# Government Notifications, Appointments, &c. NOTIFICATIONS.

#### POLITICAL DEPARTMENT.

Bombay Castle, 13th November 1895.

No. 7080.—The following is a narrative of the events connected with the Public Darbár held by His Excellency the Governor in the Council Hall at Poona on Wednesday the 18th September 1895, at which the Insignia of a Knight Grand Commander of the Most Exalted Order of the Star of India were delivered to His Highness the Rája of Kolhápur.

2. On the morning of Monday the 16th September His Excellency the Governor received at Ganesh Khind the visits of the following First Class Sardárs of the Decean. The following was the order of their reception:—

The Swami of Chaful at 9 a.m.

"Chief of Phaltan at 9-10 a.m.

"Mudhol at 9-20 a.m.

"Sangli at 9-30 a.m.

Between 5 and 6 P.M. of the afternoon of the same day His Excellency paid return visits to the abovenamed Sardárs in the following order, which was fixed with reference to the position of their respective residences :-

Miraj. On the morning of Tuesday the 17th September 1895 His Excellency the Governor received at the Council Hall, Poona, the visits of the following Chiefs at the hours mentioned against their names :-

On the afternoon of Tuesday the 17th September 1895 His Excellency the Governor paid return visits to the following Chiefs at the hours mentioned against their names: -

- 4. At 4 P.M. on Wednesday the 18th September 1895, His Excellency the Governor received in Public Darbár at the Council Hall, Poona, the Chiefs and the First Class Sardárs of the Deccan who had been invited to Poona. All the Darbáris, except the Chiefs who were entitled to a salute, and all Civil and Military Officers and other visitors who were invited to attend, were seated in the Council Hall by 3-40 P.M. The Chiefs and the First Class Sardárs of the Deccan who were not entitled to a salute, but had been invited to the Darbar, were shown to their places by the Under Secretary to Government, Political Department, and the Oriental Translator to Government according to their rank. At 3-45 P.M. the Nawab of Janjira arrived, escorted by 1 non-commissioned officer and 3 savárs of the Bombay Cavalry, and was received at the entrance of the Council Hall by the Collector and Political Agent, Kolába, and inside the Council Hall by the Under Secretary to Government, Political Department, who conducted him to his seat, his attendants following him. A salute of 9 guns was fired on the arrival of the Nawab, and a Guard of Honour furnished by a Regiment of Bombay Infantry, which was drawn up at the entrance of the Council Hall,
- 5. At 3-50 P.M. His Highness the Raja of Kolhapur, accompanied by the Political Agent, Kolhapur and Southern Maratha Country, and escorted by Cavalry, arrived, being met by the Chief Secretary to Government, Political Department, and an Aide-de-Camp to His Excellency the Governor, who conducted him to a room to the right of the entrance of the Council Hall. The feudatory Chiefs and others in attendance on His Highness were conducted to their seats in Darbar by the Oriental Translator to Government. A salute of 19 guns was fired on the arrival of His Highness, and the Guard of Honour at the entrance of the Council Hall presented arms.

The seats on the right of His Excellency the Governor, in a line extending to the entrance of the Council Hall, were occupied in the following order (the place assigned to His Highness the Raja of Kolhápur being reserved for him) :-

On seats parallel to the Dais to the right of His Excellency the Governor sat the Chief Secretary to Government, Political Department, the Under Secretary to Government, Political Department, the Oriental Translator to Government and the several Political Officers according to rank. On the left and parallel to the Dais sat the Personal Staff of His Excellency the Governor. His Excellency the Lieutenant-General Commanding the Bombay Forces, the Members of Council and Civil and Military Officers and other gentlemen entitled to the private entrée at His Excellency's Levèes were seated in one block on the left of the Dais opposite the Darbáris, and the remaining space was allotted to other visitors invited to attend.

