BILLS OF THE GOVERNMENT OF INDIA.

LEGISLATIVE DEPARTMENT.

The following Report of a Select Committee, together with the Bill as re-settled by them, was presented to the Council of the Governor General of India for the purpose of making Laws and Regulations on the 20th June 1872:

We, the undersigned, the members of the Select Committee, to which the Bill to consolidate and amend the law relating to the solemnization in India of matriages of persons professing the Christian Religion was recommitted, have the honour to present this final report.

We have considered the papers noted in the From Officiating Chief Secretary to Government of Fort St. George, No. 48, dated 5th April 1872, and enclosures.

The Bill, as formerly settled and as published in the Gazette of India, applied (so far as regards Native States) to Christian British subjects of Her Majesty. As there are many Native Christian subjects of Her Majesty in Native States, for whom it is desirable to provide, we have struck out the word 'British' in section one, and in section nine we have authorised the Governor General in Council to license persons to grant certificates of marriage to such Native Christians. Power to do this is conferred on the Governor General in Council by Statute 32 & 33 Vic., c. 98, s. 1.

We have provided (section two) that the repeals to be effected by the proposed Act shall not invalidate any marriage confirmed by a repealed enactment (e. g. 14 & 15 Vic., c. 40, s. 24), and that appointments made and licenses granted under any repealed Act shall be deemed to be respectively made and granted under the proposed Act.

Section eleven forbids a marriage to be solemnized in any place other than a church, where there is a church within five miles of such place. We have provided that this distance shall be measured, not as the crow flies, but by the shortest road.

Sections seventeen and forty-one provide that ministers and marriage-registrars shall not issue certificates if any lawful impediment, according to the law of England, be shown to their satisfaction. We have struck out the words in italics-

In sections twenty-five and fifty-one we have provided that the two witnesses there mentioned shall be exclusive of the person solemnizing the marriage.

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Section sixty contains a clause declaring that, in the case of marriage between Native Christians, the parties shall not stand to each other within the prohibited degrees of affinity. In the case of Natives there is no rule as to these degrees applicable throughout India. We have therefore struck out this clause and replaced it by a general provision that nothing in the Act shall validate any marriage forbidden by the personal law to which either of the parties is subject.

We have extended section sixty-six (as to forbidding the issue of a certificate by falsely representing oneself to be a person whose consent to the marriage is required by law) to cases where the person making the representation believes it to be false, or has not reason to believe it to be true.

Sections seventy-six and seventy-seven are intended to prevent monogamists from acquiring a right to practise polygamy by changing their religion. But we are of opinion that a Bill regulating the solemnization of Christian marriages is not the proper place for such provisions, which affect persons other than Christians, and which relate to the essence of the contract of marriage, whereas the Act is intended only to govern its ceremonial and the mode of contracting it. And as we have reason to think that under the existing law a second marriage effected during the existence of a prior one contracted under the law of monogamy would be invalid, it seems to us more prudent to postpone the matter for further consideration and to make it the subject of a separate Act.

In section seventy-eight we have provided that a marriage, otherwise duly solemnized, shall not be void merely on account of irregularity in respect of the place of its solemnization.

We have empowered the Local Government to declare who shall in any place be deemed to be the District Judge, and we have authorised the Governor General in Council to delegate to any officer the powers conferred by the Act in respect of Christians in Native States.

Lastly, we have saved marriages duly performed by ministers, consuls, and consular agents of foreign States.

We have found it necessary or expedient to amend the drafting of most of the sections, and we recommend that the Bill thus altered be passed.

A Bill to consolidate and amend the law relating to the solemnization in India of the marriages of Christians.

[AS RE-AMENDED BY THE SELECT COMMITTEE.]

Whereas it is expedient to consolidate and Preamble. amend the law relating to the solemnization in India

of the marriages of the persons professing the Christian religion; It is hereby enacted as follows ;---

PRELIMINARY.

Short title.

. 1. This Act may be called "The Indian Christian Marriage Act, 1872."

It extends to the whole of British India, and, Extent. so far only as regards Christian subjects of Her

Majesty, to the territories of Native Princes and States in alliance with Her Majesty;

and it shall come into force on the passing Commencement. thereof.

2. The enactments specified in the fifth sche-Enactments repealed. dule hereto annexed are repealed, but not so as to invalidate any marriage confirmed by, or solemnized under, any such enactment.

And all appointments made, licenses granted, consents given, certificates issued, and other things duly done under any such enactment shall be deemed to be respectively made, granted, given, issued, and done under this Act.

For clause XXIV. of section uineteen of the Court Fees Act, 1870, the following shall be substituted:-

'xxiv. Petitions under the Indian Christian Marriage Act, 1872, sections forty-five and fortyeight.'

3. In this Act, unless there is something Interpretation-clause. repugnant in the subject or context,—

"Church of England." and "Anglican" mean and apply to the Church of England as by law established;

> "Church of Scotland" means the Church of Scotland as by law established;

"Church of Rome." "Church of Rome." "Roman Catholic." and "Roman Catholic" mean and apply to the Church which regards the Pope of Rome as its spiritual head;

" Church of Scotland."

