No. 585.—In exercise of the power conferred by Section 4 of the Indian Forest Act, No. VII of 1878, as amended by Act No. V of 1890, and in supersession of Government Notification No. 7676, dated 10th November 1891, published at page 913 of the Bombay Government Gazette of the 12th idem, Part I, His Excellency the Governor in Council is pleased to appoint the Assistant or Deputy Collectors in charge of the several tilukas of the Belgaum and Dhárwár Districts to be ex-officio Forest Settlement Officers for all lands within the tálukas forming their respective charges which have been notified as proposed Reserved Forests under Section 4 or as

Reserved Forests under Section 34, and have not since been disforested under Section 26, and in respect of which the enquiries into rights contemplated by clause (c) of Section 4 and sub-para. 3 of Section 34 of the said Act have not yet been made.

- 2. Under Section 16 of the said Act His Excellency the Governor in Council is also pleased to appoint the Collectors of Belgaum and Dhárwár to hear appeals from any orders passed by the said Forest Settlement Officers under Sections 10, 11, 14 or 15 of the said Act.
- 3. His Excellency the Governor in Council is pleased to direct that the inquiry and record in respect of the Protected Forests of the said districts shall be made and prepared by the said Forest Settlement Officers in the same manner and subject to the same provisions and right of appeal as in the case of Reserved Forests.

JUDICIAL DEPARTMENT.

No. 688.—It being the intention of the Governor in Council to apply the Glanders and Farey Act, XX of 1879, to the local area included within the Municipal limits of the City of Ahmednagar and of the Town of Bhingár, the Cantonment of Ahmednagar and the village sites and lands of Bágroza, Marchudánagar, Cháhurána Budruk, Cháhurána Khurd, Máliváda, Sheri Faria Bág, Burudgaon, Padampur, Wákodi, Darevádi, Nimbodi, Sháhápur, Bhingár, Nágardevli, Buráunagar, Kapurvádi, Gálimkhána, Sáwedi, Sheri Behisht Bág, Bolhegaon, Nálegaon, Nepti, and Kedgaon, the following draft rules proposed to be issued under Section 14 of the said Act are published for general linformation; and it is hereby notified that any objections to, or suggestions with respect to them, will be considered by Government, if submitted so as to reach Government in the Judicial Department on or before the 1st March 1895:—

1. The Inspector appointed under Section 4 of the Glanders and Farcy Act, 1879, shall, whenever he has reason to believe, from personal knowledge or from information given by any person and taken down in writing, that a diseased horse is to be found in any building, enclosure or place, forthwith proceed to the said building, enclosure or place, and in the presence of the owner or other person then in charge, or, if he is absent, in the presence of an officer of Police, shall inspect the said premises and execute and discharge the duties and powers conferred on him under the Act.

The Inspector may, in such entry and search, be accompanied by a Veterinary Surgeon or such Police officers as he considers necessary or by both.

The owner of the premises or person in charge at the time shall give free ingress to the Inspector and shall in every possible way facilitate the search, and he shall be entitled subsequently to receive

from the Inspector a statement in writing of the grounds of entry and, in the event of his premises being infected, shall receive written instructions as to his liabilities and duties under the Act signed by the Inspector.

- 2. The Inspector shall seize and hand over to the Police for detention any horse which he considers diseased or which he reasonably suspects of being so. Such animal shall, as soon as possible, and with the exercise of due precautions against contagion to other horses and men, be examined by a Veterinary Surgeon and dealt with under the Act. Such precautions shall comprise, in the case of a discharge from the nose, the wearing of a nosebag and, in the case of open sores, the covering up of the same, so far as is practicable, with disinfecting powder and cloths and bandages during removal along public roads; and such removal shall, unless there be any sufficient reason to the contrary, be at night. These precautions shall be enforced in all cases where horses have to be moved for examination or disposal under the Act.
- 3. The owner or person in charge of a horse which he believes or has reason to believe to be diseased, shall report the case within twenty-four hours to the Inspector or to a Police officer (who shall at once inform the Inspector) and may remove the animal to any isolated building within fifty yards of the stable or to a remote part of the building, enclosure or other place, where the animal has been standing, and shall keep it, as much as is possible, within these limits away from other horses. He shall detain in the stable, until the granting of a license for removal, any horse which has been in contact with or near the diseased animal.

