Pensions and Gratuities.

Fort William, the 29th February 1868.

Read—A letter from the Junior Secretary to the Government of Bengal, No. 7, dated the 3rd ultimo, soliciting that Captain J. R. R. Coombs, an Officer on the Invalid Pension Establishment, who has been appointed License Tax Assessor of Darjeeling, may be permitted to draw the salary of that office in addition to his pension, and that the Local Government may be authorised at its discretion to make exceptions, in the cases of pensioners whose employment is strictly temporary, and does not last for more than a year, to the general rule under which salary and pension cannot be drawn together by the same person.

RESOLUTION.—The application cited above is sanctioned, and all Local Governments are hereby empowered to exercise the discretion applied for by the Government of Bengal.

Resolution.—The Governor General in Council observes that until recently Covenanted Civil Servants were required to pass examinations in the vernacular languages of India after their arrival in the country, and were restricted from the dates of their arrival to the dates on which they were declared qualified for the public service to allowances termed salary, house rent, and pundit allowance, the aggregates of which varied from Rs. 250 to Rs. 380 per mensem; but as under the system since introduced they will have passed examinations in the vernacular languages and in law before their departure from England, there is no longer any necessity for a difference between their allowances in India, before and after they are posted to the public service. His Excellency in Council is therefore pleased to rule that Covenanted Civil Servants posted to the upper Division of the Bengal Presidency, with permission to come to India viā Bombay, shall be entitled to a salary of Rs. 400 per mensem from the date of their reporting their arrival at Bombay, and that every other such servants who shall have passed for the Service under the new system referred to above, be entitled to a salary of Rs. 400 per mensem from the date of his reporting his arrival at the Presidency to which he belongs.

The Right Honourable the Governor in Council is pleased to publish, for the information of all concerned, the following Extract from the proceedings of the Government of India:—

Extract from the Proceedings of the Government of India, in the Home Department (Public), under date the 24th February 1868.

Read again Resolution recorded in this Department, No. 2710-19, dated the 24th July 1867.

Read a letter from the Government of Bombay, No. 144, dated the 21st January 1868.

REMARKS.—In the Resolution of the 24th July the Government of India negatived a proposal made by the Bombay Government for the extension to Uncovenanted Officers of the Rules for the examination of Military Officers in Native languages, but remarked that 'encouragement might be advantageously held out to Europeans and Eurasians above certain ranks in certain departments to acquire a better knowledge of the language of the province in which they serve than it is found expedient to demand in preliminary or probationary examinations, &c. &c.'

- 2. The Government of Bombay now proposes the grant of Moonshee allowance, or a sum of Rupces 180 to Officers in the Survey, of rank not lower than Supernumerary Assistant Superintendent; in the Police, not lower than Assistant Superintendent; in the Customs, not lower than Assistant Commissioner; and in the Forests, not lower than Assistant Conservator; on their passing in any Vernacular language according to the higher standard, 'including, as a special case, Natives passing according to the same standard in any language not their own Vernacular.'
- 3. The Governor General in Council considers it desirable to encourage young men to pass these examinations, and accedes to the proposal submitted by the Government of Bombay. His Excellency in Council, would, however, confine the measure to Europeans of the classes indicated, to whom it should be made applicable throughout India.

ORDERED, that a copy of this Resolution be forwarded to the Governments of Madras, Bombay, Bengal, North-Western Provinces, and the Punjab; the Chief Commissioners of Oude, Central Provinces, and British Burmah; the Resident at Hyderabad; and the Commissioner of Mysore and Coorg; to the Surveyor General of India; the Superintendent Great Trigonometrical Survey; and Superintendent Geological Survey; and also to the Financial Department.

His Excellency in Council commends the conduct of Captain MacLeod and the Officers and men under his orders on this occasion.

His Excellency in Council greatly regrets the loss sustained by the death of Russuldar Mahomed Khan, of the

There is reason to believe that Captain MacLeod's report of Roopa Sing and the Purmeshwur having been killed is a mistake.

"I have the honour to report the operations and movements of the Field Force under my command for the information of the Major General Commanding the Division.

I arrived at Hullole on Sunday, 9th February, and received over command from Lieutenant Burnes, who had already preceded me with one hundred men of the 26th Regt. N.I.

On the morning of February 11th I marched on Sewrajpoor, distant twelve miles via Champaneer, after leaving a party of 25 men under a Native Officer at Hullole, and sending a party of the same strength to Major Barton at Rajgurh. The road through the jungle to Sewrajpoor was good, the greater part of it having been recently cut and burnt, but in certain places the grass was very high.

