FINANCIAL.

INDIA OFFICE, London, the 16th December 1867.

To His Excellency the Right Honourable the Governor General of India in Council.

SIR,—I have considered in Council your Financial Letter of the 1st October last, No. 217, recommending that, in lieu of gratuities at present allowed, moderate compassionate allowances, not exceeding Rs. 4 per mensem, should be conferred upon all servants of Government in the inferior and ineligible grades, who may be thrown out of employment on reductions of Establishment after completing thirty years' service.

2. I concur with your Government that servants discharged from no fault of their own, after completing so long a period of service as thirty years, have a claim to liberal treatment, and I therefore sanction the grant to them of compassionate allowances as proposed by you.

## JUDICIAL DEPARTMENT.

The following Rules for carrying out the objects of Act XXV. of 1867 (*An Act for the Regulation of Printing Presses and Newspapers, for the preservation of copies of Books printed in British India, and for the registration of such books*) have been made by the Right Honourable the Governor in Council, under Section 20 of the said Act, and are published for general information:—

- I. The three copies of the books referred to in Section 9 will, in the Mofussil, be delivered by the Printer at the Collector's Head Quarters Station, to the Collector of the District in which the Press issuing the work is situated. Copies of books issued from a Press situated in Bombay will be delivered to the Collector of Bombay, at his office. When delivering books under this Rule, the Printer will present a bill of the cost, and fill up a Form containing the particulars specified in Section 18.
- II. The Collector will, with reference to Section 11, send two copies of each book received to the Secretary to Government, Judicial Department, who will transmit one copy to the Secretary of State for India, and dispose of the other copy as directed by the Governor General in Council. The Collector will send the third copy to the Director of Public Instruction, who, after registration, will forward it to the Registrar of the Bombay University.
- III. Any fines recovered under this Act will be remitted, in the Mofussil, to the Collector of the District, and in Bombay to the Collector of Bombay. Each of these Officers will keep an account of receipts and disbursements under this Act, and these accounts will annually be embodied in the Accountant General's Office, the financial result being reported to Government.
- IV. The Director of Public Instruction is appointed, under Section 18, to keep the "Catalogue of Books printed in British India" for the Bombay Presidency. He will make the quarterly publication in the *Government Gazette* required by Section 19, and send four copies of the memoranda so published to the Secretary to Government, Judicial Department. Of these copies two will be transmitted to the Secretary of State for India, and one to the Secretary to the Government of India, Home Department.
