In moving the above proposition, Dr. Birdwood addressed the Senate as follows :-

Mr. Vice Chancellor and Gentlemen of the Senate,-I crave your indulgence in venturing on the few remarks I have to make in introducing the resolution I propose to move on the General Order of the Government of India, No. 370, of April 4th 1867, referred to in the Bombay Government Gazette of July 4th last. It involves a question in which I have been led to take the greatest interest, and which I believe to be of the greatest importance.

The Indian Medical Colleges were founded some fourteen years ago with the beneficent view of introducing scientific medicine into India, and yet for several years past, in Bombay at least, the Principals of these Colleges and the Government have had yearly to deplore the falling off in the number of students seeking admission into them. There has been a tendency perhaps to exaggerate this decline in the popularity of these Colleges; but it is still undeniable that they have comparatively failed, when they might have proved brilliantly successful. And this comparative failure has been laid to every cause but the right one. The Principals of Grant Medical College have always said that it is owing to the insufficiency of the encouragement offered by Government to the graduates of the College. Yet to set them up in life, and for no other reason, Government created the artificial class of "Sub-Assistant Surgeons," and at the cost of the Army Apotheca: ics, who are the most useful, hardestworked, and worst-paid subordinates in the service of the Indian Government ; for to provide for the new class of Sub-Assistant Surgeons Government made over to them all the independent little "Civil charges" of Rs. 200 a month, which were before the prizes to which the apothecaries might look forward at the close of a long and honourable career of active service ; and now under the explanations of successive Principals of the falling off of students from Grant Medical College, and with the view of increasing its attractions, the pay of this abnormal and superfluous class of public servants, or rather state protégés has been doubled. It can no longer be said, therefore, that the encouragement offered by Government to graduates of the College at its first opening fourteen years ago has fallen in value from the rise in the cost of living in Bombay since then, as the increase

of cent. per cent. made in the pay of the Sub-Assistant Surgeons is at least equal to the increased prosperity of the country in the period. Sometimes the failure has been said to be partly due to the establishment of the Universities, which have ruled that students must matriculate before admission into the Medical Colleges: ruled, that is, that they should give some proof of general knowledge and culture before entering on entirely professional studies. But no one who understands the value of general education to professional men could attribute it in any degree to this cause. Neither is it owing to any disability in the Natives of India for the Medical profession, nor to any defeed in the teaching of the Indian Medical Colleges. The Hindu is a born physician, and makes a most apt and excellent college student; by no people is a medical man more honoured and trusted than by the Natives of India; and in no other country does the profession open more encouraging prospects of wealth, distinction, and usefulness; while more efficient institutions for teaching medicine than the Indian Medical Colleges do not, I believe, exist. At least I know that the teaching of Grant Medical College have always been successful when they have presented themselves as candidates for degrees, or the Indian Medical Services in England, and just before leaving England I heard of two of them gaining their diplomas in London, who were plucked after every consideration for them, as I can personally testify, at last year's Examinations in Bombay. Two students of Grant Medical College are plucked by the examining Board of their own Professors, and they at once take their passage to London, and win their diplomas ! No other proof is needed of the thorough efficiency and integrity of the teachers of the College, nor indeed of the natural excellence and aptitude of Indian students. All things in fact have worked together for the good of the Indian Medical Colleges. There was indeed a pre-judice at first against dissecting, but it at once pass

jealousy against the graduates and Sub-Assistant Surgeons which the aristocratic classes feel towards Natives of the commercial and service castes who win their way into the Civil Service ; and they have been always treated as equals by officers of the Covenanted Medical Services of India, the bond of a true brotherly feeling being perhaps stronger amongst medical men than in any other profession. And yet notwithstanding the good intention of the Government, and the entire sympathy of the people of India, the aptitude of native students and the excellence of their teachers all tending to make the Indian Medical Colleges a brilliant success, they have hitherto failed. They have not succeeded in naturalizing scientific medicine in India, and have only, speaking generally, provided the State with a set of dwarfed and fatted protégés.

The true cause of the comparative failure of these Colleges, in short, has always seemed to me to lie in the organic defect in their constitution, that they are military rather than academical institutions. Referring only to Bombay, at the time of the establishment of Grant Medical College, its Principal sud Professors were taken exclusively from the medical service of the Presidency; and as a matter of course its organization was military rather than academical. Certain medical officers were not indeed, in virtue of their milyry appointments, appointed also ear-officie Principals and Professors of the College,—nothing so abard as thought of. But they were nevertheless all military men, and appointed to the College in virtue of belonging to the medical service of the Presidency, and in practice at least the Principal of the College must be the Surgeon to the Jamsetjee Jejeebhoy Hospital, a rule which excludes any medical man out of the Covenanted Medical Services ever being Principal of Grant Medical College. Hence the exclusive and therefore enervating dependence alike of the College and its students on Government. They saw only the Government, and not the people numbering "two hundred millions," as the phrase goes, in India ; and the ervice of Government, and not the people numbering "two hundred millions, students having been admitted into the College before the incorporation of the University, not by the Academical test of Matriculation so much as by the military test of being looked at, to see if they were clean cut, intelligent, and wholesome looking, springy fellows, just as recruits are passed for the army. These being the ultimate causes, the proximate causes of the passing depression of Grant Medical College have been the very artificial encouragement—which I have already animadverted on—given to it by Government—for men cannot learn to swim whilst they trust to swimming bladders—and the neglect up to the establishment of the University of all proper tests of general education, without which an indepe

