No. 2534.—The following Notification by the Government of India in the Foreign Department is republished:—

“FOREIGN DEPARTMENT.

Simla, the 29th April 1886.

No. 900 G.—The following Regulations which have been recently revised by command of Her Majesty the Queen-Empress of India are published for general information:—

REGULATIONS RESPECTING FOREIGN ORDERS.

1. No subject of Her Majesty shall accept a Foreign Order from the Sovereign of any foreign country, or wear the Insignia thereof, without having previously obtained Her Majesty's permission to that effect, signified by a Warrant under Her Royal Sign-Manual.

2. Excepting in the case of Special complimentary Missions to Foreign Sovereigns, such permission shall not be granted to any Subject of Her Majesty unless the Foreign Order shall have been conferred in consequence of active and distinguished Service before the Enemy,

either at Sea or in the Field; or unless he shall have been actually and entirely employed, beyond Her Majesty's dominions, in the service of the Foreign Sovereign by whom the Order is conferred.

3. The intention of a Foreign Sovereign to confer upon a British Subject the Insignia of an Order must be notified to Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, either through the British Minister accredited to the Court of such Foreign Sovereign, or through His Minister accredited at the Court of Her Majesty.

4. If the service for which it is proposed to confer the Order has been performed during War, the Notification required by the preceding clause must be made not later than two years after the exchange of the ratifications of a Treaty of Peace.

If the service has been performed in time of Peace, the Notification must be made within two years after the date of such service.

5. After such Notification shall have been received, Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs shall, if the case comes within the conditions prescribed by the present Regulations, and arises from Naval or Military Services before the Enemy, refer it to Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the War Department, previously to taking Her Majesty's pleasure thereupon, in order to ascertain whether there be any objection to Her Majesty's permission being granted.

A similar reference shall also be made to the Commander-in-Chief if the application relates to an Officer in the Army, or to the Lords of the Admiralty if it relates to an Officer in the Navy.

6. When Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs shall have taken the Queen's pleasure on any such application and shall have obtained Her Majesty's permission for the person in whose favor it has been made to accept the Foreign Order, and wear the Insignia thereof, he shall signify the same to Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department, in order that he may cause the Warrant required by Clause 1 to be prepared for the Royal Sign-Manual.

When such Warrant shall have been signed by the Queen, a Notification thereof shall be inserted in the "Gazette," stating the service for which the Foreign Order has been conferred.

7. The Warrant signifying Her Majesty's permission may, at the request and at the expense of the person who has obtained it, be registered in the College of Arms.

8. Every such Warrant as aforesaid shall contain a Clause providing that Her Majesty's license and permission does not authorise the assumption of any style, appellation, rank, precedence, or privilege appertaining to a Knight Bachelor of Her Majesty's Realms.

9. When a British subject has received the Royal permission to accept a Foreign Order, he will at any future time be allowed to accept the Decoration of a Higher Class of the same Order, to which he may have become eligible by increase

of rank in the Foreign Service, or in the Service of his own country; or any other distinctive mark of honor strictly consequent upon the acceptance of the original Order, and common to every person upon whom such Order is conferred.

10. The preceding Clause shall not be taken to apply to Decorations of the Guelphic Order, which were bestowed on British subjects by Her Majesty's predecessors, King George IV. and King William IV., on whose heads the Crowns of Great Britain and of Hanover were united.

Decorations so bestowed cannot properly be considered as rewards granted by a Foreign Sovereign for services rendered according to the purport of clause 2 of these Regulations. They must be rather considered as personal favors bestowed on British Subjects by British Sovereigns, and as having no reference to services rendered to the Foreign Crown of Hanover.

REGULATIONS RESPECTING FOREIGN MEDALS.

1. Applications for permission to accept and wear Medals which not being the Decoration of any Foreign Order, are conferred by a Foreign Sovereign on British Subjects in the Army or Navy, should be addressed to the Commander-in-Chief or the Lords of the Admiralty, as the case may be, who, if they see fit, may submit the same for Her Majesty's sanction, upon obtaining which they may grant such permission without other formality.

2. Any other British subject, having obtained Her Majesty's permission, is at liberty to accept and wear a Foreign Medal, not being the Decoration of a Foreign Order.

3. No permission is necessary for accepting a Foreign Medal, if such medal is not to be worn.

The following information has been received from the Officer Commanding the French gun-boat "Metéore" through the French Consul at Aden:

Obokh Harbour.—The two small buoys which formerly marked the entrance to Obokh Har-

bour have been replaced by two larger buoys, each carrying a staff,  easily seen

from a considerable distance. These buoys are moored about 12 feet from the edge of the reefs, a black buoy on the port side and a red buoy on the starboard side entering.

Ghubbet Kharah.—In the middle of the large pass at the entrance to the Ghubbet Kharah, Gulf of Tajoureh, there is a reef covered with nearly two feet at low water. Recently the French despatch boat "Penguin" touched on this reef,—her draft of water is about 3' 6".

The light at Obokh when exhibited will be red, height above high water mark 174 feet.

