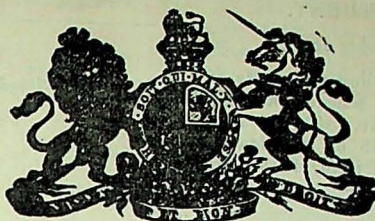

India in the Home Department, No. 1964,\* dated the 2nd September 1887, the Governor General in Council is pleased to publish for general information the following draft rule which he proposes to add to the rules to regulate the transport and importation of explosives, published in the Notification of the Government of India in the Home Department, No. 1417, dated the 24th June 1887.

The draft will be taken into consideration on the expiry of two months from the date of this Notification.

*Draft Rule.*

5. (III) No explosive belonging to class 3 (nitro-compound class) or to class 5 (Fulminate class) shall be carried otherwise than by rail over any public bridge over which reasonable facilities for the conveyance thereof by rail exist and are afforded by the Railway Administration.

A public notice shall be posted at each bridge where this prohibition applies intimating to the public that the carriage otherwise than by rail over this bridge of explosives falling under the classes mentioned above is forbidden.

MARINE DEPARTMENT.

“INDIA—GULF OF MARTABAN—  
TENNASSERIM COAST.

*Mergui Harbour—Revised Sailing Directions.*

The following revised Sailing Directions have been received from the Port Officer, Moulmein:

No stranger should attempt to enter until after the first quarter flood if of 10 feet draught, or till after half flood, if drawing more than 10 feet. At neaps, with local knowledge a vessel of 15 feet draught may enter after first quarter flood. Steer to pass about two cables to the westward of the beacon standing in 7 feet at low water, and marking the extreme of the sand spit projecting from the north-westward of Kalwin Point, and then shape course S.S.E.  $\frac{3}{4}$  E. with a white-washed basket on the beacon trees near the water (on the mangroves about one mile north of the town) in line with a white-washed pagoda on a hill behind the town,\* until the right extreme of the market, a conspicuous white shed near the water's edge comes nearly in line with the Deputy Commissioner's house (on the hill) bearing South  $\frac{1}{2}$  East.

From this position, which is 2 $\frac{1}{2}$  cables from the mangroves on Mergui Island, steer for the Deputy Commissioner's house until the north end Pataw Island bears W. by N.  $\frac{1}{4}$  N.; the left extreme of the trees on Kalwin Point should now be kept astern bearing north a little easterly, this course taking the vessel 2 to 2 $\frac{1}{2}$  cables off the Mergui Island shore, or steer to pass one cable west of the extreme of the main wharf, and anchor 1 $\frac{1}{2}$  cables W.S.W. or W.N.W. of it. These directions reversed will guide a steam-vessel in leaving the harbour.

A spit with 14 feet over it in places extends west from the end of the wharf for 1 $\frac{1}{2}$  cables. By anchoring as recommended this spit will be avoided, and vessels drawing not more than 15 feet, nor more than 200 feet in length, will have swinging room at low water.”

\* This pagoda is small and not easily distinguished; the most conspicuous pagoda is about half a mile south-westward of the first near the Deputy Commissioner's house.

Information has been received from the Port Officer, Aden, dated 12th instant, that the bar across the entrance to the new channel outside the principal light-vessel has now entirely disappeared by scour and there is now a greater depth of water in this locality than before the formation of the bar.”

The spit tongue buoy is placed in 28 feet on the following magnetic bearings from the buoy.

Eastern Grove Light-house, N.N.E.  $\frac{1}{4}$  E.  
Obelisk at Elephant Point, N.W.  $\frac{1}{4}$  W.

The spit upper buoy is placed in 20 feet reduced on the following magnetic bearings from the buoy:

Obelisk at Elephant Point, N. 66° W.

The spit tongue has wasted away to 28 feet reduced and moved to the southward.

The least water at middle ground is 20 feet at north end.”

*General Rules of 1895 for working Railways open for traffic.*

Read—

Section 47 of the Indian Railways Act, 1890.

Government of India, Public Works Department, Notification No. 118, dated the 21st March 1895, publishing—in the *Gazette of India* of the 23rd March 1895—the Government of India Circular No. 6 Railway, dated the 12th March 1895, and the General Rules for all open lines of railway in British India administered by the Government therewith, promulgated.

