The following Bill was introduced into the Council of the Governor General of India for the purpose of making Laws and Regulations on the 2nd January 1872, and was referred to a Select Committee with instructions to make their report thereon in a month:—

Bill No. 1 of 1872.

A Bill to consolidate and amend the Law relating to the Courts in British Burma.

Whereas it is expedient to consolidate and amend the law relating to the Courts in British Burma; It is hereby enacted as follows:—

CHAPTER I.

PRELIMINARY.

- 1. This Act may be called "The Burma Courts Short title. Act, 1872."
- It extends to all the territories subject to the

2. All suits, appeals, applications or proceedings suits to be disposed of by Courts in which instituted.

Recorders of Rangoon and Maulmain, shall be heard and disposed of by the Courts in which they were instituted.

4. The Acts mentioned in the schedule hereto annexed are hereby repealed, except as to the suits, appeals, applications and proceedings mentioned in section two, but not so as to affect the operation of any Act extended to British Burma by any of the said Acts.

CHAPTER II.

LAWS TO BE ADMINISTERED.

Marriage or caste, or any religious usage or institution, the Buddhist law, where the parties are Buddhists, the Muhammadan law in cases where the parties are Muhammadans, and the Hindú law in cases where the parties are Hindús, shall form the rule of decision, except in so far as such law has by legislative enactment been altered or abolished, or is opposed to any custom having the force of law prevailing in British Burma.

In cases not provided for by the former part of this section or by any other law for the time being in force, the Court shall act according to justice, equity and good conscience.

CHAPTER IV.

APPEALS.

27. The memorandum of appeal must, when Time allowed for presenting appeals to Commissioner, be presented within six weeks, the period being reckoned from and exclusive of the day on which the decision or order appealed against was passed, and also exclusive of such time as may be requisite for obtaining a copy of such decision or order.

CHAPTER V.

COURT OF THE JUDGE OF RANGOON.

There shall be no appeal from the decree or order of the Judge of Rangoon passed in any original suit or proceeding where the amount or value exceeds three thousand rupees; but where the amount or value exceeds three thousand rupees, an appeal shall lie to the High Court of Judicature at Fort William in Bengal.
- 40. For the trial of Civil suits under this Act, the Judge of Rangoon may constitute one or more persons Assessor or Assessors of the Court. Such person or persons shall attend during the trial of the suit, and shall deliver his or their opinion or opinions in writing, to be recorded on the proceedings. But the decision of the case shall rest with the Judge, No Officer of the Judge's Court shall be appointed an Assessor under this section.
- 41. The Judge of Rangoon shall, within the Miscellaneous jurisdiction.

 Miscellaneous jurisdiction, exercise the powers of a District Judge, and he shall also exercise the powers of a District Judge under Act IV. of 1869 (The Indian Divorce Act) throughout British Burma.

and to prescribe forms for every proceeding therein for which he shall think that a form should be provided, and from time to time to alter any such rule or form; and the rules so made, and the forms so framed, shall be published in the local Official Gazette, and after being so published shall be observed and used in the said Court: Provided that such rules and forms shall not be inconsistent with the Code of Civil Procedure or any other law for the time being in force, and shall, before they are published, have received the sanction of the Chief Commissioner.

CHAPTER VI.

SPECIAL COURT.

60. The Special Court under this Act shall ordinarily be constituted Constitution of Special by the Judicial Commis-Rangoon sitting together; but the Chief Commissioner may direct any Commissioner to sit in the Court as an assessor. Such Commissioner shall record his opinion in the case, but the decision shall rest with the Judicial Commissioner and the Judge of Rangoon.

61. Appeals from orders and decrees passed by the Judge of the town of Appeals from Judge of Maulmain in civil suits Maulmain. proceedings shall, and where appeal is allowed by law, be heard and de-termined by the Special Court. Such appeals shall be presented in the Court of the Judicial Commissioner.

62. Any person convicted on a trial held by the Judge of Rangoon as Appeals from Judge of a Court of Sessions may appeal to the Special Rangoon in criminal cases. Court. Such appeal shall be presented in the Court of the said Judge.

Judicial Commissioner or Judge may sit as Special Court at the request of the other.

If, in any civil suit or appeal, or in any criminal case or appeal pending in the Court of the Judicial Commissioner or of the Judge of Rangoon, the one Court

wishes to obtain the opinion of the other on any question of fact or law, or usage having the force of law, or the construction of a document, or wishes to obtain the assistance of the other for the determination of the case pending before it, such Court shall record a memorandum to that effect; and after the receipt of a copy of such memorandum by the other Court, the Judicial Com-missioner and the Judge of Rangoon shall sit together as soon as may be convenient, and shall form a Special Court for the disposal of the said question or for the determination of the case.

Rules as to finding of Special Court in case of difference of opinion arising.

65. When a difference of opinion arises in the Special Court, the following rules shall be observed:-

(1). If the difference of opinion arise in a civil appeal, and be on any question of fact, and if either the Judicial Commissioner or the Judge of Rangoon agrees with the finding of the Court from whose decision the appeal has been made, the finding of that Court shall be upheld.

- If the difference arise in a civil appeal, and be on a point of law or usage having the force of law, or the construction of a document, the ruling of the Court from whose decision the appeal has been made shall be upheld, unless either the Judicial Commissioner or the Judge of Rangoon be of opinion that the point should be referred to the High Court of Judicature at Fort William in Bengal, in which case they shall state the point as to which they differ, and forward the statement with their respective opinions thereon to such High Court.
- (3). In all other cases, the point shall be referred to the High Court with a similar statement of opinions.

STATEMENT OF OBJECTS AND REASONS.

It having been determined to appoint a Judicial Commissioner for Burma, the object of this Bill is to provide for the constitution of that Officer's Court, and to carry out certain modifications of the existing legal machinery of the Province which experience has shown to be desirable. Provision is made for a special Court, consisting of the Judicial Commissioner and another officer, which will in certain cases sit as the final Court of Appeal, and will dispose of capital cases against European British Subjects.