Except as provided in these Rules, no person shall intentionally or negligently cause or permit any diseased horse to stray or to be worked, led or driven in a public thoroughfare, road, street or place.

- 4. Licenses for the removal of horses which have been with a diseased horse will be granted by an Inspector under Section 11 of the Act, on the following conditions, viz.:—
 - (1) That the horse to be removed shall be taken direct, under such precautions as the Inspector deems fit to prescribe, to a place to be prescribed by the Inspector, where it can be conveniently isolated.
 - (2) That whilst so isolated the horse shall be inspected from time to time, at intervals of not more than a week, by the Inspector, provided he be a Graduate of the Bombay Veterinary College, or if he is not, then by the Veterinary Surgeon.
 - (3) That the horse shall continue at the appointed place in isolation for so long as the Inspector, provided he be a Graduate of the Bombay Veterinary College, or if he is not, then the Veterinary Surgeon, deems it necessary to have it under treatment or observation.
- 5. The owner or person in charge of any building, enclosure or other premises which have been occupied by any diseased horse, shall, within seven days, carry out such disinfection of such building, enclosure or other premises and destruction of dung, litter, and waste food, gear and other articles in or near to the premises, as may be prescribed by the Inspector, provided he be a Graduate of the Bombay Veterinary College, or if he is not, then by the Veterinary Surgeon.

In all cases dung, surplus food, and litter from the infected stable, also clothing and other gear which has been used by, or been in contact with, the diseased horse, shall be consumed or disinfected by fire; temporary building materials, such as thatch of grass or leaves, bamboo walls and matting, shall be burned, if the position admits of this being done with safety, and (after complete removal of all dung, temporary fittings and other articles for destruction by fire) the wood-work of the stable shall be thoroughly washed with boiling water, the walls, wood-work and ceiling shall be scraped and limewashed with freshly mixed quicklime and water, to which shall be added crude carbolic acid in the proportion of half a pint to a bucketful of lime-wash, and the flooring shall be removed to a depth of two feet and not renewed for the space of two weeks, the removed earth being burnt and replaced by fresh earth. The whole of the interior shall then be fumigated with burning sulphur, chlorine, carbolic vapour, or some other gaseous disinfectant.

- 6. On a certificate from the Veterinary Surgeon that a horse is diseased, it shall be destroyed humanely in the presence of the Inspector, and the carcass disposed of by burning under the supervision of the Police. Except with the sanction of the Police and for the purpose of burning it, no person shall remove the carcass or any portion of it.
- 7. In the event of the disinfection of premises and the destruction of gear, fittings, dung and other articles condemned by the Inspector, not being carried out by the owner within the period of seven days, they shall be carried out by the Inspector under Police supervision, and the expenses shall be recovered from the owner of the premises in the manner prescribed by Section 9.
- 8. The Superintendent of Police, Ahmednagar, may award to the Inspector, at whose instance any conviction is obtained under the Act, a sum not exceeding half the amount of any fine imposed.

Extract from the Proceedings of the Government of India in the Home Department (Sanitary),—under date Calcutta, the 11th January 1895.

Correspondence with, and reports from, the Government of Bombay and Messrs. Thomas Cook & Son on the arrangements made by the latter in connection with the conveyance of pilgrims to and from the Hedjaz from 1888 to 1894.

RESOLUTION.

