NOTIFICATION BY THE HIGH COURT OF JUDICATURE, BOMBAY.

The following Rules for the examination of candidates for the Office of Moonsiff are published in supersession of all former rules on the subject:-

1. An examination of candidates for the office of Moonsiff will be held annually in Bombay, in the month of March or April. Due notice will be given in the *Government Gazette* of the days and place of examination.

2. The examination will be conducted by a Committee appointed by the Chief Justice and Judges of Her Majesty's High Court of Judicature at Bombay. All applications to the Committee are to be addressed to the Registrar of the High Court, Appellate Side.

3. Any natural born subject of Her Majesty who shall be desirous of qualifying himself for the appointment of Moonsiff will be entitled, on application to the Committee, to be examined at any such examination, provided he shall, on or before the first day of January preceding the examination, have transmitted to the Committee, with his application :--

- (a).—A certificate showing the place of his birth, and that his age at the date of the examination will be more than twenty-five years.
- (b).—A certificate that he can speak, read, and write with case and correctness one or more of the vernacular languages which are used in the District Courts of the Bombay Presidency, viz. Mahratta, Guzerathee, and Canarese, and also that he has a similar knowledge of the English language.

(c) .- Satisfactory proof of good moral character.

(d).—A fee of Rs. 25, for which a receipt will be furnished by the Registrar, and which will be returned if the candidate's certificates are not considered by the Committee to be satisfactory.

4. If the candidate resides in Bombay, his certificates must be signed by the Head of the Department in which he has served, if the candidate is a Government Servant, or by the First Judge of the Court of Small Causes at Bombay, or by the Principal of some College or other Institution recognized by the University of Bombay, or by a Professor of the Government Law School.

5. If the candidate does not reside in Bombay, his certificates must be signed by the Judge of the 5. If the candidate does not reside in Bonnbay, his certificates must be signed by the Judge of the District in which he has resided during the twelve months immediately preceding the date of application; or if, during such preceding twelve months, he has resided in more than one District, then his certificates must be signed by the Judge of each District in which he has so resided. If the candidate has not resided for twelve months in any District of the Bombay Presidency, then his certificates must be signed by the Chief Officer or Officers having civil authority in the place or places where he has been so residing.

6. In any case in which a doubt may arise as to the eligibility of a candidate in respect of age or character, such enquiries as may be necessary will be made by the Committee.

7. The Registrar will publish in the Government Gazette, under the orders of the Chief Justice and Judges of the High Court, within a reasonable time before the date fixed for the examination, a list of the candidates whose applications are admitted.

8. The examination will be conducted in the English language in the following subjects, and the merit of each candidate will be estimated by marks, the number set opposite to each subject in the following list denoting the greatest number of marks that can be obtained in respect of such subject :--

10. No candidate will be allowed any marks in respect of any subject of examination unless he shall be considered to possess a competent knowledge of that subject.

11. The examination will be conducted by means of printed questions and written answers, and by viva roce examination, as may be deemed necessary.

The marks obtained by each candidate in respect of the several subjects of examination will be added together, and each candidate who has obtained at least one-third of the total number of marks which can be obtained in respect of each subject of examination, and at least two-thirds of the total number of marks which can be obtained in respect of all the subjects, will be held to be duly qualified for appointment as a Moonsiff; and a list of qualified candidates will be published, under the orders of the Chief Justice and Judges of the High Court, in the Government Gazette, after the close of the examination. In the published list, the candidates will be ranked in their order of merit as determined by the macks obtained by them.

13. Each candidate who has passed the examination will receive a certificate of qualification signed by the Registrar.

The first examination under these Rules will be held in 1869, and, after the 1st January 1871, the 14. the Chief Justice and Judges of the High Court will not appoint to the office of Moonsiff any person who has not obtained a certificate of qualification under these Rules.

No person who has obtained a certificate of qualification will be appointed a Moonsiff in any District unless the Chief Justice and Judges of the High Court shall be satisfied that he is sufficiently acquainted with the language of the District.

Any person who shall have obtained a certificate of qualification under these Rules will be entitled, without further examination, to apply for a sunnud authorising him to practise as a pleader in the Civil Courts of any District of the Bombay Presidency with the vernacular language of which he has been certified, under Rule 3, to be acquainted.

 - 1. The signature of the Commissioned Officer who sends the letter.
 - The signature of the Commanding Officer of the Regiment, Corps, or Detachment in which the 2. sender is serving, or of the Local Head of the Department to which he belongs.
 - A specification by the Commanding Officer or Local Head of the name of the Regiment, Corps, 3. or Detachment in which the Officer is serving or of the Department to which he belongs.

II.-LETTERS DELIVERED IN INDIA.

 (a). The letter must be one which has been posted in the United Kingdom.
 (b). It must be addressed to a Commissioned Officer of the Army actually employed (otherwise than in Civil employ) in Her Majesty's Service in India.

(c). It must bear by way of superscription,-

- 1. The rank of the addressee ; and
- 2. The Regiment, Corps, or Detachment in which he is serving, or the Department to which he belongs.

5. As regards the term "Civil employ," it will be proper to regard all Military Officers serving under the orders of the Civil Administrations (i. e. not under the orders of the Commander-in-Chief) as being in Civil employ. For instance, Military Officers belonging to the Survey, Public Works, Education, Telegraph, Post Office, Police, Jail, and other similar Departments, as well as Secretaries to Government, Cantonment Magistrates, Commissioners, Deputy Commissioners, Civil Surgeons, &c., will be regarded as being in Civil employ.

The condition that the Officer must be "actually employed" in Her Majesty's Service in India, 6. excludes Officers who may be on leave from a title to claim the privilege.

7. The term "Local Head of a Department" may be regarded as meaning the Chief Officer of the Department in the station where the letter is posted.

Increased Rates of Postage on Overland Letters.—Under instructions this day received from Her Majesty's Post Master General, it is hereby notified for the information of the public, that the single rate of postage on Letters sent between the United Kingdom and India, *viá* Southampton, has been raised from 4 Annas to 6 Annas, the rate on those forwarded *viá* Marseilles by British Packet, or by French Packet, being in like manner raised from 6 Annas 8 Pie to 8 Annas 8 Pie.

Unpaid Letters, whether forwarded viá Southampton, viá Marseilles, or by French Packet, will be liable, in addition to the foregoing rates, to a fine of 6 Annas, and insufficiently paid Letters will be liable to the deficient postage, and a like fine of 6 Annas.

All Letters forwarded from India through the United Kingdom to Foreign Countries or British Colonics will in like manner be subject to an additional charge of 2 Annas per $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. over and above the rates which have heretofore been chargeable in India.

It has also been decided to alter the scale of progression for charging Letters above the weight of $\frac{1}{2}$ oz., and to adopt a scale of charge rising by half ounces.

The above changes have been ordered with effect from the 1st April next; Letters posted in India on or after that date being subject to the new rates.

Postage to the United States.—The public are hereby informed, that, under a new Postal Convention concluded by Her Majesty's Postmaster General with the United States of America, the postage chargeable on letters sent from England to the United States has been reduced, provision being also made for the transmission of Book and Pattern Packets.
