From—The Government of India, Finance and Commerce Department, No. 4373-S. R., dated 11th September 1895.

To-The Secretary to the Government of Bombay, Revenue Department.

I am directed to acknowledge the receipt of your letter No. 646, dated the 24th August 1895, on the subject of the liability to import duty of dredgers and component parts thereof.

2. I am to say that the Government of India are of opinion that a dredger may be held to be a piece of machinery, for although it is constructed on a floating bottom, it is not built or used for the purposes of navigation, and is not therefore exempt under No. 96 of the schedule.

Dredger buckets are in any case component parts of machinery, being indispensable for the working of the dredging machine and unsuitable for any other purpose.

3. The Government of India consider that although 'dredging' is not specified as one of the purposes for which exemption from duty is allowed in No. 14 of the Tariff Schedule, the principles which govern the exemptions in that number are applicable thereto, and the buckets imported by the Karachi Port Trust may therefore be passed free."

No. 2617-P.—In exercise of the powers conferred by Sections 49 and 63 of the Inventions and Designs Act (V of 1888) the Governor General in Council is pleased to make the following rules for the preparation of applications and specifications filed under Sections 5, 8 and 51 of the Act and of drawings attached thereto:

- 1. All words used in these rules and defined in the said Act shall have the meanings thereby assigned to them respectively.
- 2. Applications and specifications must be neatly and legibly written, printed, or otherwise reproduced upon one side only of stout paper of

- half foolscap size, that is, of a size of 13 inches in height by 8 inches in width, and the pages numbered consecutively in the right hand top corner.
- 3. Drawings must be on either stout paper or tracing cloth, and must be neat and clear. Photographs will be accepted if made or mounted in accordance with the following rules.
- 4. The left hand portion of each sheet of drawings, to the width of a half sheet of foolscap, that is, a width of 8 inches, must be left blank, so that when the sheets are opened out, the sheets which lie above them and contain the text of the application or specification will conceal no portion of the drawings.
 - 5. Each sheet of drawings must be-
 - (a) of a width not greater than that of a sheet of foolscap, that is, a width of 16 inches, except when the size of any single drawing is such that a greater width is required for it;
 - (b) of the same height as a sheet of foolscap, that is, a height of 13 inches, except when the size of any single drawing is such that notwithstanding increased width a greater height is unavoidably necessary.
- 6. A clear margin of half an inch must be left round the portion of the sheet which is occupied by drawings.
- 7. Reference figures and letters must be clear and bold, and the same letters should be used for the same parts in different views or drawings. In complicated drawings, or when there is not room to write the letters in their proper places, the letters should be shown outside the figure and connected with the parts referred to by fine lines.
- 8. The name of the applicant, and the year in which the application is made or specification filed, should be shown on each sheet of drawings in the right hand top corner of the blank space left under rule 4. The sheets, when more than one, should be numbered consecutively, and the number of each should be shown in the right hand top corner of the sheet.
- 9. No written description of the invention or design should appear on the sheets of drawings.
- 10. When a patent has been applied for or obtained in England, a fac-simile of the drawings submitted with the English application may be filed, without reference to the above rules.
- 11. Notwithstanding its non-compliance with any of the above rules, the Governor General in Council may in his discretion permit any application or specification to be received and filed without requiring the same to be amended.

No. 4365.—The following Resolution of the Government of India, Department of Revenue and Agriculture (Meteorology), No. $\frac{27}{19-2}$, dated 30th September 1895, is republished for general information:—

"Extract from the Proceedings of the Government of India in the Department of Revenue and Agriculture, No. 22-22 (Meteorology), dated Simlu, the 30th September 1895.

READ-

Letter from the Meteorological Reporter to the Government of India No. 4710, dated the 31st August 1895, submitting the annual Report on the Administration of the Meteorological Department for the year 1894-95.

RESOLUTION.

The number of observatories maintained by the Government of India under the control of the Meteorological Department during the year 1894-95 was 176 against 177 in 1893-94. The observatory at the Port Office, Madras, was closed as it was no longer required, and that at Kodaikanal was also temporarily closed pending the establishment of the new Solar Physics Observatory at that station; while a new second class observatory was established at Patiala by the State authorities

2 Observatory sheds were erected at Astor and Minimarg on the Srinagar-Gilgit road; the voluntary observatory at Kalimpong, which was in abeyance during 1892-93, was reopened; and at the instance of the Political Officer in Sikkim a voluntary observatory was started at Yatung in Tibet. It is hoped that records from these high altitudes will furnish new information of value

The observations received from the Seychelles Islands proved interesting and valuable, and are throwing much light on the changes leading up to the establishment of the south-west monsoon in India. The observatory has now been made permanent; and it is hoped that next year a daily weather telegram will be received from these islands from April to June.

A complete set of meteorological instruments was supplied during the year to Mr. Churchill, British Consul, Resht, Persia, for the purpose of recording meteorological observations at that station on the Caspian Sea. Observations from stations in Northern Persia are of much value in estimating the character of the cold weather disturbances and storms in that area, many of which pass eastwards and affect the weather of the winter months in Northern India.

- 3. During the winter of 1894-95 the same methods were employed as in the two previous years, to obtain as full and accurate information as possible of the amount, distribution and time of occurrence of the snowfall in the Himalayas and Afghán mountain areas. Much interesting and valuable information was received on the subject, and the Government of India are indebted to the reporters for their assistance.
- 4. More observatories were inspected during the past year than in the previous four years, and

the work of inspection was made selective rather than general. The system elaborated by Mr. Eliot for the detection of inaccurate observations worked successfully, with the result that the general standard of accuracy was improved.

- 5. The actinometric work done was less than usual owing to the abnormally large amount of cloud during the cold weather months. It is noticed with regret that the Solar Physics Committee in London has expressed no opinion on the value of these observations, nor offered any suggestions for their improvement.
- 6. It is satisfactory to learn that the remarks made last year by the Government of India on the necessity for the regular inspection of rain-gauges have received attention, and that a larger number of inspection reports were received from local officers. It is hoped that this improvement may continue, and that eventually every rain-gauge may be inspected at least once a year.
- 7. The collection of data for Marine Meteorology from ships entering Indian ports was extended and perfected, and has proved of great value. The daily weather reports and charts of the whole Indian monsoon area were found to be so valuable, not only to the Indian meteorologist, and the shipping interest, but also to meteorologists in Europe and America, that the Government of India have sanctioned their continued publication for a further period of four years.
- 8. The system of storm and flood warnings was continued and extended, and the number of special warning messages sent out by the Simla Office during the year was 647 compared with 374 in the previous year. This is one of the most useful and important tasks, from a practical point of view, with which the Meteorological Department is charged.
- 9. Meteorological observations in forests continued to be regularly taken in order to throw light on the influence of forest growth upon meteorological conditions. It will be well to observe the result of the improved methods of taking these observations over a sufficiently long period before deciding upon the advisability of their continuance or otherwise.
- 10. The tabulation of the Trevandrum Observations, recorded during the period 1853-64 under the directorship of the late J. Allan Broun, Esq., was completed, and the greater part of the first volume has been printed and issued. The second volume will shortly be ready for distribution.
- 11. The Meteorological Department received valuable assistance in its work during the year from the Survey, Telegraph and Postal Departments and from the Eastern Telegraph Company. The thanks of the Government of India are again due to Mr. Eliot, to his assistants, and to the provincial reporters for the excellent work done, and also to the many gentlemen unconnected with the Department who have rendered it valuable assistance.