Letter from the Government of Bombay, Public Works Department, Railway Branch, No. 1766, dated the 15th August 1895, forwarding letter from the Agent, Great Indian Peninsula Railway Company, No. 9634, dated the 6th August 1895.

OBSERVATIONS.—The Agent, Great Indian Peninsula Railway Company, has applied that the General Rules for working open lines of railway in British India administered by the Government, which have been published in the *Gazette of India* of the 23rd March 1895, under the Government of India, Public Works Department, Notification No. 118, dated the 21st March 1895, may be made applicable to the Great Indian Peninsula Railway and the lines worked by it.

RESOLUTION.—The Governor General in Council is pleased to sanction, with effect from the 1st January 1896, the application to such portion or portions of the Great Indian Peninsula Railway and of the lines worked by it as are situated in British territory, of the General Rules for open lines of railway in British India administered by the Government which are cited in the foregoing observations, in supersession of the rules now in force.

ORDER—Ordered, that this Resolution be published under a Notification in Part I of the *Gazette of India*, as required by section 47, sub-section (3), of the Indian Railways Act, 1890; also that the General Rules cited in the foregoing observations—which have already been published in the *Gazette of India*—be kept at railway stations as directed by sub-section (6) of the same section.

The Honourable the Chief Justice and Judges of Her Majesty's High Court of Judicature at Bombay are pleased to direct that the following be substituted for Chapter XII at pages 152 to 176 of the High Court Civil Circulars, except Rule 2, page 162, and Forms A1, A2, pages 154 and 155:—

## Application of Rules.

1. These rules and forms apply to all sums received and paid by a Civil Court in connection with any suit or judicial proceeding.
2. Wherever in these rules and forms the Názir is referred to as performing any duty, the term "Názir" defined.

## List of Forms.

3. The following account forms shall be used:
- A. *Book of receipts* for money paid into Court.
- B. *Register of unadvised money orders.*
- C. *Register of deposit receipts, viz.,* register of sums received in Court in connection with suits or judicial proceedings and deposited with Government (to be kept in duplicate).
- D. *Register of deposit payments, viz.,* register of payments from sums received in Court in connection with suits or judicial proceedings and deposited with Government (to be kept in duplicate).
- E. *Register of intestate property.*
- F. *Register of attached property.*
- G. *Register of money received on account of subsistence money of civil prisoners and expenses of witnesses.*
- H. *Register of payments on account of subsistence money of civil prisoners and expenses of witnesses.*
- I. *Cash Book.*
- J. *Ledger.*
- K. *Bank or Treasury Pass-book.*
- L. *Bank or Treasury Cheque-book.*
- M. *Application for refund of lapsed deposits.*

Language in which the accounts are to be kept.

4. In all District Courts, except for special reasons, the accounts shall be kept in English (except Forms A, B, E, F, G, H). In Subordinate and Small Cause Courts they may be kept in English or in Vernacular, but the duplicates of the Registers C, D shall be in English in all Courts.

5. When any person pays money into Court in connection with any suit or judicial proceeding, or when collections of any such money are made by any officer of the Court, such person or officer shall tender such money or collections to the Názir, who shall cause a receipt to be prepared with counterfoil, according to Form A, and shall obtain the signature or mark of the person or officer tendering the money, on the counterfoil of the receipt. Both original and counterfoil shall be signed both by the officer of the Court receiving the money and also by the Názir. The counterfoil shall be recorded for reference and the receipt delivered to the person paying the money. When payments are made into Court by an officer of the Court, the receipt shall not be given to him, but shall be kept in the record of the proceedings in reference to which the collection has been made.

## Procedure on receipt of money

6. When money is received by postal money order, without advice from the remitter as to the cause or purpose for which the money has been forwarded, the amount shall be entered in a register (Form B).

and money orders.

