ROYAL DECREE.

Whereas the 'Portarias' of the Governor General of the State of India of the 27th of April 1893, and 5th of January 1894, in which certain alterations are introduced into the provisions contained in the Customs Tariff approved by the Decree of February 17th, 1894, have been laid before me;

Whereas most of these alterations are recommended by the principles which dictated the regime laid down in the last-named Decree;

With the advice of the Consultative Board of the Colonies and of the Council of Ministers;

Availing myself of the power accorded in paragraph 1 of Article 15 of the 1st Additional Act to the Constitutional Charter of the Monarchy;

I hereby Decree:

Article 1. Clause D of Article 26 of Tariff A annexed to the Decree of 17th February 1894, is to be worded as follows:

So that ('Inhames') Yams ('Surnos') are excluded from Clause C in said Article 26.

Article 2. Numbers 19 and 44 of Tariff B, respecting merchandise exempt from the payment of import duties, which is annexed to the Decree above referred to of the 17th of February 1894, are to be worded as follows :

No. 19. Bran husks of Garavances, and of any cereals and dry pulse, straw, hay, and other similar products for feeding cattle.

No. 44. Hewn stones in the rough, either cut or millstones, and flagstones of Porbandar.

Article 3. Any laws contrary thereto are hereby revoked.

The Minister and Secretary of State for the Marine and Colonial Department shall accordingly carry this Decree into effect.

No. 19. Farellos, cascas de grão e de todos os cereaes e legumes, palha, feno e productos similares destinados a alimentação do gado.

No. 44. Pedras de cantaria em bruto, cortada ou em mos para moinhos, lages de Porbandar.

Art. 3º. Fica revogada a legislação em contrario.

BY HER MAJESTY'S HIGH COURT OF JUDICATURE.

CROWN SIDE RULES.

Constitution of Court and Sittings.

1. The Ordinary Original Criminal Jurisdiction of the Court shall be exercised by a single Judge unless the Chief Justice shall otherwise direct. Any point of law which may be reserved under the provisions of clause 25 of the Letters Patent or Section 434 of the Code of Criminal Procedure, or which may be brought before the Court under the provisions of clause 26 of the Letters Patent, shall be heard and determined by a Division Court constituted by such three or more Judges as the Chief Justice shall appoint.

2. Applications for the exercise of the Extraordinary Original Criminal Jurisdiction conferred on this Court by clauses 24 and 29 of the Letters Patent and application under Section 526 of the Code of Criminal Procedure, shall be heard and disposed of at the Appellate Side. But cases directed to be tried by the High Court will be tried at the Crown Side according to the provisions of the said Code of Criminal Procedure before such Judge as the Chief Justice shall appoint.

3. The Criminal Sessions shall commence on the following dates in each year unless such date shall fall on a Sunday or a close holiday, in which case they shall commence on the Court-day next succeeding:

February 2nd,
April 10th,
June 27th,
September 1st,
November 20th,

and the Court shall sit daily (Sundays and close holidays excepted) unless the presiding Judge otherwise directs until the jails are delivered.

4. The following matters are disposed of by a Judge sitting in Chambers:

(a) Application for orders under clauses (c), (d), (e) and (f) of Section 491 of the Criminal Procedure Code.

(b) Applications for bail unless the Court of Sessions is sitting, in which case the application may be made to that Court.

Summonses and Processes.

5. All summonses, precepts, rules, orders, and mandatory process shall be issued from and returned into the office of the Clerk of the Crown, and shall be subscribed by him and tested, sealed, and executed in the same manner as the like processes are on the Original Side.

6. No summons shall be issued by the Clerk of the Crown to compel the attendance as a witness of any person resident and at the time residing beyond the limits of Bombay, Salsette and Caranjah, unless the Court or some Judge thereof order the same.

7. In cases where witnesses reside beyond the local limits of the Ordinary Original Criminal Jurisdiction of the High Court are bound over by recognizances or summoned to attend and give evidence at the trial of any person committed by any Magistrate in the Mofussil to any Criminal Sessions of the High Court, it shall not be necessary for the Clerk of the Crown to issue any summons to such witnesses, but the Clerk of the Crown shall in all such cases, in sufficient time before the day appointed for holding the Criminal Sessions, send a letter to the Magistrate of the district from which the committal was made, stating the day on which the Criminal Sessions are to be held, with a list of the witnesses from whom recognizances have been taken and of those to whom summonses have been issued, and requesting the Magistrate to cause the witnesses to be served with notice to attend on the day named in sufficient time to ensure their attendance on that day.

