PART VI.

BILLS OF THE GOVERNMENT OF INDIA.

HOME DEPARTMENT (Legislative).

The following Bill was introduced into the Council of the Governor General of India for the purpose of making Laws and Regulations, on the 24th January 1868, and was referred to a Select Committee, with instructions to make their report thereon in a fortnight:—

Bill No. 5 of 1868.

A Bill to authorize the Local Government of the Punjab to invest any person with the powers of an Assistant Commissioner, and for other purposes.

1. The Local Government of the Panjab may,

Local Government may invest persons with certain powers. by notification in the local official Gazette, invest any person with the powers of an Assistant Com-

missioner with full powers, or of an Assistant Commissioner with special powers, or of an Assistant Commissioner with ordinary powers, or of a Tahsildár, as described in Act No. XIX. of 1865, within such local limits as it may think proper, and may from time to time withdraw any of such powers.

The Local Government may also, by such notification as aforesaid, direct that all or any of the powers conferred under this Act shall be exercised only with reference to such class of suits as may be specified in the notification; and such powers shall thereupon be exercised accordingly.

2. The Local Government may also direct in manner aforesaid that

Local Government may direct such powers to be exercised by three or more persons sitting together. in manner aforesaid that all or any of the powers conferred under this Act shall be exercised by three or more persons sitting together as a Court.

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The decision of the majority of the persons so sitting together shall be deemen to be the decision of the Court.

All decrees heretofore passed by any person invested with any of the powers of an Assistant Commissioner or Tahsildar by the Local Government shall be deemed to be as valid as if this Act had then been passed.

STATEMENT OF OBJECTS AND REASONS.

Several Chiefs in the Panjáb were invested by the Local Government a few years ago with powers to try civil suits within the limits of their own estates, and have since continued to exercise those powers. Also certain tribunals were established in the Kangra district of the Panjáb for the decision of a particular class of suits, namely, suits relating to marriages and betrothals. In consequence, however, of no mention having been made of these tribunals, or of the Courts of the Chiefs, in the Panjáb Courts' Act (No. XIX. of 1866), doubts have been entertained of their legality. This Bill is brought forward, therefore, with the object of removing these doubts, and of enabling the Local Government to invest any person with powers to try civil suits, in the same way as it can by the Criminal Procedure Code invest any person with the powers of a Magistrate.

meet the circumstances of the Central Provinces and Berar.

4. We have provided for the appointment of Sub-Inspectors.

5. We have limited the fees to a maximum of four annas per bale.

6. Finding that it would be difficult to regulate the apportionment of the fees collected at Bombay, if some were collected under Bombay Act No. IX of 1863, and some under this Bill, we recommend that the Bombay Act be repealed from the first April next, and that this Act should take its place. We have provided that any surplus funds which GOVT. OF INDIA BILLS-79f

may then be at the disposal of the Government of Bombay for the purposes of Act No. IX. of 1863. should be treated under the provisions of this Bill.

7. We have provided that the duties of Cotton Inspectors may be entrusted by the Local Govern-

ments to any other officers.

We recommend the omission of the last sentence of section 32 of the Bill, which provides that every person shall be legally bound to furnish information to any officer when required. We consider that the Inspectors are armed with ample powers for searching and examining all cotton, and that it is undesirable to empower them to exact information at their pleasure. This provision does not occur in the Bombay Act on which this Bill is founded.

9. We have provided for the publication of annual accounts of the fund.

10. We have modified the title and preamble of the Bill.

11. We recommend that the Bill, thus altered, be passed.

AMENDED BILL.

A Bill for the Improvement of Cotton.

WHEREAS it is expedient to provide for the improvement of Cotton Preamble. produced in British India; It is hereby enacted as follows :-

I .- PRELIMINARY.

