## REVENUE DEPARTMENT.

The following Table of Penalties, prepared under the provisions of Sections 24 and 86 of the Indian Registration Act XX. of 1866, has been approved of by the Governor General of India in Council, and is published for general information:—

## Penalties under Section 24.

1. If an instrument be presented under Section 24 after the expiration of the time ordinarily prescribed for presentation, the penalty imposed shall be according to the following scale:—

If the delay has been

Less than one month .....	5 times the proper Registration fee.

Other Penalties.

2. When any person whose presence or testimony is necessary for the registration of a document shall not appear before the Registering Officer, and the person who presented the document shall not apply to the Registering Officer to take steps under Section 37 to secure his attendance, the following extra fees shall be paid :—

3. When any person or his authorised agent holds a receipt\* for a document presented for Registration, and fails to present the receipt and claim the document within two months from the date or order of Registration, the following extra fees will be levied from him before the document is returned to him:—

From date of Registration up to two months . . . . .	Nothing.
For third month . . . . .	One anna per diem.
For fourth month . . . . .	Two annas per diem.

A notice will be issued one month after the order for Registration has been given directing the parties to take away their documents, and the notice will also state that if they fail to do so within one month \* after date of notice the above fees will be levied.

CLXXXI. The Commander-in-Chief has lately received from the Director, Transport Train, A. E. Force, a full and particular report of the services rendered to the Corps by the different Officers under his command.

His Excellency has perused this report with much satisfaction, and it is most gratifying to him to find that, in spite of the numerous and extraordinary difficulties with which the Officers of the Transport Train have had to contend, and notwithstanding the hard and unceasing work they have had to perform, they have, almost without exception, displayed an amount of steady determination to do their best which is beyond all praise.

The Commander-in-Chief begs to assure Major Warden and the Officers under his command that the work performed by them has not been overlooked, and shall not be forgotten.

His Excellency trusts that one and all will remember that upon their individual exertions depends, in a great measure, the success of the Expedition.

The Transport Train, for reasons far beyond the control of the Officers belonging to it, has but just commenced to assume that Military organization so requisite to its well being, and for want of which at first it suffered so severely.

It is therefore most essential that each officer should exert himself to the utmost to ensure a steady progress in this direction; and His Excellency feels assured that in a very short time the Corps will have attained that state of efficiency for which all interested in it have been so long striving.



The Commander-in-Chief is well aware how much the services of the Officers of the Transport Train have been depreciated, and how unfairly blame has been attached to them for shortcomings beyond their control.

His Excellency, however, assures them that he has never for a moment lost confidence in them, nor has he ever doubted that their exertions would eventually bring order and regularity out of confusion and indiscipline.

It must be remembered, however, that much hard work still remains to be done, and the officers of the Transport Train must be prepared to go through with it until the object of the Expedition has been obtained.

They must remember that their duty does not merely extend to the men and animals composing their own Divisions, but that it is absolutely necessary that a general interest should be felt in the working of the whole train.

When on detached duty, more especially, it is essential that officers should look closely after every animal in the same convoy or in the same line with those of their own Division, and ensure proper care and attention being paid to them. When on the march they should be incessantly on the move along the whole line of convoy, so as to ensure the proper attention of the muleteers to the animals under their charge. Unceasing supervision on their part can alone prevent neglect of orders amongst those under their commands and consequent injury to animals, the value of which at the present moment can scarcely be too highly estimated.

No point, however minute, which is likely to tend to the comfort or efficiency of these animals must therefore be overlooked, and His Excellency relies upon his orders on these points being carried out in the spirit and in the letter.

All cannot, of course, work under the immediate eye of the Commander-in-Chief, and comparatively few can accompany the advanced force, but His Excellency will make no distinction, when the Campaign is over, between those who were in front or those who were necessarily in rear.

All, by good work, can contribute materially to the success of the Campaign, and it will be by that standard alone that His Excellency will be guided when making hereafter his report upon the services performed by the Officers under his command.

