2. The total Provincial Receipts of the year 1884-85 amounted, it will be seen, to Rs. 3,78,02,280 against Rs. 3,74,78,142 for 1883-84, thus giving an increase of Rs. 3,24,138 which is the outcome of the increases and decreases under the several major heads as shown in the margin.

3. The more important variations under several heads are explained in the following paragraphs.

Provincial Civil Receipts—Increases.

4. The improvement of Rs. 96,761 under "Stamps" was chiefly in the sale of court fee stamps. The enhancement of the still-head duty, the tax on toddy trees and the fees levied for licenses to sell foreign wines and spirits, together with the adoption of strict preventive measures throughout the Presidency and Native States, raised the receipts under "Excise" by Rs. 2,20,450. The increase of Rs. 1,35,870 under "Forests" is attributable to an increase in the forest area and to larger sales of timber and other forest produce; while that of Rs. 19,128 under "Registration" was mainly due to the increased number of sales and mortgages of landed properties and to the extensive acquisition of land by the Southern Marátha Railway. The opening of new schools and an increase in the number of students in Government colleges and schools raised "Educational" receipts by Rs. 13,720. There was an increase of Rs. 8,367 under "Scientific and other Minor Departments" owing to the better yield of the Government model farms and to the sale-proceeds of stores belonging to the late Cotton Gin Factory at Dhárwár. The receipts on account of contributions to pensions and gratuities were better by Rs. 11,156 than those in 1883-84. The increase of Rs. 9,421 under "Stationery and Printing" was due partly to an increase in the income of the Central Press and partly to the recovery of the cost of stationery supplied to the Berar Administration. The receipts under "Miscellaneous" were swelled to the extent of Rs. 45,420 by a book credit afforded in the accounts of the last year in adjustment of insurance charges on stores imported for State Railways.

Provincial Civil Receipts—Decreases.

5. Owing to the postponements of revenue granted last year on account of the lateness of the season in Gujarát and to the absence of arrear collections like those effected in 1883-84, there was a considerable decrease in the Provincial share of the "Land Revenue." On the other hand, however, several district officers raised larger book credits in adjustments of the revenue of alienated land on the introduction of enhanced survey rates. The net decrease under "Land Revenue" was therefore only of Rs. 2,41,877. The receipts under "Salt" on account of fines and forfeitures were smaller by Rs. 10,347 than in 1883-84. The stoppage of certain jail manufactures and a decline in magisterial fines reduced the receipt under "Law and Justice" by Rs. 60,664. There was also a decrease of Rs. 28,293 under "Police" owing to the Karáchi Municipality having deferred payments of their share of the cost of the town police and also to the withdrawal of a large number of punitive posts.

6. The total Provincial Expenditure of 1884-85 amounted to Rs. 3,77,42,216 against Rs. 3,75,23,423 expended in 1883-84. There was thus an excess of Rs. 2,18,793 which represents the net difference between the increases and decreases under the several major heads as shown in the margin.

7. The more important variations under the several heads are explained in the following paragraphs.

Provincial Civil Expenditure—Increases.

8. The excess of Rs. 4,39,691 under "Assignments and Compensations" is mainly on account of book debits raised in connection with alienated Inámdári and Dewasthani land at enhanced rates introduced during the last year. The increase of Rs. 1,54,852 under "Salt" is due partly to the re-organization of the Salt and Customs Establishments in the Konkan Division at an increased cost, which was wholly recorded under "Salt," instead of being divided between the two heads as formerly, pending the settlement of the question as to the proportions in which the division

