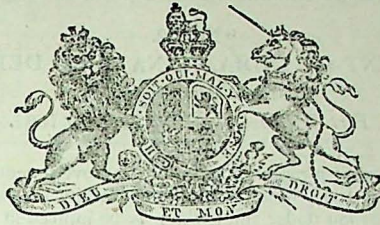

GOVERNMENT NOTIFICATIONS TO THE PUBLIC.

REVENUE DEPARTMENT.

Notification under Section 49 of Act I. of 1865.

In extending to the Esafut Villages of Honhully, Hoonshial, and Hoondurgoond, in the Talikote Pergunnah, of the Collectorate of Kulladghee, the Sections of the Survey Act (I. of 1865) marginally noted, the Right Honorable the Governor in Council is pleased to notify that the powers as regards *Kuboolayuts* and *Razeenamas* are (as at present) to be exercised by the Officers of the Alience.

PENSIONS AND GRATUITIES.

Fort William, the 13th January 1868.

Read—

The following documents regarding a representation by the Government of Bombay, of the narrowness of the Rules of 14th August 1857, which authorise a gratuity of six months' pay, as a maximum, for persons (not entitled to pension under rule) who may be injured in the execution of their public duty, and be thereby disabled from earning a livelihood, and for the families of persons killed in the execution of public duty:—

RESOLUTION.—The Governor General in Council observes that the gratuity rules of 14th August 1857 were established because the awards of special pensions had proved unexpectedly numerous, and threatened, with the rapidly increasing growth of the Uncovenanted Service, to be burdensome.

2. Six months' pay was also stated in those rules to be the maximum of gratuity to be admitted in lieu of special pension.

3. In illustration of the insufficient provision allowed by these Rules, the Government of Bombay cited two instances of a Police Officer who was stabbed by an Italian while on duty, and who died from the effects of his wound, and of a Sheriff's Peon in the Bombay County Jail, who died in the execution virtually of a Policeman's duty, viz from injuries inflicted on him by a European prisoner, whose escape, with that of two other prisoners, he had tried to prevent. The gratuity, less than six months' pay, allowable in these two cases, under the Gratuity Rules of 1857, was deemed insufficient by the Government of Bombay.

4. On the recommendation of that Government additional gratuities were specially allowed for the families of the deceased.

5. On reconsideration, however, these cases come within the scope of the despatch of the Secretary of State for India, No. 33, dated 21st April 1859, which was duly communicated to the Local Governments and Administrations, and which authorize the grant of a pension to the families of Policemen killed in the execution of their duty. The indulgence is not confined to Policemen in the Civil Constabulary: it was extended by the Secretary of State to the family of even a Village Watchman who lost his life in the execution of his duty.

6. The Government of Bombay will accordingly be requested to propose pensions for the widows and children of the two deceased men abovementioned, the gratuity already allowed being recovered from the arrears of pension.

7. The third case cited by the Government of Bombay in illustration of the insufficiency of the Gratuity Rules of 1857, was that of a third class Private in the Canara Police, who contracted an ulcer while serving in the Canara District and was unfitted thereby for further service in the Police. Having served less than five years he was not entitled to gratuity under the rules, but the Government of Bombay recommended that a gratuity of three months' pay should be allowed. This was sanctioned.

8. Obviously no general rule can be defined for a case of this kind. Unfitness for service from a disease contracted during employment in a district to which that disease is peculiar, cannot be recognised as conferring a claim to pension or gratuity on public establishments generally, and if on special considerations Policemen should be exceptionally treated in this respect, the indulgence to them should be accorded under the rules for the Police Superannuation Fund, not under the Gratuity Rules of 14th August 1857.

9. The Governor General in Council accordingly concurs with the Governments of Madras and Bengal, that it is not necessary to enlarge those Gratuity Rules.

10. In cases which appear to be insufficiently provided for by the Gratuity Rules, the maximum admissible under those rules may be allowed by the Local Government, a recommendation for any additional indulgence being at the same time submitted to the Government of India.

ORDERED, that a copy of this Resolution be sent to the Governments of Bombay, Madras, Bengal, North-Western Provinces, and the Punjab.