In the Resolution of the 21st January 1886, cited above, it was stated that in October 1884 a communication had been received from Messrs. Thomas Cook & Son expressing the readiness of that firm to undertake the conveyance of Muhammadan pilgrims between India and the Hedjaz. The success which had attended the extensive schemes of Messrs. Cook & Son for lessening the difficulties and increasing the comfort of travellers in different parts of the world seemed to the Government of India to afford an assurance that that firm would be successful in placing the arrangements for the conveyance of pilgrims between this country and Arabia on a footing more satisfactory to the Government, and more convenient to the pilgrims themselves, than had hitherto been found possible. After carefully considering the matter in personal communication with Mr. J. M. Cook, the Governor General in Council came to an agreement with the firm by which they were to be appointed pilgrim agents for the whole of India. Local officers and officers in charge of treasuries were instructed to assist the firm in making known the terms of through conveyance to Jeddah and back, and in disposing of through tickets; and the Government of Bombay were requested to make over to the representatives of the firm the issue of passports in Bombay after they had been signed by the proper authorities, and to instruct the Protector of Pilgrims to work in harmony with the firm and to render them every assistance. On their part, Messrs. Cook & Son agreed to arrange with the railway administrations, steamship proprietors and others concerned for the conveyance of the pilgrims, at through fares, from all the chief stations in India to Jeddah and back, and to do all in their power to secure the transit of the pilgrims in satisfactory ships supplied with proper accommodation in accordance with the regulations laid down by the Government. The firm were prepared to provide the requisite agency for the work, Muhammadans being appointed for that purpose in all cases where necessary; to establish a special pilgrimage office in the most convenient position in Bombay, and possibly also at Jeddah; and to make all detailed arrangements in connection with the issue of the necessary announcements, forms of tiexets, etc. They also expressed their readiness to comply with the requirements and regulations which might be laid down from time to time by the Government of India in the same manner as though they were in the service of the Government.

- 2. During the winter of 1886-87 Mr. F. H. Cook made a tour in India with the view of personally working out the details of the scheme in communication with the Government of India and of explaining to the Muhammadan community what the firm proposed to do. In their Resolution of the 3rd May 1887, the Government of India announced the detailed arrangements which had been completed with Messrs. Cook & Son. These were to last for three years from the beginning of 1887 and to be terminable at the end of that period at the option of either the Government or Messrs. Cook & Son. In the event of the Government withdrawing after three years from the scheme, Messrs. Cook & Son were to be at liberty to continue it as a private enterprise. It was explained that, though the Government gave their countenance and assistance to Messrs. Cook & Son's enterprise, they had no desire to constitute a monopoly in favour of the firm. As, however, the firm engaged to convey pilgrims to Jeddah at a fair charge, to protect them while on the journey from extortion and ill-treatment, and to provide them with comforts and facilities in the way of supplies of food and banking arrangements, the Government were, it was stated, satisfied that pilgrims would do well to take advantage of the firm's arrangements. The prices of single and return steamsnip fares were fixed on the representation of Mr. F. H. Cook and the advice of the Government of Bombay. Tickets, inclusive of the railway and steamer fares, were to be kept for sale at the office of the Collector or Deputy Commissioner of every district in India, and district officers were instructed to give the widest publicity to the advantages to be secured which were set forth in a prospectus approved by the Government of India. A guarantee against actual loss in the execution of these arrangements, up to £2,000 for the first year and £1,000 for each of the two following years, was given by the Government of India, on the understanding that Messrs. Cook & Son should furnish their accounts for audi
- 3. The report of Messrs. Cook & Son on the arrangements carried out by them in connection with the Hajj of 1887 showed that, out of a total of 9,839 pilgrims, who sailed from ports in British India for Jeddah and Yembo, 1,936 (or 19.8 per cent.) were booked by the firm. The chief advantage which the pilgrims had secured was stated by the firm to be that of through booking at fixed rates, inclusive of

landing and baggage charges. Messrs. Cook & Son were endeavouring to charter vessels themselves for future voyages in order to be able to furnish improved accommodation on board. The accounts of the firm showed a loss of £2,592, and the sum of £2,000 guaranteed by Government was accordingly paid to them.