No. 92, dated 5th ultimo, and consequent on the approaching advance of so many Troops to the front, the "Second Reserve" Ammunition, as therein detailed, of every Corps and Battery ordered now or hereafter, to Antalo, is to be sent to that post, where it will be disposed of according to circumstances, and placed under charge of a competent Officer,—the remainder of the Ammunition being detained at Senafe.

General and other Officers Commanding at Zoulla, Senafe, and Addigerat respectively, will be good enough to accord due aid in giving effect to this order.

CXC. The following rules for the Conservancy of Standing Camps in Abyssinia are published for general information and guidance:—

1. No ground is to be taken up for standing camps unless it has been inspected and reported on by the Sanitary Officer.
2. When lines are occupied, the Commanding Officer of the Battery or Regiment occupying them will be held responsible for their condition, and, on vacation, he will report that all ordinary refuse has been collected into heaps, that all glass has been removed and buried, tent pegs taken up, followers' huts pulled down, and the materials stacked, excavations for cooking-places levelled, latrines filled in, and their sites marked by raised mounds. This report is to be sent in before the rear guard leaves the ground.
3. When lines are vacated the Sanitary Officer will take possession of them and prepare them for reoccupation.
4. Should there happen to be fragments of carcases, half burnt bones or garbage on the ground, all will be collected and thoroughly burnt, and the ashes buried in pits not less than 4 feet deep. The ground from which the fragments were removed and that upon which they were burnt is to be deodorized when practicable, the surface being removed and replaced by fresh and dry earth.

#### *Latrines.*

Latrines will in all cases be opened as soon as lines are taken up:—they are to be made as narrow and as deep as possible,—a covering of from 8 to 12 inches of loose earth is to be thrown in every night, and when within 2 feet of the surface they are to be filled in and others opened, a raised mound is to mark the old sites.

They are to be made both for troops and followers, and Regimental and Departmental Medical Officers will visit them from time to time to see that they are properly maintained.

Commanding Officers and Heads of Departments will be good enough to report to the Assistant Quarter Master General upon this subject as soon as possible.

#### *Lines.*

The greatest attention is to be paid to the cleanliness of the lines, and all ordinary refuse is to be thrown into one place, from whence it will be removed by the general conservancy establishment.

#### *Ventilation.*

The lines of ventilation are to run with the prevailing winds, and the lines of tents are, if practicable, to be in echelon.

#### *Horses.*

All horses are to be to leeward of their respective lines.

#### *Followers' Huts.*

Followers' huts are also to be to leeward; no deviation is to be allowed from the line of direction, and especial attention is to be paid to their cleanliness.

#### *Tents.*

The practice of making water near the tents is to be checked, and no bones, broken victuals, or other refuse is to be allowed to accumulate.

If Straw be used for bedding it is to be kept dry, plaited along the foot line and pegged down; it is to be exposed to the sun and air, and changed as often as possible.

Every eighth day the walls of the tents are to be taken down at 6 A.M. (weather permitting); all kit is to be removed so that sun and air may have free access. They will be kept down for one hour.

If the tents be Rowties they will be struck for the same length of time, and their sites freely exposed.

All tents are to be trenched if occupied more than a week, and, if necessary, these trenches are to be connected with a surface drain.

The ground inside of the tents is not to be excavated,

*Minor Establishments.*

All cook-rooms, workshops, forges, shoeing sheds, and similar minor establishments are to be placed to leeward, and their refuse is never to be allowed to accumulate for more than one clear working day.

*Litter.*

The stable litter of the different lines is to be collected in heaps, and removed from time to time by the conservancy establishment.

*Slaughter Yards, &c.*

The Assistant Commissary General will be good enough to see that proper limits are assigned to the cattle pens, slaughter yards, and hanging ground, and within those limits the most scrupulous cleanliness is to be observed.

Refuse matter and offal are to be removed at once to a distance of 200 yards to leeward. They are then to be buried in pits as deep as the nature of the ground will admit of being dug.

