be at the charge of the proprietor and must be paid before the coin leaves the Mint.

17. The Mint does not undertake to coin British dollars at a more rapid rate than 20,000 pieces per working day when the quantity of silver received under Rule 14 is not more than five hundred thousand tolas. The return will be increased according to the discretion of the Mint Master when the quantity received is larger.

RULES SUPPLEMENTARY TO THE MINT RULES.

(CUSTOMS DEPARTMENT.)

1. Silver bullion or coin imported for the British dollar coinage will be exempt from import duty.

2. On any silver which can be identified as silver which has been imported on payment of customs duty, a drawback of seven-eighths of the duty will also be allowed when it is tendered to the Mint for coinage.

In both the foregoing cases the tenderer will have to obtain an exemption certificate from the Mint in Form C.

3. The procedure for the removal from the place of landing to the Mint of silver bullion or coin that may be imported for the British dollar coinage, will be the same as that observed in the case of goods to be deposited in the public warehouse under bond, except that no bond need be executed. All such silver will be removed from the landing place to the Mint under the supervision of a Customs officer.

4. When silver bullion or coin which has been warehoused at the Mint without payment of duty is rejected after receipt by the Mint as unfit for coinage, or is withdrawn by the tenderer because he is dissatisfied with the Assay report, the procedure for the removal of such silver from the Mint will be the same as the procedure for the clearance of goods for home consumption from a public warehouse. The application for removal of a parcel of silver, when presented at the Custom House, should be accompanied by a certificate from the Mint Master in Form E for that particular parcel. The certificate at the foot of the form will be signed by the Collector of Customs and returned to the tenderer for presentation at the Mint along with a duplicate of the application for removal.

5. When duty-paid silver has been tendered for coinage, and is rejected or withdrawn as in Rule 4, the Mint Master may allow such silver to be removed from the Mint without the orders of the Collector of Customs, if no exemption certificate has been granted by the Mint Master in respect of such silver, or (when such certificate has been granted) if the certificate is returned to the Mint Master for cancellation: but if drawback has already been allowed on such certificate, the silver shall not be removed until a certificate is produced from the Collector of Customs that the duty has been repaid to him.

6. The finished British dollar coin will be packed in the Mint in boxes consecutively numbered, in accordance with Rule 16 of the Mint Rules. The boxes will be shipped under the supervision of a Customs Preventive Officer, and must be accompanied by the tenderer or his representative, and the shipment will be made at the cost of the tenderer.

BYE-LAWS OF THE MINT BULLION DEPÔT.

1. All tenders of silver bullion and coin should specify either the number of bars or the number of parcels of silver bullion and coin, and in either case the approximate weight of the whole amount of the tender.

2. The tenders should be numbered in the order of delivery into the bullion depôt when all the bars or parcels specified in the tender are brought in. When a portion only is brought in, the tender should be numbered after the delivery of the number of bars or parcels specified is completed.

3. The silver tendered should be delivered by the authorised agent of the owner, who will see to the locking up of the parcels or bars in the strong-room of the depôt.

4. The tenders will be dealt with according to priority of numbers, if the authorised agent be in attendance; if not, the next in succession, having an agent in attendance, will be taken in hand. The order of succession only applies to silver taken out for melting.

5. Importers sending two or more invoices of silver bullion with only one tender are to understand that their agents alone will be responsible for keeping the silver bullion belonging to each invoice separate; but if the silver bullion of each invoice be separately tendered, care will be taken to keep each parcel distinct.

6. Proprietors are distinctly to understand that their agents are to satisfy themselves as to the accuracy of the weighments in the bullion office of their silver bullion after melting. If the proprietor's agent should observe anything either in the beam or in the method of weighing that he disapproves, he should make a report of it at once in writing to the Mint Master, and if anything is found at fault by the Mint Master, steps will be taken to remedy it, and every facility will be given to the agent to make the necessary corrections. Proprietors must therefore look only to their agents for explanation if any discrepancy should occur between the invoice and the Mint weighments.

7. *Registry of Bullion.*—Proprietors' silver bullion, after it has been melted and when it is ready for registry, will be taken into the bullion office; and after the bullion has been registered, proprietors' agents, durwans, &c., are to go out through the Mint gate at the warders' lodge.