1. This Act may be called "The Cotton Act, Short title. 1868."

2. The Act shall come into force in the presidency of Bombay and Commencement of Act. in the Central Provinces on the first day of April 1868, and thereupon Act No. 1X. of 1863 of the Governor of Bombay in Council (for the prevention of adulteration of Cotton, and the better suppression of Frauds in the Cotton trade in the Repeal of Bombay Act No. IX. of 1863. Presidency of Bombay) shall be repealed. All things duly done under the said Act shall be

deemed to have been done under this Act. 3. The Governor General of India in Council Power to extend Act. may, at the request of any Local Government, extend this Act to the whole or such part of the territories, other than the Presidency of Bombay and the Central Provinces, under such Local Government as shall be specified in that behalf by notification in the Gazette of India.

4. In this Act—unless there be something repugnant in the subject Interpretation clause. or context-

"Bale" means any package of cotton;

"Gin means any machine used for the purpose " Gin." of cleaning cotton;

"Bale."

"Press" means any machine used for the purpose "Press." of compressing cotton; "Foreign export" means export out of British " Foreign export." India.

II .- LICENSES FOR COTTON PRESSES.

5. From the day on which this Act shall come into operation in any pre-No cotton-press to be sidency, territory, or disworked without license. used therein for the purpose of compressing cotton, without a license obtained in the manner and subject to the conditions hereinafter mentioned.

Licenses for the working of cotton-presses may be granted by the Grant of license. Collector of the district within which such presses are to be worked, to any persons who the Collector may be satisfied are in possession of the presses in respect of which they apply.

Every such license shall expire and shall be renewable upon the first Expiration and renewal day of January in the of licenses. year next ensuing year in which it was granted or last renewed.

The Collector may, for reasons which he shall state in writing under his Refusal of licenses. signature to the person applying for any such license or renewal, refuse to grant or to renew the license of any press.

7. Every license issued under this Act shall specify the number of presses for which the same Contents of license. is granted, the place in which they are situate, and the power employed for working them, according to a written statement which shall accompany the application for such license; and for every press so licensed, or the license of which shall be so renewed, a fee shall be License fee.

Upon the removal to another place of a press comprised in any license, New license on removal or upon change of the or alteration of press. power employed for working such press, it shall be necessary for the licensee to obtain a new license in respect of the press, subject to the conditions aforesaid.

8. Every applicant for a license under this Act shall lodge with the Col-Press-mark to be lodged lector, a cloth, parchment, with Collector. or paper, impressed or marked either with some distinctive mark not less than one foot square, or with his name, or that of his firm or company, in letters not less than one inch and a half long, and the name or mark shall be called a press-mark.

Upon the grant of such license the licensee shall mark with the press-mark Licensee of cotton-press every bale compressed by to use press-mark. any press in his posses-sion or comprised in the license, and the press-mark shall be affixed to the wrapper or cloth

under-lying the fastenings or bands of the bale.

III .- INSPECTORS OF COTTON.

9. The Local Government may appoint such and so many officers to be styled Inspectors of Cotton, as shall appear Appointment of Inspectors of Cotton. expedient.

It shall be the duty of such officers to suppress the use of unlicensed presses, Their duties. and to examine cotton brought for compression, or to a Railway station for transport, or kept or offered for sale. In the execution of this duty, the Inspectors shall at all times have access to every

To have access to stores, building or enclosure withpresses, and gins. in which any cotton is stored, or any gin or press at work, or prepared for work, is situate; and if the licensee of any press, or his servant or agent, shall be convicted of having

offered any obstruction to Obstructing Inspectors. such Inspector in the execution of his duty, his license may be adjudged by a Magistrate to be suspended for such fixed time as the Magistrate shall think fit, or to have become void.

The Inspectors may seize and detain all 10. cotton with respect to Inspectors may seize which any offence under adulterated cotton and give this Act shall appear to it into custody. have been committed, and may give such cotton into the custody of any

Police officer.

Every Police officer shall be bound, at the request of any Inspector, Policeto assist Inspectors. to assist him in seizing and detaining such cotton, and in bringing the offender to justice.