Pending receipt of the information necessary to admit of the amount being credited to the cause or account for which the money was remitted, the item shall be transferred from Register B to Register C, the words "Money order suspense account" being written across column 5 of Register C. On receipt of the required information the amount shall be adjusted by entering the item in the manner described above as a payment in Register D, and re-entering the item in Register C or G, as the case may be, as a receipt of that date, the necessary explanation being entered in the column of remarks. A note should invariably be made on the counterfoil of receipts issued in Form A for money received through the post by money order or otherwise, giving a reference to the letter or advice with which the money was forwarded, and if the money order coupon affords information, it should be pasted on the counterfoil of the receipt (Form A). The original receipt, there being no person to receive the same, should be crossed and cancelled and be initialed by the Názir.

Use of Register C. 7. In the Register of deposit receipts (Form C) shall be entered:—

- (a) All sums deposited with the Court in connection with any suit or judicial proceeding and not to be immediately credited to Government.
- (b) The sums received on account of intestate and attached property as provided for in Rules 11, 12.

Use of Register D. 8. In the Register of deposit payments (Form D) shall be entered:—

- (a) All payments from sums deposited with the Court in connection with any suit or judicial proceeding and not to be immediately credited to Government.
- (b) The payments from sums received on account of intestate and attached property as provided for in Rules 11, 12.

The Názir before payment shall obtain the payee's signature or mark in column 13 of Register D, both the original and duplicate; but where a receipt stamp is required, it shall be affixed to the former only. Payment shall be endorsed on the copy of the decree or order when such is produced, the endorsement being signed by the officer actually making the payment, and attested by the Registrar or Názir, who shall also initial the entry of payment in column 14 of Register C and column 11 of Register D.

9. The Registers C and D shall be written up from day to day in duplicate. The original shall remain on the record of the Court, and the duplicate, which must be kept in English, shall also be written up from day to day and be forwarded every month to the Accountant General. In writing up Form C for the Accountant General, the columns 12 to 24 for details of payments shall be left blank for use in the Accountant General's office, but in the office copy of this register columns 12, 13 and 14 shall be filled up at once as the transactions occur; and in writing up Form D for the Accountant General, columns 10 and 11 shall be left blank.

10. When the accounts are closed at the end of the day, the total of all the transactions for that day, which are entered in column 8 of Register C, shall be entered in column 11 of that register. The daily total of the transactions in column 9 of Register D shall be similarly entered in column 12 of Register D. The Názir shall each day check the entries in these registers and initial the same.

11. In the case of property left by persons dying intestate and without known heirs, a register shall be kept in Form E by the Názir of the District Court, when he is appointed administrator for the management of the property. At the close of each day the total receipts on account of each such estate shall be posted from column 14 of Register E into Register C, and the total payment shall be posted from column 20 in respect of charges, and from column 24 in respect of the disposal of each of the estates, into Register D, quoting in the latter the original credit entry or entries from Register C. The receipts or acquittances for these payments shall be taken in column 13 of Register D.

12. Attached property which may come into the Court's custody in the course of a suit, whether before or after judgment, shall be registered in Form F, and the proceeds, when realized, shall be posted from column 15 of this register into Register C. When money is attached, it shall be taken direct from Register F to Register C, but a note of this shall be made in Register F when the attachment includes both property and cash. Payments shall be entered direct into Register D, quoting the original credit entry from Register C. A note of the payment shall also be made in the last column of Register F.

13. For subsistence money of civil prisoners and expenses of witnesses, the registers of receipts and payments shall be in Forms G and H, respectively. As these sums are required for immediate disbursement, they need not be deposited in the treasury, but the amounts shall be retained in the cash balance of the Názir or officer of the Court entrusted with the accounts of money received by the Court. The daily total from column 10 of Register G and column 8 of Register H shall be entered in the cash book, Form I. Items of subsistence money of civil prisoners lapsing to Government under Section 16 of Bombay Act II of 1874, as amended by Bombay Act II of 1882, shall be remitted to the treasury to be credited as a final receipt of Government. The balance of sums recovered on account of expenses of witnesses and remaining unpaid over 12 months at the end of each account year shall be communicated to the Accountant General in the return prescribed in Rule 23 and the amount paid into the treasury as lapsed deposits under the rule quoted.

