



## PART VI.

### BILLS OF THE GOVERNMENT OF INDIA.

#### HOME DEPARTMENT (Legislative).

The following Bill was introduced into the Council of the Governor General of India for the purpose of making Laws and Regulations, on the 7th February 1868, and was referred to a Select Committee, with instructions to make their report thereon in a fortnight:—

#### Bill No. 6 of 1868.

*A Bill to enable the Governor of Bombay in Council to delegate to the Commissioner in Sind certain of the powers of a Local Government.*

1. It shall be lawful for the Governor of Bombay in Council, by a notification published in the *Bombay Government Gazette*, to delegate to the Commissioner in Sind all or any of the powers conferred on the said Governor in Council, as the Local Government of the Province of Sind, by any of the Bombay Regulations, or by any Act of the Governor General of India in Council solely applicable to the Presidency of Bombay, or by any Act heretofore or hereafter passed by the Governor of Bombay in Council, or by any of the Acts of the Governor General of India in Council mentioned in the schedule to this Act.

2. It shall be lawful for the Governor of Bombay in Council, with the consent of the Governor General of India in Council, to delegate to the Commissioner in Sind certain powers of Local Government.

3. All acts done by the Commissioner in Sind under the authority of any power so delegated, shall be as valid as if they had been done by the Governor of Bombay in Council.

#### SCHEDULE.

- Act XXVI. of 1850, to enable improvements to be made in Towns.
- Act VII. of 1854, for the apprehension, within the territories under the Government of the East India Company, of persons charged with the commission of heinous offences beyond the limits of the said territories and for delivering them up to justice, and to provide for the execution of warrants in places out of the jurisdiction of the authorities issuing them.
- Act XXV. of 1861, for simplifying the Procedure of the Courts of Criminal Judicature not established by Royal Charter.
- Act VI. of 1863 to consolidate and amend the laws relating to the administration of the Department of Sea Customs in India.
- Act VII. of 1865 to give effect to Rules for the management and preservation of Government Forests.



STATEMENT OF OBJECTS AND REASONS.

By Act XXXII. of 1867 the Governor General of India in Council was empowered to delegate to a Chief Commissioner any power conferred on the Government of India as a Local Government by an Act of the Governor General of India in Council. When this Act was under consideration, the Government of Bombay represented that great inconvenience was found to arise from the non-possession, by the Commissioner in Sind, of some of the powers of a Local Government, and suggested that the opportunity might be taken of removing the inconvenience. The Government of India in reply stated its opinion as adverse to a

general enactment enabling the Government of Bombay to delegate to the Commissioner in Sind the powers of a Local Government, and suggested that a measure should be introduced for the special transfer of such of the powers as are requisite. The present Bill is therefore introduced in accordance with the instructions of the Government of India and the Government of Bombay.

We, the undersigned, the Members of the Select Committee of the Council of the Governor General of India for the purpose of making Laws and Regulations, to whom the Bill for repealing certain enactments which have ceased to be in force or have become unnecessary was referred, have the honour to report that we have considered the Bill and the papers noted in the margin, and have examined the Schedule of enactments which the Bill proposes to repeal.

From Under-Secretary to Government of Bombay, No. 3372, dated 20th November 1867.

Two of these enactments, Acts No. XIX. of 1858 and No. XLI. of 1858, we have struck out of the list, as we think they will be more fitly repealed by the measure for the consolidation of the stamp-laws, which will probably soon be introduced.

We have also omitted Act No. XXIII. of 1859 as being already repealed by Act No. XXV. of 1865.

We have omitted Act XIX. of 1844 as its repeal might, it is thought, give rise to questions as to the power of the Local Government to abolish taxes upon trades in districts which have been annexed since the Act was passed. We have also, at the desire of the Board of Revenue, North-Western Provinces, saved sections 16, 17, and 18, of Act IX. of 1859.

As some of the persons mentioned in the Schedule to Act XVIII. of 1848 are still alive, it seems undesirable to repeal that enactment.

Act XX. of 1859 has not yet expired, and to repeal it might, we think, be premature.

It seems undesirable to repeal single sections which merely repeal prior enactments. Such sections sometimes serve to interpret the rest of the enactment to which they belong. We have therefore omitted Act VIII. of 1856, section 1, and Act VI. of 1863, section 2.