11. Any Magistrate may grant a warrant authorizing an Inspector to Opening bales. open any bale finally passed for foreign export, and thereupon the Inspector may open the same accordingly; but no Inspector shall, without such warrant, open a bale so pressed as last aforesaid.

The Inspectors shall, in their official capacities, be subject, in any seaport to which this Act Control of Inspectors. may apply, to the orders of such officer as the Local Government shall from time to time appoint, and, in all other places to which this Act shall apply, to the orders of the Collector of the district in which they hold their appointments, or in which they are for the time being employed.

The Local Government may suspend or dismiss any Inspector for neglect Their suspension and or misconduct in the disdismissal. charge of his duty.

13. The Local Government may appoint any number of Sub-Inspectors, Appointment of Suband confer and impose up-Inspectors. on them such of the powers and duties of Inspectors as it may from time to time think fit; and the provisions as to Inspectors contained in the latter part of section ten and in sections eleven and twelve shall, mutatis mutandis, apply to Sub-Inspectors so appointed.

IV .- FEES.

14. Upon every bale of cotton exported from any presidency, territory, or Levy of fees. district in which this Act shall be in force, there shall be levied such fee not exceeding four annas per bale as the Governor General of India in Council shall from time to time notify in the Gazette of India.

Such fees may be levied at such place or places within British India (whether or not situated within the presidency, territory, or district from which the cotton is exported) as the Governor General of India in Council shall from time to time notify as aforesaid.

15. Whenever any such fee shall be levied at a

Local Government from whose territories the cotton was originally exported, the former shall transmit to the latter Government the whole or such proportion of the fee as the Governor General of India in Council shall from time to time notify as aforesaid.

All such fees levied by the Local Government from whose territo-Application of fees. ries the cotton shall have been originally exported, and (in case they are levied by another Local Government under the directions of the Governor General of India in Council as aforesaid) all or such portion of the fees as aforesaid, shall be paid to the credit of a fund to be termed "The Cotton Improvement Fund," which shall be established by each Local Government to whose territories this Act shall have been extended, and shall be devoted solely to carrying out the objects of this Act. .

After providing for the salaries of the officers appointed under this Act and the expenses of their establishments and the cost of collecting the fees leviable under this Act, the surplus (if any) may at the discretion of the Local Government be expended in the purchase, importation, and intro-duction of superior cotton-seed, and of improved machinery for cultivating, cleaning, and compressing cotton.

Power of Governor of Bombay to transfer to other Local Governments part of surplus of Cotton Fund.

17.

The Governor of Bombay in Council may, if he shall think fit, transfer to any other Local Government such portion of the unexpended surplus of the Bombay Cotton Improvement Fund as may,

in his opinion, be due to such Local Government on account of the fees collected in Bombay, before the first day of April 1868, in respect of cotton exported from the territories subordinate to such Local Government.

V .- PENALTIES.

18. Whoever adulterates or deteriorates cotton

PANJA'B TENANCY BILL.

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- Tenant who has lost proprietary rights otherwise than by forfeiture to Government.

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A Bill to define and amend the law relating to the tenancy of land in the Panjab.

WHEREAS it is expedient to define and amend the law relating to certain Preamble. matters connected with the tenancy of land in the Panjáb; It is hereby enacted as follows :-

PART I.

PRELIMINARY.

- be called "The Panjab This Act may Tenancy Act." Short title.
- Nothing contained in this Act shall affect

the operation of any agreement entered into Saving of agreements between landowners and beween a land-owner and tenants, and of decrees. a tenant or of any decree of court under which a tenant holds.

- 3. In this Act, unless there be something repugnant in the subject Interpretation clause. or context-
- "Land-owners" means any person entitled to receive rent, but does not "Land-owner." include the Government,

in cases where the Government is entitled only to the land-revnue, nor any mere assignee of landrevenue;

"Tenant" means any occupant of land liable to pay rent therefor, who " Tenant." does not, at the date of

the passing of this Act, possess both a heritable

and a transferable interest in such land, and includes the person from whom the land may have been inherited, or otherwise legally acquired;

"Rent" means whatever is payable on account of the use or occupation of land;

"Land" meons land subject to a settlement, whether regular or summary, of land-revenue;

"Settlement Officer" means any officer employed in making or revising a regular settlement of land revenue.

