#### REVENUE DEPARTMENT.

Bombay Castle, 18th June 1886.

No. 4352A.—The following draft rules under Section 31 and draft notification under Section 29 of the Indian Forest Act, No. VII. of 1878, are published for general information. Persons who have any objection to urge to the draft rules and notification are required to forward their objections in writing to the Secretary to Government, Revenue Department, before the noon of 20th August 1886:—

#### Draft No. 1.

The following rules, made by the Governor in Council under Section 31 of the Indian Forest Act, 1878, to regulate the management of the Protected Forest in the village of Samrad in the Akola Taluka of the district of Ahmednagar are published, with the previous sanction of the Governor General in Council, for general information:

- 1. Lands of either of the two following descriptions may be cleared or broken up for cultivation in the said forest subject to the conditions, if any, respectively applicable thereto, viz.:
  - (a) land the right to cultivate which has been recorded in an enquiry under Section 28 of the Forest Act, or
  - (b) land let for cultivation under a lease which is at the time in force and has been granted under these rules.
- 2. The unoccupied land in the said forest suitable for cultivation having been divided off by the Survey Department, under the orders of Government, into fields which bear distinctive numbers and having been measured and assessed by the said Department at a moderate rent, any of the said fields (hereinafter called "numbers") may be let at the rent so assessed to any person who is, and has been for not less than five years previously, a resident of the said village, subject to the conditions contained in these rules.
- 3. The lease of a number may be sold by public auction or granted, at the discretion of the Divisional Forest Officer, with or without payment of a premium.
- 4. Every lease granted under these rules shall be in the form A. hereto annexed and shall be executed by the Divisional Forest Officer, if he is competent under the rules in force in this behalf to execute such an instrument, or otherwise by the Conservator.

No such lease shall be granted until the intending lessee has executed a counterpart agreement in the form B. hereto annexed, bearing an endorsement of the tenor prescribed in the said form signed by the village officers.

- 5. In the first year in which these rules are in force leases shall be granted for a term of thirty years. Leases granted after the said first year shall be for terms which will expire simultaneously with the terms of the first year's leases.
- 6. The rent due annually in respect of lands leased under these rules shall be payable in two equal instalments on the 10th December and 10th January respectively.

- 7. On the expiry of the term of any lease granted under these rules the lessee shall be entitled to a renewed lease for such term and subject to such conditions and the payment of such rent as Government shall think fit to prescribe.
- 8. Every lease granted or renewed under these rules may at any time be cancelled by the Divisional Forest Officer or the Conservator of Forests:
  - (a) if the lessee or any co-sharer of the land held by the lessee is convicted of any offence under Section 32 of the Forest Act and such conviction is not subsequently reversed or quashed; or
  - (b) if the land included in the lease or any portion of it is subjected, without the previous sanction of the Divisional Forest Officer or of the Conservator of Forests, to any mortgage, charge, sub-lease or alienation; or
  - (c) if the land included in the lease or any portion of it is subjected to dalhi cultivation; or
  - (d) if any instalment of rent due in respect of the land is not paid or recovered, under Section 81 of the Forest Act, before the close of the revenue year in which it is payable;
  - (e) if the lessee ceases to be a resident of the said village.

When a lease is cancelled under this rule, it shall be deemed for the purposes of Rule 1 to cease to be in force from such date as shall be fixed in this behalf by the officer cancelling the same.

- 9. An appeal shall lie from any order made by the Divisional Forest Officer under the last preceding rule to the Conservator of Forests. The order of the Conservator of Forests shall be final
- 10. No lease granted under these rules shall be deemed to confer upon the lessee any right in or over the trees or other forest produce of the land included in such lease; but, subject to a reservation of the right of Government at any time to reconsider and amend or cancel such concession and to the provision of Rule 11, the Governor in Council directs that the lessee of any land of which a lease is granted or renewed under these rules shall be permitted upon or from the said land:
  - (a) to lop trees, not being trees which are reserved under Section 29 of the Forest Act, for the purpose of obtaining ráb for manure;
  - (b) with the written authority of the Divisional Forest Officer to cut and remove trees, not being trees reserved as aforesaid and not exceeding 15 inches in circumference at the base, which in the opinion of the said officer impede cultivation;
  - (c) to pasture and to cut and remove grass for his own cattle, sheep and goats;

