PANJA'B TENANCY BILL.

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WHEREAS it is expedient to define and amend the law relating to certain matters connected with the tenancy of land in the Panjáb; It is hereby enacted as follows:—

PART I.

PRELIMINARY.

- I. This Act may be called "The Panjab Short title. Tenancy Act."
- 2. Nothing contained in this Act shall affect the operation of any saving of agreements between landowners and tenants, and of decrees.

and a transferable interest in such land, and includes the person from whom the land may have been inherited, or otherwise legally acquired;

- "Land" means land subject to a settlement, whether regular or summary, of land-revenue;
- "Settlement Officer" means any officer employed in making or revising a regular settlement of land revenue.

RIGHTS OF OCCUPANCY.

Every tenant whose name appears in the records of a regular settle-Tenant whose name is in ment sanctioned by the settlement records, or who Local Government prior has occupied continuously for certain period. to the passing of this Act, as having a right of occupancy in land which he has continuously occupied from the date of entering his name in such settlement, or who, if no such settlement has been made, shall have occupied the land continuously for a term commencing not less than twelve years prior to the first day of April 1849, shall, unless and until the contrary be proved, be presumed to have a right of occupancy in the land so occupied.

The land-owner may rebut the said presumption by showing-

- (1.)—That the entry in the said records was made in violation of the rules laid down by the settlement officer, as set forth in the official report or the records of the settlement; or
- (2.)—That the tenant has voluntarily admitted before any settlement officer, or before any officer authorized to attest mutation of entries in the village record, that he is a tenant-at-will; or
- (3.)—That within the thirty years immediately before the institution of a suit relating to the right of occupancy, other tenants of the same class and holding under similar circumstances in the same or in adjacent villages (excepting tenants specified in section three), have ordinarily been ejected from their holdings at the will of the land-owner; or
- (4.)—That on any other grounds which may satisfy a Civil Court, the tenant is only a tenantat will.

Explanation.—If the tenant shall have voluntarily exchanged the land, or any portion of the land, formerly occupied by him, for other land belonging to the same land-owner, the land taken in exchange shall, for the purposes of this Act, be held to be subject to the same right of occupancy as the land given in exchange would have been subject to if the exchange had not taken place.

OF RENT.

1 .- Enhancement.

8. Every tenant having a right of occupancy shall be liable to have his Linbility to enhancement rent enhanced; but the rent of no such tenant shall be enhanced otherwise than in execution of a decree of Court made in accordance with the following provisions, (that is to say) :-

(1.) - In no case shall the rent payable by the tenant, be more than eighty-five per cent. of the average annual net produce which, in the opinion of the Court, the land is capable of yielding during a period of five years from the date of suit; and

(2.) — The rent payable by the tenant shall not exceed seventy-five per cent. of such net produce, if before the institution of a suit for enhancement or the regular settlement he did not pay rent at any higher rate than that of the land revenue.

Explanation .- These rates are laid down on the assumption that the land-revenue and all extra cesses, such as Road Fund, Lumberdars' fees, Patwaris' fees, School Fund, district dak cess, and the like, are payable by the land-owner. If the land-revenue or any of the said cesses is payable by the tenant, the rate to which his rent may be enhanced shall be reduced by the amount so payable.

9. After a decree shall have been passed in accordance with section Suit for re-enhancement. eight, no suit shall lie for re-enhancement of the rent until the expiration of five years from the date of such decree, unless-

(1.)-A general revision of settlement shall have taken place in the meantime; or

(2.) The quantity of land held by the tenant shall be ascertained to be greater than the quantity for which he has paid rent previously to the institut on of the suit; or

(3.)—The productive power of the land shall have been increased by improvements of the description mentioned in section thirty-three effected at the sole expense of the land-owner.

2 .- Rent payable by Tenant-at-will.

10. Every tenant-at-will shall pay such rent as may be agreed upon between him and the Rent payable by tenantbetween him and the land-owner; or, if no nt-will. such agreement has been made, such rent as was payable for the land in the last preceding year.

3 .- Abatement of Rent.

11. Every tenant having a right of occupancy Grounds of right to shall be entitled to claim abatement of the rent preabatement. viously paid by him on either of the following

grounds, and on no others:—
(1).—That the area of the land has been dimihished by diluvion or otherwise, or proved to be less than the quantity for which rent has been previously paid by him; or

(2).—That the productive powers of the land have been decreased by any cause beyond the control of the tenant.