PART II.

RIGHTS OF OCCUPANCY.

Tenant who has lost proprietary rights otherwise than by forfeiture to Government, shall be deemed to have a right of occupancy in such land.

Tenant whose name is in settlement records, or who has occupied continuously for certain period.

as having a right of occupancy in land which he has continuously occupied from the date of entering his name in such settlement, or who, if no such settlement has been made, shall have occupied the land continuously for a term commencing not less than twelve years prior to the first day of April 1849, shall, unless and until the contrary be proved, be presumed to have a right of occupancy in the land so occupied.

The land-owner may rebut the said presumption by showing-

(1.)—That the entry in the said records was made in violation of the rules laid down by the settlement officer, as set forth in the official report or the records of the settlement; or

(2.)—That the tenant has voluntarily admitted before any settlement officer, or before any officer authorized to attest mutation of entries in the village record, that he is a tenant-at-will; or

(3.)—That within the thirty years immediately before the institution of a suit relating to the right of occupancy, other tenants of the same class and holding under similar circumstances in the same or in adjacent villages (excepting tenants specified in section three), have ordinarily been ejected from their holdings at the will of the land-owner; or

(4.)—That on any other grounds which may satisfy a Civil Court, the tenant is only a tenantat will.

Explanation.—If the tenant shall have voluntarily exchanged the land, or any portion of the land, formerly occupied by him, for other land belonging to the same land-owner, the laud taken mexchange shall, for the purposes of this Act, be held to be subject to the same right of occupancy as the land given in exchange would have been subject to if the exchange had not taken place.

7. No tenant-at-will shall be deemed to acquire a right of occupancy by mere lapse of time.

PART III.

1.- Enhancement.

8. Every tenant having a right of occupancy shall be liable to have his rent enhanced; but the rent of no such tenant shall be enhanced otherwise than in execution of a decree of Court made in accordance with the

a decree of Court made in accordance with the following provisions, (that is to say):—

(1.)—In no case shall the rent payable by the tenant, be more than eighty-five per cent. of the average annual net produce which, in the opinion of the Court, the land is capable of yielding during a period of five years from the date of suit; and

(2.)—The rent payable by the tenant shall not exceed seventy-five per cent. of such net produce, if before the institution of a suit for enhancement or the regular settlement he did not pay rent at any higher rate than that of the land revenue.

Explanation.—These rates are laid down on the assumption that the land-revenue and all extra cesses, such as Road Fund, Lumberdars' fees, Patwaris' fees, School Fund, district dâk cess, and the like, are payable by the land-owner. If the land-revenue or any of the said cesses is payable by the tenant, the rate to which his rent may be enhanced shall be reduced by the amount so payable.

9. After a decree shall have been passed in accordance with section eight, no suit shall lie for re-enhancement of the rent until the expiration of five years from the date of such decree, unless—

(1.)—A general revision of settlement shall have taken place in the meantime; or

(2.)—The quantity of land held by the tenant shall be ascertained to be greater than the quantity for which he has paid rent previously to the institution of the suit; or

(3.)—The productive power of the land shall have been increased by improvements of the description mentioned in section thirty-three effected at the sole expense of the land-owner.

2 .- Rent payable by Tenant-at-will.

Rent payable by tenantat-will. as may be agreed upon between him and the land-owner; or, if no such agreement has been made, such rent as was payable for the land in the last preceding year.

3 .- Abatement of Rent.

Every tenant having a right of occupancy Grounds of right to shall be entitled to claim abatement. abatement of the rent previously paid by him on either of the following

grounds, and on no others:—
(1).—That the area of the land, has been diminished by diluvion or otherwise, or proved to be less than the quantity for which rent has been previously paid by him; or

(2).—That the productive powers of the land have been decreased by any cause beyond the control of the tenant.

