2. Assistant Engineers and Uppersubordinates who attain the rank of Honorary Assistant Engineer may receive, *ex-officio*, the title of Rai Sáheb, Ráo Sáheb or Khán Sáheb, and they will be eligible for the title of Rai Bahádúr, Ráo Bahádúr or Khán Bahádúr on the recommendation of the Local Government.

3. Other subordinates of higher rank than Overseer will be eligible for the title of Rai Sáheb, Ráo Sáheb or Khán Sáheb if they have held with credit for five years the charge of an important subdivision and are recommended for the distinction by the local Government, with whom will rest the decision whether the charge is of sufficient importance to justify recommending the subordinate for the honour.

Rules framed by the Commissioner of Abkari under the provisions of Section 35 of the Abkari Act, 1878, for the management of the public distilleries at Vesawa and Bassein in the Thana District, and for the regulation of the storage, removal and transport of spirits made therein.

1. No toddy shall be admitted into the distilleries between the hours of 1 P.M. and 4 P.M., or between the hours of 9 P.M. and 5 A.M.

2. Toddy brought to either of the distilleries aforesaid shall be taken direct to the Inspector in charge thereof for examination and measurement.

3. The Distillery Inspector shall examine and measure without delay all toddy brought to his distillery and shall enter in a register, to be kept by him in the annexed Form A, the quantity of toddy brought in from time to time by or on account of each licensed distiller.

4. Each licensed distiller shall, at his own expense, construct and complete within thirty days after the date of his distillery license, or within such further period as the Collector may allow, and thereafter keep in good repair to the satisfaction of the Collector, a strong room for the custody of spirit, and shall separately deposit therein all spirit manufactured by him as soon as it is drawn from the still, and shall not open the entrance thereof or remove spirit therefrom without the permission of the Distillery Inspector. He shall also provide Chubb's locks and such

other fastenings for the entrance to the strong room as the Collector may prescribe. He shall also provide vessels of such kind and capacity as the Collector may prescribe for the storage of spirit in his said strong room. The Distillery Inspector shall measure and test all spirit taken into such strong room not later than the day after its deposit, and shall enter in the Register in Form A aforesaid the quantities and strengths of the spirit taken into and removed from each strong room daily. No licensed distiller shall be permitted to distil spirit until his strong room has been completed and approved by the Collector. Licensed distillers shall conform to the orders issued to them by the Collector or the Distillery Inspector as to the positions in which their respective stills and strong rooms should be set up and as to the level of the base of the stills.

5. Spirit shall be removed from the distillery only in casks, each of capacity between 16 and 17 gallons, or between 20 and 21 gallons, or in casks of such other capacities as the Collector may prescribe. All casks used for the removal of spirit shall be filled full to the bung-hole before being gauged and tested and passed out of the distillery.

6. Persons entitled to remove spirit shall provide each his own casks of authorised capacity for the removal of spirit. Each cask, before being used, shall be taken by the owner to the Inspector, who shall gauge its capacity by means of the standard measures provided for the purpose and shall brand upon it—

- (1) the name of the distillery,
- (2) the consecutive number of the cask,
- (3) the capacity of the cask in gallons and pints,
- (4) the date of branding.

7. Every cask so branded shall be again gauged once in every six months by the Inspector by means of the standard measures provided for the purpose, and shall then be branded anew if necessary. Whenever any cask is coopered, or repaired in any way, it shall be taken by the distiller to whom it may belong to the Inspector before being used for the removal of spirit, and shall be re-gauged by the Inspector in the manner aforesaid and shall be branded anew, if necessary. Whenever the capacity of a cask as ascertained by measurement with the standard measures may be found to differ from the capacity branded thereon, the old brand shall be erased and the correct capacity of the cask shall be branded upon it.