- 4. On the 27th February 1888, Messrs. Cook & Son reported that they had chartered for the coming season four steamers from Bombay to Jeddah and two from Jeddah to Bombay. The dates of departure of these vessels were published in the Gazette of India, and the Local Governments and Administrations were requested to give every publicity to them. The report on the working of the arrangements during 1888 showed that 13,532 pilgrims left Bombay for the Haji, in 16 steamers, of whom 3,961 (or 29.3 per cent.) were conveyed by Messrs. Cook & Son in four steamers. A loss was incurred by the firm above the amount of the guarantee of £1,000, and the guaranteed sum was accordingly paid by Government. In his letter dated the 17th April 1889, Mr. J. M. Cook stated that, from the experience they had gained, Messrs. Cook & Son were convinced that it was quite impossible for them to convey the pilgrims in the way they were doing at existing rates for a profit, and that, unless the Government of India expressed satisfaction with, and appreciation of, the past working of the arrangements, they did not consider that they would be justified in incurring the great responsibility and personal labour involved. The Home Secretary's letter of the 18th October 1889 conveyed the reply of the Government of India to the effect that, after making enquiries from the Local Governments and Administrations, they were assured that the conditions under which Indian pilgrims could proceed to the Heljaz had been materially improved, particularly in the reduction of opportunities for extortion, since Messrs. Cook & Son had undertaken the work, and that the Governor General in Council believed that this was not only the case in the ships by which pilgrims proceeded with the firm's tickets, but also that the example set on the vessels chartered by the firm had raised the standard of comfort on the vessels belonging to other firms. The Government of India accordingly indicated their willingness to continue the arrangements with Messrs. Cook & Son for the
- 5. The report on the working of the arrangements during 1889 showed that 11,544 pilgrims left Bombay for the Hajj, in 15 steamers, of whom 4,460 (or 38.6 per cent.) were conveyed in the four steamers chartered by Messrs. Cook & Son. The amount of compensation claimed by the firm was R3,236 on account of the losses sustained in connection with the pilgrim traffic to the Hedjaz in 1889, and R4,969 representing the losses incurred in previous years which had not been covered by the guarantee. The former sum was paid to Messrs. Cook & Son, but the Government of India did not consider the firm to be entitled to the latter sum.
- 6. The report on the arrangements made in 1890 showed that of 9,953 pilgrims who left Bombay for the Hedjaz in eleven steamers, 4,220 (or 44½ per cent.) were conveyed in the four steamers chartered by Messrs. Cook & Son. The statement of account submitted by the firm showed a claim against the Government of R12,761-15-4, which sum included R6,272 on account of losses incurred in previous years. In Home Department letter dated the 25th August 1891, the Government of India sanctioned the payment of the sum of R6,489-13-10, being the amount of actual loss sustained during 1890.
- 7. On the 29th June 1891, the firm again addressed the Government of India regarding the question of continuing the arrangements. They expressed their conviction that the business of conveying pilgrims to the Hedjaz under the conditions proposed by them and accepted by the Government of India could never be made self-supporting, and enquired whether the Government was prepared to guarantee them against actual monetary loss. They stated that to enable the arrangements to be carried out in a satisfactory manner, it would be necessary to put on a special service of steamers to compete with the shippers who had been in the trade for many years, and that an increase in the amount guaranteed would be necessary. The Government of India were reluctant to withdraw from the scheme without a further trial of it, and expressed their willingness to continue existing arrangements for a further period of two years (1892 and 1893). This was eventually arranged on condition that the Government of India should pay to the firm the sum of £6,272 claimed as losses over the sums guaranteed in previous years, and should continue the indemnity and allow losses accruing to the firm in 1892 to be carried on to the accounts for 1893, provided that the total indemnity for those two years should not exceed £2,000. These terms were accepted by the firm in their letter dated the 21st April 1892.
- 8. The report of the arrangements for the year 1891 showed that, out of a total of 12,032 pilgrims who left Bombay for the Hajj in 18 steamers, 4,485 (or 37.2 per cent.) were conveyed in four steamers chartered by Messrs. Cook & Son. The amount of compensation paid to the firm for the losses of the year was R14,471-8-5.
- 9. The report on the pilgrim traffic for the year 1892 showed that 12,466 pilgrims left Bombay for the Hedjaz in 19 steamers, and that only 2,939 (or 23.5 per cent.) were carried by Messrs. Cook & Son in three steamers chartered by them. In addition to these the firm conveyed 732 pilgrims in one steamer from Calcutta. The Government of India sanctioned the payment to the firm of the sum of £1,000 towards the loss of £36,147-2-9 (=£2,259-3-9) sustained by them during the year.