Use of Cash Book, Form I. 14. In the cash book (Form I) shall be entered separately on the debit or credit side, as may be necessary—

- (a) the daily totals of each of the Registers C, D (which include the daily totals of Registers E, F) and the daily totals of G, H;
- (b) such items as are intended to be finally credited to Government; these shall be taken direct to the cash book, and the subsequent payment to Government or refund debited per contra. In such cases only will columns 3, 4, 5, 10, 11, 12 be entered up.

15. All sums that are intended to be finally credited to Government shall be sent to the treasury at frequent intervals during the month, or daily if possible. These remittances to treasury with chalangos shall not be entered in the pass-book (K), and must be sent separate from sums to be credited to the Court's deposit account mentioned in Rule 19. The Court will receive from the treasury officer an acknowledgment on the chalan presented.

Daily closing of cash book.

16. The cash book shall be closed and balanced every day. The closing entry shall specify particulars of the balance, thus:—

Entry 1 must agree with the pass-book K, and the aggregate of 2, 3 and 4 should be verified by counting the cash. The Názir, having ascertained that the transactions of the day have been correctly entered in the cash book and that the arithmetical balance is correct, shall sign the cash book on the left and obtain the signature of the Judge on the right side below the closing entry. In Small Cause Courts where there is a Registrar, the Registrar of the Court shall be responsible that the amounts have been correctly entered and that the arithmetical balance is correct, and shall sign the book every day on the right side below the closing entry. When a Judge presides over more than one Court, or when he is absent from his Court, there being no *locum tenens*, he shall on his return to his Court examine and sign the accounts for the days of his absence. In District Courts, where there is an Assistant Judge, he may, by order of the Judge, sign the accounts.

17. The ledger (Form J) is a supplementary record of all sums shown in the Registers C, D. The entries made in C and D shall be posted in J every evening or at latest the first thing the next morning.

Use of ledger, Form J.

18. Transactions with the treasury in regard to the Court's deposit account shall be by means of a pass-book (Form K) and by cheques (Form L). Every remittance to the treasury, intended to be credited to the Court's deposit account, shall be accompanied by the pass-book and a treasury chalan in a form that will be supplied on application by the treasury officer. Entries will be made in the pass-book at the treasury and be receipted by the Accountant and Treasurer when the remittance is under Rs. 500, and by the treasury officer when it exceeds that sum. The Názir shall not retain, except with the special permission of the Judge, a larger cash balance in his hands than in the case of Subordinate and Small Cause Courts, Rs. 100, and in the case of District Courts, Rs. 200. All sums in excess of this amount shall be paid into the Government Treasury as a deposit with Government. There shall be, as far as possible, a *daily* remittance from the Court to the treasury, and to secure an agreement between the treasury and the Názir's accounts no portion of the amount entered in Form C shall be retained from deposit on the last working day of the month.

19. Withdrawals from the Court's deposit account with the treasury shall be by cheques (Form L) signed by the Judge or Assistant Judge or (with the approval of Government) the Registrar or the Clerk of the Court. In such cases the District Judge shall inform the treasury officer of the name of the officer authorized, and furnish a specimen of his signature. Whenever it is convenient to make several small payments to different persons, one cheque for the aggregate amount may be issued in favour of the Názir; but payments to parties, when the amount is large or exceeds a limit to be fixed by the Judge, can be made by a cheque in favour of the payee: but the payee must be informed that payment can only be made at the treasury on the date of issue. If it is late in the day, and there is a possibility that the cheque cannot be presented on the date of issue, it can bear the next day's date. If the currency of a cheque has lapsed, it may be revived by an endorsement thereon for immediate payment, on satisfactory explanation being furnished.

20. There is no objection to payments being made to judgment-creditors and others from deposits received during the day; but when the account is made up in the afternoon, the amount so paid shall be recouped by drawing a cheque, which should accompany the cash sent to the treasury and be adjusted on the treasury accounts, so that the gross transactions may pass on to the Government books.

Payments otherwise than by cheque.

21. The Judge shall arrange to send the pass-book to the treasury during the first week of the month, to be written up, balanced and signed by the treasury officer after verification with the treasury accounts. Whenever the pass-book is presented at the treasury, the cheques paid must be posted in the pass-book and the entry attested by the treasury officer.