8. The Inspector shall keep a register of all casks measured and branded by him.

9. Toddy spirit may be issued from either of the distilleries to—

- (a) the person holding for the time being a license granting him the exclusive privilege of retailing country spirit of strength not exceeding 25° U. P. in the taluka in which the distillery is situated;

(b) any person producing a permit signed by the Collector of Bombay for the transport of toddy spirit to Bombay for sale therein.

10. Whenever the person mentioned under clause (a) of the preceding rule wishes to remove spirit from the public distillery of the táluka of which he holds the liquor farm, he shall apply for and obtain a permit in the annexed Form B from the Huzár Deputy Collector, Thána, if the applicant holds the farm of the Sálsette Táluka, or from the Mámlatdár of Bassein if the applicant holds the farm of the Bassein Táluka. The permit shall be in triplicate. After the production of the permit before the Inspector in charge of the distillery, that officer shall proceed to measure and test the liquor which the permit-holder wishes to buy and remove from the distillery, and shall satisfy himself that the quantity and strength of the spirit offered for removal does not exceed the quantity and strength entered in the permit. He shall then note on the reverse of the permit all the particulars required to be by him there entered, and shall complete and sign the permit and allow the spirit to pass out of the distillery after each cask has been properly secured and sealed by himself. The Distillery Inspector shall then make the necessary entries in his register in Register Form C. hereto annexed, and shall deliver the second and third portions to the person transporting the spirit to be carried along with the same to the depôt to which the spirit is conveyed. He shall record the first portion in his office.

On arrival of the spirit at the depôt, the Sub-Inspector in charge shall examine the casks, and if he finds that the seals are unbroken and that the casks show no sign of having been tampered with, he shall allow the spirit to be admitted into the depôt and shall then measure and test the same, and satisfy himself that the quantity and strength are as shown in the permit. He shall then endorse each portion of the permit and forward the second portion so endorsed to the Huzár Deputy or Mámlatdár, as the case may be, who shall then adjust the duty account with the farmer. The third portion of the permit shall be recorded in the depôt.

11. Any person licensed to sell toddy-spirit in Bombay shall apply to the Collector of Bombay for a permit for the removal and transport of such spirit from either of the distilleries. The permit applied for shall be granted by the Collector on payment by the applicant of the amount of the duty payable on the spirit, at the following rates:—

The permit shall be in triplicate in the accompanying Form D. One copy of the permit shall be

given by the Collector to the applicant and the second and third copies shall be forwarded by him to the Inspector in charge of the distillery. After the production of the original permit by the applicant before the Distillery Inspector, that officer shall compare the same with the second and third copies received by him direct from the Collector, and proceed to measure and test the liquor which the permit-holder wishes to buy and remove from the distillery, and shall satisfy himself that the quantity and strength of the spirit offered for removal does not exceed the quantity and strength entered in the permit. He shall also calculate the still-head duty payable on the spirit presented for removal and shall satisfy himself that the correct amount has been levied in the Collector's office. He shall then note on the reverse of the permit all the particulars required to be by him there entered, and shall complete and sign the permit and allow the spirit to pass out of the distillery after each cask has been properly secured and sealed by himself. The Distillery Inspector shall then make the necessary entries in his Register in Register Form E. and shall deliver the completed original permit to the person transporting the spirit to be carried along with the same to Bombay. The Distillery Inspector shall forward the second copy of the completed permit to the Collector of Bombay, and record the triplicate in his own office.

The Collector of Bombay shall furnish monthly to the Huzár Deputy Collector, Thána, a statement showing the number of permits issued for each distillery, the quantities of spirit of each strength arrived in Bombay under each permit, and the amount of duty recovered by him on the same.

12. In calculating the duty payable on toddy spirit removed from the distilleries, fractions of a pint shall be taken as one whole pint.

13. Spirit removed under any permit shall be of uniform strength, viz., either spirit not exceeding 60° U.P. in strength or spirit of strength above 60° U.P. and not exceeding 25° U.P.

14. No one shall be allowed to remain in the distilleries between the hours of 10 P.M. and 5 A.M. except with the written permission of the Collector.

