No. 4352A.—The following draft rules under Section 31 and draft notification under Section 29 of the Indian Forest Act, No. VII. of 1878, are published for general information. Persons who have any objection to urge to the draft rules and notification are required to forward their objections in writing to the Secretary to Government, Revenue Department, before the noon of 20th August 1886:—

Draft No. 1.

The following rules, made by the Governor in Council under Section 31 of the Indian Forest Act, 1878, to regulate the management of the Protected Forest in the village of Sámrad in the Akola Táluka of the district of Ahmednagar are published, with the previous sanction of the Governor General in Council, for general information :

1. Lands of either of the two following descriptions may be cleared or broken up for cultivation in the said forest subject to the conditions, if any, respectively applicable thereto, viz. :

(a) land the right to cultivate which has been recorded in an enquiry under Section 28 of the Forest Act, or

(b) land let for cultivation under a lease which is at the time in force and has been granted under these rules.

2. The unoccupied land in the said forest suitable for cultivation having been divided off by the Survey Department, under the orders of Government, into fields which bear distinctive numbers and having been measured and assessed

by the said Department at a moderate rent, any of the said fields (hereinafter called "numbers") may be let at the rent so assessed to any person who is, and has been for not less than five years previously, a resident of the said village, subject to the conditions contained in these rules.

3. The lease of a number may be sold by public auction or granted, at the discretion of the Divisional Forest Officer, with or without payment of a premium.

4. Every lease granted under these rules shall be in the form A. hereto annexed and shall be executed by the Divisional Forest Officer, if he is competent under the rules in force in this behalf to execute such an instrument, or otherwise by the Conservator.

No such lease shall be granted until the intending lessee has executed a counterpart agreement in the form B. hereto annexed, bearing an endorsement of the tenor prescribed in the said form signed by the village officers.

5. In the first year in which these rules are in force leases shall be granted for a term of thirty years. Leases granted after the said first year shall be for terms which will expire simultaneously with the terms of the first year's leases.

6. The rent due annually in respect of lands leased under these rules shall be payable in two equal instalments on the 10th December and 10th January respectively.

7. On the expiry of the term of any lease granted under these rules the lessee shall be entitled to a renewed lease for such term and subject to such conditions and the payment of such rent as Government shall think fit to prescribe.

8. Every lease granted or renewed under these rules may at any time be cancelled by the Divisional Forest Officer or the Conservator of Forests:

(a) if the lessee or any co-sharer of the land held by the lessee is convicted of any offence under Section 32 of the Forest Act and such conviction is not subsequently reversed or quashed; or

(b) if the land included in the lease or any portion of it is subjected, without the previous sanction of the Divisional Forest Officer or of the Conservator of Forests, to any mortgage, charge, sub-lease or alienation; or

(c) if the land included in the lease or any portion of it is subjected to *dalki* cultivation; or

(d) if any instalment of rent due in respect of the land is not paid or recovered, under Section 81 of the Forest Act, before the close of the revenue year in which it is payable; or

(e) if the lessee ceases to be a resident of the said village.

When a lease is cancelled under this rule, it shall be deemed for the purposes of Rule 1 to cease to be in force from such date as shall be fixed in this behalf by the officer cancelling the same.

9. An appeal shall lie from any order made by the Divisional Forest Officer under the last preceding rule to the Conservator of Forests. The order of the Conservator of Forests shall be final.

10. No lease granted under these rules shall be deemed to confer upon the lessee any right in or over the trees or other forest produce of the land included in such lease; but, subject to a reservation of the right of Government at any time to re-consider and amend or cancel such concession and to the provision of Rule 11, the Governor in Council directs that the lessee of any land of which a lease is granted or renewed under these rules shall be permitted upon or from the said land:

- (a) to lop trees, not being trees which are reserved under Section 29 of the Forest Act, for the purpose of obtaining *rāb* for manure;
- (b) with the written authority of the Divisional Forest Officer to cut and remove trees, not being trees reserved as aforesaid and not exceeding 15 inches in circumference at the base, which in the opinion of the said officer impede cultivation;
- (c) to pasture and to cut and remove grass for his own cattle, sheep and goats;
- (d) to gather and remove edible fruits and roots;
- (e) to gather and remove dead wood for fuel;
- (f) to quarry or gather and remove stones for his own use for any agricultural or domestic purpose.

11. Lessees exercising the privilege of lopping trees for obtaining *rāb* conceded by clause (a) of the last preceding rule, shall leave uncut a main leading shoot (*shendā*) of each tree which they so lop.

12. Any person permanently residing in the said village may, in any unoccupied number of the protected forest in the village, pasture, or cut and remove grass for his own cattle, sheep and goats without license or payment of any fee.

The Governor in Council reserves the right at any time to reconsider and amend or cancel this concession.

13. Except as provided in Rule 10 and in the last preceding rule, no cattle, sheep or goats may be pastured and no grass may be cut in the said protected forest without written authority from the Divisional Forest Officer.

(a) the breaking up or clearing for cultivation, for building, for herding cattle or for any

other purpose, of any land in such forest except in accordance with the rules prescribed in that behalf under Section 31 of the said Act in the foregoing draft;

- (b) the quarrying of stone, the burning of lime or charcoal and the collection or the subjection to any manufacturing process or the removal of any forest-produce, except in accordance with the rules aforesaid and with the proviso to this notification :

Provided that, until further orders, any person permanently residing in the said village may, in any unoccupied number in the protected forest of the village :

- (c) gather and remove edible fruits and roots ;
 (d) gather and remove dead wood for fuel ;
 (e) quarry or gather and remove stones for his own use for any agricultural or domestic purpose.

