“Visits of the kind are to be strictly limited to the town or immediate neighbourhood, and to a distance not exceeding two miles from the dispensary, excepting when accident or serious sudden illness may occur to a Government official entitled to attendance at his residence.”

Subsidiary Rules.

1. No carriage owner or attendant shall be compelled to convey any single person in his conveyance for any fare less than that fixed for the whole conveyance, unless his said conveyance is plying on the road for the conveyance of single passengers.

2. In any case in which any public land conveyance is called from a stand or other place to any place at a distance exceeding half a mile to take up a fare, one-half the full fare of such conveyance for such distance shall be paid to the driver in addition to the regulated fare for the conveyance of the party for whom it shall have been called.

The above rates apply to conveyances for passengers used only in the city or the immediate neighbourhood. Rates for conveyances taken to a distance exceeding three miles from the walls of the city must be specially agreed upon by the parties hiring them.

In the above enumeration of the number of passengers allowed, two children under 10 years may be counted as one grown person.

No. 36.—The following Notice by the Port Officer, Aden, dated 16th instant, is published for general information in continuation of Government Notification No. 29, dated 14th idem:—

“Notice.

The following information has been received from the Officer Commanding the French gunboat “Meteore” through the French Consul at Aden:

Obokh Harbour.—The two small buoys which formerly marked the entrance to Obokh Harbour have been replaced by two larger buoys,

each carrying a staff,  easily seen

from a considerable distance. These buoys are moored about 12 feet from the edge of the reefs, a black buoy on the port side and a red buoy on the starboard side entering.

Ghubbet Kharah.—In the middle of the large pass at the entrance to the Ghubbet Kharah, Gulf of Tajoureh, there is a reef covered with nearly two feet at low water. Recently the French despatch boat ‘Penguin’ touched on this reef,—her draft of water is about 3’ 6”.

The light at Obokh when exhibited will be red, height above high water mark 174 feet.