"Church." includes any chapel or other build-"Church." ing generally used for public Christian worship;

- "Minor" means a person who has not completed "Minor." the age of twenty-one years and who is not a widower or a widow.
- "Native State." means the territories of ar_iy "Native State." Native Prince or State in alliance with her Majesty;
- The expression "Christians" means persons "Christians." professing the Christian religion;

And the expression "Native Christians" includes "Native Christians." the Christian descendants of Natives of India converted to Christianity, as well as such converts.

PART I.

THE PERSONS BY WHOM MARRIAGES MAY BE SOLEMNIZED.

4. Every marriage between persons one or

both of whom is a Christian or Christians shall be

nized according to Act. with the provisions of the next following section ; and any such marriage solemnized otherwise than in accordance with such provisions shall be void.

Persons by whom marriages may be solemnized. solemnized in India-

(1) by any person who has received episcopal ordination, provided that the marriage be solemnized according to the rules, rites, ceremonies, and customs of the Church of which he is a Minister;

(2) by any Clergyman of the Church of Scotland, provided that such marriage be solemnized according to the rules, rites, ceremonies, and customs of the Church of Scotland;

(3) by any Minister of religion licensed under this Act to solemnize marriages;

(4) by, or in the presence of, a Marriage Registrar appointed under this Act;

(5) by any person licensed under this Act to grant certificates of marriage between Native Christians.

6. The Local Government may grant licenses Grant and revocation of licenses to solemnize marriages. and may revoke such licenses,

7. The Local Government may appoint one or Marriage Registrars. more Christians, either by name or as holding any office for the time being, to be the Marriage Registrar or Marriage Registrars, for any district subject to its administration.

Where there are more Marriage Registrars than Senior Marriage Registrar. be Senior Marriage Registrars than Local Government shall appoint one of them to be the Senior Marriage Registrars. When there is only one Marriage Registrar

Magistrate when to be Marriage Registrar. in a district, and such Registrar is absent from such district, or ill, or when his office is tempo-

rarily vacant, the Magistrate of the district shall act as, and be, Marriage Registrar thereof during such absence, illness, or temporary vacancy.

8. The Governor General in Council may, by

Marriage Registrars in Native States. notification in the Gazette of India, appoint any Christian to be a Marriage Registrar in respect

of any district or place within the territories of any Native Prince or State in alliance with Her Majesty.

The Governor General in Council may, by like notification, revoke any such appointment.

9. The Local Government or (so far as regards any Native State) the

Licensing of persons to grant certificates of marriage between Native Christians. Governor General in Council, may grant a license to any Christian, either by name or as hold-

ing any office for the time being, authorizing him to grant certificates of marriage between Native Christians.

Any such license may be revoked by the Authority by which it was granted, and every such grant or revocation shall be notified in the official Gazette.

PART II.

TIME AND PLACE AT WHICH MARRIAGES MAY BE SOLEMNIZED.

10. Every marriage under this Act shall be Time for solemnizing solemnized between the marriage. hours of six in the morning and seven in the evening: •

Provided that nothing in this section shall Exceptions. apply to-

(1)—a Clergyman of the Church of England solemnizing a marriage under a special license permitting him to do so at any hour other than between six in the morning and seven in the evening under the hand and seal of the Anglican Bishop of the Diocese or his Commissary, or

(2)—a Clergyman of the Church of Rome solemnizing a marriage between the hours of seven in the evening and six in the morning, when he has received a general or special license in that behalf from the Roman Catholic Bishop of the Diocese or Vicariate in which such marriage is so solemnized, or from such person as the same Bishop has authorized to grant such license.

11. No Clergyman of the Church of England Place for solemnizing marriage. for solemnizing in any place other than a church,

unless there is no church within 5 miles distance by the shortest road from such place,

or unless he has received a special license authorizing him to do so under the hand and seal of the Anglican Bishop of the Diocese, or his Commissary.

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For such special license the Registrar of the Fee for special license. Diocese may charge such additional fee as the said Bishop from time to time authorizes.

PART III.

A Bill to consolidate and amend the Law relating to Appeals to the Privy Council from Decrees of the Civil Courts.

[AS AMENDED BY THE SELECT COMMITTEE.]

WHEREAS it is expedient to consolidate and amend the law regu-

judgments, decrees, and orders of the Civil Courts; It is hereby enacted as follows :-

I .- PRELIMINARY.

Short title.

1. This Act may be called "The Privy Council Appeals Act, 1872."

It extends to the whole of British India, but

The following Preliminary Report of a Select Committee, together with the Bill as settled by them, was presented to the Council of the Governor General of India for the purpose of making Laws and Regulations on the 4th July 1872 :--

We, the undersigned, the members of the Select Committee to which the Bill to consolidate and amend the law relating to the admission of appeals to Her Majesty in Council from

From Officiating Secretary to Chief Commissioner, Ondh, No. 344, dated 22nd January 1872, and enclosures. judgments and orders of the Civil Courts was referred, have the honour to report that we have considered the Bill and the papers noted in the margin.

We have expressly excluded matters of criminal jurisdiction from the operation of the proposed Act.

