GENERAL DEPARTMENT.

Bombay Castle, 6th January 1886.

No. 27.—Under the provisions of Section 7 of "The Bombay Municipal Acts of 1872 and 1878" as amended by "The Bombay Municipal Acts Amendment Act of 1882"; the Ratepayers' General Election of 32 members of the Municipal Corporation of the City of Bombay for a term of three years, commencing from 1st April 1886, is fixed by Government to take place on Monday the 15th February 1886.

Under Section 9B of "The Bombay Municipal Acts of 1872 and 1878" His Majesty the Honourable the Governor in Council is pleased to make the following Rules for the conduct of the said Ratepayers' General Election.

Rule 1.—For the purpose of the Municipal Corporation of the City of Bombay the said city is divided into the wards hereinafter specified, and each such ward is entitled to return the number of members hereinafter specified to it, that is to say—

Rul 2.—Each qualified to vote, whether as a Ratepayer, as a Fellow of the University of Bombay, or as a member of either or both those capacities, may vote for one ward only,

such ward shall be,— in the case of a person voting as a Ratepayer, the ward in which his name was entered in the voters' list framed and published by the

Municipal Commissioner on the 1st October last,

and, in the case of a person voting as a Fellow of the University of Bombay, the ward in which the University buildings are situated or the ward in which such person resides:

Provided that it shall be incumbent on every person intending to vote as a Fellow of the University,

and on every Ratepayer whose name has been entered in more than one ward in the voters' list aforesaid,

to intimate in writing to the Municipal Commissioner within 14 days from the publication of this notification the ward in which he proposes to vote, and he shall thereupon, subject to the limitation imposed by this Rule, be deemed to be qualified to vote in such ward and in no other,

and in default of such intimation being received by the Municipal Commissioner, the Municipal Commissioner shall, within 21 days from the publication of this notification, determine the wards in which such persons shall be entitled to vote,

and such determination shall have the same effect as the intimation aforesaid.

A final list, showing the wards in which the votes of persons who have had an option as aforesaid will be received, shall be published in the *Government Gazette* not less than fourteen days before the date fixed for the election, and a copy thereof shall be affixed in some conspicuous place at the Municipal Office.

Rule 3.—The polling-place for each ward shall be as follows and shall be open to voters from 9-30 A.M. to 6-30 P.M., official time:—

Ward No. A, Fort.—At the Municipal Commissioner's Office.

Ward No. B, Mándvi.—At the Arthur Crawford Market.

Ward No. C, Bhuleshvar.—At the Mádhav Bág.

Ward No. D, Girgaon.—At the Ward Offices, Gowália Tank Road.

Ward No. E, Byculla.—At the Ward Office, Byculla.

Ward No. F, Parel.—At the Dádar Ward Office, Parel.

Ward No. G, Máhím.—At the Dádar Ward Office, Máhím.

Rule 4.—The Municipal Commissioner may appoint such and so many polling officers as he may consider necessary and may pay them reasonable remuneration for their services.

Rule 5.—Voting papers in the forms appended are prepared by the Municipal Commissioner and furnished to the electors on application at his office.

Rule 6.—Each voter shall present to the polling officer his voting paper with the name of the person for whom he desires to vote written legibly therein in the English language, and with all particulars duly filled in, and shall answer any questions put to him by such officer, and shall sign the voting paper in his presence; and such officer shall attest each such signature, and shall attach consecutive numbers to all such

voting papers, and shall, at the close of the poll, send them in a packet duly sealed and secured to the Municipal Commissioner.

Rule 7.—On the day of election no objection to any intending voter shall be admitted, except in respect of identity, or of not being on the list of voters for the ward; and if any such authorised objection shall be made to any voter the polling officer shall transmit his voting paper separately to the Municipal Commissioner, and shall direct the parties to appear before the said Commissioner within three (3) days from the day of the election.

Rule 8.—The polling officer shall, at the close of the day, transmit a list of the objections to voters admitted by him during the day to the Municipal Commissioner, who shall, after hearing and deciding upon all such objections, make lists of the votes given in each ward and shall record the same in his office, and shall, within ten days after the election, publish in the *Bombay Government Gazette* and at his office the names of the candidates for each ward, and the number of votes given for them respectively. And the candidates for whom the greatest number of votes shall have been given in each ward shall, in the proportion hereinbefore assigned to the respective wards, be deemed to have been elected members of the Corporation for the said wards accordingly.

The publication aforesaid shall be deemed to be a publication of the declared result of the election and will be subject to any order which may thereafter be passed by the Chief Presidency Magistrate under the provisions of Section 9 C of the Bombay Municipal Acts of 1872 and 1878.