REVENUE DEPARTMENT.

Whereas by Act XXIX. of 1857, the Governor of the Presidency of Bombay in Council is empowered to declare, by notice, to be published in the Official Gazette of that Presidency, that the territories of any Native Chief, not subject to the jurisdiction of the Courts and Civil Authorities of that Presidency, shall be deemed to be foreign territory, and that goods passing out of such territory shall be liable to certain duties, and shall be allowed to pass out of such foreign territory by certain roads and passes alone.

Notice is hereby given, that on and after the 1st March next, spirits and fermented liquors of whatever description imported out of the territories of His Highness the Guicowar, or the Rajas of Dhurrumpore and Wansda, into the portion of the Surat Collectorate lying between the Nurbudda and Damaun Gunga Rivers, shall be liable to a duty of three Rupees the Imperial Gallon, as prescribed in Act XXV. of 1865, and shall be allowed to pass out of such territory by the roads on which the following stations are established and no others:—

His Excellency in Council shares the deep regret expressed at the death of Captains Hebbert and LaTouche, and the other brave men who lost their lives in this successful attack on the Wagheer Rebels. He thanks Colonel Anderson, Major Reynolds, and Captain Harris for their prompt action, and begs that Major Reynolds and Captain Harris will express to the Officers and men under their several Commands on this occasion the Government's acknowledgment of their services. Colonel Anderson is requested to express the same to Jemedars Syud Alvee and Saleh Hindce, and the other men of the Federal Seebundee.

The conduct of Jemedar Syud Alvee will be specially brought to the notice of His Excellency the Viceroy.

From Captain H. W. HARRIS, Commanding Detachment 1st Cavalry,
To the STAFF OFFICER, Camp Rajkote.

SIR,—I beg to report for the information of the Officer commanding the Station, that yesterday evening about five o'clock we came on a party of Wagheer rebels, twenty-eight in number, who took up a position on a hill, and we were unable to charge up on account of the ground being so bad.

I divided my men, forty-one in number, into two divisions, and sent one under command of the Russaldar Major round by the East side, while I took the other by the West, and having extended both parties, surrounded three-fourths of the hill, and prevented an escape.

On the arrival of the Infantry under Major Reynolds, 17th Native Infantry, they also extended and rushed up; at the same time I closed my men and brought them to the foot, and leaving a party there to cut off a retreat, I took the remainder up the hill, and aided in repulsing the rebels from their position. I grieve to say that I did not effect this without loss, and four of my men have been killed and one horse wounded.

I may add that the Native Officer and men behaved in a very gallant manner.

To the ASSISTANT ADJUTANT GENERAL, N. D. Army,

SIR,—In continuation of my letter No. 5 of 1868, I have now the honour to forward for the information of the Major General reports from Lieutenant Colonel Anderson, Major Reynolds, and Captain Harris, containing full particulars of the engagement with the Wagheers near Machurda on the 29th ultimo. The report from Colonel Anderson is, as will be seen, a copy of his report already forwarded direct to Government.

2. I have called for a Sketch of the position, which shall be forwarded as soon as received, as I will not detain these reports pending its arrival.

3. I would beg to bring to the notice of the Major General the very rapid march made by the Infantry, they having completed the distance of 16 miles in about three hours and a half, thus enabling the attack to be made before dark; and also the gallantry displayed by Major Reynolds and Captain Harris, and all ranks of their respective Detachments, which I trust the Major General will bring to the notice of Government.

To the SECRETARY TO GOVERNMENT, Political Department, Bombay.

Dated 30th December 1867.

SIR,—I had the honour to report by telegraph the encounter which the British Force under the Command of Major Reynolds, 17th N. I., had with the Rebel Wagheers yesterday, and I now beg to forward the following particulars of the same.

2. On receiving information when at the village of Zallia in the Gondal District that the gang under several of their noted leaders were harboured in the limits of the Drappa village of Bootawudder, I made a forced march upon that village on the 26th instant with all the available force at command, and surrounded it, but was unsuccessful in finding any of the gang as expected. Sufficient evidence, however, came out against certain of the villagers as to warrant their detention, and I accordingly moved my camp next day to the place for the purpose of prosecuting my inquiries, and ascertained that the gang had actually been in a nulla close by on the previous day.