Notwithstanding anything contained in section ten or section When Court may allow eleven, it shall be lawful remission from rent. for the Court, in making a decree for an arrear of rent, to allow such remission from the rent payable by any tenant as may appear equitable, if the area of the land in the occupation of such tenant be diminished by diluvion or otherwise, or if the produce of such land has been diminished by drought or hail, or other calamity beyond the control of the tenant, to such an extent that the full amount of rent payable by such tenant cannot, in the opinion of the Court, be equitably decreed.

5 .- Rent in Kind.

13. No commutation of rent in kind into rent in money shall take place Commutation of rent without the consent of the land-owner; and no commutation of rent in money into rent in kind shall

take place without the consont of both the land-owner and the tenant. 14. Whenever rent is taken by division of the Division and appraise-ment of produce taken for produce in kind, or by estimate or appraisement rent. of the standing crop, or other procedure of a similar nature, requiring the presence of the person entitled to the rent and of

the cultivator either personally or by their recognised agents, if either party shall neglect tobe present at the proper period, or if a dispute shall arise between the parties regarding such division, estimate or appraisement, either party may present an application to the Court requesting that a suitable person be deputed to make the division, estimate

or appraisement.

15. 1st.—The construction of wells and of works for the storage of water, for applying water for irrigation, for drainage, and for protection against floods; the reclaiming and clearing of waste lands and jungles; and other works of a like nature;

2nd.—The renewal or re-construction of any of the foregoing works, or such alterations therein or additions thereto as are not required for maintaining the same, and which increase durably their value.

PART VII.

PROCEDURE.

Revenue Courts, what.

Courts shall be the several Courts mentioned in section four of the Panjáb Courts' Act, 1865, holding sittings on the revenue side, other than Courts of Small Causes; but instead of the Chief Court of the Panjáb, the final Court of appeal shall be the Court of the Financial Commissioner of the Panjáb. The Court of the Settlement Officer shall also for the purposes of this Act be deemed to be a Revenue Court. All the provisions of the said Act and of Act No. XXVII. of 1867 (to empower Deputy Commissioners in the Central Provinces, the Panjáb, Ouch and the Jhansi Division to distribute the business in subordinate Courts) shall, so far as they are applicable, apply to the Revenue Courts.

35. Claims under sections eight, nine, thirteen, Revenue Courts to hear claims under certain sections.

twenty-eight shall, unless otherwise provided for, be leard in the Revenue Courts. The rules relating to civil procedure for the time being in force in the Panjáb shall, so far as they are applicable, apply to all suits brought before the Revenue Courts under this Act.

STATEMENT OF OBJECTS AND REASONS.

No Act at present exists to provide for the fixing or enhancing of the rent of land in the Panjab, or for dealing with the claims of tenants to rights of occupancy and with other matters relating to the tenancy of land. Acts for these purposes are in existence, which apply to Bengal and the North-Western Provinces, and a Bill on the same subject for the Province of Oudh has recently been introduced in the Council. An enactment for the regulation of these matters is no less required for the Panjáb. Whatever appeared applicable to the requirements of the Panjáb, in the North-West Provinces' Acts (Nos. X. of 1859, and XIV. of 1863) and the Oudh Bill, has been adopted in the present draft, but other provisions differing in some very material respects from the provisions made for these Provinces, have been introduced where they appear to be required by the different circumstances of the Panjab. Perhaps the most important point in which this Bill differs from Act No. X. of 1859 is that, whereas by that Act tenants who have cultivated for twelve years are deemed to have rights of occupancy in the land so cultivated, under this Bill mere length of possession confers no right of occupancy on the tenant, but only creates a rebuttable presumption of such a right, if he has been entered in the settlement record as having right of occupancy, or if he has occupied his land for a period of twelve years before the annexation of the Panjáb; and mere length of possession under other circumstances creates no presumption of a right of occupancy in favour of the tenant.

I propose that this Bill be published for six or seven weeks before I move to pass it. There are so many experienced officers in the Panjáb, able to judge of the merits of the Bill, that I trust I shall, in this interval, receive from them valuable suggestions in regard to all the points on which it may require amendment.

A Bill to amend the law relating to appeals in the Punjab and its dependencies.

WHEREAS it is expedient to amend the law relating to appeals in the Punjab and its dependen-Preamble. cies; It is hereby enacted as follows:-

> 1. This Act may be Short title. called "The Punjab Appeals' Act 1868.'

2. This Act shall extend only to the Punjab and its dependencies. Extent of Act. from the thirty-first day of March 1868, in regard to all appeals preferred after that day, and shall continue in force to the thirty-first day of March 1873.

3. The Chief Court of the Punjab may, when-Power of Chief Court and try any appeal falling to remove appeals. within the jurisdiction of any Court subject to its superintendence.