At 4 P.M. His Excellency the Governor arrived escorted by a Detachment of His Excellency's Body Guard, and received a salute of 17 guns. The European Guard of Honour, stationed in front of the Council Hall, presented arms, and the Band played while a procession, formed in the following order, advanced up the Hall:—

6. As the procession entered the Council Hall, all rose from their seats and remained standing until His Excellency had taken his seat on the Dais. The Chief Secretary to Government, Political Department then informed His Excellency the Governor that His Highness Shahu Chhatrapati Maharaj, Raja of Kolhāpur, was waiting to receive the Insignia of a Knight Grand Commander of the Most Exalted Order of the Star of India and the Grant of Her Majesty the Queen-Empress conferring upon His Highness the said dignity. The Chief Secretary having received the orders of His Excellency the Governor, then proceeded to the room occupied by the Raja and led His Highness to the Dais. When His Highness the Raja had made his reverence to His Excellency the Governor, the Chief Secretary read and delivered to His Excellency the Grant of Her Majesty the Queen-Empress conferring upon His Highness the dignity of a Knight Grand Comman ier of the Order, and Her Majesty's Warrant disponsing with his personal investiture, and delivered to His Excellency the Collar of Gold of the Order. His Excellency then addressed His Highness as follows: —"En Public Barbar E hereby deliber to Pour Bighness the Grant of Ber Majesty the Queen-Empress of Endia conferring upon you the dignity of a Binight Grand Commander of the Order and the Jonourable Ensignia of the Star of Endia, of which Most Exalted Order Ber Majesty has been graciously pleased to appoint you to be a Binight Grand Commander." His Excellency then placed the Collar round His Highness' neck, and the Chief Secretary attached the Badge to the Crown in the centre of it. The Junior Member of the Order present received the Star of the Order from the Chief Secretary and attached it in its proper place, after which he withdrew to his seat. His Highness the Raja of Kolhāpur, C.C.S.L., then made his reverence to His Excellency and was conducted by the Chief Secretary and his Order from the Chief Secretary and introduced to the Excellency and was conducted by the Chief Secretary and the Under Secret

7. His Excellency the Governor then addressed the assembled Darbáris as follows:—

"Your Highness, Chiefs, and Sardárs of the Deccun, —Since I arrived in Bombay, this is the first time that I have had the opportunity of receiving you in Darbár; I give you all a cordial welcome. The main object of our assembling here is to confer, by command of the Queen-Empress, a most honourable distinction on His Highness the Raja of Kolhapur, and in offering my congratulations to His Highness, I may express the great pleasure I feel that it falls to me to hand to him the decorations of a G.C.S.I.