List of Jurors and Summoning Jurors.

8. Every male person between the ages of 21 and 60, who is a British subject and able to understand and speak the English language and is resident within the Town and Island of Bombay and is in the receipt of an income of Rupees Seventy

a month and upwards is qualified, and shall, except as next hereinafter mentioned, be liable to serve as a Juror.

9. The following persons are exempt from liability to serve as Jurors, namely :

- (a) The Governor, the Members in Council, the Secretaries and Assistant Secretaries to Government, and the Accountant General.
 - (b) Clergymen in Holy Orders, Priests, and Dissenting Ministers following no secular employment except that of a schoolmaster.
 - (c) Barristers-at-Law, Advocates, Pleaders, Attorneys and Solicitors actually practising.
 - (d) Judges, Presidency Magistrates, Officers of the High Court, Court of Small Causes and Presidency Magistrates' Courts, Coroners and Jailors.
 - (e) Physicians, Surgeons, Apothecaries, and Medical Practitioners actually practising.
 - (f) Officers in Her Majesty's Army and Navy on full pay, Officers of the Indian Marine holding the command of or employed in any ship or vessel, persons employed in the Pilot Service, all persons serving in the Police, the Secretary of the Bank of Bombay, the Sheriff, Deputy Sheriff and Sheriff's officers.
 - (g) The following officers and employés of any Railway Company, that is to say, the Resident and Assistant Engineers, District Traffic Superintendents, the Assistant and Second Assistant Locomotive Superintendents in charge of the Running Department, the Permanent-way Inspector, Carriage Examiners, Engine Drivers, Locomotive Foremen, Station Masters, and Guards.
 - (h) All Engineers in charge of Mills who by the rules of Government are obliged to remain in charge of machinery.
 - (i) Persons who have been convicted and sentenced by a criminal court to imprisonment for an offence punishable with imprisonment for a term exceeding six months or to transportation, such sentence not having been subsequently reversed or quashed or the offender pardoned.
 - (j) Persons incapacitated in the opinion of the Clerk of the Crown from serving by insanity or imbecility of mind or by deafness, blindness, or any other permanent infirmity ; and
 - (k) Such other persons whose absence from their employment while serving on Juries may in the opinion of the Clerk of the Crown be likely to be prejudicial to the public service.
10. The Sheriff, a sufficient and convenient time before the 1st day of April in each year, shall proceed to prepare and make out a true list of all men qualified and liable to serve as Jurors in alphabetical order containing in separate columns opposite to each man's name his proper style, addition or calling, his place of residence and his religious profession, provided always that in stating the religious profession of any person it shall be sufficient to say Christian, Mahomedan, Hindu or the like, without specifying the particular church or sect of the party ; and the Sheriff shall deliver the said list signed by him or his deputy to the Clerk of the Crown on or before the 1st of April.

11. The Clerk of the Crown upon the receipt of such list as aforesaid shall thereupon, if need be, make enquiry and make any necessary additions, corrections, or alterations thereto which he shall think fit and shall adjudge and determine who out of the persons entered in such lists are to serve as Common and Special Jurors respectively, and shall place in a separate list the names of all persons chosen by him to serve as Special Jurors, and shall thereafter proceed and deal with such lists as provided in the Code of Criminal Procedure.

12. The Clerk of the Crown shall keep the said original lists or a true copy thereof, and shall allow the same to be perused by any person at any reasonable time without charge, and the Clerk of the Crown shall also furnish the Sheriff with a true copy of the said lists.

13. If at any time after the making of such lists it should appear that any person placed thereon has been described by a wrong Christian or Surname or that his place of residence has been wrongly stated or that there is any clerical mistake in the said list, the Clerk of the Crown may, on being satisfied of the truth of the matter, correct such wrong description or mistake, provided that no correction shall be made in either of such lists which would have the effect of placing on the list of Jurors the name of any person who was not intended to be placed thereon at the time the same was prepared.

14. The Clerk of the Crown shall, fourteen days at least before each Criminal Sessions, issue his precept to the Sheriff commanding him to summon the requisite number of Jurors to serve on the Special and Common Juries respectively as provided by the Code of Criminal Procedure.

15. The Sheriff on the receipt of the said precept shall summon out of the names contained in the said lists the requisite number of Special and Common Jurors, provided that one-half at least of those summoned shall be European British subjects. The service of the summons shall be made six days at the least before the Sessions by handing the same to the person summoned, or in case he shall be absent from the usual place of his abode or business, by leaving it with some person there inhabiting or being engaged in business.