should be made, and partly to the entertainment of additional establishments on the Northern Frontier. The revision of a large number of establishments and the creation of several new ones for the better protection of the Abkari revenue raised the charge under "Excise" by Rs. 23,709. The increase of Rs. 1,09,413 under "Forest" is attributable, first, to heavy charges incurred for the collection of myrobolans and mowra flowers, secondly, to the re-organization of the superior staff of forest officers, and, thirdly, to the entertainment of additional establishments for keeping forest accounts and for forest settlement. Large payments of commission to registrars on the increased collection brought an excess of Rs. 5,729 under "Registration." There was an excess of Rs. 21,479 under "General Administration," ascribable (a) to the payment of the salary of His Excellency the late Governor of Bombay from 1st to 27th March 1885 during that month in consequence of his retirement, (b) to an additional contract allowance granted to him to cover certain conservancy and tour charges, (c) to heavy expenditure incurred in sending telegrams from the Secretariat, and (d) to the payment of acting allowances during the absence of Secretaries and Commissioners on privilege leave. The large excess of Rs. 1,11,442 under "Law and Justice" was due, first, to heavy charges on account of acting allowances during the absence on privilege leave of certain High Court Judges, District Judges and Magistrates, secondly, to the absence of a smaller number of officers on furlough, and, thirdly, to heavy charges in connection with law suits. Several District Superintendents of Police expended unusually large sums of money on Police clothing; this, coupled with an additional charge on account of the newly created appointment of Inspector-General of Police, and the re-organization of certain establishments, raised the expenditure by Rs. 1,32,476 under "Police." The increase of Rs. 16,662 under "Marine" was on account of a special outlay connected with repairs to the Flat "Mooltan." Several new schools were opened during the year, certain Educational establishments were revised at an increased cost, an additional post of Inspector was created for the inspection of Mahomedan schools, and some special heavy charges were incurred for the purchase of scientific apparatus. These causes resulted in an excess of Rs. 62,180 under "Education." The increase of Rs. 53,254 under "Medical" occurred chiefly in the expenditure on the diet and clothing for patients. The newly created appointment of Health Officer for the Port of Bombay also contributed to the excess. An increased expenditure for the registration of railway-borne traffic, for the collection of agricultural statistics, and for stallions and public exhibitions, account for an excess of Rs. 42,985 under "Scientific and other Minor Departments." Pension charges showed an increase of Rs. 34,249.

Provincial Civil Expenditure—Decreases.

9. The decrease of Rs. 15,13,419 under "Refunds and Drawbacks" is due to a smaller book debit being afforded last year than in 1883-84 in adjustment of land revenue remissions granted under the special authority of the Secretary of State. There was a net decrease during the year of Rs. 8,244 under "Land Revenue." There was a considerable reduction in the expenditure for the destruction of locusts and the amount written off on account of unrecoverable boundary marks charges was less than in the previous year, but there was an increase of expenditure on account of additional establishments entertained for the preparation of village registers and for the collection of agricultural statistics in Dhárwár. The decrease of Rs. 25,338 under "Customs" is due partly to the transfer to "Salt" of the cost of certain revised establishments and partly to the withdrawal of the preventive line establishment on the Habsin Frontier. A reduction in the quantity of stationery issued from the Central Stores for the use of Provincial offices reduced the charge under "Stationery and Printing" by Rs. 44,518. There was a saving of Rs. 42,746 under "Famine Relief."

11. The revised estimate of receipts of the Provincial Services for the year 1885-86 aggregates Rs. 3,95,97,000, which exceeds the original estimate by Rs. 13,83,000, being the difference between the increases and decreases under the several major heads as given in the margin.

12. Explanations of important variations under the several major heads are given below.

Increases in Provincial Receipts.

13. Under "Land Revenue" the revised estimate shows an improvement of Rs. 6,25,000, of which Rs. 5,53,000 is under "Rent of resumed Police Service Lands" reckoned upon the enhanced survey rates now current. This increase is however nominal, there being corresponding charge on the disbursement side. The remaining increase is chiefly due to an improvement in the sale-proceeds of building sites in the Presidency town and in some districts.