(d) to gather and remove edible fruits and roots:

- (e) to gather and remove dead wood for fuel;
- (f) to quarry or gather and remove stones for his own use for any agricultural or domestic purpose.
- 11. Lessees exercising the privilege of lopping trees for obtaining rab conceded by clause (a) of the last preceding rule, shall leave uncut a main leading shoot (shenda) of each tree which they so lop.
- 12. Any person permanently residing in the said village may, in any unoccupied number of the protected forest in the village, pasture, or cut and remove grass for his own cattle, sheep and goats without license or payment of any fee.

The Governor in Council reserves the right at any time to reconsider and amend or cancel this concession.

13. Except as provided in Rule 10 and in the last preceding rule, no cattle, sheep or goats may be pastured and no grass may be cut in the said protected forest without written authority from the Divisional Forest Officer.

#### Draft No. 2.

In exercise of the power conferred by Section 29 of the Indian Forest Act, 1878, the Governor in Council is pleased to prohibit, in the Protected Forest in the village of Samrad, from the day of 188:

- (a) the breaking up or clearing for cultivation, for building, for herding cattle or for any other purpose, of any land in such forest except in accordance with the rules prescribed in that behalf under Section 31 of the said Act in the foregoing draft;
- (b) the quarrying of stone, the burning of lime or charcoal and the collection or the subjection to any manufacturing process or the removal of any forest-produce, except in accordance with the rules aforesaid and with the proviso to this notification:

Provided that, until further orders, any person permanently residing in the said village may, in any unoccupied number in the protected forest of the village:

- (c) gather and remove edible fruits and roots;
- (d) gather and remove dead wood for fuel;
- (e) quarry or gather and remove stones for his own use for any agricultural or domestic purpose.

And in further exercise of the power conferred by the said section the Governor in Council is pleased to declare all mango, hirda, and jámbul trees and bámbus in the protected forest in the said village to be reserved from the said date.

28 A.—The officers in charge of post offices, receiving offices, tahsils, thanas and police stations at which letters are received for despatch, are also required to keep a supply of one-anna revenue stamps for sale to the public. To such officers one-anna revenue stamps are sold from local depôts on the same conditions as to quantity as those prescribed in Rule 22. On such sales discount at the rate of one-half anna in the rupee is allowed.

No. 5745.—It is hereby notified that the Governor in Council proposes, in exercise of the power conferred by Section 214 of the Bombay Land Revenue Code, 1879, to make the following amendments in the rules framed under the said

section in Notification No. 7368, published at pages 795—816 of the Bombay Government Guzette for 1881, namely:—

- (1) The following new rules shall be inserted between Nos. 59 and 60 of the said rules:—
- "59A.—If a defaulter shall desire that his Forfeited occupancies in certain cases to be sold at the desire of defaulters. forfeited occupancy be put up for sale on the ground—
  - (1) that he obtained it on payment of a consideration for the same to Government or to the previous occupant; or
  - (2) that the land comprised in the occupancy has been improved since the occupancy was last granted by Government;

the Collector shall inquire into the circumstances, and if the defaulter's request appears to him to be reasonable, shall put up the occupancy for sale:

Provided that the Collector shall not be bound to confirm the sale of any such occupancy, if he has reason to believe that the bidding thereat has not been bond fide or that there has been collusion to recover the occupancy without payment in full of the arrears and charges due to Government, or if in the opinion of the Collector there has been some material irregularity in publishing or conducting the sale, which is likely to have affected the amount of the highest bid or otherwise to have caused injury to any person."

