Calcutta, the 28th May 1895.

No. 1586-P.—The following draft of proposed rules for the preparation of applications and specifications filed under sections 5, 8, and 51 of Act V of 1888 and of drawings attached thereto, is published for general information, and notice is hereby given that the draft will be taken into consideration by the Governor General in Council after the expiry of two months from this date.

2. Objections or suggestions with respect to the draft should be addressed to the Secretary to the Government of India in the Department of Revenue and Agriculture; and if received before the expiry of the above term, will be taken into consideration.

Draft of proposed Rules.

1. All words used in these rules and defined in the said Act shall have the meanings thereby assigned to them respectively.

2. Applications and specifications must be neatly and legibly written upon stout paper of half foolscap size, that is, of a size of 13 inches in height by 8 inches in width, and the pages numbered consecutively in the right hand top corner.

3. Drawings must be on either stout paper or tracing cloth, and must be neat and clear.

4. The left hand portion of each sheet of drawings, to the width of a half sheet of foolscap, that is, a width of 8 inches, must be left blank, so that when the sheets are opened out, the sheets which

lie above them and contain the text of the application or specification will conceal no portion of the drawings.

5. Each sheet of drawings must be—

(a) of a width not greater than that of a sheet of foolscap, that is, a width of 16 inches, except when the size of any single drawing is such that a greater width is required for it;

(b) of the same height as a sheet of foolscap, that is, a height of 13 inches, except when the size of any single drawing is such that notwithstanding increased width a greater height is unavoidably necessary.

6. A clear margin of half an inch must be left round the portion of the sheet which is occupied by drawings.

7. Reference figures and letters must be clear and bold, and the same letters should be used for the same parts in different views or drawings. In complicated drawings, or when there is not room to write the letters in their proper places, the letters should be shown outside the figure and connected with the parts referred to by fine lines.

8. The name of the applicant, and the year in which the application is made or specification filed, should be shown on each sheet of drawings in the right hand top corner of the blank space left under rule 4. The sheets, when more than one, should be numbered consecutively, and the number of each should be shown in the right hand top corner of the sheet.

9. No written description of the invention or design should appear on the sheets of drawings.

10. When a patent has been applied for or obtained in England, a facsimile of the drawings submitted with the English application may be filed, without reference to the above rules.

11. Notwithstanding its non-compliance with any of the above rules, the Governor General in Council may in his discretion permit any application or specification to be received and filed without requiring the same to be amended.

Temporary removal of a Buoy and discontinuance of Light.

Information has been received from the Agent to the West of India Portuguese Guaranteed Railway Company, Limited, dated 9th instant, that the red buoy marking Marmugao Rock will be removed from position on or about the 25th instant for the South-West Monsoon, and the red light at end of breakwater discontinued when the monsoon sets in, and that both the above will be replaced after the monsoon.”

The exact dates of their removal will be notified hereafter.”

RANGOON RIVER.

Alteration in position of the Elephant Point Leading Lights.

Information has been received from the Port Officer, Rangoon, dated 7th instant, that the Elephant Point Leading Lights at the entrance to Rangoon River have been moved S. 10° 30' E. 67 yards from their present positions and bear from seaward N. 60° 30' W. magnetic.

The lights are 133 yards apart and visible between the bearings of N. by W. to S. W. magnetic from seaward.

The high light is 33 feet and the low light 15 feet above high water springs of the dry season, and are visible in clear weather five and four miles.”

No. 38.—In exercise of the powers conferred by Section 35, sub-section (1), of the Indian Ports Act (X of 1839), the Governor in Council is pleased, with the previous sanction of the Governor General in Council, and in supersession of Government Notification No. 54, dated 2nd May 1893, to make the following orders respecting the rates at which fees for pilotage may be charged in the Port of Aden:—

1. In this order—

(a) the words “Inner Harbour” mean all that space in the Port of Aden to the north-eastward of and within a line drawn from the flag-staff on the Battery (called the Saluting Battery) through the Light Vessel to the opposite coast, to which the Governor in Council has by Notification No. 74, dated 29th July 1892, published at page 761 of Part I of the *Bombay Government Gazette* for 1892, specially extended the provisions of Section 31 (1) of the Act, and

(b) the words “Outer Harbour” mean all the space (other than the Inner Harbour) within the limits of the Port of Aden as declared by Bombay Government Notification No. 53, dated 2nd May 1893, published at page 397 of Part I of the *Bombay Government Gazette* for 1893.

2. (a) No fee shall be chargeable for the pilotage by day of a vessel out of the Inner Harbour.

(b) In no other case shall the fee chargeable for the pilotage of any vessel within the limits of the Port of Aden be less than ten Rupees.

(c) Fees shall be chargeable in excess of Rs. 10, calculated at the rates hereinafter specified, on the tonnage of the vessel pilot-
ed.

For a Pilot who is, by reason of a vessel not being ready to proceed, detained thereon for more than one hour after he has come on board Rupees ten.