16. If during the continuance of any Sessions it appears that the number of persons so summoned is not sufficient, the Sheriff shall on the verbal request of the Clerk of the Crown summon with all convenient speed such additional number of persons liable to serve as Jurors as may be necessary to attend on such days as the Court shall appoint.

Panel of Jurors.

17. The Sheriff shall at the commencement of each Sessions deliver to the Court a panel of the persons summoned to serve on the Special Jury as aforesaid and also a panel of the persons summoned to serve on the Common Jury as aforesaid, and nothing in these rules contained shall be construed to take away from the Court such control as it may legally exercise on any panel delivered by the Sheriff.

Choosing a Jury.

18. The names of each man who shall be summoned as aforesaid to serve on the Special Jury with the place of his abode and addition or calling

shall be written on a separate piece of paper or card, such pieces of paper or card being all as nearly as may be of equal size and shall be put by the Sheriff or Deputy Sheriff in a box and delivered by him to the Clerk of the Crown at the commencement of each day's sitting of the Sessions; and the Clerk of the Crown shall in the presence of the prisoner about to be tried draw from the said box in open Court the said pieces of paper or card indiscriminately one after the other, and the names of the first nine that shall be drawn out and appear and shall not be challenged or set aside or excused shall form the Special Jury to try such prisoner: Provided that on the trial of a person claiming to be tried by a mixed Jury under the provisions of Section 451 of the Code of Criminal Procedure the Clerk of the Crown shall put back into the box the papers or cards drawn by him on which appear the names of persons who are not European British subjects until there are in the Jury box five European British subjects who shall not have been challenged, set aside or excused, after which he shall complete the number of the Jury by drawing out the papers or cards indiscriminately as in ordinary cases.

19. The name of each man who shall be summoned as aforesaid to serve on the Common Jury with his place of abode and addition or calling shall be written and placed in a separate box and delivered to the Clerk of the Crown as aforesaid, and the Common Jury shall be drawn and chosen in the same manner as is hereinbefore provided for the Special Jury.

20. If from any cause it is inconvenient for all the prisoners who have had their challenges in respect of a particular Jury to be tried by such Jury, another Jury may be empanelled to try them without the former Jury being formally discharged: provided only that such prisoners have not been given in charge to the former Jury.

21. After the close of each Sessions the Sheriff or Deputy Sheriff shall note in the margin of the lists of Jurors kept by him against the names of the Special and Common Jurors who have been summoned to serve at that Sessions the fact that they have been so summoned.

22. Mahomedan Jurors shall not be required, unless actually serving on a Jury, to attend on Fridays or on the holiday of Ramjān Id.

23. Pārsi Jurors shall not be required, unless actually serving on a Jury, to attend on the Pateti, Navroz, or Khordādsāl holidays.

24. Hebrew Jurors shall not be required, unless actually serving on a Jury, to attend on Saturdays nor on the 15th and 22nd Nisan or on the 10th Tisri.

Applications under Section 491, Criminal Procedure Code.

25. Applications for orders under clauses (c), (d), (e) and (f) of Section 491 of the Criminal Procedure Code shall be made on an affidavit setting forth the circumstances under which the order is sought.

26. Applications for orders in the nature of a Habeas Corpus under clauses (i) and (j) of Section 491 of the Criminal Procedure Code shall be made to a Judge sitting in a Division Court on the

Original Side on petition duly verified by oath or affidavit.

27. If such Judge is of opinion that a *prima facie* case for granting the application is made out, a rule *Nisi* shall be issued calling upon the person or persons against whom the order is sought to appear on a day to be named therein to show cause why such order should not be made and at the same time to produce in Court the body of the person or persons alleged to be illegally or improperly detained then and there to be dealt with according to law.

28. On the return day of such rule or on any day to which the hearing thereof may be adjourned, if no cause is shown or if cause is shown and disallowed, the Court shall pass an order that the person or persons improperly detained shall be set at liberty or delivered to the person entitled to their custody. If cause is allowed, the rule shall be discharged.

29. In disposing of any such rule the Court may in its discretion make an order for the payment by one side or the other of the costs of the rule.

Applications for Bail.