Rule 9.—No person shall be returned for more than one ward; and in case of any person or persons being found to be elected in more than one ward he or they shall be permitted to elect for which ward or wards respectively he or they will serve as member or members of the Corporation, and the votes which the said person or persons shall have obtained in any other ward shall be cancelled, and the nominee or nominees in succession who shall have obtained the next largest number of votes in such ward or wards shall be returned in the place of the said person or persons; and if, in any such case, there shall have been no other nominee for whom votes have been recorded, then the Governor or Council shall fix a time for holding an election respect of any ward or wards which may be left without due representation.

Rule 10.—If after hearing and deciding upon objections under Rule 8, it shall appear to the Municipal Commissioner that any or more nominees have received an equal number of votes in the same ward, the choice, if necessary, be decided by lot to be drawn in the presence of the Municipal Commissioner, who, in the declared result of the election, shall publish the name of the person whom the lot has fallen.

In like manner if, upon application to the Chief Presidency Magistrate under Section 9 C of the Municipal Acts it shall appear to the said Magistrate proper to pass any order pending

the declared result of the election by declaring that any two or more nominees have received an equal number of votes in the same ward, the choice shall, if necessary, in such case also be decided by lot to be drawn in the presence of the Municipal Commissioner, who shall thereafter publish the name of the person to whom the lot has fallen.

These rules are in supersession of all previous rules made under the provisions of Section 9B. of the Municipal Acts of 1872 and 1878 for the

regulation of Ratepayer's General Elections. They do not however apply to interim elections which may hereafter become necessary by reason of the death, of the resignation or of the disqualification under the provisions of Section 8 of the same Acts of any member of the Municipal Corporation. The rules already published for the regulation of such interim elections under date 1st May 1883 continue to be in force and will apply to such interim elections in future or until expressly superseded.

CIVIL PENSION CODE.

*Section 188.**Rule 1.**Page 103.*

Substitute the following for the last sentence of this rule:—

The following Rules apply to the cases of officers of the late Indian Navy, re-employed under Government, who have commuted the whole, or a portion, of their Indian Navy pensions:—

- (1.) If the re-employment of the officer commenced after the 31st of July 1883, his salary will be subject to a deduction equal to the amount of pension commuted, provided that his total emoluments shall not thereby be reduced to a less amount than the original pension, together with a quarter thereof. The officer will not be entitled by reason of such deductions to resume, on the termination of his re-employment, any portion of the amount of pension commuted.
- (2.) If the re-employment of the officer commenced on, or before, the 31st of July 1883, his salary will be subject to deductions as above; but—
- (3.) If deductions under Rule 2 have been regularly made during the whole period of his re-employment, he will be allowed to discontinue payment of the deductions when the aggregate amount deducted equals the capital value (calculated at the date of the commencement of his re-employment) of the amount of pension commuted.
- (4.) An officer under Rule 2 will be allowed on the termination of his re-employment to resume the amount of pension commuted, provided that the full capital value, as described in Rule 3, has been repaid by the deductions from his salary. If such capital value has not been repaid in full when the re-employment ceases, the amount of pension commuted may be resumed on the officer paying up the balance, and with effect from the date on which he pays such balance.
- (5.) An Indian Navy pensioner re-employed on or before the 31st of July 1883, from whose salary the deductions prescribed

in Rule 1 have not been regularly made during the whole period of his re-employment, is not entitled to the concessions specified in the subsequent rules, and is subject to deductions under Rule 1 from the date on which it is known that such deductions are not being made, or such earlier date as may be determined by the Government of India.

Alteration of Lights.

Notice has been given by the Port Commissioners of Calcutta that on and after the 1st July 1886 the following alterations will be made in the lights exhibited by the undermentioned light-vessels marking the approaches to the river Hooghly.

Eastern Channel Light-vessel.

This light will be altered to a single flashing white light, in periods of thirty seconds, the duration of each flash being about five seconds, and the dark interval about twenty-five seconds.

During the south-west monsoon, or from 15th March to 31st October, a blue light will be burnt every half hour between 7 P.M. and 5 A.M. In the north-east monsoon, or from 1st November to 14th March, a blue light will be burnt every hour between 7 P.M. and 5 A.M.

Pilot's Ridge Light-vessel.

This light will be altered to a single flashing white light in periods of sixty seconds, the duration of each flash being about ten seconds, and of the dark interval fifty seconds.

This light will only be shown from the 15th March to the 31st October, inclusive. A blue light will be burnt every hour between 7 P.M. and 5 A.M.