LEGISLATIVE DEPARTMENT.

The following Report of the Select Committee on the Bill to provide for the Imposition and Levy of certain Duties on Cotton Goods was presented to the Council of the Governor General of India for the purpose of making Laws and Regulations on the 27th December, 1894:—

We, the undersigned, Members of the Select Committee to which the Bill to provide for the Imposition and Levy of certain Duties on Cotton Goods was referred, have considered the Bill and the papers noted in the list appended, and have now the honour to submit this our Report, with the Bill as amended by us annexed thereto.

- 2. We have revised the definition of Collector in section 2, with the object of showing on the face of the Bill that the Customs Collectors at the larger ports only are to perform the functions of the Collector under the Bill and that elsewhere they may be discharged by the Collector of the district or by such officer as the Local Government may appoint.
- 3. We have so altered the first proviso to section 5 as to make it clear that it is the intention to exempt from duty all yarns which would, by mercantile usage, be reckoned as of the number of 20 or less, even though they may slightly exceed that number, that is, may weigh slightly less than the weight theoretically attributable to that number.
- 4. We have appended to sub-section (2) of section 6 a Schedule specifying the same tariff values for yarns dutiable under this Bill as those which are proposed for like yarns when imported by sea by the Bill to amend the Indian Tariff Act, 1894, which is now before the Legislative Council.
- 5. We have added a sub-section to section 7 under which the first returns of yarns produced will not be required of millowners until the 15th February.
- 6. With the view of meeting, as far as possible, an objection taken to section 18 by the Bombay Millowners Association, we have altered the section so as to permit of yarns shipped for export being shown in the return for any month not later than that in which the yarn is shipped.
- 7. We have added an explanation to section 19 the effect of which will be to enable the drawback on yarn which has only been bleached or dyed or converted into sewing thread being recovered under this section.
- 8. In deference to representations made to us we have extended the periods within which, under section 21, drawback on export of cotton fabrics may be claimed to twelve months from the date of the manufacture of such fabrics, and to twelve months from the date on which the yarns in respect of which drawback is applied for have paid duty.
- 9. We have inserted an additional number in Section 25 taken from the Bombay Salt Act, 1830, imposing a penalty on officers guilty of abusing their powers under the Bill.
- 10. We have inserted two new sections (section 31), imposing on millowners the duty of keeping such records and accounts as they may be required to do by rule, and (section 35), applying the provisions of section 10 of the Tariff Act, which prescribe rules as to payment of duty in the case of contracts for sale made before duty has been imposed, to duties imposed under this Bill.
- 11. We have added a sub-section to section 36 with the object of subjecting goods which may be imported in contravention of a notification issued under the section to the penalties imposed by section 19 A of the Sea Customs Act in the case of goods whose importation is prohibited under that Act.
- 12. The other alterations we have made in the Bill as introduced do not appear to us to be of sufficient importance to call for notice.

THE SCHEDULE.—TARIFF VALUES OF YARNS.

An Act to provide for the Imposition and Levy of certain Duties on Cotton Goods.

WHEREAS it is expedient to impose certain duties on cotton goods; It is hereby enacted as follows:—

PRELIMINARY.

Title, extent and commencement.

1. (1) This Act may be called the Cotton Duties Act, 1894.

- (2) It extends to the whole of British India; and
 - (3) It shall come into force at once.