On our arrival at Sewrajpoor, we cleared a large tract of jungle, and thus made a good encamping-ground. I was here joined by Lieutenant Reay with 60 men of the 6th N. I., and a party of Arabs, Mekranees, and Gaekwar

On the morning of 14th February I marched on Zambooghora, distant nine miles, and went through a Pass

in which the Bheels made a stand against our forces in 1858. I however threw out flanking parties and crowned the heights in succession; no opposition was made to our march. The road lay through a very dense jungle. On arriving at Zambooghora the jungle was cleared round about, and a good encamping-ground was formed. Information baving been received that the Bheels were assembled in force at a village called Warrick, distant six miles from Zambooghora, I proceeded to attack them on the morning of the 16th with a force as per margin.

Mr. Propert, the Agent to the Governor in the Punch Mahals, and Mr. Rogers, the Police Commissioner, accompanied the force, and kindly placed their services at my disposal.

We arrived before Warrick about 7-30 A.M., having taken the usual precautions of advanced guards and flanking parties.

The village of Warrick is surrounded on all sides by high ranges of hills, which are densely clothed with jungle The Pass leading to the village is a very narrow one. At the entrance of this Pass I sent some of my men in extended order with some Arabs to crown a hill on my left, which commanded the Pass. On arriving at the top they reported to me that the village was visible, and that there were a number of men in it. Leaving the main body in command of Lieutenant Burnes, I proceeded to reconnoitre the enemy's position. Having made my arrangements for the attack, I now advanced to storm the village. Perceiving that the rebels were attempting to flee into the thick jungle behind them, I put myself at the head of the sowars and charged at them, and cut them off. I was most gallantly supported by Russuldar Mahomed Khan, of the Poona Horse, who, I regret to say, fell mortally indicated with grows. In the meanting the grain heady conting up, through the cillage the processing up through the cillage the grain heady conting up through the cillage. most gallantly supported by Isussidiar Manomed Khan, of the Foolia Horse, with, I regret to say, fell mortally wounded, pierced with arrows. In the meantime the main body coming up through the village at the charge in the centre, and Captain Segrave and Lieutenaut Westmacott simultaneously on the right, with the men of the Bheel Corps, dispersed the insurgents, killing and wounding several of them. The "Purmeshwur," the high priest of the rebels, and Roopa Sing, the Chief of the rebellion, together with one of his sons and several of their followers, were killed. The fight during the time it lasted, viz., ten minutes, was hotly contested; the Purmeshwur and a few of his followers being evidently worked up to a state of religious frenzy. We now burnt the village and returned to camp. We buried Russaldar Mahomed Khan with all the respect due to so brave a soldier. Mr. Propert, the Agent to the Governor in the Punch Mahals, came to the front most gallantly and shot one of the rebels with his own hand. Mr. Rogers also rendered me great assistance in keeping the hills with the Arabs. Captain Segrave and Lieutenant Westmacott also led forward their men most gallantly. To Captain Segrave the honour is due of having shot the Purmeshwur. I have also to thank Lieutenants Burnes and Reay for the able manner in which they brought up the men to the attack. The Native officers and men behaved well, fighting in such a jungly and unaccustomed place.

On the evening of the 16th news arrived from Sewrajpoor, where I had left fifty men and some Mekranees under Subedar Sheik Sultan, that the Bheels had attacked them during the previous night and had been repulsed, and that, although they dragged away their dead, still, from reports since received, there were some five and twenty killed and wounded. One of our men was wounded by an arrow in the leg.

We are now awaiting further information. I believe a severe blow has been struck, and that the country will be soon quiet again."

XXXVII. British Troops being about to proceed to the interior of Abyssinia, Sir Robert Napier desires every one under his Command to bear in mind how absolutely necessary it is for the character and well-being of the Force to maintain a considerate and conciliatory bearing towards the people of the country; that no act of violence or aggression be committed, and that all labour and supplies be promptly paid for.

All Troops and all Followers, Public and Private, are to be carefully warned against straggling.

Soldiers who may be reported "foot sore" or otherwise temporarily disabled from keeping up with the column, should be told off in good time so as to accompany the Baggage Guard.

Men falling out afterwards as unequal to keep up, are to be collected regimentally, under a non-commissioned officer, whose duty it will be to keep them together, and bring them up steadily in rear of the Column, but every precaution is to to be taken that men do not fall out without sufficient reason.

When the Column is halted on the line of march for rest, the men are not to move out too far from the Flank, especially if the march be not in broad day-light.

Her Majesty's Regulations as laid down for "Route Marching" are to be strictly adhered to, and Captains of Companies are to be held responsible that no man leaves the ranks in an irregular manner.

The inspection of the men's ammunition and equipments is to be carefully looked to daily, and immediate notice is to be taken of any defect or deficiency.

General Officers commanding Divisions, and all Officers commanding separate bodies of Troops, will invariably adopt the measures prescribed by the customs and regulations of Her Majesty's Army, for the due protection of their Camps by day and night, and for that of their Columns on the line of march.