4.—Remission of Rent.

Notwithstanding anything contained in section ten or section When Court may allow eleven, it shall be lawful remission from rent. for the Court, in making a decree for an arrear of rent, to allow such remission from the rent payable by any tenant as may appear equitable, if the area of the land in the occupation of such tenant be diminished by diluvion or otherwise, or if the produce of such land has been diminished by drought or hail, or other calamity beyond the control of the tenant, to such an extent that the full amount of rent payable by such tenant cannot, in the opinion of the Court, be equitably decreed.

5 .- Rent in Kind.

13. No commutation of rent in kind into rent in money shall take place Commutation of rent without the consent of the in kind. land-owner; and no commutation of rent in money into rent in kind shall take place without the consent of both the landowner and the tenant.

Whenever rent is taken by division of the produce in kind, or by Division and appraise-ment of produce taken for estimate or appraisement rent. of the standing crop, or other procedure of a similar nature, requiring the presence of the person entitled to the rent and of the cultivator either personally or by their recognised agents, if either party shall neglect tobe present at the proper period, or if a dispute shall arise between the parties regarding such division, estimate or appraisement, either party may present an application to the Court requesting that a suitable person be deputed to make the division, estimate or appraisement.

15. On receiving such application the Court Procedure in case of shall issue a written notice to the other party requiring him to attend on the date and at the place specified in the notice, and shall depute a suitable person before whom the division, estimate or appraisement shall be made. The award of such person in respect of the division, estimate or appraisement shall be final, unless within three months from the date thereof either party shall institute a suit in the Civil Courts to set it aside.

PART IV.

OF EJECTMENT, ABANDONMENT, RELINQUISHMENT, SUB-LEASES.

Ejectment.

16. Subject to the provisions contained in sections sixteen, seventeen, Ejectment of tenants-atand eighteen, every notwill and tenants having right of occupancy. ant-at-will shall be liable to be ejected from the land in his occupancy, and every tenant having a right of occupancy, from whom an arrear of rent is due, shall be liable to be ejected from the land in respect of which the arrear is due.

17. No tenant-at-will from whom no arrear of rent is due shall be ejected Tenant-at-will not liable without ejectment from the land in his ocnotice. cupancy, unless he shall have received notice of the land-owner's intention to eject him, and such notice shall have been recorded by the Patwari, or a written notice put up in some conspicuous place in the village in which the land is situate, at the time fixed in the village administration paper for such notices to be given, if or no such time be so fixed, on or before the first day of May in any year after the passing of this Act.

18. No tenant having a right of occupancy shall be ejected otherwise Ejectment of tenant havthan in execution of a ing a right of occupancy. decree for ejectment, and such decree shall not be made unless at the date of the decree, a decree against such tenant for an arrear of rent in respect of the land from which the land-owner desires to eject him shall have remained unsatisfied for fifteen days or upwards.

19. Not tenant shall, whether in execution of a decree or otherwise be ejected from the land Time of ejectment. occupied by him except at such time as may have been fixed in that behalf in the village administration paper; or, if no such time has been fixed, except between the first day of May and the fif-teenth day of June in any year after the passing of this Act: Provided that , while his rent is in arrear, he has failed to cultivate the land for which the arrear is due, in accordance with the terms on which he holds it, he may be ejected therefrom at any time.

Any tenant ejected in accordance with the provisions of this Act. Compensation to ejected shall be entitled to receive tenant for growing crops. from the land-owner the value of any growing crops or other ungathered products of the earth belonging to such tenant and being on the land at the time of such ejectment.

21. If a tenant having a right of occupancy be ejected in accordance Loss of right of occuwith the provisions of pancy on ejectment. section seventeen from the land in which he possesses such right, he shall lose his right of occupancy in such land.