2. In this Act, unless there be something repugnant in the subject Definitions. or context,-

- (2) "Chief Customs Authority" means, in the Presidency of Fort St. George, and the territories respectively under the administration of the Lieutenant-Governors of Bengal and the North-Western Provinces and the Chief Commissioner of Oudh, the Board of Revenue; in the Presidency of Bombay outside Sind, the Commissioner of Customs; in Sind, the Commissioner; in the Punjab and Burma, the Financial Commissioner; and elsewhere, the Local Government or such officer as the Local Government may, by notification in the official Gazette, appoint in this behalf by name or in virtue of his office:
 - (3) "Collector" means-
 - (a) at Calcutta, Bombay, Madras, Rangoon and Karachi, the Collector of Customs,
 - (b) in any other place, the Collector or Deputy Commissioner of the district or such other officer as the Local Government may appoint in this behalf, and includes-
- (c) every officer for the time being duly authorised by the Local Government to perform all or any of the duties of a Collector under this Act:
- (4) "mill" means any building or place where cotton fibre is spun or otherwise converted into yarn, or where yarn is woven, or otherwise manufactured by machinery moved otherwise than by manual labour:
- (5) "warehouse" means a place licensed for the storage of goods under this Act, and includes every public or private warehouse duly appointed or licensed under section 15 or 16 of the Principal Act, or under section 2 of the Inland Bonded XXI of 18-7. Warehouses Act, 1887;
 - (6) "yarn" means yarn wholly or partly composed of cotton fibres; and
 - (7) "customs port," "foreign port," "vessel" and "Master" have respectively the meanings defined for them in the Principal Act.
 - 3. The officers subordinate to a Collector shall, unless the Local Govern-

duties imposed and exercise the powers conferred upon officers of Customs under the Principal Act.

EXCISE.

Application of Sea Customs Act.

4. In the application of the Principal Act or any particular section or sections thereof to this Modifications to be made in Sea Customs Act as applied to this Part.

Duties.

There shall be levied and collected at every mill in British India upon all cotton Imposition of duties on cotton yarns produced in British Indian mills. yarns produced in such mill, a duty at the rate

for the time being prescribed in the Indian Tariff Act, 1894, for the levy of duty in respect of VIII of 1894. cotton yarns imported by sea:

Provided that no duty shall be levied upon yarns of any count commercially known as number 20 or less:

Provided also that the Governor General in Council may, by notification in the Gazette of India, exempt from duty any yarns of any count or number not exceeding 24.

Explanation.—Yarn is said to be "produced" within the meaning of this Act—

- (a) in the case of yarn which is reeled and bundled in the mill in which it is spun-when it is so bundled;
- (b) in the case of yarn which is woven or otherwise manufactured in the mill in which it is spun-when it is passed out of the spinning section of the mill ;
- (c) in any other case—when it is issued out of the premises of the mill.
- 6. (1) The Governor General in Council may from time to time, by notification in the Gazette of India, fix, for the purpose Power to Governor General in Council to fix tariff values of such

yarns. of levying the said duties, tariff values of all such yarns as aforesaid or of any particular count or counts thereof, and alter any tariff values for the time being in force.

- (2) In the absence of any notification under sub-section (1), the tariff values shall be those specified in the schedule to this Act.
- (3) Such tariff value shall, for the purposes of this Act, be deemed to be the "real value" of the yarns to which it applies, but save as aforesaid all yarns shall be assessed under this Act at their real value as defined in section 30 of the Principal Act.
- 7. (1) The owner of every mill shall prepare Dolivery of monthly returns of yarn produced by mill-owners.

 and deliver, or cause to be prepared and delivered, to the Collector, on or before the Collector, on or before the fifteenth day of each month, a return of all cotton yarn produced at his mill during the Part the following modi-fications shall be made and shall subscribe a declaration of the truth of such statement at the foot of such return.

- (2) Unless otherwise prescribed by any rules under this Act, every such return shall state for each count or number of yarn the quantity produced during the preceding month under each of the three heads mentioned in the explanation to section 5, and in the case of dutiable yarn the real value of such yarn.
- (3) Every such return shall also contain such further information and be in such form and be subject to such conditions as to verification and otherwise as may be prescribed by any rules under this Act.
- (4) The first of such returns shall be made on or before the fifteenth day of February, 1895, and shall include all yarn produced since the commencement of this Act.
- Assessment of duty and notice requiring payment.

 Assessment of duty and notice requiring payment.

 The duties, if any, payable in respect of the month to which the return relates, and unless the amount thereof is immediately tendered shall cause a notice, in such form as may be prescribed by any rules under this Act, to be served on the owner requiring him to make payment of the amount assessed within ten days of the date of service of the said notice.
- (2) A notice under sub-section (1) may be served on the owner of a mill by delivering or tendering to him or his agent at his ordinary place of business a copy of the notice, or, if this cannot be conveniently done, by fixing a copy of the notice on one of the outer doors of the mill.
- 9. Sections 30 to 34, 37, and 39 to 41, all inclusive, of the Principal Act, shall apply to the assessment and recovery of duties under this Act.