15. No distillation shall be carried on in any distillery between the hours of 10 P.M. and 5 A.M., except with the written permission of the Collector. No spirit shall be issued from the distillery to the local farmer except on Wednesdays and Saturdays, and no spirit shall be issued from the distillery for transport to Bombay on those days of the week.

16. No spirit shall be removed from any distillery except between the hours of 9 A.M. and 5 P.M.

The rules will come into force from the 1st August 1886.

No. 5260.—The following rule made by the Commissioner of Customs, Bombay, with the sanction of His Excellency the Governor of Bombay in Council, in exercise of the power conferred by section 9 (c) of the Sea Customs Act, 1878, is published for general information:—

The present rules regarding the transshipment of dutiable and restricted goods and all goods brought by country craft will remain in force. But as to free goods for transshipment the following modification in the existing orders is made:—

In the case of steamers and square-rigged vessels entering inwards at Bombay, free goods for transshipment may, in the import general manifest, be lumped under one or more heads according to general description and destination without marks or details for each consignment. The boat notes covering such goods while in transit from the discharging ship to the receiving ship need show no more details than the total number of packages of each description of goods. In the export manifests of ships taking on free transshipment cargo to ports beyond the Continent of India, such cargo may be lumped under one or more heads according to general description and destination for each consignment. But regarding free goods transhipped to ports on the Continent of India full details must be given as at present in the export manifests of receiving ships, because under the procedure for coasting vessels these manifests are used as the import general manifests at the ports of destination.

No. 5918.—Their Royal Highnesses the DUKE AND DUCHESS OF CONNAUGHT and STRATHEARN arrived in Bombay by the P. & O. Steamer *Bengal* on the 27th ultimo at 10 A.M. H. M. S. *Briton* fired a salute of 31 guns as the *Bengal* entered the harbour.

2. A deputation consisting of the Director of Indian Marine, the Military Secretary to His Excellency the Governor, and an Aide-de-Camp proceeded on board the *Bengal* under arrangements made by the Director of Indian Marine.

3. Their Royal Highnesses left the *Bengal* and landed privately under arrangements made by the Senior Naval Officer. The yards of H. M. S. *Briton* were manned and a salute of 31 guns was fired from her as Their Royal Highnesses left the *Bengal*.

4. On the arrival of Their Royal Highnesses at the steps of the Bandar a salute of 31 guns was fired from the Saluting Battery. A Guard of Honour of the Marine Battalion was drawn up and Their Royal Highnesses were received by the Officer Commanding the troops, the Commissioner of Police, the Municipal Commissioner, the Chairman of the Municipal Corporation, His Highness the Raja of Rutlam, the Consul for the German Empire, and such other official and non-official gentlemen as were able to be present. Their Royal Highnesses received an address from the Municipality to which His Royal Highness made a suitable reply. All other ceremonial was dispensed with owing to the lateness of Their Royal Highnesses' arrival.

5. Their Royal Highnesses escorted by a detachment of the Governor's Body Guard proceeded to Government House, Malabar Point, and were received by a Guard of Honour of the East Yorkshire Regiment, 1 Officer and 45 Rank and File, which remained at Government House during Their Royal Highnesses' stay there.

6. Their Royal Highnesses, attended by the Commissioner, Central Division, the Military Secretary and an Aide-de-Camp of His Excellency the Governor, left Bombay by Special Train at 12-30 P.M. on Tuesday the 28th. At Khandalla they were met by the Collector of Poona and the Superintendent of Police, and arrived at Kirkee at 5-30 P.M. They were received by His Excellency the Governor, His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief, the Members of Council, the Major-General Commanding Poona Division, His Highness the Mahārāja of Jodhpore, G.C.S.I., the Rāja of Nursinghur, Sir Jamsetjee Jeejeebhoy, Bart., and Heads of Departments. A Guard of Honour of Bombay Infantry was present at the Station. The road from the Station to Government House, Ganesh Khind, was lined by the troops of the Poona and Kirkee Garrison. Their Royal Highnesses were escorted by His Excellency's Body Guard. A Guard of Honour of Bombay Infantry was drawn up at Government House, where a Guard of 45 Rank and File of the Royal Dublin Fusiliers and a Troop of the 4th Cavalry (Poona Horse) was quartered during Their Royal Highnesses' stay.