22. The Court shall, as directed in Rule 9, render to the Accountant General monthly the duplicate registers (Forms C and D), signed by the Názir and countersigned by the Judge, accompanied by a *Plus and Minus Memo.* in the subjoined form:—

These registers will be examined in the Accountant General's Office, and any discrepancies or errors discovered made the subject of reference to the Judge of the Court, until the several transactions entered in them are passed as correct.

23. In the month of January of each year a list shall be posted up in the court-house, showing the sums of money in deposit with the Court which have remained unclaimed for over twelve months, and the names of the persons to whom they are due; and if no one appears before the 31st of March following to claim the sum due to him, it shall be paid into the treasury to the credit of Government as a deposit unclaimed for the eventual benefit of any person who may duly establish his claim thereto to the satisfaction of the Court. To ensure the lapsed deposits being adjusted at the treasury before the 31st of March, the cheque should reach the treasury not later than the forenoon of that date. In the month of April following, the Court shall furnish to the Accountant General in Form C, the heading of the form being suitably altered, a statement of the balances written off and credited to Government, prepared from the original register (Form C) and not from the ledger (Form J).

24. Deposits credited to Government under Rule 23 cannot be repaid without the sanction of the Accountant General, but this sanction will be given as a matter of course on proof that the item was really received, was carried to credit in the Government accounts as a lapsed deposit, and is now claimed by the person who was entitled to draw it before the lapse, or his heir. Applications for refund shall be made in Form M by the Judge to the Accountant General, who, if the credit for the amount is exhibited on his books, will authorize payment and return the document to the Judge for delivery to the party concerned, who should personally, or by an agent, claim payment from the treasury. These refunds will not be brought on the Court's accounts. On receipt by the Court of the Accountant General's sanction, a note of the number and date thereof shall be made against the original entry in Register C.

#### *Instructions.*

1. It will be noticed that the present Rules and Forms apply solely to moneys received and paid by Civil Courts in connection with suits or judicial proceedings. They do not apply to moneys received and paid by a Názir in the administration of a minor's or lunatic's estate. The administration by the Názir of any such estate will continue to be under the supervision of the Judge.

2. In the same way, the Rules and Forms do not apply to Government money which has been paid into, or drawn from, the treasury on account of pay or other allowances of judicial establishments. In respect of such Government money, District and Subordinate and Small Cause Court Judges are bound to carry out such orders as may be issued from time to time by Government, or the Accountant General acting under Government orders. As illustrations of other items not appearing in the Civil Court accounts, the following may be noted :—

- (a) Expenses of witnesses and jurors and assessors, and pleaders' fees, in criminal cases.
- (b) Purchase and sale of dead stock articles.
- (c) Rent and Municipal taxes.
- (d) Travelling allowances to members of the establishment.
- (e) Law Library Fund. [The balance of this fund can be kept in the name of "the Názir of the Court" in the Post Office Savings' Bank.]
- (f) Departmental fines inflicted on members of the establishment.

3. Turning to the forms :—A supply of blank bilingual forms (English and Vernacular) can be obtained by indent on the Government Central Press. The book of receipts (Form A) will be in bound books of 500 forms, each receipt and counterfoil being serially numbered. If found more convenient, two or more books may be used at the same time, each being distinctively marked.

4. It will be noticed that the Registers A, B, E, F, G, H may be kept in all Courts in English or Vernacular. In District Courts the Forms C, D, I, J, K, L must be used in English only, and there need be no difficulty in this respect, as no person not possessed of a good knowledge of English can be appointed Názir of a District Court. (Circulars, 140 (v), page 100.) In Subordinate and Small Cause Courts, all the accounts may be kept and the forms used in the Vernacular; but the duplicates of the Registers C, D (which must be written up both original and duplicate *from day to day*) must be submitted every month *in English* to the Accountant General. As the forms are bilingual, this will not be difficult, if care and supervision are exercised by the Judges of the Subordinate and Small Cause Courts. The application for refund of lapsed deposit (Form M) is in English only, and will be filled up in English in all Courts.