The better rates at which A'bkári farms were bought up by contractors and the progressive improvement in the revenue raised the receipts under "Excise" by Rs. 2,28,000. The increase would have been still greater but for the decrease of Rs. 30,000 expected in transit duty on excise opium with reference to the actuals of 1884-85, and of Rs. 23,000 under "Miscellaneous" owing to the transfer to "Police" from 1st November 1885 of the contribution from A'bkári contractors towards the cost of the A'bkári Police, *vide* para. 4 of Government of India No. 754, dated 9th May 1885. The sum of Rs. 57,000 put down for the first time under "Provincial Rates" represents the portion of collection reserved to cover collection charges which are now debited in the accounts against "Provincial" in accordance with the rules framed under the new Local Boards Act instead of "Local" as formerly. An increase in the number of sleepers in course of delivery to the Southern Marátha Railway, a plentiful crop of myrobolans with better prices, and an increase in the demand for timber at auction sales, will, it is expected, bring an improvement of Rs. 1,37,000 under "Forest." The sum of Rs. 2,000 provided in the revised estimate under "Post Office" represents the Goa Government's share of the subsidy payable to the local mail service between Bombay and Goa. An improvement of Rs. 2,46,000 is expected under "Police" owing to (a) the transfer from "Excise" from 1st November 1885 of certain contribution made by A'bkári contractors to meet the cost of A'bkári Police, (b) to the appearance of a credit in the accounts from October 1885 on account of the balance and income of the Ramoshi Fund which had heretofore been kept outside the accounts, (c) to the transfer of receipts of the Cattle-trespass Fund, which were formerly shown in the accounts under "Local," and (d) to the establishment of additional punitive posts in certain districts after the passing of the budget estimate. The increase would have been larger but for the reduction made from October 1885 in the Bombay Municipal Police contribution in

No. 1691.—In exercise of the power conferred by sub-section (2) of Section 1 of the Land Improvement Loans Act (XIX of), 1883, the Governor in Council is pleased, with the previous sanction of the Governor General in Council, to appoint the 1st April 1886 as the date on and from which the said Act shall come into force in the whole of the Presidency of Bombay, except Aden and the island of Perim.

No. 1691A.—In exercise of the power conferred by section 10 of the Land Improvement Loans Act, 1883, the Governor in Council is pleased, with the previous sanction of the Governor General in Council, to make the following rules regarding the making of loans under the said Act (namely):—

1. Government will inform the Commissioners what sum will be available for loans under the Act in their respective divisions for each financial year. Each Commissioner will divide the allotted sum between the districts of his division at his discretion and may, at any time during the year, transfer any sum or portion of a sum assigned to one district to any other district. But expenditure within a division must be kept within the amount allotted by Government to that division. If an additional allotment be required for any division, it should

Allotment of the monies available for loans to the various divisions and districts.

be applied for by the Commissioner without delay. Government may at any time transfer any unexpended balance of the allotment of one division to any other division.

2. Applications for loans may be presented to any revenue officer not below the rank of a Mahálkari.

Applications for loans to whom to be made; and in what form.

The application, if made in writing, shall be made in the form A, hereto annexed, blank copies of which will be supplied to intending applicants free of charge. If an oral application be made, the officer to whom it is made shall cause it to be recorded as nearly as may be in the prescribed form and signed by the applicant.

3. Subject to the provisions of the Act and of these rules, Collectors, and Assistant or Deputy Collectors in charge of

tálukas, may grant loans not exceeding respectively Rs. 2,500 and Rs. 1,000 each without the sanction of the Commissioner of the division: provided that the aggregate of the loans granted in any one district in a year must not, without the sanction of the Commissioner of the division, exceed the sum assigned by him to that district for the year.

Loans for sums exceeding Rs. 2,500 each shall not be made without the previous sanction of the Commissioner, nor for sums exceeding Rs. 5,000 each without the previous sanction of Government.

In the case of such loans the Commissioner or Government may call for such detailed plans and estimates or for such professional opinion on the project, for the purpose of which the loan is required, as may seem necessary, before according sanction thereto.