8. *Passes.*—All passes for silver bullion required to be sent out of the bullion depôt, whether silver dross from the melting room or bullion rejected by the Mint previous to registry or withdrawn by proprietors, will be made out by the bullion clerk and sent to the Mint Master for his signature and then delivered to the proprietors' agents. Thereafter the bullion will be passed out through the Mint gate at the warders' lodge.

9. Proprietors will be required, in addition to the one per cent. charged by the Mint, to pay all other charges, such as for boxes and packing, and shipping charges for export of dollars. Silver dross will be removed at the expense of the proprietors.

10. Proprietors may have a guard at the strong-room door during working hours if they choose, as their silver is in deposit at their risk.

11. Silver bullion once rejected by the Mint as unfit for coinage will not again be received for the purpose of being melted without the special authority of the Mint Master.

GENERAL DEPARTMENT.

No. 2148.—The following Bye-laws made by the Municipal Corporation of the City of Bombay under Sections 461 and 462 of the City of Bombay Municipal Act No. III of 1888, and confirmed by His Excellency the Governor in Council under Section 463, are published for general information :—

BYE-LAWS relating to Markets and Slaughter-houses under the authority of Section 461, clauses (k), (l), (m), (n), and (o), and Section 462 of the City of Bombay Municipal Act, 1888.

CHAPTER I.

General.

1. In the construction of the Bye-laws herein after contained, the following words and expressions shall have the meanings hereinafter respectively assigned to them, unless such meanings be repugnant to, or inconsistent with, the context or subject-matter in which such words or expressions occur: that is to say:

Words importing the singular number shall include the plural, and the plural the singular, and words importing the masculine gender shall include females.

"The Act" means the City of Bombay Municipal Act, 1888, and includes any Act which may hereafter be passed in substitution for, or amendment of, the said Act.

"The Commissioner" means the Municipal Commissioner for the City of Bombay appointed under Section 54 of the Act, and includes an Acting Commissioner appointed under sub-section (3) of Section 59 of the Act.

"The Health Officer" means the Municipal Executive Health Officer for the time being appointed or acting under the Act.

"The Superintendent" means the Superintendent of Markets and Slaughter-houses for the time being.

The expression "a standing" shall include any place, space, or accommodation, whether defined or not, which may be allotted or allowed to any person resorting to a market for the purpose of sitting thereat as a seller of goods or wares, or for the purpose of placing thereon any stand, bench, board, tray, or other like thing.

Delegation of Powers, Duties and Function of Commissioner.

2. Any of the powers, duties or functions conferred, or imposed upon, or vested in the Commissioner by any of the following Bye-laws, may be exercised, performed, or discharged under the Commissioner's control, and subject to his revision and to such conditions and limitations, if any, as he shall think fit to prescribe, by any Municipal Officer whom the Commissioner generally or specially empowers in writing in this behalf; and in each of the said Bye-laws the word "Commissioner" shall, to the extent to which any Municipal Officer is so empowered, be deemed to include such officer.

CHAPTER II.

Municipal Markets.

1. Every tenant or occupier of any shop, stall, godown or standing in a Municipal market shall at all times afford free access thereto for purposes of inspection to the Commissioner, the Health Officer, or the Superintendent, or to any Municipal officer appointed in that behalf by the Commissioner.

2. A tenant or occupier of any shop, stall, godown, or standing in a Municipal market shall not bring or cause to be brought into such market any goods, provisions, or marketable commodities, except such as are intended for sale in such market, nor shall he for any longer time or in any other manner than shall be reasonably necessary for the conveyance of such goods, provisions, or marketable commodities to or from such shop, stall, godown, or standing, or any part of such market, place or deposit, or cause or allow to be deposited, in any passage or place adjoining such shop, stall, godown, or standing, or elsewhere, in such market, or in any of the immediate approaches thereto, any hamper, crate, basket, box, barrel or other receptacle for any goods brought into such market for the purpose of sale or of exposure for sale.

3. A tenant or occupier of any shop, stall, godown, or standing in a Municipal market shall not cause or allow any goods, provisions, marketable commodities, or articles to be deposited or exposed for sale in or upon such shop, stall, godown, or standing, so that such goods, provisions, marketable commodities or articles, or any part thereof shall project beyond the line of such shop, stall, or godown, or beyond the limits assigned to such standing so as to obstruct the passage of any person or of any goods, provisions, marketable commodities, or articles in or through the market or any part thereof.