In the person of His Highness we see one of the greatest remaining representatives of the Marátha power. His ancestors include the founder of the Marátha Empire. While the history of the Maráthas in the time of his ancestors abounds in dazzling deeds of arms, we trust that the annuls of his time will be no less illustrious but for your different section. less illustrious, but for very different reasons, for the reasons that his rule will be marked by sympathy, justice, and firmness, and general development. His Highness governs his State in days of peace; it was but lately that it was my pleasing duty to announce to His Highness that His Excellency the Viceroy and Governor General in Council had consented to accede to his desire to possess the full powers of a ruling prince of Kolhápur as they existed before 1862. Great as is the decorative honour of which His Highness today becomes possessed it is a sign of confidence in his cause of instince and integrity, the worthy instinction. prince of Kolhapur as they existed before 1832. Great as is the decorative honour of which His Highness to-day becomes possessed, it is a sign of confidence in his sense of justice and integrity, the worthy justification of which will be an honour greater and more deserving of renown. The high powers vested in him impose a sacred trust, the fulfilment of which will, in the fulness of time, entitle him to be enrolled amongst the most enlightened of the Princes of India. The grant of these powers implies indeed no empty compliment: they are pregnant with good or evil, according as they may be used, for the justice and impartiality of the administration of the State. Inseparable from them is the highest and most responsible duty, namely, to rule wisely and well. In this case, as in the ceremony to-day, it was a great pleasure to me to be the bearer of the message to His Highness from His Excellency the Governor General. With a sense of the responsibilities Your Highness has undertaken I offer you my most since regood With a sense of the responsibilities Your Highness has undertaken I offer you my most since re good wishes and hopes for success. And to you, Chiefs and Sardárs, I would address a few words, for the occasion appears to me not inappropriate. I am well aware that the two or three matters I propose to touch on are familiar to you. I am not less confident that at various times, with some perhaps perpetually, touch on are familiar to you. I am not less confident that at various times, with some perhaps perpetually, they engage your earnest attention. But these subjects being ever present to my mind I avail myself of this opportunity of indicating the direction of try thoughts. Some of you have powers of various degrees. You have all dignity and influence. I wish in the most friendly way to invite your attention for a few minutes as to how the advantages you possess may be, in one or two directions, usefully employed. It may be said that I come from England fresh and full of Western ideas—however, if I am so accused it is but natural that I should have to plead guilty to the accusation. I am well aware that in the East thought takes a practical shape less rapidly than in the West. I am in no hurry to urge you to immature action. My object is more to call attention to certain matters, to investe and stimulate effort. action. My object is more to call attention to certain matters, to increase interest and stimulate effort, and also to hope that thought may result in effort and action where hitherto it has been somewhat dormant. The first matter is one to which I think I can very appropriately allude in Poona. Than in the capital of the Deccan there are few places in India, if any, in which there has been made a more determined effort to widen and improve education. Your Highness is President of the Deccan Education Society. With Your Highness and so many of the inhabitants of Poona before me, there is hardly an audience that I know of to which I could more willingly and with more certainty that I have your sympathy state my views on education. It will be my best endeavour so far as possible to assist elementary education, to interest the lowest classes in it to carry education to them to point out and emphasise its necessity and to to interest the lowest classes in it, to carry education to them, to point out and emphasise its necessity and to encourage the lower classes to secure to themselves its advantages. We have ever before us the ignorance of the poorer classes and the helplessness begotten of that ignorance. One branch especially demands attention, and that is the education of girls. If we turn to the West we find that almost every child, boy or girl, has not only the chance but the right to be educated. All would say that the advantages of such education for girls is not only beyond all question, but is a sacred duty. What has occurred for long in the West let us in this instance emulate in the East. I know that much solid thought in this Presidency is on the side of female elucation. You, Chiefs and Sardárs, have much influence, so let its weight be on the side of promoting instruction generally. Assist me in the endeavours I shall make, and if we can by our united effort succeed in placing female education on a firm basis and in really encouraging it, the close of the 19th century will be a memorable epoch in the history of your country. While I advocate the claims of elementary education not only for boys but also for girls, do not think for one moment that I am possessed with a wish to place in the background higher education. If that is in any way wanting support I shall gladly stimulate it. It seems to me not impossible that there are one or two directions in which improvements might with careful thought be made. As I drive to this Hall I often think that the Deccan must be proud of Poona with her three great educational institutions, the Deccan College, the Fergusson College, and the College of Science, and believe me I share with you all a very sincere regret for the unimely death of the Principal of the Fergusson College—a man whose ambition appeared to me to be not to spare himself, but to serve the interests of his countrymen. Turning from education and the improvement and strengthening of the mind, I draw your attention to the fact that there is a great field for attention to bodily wants; in the direction of increased facilities for medical be on the side of promoting instruction generally. Assist me in the endeavours I shall make, and if we that there is a great field for attention to bodily wants; in the direction of increased facilities for medical reli f. This was a subject which in the parts of the Presidency under our own officers much engaged the attention of my predecessor, and which has not been neglected in Kolhapur and the Southern starátha Country; but much remains to be done even there, and in other places. I do not mean merely in reference to the hospitals in Bombay or in the principal towns, but in the country districts, where at present the distance from medical relief is so great as to be prohibitive. In the last quarter of a century much development has taken place in communications; railways have been laid down, roads have been made and improved, and in many places I find the number of conveyances has increased, so that obstacles which formerly presented themselves are not now so apparent. The number of medical men who have received instruction has greatly increased, and there is an immense field for the employment of their art, so I counsel an increase in the number of dispensaries in provincial localities. We frequently find a dispensary established through the munificence of an individual. I think it is a subject which could most rightly be taken up by those who derive their income largely through the labour of those who are far removed from medical relief. Areas are marked out for revenue purposes. I would most gladly see them mapped out for medical purposes, and served by travelling dispensaries and more fixed dispensaries where there are towns large enough to maintain them. You, Chiefs and Sardárs, can give help and encouragement in these matters, can promote and assist organisation, and can set a good example in this direction. Then the extension of medical relief will add to the efficiency of the rural population, for it will diminish the number of days of ill health and weakness. And lastly to all of you who within your own territories exercise criminal powers, I would commend the teaching of ancient authorities. Strive to arrive at the truth in all cases; deal with criminals not vindictively, and also not with weak leniency. And here too you will do well to take note of the modern system of jail discipline. Convicts in jail need special treatment, but they ought not to be outside the pale of our sympathies. It is true they are the subjects of punishment, but such punishment ought not to be demoralising. There is hope that, in addition to their punishments being deterrent in its effects and an example to other would-be malefactors, they themselves may benefit; no human being, however criminal his record, is, it seems to me, naturally incapable of improvement, and so we ought to deal with them as beings capable of being influenced, and not make our jails merely centres of misery and degradation. A society of comparatively recent birth has lately been brought to my notice. It is entitled the Sardárs' Association. It will no doubt give opportunities of discussion and interchange of views. Matters of social advancement and development might usefully engage its attention, and I shall watch its career with interest. And now, Chiefs and Sardárs, I conclude the few remarks I have to make on this occasion. What I have said to-day deals with your own possibilities in rendering services to those who are dependent on you and have fewer advantages than yourselves. In some cases the number of these is very large. The poorest and the helpless are those who most demand our care and attention. The development of education will render your Society more vigoro

