2. The Forest Settlement Officer, Sholápur, is hereby appointed, under clause (c) of the same section, to enquire into and determine the existence, nature and extent of any rights alleged to exist in favour of any person in these lands.

No. 3443.—In accordance with the provisions of Section 18, sub-section (1), of the Indian Explosives Act, No. IV. of 1884, and the directions contained in the Notification of the Government of India in the Home Department No. 1437, dated 14th August 1885, His Excellency the Governor in Council is pleased to publish for the information of persons likely to be affected thereby the following draft of special rules to regulate the conveyance, shipping and discharging of gunpowder and other explosives within the limits of the Port of Bombay which His Excellency in Council proposes to prescribe under the Act.

The draft rules will be taken into consideration on the expiry of three months from the date of this Notification.

*Draft Rules.*

1. No vessel having gunpowder or other explosives in excess of 100 lbs. weight on board shall come nearer to the shipping or to the Town of Bombay than one mile eastward of the Middle Ground Battery until the excess quantity has been discharged and deposited in the Magazine at Siwri or such other place as Government may direct, and no vessel shall take on board such excess quantity within the above local limit.

2. When receiving or delivering such gunpowder or other explosives the master of any vessel is to see that the platform in the vessel's hold, the gangways and combings of the hatchways are covered with tanned hides, or other suitable padings, and that the barrels or boxes are carefully stowed, the hatches properly secured and locked, and that the key remains in his own possession.

3. A cushion (stuffed with white oakum) covered with leather is to be used for landing all such powder barrels or cases upon, whether in the hold of the vessel or on the wharf, when loading or discharging powder.

4. After the vessel has been discharged, the hides, hair cloths, &c., are to be removed, and the hold carefully cleaned out.

5. Every such vessel as last aforesaid when at anchor at night in the roadstead or in the track of shipping is to show a masthead light, and every such vessel when under weigh at night is to show side-lights according to the Admiralty Regulations.

6. Barges, lighters, and vessels carrying such gunpowder or other explosives shall not when at anchor lie closer to Bombay than one mile to the eastward of the Middle Ground Battery, nor within half a mile of any of the shipping.

7. When any vessel has such gunpowder or other explosives on board, a red flag is to be hoisted at the masthead and kept flying until the cargo is discharged. The master and all the crew are to remain on board until the gunpowder or other explosives is or are discharged, unless it be necessary to procure water or provisions, in which case notice is to be given to the control officer, but the vessel is not to be left without either the master or a petty officer on board.

8. Vessels, barges, and boats having or taking on board such gunpowder or other explosives are to be kept scrupulously clean, and free from loose gunpowder.

9. In shipping or unshipping such gunpowder or other explosives, tanned hides or wadmiltits are to be laid over that portion of the vessel over which the cases or barrels pass.

10. All boats laden with such gunpowder or other explosives are to remain at anchor one mile eastward of the Middle Ground Battery, or, in bad weather, half a mile eastward of the shipping off Cross Island, until orders are received to land the said gunpowder or explosives.

11. Only deck-boats with closed-in hatches under lock and key (the latter to remain in the charge of the Police or other official superintending the discharge of the gunpowder or explosives) are to be used for the conveyance of such gunpowder or explosives, and they are to have the word "explosives" in white letters, a foot long, painted on a black ground on each side above the water line, and a red flag is to be kept hoisted during the time any such gunpowder or explosives are on board.

12. The consignee, agent, or other persons concerned shall give written notice (forty-eight hours before the expected arrival of any such gunpowder or other explosives) to the Port Officer and to the Superintendent, Water Police, and the latter shall depute a special officer to remain in charge of such gunpowder or other explosive until the same has been deposited in the Magazine.

13. The Port Officer is authorized on occasions when he may deem it expedient to permit ammunition properly packed in cases, when such cases do not exceed 50 in number, to be shipped on board a vessel lying at the ordinary anchorage on the day or the day before such vessel is intended to sail. Shipment shall be effected under the same precautions and conditions as are prescribed in the rules for the shipment of explosives on board vessels lying to the east of the Middle Ground Battery. Ammunition permitted to be shipped under this rule must be taken in immediately on the boat going alongside, and no cargo-boat or other vessel having fire on board shall be permitted to lie on the same side of the vessel during the time of such shipment.

No. 3447.—Whereas it appears to the Governor of Bombay in Council that land is required to be taken by Government at the public expense for a public purpose, viz., for Staff Quarters at the Igatpuri Station, in the village of Talegaon, taluka Igatpuri, zilla Násik, it is hereby declared that for the above purpose a piece of land, measuring, more or less, 5 acres 8 gunthás and 3 annas, and forming part of Survey No. 16, is required within the aforesaid village of Talegaon.

#### Notice to Mariners.

No. 36.—The following Notice by the Port Officer, Aden, dated 16th instant, is published for general information in continuation of Government Notification No. 29, dated 14th idem:—

#### “Notice.

The following information has been received from the Officer Commanding the French gun-boat “Meteore” through the French Consul at Aden:

*Obokh Harbour.*—The two small buoys which formerly marked the entrance to Obokh Harbour have been replaced by two larger buoys,

each carrying a staff,  easily seen

from a considerable distance. These buoys are moored about 12 feet from the edge of the reefs, a black buoy on the port side and a red buoy on the starboard side entering.

*Ghubbet Kharah.*—In the middle of the large pass at the entrance to the Ghubbet Kharah, Gulf of Tajoureh, there is a reef covered with nearly two feet of low water. Recently the French despatch boat “Penguin” touched on this reef,—her draft of water is about 3’ 6”.

The light at Obokh when exhibited will be red, height above high water inark 174 feet.