22. If a tenant having a right of occupancy abandon the land in his Loss of right of occuoccupancy, he shall lose pancy on abandonment. his right of occupancy in such land.

Omission both to cultivate and to pay rent or to make provision for both Abandonment, what. cultivation on payment of rent for twelve months, shall be held to be abandonment within the meaning of this section.

Relinquishment.

23. Every tenant shall continue liable for the rent of the land occupied Relinquishment of land by him, unless at the time by tenant. fixed in that behalf in the

village administration paper, or, if no such time be fixed, on or before the fifteenth day of May in any year after the passing of this Act, he shall give notice to the land-owner of his intention to relinquish such land, or unless such land shall have been let to any other person by the land-

Sub-leases.

24. Any tenant having a right of occupancy may sub-let, or otherwise Right to sub-let. temporarily provide for the cultivation of his land, whenever for any sufficient reason he is unable to cultivate it himself.

Loss of right of occupancy by non-receipt of pro-

Provided that the tenant shall lose his right of occupancy, if it appear that, for a period of more than three years, neither the tenant nor his

heir has received any portion of the produce of the land.

PART. V.

OF CERTAIN DISABILITIES WHICH MAY BE REMOVED BY PAYMENT OF COMPENSATION.

23. Any land-owner proving to the satisfaction

Right of land-owner to resume possession of leased land required for his own cultivation.

of the Court that the quantity of land in his possession is insufficient for the support of himself and his household, may,

on payment of the market value of the land, be entitled to require a surrender of as much of the land of any tenant having a right of occu-pancy subordinate (7) him (the land-owner) as shall, when added to the land already in the land-owner's possession, be sufficient in the opinion of the Court for the support of himself and his household: Provided that, at the option of the tenant, the land-owner shall be required to take at the market-value either such additional quantity only, or the whole of the land-occupied by the

27. Any tenant having a right of occupancy in any land, and having an heir entitled to succeed Right of tenant to aliento such land, shall have power, subject to any restrictions imposed on the disposition of immoveable property generally by law or local usage, to alienate his tenure on payment to the land-owner of a sum of ten per cent-

Land-owner's right of of the market-value; provided that in every such pre-cuption. case the tenure shall be offered for sale in the first instance to the land-

owner at the market-value less ten per centum, and shall not be sold to any other person unless the land-owner shall for the space of one month refuse or neglect to complete the purchase.

Every person to whom a tenure shall be alienat-Right of tenant's alience. ed under this section, shall be deemed to have the same rights and to be subject to the same liabilities as the tenant making the alienation.

28. Any tenant having a right of occupancy but disentitled to plant or Removal of disability to cut down, remove and plant or cut trees. dispose of trees or timber planted by himself or of spontaneous growth, on the land in his occupation, shall, on tendering to

the land-owner such compensation as the Court shall think reasonable, become entitled to plant and cut down, remove and dispose of any such trees or timber as aforesaid. Provided that nothing herein contained shall be deemed to authorize the tenant to plant trees so as to diminish the amount of rent which he may from time to time be liable to pay in kind.

PART VI.

OF COMPENSATION FOR TENANTS' IMPROVEMENTS.

29. The land-owner may make improvements on the land in the occupa-Rights as to improvetion of any tenant; and any tenant may with the previous permission of the land-owner make improvements on such land : Provided that the land-owner shall be deemed to have given such permission in every case where, being cognizant of the improvements while they were being made, he did not expressly prohibit them.

30. Any tenant having a right of occupancy may require the land-Enforcement of tenant's owner either to make the right to require or make improvements or to give improvements. the tenant permission to

make them. If the land-owner refuse to make or neglect to commence and within a reasonable time to complete the improvements required of him, or to give the tenant permission to make them, the tenant may, on satisfying the Court that such improvements or any of them are or is desirable, obtain an order authorizing him to effect them or it himself.