4. The officer entertaining the application shall either make an en-

Local enquiry to be made. quiry himself, or cause one to be made by a Revenue officer not below the rank of Head Kárkún, for the purpose of ascertaining the particulars mentioned on the reverse of form A

section 5 of the Act, to the officer who received the application, shall be disposed of by him at the time that he makes the local enquiry, if he makes it himself, and, if not, upon the receipt of the report of the officer who made it. He shall then record the particulars of the objections and of his orders thereon in the appropriate space on the reverse of the application.

If the officer who received the application is empowered by Rule 3 to grant loans of the amount applied for, he may himself grant or refuse the loan. Otherwise he shall forward the application, with a separate report, through the usual channel of communication to the Assistant or Deputy Collector in charge of the táluka, or to the Collector or to the Commissioner, as the case may be.

6. No loan shall be granted—

(1) to any land-holder who is a defaulter for land revenue, or for any loan previously made to him under the Land Improvement Loans Act, 1883, or any previous similar enactment;

(2) to any inferior holder who is in arrears with his landlord for rent, or is a defaulter for any loan previously made to him under the said Act or any previous similar enactment;

(3) unless the officer disposing of the application shall be satisfied of the sufficiency of the security, if any, to be furnished by the borrower.

7. When the value of the applicant's interest in the land to be improved will clearly cover the amount of the loan applied for, with interest and the costs (if any) likely to be incurred in making the same, no collateral security need be required from him.

8. Moveable property shall rarely be accepted as security.

Personal security may be accepted if the sureties offered are members of the same village-community as the borrower, who are not less than three in number and are willing to bind themselves jointly and severally.

9. A loan granted under these rules shall be paid to the borrower in one or more instalments as may seem fit to the officer granting it. Loans not exceeding Rs. 500 to be paid in a lump sum. Loans not exceeding Rs. 500 shall ordinarily be paid in a lump sum.

10. Interest shall ordinarily be charged on all loans granted under the Act at the rate of one anna in the rupee, *i.e.* 6¼ per cent. per annum. But the Government may, on the recommendation of the Commissioner, in any case, sanction the grant of a loan at a reduced rate of interest or without interest.

Interest shall begin to run from a date to be fixed in this behalf by the authority who grants or sanctions the loan, but which shall not precede by more than six months the date fixed for the repayment of the first instalment of principal.

If any instalment of a loan, or any interest chargeable thereon, or the costs (if any) incurred in making the loan be not paid when the same becomes due, the Collector may, if he thinks fit, charge interest on the amount due at any rate not exceeding Rs. 6¼ per cent. per annum from the date when payment became due to the date of payment.

11. An order granting a loan shall be in Form B, hereto annexed, and shall be signed by the applicant in token that he understands and agrees to the conditions contained therein. When the sureties (if any), whom the applicant is required to furnish, give personal security only, the bond to be executed by them shall be in the Form C, hereto annexed. When immovable property is required to be

given as collateral security, the security bond shall be in the Form D, hereto annexed.

12. A copy of the order and counterpart agreement certified by the officer who grants the loan to be a true copy, shall then be given to the borrower, and payment of the loan shall be made to him in accordance with the conditions therein contained, on presentation of the said copy at the taluka treasury.

13. Subject to such general orders as Government may from time to time issue in this behalf, provision shall be made by each Collector for the inspection of works in his district for which loans have been granted until the said works are completed. The object of such inspection shall be to ascertain and secure that each loan is duly applied to the purpose for which it has been made.

14. Every work for which a loan has been made in a lump sum shall be inspected and reported on to the Collector as soon as possible after the date prescribed for its completion in the order granting the loan.

Every work for which a loan has been granted by instalments shall be inspected and reported on to the Collector before each instalment subsequent to the first is paid and the Collector may suspend payment of any such instalment, if he shall think that any condition of the order granting the loan has not been complied with by the borrower.

15. The repayment of loans shall be made in instalments consolidating principal and interest, the amounts of which shall be fixed according to tables to be prescribed by Government.

The costs, if any, incurred in making the loan shall be repaid along with the first instalment.

16. The date for the payment of the first instalment shall be fixed with reference to the time when it is estimated that the improvement will begin to yield a return.

