The Honourable the President in Council is pleased to direct that, for the purposes of Section 399 of the Code of Criminal Procedure, 1882, as applied to the Cantonment of Secunderabad by Foreign Department Notification No. 1496I. dated the 21st December 1882, the Reformatory at Poona in the Presidency of Bombay shall be deemed to be a Reformatory established for the confinement of persons under the age of sixteen years sentenced in the said Cantonment to imprisonment.

No. 1209.—In exercise of the power conferred by Section 19 of the Prisoners Act, 1871, the Governor in Council is pleased to authorize the reception and detention in the Juvenile Reformatory at Poona, for the period specified in their respective sentences, of persons under the age of sixteen years who have been sentenced in the Cantonment of Secunderabad to imprisonment for any of the offences named in the said section and whom the Courts which pronounced such sentences have directed under Section 399 of the Code of Criminal Procedure, and the Governor General in Council's Notification No. 391I. of the 5th

instant (republished in the *Bombay Government Gazette* under this Department No. 1208 of this day's date), to be confined in the said Reformatory: Provided that nothing in this notification shall be deemed—

- (1) to apply to persons whose sentences have not been pronounced after trial before a tribunal such as is described in the proviso to Section 19 of the Prisoners Act, 1871, or
- (2) to authorize the detention in the said Reformatory of any person after he has attained the age of eighteen years.

Whereas by reason of the contiguity of the group of British Possessions hereinafter mentioned, and the frequent intercommunication between those possessions, it seems expedient to Her Majesty and conducive to the better administration of justice therein, to apply Part II. of the Fugitive Offenders Act, 1881, thereto.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the powers in this behalf by the Fugitive Offenders Act, 1881, or otherwise vested in Her Majesty, is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. On and after the 1st day of July 1886, Part II. of the Fugitive Offenders Act, 1881, shall apply to the group of British Possessions hereunder mentioned; that is to say:—

Her Majesty's East Indian Territories.
Ceylon.
The Straits Settlements.

2. The Governor General of India and the Governors of Ceylon and the Straits Settlements shall cause this Order to be proclaimed in the Territories and Colonies under their respective governments.

And the Right Honourable Lord Randolph Churchill, and the Right Honourable Frederick A. Stanley, two of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly."

Fort William, the 18th February 1886.

No. 41.—The Honourable the President in Council is pleased, under the provisions of Section 7, Act XIII. of 1885, entitled the Telegraph Act, to make the following modifications, with effect from the 1st April 1886, in the Rules and Rates for Inland and Foreign Telegrams, viz.:—

INLAND RULES.

Cancel the present rule 37, viz.:—

*Prepayment of Reply.**

RULE 37.—The sender of a message can prepay a reply, depositing for this purpose a

* The sender of a State message addressed to a Government official may not prepay a reply. And in the case of a State message addressed to other than a Government official any sum deposited by the sender under this rule must be intended for no other purpose than to cover the cost of a return telegram.

sum not less than eight annas and not more than two rupees, and not including any fraction of an anna, but the message to which a reply is prepaid must not be addressed to more than one person. On depositing the corresponding sum, the sender can add (free) the words ‘Reply paid’ or ‘Answer paid’ and the amount to which he wishes the reply to be limited. The terminal station pays to the receiver in telegraph or postage stamps, or in money, the amount prepaid, leaving it to him to send his answers how and when and to what address he pleases, or not to send one at all. The reply, if sent, is considered in every respect as a fresh message.

When a message to which a reply is prepaid is addressed to a station where there is no telegraph office, the amount is forwarded to destination from the nearest Government telegraph office in postage stamps in an insured cover, the sender must accordingly prepay the postal insurance fee (two annas).

Should it be impossible to effect delivery of a ‘Reply paid’ message, the terminal station sends a service telegram to that effect to the sender, and the amount deposited will be refunded on application being made to the Telegraph Check Office, Calcutta.

It should be distinctly understood that it is not compulsory on the addressee to send a reply. The duty of the terminal station consists simply in paying to him in stamps or in money the amount prepaid, leaving him at liberty to do what he pleases with it.

and substitute—

*Prepayment of Reply.**

RULE 37.—The sender of a message can prepay a reply, depositing for this purpose a sum not less than eight annas and not more than two rupees and not including any fraction of an anna; but the message to which a reply is prepaid must not be addressed to more than one person. On depositing the corresponding sum the sender can add (free) the words ‘Reply paid’ or ‘Answer paid’ and the amount to which he wishes the reply to be limited. The terminal station delivers to the receiver a ‘pass’ for the amount prepaid, leaving it to him to send his answer how and when and to what address he may please, or not to send one at all. The reply, if sent, must be accompanied by the pass.

When a message to which a reply is prepaid is addressed to a station where there is no telegraph office, the message and ‘pass’ are forwarded to destination from the nearest Government telegraph office by ordinary post, free of charge.

* The sender of a State message addressed to a Government official may not prepay a reply; and in the case of a State message addressed to other than a Government official, any sum deposited by the sender under this rule must be intended for no other purpose than to cover the cost of a return telegram.

Should it be impossible to effect delivery of a 'Reply paid' message, the terminal station sends a service telegram to that effect to the sender and the amount deposited will be refunded on application being made to the Telegraph Check Office, Calcutta.*

FOREIGN RULES.

Cancel the present rule 21, viz.:—

RULE 21.—The sender of a message can prepay the reply which he requests his correspondent to send. The amount deposited for the reply must not exceed the cost of an ordinary telegram of thirty words by the same route.

In this case he must write before the address of the message and pay for the instruction 'Reponse payée or R. P.' Should the number of words for which a reply is prepaid be greater or less than ten, the sender must add to the instruction the number of words thus—'R. P. 15' (two words) or 'Reponse payée 15' (three words).

When a reply is prepaid the station of delivery furnishes the addressee with an order current for six weeks only, authorizing the free despatch of a message to any destination up to the amount prepaid. In India the amount is always paid to the addressee in cash or telegraph stamps, and the reply, when tendered, is considered and treated as any other message.

If the original message cannot be delivered within eight days, or if the receiver formally refuses the money, stamps or order for the reply, the station of delivery informs the sender of it by a telegram, which indicates the cause of non-delivery and *takes the place* of the reply.

and substitute—

RULE 21.—The sender of a message can prepay the reply which he requests his correspondent to send. The amount deposited for the reply must not exceed the cost of an ordinary telegram of thirty words by the same route.

In this case he must write before the address of the message and pay for the instruction 'Reponse payée,' or R. P. Should the number of words for which a reply is prepaid be greater or less than ten, the sender must add to the instruction the number of words, thus, R. P. 15 (two words) or 'Reponse payée 15' (three words).

When a reply is prepaid the station of delivery furnishes the addressee with a 'pass' current for six weeks only, authorizing the free despatch of a message to any destination up to the amount prepaid.

If the original message cannot be delivered within eight days, or if the receiver formally