Attar, pán and garlands were given by the Chief Secretary to Government, Political Department, to His Highness the Rája, and to the other Chiefs and Sardárs by the Under Secretary and the Oriental Translator to Government. The Agent for Sardárs in the Deccan arranged for the distribution of attar, pán, &c., to other visitors. Whilst attar and pán were being distributed, the Band played. His Excellency the Governor then left the Darbár under a salute of 17 guns, attended by the same officers in the same order which was observed as His Excellency entered. The Guard of Honour presented arms and the Band played as His Excellency passed. The Chief Secretary to Government, Political Department, the Under Secretary to Government, Political Department, and the Oriental Translator to Government conducted the Chiefs to their carriages, and they left under the same salutes and honours that were accorded to them on their entrance, the order of arrival being inverted at their departure. His Highness the Rája of Kolhápur left first. The Civil and Military Officers of Government and the spectators present were requested not to leave their seats until the Chiefs of Kurundvád (Junior) had left the Council Hall.

The First Class Sardárs of the Deccan were shown to their carriages by the Under Secretary to Government and the Oriental Translator to Government.

At 9-30 P.M. on Wednesday the 18th September 1895, His Excellency the Governor held an Investiture at Government House, Ganesh Khind, for the purpose of investing Nawab Sidi Ahmed Khan, Nawab of Janjira, with the Insignia of a Knight Grand Commander of the Most Eminent Order of the Indian Empire to which dignity he had been appointed by Her Majesty the Queen-Empress of India. All the Chiefs and First Class Sardárs who had been present at the Darbár in the afternoon were present at the Investiture and sat in the same order as they did at that function.

All Members of the Most Eminent Order of the Indian Empire present in Poona, and such others not residing in Poona as could be conveniently assembled attended. The Companions of the Order having assembled in the room set apart for the purpose at 9-15 P.M., formed a procession according to ancient custom, the junior preceding the senior Members, and entered the Parbár Room at 9-30 P.M., in the following order:—

On reaching their seats, the Members of the Order filed off right and left and made their reverence to the Governor as His Excellency passed. The Band played the National Anthem. When all were seated, the Chief Secretary reported that the business was the Investiture, under the Sovereign's Grant, of Sidi Ahmed Khan, Nawab of Janjira, and delivered to His Excellency the Lord Sandhurst, G.C.I.E., the Grant of Her Majesty. Having received the Grant from His Excellency, the Chief Secretary read it aloud

The Chief Secretary to Government and two Companions of the Order then conducted the Nawáb of Janjira to the Dais, where he made his reverence. Members of the Third Class of the Order rose from their seats. The Nawáb of Janjira was then conducted by the Chief Secretary to the table. All Members of the Order rose from their seats. Two Companions, by desire of His Excellency the Governor, on receiving the Star of the Order attached it in the proper place. This done, the Nawáb of Janjira was conducted by the Chief Secretary to the front of the Dais, and made his reverence. Meanwhile, the two Companions withdrew to their places and remained standing with the other Members of the Order. The Chief Secretary then, with due reverence, delivered the Riband and Badge of the Order to His Excellency the Governor, who invested the Nawáb of Janjira with the Riband and Badge, addressing him as follows:—

"En the name of the Queen and Empress of Endia and by Her Majesty's Command, E hereby invest you with the Honourable Ensignia of the Order of the Endian Empire, of which Most Eminent Order Her Majesty has been graciously pleased to appoint you to be a Unight Commander."

8. The newly invested Knight then made his reverence and was led by the Chief Secretary to his seat. Those standing resumed their seats. The Chief Secretary then represented that there was no further business. A procession of the Knight Grand Commander, the Knight Commander and the Companions of the Order of the Indian Empire was thereon formed and left the Darbár Room in the same order in which they entered, a grand march being performed by the Band.

- (b) if any Company, which has paid the said duty or composition in full, subsequently issues an addition to its subscribed capital, three-quarters per centum of the additional capital so issued.