3. About midday of the 29th instant intelligence was sent in from the Nuggur village of Wudala that the gang had seized a man of that place, and that a patrol had started on their tracks, which went in the direction of Oomalee, some 12 miles distant from our camp.

4. I requested the force to move at once, and with the Cavalry under Captain Harris and my Assistants, Captains Hebbert and LaTouche, started on ahead. On reaching Oomralee a note was brought stating the gang had been started out of a sugarcane field at Chawundee, and had taken up a position on a rocky hill some five miles off, and were defying the Seebundee. Word was sent back to the Infantry and Federal Seebundee to push on quickly, and our party of horse galloped on, and passing the village of Chawundee (under Nuggur) saw an isolated hill called Tohur situated near the village of Machurda, about a couple of miles in the distance, on which the Wagheers were said to be.

5. On reaching this hill, which was covered with grass and large boulders of rock, and rising out of the plain 250 to 300 feet high, the Wagheer gang were seen to have entrenched themselves behind the rocks and stones which they had piled up to form barriers, and from behind which they kept up a sharp fire on us from time to time. The N.E. side of the hill was the position in which the Wagheers seemed strongest. Measures were taken to surround the hill effectually with the Cavalry as per margin, as it was seen to be impracticable for an attack by that arm, and we were obliged to await the arrival of the Infantry.

6. The day was declining, and I was under great fear that the Infantry would not reach in time. Some few of the Nuggur Seebundee who had traced the gang up refused to face the enemy notwithstanding large offers of rewards. About 5-30 p.m., however, the Infantry as per margin arrived (camels having been pressed into the service to expedite their arrival). Captain LaTouche placed himself at the head of the Federal Seebundee, with Syud Alvee, Jemedar, and attacked the position from the S.E. corner. Major Reynolds, with 15 Rank and File, attacked from the S.W., while Captain Hebbert, volunteering, took the remainder of the 17th Regiment N. I. and attacked from the West and N.W. face. The Seebundee of the Nuggur State under Jalumsing were directed to attack from the North and N.E.

7. These movements were to be simultaneous, and as the attack commenced the Cavalry were to close in. I left the Officers, and myself went to see the native Seebundee of His Highness the Jam follow out the programme, but found they would not face the hill. I begged and entreated of Jalumsing, their leader, to go closer in at all events and so distract the attention of the Wagheers, but to no purpose. I therefore left them and with a portion of the Cavalry scrambled up the hill as best we could.

8. The position, which was a strong one, from the natural obstacles, had been made more so by the outlaws as above described, and they also had the advantage of being armed for the most part with double-barrelled guns and rifles which they used effectively; but nothing could withstand the gallant dash with which our Troops assailed the position, reserving their fire until they reached the crest of the hill, where, I grieve to say, Captain Hebbert fell mortally wounded through the body and spine; killing 2 of the rebels, however, before he was shot down. He lingered until midnight, when he died, conscious to the last, and satisfied in having nobly done his duty.

9. Major Reynolds, at the head of his party, was on the crest of the hill simultaneously with Captains Hebbert and LaTouche; he received a severe wound on the head from a musket-ball cutting the scalp down to the bone, but fortunately not injuring the latter. Nothing could exceed his coolness and intrepidity. I am glad to state he is in a fair way of recovery.

10. Captain LaTouche was apparently unhurt when I last saw him at the top of the hill, but as some of the gang broke down on the N.E. side where the Nuggur Seebundee should have been, he followed after them with a few men, and seizing a horse from one of the Seebundee (Jallumsing's), mounted and galloped after some of the runaways, shot one with his revolver, and had dismounted to finish with his sword another whom he had also wounded, when the man, firing his musket from his hip, shot him through the left side, receiving his death at the same time from a thrust of Captain LaTouche's sword. Jemedar Alvee was immediately up, but too late to be of use. The wound was mortal, and Captain LaTouche died in his arms in about a quarter of an hour, having shown a brilliant example of bravery and heroism to his men which will be long remembered.