Section three of the Bill, as introduced, speaks of appeals from final decrees or orders made on repeal or revision under the law relating to appeals. We have struck out the words italicised.

Act II. of 1863, section two, provides an appeal from interlocutory judgments. We have therefore struck out the word 'final' in the fifth paragraph of section three of the Bill as introduced.

We have provided (section four) that the amount or value of the subject-matter of appeals shall be computed according to the rules prescribed by the Court Fees Act, 1870, sections seven and eight. An analogous rule is prescribed by Bengal Regulation XVI. of 1797, section three.

We have provided for the case of the period prescribed for applications, under the proposed Act, expiring when the Court is closed, and for admitting, in proper cases, such applications after the prescribed period. Similar provisions are made in the new Limitation Act, 1X. of 1871, section five.

We have followed in sections seven and eight the rules of the High Courts at Fort William and Bombay, and we have authorised the exclusion, from the transcript of the record of formal documents, of papers which the parties agree to exclude, and of unnecessary accounts. This is in accordance with the present practice, and, so far as regards formal documents, follows the rule prescribed by clause 2 of the order of the Privy Council dated 13th June 1853.

Sections ten, eleven, and twelve are modelled on rules of the High Court at Fort William.

In section thirteen we have authorised the Court, on receiving security for the performance of the decree of the Privy Council, to give any direction that it thinks fit respecting the subjectmatter of the appeal.

In section nineteen we have empowered the High Courts to make rules regulating all matters connected with the enforcement of the proposed Act.

In section twenty we have made the amendments of Bengal Regulation III. of 1828, section four, and Bombay Regulation XIX. of 1827, section eight, necessitated by the proposed repeals.

Lastly, we have saved (section twenty-one) the exercise of Her Majesty's pleasure in receiving or rejecting appeals to Her in Council.

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We have made many changes in the wording and arrangement of the Bill, and, before proceeding further with it, we recommend that it be published, with this preliminary_report, in the *Gazette of India*, and sent for consideration to the various Local Governents and High Courts.

Whenever a Marriage Registrar refuses 46. to issue a certificate Petition when Marriage under this Part, either of Registrar refuses certificate. the parties intending marriage may apply by petition, where the district of such Registrar is within any of the towns of Calcutta, Madras, and Bombay, to a Judge of the High Court, or if such district is not within any of the said towns, then to the District Judge.

The said petition shall state all the circumstances of the case, and pray Procedure on petition. for the order and direction of the Court concerning the same,

And thereupon such certificate shall be issued, and the like proceedings may be had in relation to such marriage as if the issue had not been forbidden.

under section eight, to act within any Native State is not satisfied that the person forbidding the issue of the certificate is

authorized by law so to do, the said Marriage Registrar shall send a statement of all the circumstances of the case, together with all documents relating thereto, to the Governor General in Council.

If it appears to the Governor General in Council that the person for-Procedure on reference. bidding the issue of such certificate is not authorized by law so to do, the Governor General in Council shall declare that the person forbidding the issue of such certificate is not authorized as aforesaid,

and thereupon such certificate shall be issued, and the like proceedings may be had in relation to such marriage as if the issue of the certificate had not been forbidden.

And in some part of the ceremony each of the parties shall declare as follows, or to the like effect-

" I do solemnly declare that I know not of any lawful impediment why I, A. B., may not be joined in matrimony to C. D."

And each of the parties shall say to the other as follows, or to the like effect-" I call upon these persons here present to witness that I, A. B., do take thee, C. D., to be my lawful wedded wife [or husband]."

52. Whenever a marriage is not solemnized

within two months after the notice has been entered by the Marriage Registrar, as required by section forty, the notice

and the certificate, if any, issued thereupon, and all other proceedings thereupon, shall be void; and no person shall proceed to solemnize the mar-riage, nor shall any Marriage Registrar enter the same, until new notice has been given, and entry made, and certificate thereof given, at the time and in the manner aforesaid.

(1.) The age of the man intending to be married shall exceed sixteen years, and the age of the woman intending to be married shall exceed thirteen years:

(2.) Neither of the persons intending to be married shall have a wife or husband still living :

(3.) In the presence of the person licensed under section nine, and of at least two credible witnesses other than such person, each of the parties shall say to the other-

"I call upon these persons here present to witness that I, A. B., in the presence of Almighty God, and in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, do take thee, C. D., to be my lawful wedded wife [or husband]," or words to the like effect :

Provided that no marriage shall be certified under this Part when either of the parties intending to be married has not completed his or her eighteenth year, unless such consent as is mentioned in section nineteen has been given to the intended marriage, or unless it appears that there is no person living authorized to give such consent.

61. When, in respect to any marriage solemnized under this Part, the

Grant of certificate. conditions prescribed in section sixty have been fulfilled, the person licensed as aforesaid, in whose presence the said declaration has been made, shall, on the application of either of the parties to such marriage, and on the payment of a fee of four annas, grant a certificate of the marriage.

The certificate shall be signed by such licensed person, and shall be received in any suit touching the validity of such marriage as conclusive proof of its having been performed.
