REVENUE DEPARTMENT.

Under the provision of Act XXII. of 1855 the Right Honourable the Governor in Council is pleased, with the sanction of the Governor General of India in Council, to publish the following Rules for the protection of the Screw Pile Pier and Cranes at Karwar:—

- 1. No boats or pattimars shall remain alongside the Screw Pile Pier after sunset, nor shall come along-side before daybreak.
 - 2. No carts or trucks are allowed to go on the wooden platform of the Pier.
 - 3. Cargo of any kind must not be left on the Pier for more than twenty-four hours before being shipped, and led, without permission.

OFFICE MEMORANDUM.

Fort William, the 19th December 1867.

In reply to Memorandum from the Public Works Department, dated 17th October 1867, No. 1447 E, the undersigned is directed to state that an Uncovenanted Officer, promoted before the 6th August 1862 to an office with a salary exceeding Rs. 10,000 per annum, whose average salary during the last five years of his service equals or exceeds that amount, and whose effective service at the time of retirement is not less than twenty years, may, under the terms of the Despatch of the Secretary of State, dated 9th February 1864, No. 20, be allowed one-third pay pension up to the limit of £500 per annum.

2. Mr. Login would seem therefore to be entitled to a pension not exceeding £360 Pear.

- 1 Europe Blanket, measuring 7 × 4 feet, triennially, in lieu of the Country Blanket now issued biennially.
- do triennially, in lieu of the Numdah Mattrass and Cover now issued.
- 1 Cotton Sheet (annually) after the first issue, when 2 will be supplied.
- 1 Settringee (triennially).
- 1 Bed Cover, canvas (not to become the property of the Soldier), measuring 6 feet 6 inches long by 2 feet 91 inches wide, with raised sides 3 inches, intended to hold 20 lbs. of Straw, renewable when necessary.

Men who have already received bedding for the year 1867-58 will receive nothing more till the 1st October next, when, if they would have received a Numdah Mattrass under the Old Scale, they will receive in lieu an English Blanket and a Canvas Cover; the next supply of the former will take place after three years, but the Canvas Covers will only be renewable when they are condemned by a Committee.

Cotton Covers will be issued on the 1st October next to such men as received Numdah Mattrasses this year, and they will receive the triennial Blanket and the Canvas Cover in the following year-

When the biennial Country Blanket would have next fallen due under the scale of Bedding superseded by this Order, an English Blanket will be issued, which will thereafter be renewable triennially.

Recruits will receive one Blanket and one Settringee on arrival, and the remaining articles on joining their