11. The losses amongst our men were also heavy. Captain Harris, with a portion of the 1st Lancers, succeeded also in scrambling up the N.W. face of the hill, which the Nuggur Seebundee should have done. He suffered a loss of 4 men in this attempt—2 killed and 2 wounded (since dead). The Federal Seebundee lost 4 killed and wounded, the 17th N.I. one killed, and 1 Seebundee of Nuggur, who had joined the Federal Seebundee party, was also killed, making a total of 2 European Officers and 10 men killed, 1 European Officer and one man wounded.

12. The Wagheer gang was under the leadership of the notorious Dewo Mañek, and it is a source of great satisfaction to me to record that he was amongst the killed with 16th others, whilst Shukker Mekrance Jemedar out against Nuggur, and another of the gang Bhoja Mher of Porebunder, have been taken alive, but badly wounded.

13. Shukker Jemedar has recognized the bodies of his dead comrades of whom I append a list, from which it will be seen that besides Dewo Mañek, Poonja Mañek, and Mūhmudia Seedee, long known as Mooloo Mañek's Benchmen, and who carried him out of Baroda Jail (in his flight), have been killed. It became dark before the affair was over; but by the statement given by our two prisoners, 7 only are said to have escaped; of these 3 were seen to be wounded, and the traces of them were taken next morning to the sugarcane fields at Chowundee from which the gang was first started. As this is a Nuggur Village I have called upon His Highness the Jam's Agent here to produce them. Amongst the wounded, Shukker Jemedar states was Hado Kuronee, a noted Wagheer. The traces of the remaining 4 were taken towards the Allich hills, and they most probably will join Mooloo Mañek in the Burda hills where Shukker states him to be lying concealed.

14. I think Government may consider that a severe blow has now been given to this gang, and I am not without hope of Mooloo Mañek giving himself up, as it has long been known that Dewo Mañek was the person who has hitherto prevented him from doing so. It is essentially necessary, however, that summary measures should be taken against all who have been harbouring or assisting this gang. This is due to all past sufferers from the Wagheer outrage, and especially we owe it to our murdered officers that we should not fail to punish all who have been traitors among us. My former letter No. 45 W, of the 23rd instant, will, I trust, have proved how little necessity there is for any pity being shown towards persons aiding, in however slight a degree, such a gang of ruffians as these men are known to have been.

15. I have requested Major Reynolds and Captain Harris to furnish reports of the conduct of the men under their command on the late occasion, which are forwarded. I owe much to both these officers for the very ready and efficient assistance they have given me during the late trying occasion; of the gallantry displayed by both it is needless to write; both showed by their example what European leaders can do on occasion of difficulty, and I feel sure Government will not fail to appreciate the same.

16. The victory we have gained is clouded over by the sad loss we have suffered in the deaths of Captains Henry Hebbert and Charles LaTouche. Both these officers have been invaluable to me of late. Captain Hebbert was thoroughly acquainted with the districts in which the rebel gang were wont to move about and find shelter, and this knowledge would have served me in good stead when prosecuting the case I have now on hand. A brave and gallant soldier Government has lost in him, a laborious and zealous Political officer, and I know of no one who more earnestly entered into work and tried his utmost to do his duty. Captain LaTouche knew not fear; his bravery on the late occasion is the theme of all; young, ardent, and impulsive, his daring carried him on rashly, I fear, to his death. As an Assistant he was indefatigable, and his loss will be very great in this Agency, for he showed by his aptitude the making of a first rate Political officer, and in everything to which he devoted himself he put his whole soul to the work, indifferent alike as to the trouble and anxiety it entailed. I grieve for him and Captain Hebbert as loved friends for many years standing, and can assure Government that in their premature deaths it has lost officers of rare and great promise. Of Jemedar Syud Alvee, of the Federal Seebundee, I cannot speak in terms of sufficient praise. Colonel Keatinge has before brought his conduct to the notice of Government, and a sword has been presented him; he showed much gallantry in the field, and has also got his portion of the Federal Seebundee in such first-rate order, that I consider they helped in a great measure to secure the success we had, and I would beg to suggest that some mark of distinction should be bestowed upon him for his conduct, and I know it was the intention of the late Governor Sir Bartle Frere, when he was at Verrawul in January, to bring his loyalty and devotion prominently to the notice of the Supreme Government.