In fact the few graduates who have set up in private practice in Bombay, or who have become physicians to native Princes and Chiefs, have never dreamt that it was due to their self respect to fix a remunerative scale of professional fees, and are content to accept what is given them. They have never formed a medical association for the projection of their interests and honour, as the lawyers have, and simply because, as a body, they have hitherto been without culture. I believe it is the fact that the Graduates' "nominal fee" is Rs. 1 a visit, and that even so low as annas 4, the native barber's fee, are taken. 'The average annual charge is, I have been told, Rs. 50, or Rs. 4 a month. They have, some of them, also taken to retailing medicines and simples, as Epsom Salts, Quinine, Castor Oil, and the indigenous "Chreat," at the rates of profit of the old "grocer apoticearies;" and all this degredation, for from a professional point of view it must be so called, is distinctly due

proximately to the well meant patronage of Government, and neglect of academical tests, and ultimately to the military organization, or rather military leaven in the organization of the College. Up to the time of the University insisting on matriculation, the College was producing no worthy successors to its first distinguished graduates, and all the Government plans for forcing them simply involved the alternative of still more Sub-Assistant Surgeons, or "barber Surgeons," and "grocer Apothecaries." Thus the College, with the best intentions on the part of its patrons, instead of developing, has positively arrested the development of an independent native profession of medical practitioners; and instead of having brilliantly succeeded as it would have if left to itself, has comparatively failed in introducing scientific medicine into India, as was the beneficent hope, aim, and inspiration of its founders.

But at last the University had been incorporated, and it was only further required to fulfil the views of the founders of the College to place it under the Director of Public Instruction, or the University, to abolish the parasitical growth of Sub-Assistant Surgeons, especially as the graduates of the College are now permitted to compete for the Covenanted Medical Service—which also they would easily fill were enough candidates always ready—and to turn over the salaries hitherto paid them to the College and University for medical scholarships, and travelling medical fellowships.

But what has been done? By G. O. G. I. No. 370, of April 4th, all the Professors of Grant Medical College will henceforward, or until further orders, be appointed to their various chairs ex-officio—that is, the Medical officers required at the Presidency for military purposes, will, in virtue of their several military offices, be Professors also in Grant Medical College. For example, not necessarily the man best fitted for the chair, but the medical storekceper at the Presidency ex-officio, will always, under this order, be Professor of Materia Medica. There is a chair of Materia Medica, and Government appoints to it not necessarily a man who knows the subject, and can teach it, or who even has the gift of articulate utterance, but the medical store-keeper at the Presidency. I believe that no extra salary is to be given to the Professors for teaching. Government wished to increase the pay of certain military appointments belonging to the Medical Services of India, and at the same time to increase the pay of certain military appointents, the holders of which are, as a make shift, to be for the future ex-officio Professors als of these Colleges. This is what the order means on the face of it, but it amounts to thue more than its framers, I feel certain, ever meant. The application of the order has rather been to force the Professors into the military offices to which their chairs are tached than the holders of these college. But for the future on their strature, or any other legitimate chairs, and enters in the order has rather been to force the Professors on the lege event of the order. The military appointments at the Presidency cannot be which their chairs are tached than the holders of these military offices in the Kelles from the medical Storekeepers at the presidency and uprofitable manner. Government, for instance, could not be greater number of instances to be left altogether out of consideration, and gradually the College will be filled with everlits in the most perfunctory and uprofitable manner.

Under this Order, as has happened before, when *ex-officio* Professors have been tried, a Professor may happen to be the military superior of the Principal. Under this Order I fancy the majority of the Professors indeed will be the military seniors of the Principal. Such men seldom make good Professors, and I believe generally make very bad ones. They come to lecture late and go early, and read their lectures. For examinations they read up pretty thoroughly a hundred pages of some class book, and ask the most cruel questions out of them, and incapable of searching a candidate over a wider field, invariably press hard for a pluck if he expected of men suddenly made Professors *ex-officio*. Can Principals rule, can the Directors of Public Instruction be held responsible for, or can any University recognise Colleges so organized?