"59B.—If a forfeited occupancy which falls under Rule 59A. is a

under Rule 59A. is a recognized share of a Survey Number it shall first be offered by the Collector at such price as it seems to him worth

to the occupants of the other recognized shares in the survey number in the order prescribed in Section 99(b). If none of them buys it the Collector will then deal with the occupancy as is prescribed in Rule 59 d."

- (2) For No. 60 of the said rules the following rule shall be substituted:—
- Forfeited occupancies when to be sold in other cases.

  The foliated occupancies shall be put up for sale for recovery of the arrears due, except thinks.

when the Collector thinks—

- (a) that owing to the badness of the times, or to the want of demand for land of the description comprised in the occupancy, or to a combination of the neighbouring landholders, or for any other special cause, there will be no bidders at the sale, or that the highest amount bid will be considerably below the upset price of the occupancy: or
- (b) that the land comprised in the occupancy is likely to be required either immediately, or within such time as the Collector deems reasonable for any such purpose as is described in Section 38 of the Land Revenue Code."

(3) For No. 62 of the said rules the following rule shall be substituted:—

Forfeited occupancy which is not sold how to be dealt with.

For eited occupancy which is not sold how to be entered in the records

as unoccupied and direct that it be dealt with under the rules and orders in force relating to land of that description, or take steps for having it at once lawfully assigned for any such purpose as is described in Section 38 of the Land Revenue Code."

The draft amendments will be taken into consideration by the Government of Bombay on the expiry of one month from the date of this notification.

#### Notice to Mariners.

No. 57.—The following Notice to Mariners issued by the Port Officer, Madras, is republished for general information:—

"It is hereby notified that the buoy marking the anchorage at Navakel has broken adrift, and Masters of ships are warned to be careful in coming to an anchor at that Port. During the S.W. monsoon vessels should take up a berth with the Navakel flagstaff bearing from E. by S. to E. by S. ½ S.; distance off shore about 3 miles in 4 to 5 fathoms."

"Notice is hereby given that a lighter was sunk in the outer harbor on the 24th instant. The Light-ship bears from this lighter N. 61° E. Mag. distant 600 yards.

A lighter is anchored over the sunken lighter carrying a red flag by day and a red light by night.

The sunken lighter is not likely to be removed until the end of the South-West Monsoon, i.e., the beginning of September."

#### Bombay Castle, 11th August 1886.

No. 61.—The following Rule is made under Sections 7 and 61 of the Indian Ports Act of 1875:—

One or more hulks to be used for the storage of coal and for supplying vessels with coal may be moored in the Bombay Harbour, but only with the permission of and subject to such directions as to position and otherwise as may be given by the Trustees of the Port of Bombay.

The term for which such permission to moor a coal hulk may extend shall be fixed by the said Trustees, and is not to exceed ten years.

The fees to be charged for the mooring of any such coal hulk shall be paid to the said Trustees monthly, and shall amount to the monthly sum of Rs. 1,050 for the first five years

of any such term and to the monthly sum of Rs. 1,250 during the second five years of any such term. If the use of any such coal hulk should be abandoned by the lessee, or any agreement in regard thereto should be surrendered before the expiration of the term granted, the lessee shall pay to the said Trustees the cost or value of any moorings which have been placed in the harbour for the use of the coal hulk less damage or depreciation by fair wear and tear, and the moorings will then become the property of the lessee, and must be removed by him.

INDIA, SOUTH COAST. TRAVANCORE TERRITORY. CADIAPATAM, OR MUTTUM POINTS.

Reported correct position of the Crocodile Rock.

The officer in charge of the Marine Survey of India has reported that the Crocodile Rock, lying off Cadiapatam, or Muttum Point, and about 16 miles west of Cape Comorin (on which the British barque "Natal" struck on the 14th March 1886 on her passage from Point de Galle to Cochin), lies about half a mile S.W. by S. of the position formerly assigned to it. From the rock the Cadiapatam or Muttum light-house bears N. 39° È., distant 3.6 miles.

Note.-Mariners should navigate this part of the coast with extreme caution.