17. Jemedar Saleh Hindee of Joonaghur, with a small portion of his men, joined the Federal Seebundee and behaved most gallantly. It must be remembered that this portion of the Federal Seebundee belonged to the Joonaghur Contingent, and it showed extremely well to see them exerting themselves under the eyes of their Chief's own official, and I trust that Government may see fit to notice the conduct of this official.

18. It is with pain I have to record the cowardice displayed by the Nuggur Seebundee under Jallumsing. Threats and entreaties had no effect, and I feel now convinced that with very rare exceptions we can never calculate upon obtaining efficient aid from them or any other Seebundee under the organization of the native Durbars in putting down desperate characters such as these Wagheers. Had they done their duty in the slightest degree, not a Wagheer would have escaped, but they would not even stand at a distance to surround their position, and Captain LaTouche owes his death to their cowardice alone. A report of their behaviour will be made to His Highness the Jam, which I feel assured he will receive with regret, as he has been most anxious to have these outlaws crushed, and has entrusted his agent Poput Veljee with full powers, and stimulating with offers of large rewards all who will assist in putting them down.

19. In concluding this report I beg to bring to the notice of Government the creditable behaviour of my judicial clerk Mr. Falkers, who attended me all through, and was of the greatest assistance when Captains Hebbert and LaTouche were first shot down.

20. The Foujdar of Wuddalee Nursec, and the Jamedar of the Patrol, Abdool Roomur, both of Nuggur, who followed the traces of the gang, and sent us word of their position, also accompanied Captain Hebbert in the attack, and are deserving of much commendation. They were the only persons, however, that behaved with any thing like spirit on the occasion; and their conduct will be brought to the notice of His Highness the Jam.

Camp Machurda, December 30th, 1867.

From Major J. H. REYNOLDS, Commanding Detachment 17th Regt. N.I.

To the STAFF OFFICER, Rajote.

SIR,—I have the honour to inform you, that owing to the Political Agent having received information that a body of Wagheer rebels were in the vicinity of Machurda, the Troops, Cavalry, and Infantry, strength as per margin, marched from Bootawadda to this place, distance 16 miles, at about 1 p.m. yesterday. On arriving near this village, we received information that the rebels had taken up a position on the top of a conical hill named "Tobur," about 250 or 300 feet high. The Cavalry were pushed on, and surrounded it. The Infantry, after a very hurried march, arrived at the base of the hill at 5-30 p.m., when it was considered advisable to divide the Infantry into two bodies,—one to ascend the south-west side, and the other west and north-west. I took command of the former party, accompanied by Subedar Shaik Mytop; and Captain Hebbert, having volunteered his services to command the latter, was accompanied by Subedar Cristina Paloo. Both parties moved up simultaneously, in extended order. The rebels kept up a heavy fire on us from behind breast works and rocks, and our ascent was much impeded on account of the rocky and steep incline. On reaching the summit we drove the enemy from the plateau to the north-east side of the hill, where they took shelter behind some rocks, and kept up a galling fire. I deeply regret to report that Captain Hebbert, who had behaved in a most gallant manner, leading on his men, met with his death on this plateau. I personally witnessed the gallantry of this officer. Private Sahibdeen Bhyhas also here fell, shot dead, having in the most gallant way followed close behind Captain Hebbert. My men had now the advantage of being partially under cover, from which position our fire proved very destructive to the rebels. I would here mention that the enemy's fire was to a great measure drawn off by a cross fire from a party of Sebundee coming up the hill, to which I attributed the small casualties to my men. The enemy were driven from all their positions, leaving seventeen killed and two wounded, who were afterwards taken prisoners.

The reputed number of the rebels was 26. Night coming on, and owing to the misunderstanding of orders by the Sebundeas, the rest of the gang escaped. The ground in the vicinity of the hill, on the east, north, and west sides, is hilly. The hill itself is rugged, with large boulders of rock on the north, on the north-east side where, as stated above, the rebels made their final stand. The approach to the hill over which the troops marched was cultivated ground. In conclusion, I beg most favourably to represent the admirable and gallant conduct of all grades under my Command.