Provided that the rate of duty and the tariff valuation applicable to any yarn which has not been warehoused as hereinafter provided shall be those in force at the time when the yarn was produced, and not when the return was delivered as provided by the said section 37.

- 10. (1) If any duty payable under this Act is Recovery of unpaid not paid within the time duty. fixed by any such notice as aforesaid for the payment thereof, the Collector may, in lieu thereof, recover any sum not exceeding double the amount of duty so unpaid, which he shall, in his discretion, think it reasonable to require.
- (2) All sums recoverable under sub-section (1) shall be recovered in the manner provided in Act II of 1886, section 30, sub-sections (1), (2) and (3), with respect to the sums therein referred to.

Warehousing.

Licensing of ware-houses for storage of yarn, and fees for same. warehouse for the storage of cotton goods, and for the purposes of this Act every such place shall be deemed to be a warehouse and to have been duly licensed under the Principal Act.

(2) There shall be payable in respect of every such warehouse such and the like licensing fees and other payments as may for the time being be payable in respect of a private warehouse licensed under the Principal Act:

Provided that the Chief Customs Authority may remit the whole or any part of such fees or other payments in respect of any particular warehouse.

- Permission to deposit yarn in warehouses.

 Permission to deposit for leave to deposit in a warehouse any yarn in respect of which duty has become leviable under section 5 and which has not been issued out of the mill.
- (2) Such application shall be in writing signed by the applicant, and shall be in such form as may be prescribed by the Chief Customs Authority.
- Application to yarn so deposited of provisions of Chapter XI of the Principal Act, so far as the same are applicable to imported goods of a similar description, shall apply to all yarn in

respect of which an application has been made under section 12.

Exemption from assessment of yarn so deposited in the return made under section 7 for the month in which the yarn was produced, and the said yarn shall be omitted in the assessment and collection of duty.

Inspection.

- Power to Collector to inspect mills, and take copies of records and accounts.

 The Collector, or any officer duly appointed by the Local Government in that behalf, shall have free access at all reasonable times during working hours to any mill.
- (2) Any such officer may at any time, with or without notice to the owner, examine the working records, sale records, and accounts of any mill, and take copies of, or extracts from, all or any of the said records or accounts, for the purpose of testing the accuracy of any return, or of informing himself as to any particulars regarding which information is required for the purposes of this Act or any rules thereunder.
- 16. (1) All such copies and extracts, and all other information acquired to be deemed official secrets within meaning of Act XV of 1889.

(2) If any such officer shall disclose to any person other than a superior officer any such official secret as aforesaid without the previous consent in writing of the Chief Customs Authority, he shall be guilty of a breach of official trust, and shall, upon conviction thereof, be punishable in the manner provided by section 4 of the Indian Official Secrets Act, 1889.

Export and Drawback.

- 19. When any yarn upon which duty has been paid under this Act is exported by sea from any customs port to any foreign ports, such duty shall, except as otherwise herein provided, be repaid as drawback:

Provided that in every such case the yarn has not been woven into cloth or otherwise altered in character since the payment of duty, and that it is shown to the satisfaction of the Collector at the port of shipment, that the duty on the said yarn has been duly paid, and that the export is made within two years from the date of payment of the duty, or within such further time as the Chief Customs Authority on sufficient cause shown may in any case determine.

Explanation.—Yarn bleached or dyed or converted into sewing thread is not to be deemed to have been altered in character for the purposes of this proviso.

20. (1) When any cotton fabrics manufactured

- (2) In every application made under subsection (1) the applicant must state—
 - (a) the quantities and counts of yarns in respect of which drawback is claimed, the mill at which they were produced, and, as nearly as possible, the dates on which they were produced;

- (b) the mill at which, and, as nearly as possible, the dates on which the fabric was manufactured.

Offences and Penalties.