5. Most of the forms are practically the same as those heretofore in use. The Registers of receipts and payments on account of subsistence money of civil prisoners and expenses of witnesses (G, H) are new; and instead of the old general day-book and general ledger (B1, B2) and execution day-book and ledger (D1, D2), we now have

Registers of receipts and payments of sums *deposited* in Court in connection with suits or judicial proceedings, (C, D);

Ledger of the same (J);

Cash-book (I).

6. It will be noticed that moneys paid into Court in connection with suits or judicial proceedings are divided under two heads :—

(a) Sums, to be credited at once to Government :—such as—

- (1), fines inflicted by a Civil Court under Section 480, Criminal Procedure Code, or under Chapter XIV, Civil Procedure Code; [fines inflicted by a Sessions Court cannot appear in Civil Court accounts;]
- (2), penalties for insufficient stamp-duty;
- (3), comparing fees;
- (4), fees for copies made by paid members of the establishment, and credited to Government (Circulars 133 (vii), page 91) [Nos. (3) and (4) though not necessarily paid in connection with a suit or judicial proceeding should always be shown in these accounts;]
- (5), commission fees paid for work done by Government servants during office hours (Circulars 35, page 22);

All these items should be taken direct to the cash book (Form I).

(b), Sums, deposited with the Court, intended to be paid to some person, but which, if not so paid, and unclaimed, lapse to Government :—such as—

- (1), Sums received on account of subsistence money of civil prisoners and expenses of witnesses. These are generally disbursed at once; they are shown in Registers G, H, the daily totals, without any details, being taken direct to the cash book (Form I).
- (2), Sums received on account of intestate property (Form E), the daily items, without details, being shown *seriatim* in the deposit Registers (C, D).
- (3), Items of attached property, viz. cash, and the proceeds of property, other than money which has been attached (Form F), the daily items without details being shown *seriatim* in the deposit Registers (C, D).

- (4), Sums paid in connection with suits or judicial proceedings, and not appearing in the abovementioned registers, but taken direct to the deposit Registers (C, D.)—such as sums paid in execution of decrees, commission fees, moneys deposited for keep of attached cattle, for salary of additional bailiffs, for succession certificates, and the such like.

7. The Register of intestate property (E) is for use in District Courts only. It is distinct from the return of intestate property (Form IX, Circulars, pages 146, 147). Items referring to the same estate, but entered on various dates, should always refer back to the original entry of the estate, which should contain in the column of remarks a reference to all subsequent entries.

8. In the same way with the Register of attached property (F):—Entries, referring to the same attachment but occurring at various dates, should always show a reference to the original entry. It must be understood that this Register F in no way supersedes the Register of applications for execution of decrees (Form XVII, Circulars, pages 188, 189) or the Register of suits (No. 116, Sch. IV, Civil Procedure Code), the columns in which relating to execution must be duly filled in.

9. With reference to Rule 13 and Forms G, H, it should be understood that the amounts retained by the Názir for subsistence money of civil prisoners and expenses of witnesses are in excess of the cash balance referred to in Rule 18. The Bailiff's Process Service and Receipt Book (A2, Circulars, page 155) is retained; but with respect to the 12th column of that form, the money returned by the Bailiff should be re-entered in Register G unless handed over at once to the party or pleader. (Circular No. 1177, 17th September 1885.) In the case of expenses of witnesses sent to, or received from, other Courts, the necessary information can be easily shown in the Registers G, H. Where any sum on account of expenses is paid to a witness in Court in the course of the suit or proceeding, and a receipt is taken there and then and filed in the record, no entry need be made in Registers G, H. The few instances, covered by the Circular No. 26, page 15, should be shown in the Registers G, H.

10. It will be noticed that while remittances of money to be credited at once to Government are sent to the treasury with a chalan only (Rule 14), remittances of money to be credited to the Court's deposit account are sent to the treasury with the pass-book and a chalan (Rule 18). The last working day of the month referred to in Rule 18 is, in the case of sub-treasuries, usually the 25th, except in March, when they close on the 31st. Special provision will be made for the few cases in which there are no sub-treasuries at the places where the sub-courts are held.

11. The ledger (J), it will be noticed, will not contain any entries of any moneys not to be found in the deposit Registers C, D. The list of lapsed deposits (Rule 23) must be prepared from the Registers C and G, and not from the ledger. Prefixed to the ledger there should be an index in rough alphabetical order showing the names of the defendants or persons paying the moneys, the corresponding pages of the ledger, and the numbers of the suits or proceedings.

