BOOK DEPARTMENT.

I have the honour to intimate that with the approval of the Commissioner in Sind, paragraph 52 A of the new green pamphlet added by Circular No. 27, dated 23rd June 1885, has been extended to that Province and should be introduced at your Treasury in respect to all payments made in and after February 1886.

- 2. You will observe that the effect of the rules now introduced is to do away with the running account of unaudited advances hitherto kept with the Survey Department. Each advances now taken on a Survey Officer's plain receipt should, as explained in Rule II. be debited to "Miscellaneous Advances" and should be watched by the Treasury Officer by means of the list printed at page 15 of the new green pamphlet (adjustment being taken against the oldest advance of the year indicated by the Survey Officer). Any balance of the old running account which may be outstanding on 31st January 1886, may be treated as one advance for the purposes of that list and you should see that it is adjusted within a reasonable
- 3. The amounts outstanding on the books of this office at the end of 1884-85 against the Survey Department in Sind were as follows :-

Hyderabad 1,20,534-13-7 Karáchi ... 62,234-14-2 ... Shikarpur 1,40,449-13-2 ...

and when entering the balance on the 31st January 1886 in the list of "Miscellaneous Advances" it will be necessary to make a book adjustment crediting "Revenue Advances Tálukdári Settlement Officers" (the head against which the balance stands) and debiting "Miscellaneous Advances" and an endeavour should then be made to clear the whole balance by the end of the official year 1885-86.

(2) Cost of Boundary marks pending completion of Survey Operations.

4. There should be little difficulty in doing this as there will be a clear two months to spend or refund any unspent balance and if all the bills debiting one or the other of the two *heads cannot be prepared and adjusted at the

Treasury in that time, they can be adjusted in this office up to the 30th June under the note to

5. I would take this opportunity to impress on all officers in Sind or in the Presidency proper the importance of endeavouring to close the year's accounts with as small balances as possible under "Revenue Advances." Special endeavours should be made to send all pending bills to this office under paragraph 52 A, Rule IV. of the new green pamphlet by the 30th June and endeavours should also be made to ascertain in March each year, what advances (if any) are irrecoverable so that sanction to write them off may at once be procured and the write-off made (in the accounts of the year under closure) under the rule cited above. In my technical report on balances for 1884-85, I had to notice several items as "irrecoverable and since written off" which might with a little trouble on the part of the responsible officers have been written off in the accounts for 1884-85 and I trust that officers dealing with "Revenue Advances" will assist me in preventing this occurring again.

BOOK DEPARTMENT.

With reference to Government Resolution, Financial Department, No. 1377, dated 11th May 1885, I have the honour to request that you will keep your Revenue and Criminal Court Deposit Accounts in strict accordance with Chapter 17 of the Civil Account Code and will discontinue all balancing by the Revenue year should such a procedure still prevail in your District.

- 2. The accounts of these two classes of Deposits should be maintained in strict accordance with Rules 6 to 10, 14, 16 and 17 and with regard to Rule 14 I would particularly invite your attention to the procedure to be followed in the case of items received and paid at Sub-Treasuries.
- 3. The annual "account particulars" to be prepared in accordance with Rule 21 should be made to include all items outstanding on the 31st March except those for the year just closed; thus the return due on 1st April 1886 should include
 - (1) Items (if any) reserved from lapsing under Rule 23 note 1.
 - Deposits of 1883-84. (3) Deposits of 1884-85.
- a special form (smaller than form 31) will be provided for this return.

^{**} Paragraph 5 is addressed to "all Collectors and Treasury Officers" in the whole Presidency.

^{*} Circular No. 55, dated 11th January 1886, should be altered to No. 1.

- 4. The annual account of lapses should be very carefully prepared in accordance with Rule 23; the write-off of the lapse, it will be noticed, is to be made in this office, not at the Treasury as has sometimes been irregularly done in this Presidency. All the Treasury Officer has to do is to submit the prescribed return and make the deduction from the plus and minus memorandum (see Rule 19) subject of course to any amendment that may be made in this office.
- 5. I take this opportunity to send correcting slips for the new green pamphlet in connection with Civil Court and other Deposits and to request that you consider paragraph 6 of my No. 49, dated 27th November 1885, as cancelled.

Correction slips to new green pamphlet:-

Alter the heading of paragraph 42 to "Revenue and Criminal Court Deposits" and add paragraph 46, as follows:—

Civil Court Deposits.

46.—Civil Court Deposits will be recorded in the same forms as "Personal Accounts" a separate account for each Court being opened in Civil Account Code, Form 28, and the daily totals of these carried into an account in Form No. 29 (the heading being altered from "Personal to Civil Court Deposits"), the daily total of which will be carried into the Cash Book as "Civil Court Deposits." Civil Courts will not render any registers to this office, but will continue to keep up the Pass Book prescribed in the High Court rules.

Alter paragraph 44 Note (2) as follows :-

(2).—When the payment has to be made at the Huzúr no cash order is necessary the amount should be entered in the "Revenue Deposit Register" at the Huzúr and be paid and vouched for under the rules applicable to such Deposits. Transactions of the nature referred to should be quite exceptional.

N.B.—The Personal Ledger Account with the Huzúr should now be closed by transferring to Revenue Deposits any item unpaid at the end of January 1886.

ACCOUNT CURRENT DEPARTMENT.

I have the honour to request that commencing from April 1886 you will introduce the procedure laid down in the accompanying revised paragraphs for the new green pamphlet, viz.:—

Substitute the following for paragraphs 63, 63 A. and 63 B.

63. Separate registers should be maintained for the Public Works Department (ordinary branches) and each State Railway (including the South Marátha Railway) with which the Treasury deals. For the register of receipts from Public Works Officers, Civil Account Code Form No. 67 should be used, one column being opened for each Executive Engineer (or other Public Works Disburser) and one column for "other items": When signing a "consolidated receipt" the Treasury Officer should have this register brought before him and should personally see that the receipt he signs is exactly (neither more nor less than) the total of the column of the disburser to whom the receipt is being passed.

- 63-A. The column "other items" should be confined to sums received under Chapter 23, Rule 12 as "contributions" direct from the contributors and items so dealt with will not of course be included in any consolidated receipt granted to an Executive Engineer, though an Executive Engineer may be advised of such a receipt.
- N.B.—Receipts from Cemeteries by Civil Officers must be paid in gross into the Treasury and credited direct in the Cash Book as directed in Chapter 23, Rule 16 of the Civil Account Code.
- 63-B.—All Public Works Revenue or other receipts realized by Civil Officers such as Water Rate Collections, Ferry or Road Tolls (other than those assigned to the Local Fund) should be entered in a separate register in Civil Account Form 15 with columns arranged according to the peculiar requirements of each district. The Examiner, Public Works Accounts, may with advantage be consulted as to the exact detail needed in each district.
- 63-C.—The daily total of the two receipt registers of the Public Works Department (ordinary branches) should be separately carried into the Cash Book, but only one Schedule will be needed to the Cash Account which will be in the ordinary subsidiary schedule form and will show the total (in some cases the details also) of each column in two registers according to the following example, viz:—