4. Every tenant and occupier of any shop, stall, godown, or standing in any Municipal market shall daily arrange his goods before the hour of 6 A.M., and shall remove or put them away, and, in the case of a tenant or occupier of a shop,

stall, or godown, close such shop, stall, or godown before the hour which may for the time being be prescribed by the Commissioner as the hour for closing such market, so as to admit of the market being thoroughly cleansed.

5. Every tenant and occupier of any shop, stall or godown in a Municipal market shall cause the same to be kept in a cleanly condition, shall allow no refuse or garbage to remain about it, but shall cause the same to be put in a tub, box or basket and to be carried to the proper receptacle.

Shops, &c., to be kept clean.

No person shall waste the water supplied in any Municipal market by the Corporation.

Water not to be wasted.

6. Every tenant and occupier and every servant of a tenant or occupier of any shop, stall, godown or standing in any Municipal market shall at all times be decently and properly dressed when present in the market; and no tenant or occupier of a stall at which meat or fish is sold shall sit in or upon his stall so as to be in contact with such meat or fish.

Tenants, &c., of shops and their employés to be decently clad.

7. No person shall occupy or use any shop, stall, godown, standing, bench, table, compartment, place or space in any Municipal market, except as the immediate tenant or occupier thereof from the Corporation.

No tenancies except direct from the Corporation.

No person not being the immediate tenant or occupier from the Corporation, or an employé of such immediate tenant or occupier, shall sell or offer or expose for sale or deposit for sale or otherwise, any articles in or upon any shop, stall, godown, standing, bench, table, compartment, place or space in any Municipal market.

Only immediate tenants or occupiers from Corporation and their employés to sell in market.

No person shall assign, sub-let or part with the possession of any shop, stall, godown, standing, bench, table, compartment, place or space in any Municipal market.

No assignments or sub-letting permitted.

8. Every tenant or occupier of any shop, stall, godown or standing in any Municipal market, who shall employ another person to carry on his business at such shop, stall, godown, or standing on his behalf and as his substitute, shall register with the Superintendent of Markets, and from time to time keep so registered, the name of every such employé who may for the time being be deputed to act for him as aforesaid.

Persons appointed as substitutes for tenants, &c., to be registered.

He shall forthwith cease to employ at such shop, stall, godown or standing as such substitute as aforesaid any person whose employment in that capacity may be prohibited in writing by the Commissioner.

Substitutes prohibited by Commissioner not to be employed.

9. No person shall hold any sale by auction in any Municipal market without the written consent of the Commissioner.

No sales by auction without permission.

No person who is not a tenant or occupier of a shop, stall, godown or standing in a Municipal market shall sell articles by sample in such market or its approaches, the bulk being elsewhere, or shall in such market tout for, or take an order, for any article.

Sale by sample by persons not being tenants, &c., prohibited.

No person, whether an occupier or not, shall obstruct or lay hand on persons resorting to the market in soliciting their custom.

Obstruction and laying hand on persons resorting to markets to obtain their customs not allowed.

10. No person shall hawk, carry about, or cry any article whatever for sale in any Municipal market.

No hawking, carrying about or crying of articles for sale.

No person for the purpose of attracting purchasers to his shop, stall, godown, standing, bench, table, compartment, place or space, shall use in any Municipal market any bell or other noisy instrument whatever.

No noisy instrument to be used to attract purchasers.

11. No person shall bring any dog, or knowingly permit any dog to follow him into any Municipal market.

No dogs allowed.

12. No person shall, in any Municipal market, whistle, shout or make use of any violent, obscene, abusive, disgusting or offensive language.

No whistling, shouting or offensive language allowed.

13. No person shall in any Municipal market smoke, spit the juice of "pán-supári," or wilfully or negligently throw or drop in or upon any avenue or passage of such market or any of the immediate approaches thereto, any orange peel, vegetable substance, or other matter whatsoever to the danger or damage of any person.

No smoking, spitting pán-supári juice, or throwing about of orange peel, &c., allowed.

14. No person shall loiter or stand in any of the avenues or passages of any Municipal market or its immediate approaches to the annoyance or obstruction of any person.

No loitering or standing in passages, &c., allowed.

No person shall remove any meat or offal from any Municipal market without first wrapping the same up in cloth or paper, so that it shall not be exposed to the public view.

No person shall sleep in or on any shop, stall, godown or other place within the limits of any Municipal market.

No sleeping allowed in markets.