30. Every application that a prisoner who has been committed for trial to the Sessions be brought up to be bailed may be made *ex-parte* and shall be supported by an affidavit stating when, by whom, for what offence, and under what circumstances the prisoner was committed to custody and where he is detained in custody and the grounds for the application. If the application is granted, the Clerk of the Crown without any formal order being drawn up shall, unless the prisoner be present, write a letter to the Jailor in whose custody the prisoner is, directing the Jailor to bring him before the Judge or the Court as the case may be at a time to be specified in the said letter, and a letter shall also be written by the Clerk of the Crown directing the Magistrate by whom such prisoner has been committed to produce before the Judge or Court the depositions in the case taken before him, unless such depositions shall have been previously forwarded to the office of the Clerk of the Crown.

31. At least 48 hours' notice of the bringing up of a prisoner to be bailed shall be given to the prosecutor, who may file affidavits in opposition to and may appear to oppose the making of the order that the prisoner be admitted to bail.

32. If on the making of the application mentioned in Rule 30 the prosecutor consents to the matter being dealt with forthwith, the Judge or Court may then and there make such order as may seem just.

33. If the order be that the prisoner shall be admitted to bail, the Judge or Court shall direct to what amount such bail shall be taken and with how many sureties, and unless the Court or Judge approve the names proposed as bail or shall otherwise direct, the Clerk of the Crown or his deputy in his absence shall after examination approve the same if he is satisfied of their sufficiency.

34. Unless the Court or Judge shall otherwise order the recognizance of such persons and of the prisoners shall be entered into before the Clerk of the Crown or his deputy in his absence, and the Clerk of the Crown or his deputy is authorised by

letter to direct the Jailor in whose custody the prisoner is to bring up the prisoner before the Clerk of the Crown or his deputy to enter into his recognizances, and on the prisoner being so brought up, the Clerk of the Crown or his deputy may on recognizances being entered into according to the Judge's order, direct that the prisoner shall be released.

Appeals against Orders under Section 491, Clauses (a) and (b), of the Code of Criminal Procedure.

35. The Appeal shall be heard and determined by the Division Court established on the Original Side for the purpose of hearing appeals.

36. The memorandum of appeal shall follow as nearly as may be the form prescribed for memoranda of appeals on the Original Civil Side, and Rule 188 shall *mutatis mutandis* and as far as applicable apply to memoranda of appeals under these rules.

37. The memo. shall be accompanied by a copy of the order appealed against.

38. With the memo. of appeal the appellant shall (unless he appears in person or the Court otherwise orders) deposit in Court the sum of Rs. 200 as security for the costs of the Appeal, and the Clerk of the Crown shall give a certificate of such deposit having been made.

39. The Clerk of the Crown is empowered to accept and file a memo. of appeal if Rules 35—37 have been complied with and such of the following conditions as apply to the case have been fulfilled, namely:

(a) That the appellant has within twenty days after the date of the judgment being pronounced applied to the Clerk of the Crown for a copy of the order, and (if no application has been made to draw up the same) to have the original drawn up.

(b) That the appellant has presented the memo. of appeal within the time allowed by the Limitation Act.

40. An application for the admission of a memorandum of appeal rejected by the Clerk of the Crown shall be made to the Appellate Court at the earliest opportunity and on at least two days, notice to the respondent.

An application by a respondent to take off the file a memorandum of appeal admitted by the Clerk of the Crown shall be made in like time and manner.

41. An application under Rule 39 shall be on affidavit setting forth the grounds on which the applicant relies, and a copy of such affidavit shall be served on the respondent or appellant as the case may be along with the notice, and the notice, the said affidavit, and any further affidavit in reply or otherwise shall be filed in the Crown Office not later than the day before the hearing.

42. The appellant shall at the time of filing his memo. of appeal apply to the Clerk of the Crown for a copy of affidavits or other necessary documents including a copy of the Judge's notes if the Judge hearing the application has examined any of the parties or allowed witnesses to be examined, and shall prepare the paper-book without delay.

43. An official copy of the Judge's notes (if any) shall be filed by the appellant in the Crown Office at least two days before the day fixed for the hearing of the appeal, and at the same time a copy of the paper-book for each of the Judges sitting in appeal shall be delivered to the Judge's Clerk.

44. The paper-book shall contain copies of the following proceedings:

The Memo. of Appeal.

The Order.

The Judgment (if written).

The Petition and all Affidavits (with exhibits) filed in support or in opposition thereto.

The Judge's notes (if any).

Such other papers as shall be relevant and necessary for the purposes of the appeal, and shall be properly paged and indexed.

45. When disposing of the Appeal the Court may make such order as to the costs of the Appeal and original motion as it thinks fit.

The above rules framed by the Honourable the Chief Justice and Judges are published for information and come into force on and from the 1st July 18.5 in supersession of all rules dealing with the same matter.