4. Sections three hundred and thirty-three to three hundred and thirty-Parts of Act No. VIII. of 1859, and of Act No. eight (both inclusive), three hundred and forty XXIII. of 1861, to take to three hundred and effect in Punjab. fifty-seven (both

Court of original jurisdiction upon any point other than a preliminary point, a second appeal shall lie to the Chief Court or the Court of the Commissioner, as the case may be.

STATEMENT OF OBJECTS AND REASONS.

The Code of Civil Procedure has, with the exception of the chapters on appeal and special appeal, already been extended to the Punjab. It s now proposed that these capters also should be extended to that Province, with some slight modifications, required by its peculiar circumstances. In order to prevent, however, this difference of procedure between the Punjab and the rest of the empire being perpetuated, if it should not be required by the future circumstances of that Province, it has been provided that this Act shall only continue in force five years. The opportunity has been taken of supplying what appears to be a slight defect in the Punjab Chief Court Act, in that the Chief Court, under that Act, has no power to withdraw appeals from subordinate Courts in order to try the appeals itself.

Bill No. 2 of 1868.

A Bill to amend Act No. III. of 1861.

WHEREAS Act No. III. of 1861 (to provide for the collection of duty of customs on pepper exported Preamble by sea from the British port of Cochin) provides that a duty of fifteen rupees per khandi shall be levied on all pepper exported by sea from the British port of Cochin; and whereas the Governments of Travancore and Cochin have recently reduced the duty on pepper exported from their ports from rupees fifteen to rupees nine per khandi; and whereas it is expedient that the duty leviable under the said Act should not exceed the said reduced duty; It is hereby enacted as follows :-

In lieu of the duty prescibed by the said Act No. III. of 1861, Duty leviable on pepper exported by sea from Coor Act No. XVII. of 1867 (to amend the Law relatchin. ing to Customs' Duties), there shall be levied a duty not exceeding nine rupees a khandi on all pepper exported by sea from the said port of Cochin, and the Governor of Fort St. George in Council may from time to time determine the exact rate of duty to be levied under this Act.

This Act shall be read with and taken as Act to be reed with Act part of the said Act No. III. of 1861.

STATEMENT OF OBJECTS AND REASONS.

Act No III. of 1861 was passed to assimilate the duty on pepper grown in the Native States of Cochin and Travancore, but exported from the British port of Cochin, to that then levied on pepper exported from the ports of those States. The duty was accordingly fixed at rupees fifteen per khandi.

The States of Cochin and Travancore have reccently reduced from rupees fifteen to rupees nine the duty on pepper exported from their own ports.

The present Pill (which has been prepared at the request of the Madras Government) accordingly proposes to effect a corresponding reduction in the case of pepper exported from the British port of Cochin. Provision has also been made for a further reduction in case the Native States referred to see fit to diminish the export duty now leviable in their ports. The duty will continue to be paid over to those States, minus the cost of collection.

STATEMENT OF OBJECTS AND REASONS.

The existing Municipal Act has by experience been found, in the North-Western Provinces, to be defective in several points.

It has been found inconvenient that the introduction of the Act into any town should be contingent on the submission of an application from the inhabitants. The necessity of improving the sanitary condition of towns, and the duty of providing for that object by the raising of sufficient funds, are as yet imperfectly recognized by the people, who are therefore sometimes slow to move for the introduction of the Act. At the same time, where Committees under the Act have been appointed much assistance has been received from the members both in carrying out improvements and in devising convenient modes of taxation. is therefore desirable to enable the Local Government to anticipate the expression of a general desire for the promotion of improvements by the introduction of the Act, and to form a Committee in any town the circumstances of which are such as to require or justify the introduction of municipal government.

It is desirable also to define more clearly the liability of Municipal Committees to provide from their funds for the maintenance of the municipal police, to enlarge the description of the objects to which, after providing for the police force, the funds of the municipality may be devoted, and thus to set at rest the doubts which have been started as to the legality of their appropriation to the support of educational, charitable, and similar institutions, which are peculiarly deserving of support from the locality immediately benefitted.

The present law does not authorize Committees to borrow money for the construction of works of permanent utility. Such works, however urgently required, cannot, therefore, in many instances, be undertaken, because the ordinary income is insufficient to meet the cost, and cannot be increased to the required amount without pressing unfairly and injuriously on the inhabitants. It is proposed to empower Committees to borrow money by debentures when the proposed works shall have received the sanction of the Local Government.

The powers of the Committees in dealing with nuisances are also susceptible of more careful definition and partial enlargement.

To accomplish these objects, and otherwise to enable the Local Government to supervise and improve municipal administration, the present Bill, which has in a great measure been framed on the model of Act No. XV. of 1867, lately passed for the Punjáb, is now brought forward.