15. No person shall ply for hire as a helkari or cooly in any Municipal market unless he be in the service of a tenant or occupier of some shop, stall, godown or standing

No helkaris or coolies to ply in markets unless in employ of tenants, &c., or purchasers.

in such market, or be brought into such market by a person resorting thereto for the purpose of purchasing therein.

Every person plying for hire as a helkari or cooly as aforesaid shall wear a badge on the sleeve of his left arm granted to him by the Superintendent, for which a deposit of Re. 1 will be required, together with the name and address of the holder to be entered in a register kept for the purpose, and such badge may be withdrawn at any time.

16. No person resorting to a Municipal market

as a buyer or seller or as a helkari or cooly, shall at any time refuse, neglect or omit to comply with

any reasonable directions of the Superintendent or any of his assistants for the maintenance of order and regularity.

17. Weights and measures according to recognized local standard of

principal Municipal market called the Arthur Crawford Markets, and an officer appointed by the Commissioner in that behalf will attend at this market at times to be fixed by the Commissioner, for the purpose of verifying weights and measures by comparison with the said standards, and for stamping the weights and measures so verified.

18. No tenant or occupier of a shop, stall, godown or standing in a

No tenants, &c., to keep weights or measures other than such as have been verified and stamped under sections 418 and 419 of the Act.

Municipal market shall keep at such shop, stall, godown or standing, any weight or measure which has not been duly verified

by comparison with the standard weight or measure and stamped in accordance with the provisions of sections 418 and 419 of the Act.

19. An officer appointed by the Commissioner

in that behalf of the farmer or contractor, to whom the right may have

been farmed, will attend at the Arthur Crawford Markets or other Municipal markets, at times to be fixed by the Commissioner, for the purpose of weighing and measuring goods and articles. Fees shall be payable therefor as shall be fixed by the Commissioner with the sanction of the Standing Committee.

20. Every person who brings or causes to be brought any goods or

Goods to be removed after weighing or measurement.

articles to be weighed or measured by the Municipal standard weights or

measures shall immediately after the weighing or measurement thereof is completed, cause the said goods or articles to be forthwith removed.

21. No person shall deliver to a purchaser any goods or articles of a less

weight or measure than has been represented, or that have been fraudu-

lently or deceptively packed.

CHAPTER III.

Private Markets.

1. Every owner, lessee, contractor, agent, tenant

Free access to be afforded to shops, stalls, &c., for inspection.

or occupier of a private market or of any shop, stall, godown or standing therein shall at all times afford free access to every part of the premises for purposes of inspection, to the Commissioner, the Health Officer, or the Superintendent, or to any Municipal Officer appointed in that behalf by the Commissioner.

2. Every person to whom a license has been

Licensees to cause markets to be properly lighted.

or may be granted by the Commissioner, under section 403 of the Act, to keep open a private market, shall cause such market to be properly lighted to the satisfaction of the Commissioner by gas or oil lamps or electricity from sunset until the hour which may for the time being be prescribed by the Commissioner as the hour for closing such market.

3. Every person to whom a license has been or may be granted by the Commissioner, under section 403 of the Act, to keep open a private market shall comply with the following regulations for securing and maintaining such market in a proper sanitary condition:—

(a) He shall twice at least in every year, and

Licensees to limewash twice a year or oftener if required.

oftener if required so to do by the Commissioner, cause the said market to be limewashed both internally and externally to the satisfaction of the Commissioner.

(b) He shall once at least in every two years,

And to paint once in every two years or oftener if required.

and oftener if required so to do by the Commissioner, cause all woodwork or ironwork in the building of the said market to be painted to the satisfaction of the Commissioner.

CHAPTER IV.

Municipal Slaughter-houses.

Bandra Slaughter-houses.

1. The Municipal slaughter-houses at Bandra

Municipal slaughter-houses at Bandra for slaughter of animals other than pigs.

are established and set apart for the slaughter of animals other than pigs, intended for human food for consumption in the city.

2. A person bringing an animal intended for

Animals brought for slaughter to be presented for inspection and fair ground fees to be paid.

slaughter to the Municipal slaughter-houses at Bandra shall present such animal for inspection to the Superintendent or his Assistant at the fair ground attached to the said slaughter-houses (and which forms part of the slaughter-house premises) at least 48 hours before the time at which such animal is intended to be slaughtered, and shall pay the fair ground fee for such animal according to the scale for the time being in force.