All Officers exercising Command are directed to have this order carefully explained to every individual under their orders.

The Commander-in-Chief is confident of receiving the fullest support from the whole of the Officers and Men of the Force, in maintaining its character for strict discipline and good conduct.

European Rations.

The daily allowance of 4 oz. of rice to cease; the men to be permitted in lieu to draw money compensation for this article.

Native Rations.

The rice and flour ration of fighting men to be reduced to 12 oz. of each per man per diem; one-half pound of mutton or money compensation in lieu, at the option of the soldier, being given for the difference.

Public and Private Followers will draw 10 oz. of flour, 10 oz. of rice per diem, and a quarter of a pound of mutton or goat in lieu of the balance; other articles of ration to stand as before.

In the case of Public Followers, money compensation will be allowed, if desired, in lieu of the balance of rice and flour.

Officers Horses will receive only six pounds instead of eight pounds of grain per diem.

Overland Postage Rates.—Under the authority of the Treasury Warrant, published in page 490, Part I. of the Bombay Government Gazette, dated 26th December 1867, the correspondence of Officers of the Army in India is excluded from the operation of the increased rates of Postage on letters passing between India and the United Kingdom, intimated in this Office Postal Notice No. 4, dated 26th instant, and will be charged, from 1st April 1868 the uniform rates below mentioned, in which Inland Postage has been included.

2. Letters entitled to the privileged rates laid down in the Warrant, may be classed as follows, and must be subject to the conditions enumerated. Should any of these conditions not have been regarded, the cover will be considered an Ordinary Overland letter, and treated accordingly:—

I .- LETTERS POSTED IN INDIA.

- (a.) The sender must be a Commissioned Officer of the Army, actually employed (otherwise than in Civil employ) in Her Majesty's Service in India.
- (b.) The letter must be one addressed to the United Kingdom.
- (c.) The letter must bear by way of superscription,-
 - 1. The signature of the Commissioned Officer who sends the letter.
 - 2. The signature of the Commanding Officer of the Regiment, Corps, or Detachment in which the sender is serving, or of the Local Head of the Department to which he belongs.
 - 3. A specification by the Commanding Officer or Local Head of the name of the Regiment, Corps, or Detachment in which the Officer is serving or of the Department to which he belongs.

II .- LETTERS DELIVERED IN INDIA.

- (a). The letter must be one which has been posted in the United Kingdom.
- (b). It must be addressed to a Commissioned Officer of the Army actually employed (otherwise than in Civil employ) in Her Majesty's Service in India.
- (c). It must bear by way of superscription, -
 - 1. The rank of the addressee; and
 - 2. The Regiment, Corps, or Detachment in which he is serving, or the Department to which he belongs.
- 3. As regards the term "Civil employ," it will be proper to regard all Military Officers serving under the orders of the Civil Administrations (i. e. not under the orders of the Commander-in-Chief) as being in Civil employ. For instance, Military Officers belonging to the Survey, Public Works, Education, Telegraph, Post Office, Police, Jail, and other similar Departments, as well as Secretaries to Government, Cantonment Magistrates, Commissioners, Deputy Commissioners, Civil Surgeons, &c., will be regarded as being in Civil employ.
- 4. The condition that the Officer must be "actually employed" in Her Majesty's Service in India, excludes Officers who may be on leave from a title to claim the privilege.
- 5. The term "Local Head of a Department" may be regarded as meaning the Chief Officer of the Department in the station where the letter is posted.
 - 6. The privileged rates, subject to the abovenamed conditions, are as follows:-

Overland Postage Rates.—Under instructions this day received from Her Majesty's Post Master General, it is hereby notified for the information of the public, that the single rate of postage on Letters sent between the United Kingdom and India, viá Southampton, has been raised from 4 Annas to 6 Annas, the rate on those forwarded via Marseilles by British Packet, or by French Packet, being in like manner raised from 6 Annas 8 Pie to 8 Annas 8 Pie.

Unpaid Letters, whether forwarded viá Southampton, viá Marseilles, or by French Packet, will be liable, in addition to the foregoing rates, to a fine of 6 Annas, and insufficiently paid Letters will be liable to

the deficient postage, and a like fine of 6 Annas.

All Letters forwarded from India through the United Kingdom to Foreign Countries or British Colonies will in like manner be subject to an additional charge of 2 Annas per 1 oz. over and above the rates which have heretofore been chargeable in India.

It has also been decided to alter the scale of progression for charging Letters above the weight of ½ oz.,

and to adopt a scale of charge rising by half ounces.

The above changes have been ordered with effect from the 1st April next; Letters posted in India on or

after that date being subject to the new rates.