25. The offences mentioned in the first column of the following schedule shall be punishments to the extent mentioned in the first column of the following schedule shall be punishment column thereof with reference to such offences respectively:—

1. Contravening any rule made under this Act.

2. Concealing or attempting to conceal, or knowingly permitting or procuring to be concealed, any yarn liable to duty under this Act with intent to evade payment of the duty or any part thereof.

3. Omitting to make any return required by section 7 or refusing to sign or complete the same.

- 4. Making and delivering any such return containing any statement not true to the best of the information and belief of the person making the same.
- 5. Altering or falsifying any record or book of account kept in the mill with the intention of defrauding the revenue.

Penalty not exceeding five hundred rupees.

Such yarn shall be liable to confiscation, and every person convicted of the offence shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding three times the value of the yarn.

Penalty not exceeding one thousand rupees.

The penalty provided in XLV of 1869. the Indian Penal Code, section 199, for making a false statement in a declaration.

The penalty provided in the Indian Penal Code, section 465, for the commission of forgery.

- 10. In a letter dated the 20th July 1893, Messrs. Cook & Son enquired what were the intentions of the Government of India as to any further continuation of the arrangements with the firm for the conveyance of pilgrims to the Hedjaz, and the Government of India consulted the Government of Bombay upon the matter. The report of the Government of Bombay showed that during the official year 1892-93, the number of pilgrims embarked from Bombay was 11,896, of whom only 1,656 or not quite 14 per cent. were booked by Messrs. Cook & Son. The Bombay Government considered that the influence of Messrs. Cook & Son on the working of the pilgrim traffic was diminishing, and were unable to recommend that the existing arrangements should be continued. The Government of India came reluctantly to the conclusion that they would not be justified, in view of the diminishing number of pilgrims carried through the agency of Messrs. Cook & Son, in continuing the subsidy to Messrs. Cook & Son after 1893. This decision was intimated to the firm and communicated to Her Majesty's Secretary of State for India.
- 11. The report of Messrs. Cook & Son on the working of the arrangements during 1893 has now been received and considered by the Government of India, and the accounts for the year have been audited by the Accountant-General. The report shows that, in 1893, 18,468 pilgrims left Bombay for the Hedjaz in 29 steamers, but Messrs. Cook & Son only conveyed 1,767 (or 9.5 per cent.) in two steamers. These figures, it appears to the Government of India, are sufficient in themselves to justify the decision come to in October 1893 to terminate the arrangements with Messrs. Cook & Son. The accounts of the pilgrim traffic for that year show that the receipts to the firm from all sources amounted to R65,636-10-0, and the expenditure to R61,348-2-11. There was thus a net gain of R4,283-7-1 on the year. In pursuance of the conditions accepted by the firm in 1892, the Government of India have to make good the losses of the two years 1892 and 1893 together up to the limit of £2,000. The payment of R16,023-10-10 has accordingly been sanctioned. With the payment of this sum Messrs. Cook & Son will be recouped for all losses shown in their accounts and admitted on audit by the Accountant-General of Bombay which have been incurred by the firm since 1887 in connection with their transactions for the conveyance of Indian pilgrims to and from Arabia.
- 12. In sanctioning the above payment the Governor General in Council has thought fit to review the history of the arrangements, which were brought to a termination last year, between Messrs. Cook & Son and the Government of India. His Excellency in Council fully recognizes the good work done by the firm in improving the conditions under which Indian pilgrims during the last few years proceeded to the Hedjaz. Its influence has in his opinion been especially manifested in the reduction of the opportunities for extortion. The Governor General in Council is aware that difficulties were encountered by Messrs. Cook & Son in the opposition of the shippers interested in the traffic, but His Excellency in Council was not without hope that the popularity of the vessels of so influential a firm would have been so great that in time the continuance of the arrangements would not have necessitated a guarantee. This hope has not been realized, and the reports for recent years show that the firm's vessels have lately been less popular as compared with those of other charterers than they were. In these circumstances the Governor General in Council was forced to conclude that the experiment which had been fully and fairly tried was not likely to be more successful in future, and that the time had come for the discontinuance of the annual subsily.