17. The period within which the loan shall be repaid by instalments shall be fixed in such way that a reasonable portion of the profits accruing during such period shall be left with the borrower:

Provided that the said period shall not in any case exceed thirty-five years from the date of the advance of the loan or, when the loan is advanced in instalments, from the date of the advance of the last instalment thereof, without the previous sanction of Government, which will not be accorded unless the work for the purpose of which the loan is required is to be of such durability and importance that it shall seem to Government reasonable to charge a portion of the cost thereof on a future generation.

18. Instalments shall usually be made payable on the dates fixed for the payment of the land-revenue.

Dates of payment of instalments.

19. Payment of instalments may be suspended by order and at the discretion of the Collector on proof of failure of crops or other exceptional calamity. The Collector shall report the suspension to the Commissioner, who shall pass such order as he thinks fit for confirming, modifying, or setting aside the order of the Collector and, in the event of the payment of any instalment being finally suspended by him, shall direct when the same shall be payable.

20. With the permission of the Collector any borrower who wishes to do so, may repay the loan received by him or any instalment thereof at an earlier date than that fixed in that behalf in the order granting the loan.

Early repayment may be permitted.

21. If at any time the Collector, or the Assistant or the Deputy Collector in charge of the taluka, is satisfied that the person who has received a loan has failed to comply with any of the conditions under which it was granted, either by misapplying the same or by failing to pay any instalment or costs on the date fixed for the payment thereof or otherwise howsoever, he shall, after recording in writing the grounds of his decision and subject to the control of the superior revenue authorities, proceed to recover under the provisions of Section 7 of the Act, any sum still payable by such person.

22. When any portion of a loan made under these rules is found to be irrecoverable, a special report of the circumstances shall be made to the Commissioner.

23. The accounts of all loans granted under the Act shall be kept in such form as the Local Government may from time to time prescribe.

RESOLUTION.

In Home Department Resolution No. 360, dated 30th June 1868, a scheme was promulga-

ted for the creation of a certain number of Government scholarships tenable in England by natives of India. It was explained that the object of creating the scholarships was to encourage natives of India to resort more freely to England for the purpose of perfecting their education and of studying for the various learned professions or for the Civil and other services in India. In a subsequent Resolution dated 18th January 1870 the circumstances were set forth under which it had been determined to hold this scheme in abeyance. For some time past the Government of India has been in communication with Her Majesty's Secretary of State regarding the re-establishment of a limited number of Government scholarships tenable in England by natives of India, and the Governor General in Council is glad to be able now to announce that it has been decided to bring into immediate operation a scheme which it is hoped will have the effect of offering a certain measure of encouragement to the youth of this country to proceed to England for the purpose of completing their education either at the University of Oxford or at the University of Cambridge.

2. Six scholarships, the cost of which will be defrayed by the Government of India, will be at once established tenable in England by persons who are natives of India within the meaning of Section 6 of the Statute 33 Vic., Cap. 3. The scholarships will be placed at the disposal of the Universities of Calcutta, Bombay, Madras and the Punjab in rotation, one scholarship being given to each of the first two Universities during the present year (1886) and one scholarship to

each of the last two during next year (1887). In allotting the scholarships in future years the same order will be observed.

3. Each scholarship will entitle the holder to an allowance not exceeding £200 per annum, payable from the date of his arrival in England, and will be tenable for three years. No candidate should be more than 21 years of age. Each candidate to whom a scholarship may be awarded will be required to proceed to England within a reasonable period from the date of his selection and to reside there for a period of three years, unless compelled to return sooner by ill health.

4. Each scholar will be entitled to receive a sum of £100 for passage money, and a similar sum will be payable within one month before his actual return to India, if he should complete the full period of three years' residence, or be compelled by sickness to return before the completion of that period.

5. It is intended to reserve to the scholars the power of selecting, once for all, the course of study to be followed by them in England. Each scholar will be required to bind himself by a written engagement to submit to such regulations as may from time to time be framed by Her Majesty's Secretary of State for the guidance of the scholars.

