SIR,—I am directed to forward, for information and guidance, the accompanying copy of a communication from the Government of India, in the Military Department, No. 39, dated 2nd instant, and of its enclosure, specifying the measures that should be adopted for the purification of Barracks of Native Troops whenever vacated on account of cholera or other infectious diseases, and to intimate that the cost of such measures of purification when ordered should be defrayed by the State.

From M. G. B. Malleson, Sanitary Commissioner for Bengal,

To The Officiating Deputy Secretary to Government of India, Military Department.

Dated 18th October 1867.

With reference to the papers received with your docket No. 313, dated the 14th instant, regarding the purification of the Barrack of the men of the 7th Regiment Native Infantry, at Allahabad, which had been vacated on account of cholera. I have the honour to state that, in my opinion, every hut or building in which a case of the disease occurs, or which there there is reason to suspect may have been contaminated by cholera discharges, should at once be funigated with sulphurous acid (the fumes of burning sulphur), the floor to the depth six inches should be dug up, the old earth burier, and fresh earth placed in it; the inside of the roof should be washed over with a solution of McDougall's Powder or other disinfectant, and the walls smeared with fresh mud (leeped). The last-named process will, I believe, be more efficacious, and at the same time more economical than white-washing. Where the floor is not earthen, but of brick or other permanent construction, it should not be dug up, but washed with some disinfectant in the same manner as the ceiling.

2. It will be observed that I do not consider it necessary that the whole of the buildings occupied by the troops should be subjected to the process of disinfection, but only those individual huts or barracks which appear likely to retain the germs of the disease.

The Emigration Agents of the various Colonies will furnish to the Accountant General at the Presidency Town where they are stationed, the lists referred to in paragraphs 5 and 6 of the Rules, together with a receipt from the General Treasury for the amount remitted. The Accountant General will then advise the Treasury

Officers of the particulars of the bills to be paid; these payments will be adjusted in the ordinary manner to the debit of the Governments of India, Madras, or Bombay, as the case may be, but under a separate heading of EMIGRANTS' REMITTANCES.

REGULATIONS FOR THE REMITTANCE TO INDIA OF THE SAVINGS OF COOLIES IN THE WEST INDIES, AND OTHER COLONIES.

The amounts to be remitted to India are to be deposited in sums of not less than 10 Dollars, nor more than 100 Dollars, with the Colonial Treasurer or other Officer to be named by the Colonial Government for this service.

Each deposit is to be accompanied by a printed form, to be obtained from such Officer, in which are 11. to be specified the full name, age, occupation, and address of the Remitter, the amount deposited, and the name, age, and address of the intended Payee in India. Special care should be taken in ascertaining and recording the designation of the Payee.

III. In return for the deposit, the Remitter will be furnished with a Money Order for the amount payable by the Government in India at the local Government Treasury nearest to the residence of the Payee. The amount will invariably be computed at the rate of 2 Rupees 1 anna 4 pies per Dollar, or of one Rupee for two Shillings according to the currency of the Colony. Upon the back of each such Money Order, there will be printed in the language of the Colony in which the order is issued, and also in the Indian language most familiar to the Depositor, in addition to any other information which local circumstances may render desirable, the following notice for the guidance of the Remitter as well as of the Payce in India:—

NOTICE.

- This Money Or is is issued and must be taken subject to the following conditions:

 1. The amount feified in this Money Order, namely Rupees annas will be paid by the Indian Government, without any deduction whatsoever to the person in whose favour it has been issued, within two months after its presentation or as soon after as the Official advice of it shall have been received at the local Indian Treasury situated nearest the residence of the Payee.
- 2. Before paying the money the Payee will be required to furnish the name, address, and such other particulars ing to the Remitter, as well as to himself, as may be required to satisfy the Officer paying him that he is entitled to receive the money.
- 3. If the Money Order be not presented at the Local Treasury in India for payment within 12 Calendar months from the date of its issue in the Colony, all claim to the money will be lost.
- If a Money Order, by whomsoever presented, has been once paid, neither the Colonial nor the Indiana Government will be liable to any further claim in respect of it.

IV .- It will rest with the Remitter to send the Money Order at his own risk to the person intended to receive the amount in India, in doing which he should be careful to call the Payee's attention to the aboveconditions.

V .- The Colonial Government will transmit by each mail to its Emigration Agent in India, a list, in duplicate, containing the above particulars in respect of every Money Order issued since the despatch of the

VI .- On receipt of these lists, the Emigration Agent in India will, without delay, hand in one copy to the proper Officer of the Government, together with the amount of Rupees comprised in such list, taking a receipt for the same as his voucher; all particulars necessary for the payment of the Money Order will then beforwarded free of charge by the Indian Government to the several Local Treasuries in the interior, nearest to the residences of the Payees.

Coolies about to return to India may deposit their savings for the purpose of drawing them in India, receiving in return a Money Order issued in their own favour under the above rules, and subject to the sameconditions, as to proof of their identity at the time of applying for payment in India.