We have added words saving Act XXIX. of 1837 as to the power to prescribe the language and character to be used in revenue and judicial proceedings, and saving Act XXVIII. of 1865 as to estates not completely wound up under its provisions.

2. We think that the following list of Bengal Regulations (for preparing which we are chiefly indebted to our late colleague, the Honorable Mr. Justice Hobhouse) may safely be added to the Schedule:—

2. The opinion expressed by your Government, that the rule in question was intended to apply only to Officers proceeding to Europe, is correct. Your Government will issue a notification accordingly.

‘5. The value of the services of the Warrant Officers of the Indian Army has been recently acknowledged by Majesty’s Government in the sanction they have accorded to the recommendations of your Government for the improvement of the pay and pension of the Warrant Classes.

‘6. In further recognition of their claims to the consideration of Her Majesty’s Government, I have to inform your Excellency that I have resolved on the adoption of the following rule in preference to the one suggested by you, viz:—

‘I.—That all Warrant Officers of the Indian Army who are compelled by sickness to take leave to Europe, shall be granted passages to England and back to India at the expense of Government, either in the troop-ships, if accommodation is available, or in sailing vessels.



' If they be accompanied by their wives and families, they will be required to pay in the former case the messing rates laid down in the the Royal Passage Warrant on their account. If proceeding by sailing ship, they must make their own arrangements for their families.

'7. The second rule proposed by your Government appears judicious, and I approve it accordingly :—

'II.—That Warrant Officers taking furlough to Europe on private affairs shall be required to lodge the full amount of return passage money, or to give approved security for the payment of the amount, in the event of being unable to make arrangements for their return themselves, in which case a Government return passage will be provided.

'8. These arrangements may be published as an addition to the Draft General Order approved in my Despatch No. 372, dated 9th December 1867, and will take effect from the 1st January 1868, applying to all such Warrant Officers as may now be on leave in this country.'

**Overland Postage Rates.**—Under the authority of the Treasury Warrant, published in page 490, Part I. of the *Bombay Government Gazette*, dated 26th December 1867, the correspondence of Officers of the Army in India is excluded from the operation of the increased rates of Postage on Letters passing between India and the United Kingdom, intimated in this Office Postal Notice No. 4, dated 26th instant, and will be charged the uniform rates below mentioned in which Inland Postage has been included.

2. Letters entitled to the privileged rates laid down in the Warrant, may be classed as follows, and must be subject to the conditions enumerated. Should any of these conditions not have been regarded, the cover will be considered an Ordinary Overland letter, and treated accordingly:—

I.—LETTERS POSTED IN INDIA.

- (a.) The sender must be a Commissioned Officer of the Army, actually employed (otherwise than in Civil employ) in Her Majesty's Service in India.
- (b.) The letter must be one addressed to the United Kingdom.
- (c.) The letter must bear by way of superscription,—
1. The signature of the Commissioned Officer who sends the letter.
  2. The signature of the Commanding Officer of the Regiment, Corps, or Detachment in which the sender is serving, or of the Local Head of the Department to which he belongs.
  3. A specification by the Commanding Officer or Local Head of the name of the Regiment, Corps, or Detachment in which the Officer is serving or of the Department to which he belongs.

II.—LETTERS DELIVERED IN INDIA.

- (a.) The letter must be one which has been posted in the United Kingdom.
- (b.) It must be addressed to a Commissioned Officer of the Army actually employed (otherwise than in Civil employ) in Her Majesty's Service in India.
- (c.) It must bear by way of superscription,—
1. The rank of the addressee; and
  2. The Regiment, Corps, or Detachment in which he is serving, or the Department to which he belongs.

3. As regards the term "Civil employ," it will be proper to regard all Military Officers serving under the orders of the Civil Administrations (*i. e.* not under the orders of the Commander-in-Chief) as being in Civil employ. For instance, Military Officers belonging to the Survey, Public Works, Education, Telegraph, Post Office, Police, Jail, and other similar Departments, as well as Secretaries to Government, Cantonment Magistrates, Commissioners, Deputy Commissioners, Civil Surgeons, &c., will be regarded as being in Civil employ.

4. The condition that the Officer must be "actually employed" in Her Majesty's Service in India, excludes Officers who may be on leave from a title to claim the privilege.

5. The term "Local Head of a Department" may be regarded as meaning the Chief Officer of the Department in the station where the letter is posted.

6. The privileged rates, subject to the abovenamed conditions, are as follows:—