7. On Wednesday the 29th Their Royal Highnesses visited the Deccan College at 5-15 P.M., and received an address of welcome from the students, and His Royal Highness made a short reply.

8. On Thursday the 30th His Highness the Mahārāja of Jodhpore called on His Royal Highness. On the same day Their Royal Highnesses were present at the presentation of Prizes to the successful students of the Poona Female Training College at the Soldiers' Institute at 4-45 P.M. Her Royal Highness the DUCHESS OF CONNAUGHT was graciously pleased to present the prizes to the successful students. The Horse Show was subsequently visited, and there also Her Royal Highness distributed prizes to successful competitors.

9. On Friday the 1st instant His Royal Highness returned the call of His Highness the Mahārāja of Jodhpore. Their Royal Highnesses were entertained at a musical party by the Gayan Samāj in the Civil Lines at 6 P.M. on the same day.

10. On Saturday the 2nd His Royal Highness was pleased to open the Fine Arts Exhibition at the Council Hall at 5 P.M. A Guard of Honour of the Royal Dublin Fusiliers was present.

11. On Sunday the 3rd Their Royal Highnesses attended Divine Service at Kirkee Church at 11 A.M., and at St. Mary's Church, Poona, at 6-30 P.M.

12. On Monday the 4th Their Royal Highnesses were pleased to open an Exhibition of Silk and Lace at Mr. Balmukund Hindumal's Silk Rooms in Poona City at 8 A.M., and were present at the races in the afternoon.

13. On Tuesday the 5th His Royal Highness was present at a Parade of the Troops in garrison at Poona and Kirkee at 7 A.M. At 5 P.M. Their Royal Highnesses visited the Poona Native Institution. At 5-30 His Royal Highness opened the Reay Market in Poona City. A Guard of Honour of Poona Volunteers was present. Their Royal Highnesses afterwards drove through the City and Sadar Bazar and visited the Connaught Market and the Albert Edward Institute in East Street. At night the streets were illuminated in honour of the occasion.

14. On Wednesday the 6th Their Royal Highnesses left by Special Train from Kirkee Station at 3-30 P.M., en route for Allahabad via Kalyán. Their Royal Highnesses' departure was private. His Excellency the Governor, His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief, the Members of Council, His Highness the Mahārāja of Jodhpore, the Major-General Commanding Poona Division, the Inspector-General of Police and some other official and non-official gentlemen were present by invitation to take leave of Their Royal Highnesses. A Guard of Honour of Bombay Infantry was drawn up on the platform. Mr. A. T. Crawford, C. S., Commissioner, Central Division, and Captain Herbert, Aide-de-Camp to His Excellency the Governor, accompanied Their Royal Highnesses to the limits of the Presidency.

15. Before taking his departure His Royal Highness desired His Excellency the Governor to make publicly known his grateful sense and appreciation of the reception which has been given to Her Royal Highness and himself, of the arrangements made for their comfort, and especially of the warm welcome which they have received from all classes during their stay in the Bombay Presidency.

While His Royal Highness feels that there was a general desire to testify in their kindness to Her Royal Highness and himself the loyalty and attachment entertained towards Her Majesty the Queen-Empress, he is not the less aware of the hearty good wishes which have been manifested towards himself and Her Royal Highness, of which they will ever retain a grateful recollection.

16. His Excellency the Governor in Council has had much gratification in remarking the good order which has characterized the public celebration of the auspicious visit of their Royal Highnesses.