The Order will, moreover, operate all the worse now that the Indian Medical Services are open to competition. Competition is, or rather was, the best system for supplying the Indian Civil Services. Its prizes were, until the remarkable rise in the prosperity of India which followed on the mutiny, sufficient to attract a very high class of men to it, and competition made no difference in its personnel; whilst it is, on the whole, a fairer system for supplying the service than patronage. If two boys want one cake, it is fairer, all else being equal, that they should compete for it, than that it should be given to either of them. But since the days of its Roxburghs, Wallichs, Royles, Thompsons, and Wights, the Indian Medical Services have not been worth competing for ; and opening them to competition has merely proved the sacrifice of the only check to their becoming the prey of needy, incompetent, and worthless men. The gift of an appointment in the Indian Medical Services was always worth accepting, and the Company, in its own interest, for the health of its soldiers and sailors, and the social peace of the services, always gave these appointments to men rigorously—by a triple examination—qualified for them, and of the same social standing as its other Covenanted Servants. They specially patronised young medical men devoted to any branch of physical science or natural history, and indeed the Indian Medical Services were perhaps the chief glory of their Japanese system. Like all other consumers they made the best bargain they could for themselves, and pressed hard as regards pay and pension on the humanity a medical education calls out in men ; bot they bought only gentlemen and bought them young. This was the very system for keeping up the efficiency and high tone of an ill-paid scientific service ; whilst competition,—" first come first have" here—applied to such a service, cannot but affect it most disastrously.

Two newly created Professorships in Grant Medical College are indeed thrown absolutely open under this Order, viz. Botany and Hygiene. If it is because they were considered special subjects, I would reply that still pore special are such subjects as Medicine, Surgery, and Materia Medica, as regards the requisite qualifications for teaching men properly. But I fear that it simply is that the salaries of these new Professorships are not worth attaching.

I may very much misapprehend this Philistine Order, or my fears of it may be vain, but I look on it as a calamity to medical science in India, and this will excuse me, I would trust, for addressing you at such length on it. It raises a question, as it seems to me, of the greatest possible importance, and yet which might very naturally be overlooked, except by one who has, with however little intelligence, made something like a special study of it, and this is why I have ventured on raising a discussion on it here.

I have used the fact that the Indian Medical Services are open to natives of India as an argument against the perpetuation of Sub-Assistant Surgeons, and I feel that I ought, in conclusion, to state my views--as given in a letter I wrote just before leaving England, and in which I almost literally followed a letter once written to myself by a distinguished graduate of this University—on the question, by some thought so momentous, "What are we to do with the educated natives of India?" The question is already almost obsolete. Government is fully committed to provide for them. It is trowing its Services one by one open to them, and, as they fit themselves for the trust, must do so more and more freely. But none more fully, frankly, and sincerely than the educated natives of India, or at least of Western India will acknowledge, and indeed insist that the responsibilities of conquest, which are as unavoidable as its rights are incontestable, oblige us, not less in the interest of the natives than of the Empire, whilst providing justly and liberally for them, to fix explicit rules limiting the proportion of educated natives in the public services, so that whilst securing to them the weight and influence of a national representation we may maintain our own superiority unimpaired. The majority of the officers of the Army and Civil Service must always be Englishmen, and the chief executive power must always be kept in English hands, until India, fit at last, as a few believe it may be some day, to administer and protect itself. Even this compromise, as generous as it is just, may offend, all will not be endured by the conscience of England. No enfranchisement for which the educated natives of India are prepared (and I would under wise restrictions ad nit them into the Afmy as well as the Civil and Medical Services) will ever, I believe, either lead to an embittered competition between them and ourselves, or to our having once again to reconquer the country. Educated natives resent being shut out from the Government Services, but they do not really greatly covet them. The native of India is intensely bureaucratic by habit, and the first generation of educated natives has still be characterised by a morbid dependence on Government employ. But it is quite otherwise with the best of the University trained men; men who have received something of culture. These feel that the most sacred service they can render to their country is to develop independent professions, and raise in every way in their power the standard of professional requirements. And the times work with themfor the independent professions are year by year opening up greater prospects in India, whilst a blight has fallen on all the Government Services. The educated native is also the loyalest of the subjects of England in India. His loyalty is not merely that passive indifference of the Indian ryot which is the result of the Indian village system, but a loyalty that is always active, keen, and agressive on our behalf. It is quite true that in newspaper controversy the Native press has hitherto almost invariably sided with the Native Princes and Chiefs, against the British Government on any question of interference or annexation by the paramount power. But where they were wrong they erred ignorantly, and at least never intended more than to advocate what they believed to be Native rights. But the new generation of educated natives, the new University men, see the relations of England to India in their true light, and are not unlikely to become the most eager advocates of annexation. The universal approval which followed the absorption by Piedmont of all the petty tyrannies of Italy in 1859, and of Hanover and other German States by Prussia last year, has been fully appreciated by the Native press in India. The small body of educated natives of India are, I believe, loyal to us with all the strength and fervour of their quickened souls, while of nothing have we greater cause to be prouder, with all its defects, than of the Native press. This is the great monument that we have raised in that country. It is often unjust and bitter, but what is unjust and untrue can do no permanent mischief, and must perish before the rising light, as the mist press. which it draws from out their dark places of the earth disappear before the dayspring."

F. S. Stedman, Esq., seconded the motion, but after some conversation the following amendment was agreed to oy the mover and seconder of the original proposition, and carried—" That the Syndicate be recommended to take into consideration the General Order of Government of India, No. 370, of 4th April 1867, as it affects the progress of University studies."