This was, I grieve to say, not effected without loss, I had three men killed there, and one down in the opea; altogether four men killed and one horse wounded.

I may mention here that, on the evening in question, nineteen Wagheers were killed and three wounded; and among those killed are many of their leading men, the remainder escaping in the dark.

I would bring to the notice of the Commanding Officer the gallant conduct of Native Officers and men during this affair, and especially the names of Rusuldar Mahomed Ally and Jemedar Ameenkhan.

From Major J. H. REYNOLDS, Commanding Detachment 17th Regt. N.I.

To the STAFF OFFICER, Rajcote.

SIR,—I have the honour to inform you, that owing to the Political Agent having received information that a body of Wagheer rebels were in the vicinity of Machurda, the Troops, Cavalry, and Infantry, strength as per margin, marched from Bootawadda to this place, distance 16 miles, at about 1 P.M. yesterday. On arriving near this village, we received information that the rebels had taken up a position on the top of a conical hill named "Tobur," about 250 or 300 feet high. The Cavalry were pushed on, and surrounded it. The Infantry, after a very hurried march, arrived at the base of the hill at 5-30 P.M., when it was considered advisable to divide the Infantry into two bodies,—one to ascend the south-west side, and the other west and north-west. I took command of the former party, accompanied by Subedar Shaik Mytop; and Captain Hebbert, having volunteered his services to command the latter, was accompanied by Subedar Cristina Paloo. Both parties moved up simultaneously, in extended order. The rebels kept up a heavy fire on us from behind breast works and rocks, and our ascent was much impeded on account of the rocky and steep incline. On reaching the summit we drove the enemy from the plateau to the north-east side of the hill, where they took shelter behind some rocks, and kept up a galling fire. I deeply regret to report that Captain Hebbert, who had behaved in a most gallant manner, leading on his men, met with his death on this plateau. I personally witnessed the gallantry of this officer. Private Sahibdeen Bhyhas also here fell, shot dead, having in the most gallant way followed close behind Captain Hebbert. My men had now the advantage of being partially under cover, from which position our fire proved very destructive to the rebels. I would here mention that the enemy's fire was to a great measure drawn off by a cross fire from a party of Sebundee coming up the hill, to which I attributed the small casualties to my men. The enemy were driven from all their positions, leaving seventeen killed and two wounded, who were afterwards taken prisoners.

The reputed number of the rebels was 26. Night coming on, and owing to the misunderstanding of orders by the Sebundeas, the rest of the gang escaped. The ground in the vicinity of the hill, on the east, north, and west sides, is hilly. The hill itself is rugged, with large boulders of rock on the north, on the north-east side where, as stated above, the rebels made their final stand. The approach to the hill over which the troops marched was cultivated ground. In conclusion, I beg most favourably to represent the admirable and gallant conduct of all grades under my Command.

4. When in effective employ in the Ordnance, Commissariat, or any Department where no other special departmental staff or consolidated salary is allowed, they will receive, in addition to the warrant pay and allowances, a warrant Staff pay according to grade.

5. When a Warrant Officer is out of employ owing to no fault or seeking on his part, or if he resigns his appointment with the full approval of Government, he will whilst so unemployed be entitled to his “warrant pay and allowances.”

6. When put out of employ for misconduct or incapacity, or if he resigns his appointment without, in the opinion of Government, sufficient grounds for so doing, he will only be entitled to his net “warrant pay.” In particular cases, however, he may be allowed, as a maximum, the invalid scale of pay of his rank, but only with the special sanction of Government.

7. The following are the monthly rates of pay and allowances for the several grades:—

10. Warrant Officers in receipt of the effective staff pay will when on leave be subject to reduction on the same principle as that applied to Commissioned Officers.

Furlough and Invalid Pay, Retired and Wound Pensions.

11. The annual furlough pay and retired pensions will be the same according to grades, and will be payable in British currency. The invalid pay can only be drawn in India.