It is not necessary to have accounts in the ledger corresponding to the intestate and attached property Registers (E, F).

12. Copying and translations fees, which are paid to the sectioners and translators and are not credited to Government, will not be shown in these accounts at all. The rules at present in force regarding these moneys hold good.

13. It will be the duty of the Judge of every Court to call occasionally for the Registers and accounts, and satisfy himself that the entries have been carefully and properly made. When such inspection is made, the Judge should note the fact with his own hand on the Register or account inspected.

No. 5014.—The following rules made by the Chief Customs Authority under Section 100 of the Sea Customs Act, VIII of 1878, are published for general information:—

1. The importer or owner of any spirit in a Bonded Warehouse, who desires to reduce the strength of the same by the addition of water, or to bottle the spirit after it has been so reduced in strength, should make an application to the Collector stating the number of the bond under which the spirit has been warehoused and the marks and numbers on the casks or vessels containing the spirit to be reduced or to be reduced and bottled, as the case may be. The application should in other respects be in such form and contain such particulars as the Collector may direct. Not less than the whole contents of a cask or other vessel shall be reduced to a uniform strength or reduced and bottled at one operation.

2. The whole operation of reducing the strength of spirits in bond or of bottling the spirits so reduced in strength shall be conducted in the presence of a Customs Gauger for whose services will be charged a fee of Rs. 5 per day, or for any portion of a day that the Gauger may be employed in watching the operation.

3. Before the operation of reducing the strength of the spirit is commenced the Gauger should re-gauge the casks or vessels containing the spirits to ascertain whether any duty is recoverable on any deficiency in excess of the allowance prescribed by Section 116 of the Sea Customs Act. The strength of the spirit should also be ascertained before its admixture with water.

4. The water added to the spirit should be thoroughly mixed with it, and the admixture allowed to stand for two days, after which the casks or vessels holding the admixture should be re-gauged and the strength ascertained. The admixture may be coloured with a colouring of burnt sugar only, which shall be of such a description as will not obscure the strength.

5. If the admixture is intended to be cleared for home consumption its strength should not be reduced below 35° under proof in the case of gin, or below 25° under proof in the case of any other spirit. If the admixture is intended for export to a foreign port or for use as stores on board a vessel proceeding to a foreign port, the strength may be reduced as desired by the exporter.

6. No importer or owner of spirit in a Bonded Warehouse shall be permitted to reduce the strength, to colour or bottle such spirit, if intended for home consumption, unless he is the holder of an Excise license for the sale of such like spirits in a place in British India. All bottles containing spirit bottled in a Bonded Warehouse shall bear labels correctly showing the description of the spirit bottled, and that the spirit was bottled in Bombay by the bottler under his full name as shown in his Excise license.

7. All bottles containing spirit bottled in a Bonded Warehouse and intended for export to a foreign port or for use as stores on board a vessel proceeding to a foreign port, shall bear labels correctly showing the description of the spirit bottled and that the spirit was bottled in Bombay by the bottler under his full and correct name.

8. The bottles used for bottling spirit bottled in a Bonded Warehouse shall for each transaction and as far as practicable be of one uniform size.

9. The labels or seals placed on casks or vessels containing spirit which has been reduced in strength in a Bonded Warehouse or on bottles of spirits which have been bottled in a Bonded Warehouse, shall not describe the spirits as reduced in strength or bottled under Customs or official supervision, or mis-describe the spirit in any manner. Such casks, vessels or bottles may, however, be labelled or sealed as "reduced in strength in the Customs Bonded Warehouse at Bombay" or "bottled in the Customs Bonded Warehouse at Bombay" as the case may be, or "reduced in strength" or "bottled in Bond at Bombay."

10. The Gauger shall on completion of the operation report in writing to his official superior full particulars of the re-gauge and strength of the

spirit before its admixture with water, the gauge and strength of the spirit after admixture, the number of casks, vessels, or bottles filled, details as to the labels or seals attached to the casks, vessels or bottles, and the marks and numbers of the packages into which the bottles have been packed.