No skins are to be dried within 200 yards of the slaughter yards, and then only to leeward.

Lines will be assigned to the public followers, and Heads of Departments will be held responsible for their condition.

References upon general questions of conservancy are to be made to the Sanitary Officer, who at all times is to have access to every part of the camp.

Supplementary orders will be issued as the necessity arises.

Commanding Officers and Heads of Departments will be held responsible that the above rules are copied and enforced.

CXCI. A War Office Form required to show the distribution of each Corps and Battery in this Force has been received and issued to Corps, and will be substituted for the Regimental Monthly Distribution Return rendered by Corps on the 1st of each month, through Assistant Adjutant Generals of Divisions, to this Department.

The new Returns to be furnished as punctually as possible on or after the 15th March, and every following month, through the Assistant Adjutant Generals of Division,—except those of the Royal Artillery, which are to be rendered to this Office direct by the Colonel Commanding R.A., A.E.F.

As all "Morning States" now show the number of Public and Private Followers and Animals with each Corps, the separate Memorandum as to Followers now furnished by Corps on Mondays may be discontinued. A Memorandum however, of Followers of Divisional and Brigade Staff should be sent in, in which should be included those of Civilians who may be residing in the respective Camps, and who have been requested to afford the information to the several Staff Officers whenever required.

CXCII. The Commander-in-Chief directs that G. O. C. No. 153, dated the 23rd instant, shall be held applicable to all Officers and Troops proceeding south of Koomaylee.

No Interpreters should be detached, except in cases of emergency, from the stations at which they are now serving without special sanction being obtained through the Assistant Quarter Master General at Army Head Quarters. When it becomes necessary to move an Interpreter without the previous sanction of the Commander-in-Chief having been obtained, a special report should be made for His Excellency's information.

3. Monthly Muster Rolls of all Tent Lascars serving in Abyssinia are to be furnished by Corps and Departments to the Commissary of Ordnance, Zoulla, who will submit a general return monthly to the Assistant Quarter General at Army Head Quarters.

CXCIII. Until the Postal packets in Abyssinia are carried by paid runners no inland postage is to be charged.

CXCIV. The usual ration of Rum for 1,000 men for one month is to be provided for the Troops advancing beyond this.

The ration of Salt at this and onward stations is to be reduced to one-half ounce.

CXCV. The appointment of Lieutenant Sorell, R.A., as notified in G. O. C. No. 165, dated 28th February 1868, is to be considered a "temporary arrangement."

CXCVI. Lieutenant Seton, R.A., was appointed Staff Officer, Land Transport Corps, at Addigerat, as a temporary measure, with effect from the 16th February 1868.

**Overland Postage Rates on Army Officers' letters.**—Instructions having this day been received from the London General Post Office altering from full ounces to half-ounces the scale of progression of weight for Letters between India and the United Kingdom sent to or by Officers of the Army in India, this Postal Notice will supersede that issued by this Office on the 29<sup>th</sup> ultimo, No. 5.



2. It will be observed that the only change now made is the imposition of four annas per half oz. in lieu of 8 annas per oz. on Letters weighing more than one ounce.

3. Under the authority of the Treasury Warrant, published in page 490, Part I. of the *Bombay Government Gazette*, dated 26th December 1867, the correspondence of Officers of the Army in India is excluded from the operation of the increased rates of Postage on letters passing between India and the United Kingdom, intimated in this Office Postal Notice No. 4, dated 26th instant, and will be charged, the uniform rates below mentioned, in which Inland Postage has been included.

4. Letters entitled to the privileged rates laid down in the Warrant, may be classed as follows, and must be subject to the conditions enumerated. Should any of these conditions not have been regarded, the cover will be considered an ordinary Overland letter, and treated accordingly:—

I.—LETTERS POSTED IN INDIA.