And in further exercise of the power conferred by the said section the Governor in Council is pleased to declare all mango, hirda and jámbul trees and bámbus in the protected forest in the said village to be reserved from the said date.

clause (f) of the Bombay District Municipal Act in the Municipality. The word 'streets' must be understood with reference to the definition of that word in Section 3 of the Act. It does not include building-sites and plots of open ground which have not been dedicated to public use. Such sites and plots, unless they have already been transferred to the Municipality, vest in Government.

"In an irregular street or road of varying width, small pieces of ground between the houses and the roadway should be recognized as forming part of the street and therefore vesting in the Municipality, unless private individuals have rights thereto. But separate vacant sites between the houses do not vest in the Municipality even though they be unenclosed, unless they have been transferred to the Municipality by Government.

"When the right to any piece of ground is in dispute between a Municipality and the Government, the Collector shall endeavour to decide the dispute in accordance with the foregoing principles. If the Collector is in doubt, or if the Municipality does not accept his decision, the case shall be referred through the Commissioner for the orders of Government."

1. For the purpose of ascertaining and determining any income chargeable with tax under Part IV. of the second schedule to the said Act, the gross receipts from every source of income not included in Part I., Part II., or Part III., of the said schedule shall be computed, no deduction being allowed on account of the maintenance of the person whose income is to be assessed, or of his family or domestic establishment, nor on account of any tax, rate or cess to which such person is liable, nor on account of any disbursement or expense not specially exempted from assessment by section 5 of the said Act, or not wholly and exclusively incurred in respect of the source of income in question.

2. Any person who claims exemption from taxation in respect of any income under clause (e) of sub-section (1) of section 5 of the Act, shall adduce proof that the property from which such income is derived is "solely employed for religious or public charitable purposes;" and on his establishing such right of exemption, to the satisfaction of the Collector, shall be entitled to receive from the said officer a certificate to that effect, which, if the property consists of securities, shall be in the Form A hereto annexed which has been prescribed in this behalf by the Honourable the President in Council in No. 10 of the rules published in the Government of India's Notification* No. 593 of 5th February 1886, and, in every other case, shall be in the Form

B hereto annexed.

3. The conclusion of any arrangement by a Collector, under sub-section (2) of section 9 of the said Act, with a company, or with a public body or association not being a local authority or company or with a private employer shall be subject to the following conditions (viz.) :—

(1) that the Collector may, if the conclusion of any such arrangement will thereby be facilitated, allow such company, body, association or employer to deduct from the amount of tax to be recovered by such company, body, association or employer on behalf of Government from the person or persons receiving any salary, annuity, pension or gratuity from such company, body, association or employer, a commission at such rate not exceeding two per centum of the amount of the tax as they shall mutually agree upon ;

(2) that the amount of the tax recovered on behalf of Government shall be paid by such company, body, association or employer, after deducting the commission, if any, agreed upon as aforesaid, to the credit of Government into such treasury or bank as the Collector directs, within one week after payment of the salary, annuity, pension or gratuity in respect of which such tax has been recovered.

4. The lists to be prepared by Collectors under section 16 of the said Act shall be in English in the City of Bombay, and, elsewhere, shall be in the vernacular language officially used by the Collector, and also, if the Collector thinks fit, either wholly or in part, in some other vernacular language or in English.

5. Applications to compound for the tax assessable under Part II. or Part IV. of the second schedule to the Act shall be made in writing to the Collector.

6. Agreements for composition shall be in the Form C or D hereto annexed, as the case may be, or as near thereto as may be, and shall be for a period of not less than three years and not more than five years. Each agreement shall be made in two parts, one of such parts, signed by the person compounding, remaining with the Collector, and the other part, signed by the Collector, remaining with the person compounding.

7. No agreement for composition for any tax chargeable under the Act shall be entered into, unless the income on which such tax is to be assessed amounts in the City of Bombay and in Aden and Perim to Rs. 10,000 or upwards, and elsewhere to Rs. 2,000 or upwards.

8. The amount of the composition shall in every case of a tax assessable under Part IV. of the schedule aforesaid, be a sum equal to one hundred and five per centum of the amount of the tax at which the person compounding is finally assessed under the provisions of the Act for the first year of the period comprised in the agreement.

9. If any person who has compounded for the tax assessable under Part IV. of the schedule aforesaid dies or becomes bankrupt or insolvent before the expiration of the period comprised in his agreement, his agreement shall determine on the thirty-first day of March next after his death, bankruptcy or insolvency, save and except as to any portion of the amount of composition which before the said day, shall have become payable and shall then be unpaid.

10. If in any part of the Presidency, except the city of Bombay and Aden, any income assessed under Part IV. of the schedule aforesaid amounts to or exceeds two thousand rupees, the amount of the tax may, if the person liable for the payment thereof so desires, be paid in two equal instalments, the first within sixty days from the date of publication of the list under Section 16, or of notice under Section 17, or of issue of notice of acceptance of return as correct under Section 18 (1) (b) or of agreement under Section 31 of the Act; and the second on such date as shall be fixed by the Collector in this behalf, being not more than six months from the expiry of the said sixty days nor less than two months before the end of the year for which the tax is due; provided, however, that in case of default of payment of the first instalment within the period aforesaid, the whole amount of tax due for the year shall be immediately recoverable.