No. 1519.—In exercise of the power conferred by Act I. of 1870, the following Rules for Quarantine against Cholera have been made by the Government of Bombay, with the previous sanction of the Governor General in Council: they will take effect from the 22nd instant in the Port of Aden and at Perim as a temporary measure:—

- I.—The Commander of every vessel, including buggalows or other native craft, arriving from Bassein shall, before entering the harbour, indicate by signal the port from which such vessel has come.
- II.—Such Commander shall not, except as hereinafter provided, allow any communication, either with the pilot boat, except orally, or with the shore, or with any other vessel or boat in the harbour.
- III.—Immediately on arrival the Commander shall cause the letter 'R' of the Commercial Signal Code to be hoisted, and shall keep the said flag flying during his stay in port or until authorized by the Health Officer to haul it down. If communication with the shore is not desired, the vessel shall anchor at such place as may be pointed out by the Port authorities, having regard to the season of the year. If communication with the shore is desired, the Health Officer shall go

alongside the vessel, and, after all necessary enquiries, shall direct the Commander to take the vessel to the quarantine anchorage duly appointed and notified in that behalf by the Resident, there to remain for a period of seven days from the date of arrival, or for the shorter period prescribed in Rule IV., and undergo disinfection, which should apply as well to crew, passengers, effects, and susceptible goods.

IV.—If the Health Officer of the Port has sufficient evidence that no cases of a suspicious nature have taken place on board during the voyage, and if the vessel is besides in good hygienic condition, the duration of the quarantine will be diminished according to the following scale:—

After eight days of voyage	six days of quarantine.
Do. nine do.	five do.
Do. ten do.	four do.
Do. eleven do.	three do.
Do. twelve do.	two do.
Do. thirteen do.	and upwards	...	twenty-four hours of quarantine.

V.—If during the period a vessel is at the quarantine anchorage aforesaid, any case or cases of cholera should occur on board, the said vessel shall remain in quarantine for a period of seven days from the date of the last case occurring, and be subject to all the prohibitions provided for in Rule III.

VI.—When any vessel has been placed in quarantine as aforesaid, the Health Officer may direct the removal of so many of the passengers and crew as may not be suffering from illness, and whose services may not be required on board the vessel, to such particular spots as may from time to time be selected by the Resident as places of quarantine, there to remain for a period of seven days. If a case of cholera occurs among such passengers and crew during any such period, they shall remain in a place of quarantine for a period of fifteen days from the date of the occurrence of the last case of such illness.

VII.—Any mails or cargo which may be brought by any vessel so arriving shall be landed under such precautions as the Health Officer may deem necessary to prevent the spread of the disease.

VIII.—It will be the duty of the Port Officer to facilitate the conveyance to all vessels in quarantine of such supplies of provisions, stores and other articles as may be required by those on board. Such supplies will be placed on the boats of the vessels in quarantine to be subsequently removed by members of their crews.

IX.—All vessels arriving at Aden and Perim which may have communicated with vessels coming from Bassein shall be subjected to the same quarantine as vessels arriving at Aden and Perim from that Port.

X.—All vessels which have undergone quarantine in the manner above prescribed should have the fact clearly stated on their Bills of Health.

COLONIAL AND INDIAN EXHIBITION.

Address by His Royal Highness the Executive President to Her Majesty the Queen on the occasion of the opening of the Exhibition.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR MAJESTY.—As Executive President of the Royal Commissioners appointed by your Majesty's Royal Warrant of the 8th of November 1884, for the promotion of an Exhibition of the British, Colonial and Indian Empire, and subsequently incorporated by your Majesty's Royal Charter of the 10th September 1885, I humbly beg leave to lay before you a brief statement of our proceedings up to the present time.