- (a.) The Sender must be a Commissioned Officer of the Army, actually employed (otherwise than in Civil employ) in Her Majesty's Service in India.
- (b.) The letter must be one addressed to the United Kingdom.
- (c.) The letter must bear by way of superscription—
  1. The signature of the Commissioned Officer who sends the letter.
  2. The signature of the Commanding Officer of the Regiment, Corps, or Detachment in which the sender is serving, or of the Local Head of the Department to which he belongs.
  3. A specification by the Commanding Officer or Local Head of the name of the Regiment, Corps, or Detachment in which the Officer is serving or of the Department to which he belongs.

II.—LETTERS DELIVERED IN INDIA.

- (a.) The letter must be one which has been posted in the United Kingdom.
  - (b.) It must be addressed to a Commissioned Officer of the Army actually employed (otherwise than in Civil employ) in Her Majesty's Service in India.
  - (c.) It must bear by way of superscription,—
    1. The rank of the addressee; and
    2. The Regiment, Corps, or Detachment in which he is serving, or the Department to which he belongs.
5. As regards the term "Civil employ," it will be proper to regard all Military Officers serving under the orders of the Civil Administrations (*i. e.* not under the orders of the Commander-in-Chief) as being in Civil employ. For instance, Military Officers belonging to the Survey, Public Works, Education, Telegraph, Post Office, Police, Jail, and other similar Departments, as well as Secretaries to Government, Cantonment Magistrates, Commissioners, Deputy Commissioners, Civil Surgeons, &c., will be regarded as being in Civil employ.
6. The condition that the Officer must be "actually employed" in Her Majesty's Service in India, excludes Officers who may be on leave from a title to claim the privilege.
7. The term "Local Head of a Department" may be regarded as meaning the Chief Officer of the Department in the station where the letter is posted.
8. The privileged rates, subject to the abovenamed conditions, are as follows:—

**Increased Rates of Postage on Overland Letters.**—Under instructions this day received from Her Majesty's Post Master General, it is hereby notified for the information of the public, that the single rate of postage on Letters sent between the United Kingdom and India, *viâ* Southampton, has been raised from 4 Annas to 6 Annas, the rate on those forwarded *viâ* Marseilles by British Packet, or by French Packet, being in like manner raised from 6 Annas 8 Pic to 8 Annas 8 Pic.

Unpaid Letters, whether forwarded *viâ* Southampton, *viâ* Marseilles, or by French Packet, will be liable, in addition to the foregoing rates, to a fine of 6 Annas, and insufficiently paid Letters will be liable to the deficient postage, and a like fine of 6 Annas.

All Letters forwarded from India through the United Kingdom to Foreign Countries or British Colonies will in like manner be subject to an additional charge of 2 Annas per  $\frac{1}{2}$  oz. over and above the rates which have heretofore been chargeable in India.

It has also been decided to alter the scale of progression for charging Letters above the weight of  $\frac{1}{2}$  oz., and to adopt a scale of charge rising by half ounces.

The above changes have been ordered with effect from the 1st April next; Letters posted in India on or after that date being subject to the new rates.

**Postage to the United States.**—The public are hereby informed, that, under a new Postal Convention concluded by Her Majesty's Postmaster General with the United States of America, the postage chargeable on letters sent from England to the United States has been reduced, provision being also made for the transmission of Book and Pattern Packets.

2. Under the new arrangement, the consolidated rates of postage (including the increased rates recently ordered between India and the United Kingdom) chargeable on Letters, Newspapers, and Book and Pattern Packets, addressed to the United States of America, will be as follows, viz.:—

**Postage to places in Turkey.**—Under instructions from Her Majesty's Post Master General the following rates of postage will be chargeable in India, on correspondence addressed to Europe "via Trieste," or sent through the Austrian Post Office at Alexandria, to places\* in Turkey where there are Austrian Post Offices.

The full prepayment of these rates is in all cases compulsory, and they do not carry the covers to destination, being in fact only the Indian and British Packet rates. The Austrian rates cannot be prepaid in India.