3. The Superintendent, or his Assistant for the time being in charge at the fair ground, shall inspect and examine every animal so presented, and shall cause to be branded with some distinctive mark (but in such manner as not to cause pain) every such animal which he may consider fit to be slaughtered for human food.

An animal so marked will, on payment of a slaughter and carrying fee at the rate for the time being in force, be admitted for slaughter into the inner yard of the slaughter-houses, provided that no animal shall be permitted to pass into the inner yard of the slaughter-houses at a later hour in the day than 5 P.M. during the period from 1st October to 28th February or than 5-30 P.M. during the period from 1st March to 30th September.

4. The Superintendent or his Assistant whose duty it is to inspect any animal presented for inspection shall reject any such animal which for any reason may appear to him unfit to be slaughtered for human food. The owner of an animal so rejected shall cause it to be forthwith removed from the slaughter-house premises.

5. A person shall not under any circumstances pass or attempt to pass into the inner yard of the slaughter-houses any animal which has not been inspected and branded as fit for slaughter under Bye-law 3 of this Chapter. Any animal which has not been branded as aforesaid found within the inner yard of the slaughter-houses will forthwith be removed from the slaughter-house premises, and if it appears to be diseased, unsound, or unfit for human food will be dealt with pursuant to the provisions of sections 415 and 417 of the Act.

6. Should an animal which has been inspected and branded as aforesaid be found before slaughter to be diseased, unsound or otherwise unfit for human food, it will, notwithstanding it has been so branded, be forthwith removed from the slaughter-house premises, to be dealt with pursuant to the provisions of sections 415 and 417 of the Act.

7. Should the carcass of an animal which has been inspected and branded as aforesaid be found after slaughter to be diseased, unsound, or otherwise unfit for human food, it will, notwithstanding the animal was so branded, be dealt with pursuant to the provisions of section 416 of the Act. All fees paid in respect of the animals in Bye-laws 6 and 7 referred to

except the slaughter-fee in the case of animals slaughtered, will be refunded on application to the Superintendent.

8. Every person desirous of carrying on the business of a butcher, broker, shroff, cattle-dealer or hide-dealer, or of otherwise carrying on trade or business, or of working for gain within the limits of the slaughter-house premises shall obtain from the Commissioner a written permission or ticket of license to enter and carry on such business within the said premises on payment of such annual or other fee as shall from time to time be fixed by the Commissioner with the sanction of the Corporation, and no person shall carry on any such trade or business or work for gain within the limits aforesaid without such written permission or ticket of license.

9. All animals are to be slaughtered in such a manner as will not cause unnecessary pain or suffering, and in dressing any carcass or portion of a carcass, the meat shall not be subjected to the process of "blowing" or "fooka" by any person.

10. No person not being the holder of a written permission or ticket of license shall without the previous permission of the Commissioner enter the Municipal slaughter-houses or fair ground at Bándra.

11. No person shall carry any stick, bludgeon or other weapon within the limits of the Municipal slaughter-houses or fair ground at Bándra.

SLAUGHTER-HOUSE FOR PIGS AT SONÁPORE.

12. The Municipal slaughter-house for pigs at Sonápoore is established and set apart for the slaughter of pigs intended for human food for consumption in the city.

13. A person bringing a pig intended for slaughter to the Municipal slaughter-house for pigs at Sonápoore shall present such pigs for inspection to the Superintendent, or his assistant in charge, at the slaughter-house, who shall inspect and examine every pig so presented, and shall pass every such pig which he may consider fit to be slaughtered for human food. A pig so passed will, on payment of such slaughter-fee as may from time to time be fixed by the Commissioner, with the approval of the Standing Committee, under the provisions of section 407 (a) of the Act, be admitted for slaughter in the said slaughter-house: Provided that no slaughtering shall, without the previous special permission in writing of the Commissioner, be permitted in such slaughter-house except at night between the hours of sunset and sunrise.

MUNICIPAL SLAUGHTER-HOUSES GENERALLY.

14. No person resorting to a Municipal slaughter-house for any purpose shall at any time refuse, neglect or omit to comply with any reasonable directions of the Superintendent or any of his assistants for the maintenance of order and regularity.

Directions of Superintendent for maintenance of order to be obeyed.

comply with any reasonable directions of the Superintendent or any of his assistants for the maintenance of order and regularity.

CHAPTER V.

Penalties.

