- 3. We have in the first place (clause 1 of the amended Bill) proposed to insert in the Act a definition of the expression "tout," bringing within that category only persons who procure the employment in any legal business of any legal practitioner in consideration of any remuneration moving from such practitioner, and we have altered the new section drawn in the original Bill to take the place of section 13 of the Act so as to render a pleader or mukhtar liable to suspension or dismissal by the High Court if he accepts any employment in any legal business through such a person. We have also, accepting a suggestion recently made by the Calcutta High Court, proposed an additional clause in section 13 of the Act expressly declaring that any pleader or mukhtar who, directly or indirectly, procures or attempts to procure the employment or himself as such pleader or mukhtar through, or by the intervention of, any person to whom any remuneration for obtaining such employment has been given by him, or agreed or promised to be so given, shall be liable to the like penalties.
- 4. The opportunity has next been taken to suggest the amendment of that part of section 13 of the Act which admits of the taking of instructions from the "private servants" of a party. If by the expression "private servants" is meant menial servants, it seems to us that these are the very persons by whom professional men ought not to be instructed, and we think that the Legislature should not expressly recognize the practice, if indeed, it exists, of receiving instructions from such a source. On the other hand we can see no objection to the receipt of instructions from a respectable servant authorised by his employer to give them; nor do we appreciate the reason for debarring relatives and friends from affording assistance in this way except in this way except in the case of parties who are pardanashin women or unable themselves to take action. We have proposed, therefore, to omit the proviso to the section in question and to recast clause (a) so as to allow pleaders and mukhtars to be instructed by any "servant, relative or friend authorised by the party" to act for him in this behalf.
- 5. We have at the same time veen impressed by the necessity, represented from several quarters, of providing for the exercise, in the interests of the public, of some measure of direct control over persons who are notoriously touts; and we think that the practice, which has in some cases actually been adopted, of publishing lists of persons who are touts and to be avoided as such, and of excluding them from the precincts of the Courts, should be legalised. With this object we have drafted a new section (see clause 4 of the Bill as amended) to take power for the superior Courts to proceed on these lines, subject to suitable safeguards.
- In the case of revenue agents, the Bill has been similarly recast, and we have determined to recommend that, if these proposals be accepted, section 36 of the Act may be removed from the Statuebook, and the scheme of extending the powers of District and Sessions Judges and District Magistrates and Collectors in the direction of the summary suspension and dismissal of legal practitioners may with safety

A Bill to amend the Legal Practitioners Act, 1879.

WHEREAS it is expedient to amend the Legal Practitioners Act, 1879; It is hereby enacted as follows:—

Addition to section 3, Act XVIII, 1879.

1. To section 3 of the said Act the following shall be added, namely:—

"Tout" ment in any legal business of any legal practitioner in consideration of any remuneration moving from such practitioner."

2. For section 13 of the said Act the following shall be substituted, section for section 13, Act XVIII, 1879.

"13. The High Court may also, after such suspension and dismissal of Pleaders and Mukhtárs guilty of unprofessional conduct.

Pleader or Mukhtár holding a certificate as afore-

(a) who takes instructions in any case except from the party on whose behalf he is retained, or some person who is the recognized agent of such party within the meaning of the Code of Civil Procedure, or some servant, relative or friend authorized by the party to give such instructions, or

to give such instructions, or

(b) who is guilty of fraudulent or grossly improper conduct in the discharge of his professional duty, or

(c) who tenders, gives or consents to the retention out of any fee paid or payable to him for his services, of any gratification for procuring or having procured the employment in any legal business of himself or any other Pleader or Mukhtár, or

- (d) who, directly or indirectly, procures or attempts to procure the employment of himself as such Pleader or Mukhtúr through, or by the intervention of, any person to whom any remuneration for obtaining such employment has been given by him, or agreed or promised to be so given, or
- (e) who accepts any employment in any legal business through a person who has been proclaimed as a tout under section 36, or
- (f) for any other reasonable cause.

(b) who tenders, gives or consents to the retention, out of any fee paid or payable to him for his services, of any gratification for procuring or having procured the employment in any legal business of himself or any other Revenue Agent, or

(c) who, directly or indirectly, procures or attempts to procure the employment of himself as such Revenue Agent through, or by the intervention of, any person to whom any remuneration for obtaining such employment has been given by him, or agreed or promised to be so given, or

(d) who accepts any employment in any legal business through a person who has been proclaimed as a tout under section 36, or

(e) for any other reasonable cause.

Substitution of new section 4. For section 36 of for section 36, Act XVIII, the said Act the following shall be substituted,

"36. (1) Every High Court, District Judge,
Power to frame and publish lists of touts.

Revenue officer, not being below the rank of a Collector of a District, and the Chief Judge of every Presidency Small Cause Court (each as regards their or his own Court and the Courts, if any, subordinate thereto) may frame and publish lists of persons proved to their or his satisfaction, by evidence of general repute of otherwise, habitually to act as touts, and may, from time to time, alter and amend such lists.

- "(2) No person's name shall by included in any such list until he shall have had an opportunity of showing cause against such inclusin.
- "(3) A copy of every such list shall be kept hung up in every Court to which the same relates.
- "(4) The Court or Judge may, by general or special order, exclude from the precincts of the Court any person whose name is included in any such list.
- "(5) Every person whose name is included in any such list, shall be deemed to be proclaimed as a tout within the meaning of section 13, clause (e), and section 22, clause (d)."