6. If any scholar, not being disabled by sickness, fails to complete a residence of three years in England, or is guilty of gross misconduct or disregard of the orders of Her Majesty's Secretary of State, he will, at the discretion of the Secretary of State, forfeit his scholarship and further be liable to refund the sum of £100 drawn by him as passage money.

7. It will be open to each University to consider whether a special examination should be held for the election of the scholars, or whether the election should be made on the results of its ordinary examinations. If special examinations are held, the regulations which the University concerned may propose to lay down in regard thereto should be submitted for the previous approval of the Government of India, the necessary arrangements for the conduct of the examinations being made under the orders of the University authorities. It is, however, desirable that the examinations should be held at such a time (probably not later than the month of June in each year) as will afford the successful candidates a sufficient interval to complete their arrangements and to reach England before the opening of the October term at the Universities of Oxford or Cambridge, to one of which Universities the scholarship-holders will be required to proceed. The candidates for the special examinations, when such examinations are held, must be young men of proved ability, and will be selected by the Vice-Chancellor on the report of the Syndicate or governing body, who will in their turn be guided by the opinion of the Professors and Examiners. The candidates for these examinations or the persons elected as scholarship-holders on the results of the ordinary University examinations must in all cases be graduates of the University under 21 years of age, who are willing with the consent of their families to proceed to England in order to complete a

University education, and will be required to satisfy the Vice-Chancellor as to their good conduct, knowledge of the English language, and physical capacity to undergo the course of life and study which they will have to follow in England. The tenure of the scholarships will be strictly dependent on good conduct in England, and will be conditional on satisfactory progress being made in study.

8. The Governor General in Council desires to take this opportunity of expressing his acknowledgments to Mr. Monier Williams, Boden Professor of Sanskrit in the University of Oxford, with whom the present scheme originated and who has always taken a deep interest in any measures designed to promote the educational progress of natives of India.

ORDER.—Ordered that a copy of this Resolution be forwarded to the Governments of Madras, Bombay, and the Punjab for information and communication to the authorities of the Universities concerned.

Ordered also that a copy be forwarded to the Governments of Bengal and the North-Western Provinces and Oudh, the Chief Commissioners of the Central Provinces, British Burma, Assam and Coorg, and the Resident at Hyderabad for information; and to the Registrar of the Calcutta University for information and guidance.

Ordered further that a copy be forwarded to the Department of Finance for information, and that the Resolution be published in the Supplement to the *Gazette of India*.

MILITARY DEPARTMENT.

Bombay Castle, 4th March 1886.

No. 1.—LIEUTENANT-GENERAL SIR ROBERT PHAYRE, K.C.B., being about to leave India on the expiry of his tenure of service on the Divisional Staff of the Bombay Army, His Excellency the Governor in Council cannot permit that most distinguished officer to sever his connection with the Army of this Presidency, in which he has served so long and so honourably, without placing on record an expression of the warm appreciation by the Government of Bombay of his brilliant active career.

After a service of 47 years spent almost at continuous duty Sir Robert Phayre leaves behind him many lasting memorials of his great administrative abilities, not only in the Quarter Master General's Department, with which he was associated for 24 years, but in the Command of the Mhow Division, and in other positions of high responsibility which he has filled as well in the Civil as in the Military service of the Crown.

His arduous and meritorious service as Deputy Quarter Master General of the Abyssinian Expeditionary Force, and also his energetic and highly successful Command of the Reserve Brigade and Line of Communications and subsequently of the Reserve Division during the Campaign of 1878-80 in Southern Afghanistan (for which he received the thanks of Parliament) have given him a deservedly prominent place in the history of the Bombay Army and of the important military operations in which it has recently shared.

The Governor in Council shares the feelings of the Officers and Soldiers of this Army when he expresses his most sincere regret at the event which now breaks the link of Sir Robert Phayre's long and valued association with this Presidency, and at the same time deprives this Government of the services of a devoted and faithful servant whose upright and firm character will long be remembered with respect by all those who have served with and under him.