Every person who shall commit any breach of any of the foregoing Bye-laws contained in Chapters II, III and IV of these Bye-laws, shall be liable for every such breach to fine which may extend to Rupees 20, and in the case of a continuing breach to fine which may extend to Rupees 10 for every day after conviction for the first breach or after receipt of written notice from the Commissioner to discontinue the breach during which the breach continues.

which is named in the Order, were a British possession and part of Her Majesty's dominions, and to provide for carrying into effect such application.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the powers in this behalf by ‘The Foreign Jurisdiction Act, 1890,’ and the said recited Act, or otherwise in Her Majesty vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. ‘The Colonial Prisoners Removal Act, 1884,’ shall apply to Egypt and to the Ottoman dominions (except Egypt) as if those places were respectively British possessions and parts of Her Majesty's dominions.

Subject as follows:

As respects Egypt, Her Majesty's Agent-General, and as respects the Ottoman dominions (except Egypt), Her Majesty's Ambassador at Constantinople, shall be substituted for the Governor or Government of a British possession.

2. This Order may be cited as ‘The Ottoman Dominions (Prisoners' Removal) Order in Council 1895,’ and shall be read as one with ‘The Ottoman Order in Council, 1873,’ and the Orders amending that Order.

And the Right Honourable the Earl of Kimberley, K.G., Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, is to give the necessary directions herein.

And whereas the immediate operation of this Order is urgent, this Order shall come into operation forthwith.

Whereas by Treaty, capitulation, grant, usage, sufferance, and other lawful means, Her Majesty the Queen has jurisdiction within the Ottoman dominions:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in this behalf by ‘The

Foreign Jurisdiction Act, 1890,' or otherwise in Her Majesty vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows :

Supreme Court.

1. Subject to the provisions of this Order, there shall be one Judge of the Supreme Court who shall be appointed by Her Majesty by warrant under Her Royal sign-manual.

He shall be at the time of his appointment a member of the Bar of England, Scotland, or Ireland, of not less than seven years' standing.

2. For the purposes of this Order the Secretary of State may, from time to time, appoint a fit person, being either a Judge of the Supreme Court of a British possession or of Cyprus, or a person qualified to be Judge of the Supreme Court at Constantinople, to be an Additional Judge of the Supreme Court.

3. Every appeal from the Court for Egypt, under the Ottoman Orders in Council, shall be heard and determined by the Judge and additional Judge of the Supreme Court.

4. Any person aggrieved by any final order of the Supreme Court in a civil suit or proceeding, whether in the original or appellate jurisdiction of that Court, and not being an order made on an appeal from the Court for Egypt, may, within fifteen days after the order is made, apply by motion to the Supreme Court for a rehearing, and the cause or matter in which the order was made shall be set down for rehearing, and shall be reheard before the Judge and the Additional Judge of the Supreme Court.

Articles 257 and 258 of the Order of 1873, which relate to applications by motion to the Supreme Court for leave to appeal to Her Majesty the Queen in Council, shall apply only to final orders of the Supreme Court made after such rehearing as is provided for by this Article, and the jurisdiction of the Supreme Court under these Articles shall be exercised by the Judge.

For the purposes of this Article, 'final order' includes any rule or order having the effect of a final or definitive judgment decree, or sentence.

5. There shall be attached to the Supreme Court a Registrar and so many officers and clerks as the Secretary of State from time to time thinks fit.

The Registrar shall be appointed by Her Majesty, and shall hold by Commission from Her Majesty the appointment of Legal Vice-Consul.

He shall be either a member of the Bar of England, Scotland, or Ireland, or a Solicitor of the Supreme Court in England or Ireland, or a Writer to Her Majesty's Signet, or a Solicitor in the Supreme Courts in Scotland.

He shall, subject to any directions of the Judge, hear and determine by summary trial such criminal charges as may, under the Ottoman Orders in Council, be properly so heard and determined, and for this purpose shall have all the jurisdiction, power and authority of Judge.

6. In case of the death or illness, or the absence or intended absence from the Consular district of Constantinople, of the Judge of the Supreme Court, or the Registrar, Her Majesty's Ambassador may appoint a fit person to be Acting Judge or Acting Registrar, as the case may be.

Jurisdiction in Lunacy.

7. The jurisdiction in lunacy conferred by Article 89 of 'The Ottoman Order in Council, 1873,' upon the Supreme Court shall, so far as the same relates to Egypt, be exercised by the Court for Egypt, concurrently with the Supreme Court, but subject to the same rights of appeal to the Supreme Court as in civil suits and proceedings.