- 31. If any tenant shall have made improvements on the land in his Tenant's right to comoccupation in accordance pensation for improvement. with the conditions mentioned in sections twenty-nine and thirty, and if the land-owner ejects or brings a suit to eject or to enhance the rent of such tenant, the tenant shall be entitled to compensation for the outlay, in money or labour, or both, in making such improvements, which shall have been effected by him within twenty years next before such ejectment or the institution of such suit as aforesaid
- 32. Such compensation shall, in case the tenant be ejected or the land-Compensation how made. owner sue to eject him, be made by payment in money; and in case the land-owner sue to cubance the rent within twenty years after the date of effecting any such improvement, the Court in making a decree in his favour shall not take into consideration the increase of the value of the land which may reasonably be attributed to such improvement: Provided that, in estimating the amount of the compensation, regard shall be had to any benefit derived by the tenant from his having been allowed to hold at a . rate of rent more favourable than the rate at which he otherwise would have held.
- 33. The word "improvements," as used in sections twenty-nine, thirty, "Improvements" defined. thirty-one and thirtytwo, means works by which the annual letting value of the land has been, and, at the time of demanding compensation, continues to be, increased, and shall comprise-

1st.—The construction of wells and of works for the storage of water, for applying water for irrigation, for drainage, and for protection against floods; the reclaiming and clearing of waste lands and jungles; and other works of a like nature;

2nd.—The renewal or re-construction of any of the foregoing works, or such alterations therein or additions thereto as are not required for maintaining the same, and which increase durably their value.

PART VII.

PROCEDURE.

Revenue Courts, what.

Courts shall be the several Courts mentioned in section four of the Panjáb Courts' Act, 1865, holding sittings on the revenue side, other than Courts of Small Causes; but instead of the Chief Court of the Panjáb, the final Court of appeal shall be the Court of the Financial Commissioner of the Panjáb. The Court of the Settlement Officer shall also for the purposes of this Act be deemed to be a Revenue Court. All the provisions of the said Act and of Act No. XXVII. of 1867 (to empower Deputy Commissioners in the Central Provinces, the Panjáb, Ouch and the Jhansi Division to distribute the business in subordinate Courts) shall, so far as they are applicable, apply to the Revenue Courts.

Revenue Courts to hear fourteen, fifteen, twenty-claims under certain sections.

State of the rules relating to civil procedure for the time being in force in the Panjáb shall, so far as they are applicable, apply to all suits brought before the Revenue Courts under this Act.

STATEMENT OF OBJECTS AND REASONS.

No Act at present exists to provide for the fixing or enhancing of the rent of land in the Pan-

jáb, or for dealing with the claims of tenants to rights of occupancy and with other matters relating to the tenancy of land. Acts for these purposes are in existence, which apply to Bengal and the North-Western Provinces, and a Bill on the same subject for the Province of Oudh has recently been introduced in the Council. An enactment for the regulation of these matters is no less required for the Panjáb. Whatever appeared applicable to the requirements of the Panjáb, in the North-West Provinces' Acts (Nos. X. of 1859, and XIV. of 1863) and the Oudh Bill, has been adopted in the present draft, but other provisions differing in some very material respects from the provisions made for these Provinces, have been introduced where they appear to be required by the different circumstances of the Panjáb. Perhaps the most important point in which this Bill differs from Act No. X. of 1859 is that, whereas by that Act tenants who have cultivated for twelve years are deemed to have rights of occupancy in the land so cultivated, under this Bill mere length of possession confers no right of occupancy on the tenant, but only creates a rebuttable presumption of such a right, if he has been entered in the settlement record as having right of occupancy, or if he has occupied his land for a period of twelve years before the annexation of the Panjáb; and mere length of possession under other circumstances creates no presumption of a right of occupancy in favour of the tenant.

I propose that this Bill be published for six or seven weeks before I move to pass it. There are so many experienced officers in the Panjáb, able to judge of the merits of the Bill, that I trust I shall, in this interval, receive from them valuable suggestions in regard to all the points on which it may require amendment.
