The following Bill was introduced into the Council of the Governor General of India for the purpose of making Laws and Regulations on the 25th September 1872, and was referred to a Select Committee with instructions to report thereon in a month :-

## THE BURMA FERRIES BILL, 1872.

A Bill for regulating Ferries in British Burma. Whereas it is expedient to regulate the public ferries within the Province of British Burma; It is hereby enacted as follows :-

#### 1.—Preliminary.

1. This Act may be lled "The Burma Short title. called Ferries Act, 1872":

It extends only to the territories under the administration of the Chief Commissioner of British Local extent. Burma;

And it shall come into Commencement. force on the passing thereof.

#### II.—Public Ferries.

The Chief Commissioner may declare what ferries within any part of. Power to declare and British Burma, shall be establish public ferries. deemed public ferries, and may at any time hereafter establish new ferries, where, in his opinion, they are needed, and may, from time to time, change the course of any public ferry, or discontinue any public ferry which he deems unnecessary.

The immediate superintendence of all public ferries shall, except as hereinafter provided, be vested in the Deputy Superintendence of ferries.

Commissioner of the district in which they are situate, and he shall make all necessary arrangements for the supply of boats for such ferries, and for the collection of the authorized tolls leviable thereat.

and thereupon such ferry shall be managed, and such proceeds shall be paid, accordingly.

5. Not less than fifteen days before the beginning of the official year, Letting ferry-tolls by the tolls of any public ferry

auction may be put up to public auction for such term not exceeding three years from the date of the auction as may be deemed expedient by the Commissioner of the Division in which such ferry is situate, and may be let to the highest bidder at a

certain annual rate for the whole term, payable by quarterly instalments in advance not later

than the fifth day of every quarter of the year.

The lessee shall bind himself to conform to the rules made under this Act for the management and control of such ferry,

and may be called upon by the officer putting the tolls of the ferry up to auction to give such security for his good conduct and for the punctual payment of the rent as such officer may deem fit:

Such officer may, for sufficient reason duly recorded in writing, refuse to accept the offer of the highest bidder, and may accept any other bid. or may withdraw the tolls from auction.

6. Subject to the revision and confirmation

of the Chief Commissioner, Power to make rules. the Commissioner of each

Division shall make rules-

for the control and management of all public ferries within his division,

for collecting the rent payable for such ferries, and for fixing the limits of the same;

and, when the tolls of a ferry have been let under section five, shall make additional rules-

for regulating the number and kinds of boats and their dimensions, and the number of crew for each boat which the lessee of the tolls will be required to keep,

and the number of passengers, carts, carriages and animals, and the quantity of goods that may be carried in each kind of boat at one trip,

and for the keeping of such boats continually in good condition for the safe conveyance of passengers and property.

No person shall, except with the sanction of the officer charged with

the management of a public ferry, keep a ferry-boat for the purpose of plying for hire within a distance

of two miles above or below the place where such public ferry is situated.

#### III .- Tolls .-

Tolls, according to such rates as are, from time to time, fixed by the Chief Commissioner, shall be levied on all passengers, carts, carriages, cattle

and other animals, and on all goods and merchan-

dize carried over any public ferry :

Provided that the Chief Commissioner may, from time to time, declare what persons, vehicles, animals and stores shall, when employed or transmitted on the public service, be exempt from payment of such tolls.

Where the tolls of a ferry have been let under section five, any such declaration, if made after the date of the auction, shall entitle the lessee to such abatement of the rent payable in respect of the tolls as may be fixed by the Commissioner of the Division with the concurrence of the Chief Commissioner.

9. The lessee of the tolls of every public ferry, or other person authorized to collect such tolls, shall affix a table of tolls, legibly written or printed in Burmese, in some conspicuous place near the ferry

10. All tolls or rents received under this Act, Tolls or rents to be credited to district fund, shall, except in cases provided for by section four, be credited to the district fund.

### IV .- Penulties.

11. Every lessee of the tolls of a public ferry or other person authorized Penalty for failing to affix or for removing, altering or defacing table of tolls. to collect such tolls, who neglects to affix and keep in good order and repair the table of tolls mentioned in section nine,

or who wilfully removes, alters or defaces such

table, or allows it to become illegible,

shall be liable to fine not exceeding twenty

rupees.

Every such lessee or other person as Penalty for taking un- aforesaid asking or taking other than the lawful toll, or without due cause delaying any passenger, and for causing dely. cart, carriage, animal or and for causing dely. goods, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding fifty

rupees, 13. In the event of any breach of the rules Cancelment of lease on for the management of a

or in the event of repeated liability to the penalties respectively provided by sections eleven

The Deputy Commissioner shall, with the sanction of the Commissioner of the Division, cancel the lease of the tolls of such ferry and make other arrangements for its management during the remainder of the term for which the tolls were let,

Penalties on passengers offending.

14. Every person crossing at any public ferry who refuses to pay the proper toll,

or who, with intent of avoiding payment thereof, fraudulently or forcibly crosses any ferry-station without paying the toll,

or who obstructs any toll collector or lessee of the tolls of a public ferry, or any of his assistants in any way in the execution of their duty under this Act.

and every person who maliciously damages any ferry, wharf, boat, or any other thing employed in or about any public ferry,

or who maliciously removes, alters, destroys or damages any table of tolls affixed as hereinbefore

directed

shall be liable to fine not exceeding fifty rupees over and above the value of the damage, if any, which he has done.

15. Whoever conveys for hire any passenger,

animal, cart, carriage or Penalty for plying withother vehicle, or any goods in public ferry course withor merchandize to or from out license. any point within the limits assigned to each public ferry, without a

special license from the chief civil authority of the station where such public ferry is situate, shall be liable to fine not exceeding fifty rupees.

Nothing in this section applies to-

(a) owners of boats proceeding to or from outstations specially let for hire for the conveyance of any other person, or his family or goods, or

(b) private persons crossing in their own boats, or carrying across their friends without hire.

The whole or any portion of any penalty realized under this section may, at the discretion of the convicting Magistrate, be paid to the lessee of the tolls of the ferry.

16. All fines levied under this Act may be commuted to simple im-Fines commutable to prisonment in accordance simple imprisonment. with the scale specified

in section sixty-seven of the Indian Penal Code.

17. All offences against this Act shall be summarily heard and deter-mined by the nearest As-Officers by whom of-fences are triable. sistant Commissioner in

a district, and by a Magistrate in a town, within the limits of which the same shall have been committed.

## STATEMENT OF OBJECTS AND REASONS.

Hitherto the ferries of British Burma have been managed under rules separately promulgated in each division before the Province was formed into a Chief Commissionership. These rules are not uniform, and doubt exists as to the legal authority which some of them possess. The whole country is intersected with rivers; and as these are gradually becoming channels of an increasing trade, and new marts and villages are springing up rapidly on their banks, the question of ferries has become one of some importance. The Officiating Chief Commissioner, therefore, has requested the Government of India to pass a general enactment which will put the management of the ferries throughout the Province on an uniform and legal

footing.