8. A Provincial Court shall, as far as circumstances permit, have with respect to British subjects and protected persons all such jurisdiction relative to the custody and management of the persons and estates of persons of unsound mind as for the time being may be exercised in England by the Masters in Lunacy under the provisions of 'The Lunacy Act, 1890,' and any Act amending the same.

In any such case the Provincial Court may of its own motion, or on the application of any person interested, take or authorize such steps as to the Court may seem necessary or expedient for the immediate protection of the person and property of any person appearing to the Court to be of unsound mind, and may from time to time revoke, or vary, or supplement any order or proceeding taken in the matter.

Subject to the provisions of this Article, a Provincial Court shall not proceed in any such matter except under and according to the directions of the Supreme Court.

General Provisions, Repeal, &c.

9. Any reference to Her Majesty's Consul-General at Constantinople, or to his Consulate-General, contained in any Order in Council relating to the Ottoman dominions, shall be read as if 'Consul' and 'Consulate' were substituted therefor respectively.

10. The following provisions are hereby repealed :

In 'The Ottoman Order in Council, 1873,' Articles 10 to 12; Article 34 from 'or may direct' to the end of the Article; Article 48; in Article 89 the words 'in itself exclusively'; and in Article 266 the words 'or Assistant Judge.'

In 'The Ottoman Order in Council, 1882,' Articles 5 and 6.

In Article 2 of 'The Ottoman Order in Council, 1890,' the word 'Assistant.'

In Article 2 of 'The Ottoman Tribunals Order in Council, 1891,' the words 'Consul-General or other person for the time being acting as the Principal.'

In Regulation 1 of the Regulations respecting Assessors before Ottoman Tribunals, made pursuant to 'The Ottoman Tribunals Order in Council, 1891,' and approved by the Secretary of State on the 2nd December, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one, the words 'Consul-General and.'

11. This Order may be cited as 'The Ottoman Dominions (Courts) Order in Council, 1895,' and shall be construed as one with the Ottoman Orders in Council, 1873, 1882, and 1890.

SIR,—I have the honour to request on behalf of the Municipal Corporation of Bombay, under Act III of 1888, the favour of the sanction of Government to the raising from the public of a loan of Rs. (16,19,000) sixteen lakhs and nineteen thousand only, for the construction of Sewerage, Roads, Water Works, &c., as per accompanying statement, which gives the particulars required by Rule 5 of the rules relating to loans so raised.

Statement showing particulars pursuant to Rule 5 of the Rules published by the Government of India for the raising of Loans by Local Authorities.

I.—The loan is required for the construction of different works as per Statement A attached. The estimated cost of the works (exclusive of Rs. 1,32,652 already provided in the 23½ lakhs Loan sanctioned as per Government Resolution No. 809, dated 3rd March 1894) is Rs. 16,19,000.

II.—The amount which it is proposed to borrow is Rs. 16,19,000.

III.—It is proposed to borrow the said sum on the security of the general revenue of the Bombay Municipality, aggregating over Rs. 63½ lakhs (excluding the items of net premia received on loans and nominal profit on stock adjustments) on the average of the three years ending 1893-94, as per Supplementary Statement B hereto annexed.

IV.—The laws under which funds, duties, taxes, rates, cesses, &c., are levied, received or held, are Act IV of 1857, and Bombay Acts VI of 1863, V of 1878 and III of 1888.

V.—It is proposed to raise the loan in two instalments as under:—

(1) Rs. 10,00,000 between 1st July and 31st December 1895.

(2) Rs. 6,19,000 between 1st July and 31st December 1896.

VI.—The loan is required for a period not exceeding 40 years. Interest will be paid half-yearly at 4 per cent. per annum (Rs. 32,380 + Rs. 32,380 = Rs. 64,760 per annum), and a sum of Rs. 17,240 will be annually set aside from 1st July 1897 as a Sinking Fund, which, with interest accumulations at 4 per cent., will pay off the whole loan on 1st July 1936 (in not more than eighty instalments).

VII.—The yearly proceeds of each separate source of income are shown in the Supplemental Statement B hereto annexed.

VIII.—All expenditure incurred by the Municipality in each of the three years 1891-92, 1892-93 and 1893-94 is shown in the Supplemental Statement C hereto annexed.