The general interest manifested in the display made by your Majesty's Colonial and Indian Empire at the Paris Exhibition 1878, led me, as President of the British Commission, to express a hope that an opportunity might soon occur by which your Majesty's subjects in England would be enabled to witness the marvellous development which, under your beneficent rule, their brethren and fellow-subjects had attained throughout so many portions of the globe. It was therefore with the highest gratification that I accepted your Majesty's gracious invitation to assume the Executive Presidency of this Commission, the appointment of which by your Majesty has been the means of making this hope a reality. The invitations which we were empowered by your Majesty to issue to the Colonial Governments and to the Government of India were forwarded towards the close of the year 1884, and from the answers received it at once became apparent that this undertaking had obtained warm and hearty sympathy throughout your Majesty's dominions. In your Majesty's dominion of Canada, throughout your Australasian, African, West Indian and Eastern Colonies, in your Mediterranean possessions and elsewhere, grants were voted, Commissions formed, and Executive Commissioners appointed. That the work of preparation was undertaken with enthusiasm and attended with success is evident from the complete and varied collections which at present fill the buildings through which your Majesty has just passed. The response received from the Government of India was also of the most cordial character. His Excellency the Viceroy caused, through the Revenue and Agricultural Department, instructions to be issued to every district of your Majesty's Indian Empire for the collection of objects illustrative of the arts, manufactures and resources of that great realm. These collections, which now adorn a large section of the Exhibition, have been supplemented by generous contributions from their Highnesses the Princes of India, by collections the formation of which we ourselves have authorised, and by the contributions of private native exhibitors. We are desirous of bringing under your Majesty's notice our deep appreciation of the hearty co-operation of the Colonial Governments in this Exhibition and of taking this exceptional opportunity of stating how greatly we are indebted to the Commissions appointed by these Governments and to the Executive Commissioners on whom the superintendence of the entire work of installation has devolved. We further desire to record the valuable assistance which we have received from your Majesty's Viceroy, from the Supreme Government of India and from the various officials who have so ably and thoroughly carried out their instructions. Our grateful thanks are also due to the Colonial Governments, to the Government of India, to the co-operation of the City of London, to many city companies, and to the firms and individuals who have contributed to the guarantee funds. The fact that the list of subscribers not only includes those whose interests are likely to be specially affected by the Exhibition, but also comprehends every class of the community, supplies a gratifying proof of the universal sympathy and interest which this undertaking has aroused. We venture to avail ourselves of this opportunity to convey to your Majesty our dutiful and loyal acknowledgments of the interest which your Majesty has been pleased to take in our labours, proved as it is by your Majesty's presence here to-day; nor can I resist a reference to a similar ceremonial presided over by your Majesty but a few paces from this spot thirty-five years ago. On that memorable occasion, the first of its kind, the Prince-Consort, my beloved and revered father, filled the position which I, following in his footsteps at however great a distance, now have the honour and gratification of occupying. Your Majesty alone can fully realize with what deep interest my beloved father would, had he been spared, have watched, as their originator, the development of Exhibitions both in this country and abroad, and with what special pleasure he would have welcomed one having for its object the prosperity of your Majesty's Empire, the interest of which he had so much at heart. In the great Exhibition of 1851 your Majesty's Colonial and Indian possessors were indeed represented, but their importance was then but little realised, and their present greatness was at that time unforeseen. During the years that have elapsed since 1851, few greater changes have been wrought than the marvellous development of the outlying portions of your Majesty's empire. It is our heartfelt prayer that an undertaking intended to illustrate and to record this development may give a stimulus to the commercial interests and intercourse of all parts of your Majesty's dominions, that it may be the means of augmenting that warm affection and brotherly sympathy which is reciprocated by all your Majesty's subjects, and that it may still further deepen that steadfast loyalty which we, who dwell in the mother-country, share with your kindred, who have elsewhere so nobly done honour to her name.

From His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales to His Excellency the Governor of Bombay.

Speech by Her Majesty the Queen-Empress.

I receive with the greatest satisfaction the address which you have presented to me on the opening of this Exhibition. I have observed with a warm and increasing interest the progress of your proceedings in the execution of the duties entrusted to you by the Royal Commission, and it affords me sincere gratification to witness the successful result of your judicious and unremitting exertions in the magnificent Exhibition which has been gathered together here to-day. I am deeply moved by your reference to the circumstances in which the ceremony of 1851 took place, and I heartily concur in the belief you have expressed that the Prince-Consort, my beloved husband, had he been spared, would have witnessed with intense interest the development of his ideas, and would, I may add, have seen with pleasure our son taking the lead in the movement of which he was the originator. I cordially concur with you in the prayer that this undertaking may be the means of imparting a stimulus to the commercial interests and intercourse of all parts of my dominion by encouraging the arts of peace and industry, and by strengthening the bonds of union which now exist in every portion of my Empire.

TREASURY ACCOUNT DEPARTMENT.

To—All COLLECTORS and TREASURY OFFICERS.

Dated Bombay, 22nd April 1886.

In continuation of my Circular No. 8, dated 10th March 1886, I have the honour to inform you that the Government of India have altered the wording of paragraph 9 of their Financial Department letter No. 595, dated 5th February 1886, published at page 120 of the *Bombay Government Gazette* of February 11th.

That paragraph now runs as follows:—

“9. It will be observed that salaries, annuities, and pensions paid in April 1886, are liable to the tax although on account of March 1886. Payment in advance does not extinguish this liability.”

If therefore any salary, &c., is payable before 1st April, it is not taxable although it may be paid later.

With reference to the Government of India's Resolution No. 185, dated 10th January 1883, embodied in Government Resolution, Financial Department, No. 595, dated 13th February 1883, all Civil officers are hereby requested, in accordance with Government Resolution, Financial Department, No. 2842, dated 22nd August 1884, to submit their store returns for 1885-86 to their Controlling officers with the least possible delay.

On receipt of these returns the Controlling officers will prepare one general consolidated statement in Form Appendix B. attached to the Government of India's Resolution above quoted, and forward it to this Office by the 31st July 1886, to enable it to submit one general statement for the whole province to Government, who will pass it on to the Government of India by the prescribed date.

As the annual estimates of stores for 1887-88 prescribed in paragraphs 20 and 21 of the Government of India's Resolution already quoted are not needed by the Accountant General's Office, they should be forwarded separately to the Local Government direct. In many cases last year a non-observance of this course caused unnecessary confusion and loss of time.
